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

NC General Assembly Session Records, Nov.-Dec. 1814, Box 3, Misc.

"State of No Carolina Green County} November Term Court Pleas & Quarter Sessions
The Court for the County aforesaid Certify that Isaac PARKER of the County & State aforesaid was a
Malitia Soldier in the last Revolution War against Great Brittain, which gloriously terminated in the
establishment of American Independance that he the said Isaac PARKER was Several times wounded in
the Battle of Rock Fish in the Head arms thighs and Legs insomuch that he was of nesessity bore off as
will apper as well from the Inclosed affadavit as from the the information of one of our Bench who was in
the Same Company with said PARKER. Now therefore the Court recommend him to favour and expect
that a Pension adequate to his Support for one year will be allowed him, as act of Assembly in Such case
made and provided, provides. The Court moreover, States, that the Said PARKER is, in consequence of
his wounds unable to earn a Comfortable Subsistence by his labour, and would recommend as an adequate Sum for his support, Twenty Dollars.

NC General Assembly Session Records, Nov.-Dec. 1818, Box 2, Rev. War Petitions

"To the Honorable The General Assembly of the State of No. Carolina

The Petition of the Heirs of James BOYD humbly represents

That the said James BOYD enlisted as a soldier in the revolutionary War in the Continental line of this State and faithfully served his Country until his death; which happened in actual service of his Country. All which he is prepared to prove on any requisite Occasion. Your Petitioners further Shews that they have never recd. any Compensation for the Services of the said James BOYD. Therefore prays that the Secretary of State be directed to issue a Military Warrant for such quantity of Land as they are entitled to for the services aforesaid; And they as in duty bound will ever pray &c The Heirs of James BOYD" [Rejected]

"State of No Carolina Pitt County)

Personally appeared before me Jno. NORCOTT a Justice of the Peace Mr. William MOORE and made Oath that he served with a Certain James BOYD a nine months Soldier in the old revolutionary war, in the North Carolina line, and in the Company commanded by Capt. Richard MOSSEN & the sd. MORE deposeth that the said BOYD died to the best of his reco<u>llion</u> and Knowledge.

NC General Assembly Session Records, Nov.-Dec. 1816, Box 3, Rev. War Petitions

"To the Honourable The General Assembly of the State of North Carolina Humbly sheweth

Abraham HARDEE of the County of Pitt in said state that his brother one Isaac HARDEE was a Lieutenant in the 10th North Carolina Regiment which was enlisted for three years or during the war by order of the Congres of the United States in the Revolutionary War, and that the Said Lieut Isaac HARDEE Served his time in that Regiment according to the term of enlistment and your petitioner further Shews that the said Isaac HARDEE was entitled in consequence of said Service to a certain quantity of land under the Law of the United States, and that he died without having received the Same or any part thereof. Your petitioner further Shews that he is the only Heir of the Said Isaac HARDEE and entitled to the Said Land and that he never did receive the same, nor transfer it to any person and humbly prays your honourable body to order the same to be granted to him and as in duty bound will pray

"State of North Carolina Pitt County December 10th 1816

abraham HARDEE maketh oath that the facts stated in the foregoing Petition are true that the Said Isaac HARDEE lived two or three years after the expiration of his Said Service, during most of which time he was in a low state of health, and for Some time before his death he was about applying for his said land, but died before he effected it, and that he feels confident it was never transfered by said Isaac in his life time

Pitt County Dec. 10th 1816— Gardener MOYE of the County of Pitt maketh oath that he was raised in the County of Pitt aforesaid within three miles of Isaac HARDEE, that he (the deponant) enlisted & Served in the 10th North Carolina Regiment in the Revolutionary Army, which was enlisted by order of Congress for three years or during the war- that he knows that the said Isaac HARDEE was a Lieutenant under Captain Van Naye"s Company in said Regiment, and that he as well as the deponant Served their time according to enlistment- that deponant was well acquainted with the said Isaac HARDEE & his family, and knows that Abraham HARDEE, the foregoing petitioner is the brother & Heir of the said Isaac, who died without issue, and that he believes he is the only Heir

