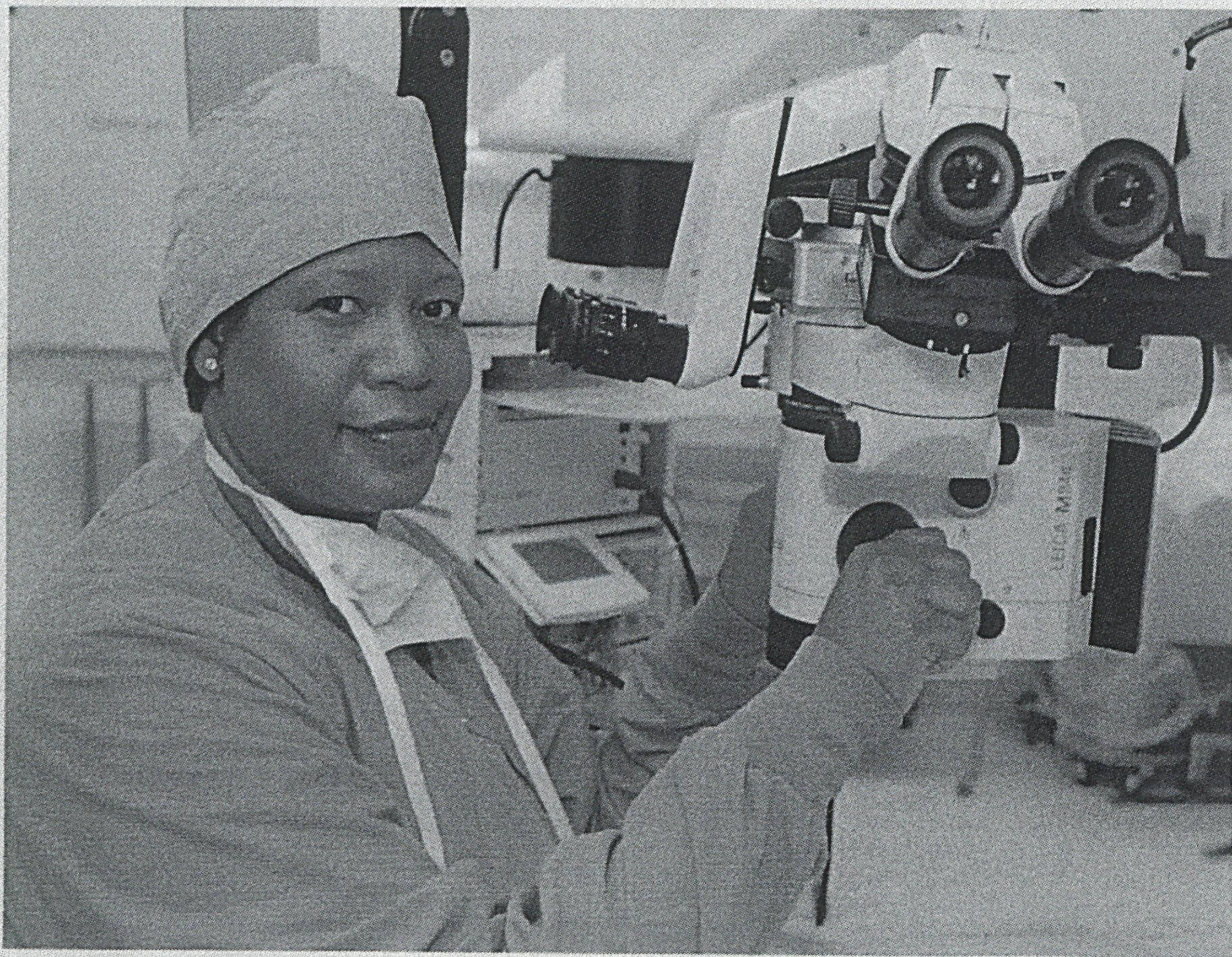

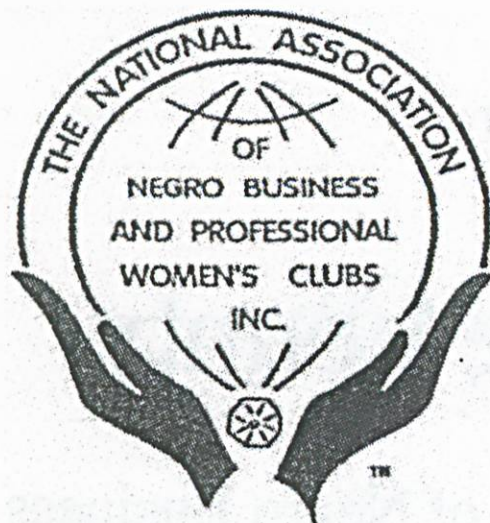


WHEREAS, these women have made significant contributions to the community and are role models for others to emulate;



