

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

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HARPER VS. WHITFIELD, LENOIR CO., NC, 1840

The following are depositions concerning the disputed election of James Harper and James B. Whitfield for the Lenior County Senate seat in the NC Legislature. Found in the NC General Assembly Papers, 1840, Box 7; NC Archives, Raleigh, NC. Contributed by Roger Kammerer.

Lenoir County} Personally appeared before us two of the acting Justices of the peace for the County aforesaid the persons whos. names appears to the following depositions & having been duly sworn on the Holy Evangalist Allmighty God deposeth & saith as follows it being at the Court House in Kinston on the 2d day of November A. D. 1840 & subscribed by each Examinant & attested by us as follows

S. B. CARRAWAY being duly sworn

Question by J. B. WHITFIELD State the qualification of Holidy H. FIFE to vote in the Senate & for whom he voted Answer he owns twenty seven acres by his wife unincumbered, six acres besides which it is my imprshion is incumbered & thirty two acres which is incumbered Mrs. DUDLY having a life Estate in it, which is all the lands said FIFE owns the Deponant further saith that H. H. FIFE informed him he voted by James HARPER, since stating above the deponant states that he is not certain the above twenty seven acres spoken of by him is unincumbered. Question by James B WHITFIELD for whom did Guilford W. HOUSTON take an active part for in the last Election for the Senate

Answer I believe he advocated the Election of James HARPER.

Answer I herd my father say that he had given them deeds of gifts reserving to himself a life Estate, they qwn no other lands that I Know of. I dont Know how they voted

Question by J. C. WASHINGTON are you not a brother of Aretus JONES Jr. & George JONES & if they owned any other land would you not likely have Known it.

Answer I am their brother and if they owned other lands likely I might Know it

Question by J. C. WASHINGTON were they not immediately before the Election Supporters of the administration & favourable to the Election of James B. WHITFIELD

Answer I herd them say they were favourable to the present administration and I think I herd them say they wished WHITFIELD might be Elected

Question by J. C. WASHINGTON do you Know whether Baird KING resides in Lenoir County or not.

Ans Yes he does

Question by James B WHITFIELD do you Know whether Bright HARPER lives in this County or not. Answer he works at the coopers trade Sometimes in Duplin & Sometimes in Lenoir County & I saw him once Coming towards his plantation & house in Lenoir County. I asked him where he was going & he said he was going home he was not exceeding a half a mile from his plantation & House in Lenoir County.

Question by J. B. WHITFIELD is Bright HARPER a free holder in this county of fifty acres of land free of incumberance & has he possessed the same six months previous to the day of Election

Answer he is he owns more than one hundred acres of land in Lenoir County & has owned it more than six months before the Election

Question by J. B. WHITFIELD do you Know how Levi POWELL John MEWBORN John WEST Sr. Fredk WEST William HOLLAND Jesse HINSON James GRACE, voted in the Senate at the last Election

Answer Levi POWEL John MEWBORN John WEST Sr. William HOLLAND Jesse HINSON & James GRACE Voted for James HARPER at the august Election & I believe that Fredk WEST voted for James HARPER & they was a contention at the day of Election & the day after the Election Concerning the votes of John WEST & Levi POWEL, & the Inspectors both agreed to throw Out the votes of John WEST & Levi POWEL but they did not do it Question by J. B. WHITFIELD State the qualifications of John WEST Sr. to vote in the Senate

Answer I was present when John WEST Sr. took the Insolvent debtors Oath, which I believe was not Six months before the Election—

Question by James B WHITFIELD are you not the Sheriff of Lenoir County & did you not receive the votes in the Senate Election at the Kinston Precinct

Answer I am the Sheriff of Lenoir & did receive the Votes in the Senate at the last Election in Kinston—Question by James B WHITFIELD were not three or more tickets for James HARPER when counted Out of the box Appear to be rolled up together as tho they were put in by one man

Answer they were three rolls containing two tickets in Each roll for James HARPER, they were rolled up in such away that I do not believe they Could have bin voted single

Question by J. B. WHITFIELD were they Counted for HARPER

Answer They were

Question by J C WASHINGTON in what direction was the Duplin County line from Bright HARPER when you met him

Answer he was coming from towards Duplin County & his back was towards the Duplin County line Question by J C WASHINGTON agent for HARPER did he pay a land & poll tax in this County for the last Year or two

Answer last year he paid a land tax in this County but did not a poll tax last year he lived in Duplin Co. Question by J C WASHINGTON agent for HARPER do you or do you not Know that Bright HARPER lives with his brother Warren HARPER in Duplin County and if you do not Know that fact is it not so understood in the neighbourhood

Answer he sometimes Stays in Duplin & Sometimes in Lenoir County & I Expect he stays at Warren HARPERS when in Duplin

Question by J C WASHINGTON agent for James HARPER why did you not collect his poll tax for last Year when you did his land tax for last year

Answer because in 1839 he was in Duplin County-

Question by J C WASHINGTON agent for James HARPER has Abram TAYLOR Ever paid a land tax or any friend of his paid one for him

Answer they has never bin any land tax charged to him on the list Since I have bin Sheriff of the County Question dus Richard W. KING Own Land Enough in Lenoir County to enable him to a vote in the Senate Answer he bot at Sheriffs sale for taxes a tract of Land sufficient to Enble him to vote in the Senate it Lay twelve months after the Sale & then I give him a deed for it more than twelve months before the Election. I give before I sold it all the necasury notice that I thought necasury

Question by J. C. WASHINGTON agent do you Know either Geo. W. WALLACE or Samuel LOFTIN owns land Enough in this Senatorial district to Entitle them to a Vote in the Senate

Answer I do not they have not given in any land or paid taxes for any Land. I herd J. C. WASHINGTON tell Samuel LOFTIN that he was Entitled to vote.

Question by J C WASHINGTON agent for James HARPER do you Know either James DEAVER & John DEAVER Jr. Owns land & has owned the same six months before the Election Enoughf to entitle them to vote Answer They have

Question by J. B. WHITFIELD State what you Know of the blood of John DEAVER Sr John DEAVER Jr. James DEAVER & John CARTER.

Answer I Saw the deposition of an Old woman by the name of Sarah THOMPSON who stated in Said Deposition that she lived near Ned CARTER before he moved to this Country & that deposition made the DEAVERS the fourth degree or past as to John CARTER his father I have no doubt was a white man, but may stand in the same with John DEAVER Jr James DEAVER, with the exception that his father is supposed to be a white man—

Question by J. C. WASHINGTON agent for James HARPER do you Know of his moving in Lenoir County Answer I do not Know of his moving into this County—at the time I saw him coming from Duplin to Lenoir County he had his tools with him & said he was going home

Question by J. C. WASHINGTON agent for HARPER did he or did he not tell you that he intended to work a part of this year in Lenoir & apart in Duplin Co

Answer I herd him Say so sometime in January last.

Question by J. C. WASHINGTON agent for James HARPER did you call the attention of the Inspectors to Each of the 3 rolls of tickets Spoken of before.

Answer I Spoke of one roll, did not particular call the names of the Inspectors, they were standing by & looking on Question by J C WASHINGTON agent for Jas HARPER does David KING live in Lenoir County & has he given land Enough to Entite him to a free hold

Answer he lives in Lenoir County has not given in Land for the last two or three years, he has previous to that time give it in & paid the taxes, but for the last two or three years has not paid the tax of any land to me as Sheriff of this County, he lives on the Land & I expect it belongs to him his life time

Question by J. C. WASHINGTON agent for HARPER who give in the land on which David KING resides for the last two or three years

Answer for the the last two or three years I dont think it has bin given Except the Last year. Last year it was given in by Whitfield GRADY

Question by J. C. WASHINGTON agent for HARPER do you Know whether Abram TYLER owns land Enough in this County to Entitle him to Vote in the Senate

Answer I do not Know

Question by James B WHITFIELD does Rewben WETHERINGTON reside at the Same place now that he did when you went to his house

Answer he does as far as I know

I live in the neighbourhood and think if he owned other land I should Know it.