NC General Assembly Session Records, Nov. 1831-Jan. 1832, Senate Committee Reports "The Committee of Pro & Grievences to whom was refered the petition of Jesse COBURN of Martin County, Stating that he was a drafted Soldier in the revolutionary War, and served in Collo. DUDLEYS regiment and attached to Capt. KENNEDYS Company, and thence transfered to Capt. EVANS Company under whom his term of service was compleated, he was afterwards at the battle at Gilford Court house ans also at the battle fought at Camden, South Carolina, and further represents that he is of an advanced age, very infirm in body poor and necessitous, and unable to support himself and family, who are <u>intirely</u> dependant on his feeble exertions for sustenance, praying that he may receive the charity of the Legislature, and receive such boon as may be necessary for his Support in his declining days, report, that your Committee have examined the facts set fourth in the petition and find in the Deposition of Edward GLASGOW, that the dibility of the petitioner, has been, and is such, from the effects of old age and affliction as to incapacitate him to provide the common necessaries of life. And it appears also from a deposition laid before the Committee, that the petitioner was at Guilford about the time of the battle at that place. And it further appears by the Deosition of Richard TAYLOR a soldier, that the petitioner was a Soldier in the Revolutionary War and under the command of Colo. HILL, that he was in the battle fought at Guilford Court house, but it does not appear for what time the petitioner enlisted or what time he actually served. Upon this State of the facts it does not appear to the Committee that the petitioner has any particular claim upon the State, more than any other Citizen whose youthful days has been spent in the Armies of his Country and has become poor in his old age & thereby is unable to support himself, neither does it appear that the disabilities set fourth in his Petition has arisen from wounds or any other services rendered to the State in an <u>ou</u>r of danger, nor does it in any way appear that his indigence or inability to support himself has resulted from that Cause, wharefore your Committee are unable to percieve any just or proper ground by which the prayer of the Petitioner should be granted, and therefore recommend the Rejection of the same, All of which is respectfully Submitted. NC General Assembly Session Records, Nov. 1831-Jan. 1832, Senate Committee Reports "The Committee of Pro & Grievences to Whom was refered the Petition of John BONNER of Martin County, Stating that he was a Soldier in the revolutionary War and served three tours of militia duty, & further representing that he is of an advanced age, afflicted with the rheumatism, poor & indigent, and unable to supply himself with the common neccessaries of life, praying that he may be placed in the pension list of this State, report, that your Committee have examined the facts set fourth in the petition and find by the Certificate of Colo. READ, which they believe to be genuine, that the petitioner served in the Troop of Capt. CROWELL his tour of duty and was discharged. It appears also to the Committee by a deposition laid before them, the Petitioner was a Soldier under Capt. PHILLIPS and was at the battle of Camden, but it does not appear for what time the Petitioner enlisted, or what time he actually served, nor does it appear to the Committee whether the Petitioners claim upon the score of his indigence is in truth as set forth. Upon this State of the facts it does not appear to the Committee that the Petitioner has any Special Claim upon the State, beyond that of every other Citizen, who in earley life served in the Armies of his Country & has become poor in his old age and thereby is unable to support himself. It does not appear that the infirmities which is stated, if true, has arisen from wounds or any other services rendered to the State in an hour of peril, nor does it in any way appear that his poverty or inability to support himself has resulted from that cause, wherefore your Committee are unable to percieve any Just or proper ground by which the prayer of the Petitioner can be granted and therefore recommend the rejection of the same, all of which is respectfully submitted. Laughinghouse House Burned

Kinston Journal, Fri., Jan. 24, 1879

"The dwelling of Ed LAUGHINGHOUSE in Pitt county, was burned last Wed. night. Caught from the kitchen. A large portion of the furniture was burned. Loss about \$2,500."