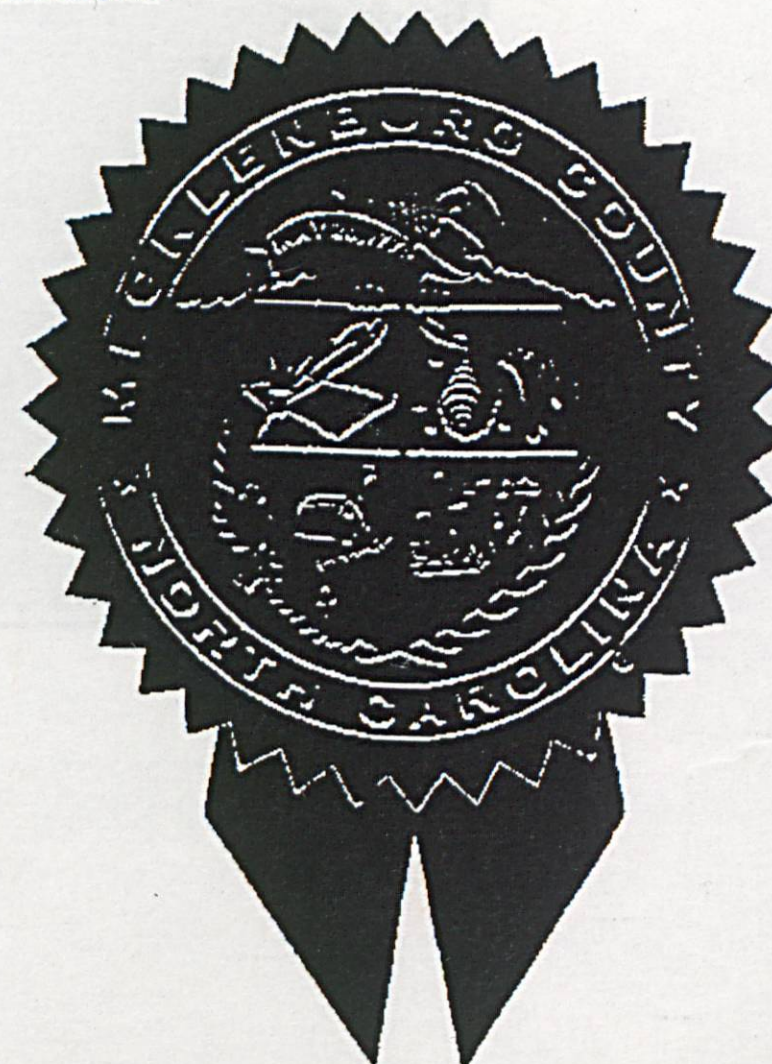
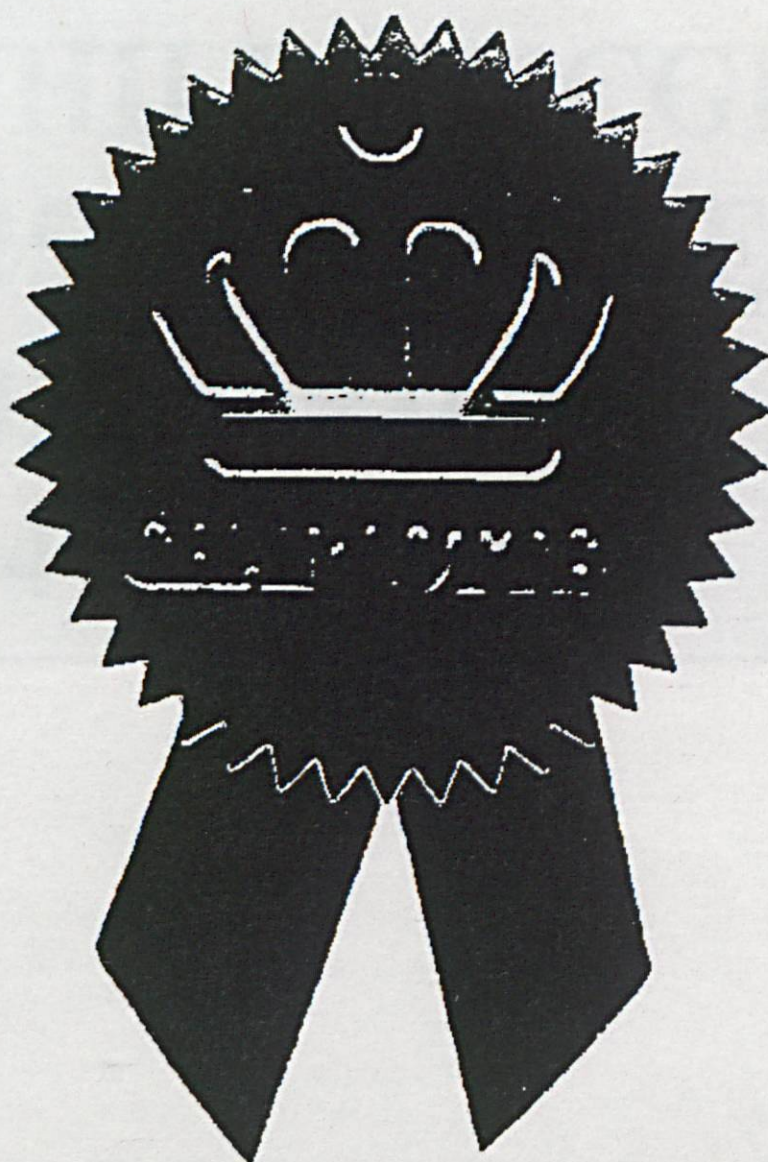