Question by James B. WHITFIELD do you Know the qualifications of John WEST Sr. to vote in the Senate Answer I was one of the Court when [TORN] WEST Sr took the Insolvent Debtors oath I think it was Either January or April court last

Question by John C WASHINGTON agent for James HARPER are you acquainted with the Signature of Rewben WETHERINGTON

Answer no

Question by J C WASHINGTON are you prepared to swear that the Signature of one Rewben WETHERINGTON to the deed you saw this morning dated in 1838 is the same Rewben WETHERINGTON that voted in the Senate in August last

Answer I am not

Question by J. C. WASHINGTON agent Can you say that you Know where Rewben WETHERINGTON lives & that he was not qualified to vote in the Senate in August last

Answer I can not

Question by James B WHITFIELD do you Know of any other Rewben WETHERINGTON in Lenoir County or Green or did you Ever Know any other Rewben WETHERINGTON Except the One Spoken of Answer I dont recollect of Ever Knowing but one Rewben WETHERINGTON in Green or Lenoir Counties and he

lived in Contitna neck and is the One I refird to above

Answer I sold the land to Joel WATERS Jr. to get the right out of my wife into him Joel WATTERS he give me his note for the Land it was to be optional with him Either to Keep the land & pay me for it or deed it back to me Question by J C WASHINGTON who has paid the tax for this land since you sold it

Answer I have given out the money to pay it he has not paid me back nor have I pushed him Joel WATERS Jr. for it Question by J C WASHINGTON did you pay the taxes at Joel WATERS Jr request

Answer I think they was an understanding between me and Joel WATTERS Jr. that I was to pay the tax

Question by J C WASHINGTON have not you had the deed from Joel WATTERS Jr delivered up to you

Answer I got the deed from him to write a deed by but has since returned it to him

Question by Jno C WASHINGTON do you Know whether John WATERS (Son of Daniel) owns a free hold in this Senatorial district or not

Answer If he does I do not Know & if he did I should likely Know it

Question by James B WHITFIELD has this deed from yourself and wife to Joel WATTERS Jr bin acknowledged by yourself and wife before a Judge of the Superior Court of this State

Answer it has—& the title has not been recognized—

BLACKLEDGE to James DAUGHETY he BLACKLEDGE took a mortgage deed for the purchase money on said Land which has not bin canceld as far as I Know. Said mortgage never having bin closed.

Question by James B WHITFIELD how long has Daniel DAUGHETY Snr. had a deed for this land & how long has he had it in possession & has suit bin commenced by the other claimants

Answer the deed I think has bin given from James DAUGHETY Sr. to Daniel DAUGHETY Sr about Eight years, the admrs of Daniel DAUGHETY Sr. took said land in possession about three years ago & has had possession of it Ever since they has bin no Suit Commenced by the other claimants the land not having bin divided

In the March 1866 session of the North Carolina General Assembly, an Act was passed concerning negroes and persons of color. Justices of the Peace were to collect and record in the County Clerk's office, a record of the cohabitation of former slaves to ratify their state of marriage. The Court Clerk was required to maintain a record book for this purpose and to receive 25 cents per entry for his service. In Section 6, Chapter 40 of the Act, it was a misdemeanor if negroes did not record their marriage by Sept. 1, 1866, This section of the Act was amended by Section 1, Chapter 70 (ratified March 1867), to extend the time of recording these marriages to Jan. 1, 1868. 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

IN MEMORY OF ALLEN CHURCHILL

With great sadness we must report that the Pitt County Family Researchers has lost another great friend and genealogist when Levis Allen Churchill (called Allen by his friends) passed away at his home on Monday, Feb. 20, 2006, at the age of 75. Allen was one of those people that after you met them you were compelled to verbally proclaim "What a nice man!" He was warm, witty, kind, generous, compassionate, dependable and serious. And boy was he serious about genealogy.

When Bill Kittrell called the first meeting of the Pitt County Family Researchers in the Fall of 1994, Allen was there as one of the founders. He was elected as the first Vice President of the group and then served as the second President of PCFR from 1996 to 1997. He then served on the PCFR Board several years.

Everyone who knew Allen, knew how much he loved to help people research their family genealogy. Allen's own family history was rich with connections into numerous prominent and obscure families in Pitt County and eastern North Carolina. He haunted the Pitt County Court House and the North Carolina Collection of the J. Y. Joyner Library at East Carolina University doing research. He even started his own genealogy collection on local families in the East Carolina University Manuscript Collection in the J. Y. Joyner Library.

He apparently never knew a stranger because he would boldly ask anyone and everyone about their family history. Because he was so generous with his time and knowledge he made numerous friends all over the State and nation. He published nearly one dozen books on local genealogy, not to make money but to share with others. He then put copies of them in all the local libraries of the surrounding counties in hopes of helping someone.

I knew Allen as a witty man who loved his family and his church, loved roses and loved to stay at their place on the Pamlico River. He and his wonderful wife Rachel opened their home to all their friends and it was always hard to leave because of all the laughter. Allen was a living resource about Greenville's history since he worked at such vanished landmarks as the first Silo Restaurant and ran the movie projectors in the three Greenville theaters, the Pitt, The State and The Colony. He was a notorious night owl and it wasn't unlike him to call a dozen times late at night to fellow researchers if he was working on a family. He was fun to be around and made you feel good about yourself.

Allen Churchill was a native and lifelong resident of Pitt County. He was a graduate of Greenville schools and East Carolina University. He served a number of years as Assistant Clerk of Court for Pitt County and later began a career with East Carolina University as an Associate Professor with the Division of Continuing Education, retiring in 1992. He was an active member of the Hooker Memorial Christian Church. His body was laid to rest in the mausoleum at Pinewood Memorial Park.

At his death, Allen left his wife of 56 years, Rachel Little Churchill; a son, Levis Erik Churchill and wife Susan, of Graham, NC; a daughter, Rachel Erika Churchill, of Snow Hill, NC; grandchildren, Jakob Alexander Churchill and Kirsten Taylor Churchill; a brother, Mack Churchill, of Atlantic Beach, NC; and a sister, Carolyn Studeman and husband Daryl, of Atlanta, Ga.

All of Allen's friends know he was truly a wonderful person and he left a generous legacy to the future with all his publications. He will be missed.

CONTENTNEA ASSOCIATION AT RED BANKS

Eastern Reflector, Friday, Oct. 17, 1902

The Sunday session of the Contentnea Association of the Primitive Baptists at Red Banks was favored by all the circumstances that go to make such occasions all that the church and the visiting public could anticipate. Weather conditions were perfect, insuring a pleasant drive through the country, and allowing open air service, which made it possible for a much larger number to hear the sermons that the church could have accomodated. A raised platform under a large oak served as pulpit and around this, completing almost a circle and extending far out into the grove, substantial board seats had been constructed. The first sermon of the morning was by Elder P. D. GOLD, of Wilson, editor of Zion's Landmark. The morning service was concluded with a sermon by Elder BUCK, Elders ROBERSON and JONES preached in the afternoon.

With a crowd estimated from two thousand to three thousand, it is doubtful if ever a similar occasion witnessed better order.

The writer did not see nor hear of a single drunk, or any incident to mar the pleasure of the association proceedings. With such a crowd, under no restraint apart from that attached to the nature of the occasion, the deportment of those having no interest in the religious program was noteworthy.

The feature of the noon recess was dinner upon the grounds. Well, it was "a square meal." Somebody said that the people around Red Banks had been cooking for a week. Many visitors carried lunch, and a fine courtesy was made for all.