State vs. Francis Meeks, 1795 New Bern District Criminal Action Papers, DSCR 206. 326. 4

"State of North Carolina Newbern District} Superior Court of Law September Term 1795 The Jurors for the State upon their oath ____ that before John HOLLIDAY Esquire one of the Justices of the peace of the County of Glasgow on the eleventh day of November in the year of our lord one thousand seven hundred and Ninety four and in the Nineteenth Year of the Independence of the State at the County of Glasgow aforesaid in the district of Newbern aforesaid a certain controversy between a certain Jonas MEEKS plaintiff and James MEARS and Joel MEARS defendants came on to be tried in due form of law and was then and there tried by the said John HOLLIDAY Esquire then being one of the Justices of the peace for the said County duly appointed and sworn and haveing good right and lawful Authority to hear and determine the said Controversy. And the Jurors aforesaid upon their oath aforesaid do further present that upon the trial of the said Controversy so then depending for trial as aforesaid before the said John HOLLIDAY Esquire between the parties aforesaid a certain Frances MEEKS late of the County of Glasgow aforesaid Yeoman appeared as a witness for and on behalf of the said Jonas MEEKS the Plaintiff in the Controversy abovementioned and was sworn aand then and there took his corporal oath upon the holy evangelist of Almighty God, before the said John HOLLIDAY Esquire one of the Justices aforesaid, to speak the truth the whole truth and Nothing but the truth touching and concerning the matters in question in the said controversy (he the said John HOLLIDAY Esquire being such a Justice as aforesaid then and there having sufficeint and competent authority to administer an oath to the said Francis MEEKS in that behalf.) And the Jurors aforesaid upon their oath aforesaid do further present that upon the trial of the said Controversy so then depending between said parties aforesaid certain questions then and there became and are Material, that is to say, Whether the said James MEARS and Joel MEARS had Killed a certain sheep of a White colour which they the said James and Joel had taken up as stray; and also of What Mark the said sheep was? and the said Francis MEEKS being so sworn as aforesaid not having the fear of God before his Eyes nor regarding the laws of this State but being Moved and seduced by the instigation of the devil and falsely wickedly and corruptly and Maliciously Contriving and intending as much as in him lay to prevent justice and prevent the due course of law and unjustly aggreve the said James MEARS and Joel MEARS the defendants in the said controversy and to subject them to the payment of sundry costs and charges then and there to wit on the Eleventh day of November in the year aforesaid at the said County of Glasgow in the district of Newbern aforesaid falsly, wickedly, wilfully, maliciously and corruptly and by his own act and consent did say depose swear and give evidence (amongst other things) to and before the said John HOLLIDAY Esquire, being such Justice as aforesaid, in substance and to effect following, that is to say, that the said Joel MEARS told him the said Francis MEEKS that the said sheep had been killed by them the said James MEARS and Joel MEARS and the said sheep was ear Marked in the following manner that is to say on the right ear a poplar leaf, the left ear a swallow fork: Whereas in truth and in fact the said Joel MEARS had not told him the said Francis MEEKS that they the said James MEARS and Joel MEARS had killed the said sheep and whereas in truth and in fact the said sheep was not of the ear Mark abovementioned. And so the Jurors aforesaid upon their oath do say that the said Francis MEEKS on the said Eleventh day of November in the Year aforesaid at the County in the district aforesaid before the said John HOLLIDAY Esquire being such Justice as aforesaid (and then and there having sufficient and competent authority and power to administer the said oath to the said Francis MEEKS as aforesaid) by his own act and consent and of his own Wicked and corrupt mind and disposition in manner and form aforesaid upon his oath aforesaid did falsely wickedly wilfully maliciously and corruptly commit wilful and corrupt perjury to the great displeasure of Almighty God, in contempt of the Laws of the State, to the great damage of the said James MEARS and Joel MEARS, to the evil and pernicious example of all others in the like case offending, contrary to the act of Assembly in such case made and provided and against the peace and dignity of the State."

Be it Remembered on the thirtieth day of October 1795 Francis MEEKS Junr. & James AVERY & Thomas DAIL came before me and Acknowledged themselves severally to owe & stand justly Indebted to the State, Twit, Said Francis MEEKS in the sum of one hundred pounds and the said James AVERY & Thomas DAIL in the sum of Fifty pounds each to be levied of their several Goods and chattles lands and Tenements to the use of said State.