Elder, a founding and charter member of the Charlotte Club of The National Association of Negro Business and Professional Women's Clubs, Incorporated, expressed a desire to have a Women's History Hall of Fame to honor women during National Women's History Month. 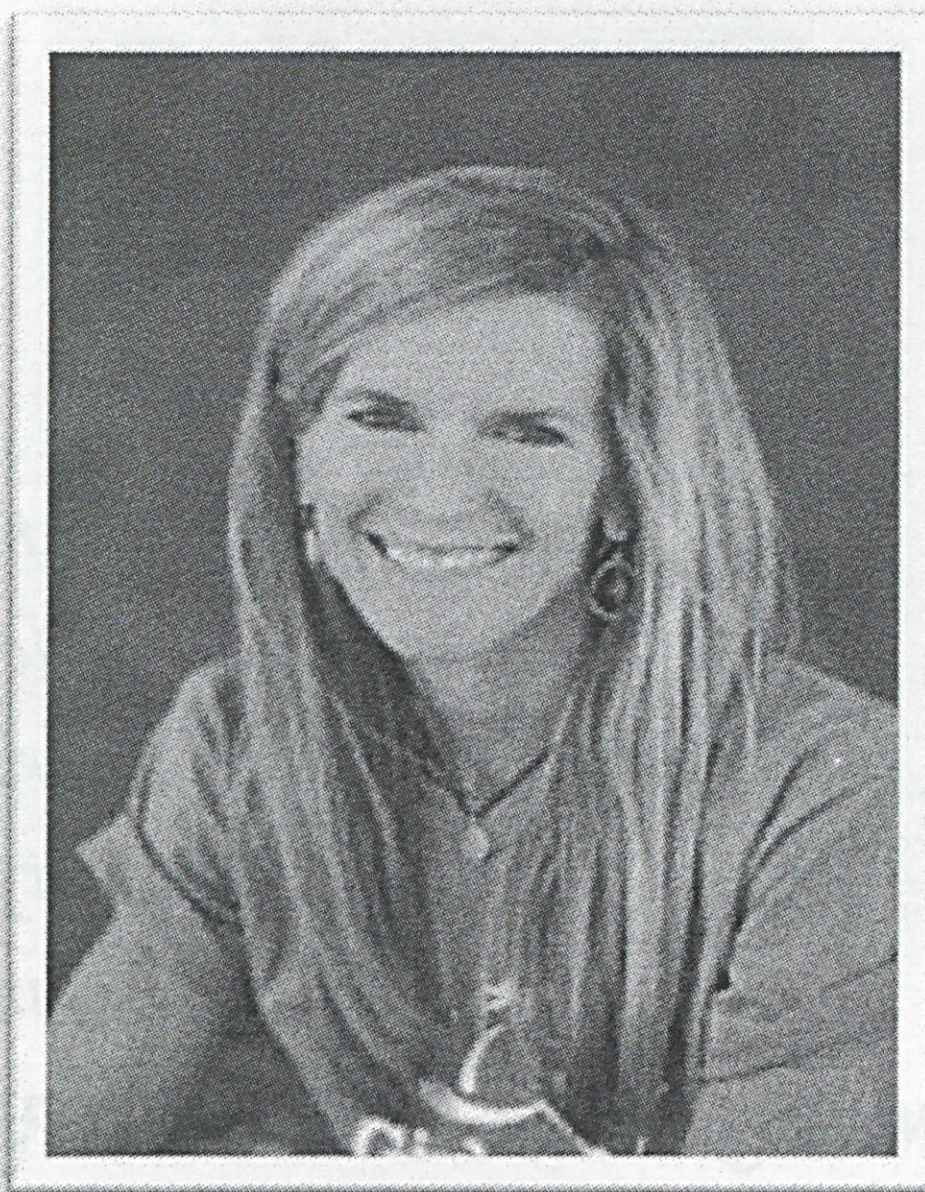