"To the General Assembly of the State of North Carolina now setting at Tarborough The Petition of the subscribers humbly Sheweth

That we your petitioners compo<u>sa</u> a small part of the County of Pitt, that we are in that part of it which is at the greatest distance from the Court House adjoining the County of Edgecomb to the Court House of which latter County it is but the distance of a few miles from our respective places of residence compared to the great distance we are from the other. Your Petitioners further shew that between their respective dwellings and the Court House of Pitt County there are several very large and in time of fresher almost impassable swamps, add to there the low grounds of Tar river two miles in breadth which we all have to pass on public meetings at a very considerable expense and great risque of our Persons, whereas on the contrary between our habitations and the Court House of Edgecomb there are no such obstacles and the distance is not so great we may very conveniently go and return after doing our business in the compass of a day. All these considerations have induced us to exhibit to your honors an exact view of our present situation and implore your legislative interposition on our behalf by annexing us to the County of Edgecomb we are the more emboldened to do this as we have always demeaned ourselves in such a manner as to give full demonstrations of the most loyal affection to the present Government and to merit the title of good citizens and because we are fully able to evince to your honors the reasonableness and necessity of this aplication which if granted will be ever held in greatful rememberance by your humble petitioners"

FIRE AT J. S. HINES NEAR AYDEN, 1893

Mr. J. S. HINES, who lives near Ayden, told us the other day of a narrow escape from fire he had on that windy Friday of week before last. His wife concluded she would scald the bedding and furniture that day, and while heating water out in the yard the wind blew sparks into a lot of bed clothing piled up in the piazza of the house. In a moment the fire was in a big blaze. Fortunately Mr. HINES was very near the house and summoning help with his farm bell succeeded in putting out the fire after a hard fight. About \$20 worth of bedding was burned and the house damaged slightly. Mr. HINES received severe burns about the hands and singed his hair while fighting the flames.

JOHNNIE STOKES FELL DEAD

Eastern Reflector, Wed., March 14, 1883

Johnnie STOKES, a 16 year old son of Edward STOKES, of Swift Creek township, this county, dropped dead in the field last Friday. He had not complained of being sick and fell dead while at his work.

LEMUEL MCGOWAN KILLED HIMSELF

Eastern Reflector, Wed., February 27, 1884

Mr. Lemuel MCGOWAN, who resides below Greenville, killed himself by cutting his throat last Wednesday. He had been acting strangely for several days prior to his death, and when his absence was discovered, search was made for him. He was found in a dense pine thicket about a mile from his home, lying upon his back, with a frightful gash, in which a man could turn his fist across reaching almost from ear to ear. The knife with which the deed was committed was lying in a pool of blood about a yard from the body when found. Life was not quite extinct and Dr. J. T. SLEDGE was sent for, but could render no assistance. Mr. MCGOWAN dying in about fifteen minutes after Dr. SLEDGE reached him. The causes prompting Mr. MCGOWAN to take his life are supposed to be trouble over the loss of his property, which brought on insanity. His family is in very destitute circumstances.

ALF FORBES PLAYING WITH GUN KILLS MAN

Eastern Reflector, Wed., Nov. 12, 1890

A very sad homicide occurred four miles above Greenville Monday afternoon. The particulars, as we learned them yesterday, are that Mr. A. A. FORBES, who had come down to town with a load of tobacco for shipment, left word for his little son Alf and a negro named Bill, a half witted man who lived on the place, to carry home a buggy that had been borrowed from a neighbor. Before starting with the buggy Alf had gone in his father's room and put the latter's pistol in his pocket. When they had got off up the road a bit the boy climbed up in the buggy to ride and told the negro to pull it along. While sitting in the buggy he began fooling with the pistol and fired it off in the air. He fired it again, the second ball striking the negro man in the back. The man fell in the road and the boy thinking he had done so in fun called to him and told him to go on with the buggy. Not getting up the boy went and jumped on the man playfully, and as he did so saw the man gasping in the last agonies of death. This frightened the little fellow and he ran back home and told what had happened. It is truly a sad occurrence, and draws out sympathy for the parents and family of the little boy. It also be a warning against boys fooling with pistols.

To the Honourable the Judge of the Court of Equity of Pitt County

Humbly complaining sheweth unto your Honour your Orator Robert BOYD of the County of Pitt an infant by Calvin BOYD his next friend that William BOYD late of Pitt County died in the year one thousand eight hundred & fifteen leaving a last Will Whereby he bequeathed to his wife Rachael all his slaves (except two otherwise disposed of) to remain under her control for her benefit & for the support & education of his Children and to remain in Common Stock until his yongest child Should come of age, and then to be equally divided between his Wife and his Sons Thomas William and Robert BOYD-which will at the term of Pitt County Court of Pleas and Quarter Sessions was duly proved and Samuel BOYD named the executor thereof qualified thereto-the said Samuel BOYD as your orator believes assented to the legacy of the Slaves to the widow who receaved the same into her possession under the Said Will-Your Orator further Sheweth unto your Honor that the Said Samuel BOYD has died intestate—Thomas BOYD and William BOYD two of the children, have also died infants and intestate, leaveing your Orator and their mother the said Rachael Surviving them; the said William was the youngest child of the testator and if living Would be of the age of eight or nine years. No administration has been granted upon the estates of the said Thomas and William BOYD. Your Orator further sheweth unto your Honour, that the said Racheal BOYD has intermarried with one Alfred NELSON of Pitt County who received into his possession the slaves bequeathed as aforesaid which were in the possession of the said Rachael at his intermarriage, and who holds the same under the bequest aforesaid and under no other pretence of title Said negroes are men Aaron and Stephen Boys Moses, Joe and Jordan Woman Fan and girls Hannah, Zylpha and Lucinda-Your Orator further Sheweth that the said Alfred NELSON has addicted himself to habits of iintemperance and irregularity of life neglecting his family and his business, and your Orator charges has become embarrassed and is likely to become insolvent-under which circumstances your Orator having no Guardian to watch over his interests, the Said Alfred NELSON as your Orator believes and charges intends to Sell and dispose of the Said Negroes and thereby either put them beyond the reach of your orator or to sell them to persons who may take them out of this State & to parts unknown in execution of Which your Orator charges that said NELSON has at this time one of the said Slaves Vizt boy Moses in the Jail of Pitt County preparatory to conveying him off for sale & has repeatedly & publicly offered to Sell the said Boy absolutely and without Communicating the nature of the right under which he holds the said boy And your Orator has just ground to fear and does believe that said NELSON will convey away said negroes or sell them or sum of them to persons who will convey them away to the great injury of your Orator. In tender concideration whereof and to the End that the Said Alfred NELSON may Secure the forthcoming of Said Slaves when his right to the possession thereof to may terminate or that the Said Slaves may be otherwise Secured against his unjust Schemes of disposal that he may answer the matters herein charged on his corporal Oath & that your Orator may have Such other and further relief as the nature of his case may require and the rules of Equity will admit may it please your Honor to grant your Orator a Writ of Subpana directed to the Said Alfred NELSON commanding him to appear and answer the premises at the Court of Equity to be held for Pitt County on the first Monday in September next and also a Writ directed to the Sheriff of Pitt County Commanding him to take into his possession the negroes herein before named and retain them in his Custody untill the Said Alfred NELSON Shall give bond and Sufficient Security to abide the further Order and decree of your Honor herein And your Orator Shall ever pray John STANLY Sol. For Complainant

Calvin BOYD maketh oath that the matter of fact stated in this Bill are true as therein charged he also swears that the negroes therein named are of the Value of three thousand Dollars Sworn to before me this 8th day of March

MAIMED & BLIND CIVIL WAR SOLDIERS

The following are selections taken from a Register of Maimed Pensioners and Artificial Limbs found in the NC State Auditors Papers, AUD 6.1; NC Archives, Raleigh, NC. Contributed by Roger Kammerer.

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By Resolution and Law the second Legislative session of 1866 voted to provide artificial limbs for veterans or commutation money (\$50) for those who either had procured limbs at their own expense or had useless limbs. Pensions for the blind and maimed were started by Public Law in 1879 which provided only for veterans who had lost their sight, both feet or both hands to get \$60 a year for life and was administrated by county committees. The stipend increased to \$120 a year in 1883. In 1889, the benefit was extended to veterans who had become blind since the war.