The Condition of the above recognizance is such that if the above bounden Francis MEEKS do and Shall make his personal appearance before the Judges of the Superior Court to be held for the District of Newbern on the nineteenth day of March next then and there to answer to the State in a Certain charge Exhibited agt. him by Indictment and then and there to answer all such things as shall be objected against him and shall then and there stand to and abide the Judgt. and durn of sd Court and not depart the same without leave first had and obtained then this obligation to be null and void otherwise to remain in full force and virtue

State vs. James Hopkins, 1803

New Bern District Criminal Action Papers, DSCR 206. 326. 5

"State of North Carolina Newbern district Superior Court of Law January Term 1803 The Jurors for the State upon their oath present that James HOPKINS late of the County of Pitt Yeoman on the twenty first day of November in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred & two & in the twenty seventh year of the Independence of the State, with force & arms in the said County of Pitt in the District of Newbern aforesaid, one negro man Slave named Tony of the price of one hundred pounds the property of Adam ALBRITTON Executor of the last Will & Testament of James ALBRITTON deceased, then & there being, feloniously did steal take & carry away contrary to the Act of the General Assembly in such case made & provided & against the peace & dignity of the State And the Jurors aforesaid upon their Oath aforesaid do further present that the said James HOPKINS afterwards to wit on the same twenty first day of November in the year aforesaid with force & arms at the said County of Pitt in the district aforesaid a certain negro man slave named Toney of the price of one hundred pounds the property of Adam ALBRITTON Executor of the last Will & Testament of James ALBRITTON deceased & then & there being lawfully & peaceably in the possession of one Gardner MOYE, feloniously & by seduction did take & convey away out of the possession of him the said Gardner MOYE with an intention feloniously to appropriate the said negro Toney to his own use, contrary to the Act of the General Assembly in such case made & provided & against the peace & dignity of the State Blake BAKER Atto. Genl."

"State vs. James Hopkins Newbern Supr Court of Law

Thomas A GREEN and Edward GRAHAM make oath that that the defendant for whom appearance they were bound is as they are informed and believe not less than sixty years of age, that he served as an American soldier during the whole of the late revolutionary war, that in the battle at Eutaw Spring the said HOPKINS recd several wounds which have rendered him a cripple for the rest of his life and that at this time two of his wounds were running issues these deponants further say that residing with their families in the neighbourhood of the goal in which said HOPKINS was confined during the late cold spell of weather in the first of December last, and learning that a person of the above description was there in a very suffering condition, they thought it their duty to inquire into the circumstances of the charge against the prisoner then his character and situation, that they were informed by several respectable persons, that the charge against the man was groundless, that no one was bound to prosecute him and that Mr. MOYE the person who brought him down and whose slave he was said to have seduced had repeatedly declared him innocent, and thought it was hard he should be compelled to bring him to goal — these deponants were also under a strong conviction that the said HOPKINS was a good and moral man, and that his longer confinement would in all probability terminate his existence—these deponants say that they never saw or heard of said HOPKINS untill they heard of him in goal and that they were induced to interfere to procure his discharge from motive of compassion only

"John GOODING & Mary GOODING & John F. TEMPLETON make oath that when the said HOPKINS was brought to town and committed to goal Mr. MOYE who brought him and who is named as prosecutor assured him that said HOPKINS was innocent of the charge and that he would attend at court in order to clear and discharge him

State vs. Shadrach Price, James Dixon, Sr. and William Dixon Jr., 1795 New Bern District Criminal Action Papers, DSCR 206. 326. 4

"The depositions of the following persons taken before me Thos. SMITH Esq. one of the justices of the peace for the county of Beaufort and State of No. Carolina July the 21st 1795
The State vs Shad. PRICE Wm DIXON Jr. and Jas. DIXON suspected of house Burning—

William DAW junr. says that he heard Shad: PRICE say that David SMITHWICK nor Edwd. WARREN should never Live there (meaning in the neighborhood of Durhams Creek)

Robt. ROWE saith that he heard Shad: PRICE say that there were two men at his house who said that if David SMITHWICK did not make haste back (he being gone at that time to Roanoke) his house should be in ashes and that said SMITHWICK nor Ed WARRENshould not live there

