

At 22, Dempsey was the youngest Major in the history of the Army Air Corps (before it became the United States Air Force).

Seated straight ahead (with the cane and white hat) is Sir Winston Churchill, Prime Minister of Great Britain. To Churchill's right sit Sir Anthony Eden, Asst. Prime Minister, and General George Marshall, Chief of Staff of the United States Armed Forces.

Standing in the back left corner are, left to right, Marshall Tedder, Cheif of R.A.F. in England; General James Dolittle, Anterica's most famous pilot and Commander of Strategic Air Command; and General Carl Spatz, Commander General of all Allied Air Forces in Europe.

U.S. DECLARES WAR ON JAPAN

Request for Declaration
Passed Through Congress with
Unprecedented Speed

Washington, Dec. 8 – (AP) – The text of President Roosevelt's war message to Congress follows:

To the Congress of The United States: Yesterday -- December 7, 1941 -- a date which will live in infamy, the United States of America was suddenly and deliberately attacked by naval and air forces of the empire of Japan.

The United States was at peace with that nation and, at the solicitation of Japan, was still in conversations with

its goverment and its emperor, looking toward the maintenance of peace in the Pacific.

Indeed, one hour after Japanese air squadrons had commenced bombing in Oahu, the Japanese ambassador to the United States and his colleague delivered to the Secretary of State a formal reply to a recent American message. While this reply stated that it seemed useless to continue the existing diplomatic negotiations, it contained no threat or hint of war or armed at-

It will be recorded that the distance of Hawaii from Japan makes it obvious that the attack was deliberately planned many days or even weeks ago...

Upon returning to Wilson, Dickerman served as the Asst. Publisher of The Wilson Daily Times from 1957-1974.







## **Today In Wilson Times History:**

November 11, 1918

Allies Invade France

American, Britsh, and Canadians land at dawn June 6 – (AP) – American, British, and Canadian troops landed in Northern France this morning, launching the greatest overseas military operation in history with word from their superme commander, General Dwight D. Eisenhower, that "we will accept nothing except full victory over the German masters of the continent."

The invasion, which Eisenhower called "a great crusade," was announced at 7:32 a.m. Greenwich time (3:32 a.m. EWT) in this one sentence communique No. 1:

"Under the command of General Eisenhower, Allied Naval forces supported by strong air forces began landing allied armies this morning on the northern coast of France.'

It was announced moments later that Britain's General Sir Bernard L. Montgomery, hero of the African desert, was in charge of the assault...







In the letter, Minnie Kilburn quotes one of the poems Clem once wrote her. Clem and his daughter now live together in Sims