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
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BEAUFORT COUNTY COURT MINUTES, 1759-1761

The following are selected items of interest taken from the minutes of the Beaufort County Court of Pleas and Quarter Sessions found at the NC Archives, Raleigh, NC. The original minute records are very faint and difficult to read. Contributed by Roger Kammerer.

March 1759 Court

- 1) Mary MOYE, adminstrx. of George MOYE, dec'd. exhibits inventory.
- 2) Theophilus CRAFTON, aged 17 years or thereabouts, bound apprentice to Edward SALTER, Esq. till age 21.
- 3) William Edwards GRYMES, orphan boy, aged about 14 years and 7 months, bound apprentice to Alex. STEWART till age 21.
- 4) Will of James HERRINGTON, dec'd., proved by William TRIPP, one of the subscribing witnesses.
- 5) Pursuant to an order of Sept. Court 1758, William MAYO, David HATTAWAY and Amos ATKINSON value an acre of land on Doyls Creek on Connetto (Conetoe), for privilege for a grist mill at 5 shillings proc. money.
- 6) John SPEIR, Sr., petitions the Court for the continuance of his ferry at the Red Banks, granted. He is allowed 2d for footmen, 4d for man and horse and ¼ for empty cart or chairs, and the carriages in proportion; William SPEIR and John HARDEE, securities.
- 7) Edward SALTER, moved the court for continuance of his ferry from his own plantation to the opposite side of the river and back, allowed same charges as before. William SPEIR and John HARDEE, securities.
- 8) Catherine HODGES, adminstrx. of Benjamin HODGES prays the Court to divide the estate among the children. Simon JONES, William SPEIR and Alexr. STEWART nominated to do so.
- 9) Catherine HODGES at special request is appointed guardian to her children viz: Barbara, Hazen, Axis, Winefred, Benjamin and Elizabeth HODGES. Bond of 300 pds. Proc. money, John HODGES, Sr. and William WATSON, Sr. securities.
- 10) William SPEIR moved the court for continuance of keeping his ferry on the Tar River to the opposite side and back. John SPEIR and Edward SALTER securities.
- 11) Will of James ADAMS, dec'd., proved by Mary ADAMS and James ADAMS, executors. Michael COUTANCHE, subscribing witness. Other witnesses Mourning BLIN and Mary FOREMAN.
- 12) John ANDERSON came to Court and said that Sarah FLANNAKIN, widow of Edward FLANNAKIN, relinquished her right of administration to James ELLISON, Esq.
- 13) James ELLISON, Esq. exhibits inventory of the estate of Edward FLANNAKIN, dec'd.
- 14) Abraham TISON, exctr. of George SUGG, dec'd. moved to sell residue of the estate.

PETITION FROM PITT AND BEAUFORT COUNTIES FOR A ROAD, 1783

This petition was found in the NC General Assembly Session Records, April-May 1783, Box 2; NC Archives, Raleigh, NC. Contributed by Roger Kammerer.



"To the Honorable Members of the Senate and Commons in both houses assembled---The Petition of a great number of the inhabitants of the Counties of Beaufort and Pitt and others---Humbly Sheweth

That Whereas on account of there being a Large marsh and Pocoson (about three quarters of a mile through) Lying on the South Side of the Pamplico river opposite To Washington, the present ferry Landing on the Same side of the said river, at which the ferry Boat from the said Town is obliged to land is At least a full mile distant there from as As there is no ferry boat Kept on that side of the Said river, persons travelling Northward are Discouraged from Crossing the said ferry, and are thereby frequently obliged to take other routs which Carries them many miles out of their way, And That Whereas if proper encouragement were given for Cutting and opening a good road opposite to the said Town, through the said marsh and pocoson, travellers Would then be on a Certainty of being always immediately carried over the said river, it being there not more than half mile wide, and which would moreover Have a great tendency to encourage the Trade and Settlement of the said Town And That Whereas John and James BONNER Junior Two of your said Petitioners are willing at their own Proper Charge and Expence to cut open and Clear such a road as aforesaid, Provided an Act of assembly might be passed, to invest in them the said John and James BONNER Junior, their Heirs and assigns, for a term not less than Ninety Nine Years, the Sole Profits and Emoluments Arising from the Keeping the sd. Ferry, to and from the said Town of Washington a Cross the Said river during which term they will agree to keep sufficient ferry boats and attendance, and also Will Keep the said road in good order and repair. That We your said Petitioners do thereof most humbly pray that such an Act may be passed Accordingly allowing them the sd. John and James BONNER Junior Their heirs and assigns, during the term above Mentioned an Exclusive right to all the Profits and advantages arising from the Keeping the said ferry, is a Consideration for their trouble and Expence in Cutting and Opening the said road As aforesaid and your Petitioners as in duty Bound shall ever Pray &c

BAKER VS. CARSON, SUPREME COURT CASE, 1833

The following is an abstract of Supreme Court case #2785; John Bunyan Baker and wife Licetta vs. Rebecca Carson, widow of Thomas Carson, dec'd.; found in the NC Archives, Raleigh, NC. Contributed by Roger Kammerer.

Deposition of John B. BAKER, May 30, 1831

John Bunyan BAKER married on March 29, 1826 to Lisetta CARSON. At that time he lived on a piece of rented land about three or four miles from the residence of Mrs. Rebecca CARSON and lived on it until January 1827 when his lease ran out. He was planning to move to a piece of land he owned about three or four miles farther away from Rebecca CARSON'S residence and was "in treaty" with Amos TURNAGE for the purchase of another piece of land adjoining it. Rebecca CARSON intervened and said the manor plantation on which she resides contained a large portion of uncleared land, which was of no service to her. She said a good settlement could be made by them and proposed that the heirs have a division made of the lands of Thomas CARSON, dec'd. and BAKER and his wife should take possession of the uncleared lands contained in the part allotted them and make a permanent settlement there. Rebecca declared her readiness to make them at any moment a conveyance of all her interest and right in the uncleared part. BAKER and his wife said they couldn't move there when their lease ran out because there was no place to settle. Rebecca told them they should live at her house until a new place could be rendered fit to receive them. Rebecca was distressed that her youngest daughter would move so far from her and her protests were so reasonable and kind that BAKER and his wife assented to them. In January 1827, they moved to Rebecca's house and in February Court 1827 they filed with the other heirs of Thomas CARSON, dec'd. to have their share of the lands allotted to them. At the Partition, BAKER and wife were allotted Lot #2 on Pine Log Swamp on William HEMBY'S line, through Hurley Branch Pocosin, being 152 acres. They made a contract with Rebecca and she approved of the division. BAKER then sold his land and got TURNAGE to break off the deal for the TURNAGE land and they settled on the land allotted them. BAKER said he cut a ditch on the cleared part more than 600 yards long, 3 feet wide and averaging 3 feet deep. He erected a decent dwelling house and a plain, but substantial, log kitchen, smoke house, corn crib and other smaller erections. He cleared between 20 and 29 acres, which yielded him last year 2 1/2 to 3 bushels or corn an acre. All of this was done with the knowledge of Rebecca CARSON in execution and performance of the contract between them. On March 20, 1828, after having gotten their new settlement fit to receive them, they moved onto the land and lived there without the slightest intimation from Rebecca of any design on her part to violate their contract. On Sept. 25, 1830, a notice from Rebecca was delivered by the Sheriff of Pitt County to BAKER to leave Rebecca's land by January next (1831) or she would go to court. Ruel ANDERSON acted as agent for Rebecca CARSON to get the eviction notice. BAKER said that a short time bbefore the notice was received by him that there had been some disagreement between himself and Ruel ANDERSON, brother of Rebecca CARSON. BAKER believed this whole business was intigated by Ruel ANDERSON who sought to avenge his private quarrel. BAKER went to Rebecca's house and in front of witnesses applied to her to learn if she authorized the notice and she answered that ANDERSON would not have done it had he not had authority for it. BAKER proposed to Rebecca that he would remove from the land as she required, if she would pay him back for the improvements. But she refused. In April 1831, BAKER and wife were served with a declaration of ejectment. BAKER prayed to the May term 1831 Pitt County Court for relief. John B. BAKER