Thos. TUTEN saith that he heard Shad: PRICE say there was at his house two men the one a midling tall man and the other Shorter— the tallest one Said he woud be D—d if SMITHWICK did not make haste from Roanoke his house should be in ashes before his return. TUTEN made reply 'tis Will: DIXON Junr. and his Brother. PRICE made no ansr. to the question but said it woud be a happy turn if there was a junk of fire in it meaning the house that is since burnt

Absalom TUTEN'S Oath the same as the last—

Wm. MOORE says that Shad: PRICE say that there was a person at his house say that he w<u>oud</u> be dam'd if his house (meaning SMITHWICKS house) should be in ashes bef<u>or</u> his return from Roanoke. The above conversation happen'd since the house was burnt

Ed. WARREN says that Jas. DIXON Sr. said there was never above six nails found and them D. SMITHWICK junr picked up—but upon search being made there was seventeen nails found in a chest which Polly DIXON & Ephriam DIXON acknowledged that Epheriam DIXON, Jas. DIXON Senr. and James DIXON junr. Each picked up some of said nails after the house was burnt—and that there was a piece of Iron found at Shad: PRICES that Epheraim DIXON said his brother Wm. DIXON picked up as he was going to said PRICES and there left it

The deposition of Benjamin DIXON who deposes and saith concearning the Burning down of David SMITHWICK House that he after the House was burnt in Company with Wm. DAW who upon hearing that the House was burnt, said he had heard Shade PRICE say he would burn it when ever an oppertunity offerd and he the said Ben DIXON then said if SMITHWICK would give him something he would tell the man that he had don the offense upon which Shade PRICE came to him and desired him to say nothing about the matter that his brother James DIXON was equally concerned in the affair and that they had made an appointment once before but had bean disapointed but the last time he was from home untill the Evening and when he came his Bror. had the Bark Ready lited he Ben understood in order to

fire the House On some conversation between this deponant and his brother James heard him say he Expected to pay for SMITHWICKS House meaning the house that was burnt don before me July 27th 1795

The deposition of Clark CARLILE who saith on his oath, that since the Burning down of David SMITHWICKS House he the said CARLILE heard a Conversation between David SMITHWICK and James DIXON who Said if SMITHWICK woud let himself and son Wm. DIXON out of the prosecution of the House burning he woud Build him Such another House and make him full satisfaction for the Ingury he had Sustained But begd he woud Carry on the prosecution against Shad PRICE who he said was the Ring leader of the Mischief, and offerd to pay a woman for a bead that was suposed to be Burnd or stolen out of the House further this deponant saith not

"To the Hone. the General Assembly of the State of North Carolina, now sitting at Raleigh The Petition of Frederick BRYAN, Thomas BRYAN & Arthur WHITEHURST of Pitt County Humbly sheweth-

That in the year 1811 your petitioners entered in the Entry takers office for the County of Beaufort thirty six Surveys of Land 640 acres each lying in said County of Beaufort on the south side of Pamplico River, above the head of South dividing creek pocosin, and that in the year 1812 they also entered in the Same office thirty five more surveys in the Same Pocosin, warrants for which from the said entry taker have been duly issued, but from the divers causes thaey have not been able to obtain actual Surveys thereof or any part of them, and in these hard times cannot, without great inconvenience, pay the purchase money for the said Lands. Now your petitioners humbly pray that by a Resolution of your hone. Body they may be included in the payment of the purchase money until the rising of the next General Assembly. And ye. Petitioners now duty bound will pray

Annice Gorham Wilson, Former Slave, age 108

Daily Reflector, April 1, 1938

"Annice Gorham WILSON, Negro woman of Pactolus township, is believed to be one of the oldest persons receiving aid under the Social Security old-age benefit program in the State. Annice claims to be 108 years old and acquaintances, both white and colored, in the section bear her out. Affidavits in the office of K. T. FUTRELL do not give her exact age, but two statements declare she was in her "middle age" years and tears ago. In fact, she has a living son who was not the first born, whose age is reported in the 80's. The son, Jeff WILSON, is blind and lives with his mother. The aged Negro woman, bent with the years, is only something like four feet tall. Despite her age, she can see and her mind cotinues clear. Up until two weeks ago she was up and about the house, but now is confined to her bed. According to records, she was a slave in the home of the late Albert WILSON of Bethel. She moved to the section known as Yankee Hall following her marriage. She is declared to have lived on the farm of B. B. SATTERTHWAITE for the past 50 years. Annice had 14 children, nine of which are still living. She has 35 grandchildren, 83 great grandchildren and 25 great-great grandchildren."