MOLLY BARKER



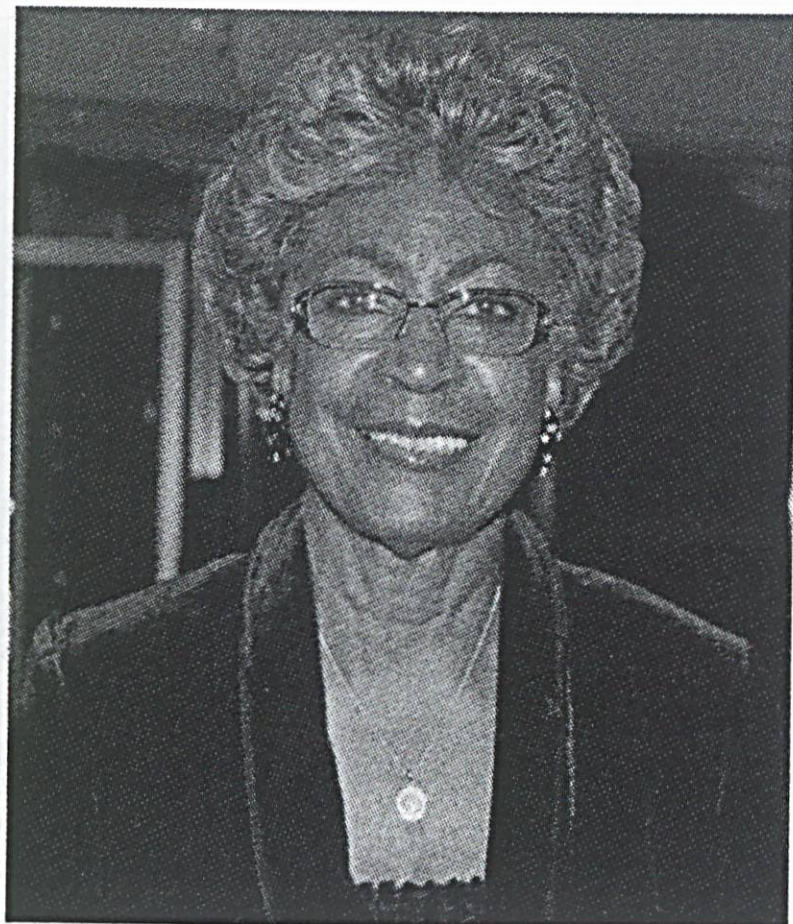
Molly Barker, MSW, founded Girls on the Run® in 1996 in Charlotte, North Carolina. A four-time Hawaii Ironman triathlete, she used her background in social work, counseling and teaching, along with research on adolescent issues, to develop the program. Today, there are Girls on the Run councils in over 160 cities across North America serving over 70,000 girls each year.

The Girls on the Run curriculum is designed to help girls break Free of the "Girl Box." The "Girl Box," a phrase coined by Molly, describes girls' unconscious acceptance of gender stereotypes that limit their choices, opportunities and ability to thrive. The Girls on the Run curriculum is Molly's foundation to create a social movement which provides girls and women with the tools and the courage to recognize, unravel from and reject their buy-in to the Girl Box and its limiting messages. Only then will a world exist where all girls and women are able to recognize and achieve their greatest human potential.

Girls on the Run has been featured in many media outlets including People, Runner's World, Redbook, Women's Day, O Magazine, Self, Shape, Southern Living, Running Times, CNN, MSNBC, ABC News, NBC News, NPR, ESPN and Forbes. Molly is the recipient of several prestigious national awards including Redbook magazine's "Strength and Spirit Award" which recognizes individuals who are building a better future for all of us, the "Woman's Day Award" from Woman's Day magazine which salutes individuals who have used their vision and heart to help fix pressing problems, and the highly prestigious "Heroes of Running Award" from Runner's World magazine. She is also a lifetime fellow of Ashoka, a global organization that recognizes and supports leading social entrepreneurs who are creating positive systemic change to the planet. Molly is an inspiration to people of all ages.

Molly lives in Charlotte, North Carolina, and enjoys running, cycling and writing. Since creating Girls on the Run, she has authored two books, 'Girls on Track: A Parent's Guide to Inspiring our Daughters to Achieve a Lifetime of Self-Esteem and Respect', and 'Girls Lit From Within'. She is passionate about her work but is most inspired by her two children.

MARY R. GILL



Mary Gill is a native of Winnsboro, South Carolina. She relocated at the age of five with her family to Charlotte. She is a retired Charlotte-Mecklenburg School Teacher, Secondary Counselor and Human Resources Coordinator/Analyst. Mary received a Bachelor of Science Degree from Winston-Salem State University in Elementary Education and a Master of Education Degree in Guidance and Counseling from the University of North Carolina at Charlotte.

Mary has strong belief in Christian Principles. She is a member of Friendship Missionary Baptist Church where she is a member of the choir and the Black College Awareness Day Committee.

As a retired Life Member of the North Carolina Association of Educators, she has constantly been involved in community affairs. She led a successful effort to defeat the City of Charlotte Auten Road/Griers Grove Road Extension Project. She has served on many political campaign committees including James K. Polk, Harvey Gantt, Ella Scarborough, Jim Richardson, Vilma Leake and Mayor Anthony Foxx. Mary is currently the Vice Chair of Precinct 16.

Being a Life member, Mary has kept her focus on Winston-Salem State's Motto "Enter to Learn, depart to serve". Additional committees include: the Mecklenburg City/County Consolidation Study Committee, Charlotte-Mecklenburg Bond Oversight Committee, and the UNCF Maya Angelo Women Who Lead Luncheon Committee. She is the founder of "Citizens in Pursuit of Justice", a grassroots organization that monitored governmental/civic issues of this community.