Deposition of Mrs. Rebecca CARSON, Sept. 8, 1831

She said that Thomas CARSON died and by Will left land to his widow Rebecca during her life and widowhood. They had three daughters: Elizabeth, Sarah and Lisetta, who married John B. BAKER. According to Rebecca, the marriage of John B. BAKER and Licetta took place against the wishes of the BAKER family and Rebecca fearing Licetta would be treated badly if they settled in the BAKER neighborhood at a distance from her, Rebecca induced John to settle on her life estate. Rebecca said she never intended to give John deed to the land, but did assent to the division and having him building on it and occupying it. Rebecca said John erected erected indifferent buildings on the land, cleared some 10 to 15 acres and occupied it since March 1828. Rebecca said that John treated her harsh and unkind after they

inhabited the new dwelling. She said John keeps her daughter from visiting her when she was sick and believes he has done much injury to her stock, which has never happened before until he became a near neighbor to her. Rebecca got her brother, Ruel ANDERSON, to take steps to get them off the land.

Signed Rebecca (her mark) CARSON

Depositions at the store of Sherrod TISON, Pitt Co., taken by John JOINER and Isaac JOINER, Justices, July 5, 1831, of Selah HENBY (HEMBY), Absalom SANDERS, Sherrod TISON and Jesse BAKER.

Deposition of Selah HENBY (HEMBY)

She said she heard Rebecca CARSON several times persuade BAKER and wife to settle on the Carson land. If BAKER paid the expenses for division, and he settled on it, she would give up all her right to all the uncleared land. HEMBY said BAKER was reluctant at first, but did comply with her. John B. BAKER was about to buy the Benjamin BAKER place. Rebecca said that her daughter was young and would require her further assistance and instruction. For BAKER and his wife to buy the Ben BAKER place they would have to go into debt.

Signed Selah (her mark) HENBY

Deposition of Absalom SANDERS

SANDERS said he heard Rebecca say she would give each of them the preference to rent that part of the land that fell to them and if they would not rent it, she would have liberty to rent it out to someone else. She did not want her children to settle on it until it was devised. SANDERS heard Rebecca say her daughter Lisetta was young when she married and she didn't want her to settle far from her. According to the Will of Thomas CARSON, Rebecca could only get firewood and rail timber from the woodland. The Will prohibited her from cutting boxes or making tar or anything that would damage the land. SANDERS heard Rebecca express great confidence in BAKER after he settled on the land. She would not let Allen TISON build on his lot because he had treated her so mean and BAKER had been so good to her. SANDERS was at Rebecca CARSON's house on Nov. 2, 1830 when BAKER confronted Rebecca after the eviction notice had been delivered. BAKER asked her to pay him for his labor, but she made no reply and left the house.

Signed A. SAUNDERS

Deposition of Sherrod TISON

In February 1827, Mrs. Rebecca CARSON, John B. BAKER and his wife, Licetta were together at the store of Sanders and Tison. Sherrod got into a conversation with Rebecca in which she said her daughters married men without land and the Will of her husband gave her all the lands during her life and widowhood. She said that she had more lands than she could use and the wood land was of very little use to her except for timber and firewood. She was willing that her son-in-laws should have some profit from the land and if they had the land divided, they could settle on their parts. Sherrod said he was on the Commission to divide the estate of land and negroes of Thomas CARSON among the heirs. During the Division, Sherrod said he had another conversation with Rebecca in which she said she could not give up the cleared land, that she needed that for her support. TISON told her that she could rent the land to her sons-in-law, the part they received if they would give her the same rent as others for her support, which she agreed. TISON said that if they build and settle on the land and improve it, she shouldn't take it away from them until they had benefit of their labor. She said she would not, that she only wanted privilege of the woodland.

Deposition of Jesse BAKER

Jesse BAKER said that in 1826 my son, John B. BAKER married Lisetta CARSON. That at the time John was renting a place belonging to the heirs of James MAY, known as the BECTON place. During that year John was planning to purchase lands adjoining a place he then owned, 3 or 4 miles from where he lived then, which provided shingles and lumber for building on that place. Jesse said he talked with Rebecca CARSON frequently and she wanted him to use his influence as a father to have him settle on the Carson land. After John moved to Mrs. CARSON'S, Jesse was there and heard Rebecca CARSON say that John could stay as long as he pleased.

Signed Jesse (his mark) BAKER

Depositions at the store of Sherrod TISON, Pitt Co., on Jan. 30 and 31, 1832, of Elijah RANDOLPH, Jesse RANDOLPH, William MOORE, Bathsheba SMITH and Sherrod TISON

Deposition of Elijah RANDOLPH

He says that John B. BAKER, called Bunyan BAKER, was living in Rebecca CARSON's kitchen while he was clearing the land.

Signed Elijah (his mark) Randolph

Deposition of Dr. Jesse RANDOLPH, Sr.

Says he visited Rebecca CARSON in her sickness in September 1829 and saw John B. BAKER and Licetta there.

Jesse RANDOLPH Senr.

Deposition of William MOORE

Says he was one of the Commissioners to divide the land of Thomas CARSON, dec'd. among the heirs. The Commissioners met in the home of Rebecca CARSON.

Deposition of Bathseba SMITH

Bathsheba said she was the aunt of John B. BAKER. Bathsheba said that she and Rebecca CARSON were both together at John B. BAKER'S the day after his first child was born. Bathsheba in conversation with John that day mention was made of him moving away. Bathsheba asked Rebecca why John could not settle on the land which fell to Licetta and Rebecca answered that she wished John would settle there and asked Bathsheba to tell John so. That Rebecca would give him the use of one of her houses until John could build. Rebecca said that her other two daughters were no satisfaction to her and that if Licetta was carried away she should die. Rebecca requested Bathsheba to use her influence as aunt to persuade John to live with her.

Feb. 11, 1832, ordered John C. GORHAM and Goold HOYT, Justices to take depositions on March 2 and 3, 1832 at the Court House of Allen TISON and Sally TISON, Elizabeth WILLOUGHBY, Richard CARSON, Joel TISON, Jordan EVERITT and Blaney WILSON.

Deposition of Richard CARSON

CARSON says he heard John B. BAKER say he was putting up a fence, after he got notice to leave the land and that he expected to get paid for making it by Mrs. Rebecca CARSON. Richard heard BAKER say he does not have right to the land. CARSON said BAKER first settled on the woodland part of the land. He heard BAKER say he was willing to go off the land whenever he was paid for his labor. CARSON said BAKER had been living on the land for three years and only tended a garden the first year. BAKER hired a negro man who worked part of the year on the land.

Richard CARSON

Deposition of Joel TISON

TISON heard BAKER say he had no right to the land and would leave off of it if he got paid for his labor or was turned off of it. If he was paid for his labor he would be willing to get off any time. TISON said BAKER made three crops on the land. He put up a fence since 1831. Joel TISON

Deposition of Elizabeth WILLOUGHBY

WILLOUGHBY says she heard BAKER say he didn't have a right to the land and that Mrs. Rebecca CARSON had the advantage of him. She could turn him off the land whenever she pleased. WILLOUGHBY heard that Mrs. Licetta BAKER was "at law" about the land. Elizabeth WILLOUGHBY was a daughter of Mrs. Rebecca CARSON and did see Licetta at her mother's house a few times. When Rebecca CARSON was sick and under the care of Dr. RANDOLPH, WILLOUGHBY said that she sent a negro man named Charles and a Mrs. ANDERSON to send for her sister Licetta BAKER to come to their mother's house. Willoughby heard her mother say that Allen TISON and John B. BAKER might live on the woodland if they would have it divided among the heirs and they could have what they could make off of it, but not live on it. WILLOUGHBY said that Allen TISON did not live on the land that fell to him.