T. HOPKINS and two children, William T. and Ada Virginia, of Creswell; Mr. and Mrs. Irving L. SMITH, of Robersonville, and Irving Lee SMITH, Jr. and Miss Mary K. ROBERTSON and Joe Brake ROBERTSON. Mr. J. L. ROBERTSON, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John A. ROBERTSON, for thirty years a resident of Martin County and Robersonville, was born in Pitt County on Sept. 25, 1862. He was married to Ada C. MOORE, of Pitt County, in 1890. After her death in 1890, Mr. ROBERTSON was married to Prudence BRAKE, of Rocky Mount in 1913. All of Mr. ROBERTSON'S children and sons-in-law are living except one son, William Oscar ROBERTSON, 1893-1899. Other relatives and friends of the family at the reunion were Mr. and Mrs. Charles JAMES, Mr. and Mrs. John S. MOORE, Miss Grace EVERETT, Mr. Melvin BUNTING and Mr. Winston HOPE, of New York."

DIVORCE PETITION OF JOHN HEATH, 1814

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State of No Carolina Jones County John HEATH appeared before me Daniel SIMMONS one of the Justices of the sd. county ans made Oath on the Holy Avangelist of Almighty God and saith that the next morning after she had set the Negro Dublin to the table and him to the skillet of Cold soup in the Corner that he was going to kill some hogs that day to carry to market that he was busy about geting in fix for it all out of order as he had not kill, d any that season and that help was to Come at a Certain time of day to help him the weather being very Cold he Came in the house to warm when he came in his wife Rachel and Polly HEATH was disputing I know not what about I paid no attention a small Child was fretting for something to Eat she would not give it anything there was a potatoe on the shelf I stept to it and took it of she forbid me and said she would be Curst if he should eat it I did not obey her but cut it in two and threw a piece on the hearth and said here Gim take it and roast it and eat it my son Calling him so she immediately Catcht it up and swore he should not ha_ Rachel said I dont be a blockhead she then threw it down and the Childs Mother pickt it up and threw it in the Corner and swore he shud not eat it after the child and his mother was gone I came in and said Rachel I think you behave mighty odd to make a fus about a piece of potatoe I went to give to my grand child and you could set the negroe to the table last Night she immediately affirmed if not swore that if she was debard from giving Dublin Victuals when ever he came to see her that she whould never do a nother thing on that plantation nor take a nother grain of Care there and that she would not do a thing to them hogs that day and that she would never set a nother mouth full of victuals to no body let who would come no not even to one of her own folks and that she would go and tell Gim BRIGHT that I would not let her give dublin victuals when he came to see her I was much surprised and spoke and said I dont know what more you Could have said if he had been your Husband she said I had as leave be dublins wife as your wife and had rather be Calld Dublins wife than your wife for I am not asham'd of dublin nor should not be ashamd to be catcht with dublin no where no not in a Court yard so I should not I left her and went out about my business I got my pots filld with water I Calld her to help me hang them up I Calld three times before she would not answer and then did not Come I calld a gain three times before she would answer and them it appear'd she did not intend to Come I went in and askt her if she did not intend to help me she said let me suckel my Child the Child was a sleep I took it and put it to bed sot still till I took her by the arm then she went out but still poutting the Next day I started to Newbern with my pork when I came home she was still pouting and nothing to say hardly nor would Cook nothing to eat for about three weeks in the time two of her sisters came near night after they had been their a while one said Rachel we are hungry we have been washing and scouring to day and had not the chance of geting dinner and comeing here and we want you and Mr. HEATH to come to dinner with us at Christmas she sot still said nothing till I grew uneasy and thought they would think hard of me I spoke and told them they knew where the provision was cook and eat they were welcome they did so nothing said what was the matter the day before Christmas she appear'd to get in a good humour and cookt for the family Chrismas morning she wanted to go to her Mothers I went with her but she took to pouting again and Refus'd Ever to go back this was on friday on sunday morning I went over to her mothers she and her mother had gone out her mother lived in about three quarters of a mile of this negroes masters but when she came in she was pouting and and would not speak to me she took the child and suckled it it went to sleep she laid it on the bed I took it up and went and agreed with a woman to take Care of it she would not follow her Child it was not five months old on monday one of her sisters had borrowed a mare of me to go to a Quarterly meeting which she promised to return that morning as soon as it Could be got home but I waited till I knew the Creature Could have come long before I took a nother and went after it met Rachel and Timothy her brother and Daniel POOL with a Cart Comeing to move her to her mother but had not my Creature I still went on after it they turn'd and went back and when I went home she went with me but to very little satisfaction she would be often telling me of dublin the Next hogs I killd I was salting my meat she came in with some harslets in her hands threw them in the tray where I was salting I asked her what she was going to do with them she said salt them to