As a Life Member of Charlotte Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Incorporated, she has held several positions and was Co-Chairperson of the First Area Founders Day West. Mary is also a Charter Member of Deltas of Charlotte, the fund raising arm of the sorority.

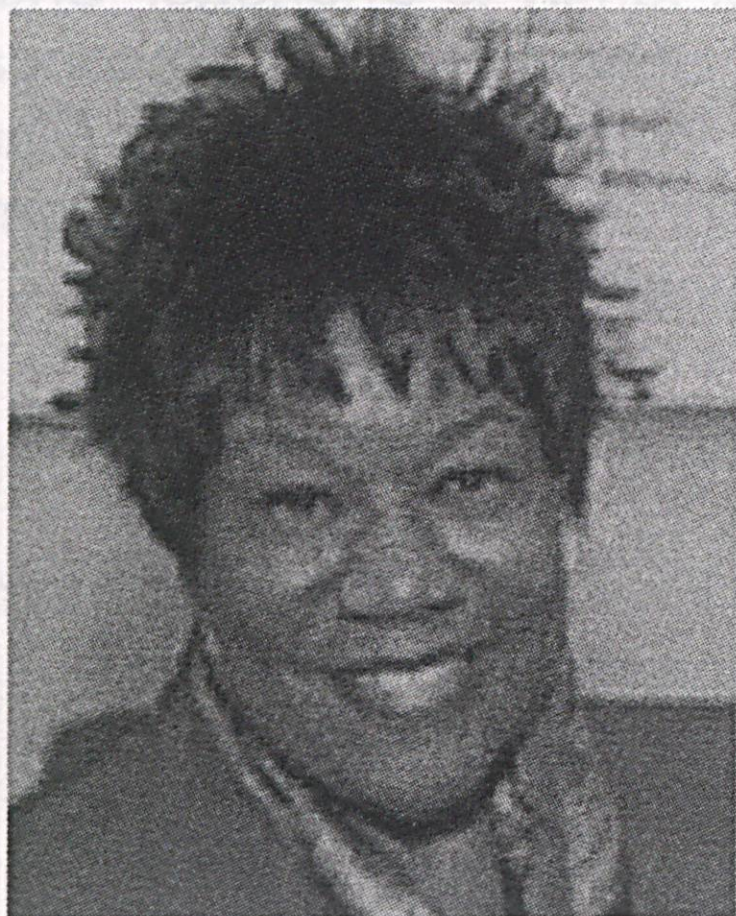
Mary is a charter member of the Charlotte Chapter of Squaws, Incorporated (recent name change, Charlotte Chapter of Charms, Incorporated). She coordinated the Chapter's Project to provide Christmas gifts for Mecklenburg County Youth and Family Services Giving Tree for Foster Care teenagers. She is currently leading the CHARMS efforts to support Samaritan's Feet, which is an International Program to supply athletic shoes to children.

DELORES HURT



Delores Johnson Hurt is a civil rights, journalistic and entrepreneurial trailblazer with professional experience as a college instructor, news reporter, small business owner and non-profit administrator.

She is a graduate of the Columbia University School of Journalism in New York City and Winthrop University in Rock Hill, South Carolina, where she was the first African-American accepted and the first black undergraduate. She also attended the University of Nice in France on a prestigious Fulbright-Hays Fellowship and during breaks from school traveled throughout Europe and North Africa.

Delores has led a varied adult life. Early on, she worked as a journalist in New York City at radio stations WRVR and WBAI, The National Black Network and the CBS Radio Network. She also wrote articles for the "Black Enterprise" and "Encore American and World-wide News" magazines in New York, and "Black News" in Columbia, South Carolina. She taught journalism at Benedict College and was the second African-American journalist to work at WIS Radio, an NBC affiliate, in Columbia, S.C. In Charlotte, Delores covered the Huntersville Town Council for the Charlotte Observer.

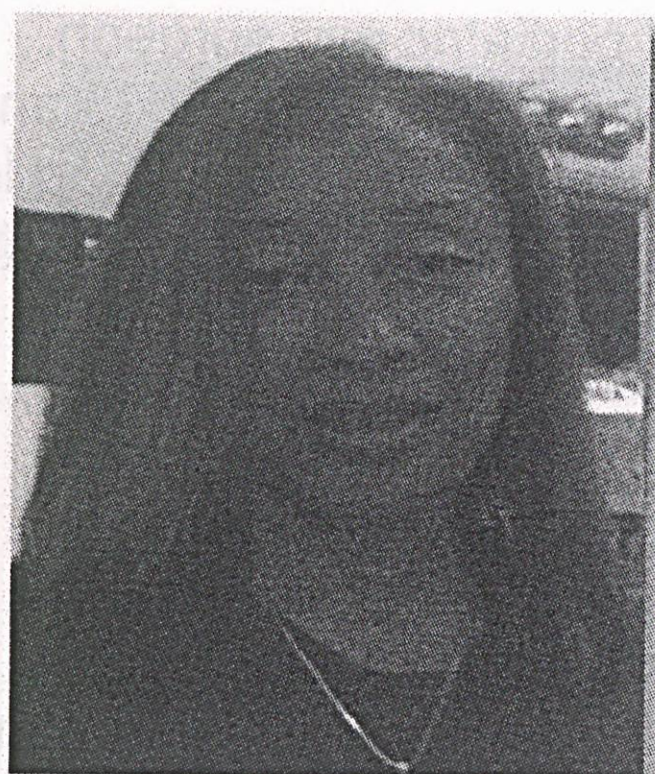
She worked at the Rockefeller Foundation in New York City, owned a restaurant in Key West, Florida and a wholesale bakery, "Anne's Simply Delicious Cakes and Pastries," which was founded by her mother, Annie Price Johnson. The bakery sold home-style cakes in 55 grocery stores in South Carolina, North Carolina and Georgia.