Deposition of Allen TISON

TISON says he was at John B. BAKER'S one day and TISON was about to take BAKER'S oldest child to its grandmother (Rebecca CARSON) when BAKER objected to it and said he did not want his child or any

other person that he had control over to visit Rebecca CARSON. This was before the Court order notice was given to BAKER. Allen TISON was displeased with Mrs. Rebecca CARSON, when he was about to carry the Baker child over to her house, but they had not had any unpleasant words with each other. TISON said that he has had a habit of drinking to much spirits at times and was drinking at the time he was going to carry the BAKER child over to Mrs. CARSON'S. TISON said BAKER grew a garden on the land the first year and made very little on the land the first year on account of the roughness of the land and wet weather.

Allen TISON

Depositions at the store of Sherrod TISON, Pitt Co. on March 2, 1833 Deposition of Alfred MOYE

He says that in March or April 1827 he was called on by John B. BAKER and Allen TISON to survey the land of Thomas CARSON, dec'd. MOYE proceeded to survey and divide the land among the heirs as directed by the commissioners appointed for that purpose. While he was surveying he was at the house of Rebecca CARSON (except for the time he was engaged in the woods) where she provided for him and after the division had taken place, MOYE recollected that John B. BAKER appeared to be gratified at the lot of land that fell to him and his wife. It appeared to also be convenient to Mrs. Rebecca CARSON. That there was a piece of woodland that John B. BAKER wanted to clear and settle on. John B. BAKER paid MOYE \$9.00 as his half part of the expenses of the survey in May 1827.

William CLARK, Clerk and Master of Court of Equity of Pitt County to hold court at the court house in March 1833.

Depositions at the store of Sherrod TISON, Pitt Co., taken by John JOINER and Alfred MOYE, Justices, April 26, 1837, of Amos JOINER, Isaac JOINER, William HEMBY, William MAY, Sherrod TISON and Moses TURNAGE.

<u>Deposition of William I. (J.?) BAKER, April 26, 1837 at the store of Sherrod TISON</u>
William BAKER said he saw John B. BAKER put manure on the land, which he adjudged to be 100 cart loads of one horse, which improved it greatly.

William MAY and Goold HOYT, Justices ordered to take the depositions of Wiley NOBLES and John S. BROWN, May 5, 1837.

Deposition of Wiley NOBLES, May 5, 1837

Nobles said he surveyed the land in question the day before, it being $13 \frac{1}{4}$ acres. He valued the improvements on the land when new at \$210. He valued the improvements:

Dwelling house \$62.50

kitchen \$13.00

smoke house \$13.00

corn crib \$20.00

hen house \$2.50

gig shelter \$3.00

garden \$5.50

well \$3.00

ditches \$17.50

clearing the land \$70.00

The houses are principally constructed of pine logs, the dwelling house logs I think are split and the inside hewed. The corn crib logs are split but as to the others I do not know whether they are split or not. The hen house, kitchen and dwelling are decayed some. NOBLES judged the value of the land at \$32.50 per year from 1831 until this time. Half the ditches need considerable work. NOBLES said he saw the land several times before it was cleared, but only from the road. NOBLES lived 8 ½ miles from this land. Wiley NOBLES was county surveyor until he resigned Feb. term 1837. Signed: Wilie NOBLES

Deposition of John S. BROWN, May 5, 1837

BROWN says he was with NOBLES surveying the land the day before. The dwelling house, smoke house and corn crib are split pine buildings. Inside the dwelling the logs are hewn. The kitchen and hen house are round logs with pine slab roofs. The hen house and kitchen are considerably decayed. The garden and well is in tolerable good repair and the ditches need clearing out. BROWN said Mrs. Rebecca CARSON is about 50 years old the same age as him. The ditch on the property is 627 yards long. Some portions are 5 feet deep and other parts are not more than 6 inches. It is 3 feet wide in some places and 2 feet wide in others. The narrow part of the ditch was 125 feet long. The shallowest part is 20 yards long. BROWN said he passed the land on the road before BAKER moved on it. It was piney land, 1/3rd of which would be heavy land to clear. The balace of the land might be plowed up by scutter grubbing. It was worth \$5.50 to clear at a total of \$70.00. It is worth at least \$8 to \$9 per acre considering all the improvements BAKER made. BROWN recalled a ditch along the road before BAKER moved on the land.

BROWN says he had never been on the land but helped survey it the day before. BROWN says he saw the ditches about 20 years before. There was a ditch on the land along the road before John B. BAKER moved on it. The ditch was 330 yards long, 3 feet wide and 1 ½ feet deep on average. Willie BROWN

He said that the lumber on the land would cost \$3.00 for every hundred yards to cut it on average.

The well is at a convenient place for people to get water when passing, and it was kept in use as a matter of public convenience. Why any one should be so wanton as to keep injuring the well we are unable to see. Some people are very thoughtless of the comfort and convenience of others.

First My Soul, I commend to God who gave it, my body to my friends for decent burial—head and foot marble pieces to be placed at my tomb.

Second After my burial expenses and my just debts are paid it is my will, that the following disposition should be made of the balance of my property

Item 1st To my grand-daughters, Martha and Mary HARDY children of my son Cornelius I give and bequeath the sum of five dollars each.

Item 6th To my daughter Emily MCLAHORN I give and bequeath one mule and one cow and calf—should they be found in my possession at my death; if not then one hundred and fifteen dollars if found in my possession

Item 7th To my Son F. M. HARDY I give and bequeath one cow and calf, one large mahogany table that sets in the parlor, one parlor carpet and one bed and its furniture- if I have not the cow and calf at my death then fifteen dollars in <u>liew</u> of the same

STONEWALL LODGE HISTORY

The following history of Stonewall Lodge in Robersonville, Martin County, NC was written by Paul D. Roberson, Master of Stonewall Lodge. It appeared in the *Weekly Record*, Robersonville, Aug. 20, 1941. Contributed by Judy Nobles Lewis.



Stonewall Lodge was organized during April, 1869, Robersonville. On December 27, 1869, the lodge was convened by dispensation from the Grand Lodge for the purpose of constituting, consecrating and dedicating the lodge and installing the officers, which was done according to the ancient usage. The growth of the lodge has been continuous, and its activities have followed closely along the well-chosen path of Freemasonry.

On the 19th day of August, 1871, Henry D. ROBERSON gave a lot on which to build a temple. This lot of 70 feet square on the east side of which is now Main Street of Robersonville, is the home of Stonewall lodge. Immediately after the lot was given, the members of the local lodge constructed the building which is now located on the lot. It is the oldest building now standing on Main Street.

The lower floor of this building was used for the purposes of refreshment by the Masons, and by Professor Stephen W. OUTTERBRIDGE as a school until the latter part of the nineteenth century. The lower floor is still used by the Masons when they desire the use of it. The lodge permits the Senior and Junior Woman's clubs and other non-profit organizations which have for their purpose the betterment of the town and community of Robersonville to use this lower floor at the present time. At the present time, one of the small rooms on the lower floor is used by the Junior Woman's Club for the purposes of conducting a public library.

Originally the entrance to the second floor was by means of steps entering from the south side of the building. This was changed several years ago by removing the original steps and making a winding stairs within the hall leading from the first floor to the second. During the past few years with the assistance of the ladies, the Masons have improved the grounds surrounding the temple by appropriate posts and the planting of shrubberies and flowers. During the year 1937 the building was completely renovated. At that time a small porch was built to the building, and a new roof was put over the temple. At the present time, the temple compared favorable with the best in the Fifth Masonic district.

Several times in the past Stonewall lodge has been favored by visits from the Grand Masters and other high ranking State officers of the Masonic Order. During 1938 the local lodge was host to the district meeting.

