

Ohituary

On August 2, 1995, HERBERT LYNN SNIPES departed this life and was granted eternal peace.

It was 61 years ago that Herbert Lynn was born to Lucille Dark Snipes and James Duncan Snipes in Siler City, N.C. He was a brother to Saraphine, Hurley and Geneva. His early years were spent attending the First Baptist Church of which he was a member. He attended the Chatham County Train-

ing School through the 8th grade.

As a young man, he set his sights on Philadelphia, Pa. He was an ambitious man who dreamed of owning his own business. At the age of 19 he married his longtime friend, Olivia Johnson. To support their family he and his wife began a series of businesses, starting with an Esso service station. They also owned a diner, grocery store, and several garages. Herbie worked as an insurance adjuster, but found his niche in automobile towing. In 1954, Herbie and Olivia established "Herbie's Towing & Auto Body". Herbie's was the first black owned towing service in Philadelphia. Herbie was the first to install the police two-way radio system in tow trucks. His trucks had instant contact to the dispatcher, at all times. Herbie's flourished for more than 30 years, dealing with all major automobile dealers and credit companies in the Philadelphia metorpolitan area. Of all his accomplishments, Herbie was extremely grateful and blessed to have worked closely with four of his sons.

Herbie leaves behind his current wife, Jane Staten Snipes; nine children: Herbert Snipes of Allentown, PA; Marian Regina Snipes of Upper Darby, PA; Stephen Snipes of Philadelphia, PA; Felicia Snipes Dixon of Durham, NC; Elizabeth Snipes of Upper Darby; Christopher Snipes of Cary, NC; Herbert Staten, Gregory Staten and Theresa Staten of Philadelphia. He leaves a loving mother, Lucille; stepfather, Jessie Glover; a brother; two sisters; daughters-in-law, Winnie Steptoe Snipes and Ashay Newkirk Staten; son-in-law, Willie Otis Dixon IV; 11 grandchildren, and a host of extended family and friends.