Delores founded Nefertiti, Inc., a non-profit arts organization that brought Broadway plays to South Carolina. She also served on the executive committee of the Columbia Chapter of the NAACP, and on the boards of the Richland County Township Auditorium and the City of Columbia Action Council.

In 2004, Delores moved to Charlotte, N.C. to be close to her daughter, Vashti. She has been a member of the Charlotte Club of NANBPWC, Inc. since 2006, and has served as Founders' Day Chair, Adopt-A-Community Chair and Director of Communications. She is proud to be a part of an organization comprised of women role models who have done much for the Charlotte community.

Delores was born in Orangeburg, South Carolina to Annie Price Johnson and Napoleon Johnson. She spent three childhood years in France. Delores is a member of Friendship Missionary Baptist Church. She is currently an educator in the Charlotte-Mecklenburg School System, having returned to a first love, sharing her knowledge of French language and culture.

ELLEN FLOYD JOHNSON



Mrs. Ellen Floyd Johnson is known for her distinctive custom hat line "Designer Hats by Ellen J". She had a vision of starting her own business and being a very creative person, Ellen decided to become a milliner. In 1995, Designer Hats by Ellen J" was birthed, bringing her dream of owning her own business and creating her very own brand to life.

Ellen J's hats have been displayed at the Charlotte Museum of History and were featured in the Charlotte Observer and other publications. Mrs. Johnson's designs have been displayed at the Maya Angelo Women that Lead Luncheon for many years and various other events.

In 2010 after 15 years in the business, Ellen J's hats were displayed at the Mint Museum in conjunction with the Lois Mailou Jones art exhibit "The Vibrant colors of Sisterhood" featuring the painting "My Mothers Hats". Also recently at the Mint, her hats were featured in the play "My Mother's Hats" by Pearl Jones Smith.

Mrs. Johnson has always had a passion of Help Ministry. In 2004 she and other members of her Church, Friendship Missionary Baptist, traveled on a mission trip to South Africa. The Church sponsors a farm to help provide food and jobs in the community. She also assisted in the evaluation of needs, supplying equipment and supplies to schools.

Serving on the board of the International Children's Outreach Ministry Honors Choir (ICOM), Ellen has been involved with the program designed to expand academic and cultural outreach to new US communities. This outreach provides an opportunity for choral, dance and instrumental exchange, creating dialog among musicians, music and dance educators and youth within public and private institutions, increase awareness and understanding between the people of the US and South Africa and to expose South African children to educational and cultural opportunities, both musical and non-musical.

She is proud to have assisted with enrolling three young men that were students in the ICOM program to Guilford Technical Community College. She was chosen as part of the Elite 8 who is responsible for permissions beyond their current academic pursuits.

Ellen Johnson is a native of Kings Mountain, NC. Her parents are John and Elizabeth Floyd of Kings Mountain NC. She has been married to Jerome "Magic" Johnson for 22 years. Jerome has always supported and encouraged Ellen to pursue her passions and dreams. They have two children and five grandchildren

Mrs. Johnson shows compassion for others and has found herself in the line of fire when help has been needed. She has opened the doors of her home for extended periods of time to several women that have found themselves in abusive and unfortunate situations, also reaching out to people experiencing verbal and physical abuse and low self-esteem.

Dr. McGriff is the pediatric Ophthalmologist in charge of diagnosing and laser treatment of premature infants with Retinopathy of Prematurity at Carolinas Medical Center - Northeast. She is one of local Surgeons with a partnership in Gateway Surgery Center and serves as a lecturer to Pediatric and Family Medicine Physicians. Dr. McGriff has been named Outstanding Pediatric Ophthalmologist and Adult Strabismologist two consecutive years on a national level.