The lodge has never had its charter arrested, and it has always been in good standing with the Grand Lodge. It has contributed continuously to the support and relief of the Orphan's Home and the Eastern Star Home. At the present time there are thirteen members who hold a record of over 25 years of continuous service as members in good standing. Spier COCHRAN has served continuously as Tiler for more than 35 years.

The first Master of the lodge was James Augustus WHITLEY, who was an outstanding farmer and citizen of Martin County. He lived near Everetts, and represented the county in the State Legislature. He was Master for a total of 24 years, attending many of the Grand Lodge Meetings as representative of Stonewall Lodge, and was often known as "Father of the Lodge." He served a Master during the following years: (1869-1874), (1877-1833), (1886-1893), (1895), (1904-1905), (1909), and (1911).

Following James Augustus WHITLEY'S first term as Master, W. H. PERKINS served as Master during the year (1874-1875). W. H. PERKINS was known as a merchant in Beaufort County, where he did business, and as a jovial fellow, to all those who knew him. John D. SIMPSON served as Master during the year (1875-1876). He was reared and lived near Everetts and during his latter days was engaged in the hardware business in Williamston. W. B. MANGRUM served as Master during the year (1876-1877). He operated much land in Martin, Beaufort and Pitt Counties; operated a saw mill and cotton gin; and in addition to his leadership given to the Masonry, he was an active lay member of the Methodist Church.

J. B. ANDREWS served as Master during the year 1884. He was reared in Pitt County and known throughout eastern Carolina as a building contractor. W. H. HARDISON, the son of Sheriff Hardison, of

Martin County, lived in Robersonville, built a store and entered into the mercantile business. Later he entered the lumber business and moved to Rocky Mount where he continued in the lumber business until his death. He served as Master during the years 1894 and 1896.

- W. R. WHICHARD, Jr. served as Master during the years 1897 through 1900. He was raised near Whichard's Station and was engaged in successful farming operations, taught school in Pitt County. Later he entered the lumber business and then moved to Norfolk and went into the wholesale business and traveled for his firm. He has advanced to positions of high authority in the Masonic bodies. He was followed by T. H. BAILEY who was Master in 1901.
- J. W. ROSE served as Master during the year 1902. He was a very influential Missionary Baptist minister and was very instrumental in the construction of the first Baptist Church in Robersonville. Dr. R. J. NELSON served as Master during the year 1903. He was reared near Bethel, worked in a drug store in Bethel, worked with a lumber company as a doctor, then with the State of North Carolina for a few years, and then practiced medicine in Robersonville for about 40 years. He also served as Robersonville Township Toad Commissioner, until its dissolution. W. A. JAMES, Jr., served as Master during the year 1906. He was reared in Pitt County, was in business in Bethel for a number of years, and then moved to Asheville where he was engaged in the hotel business.
- E. B. WHICHARD, brother of W. R. WHICHARD, Jr., served as Master for eight years, having served the following years: 1907-1908, 1910, 1912, 1914, 1917, 1918, and 1925. He delivered mail on the R.F.D., and was known as a good sport.
- S. L. ROSS acted as Master during the year 1913. He expanded the services of the Eastern Telephone Company. He was Mayor of the Town of Robersonville for a number of years, and served with distinction as Justice of the Peach for many years. He was reared near Cross Roads Church and was an outstanding citizen of Martin County, and died as Postmaster of the Town of Robersonville.
- J. C. TAYLOR served as Master during the year 1915. He was reared in Pitt County and for a number of years was connected with the Adkins and Bailey Warehouse in Robersonville. He moved to Robersonville about 20 years ago, where he now makes his home, although frequently visiting his farming lands located in Pitt County. J. W. EDMONDSON served as Master during the year 1916. He lived on the edge of Everetts and had a hobby of raising bees and engaged in the lumber business for a livelihood.
- J. A. COFFIELD served as Master for 10 years, having served the following years: 1919-1921, 1928, 1933-1938. He was raised on the farm, worked as clerk, then entered into the mercantile business in Rocky Mount for a short while, and returned to Robersonville and clerked for many years. For the past few years, his occupation has been that of a carpenter. He served the lodge with his untiring efforts and has been a true Mason for many years.
- A. L. ROEBUCK served as Master during the year 1922. He was an outstanding farmer of Cross Roads Township and held many trusts and died as Sheriff of Martin County. H. H. POPE, Sr., served as Master during the year 1923. He is well known as a depot agent, having worked with the A.C.L. Railroad for 40 years, of which 36 years were spent in Robersonville. He is now retired and makes his home in Robersonville.
- A. L. WOOLARD served as Master during the year 1924. He makes his home in Pitt County, where he is an active Justice of the Peace. He has been very active in behalf of the Orphan's Home. H. A. GRAY, Jr., served as Master during the years 1926 and 1927. He makes his home in Pitt County, where he is known as a very good farmer.
- C. D. CARAWAY served as Master during the year 1929. He was a clerk-operator for the A. C. L. Railroad for 13 years. He is closely connected with the tobacco business and since 1928 has managed the operation of the Martin County Transfer Company with its chief offices in Robersonville. J. G. SMITH served as Master during the years 1930, 1931 and 1932. He is a graduate of N. C. State College in electrical engineering. He has been very active in the promotion of Boy Scouts, the raising of bees, and continues his electrical hobbies. He is a partner of the business of R. L. SMITH and Sons.
- B. F. COBURN served as Master during the year 1939. He operated the light plant in Robersonville for a number of years, and for the past few years has been superintendent of water, lights and streets for the Town of Robersonville. Paul D. ROBERSON has served as Master since 1940. His profession is an attorney.

He represented Pitt one term in the Legislature, was at one time a Justice of the Inferior Court, and for several years prior to his death served as Magistrate. He had large family connections and a great many friends who regret his death.

Henry BROWN, a well known colored man here, and who for many years attended to the county bridge in opening the draw for boats to pass, died Wednesday.

COHABITATION RECORDS

Part 8 (continued from February 2006 issue)



In the March 1866 session of the North Carolina General Assembly, an Act was passed concerning negroes and persons of color. Justices of the Peace were to collect and record in the County Clerk's office, a record of the cohabitation of former slaves to ratify their state of marriage. The Court Clerk was required to maintain a record book for this purpose and to receive 25 cents per entry for his service. In Section 6, Chapter 40 of the Act, it was a misdemeanor if negroes did not record their marriage by Sept. 1, 1866, This section of the Act was amended by Section 1, Chapter 70 (ratified March 1867), to extend the time of recording these marriages to Jan. 1, 1868. 

John SIMPSON'S to Newbern, then a south west course to Craven County line, then with Craven Beaufort and Martin lines to the Beginning, and that all that part of Pitt County included in sd. Bounds may be annexed to, and Included in Beaufort County,

The Petition of Edward COWARD of Dobbs County Humbly Sheweth that on the Eighteenth day of November 1738 A Patent was Granted by Gabriel JOHNSTON Esquire then Governor to your Petitioner for Three Hundred Acres of Land lying in the Precinct of Craven at that time so called but now called Dobbs County, which said three Hundred Acres of Land hath been ever Since & now is in Possession of your Petitioner & hath paid His Majesty's Quit Rent for the same And your Petitioner being an Illiterate Person knew not but that his Patent had been properly & Regularly Completed in the Offices-- before it was delivered to him as he Honestly paid all the fees that was Requested of him by the Officers for the Obtaining the Same. IN MEMORY OF JEFF MCALLISTER



Pitt County Family Researchers has lost another friend, Jeff McAllister, a former PCFR Officer. Jeff joined PCFR in 1996, served on the Executive Board in 1997, was Vice-President of PCFR in 1998, and served as Secretary of PCFR in 1999. He and his wife Phyllis were always so gracious; letting us put together the Quarterly at their beautiful home. Back then, we would have pages of the *Quarterly* strung everywhere, with people collating, some stapling, some stuffing envelopes and others addressing. Then we would spend another hour trying to understand the bulk mail rules and get the Quarterlies in stacks and into certain tagged bags. There would always be laughter and of course lots of genealogical talk.

I have a personal connection to Jeff that I didn't realize until about two years after I knew him. He had ancestry back to West Virginia and would occasionally ask me about research techniques on tracking that family there. About two years later I was tracking a line of my mother's family out of Texas, which lead me to Indiana and then West Virginia. When I went on-line looking on message boards for this family I found a message about them. It turned out to be a message from Jeff McAllister! He came off the son and I came off the daughter of the same family. So, however unlikely, I found a distant cousin in Greenville, NC, since my mother's people lived in Texas. Jeff was warm, direct, intelligent, and loved gardening. I really appreciated his being direct (which came from his military training) and he did much for PCFR in its troubled and stumbling years. He will be missed and Phyllis and their children will be in our thoughts.

According to his obituary, Jeff McAllister, 81, died Wednesday, Aug. 30, 2006, in Greenville, NC at Pitt County Memorial Hospital. He was a native of Hopewell, Va. and later served in the United States Navy during World War II and the Korean Conflict. In the March 1866 session of the North Carolina General Assembly, an Act was passed concerning negroes and persons of color. Justices of the Peace were to collect and record in the County Clerk's office, a record of the cohabitation of former slaves to ratify their state of marriage. The Court Clerk was required to maintain a record book for this purpose and to receive 25 cents per entry for his service. In Section 6, Chapter 40 of the Act, it was a misdemeanor if negroes did not record their marriage by Sept. 1, 1866, This section of the Act was amended by Section 1, Chapter 70 (ratified March 1867), to extend the time of recording these marriages to Jan. 1, 1868. To the Honourable the General Assembly of the State of North Carolina Sitting at Fayette--The Petition of Saml CHERRY, John SMITH, Matthew LUTER, Charles WALDROP & Luke OSBORNE
Prisoners in the District Goal of Newbern--- Respectfully Shew

That at the last Superior Court of Law for the District of Newbern your Petitioners being charged with having riotously Assaulted one John WORSLEY were found guilty and fined as follows Vizt. Samuel CHERRY was fined L40 with 20 Days Imprisonment and to remain in prison untill the fine and Costs were paid--- John SMITH was fined L150 with 30 Days Imprisonment and there to remain as above mentioned— Matthew LUTER, was fined L30 and thirty Days Imprisonment and there to Remain as above mentioned— Charles WALDRON was fined L20 with Twenty Days Imprisonment there to Remain as above mentioned— Luke OSBORN was fined L30 with Thirty Days Imprisonment there to remain as above mentioned—

Your Petitioners beg leave to shew that being only 5 in Number they were picked out of 200 as the victims of WORSLEYS Resentment—Your Petitioners shew that the Depredations of Mr WORSLEY and his adherents had brought down the resentment of the Neigbourhood to defend themselves by those Laws which God and Nature had vested them with—That Mr WORSLEY and his Followers had bound themselves by Oath to use every Stratagem in plundering the Neighbourhood and defending themselves thereafter in such a manner that they were above the operation of the Laws. this being the Case the Neibourhood reduced to Desperation thought themselves Justifyable in some Measure in punnishing Villians who were beyond the reach of the Law Your Petitioners humbly shew that being poor and indigent persons with large famileys, to Support, the fines are more then they are any way Capable of Paying, and the Imprisonment is a Cruelty which however proper in a Court of Law to inflict, is a Severity upon their familys that will reduce them to the Greatest Distress——

Looking up to the Honourable General Assembly as the Seat of Mercy for redress in their unfortunate Situation they Humbley pray such Assistance as they in their Goodness may think Proper--- And your Petitioner as in Duty bound shall ever pray----- Saml CHERRY

Services were conducted by Rev. Mr. CAMERON, pastor of the Episcopal church in Ayden. The stick which the young man fell on, penetrated his body to a depth of several inches, inflicting a gaping wound. He was rushed to a Kinston hospital but died a few hours later.

Louis Nobles Respected Colored Man Dead

Louis NOBLES, an old colored man died here Saturday. He claimed to have been born in 1795 making him in his 110th year. He never saw George Washington, Lafayette nor had he visited Queen Victoria at Windsor Castle. He never voted any ticket, because he did not wish, as he said, to oppose the white race, neither was he ever convicted of any crime. A remarkable old colored gentleman to say the least.

William Henry Cox Called To Rest

Kinston, April 18----William Henry COX, aged 78, and one of Kinston's oldest citizens, died yesterday morning at 11 o'clock, following a severe stroke of paralysis earlier in the morning. The funeral will be conducted this afternoon at 3 o'clock, conducted by the Rev. Francis J. H. COFFIN, rector of St. Mary's Episcopal church, and will be held from the residence at McLewean and Blount streets. His death will be a distinct shock to his many friends, as he had been in apparently fine health up till the stroke. He arose yesterday morning in apparently fine health, but after the first coming of the paralysis he spoke to no one and finally died a short time later. Mr. COX was interested in the real estate business, owning several homes in Kinston. He had an office in the Spear Cycle Company, on Queen street, and was one of the city's most familiar figures. He was a farmer for many years. Several years ago he suffered a similar stroke and has been paralyzed in one side ever since. The following survive----his wife, a son, Robert COX, connected with the Kinston post office department, and one daughter, Mrs. Mark MEWBORN, with the T. W. MEWBORN Company store. He was a man of fine character and known to a very large number of people in this county and in Eastern Carolina. He was a native of Pitt and had lived here since 1897. Ed. Note------Mr. COX will be remembered pleasantly by Greenville people, having been in business in this city several years ago. News of his death will be received with profound regret.

BEAUFORT COUNTY REVOLUTIONARY WAR GRAVES

Washington Progress, May 9, 1912

The Graves of Our Revolutionary Ancestors Who Took Part in the Revolutionary War in Civil Capacity From Beaufort County Written by R. T. Bonner, Aurora, N. C.

John Gray BLOUNT, Deputy Paymaster under his father Jacob BLOUNT, is buried in the P. E. church yard in Washington. His grave is covered with a large slab.

Maj. Reading BLOUNT is buried near Tranter's Creek. A tombstone marks his last resting place.

Col. Thomas BONNER and Maj. Henry BONNER are buried in the vicinity of Washington in unmarked graves.

Capt. John BONNER of the marine service is buried on Windmill point on the east side of Washington. His grave is marked by a slate tombstone.

Col. James BONNER is buried in the southeast corner of the P. E. church yard in Washington.

Capt. Charles CRAWFORD is buried on the west side of the mouth of Durham's Creek, his grave is marked by a slab. This grave is on the land <u>now</u> owned by Gov. Charles EDEN and then known as "Thistleworth."

Alderson ELLISON, Sr., Clerk of Court of Beaufort County, during the American Revolution is buried about four miles east of Washington at the "Smaw" place. A monument marks his grave.

Lieutenant Caleb FOREMAN is marked by a tombstone and is on the north side of Pungo Creek opposite the Baugham Mill site.

Capt. Nathan KEAIS is buried in the P. E. church yard in Washington. His grave is marked.

Col. John PATTEN lies in an unknown grave on Hill's Point.

In the southwest corner of Beaufort County near the Craven and Pitt lines is the grave of "Private" Joseph GUILFORD. Until 12th of this month (April) his grave was marked by a cedar head board. At that time the North Carolina Society Sons of the American Revolution placed a government marker to his grave.

Near a station on the N. & S. R. R. called "Frederick" is the unmarked grave of Sergeant Israel HARDING. Corporal Benjamin ROSS is buried about one mile west of the town of Edward. His grave is unmarked. Robert TRIPP, delegate to the Halifax Convention Nov. 1776 that formed the first State Constitution is

buried at Core Point with only a stone at the head of his grave.

Who will aid your correspondent in locating the graves of those who took part in the Revolution on the American side?

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