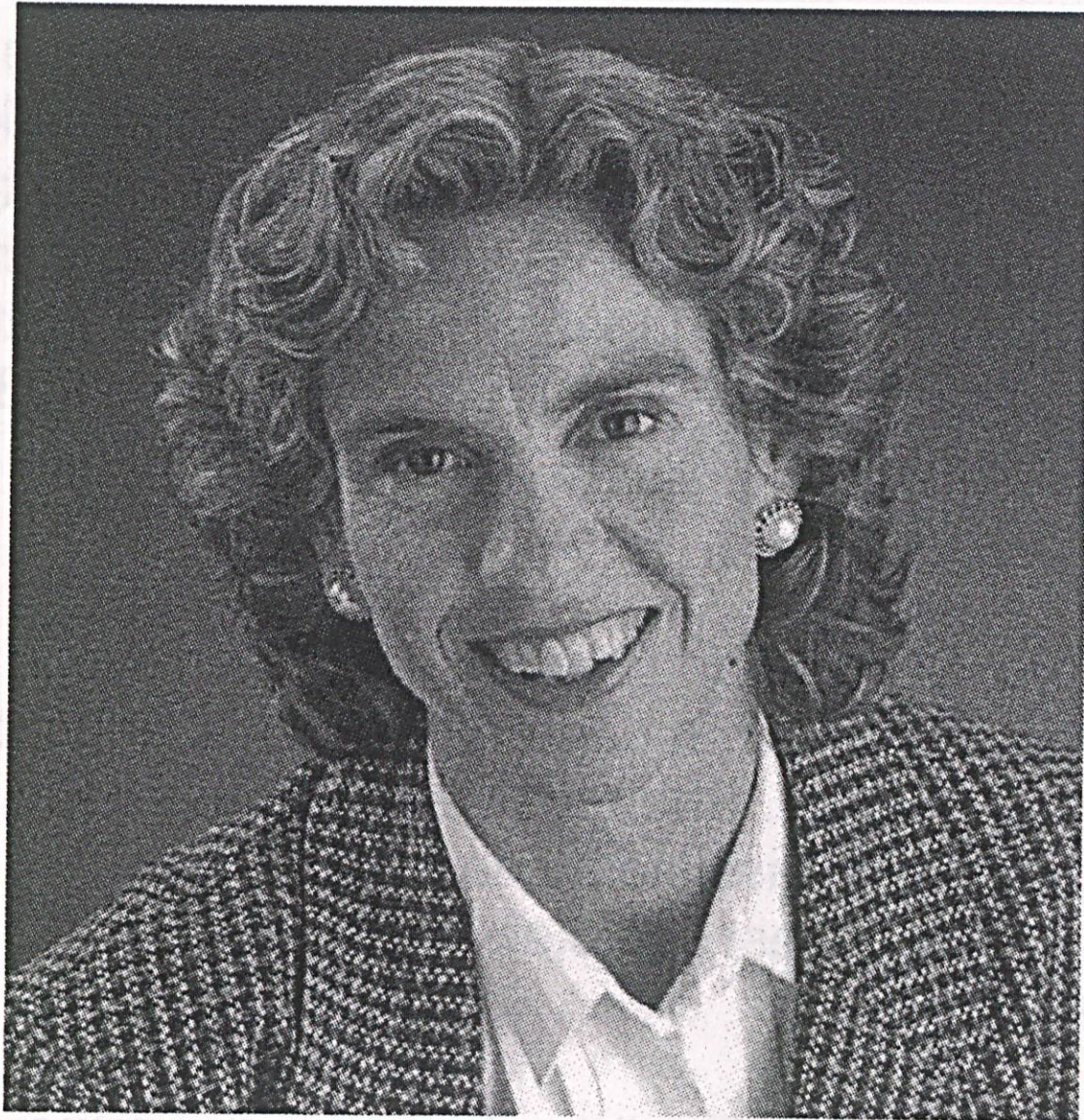

Jennifer Watson Roberts is currently Chair of the Mecklenburg Board of County Commissioners, and has been re-elected to her fourth term in office and her third term as chair. She is a native of Charlotte and a graduate of East Mecklenburg High School. She attended UNC-Chapel Hill on a Morehead Scholarship, and also holds two Masters Degrees in International Affairs, from the Johns Hopkins University School of Advanced International Studies and from the University of Toronto.

She worked as a diplomat for three and a half years with the US Department of State, serving in the Dominican Republic as a consular officer and then

as a political officer on the Mexico Desk in Washington before returning to Charlotte in 1993 with her husband.

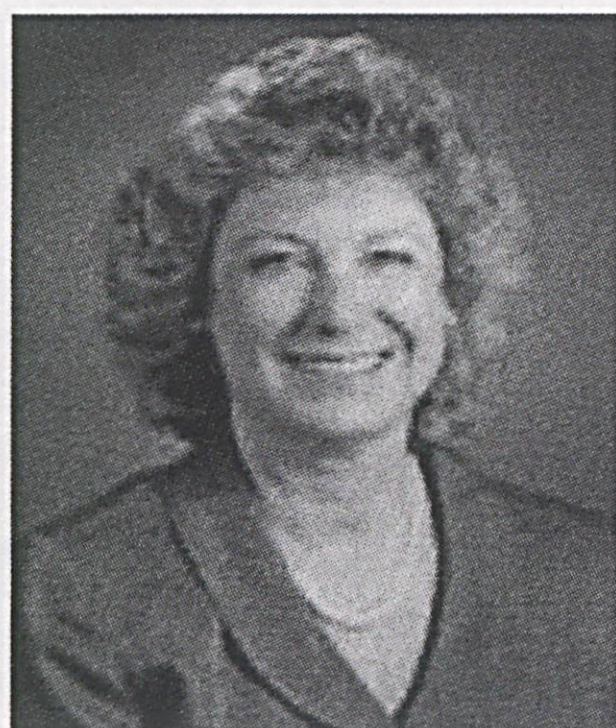
During her years in Charlotte, Roberts has been Director of the Mayor's International Cabinet, a lending officer in International Corporate Banking at First Union, and executive director of the Charlotte World Affairs Council. She has also taught courses in international politics and economics in the International Studies Department at UNC-Charlotte. She speaks Spanish, French, and some Italian, and has lived in Canada, Italy, and the Dominican Republic.

Roberts has won many community awards, including the Maya Angelou Women Who Lead Award, the William Friday Fellowship, and the Counselors of Real Estate Creative Thinkers Award. She serves on numerous boards and advisory groups in the region, including the Governor's Crime Commission, the Governor's Local Government Advisory Council, the NC Association of County Commissioners, the Centralina Council of Governments, the Charlotte Chamber, the Charlotte Regional Partnership, the Girls Scouts Hornets Nest Council, Keep Mecklenburg Beautiful, and the Women's Commission. She also chairs the Metropolitan Transit Commission. Her main interests cover education, workforce development, job growth, children's issues, alleviating poverty and homelessness, and environmental protection.

She is married and has two children who attend middle and high schools in CMS.

Something you may not know about Jennifer: She played four years of varsity volleyball at UNC Chapel Hill, serving as captain her senior year and winning the prestigious Jim Tatum Award as an outstanding scholar/athlete. She also coached volleyball when she was teaching high school between her undergraduate and graduate studies. She and her husband are avid outdoor enthusiasts and they have climbed Mt. Kilimanjaro in Africa.

JUDITH ROSE



UNC Charlotte Director of Inter-Collegiate Athletics, Judy Rose is one of the most successful and well-respected Athletics Directors in the nation. At the time of her appointment in 1990, she was just the third female to be put in charge of a Division I program. In 1999-2000, she became the first female to serve on the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Committee and she completed a five-year term (2000-2004). She served as 2003-04 President of the National Association of College Directors of Athletics (NACDA).

Rose is a native of Blacksburg, SC; she and her husband, Ken live in Denver, NC. Rose graduated with her B.S. degree in physical education in 1974 from Winthrop University, where she lettered in basketball. She received her Master's in physical education from Tennessee in 1975. At UT, Rose was an assistant coach under Pat Summitt. Rose is active on numerous boards and is a popular guest speaker. The NCAA and Conference USA each list her on numerous committees.

She has been instrumental in attracting national sporting events to Charlotte, including the 1994 Men's Final Four, the 1996 Women's Final Four, the 1997 AAU Junior Olympics and the 1999 and 2000 NCAA Division I Men's Soccer College Cup. In 2008, the 49ers hosted the NCAA Div. I Men's Basketball East Regional at Bobcats Arena.

It is under her watch that the 49ers have expanded opportunities to include women's soccer and men's and women's track. Her next step has been to lead the 49ers most aggressive push to add football to the Charlotte 49ers program. Winning approval from both the Chancellor and UNC Charlotte Board of Trustees, the 49ers have pushed forward with plans to start the program in 2013.

Her awards include the 2001 NACDA Southeast Region Athletic Director of the Year Award. Other awards have included the Pegasus Award in 1999, the 1996 Bob Quincy Award by the Charlotte Sportsman Club, and the 1996 Charlotte Regional Sports Commission "Sixth-Man" Award for city-wide athletic achievement. She was selected the 1996 Woman of the Year in Charlotte and was named the 1997 Citizen of the Year by the University Chamber of Commerce. In 1986, she became the first female inducted into the Blacksburg (S.C.) Hall of Fame. She is inducted into the Winthrop Athletics Hall of Fame.

Rose became the sixth person to head the athletics department and is just the second individual who was not also the 49ers men's basketball coach. She was the third woman, ever, to spearhead a collegiate program. Early in her administrative career, Rose pioneered the department's most successful fund raiser, the annual Great Gold Rush Auction. The one night extravaganza began in 1984 and generated over of \$2 million in its 21-year history, including more than \$100,000 each of the last 17 years and over \$150,000 in each of the last five, including a record \$195,000 in 2004.

Rose is on the Executive Committee of the Charlotte Regional Sports Commission and is on the Board of Directors for USA Basketball and the Metro Board of the YMCA. She has served on the Board of Directors of the N.C. Sports Hall of Fame on the Board of Managers for University City YMCA; and on the N.C. High School Athletic Association Foundation and has been a member of the NCAA Women's Committee on Committees; the NCAA Division I Task Force for Restructuring; and the NCAA Task Force for Marketing and Licensing. She chaired the NCAA Walter Byers Postgraduate Scholarship Committee. In 1996-97, Rose served as Chair of the C-USA Athletic Directors and in 1998-99 she chaired the league's Championship Committee.