eat why says I here is some of the Neighbours would be fond of a fresh mess and you know I never eats no liver at all of any kind and Gideon dont care much about it well says she I like it mightily well said I if you want it you are welcome to it some time after she cookt some back bones and turnips and a Chunk of that liver I was not at the house when dinner was eaten when I Came in I ask'd for dinner it appeared there was nothing but that she stuck a fork in and lifted it up and says here is a mighty pretty piece of liver I sav'd a purpose for your dinner says I is there nothing else she said no well then go and get me something else for I wont eat that why you old son of a bitch says she I will let you know you shall eat any thing that I please to give you and shant open your mouth I wont eat it says I you may keep that for dublin when he comes to see you why you godalmighty god damnd hellfire old son of a bitch I will let you know I will give dublin what I please and you shant say a word you godalmighty god damd hellfire old son of a bitch I will let you know I will do as I have a mind to with dublin and you shant open your mouth you god almighty god damd hellfire old son of a bitch I will let you know I will say and do Just as I please with dublin and you dare not open your mouth I rose up and thought I would stamp her I took her by the shoulders but a check took place and I only give her a shake and went out while passion abated I came in askt her if she was not ashamed of her self he says she that is nothing many a woman have said as much as that to her husband and it was thought nothing of she would often tell me that the white men on the other side of the river thought no less of her for the negroes keeping of her did I think my self better than they one time I had got William WATSON and his negro man to work with me a day she said over night She would stew some meat and potatoes for brakefast I left a negro boy to assist her betwixt twelve and one Oclock the boy came and told us to go to brakefast when we come set down I saw nothing but some broiled beef and hard hoe Cakes I ask'd for a potatoe she said there was none I ask'd how so O you ought to get Gim BRIGHTS dublin to come and do for me Rachel if I say nothing about dublin do you hold your peace but she kept on and before I had eat my meal she went of and said there she would not live but in the Evening she came back a nother time the Child was sick with the flux very Early in the morning I was going to Kinston I got my horse she met me at the door and askt me if I did not want to shave if I did she would get me some water I told her no sadled my horse and went of ther had not been a word of anger with us I got some medicine for the Child and came home when I came she had took her Cloaths and the sick child and ran a way I Could not find them that day I spent the night in trouble the next morning I giot two men to help me to search for her we come a Cross her on the other side of the rive and after a small Conversation with her she stript her head dropt on her knees put up her hands and prayed to god almighty that my Land might be barren to the end of Eternity but turnd back and went home but to no satisfaction to me she often teased me to give her a Clearance and let her go she said to her mothers for there she would not stay a nother time she ran away one night and was gone four days and two men came home with with her and on the 17th of january last was twelve months ago she ran away again without one word of anger between us or any of the family and I am informed she told it her self but that she never intended to live there a nother day and she has never returnd since but once and then did not stay two hours left a small child and had no more and left that when she run away the discourse that William WATSON and his Wife and Nancy WATSON swore to about Milly ARNOLD she is a woman that has had three Children by a negro Rachel said that Milly was a smart woman and that she was thought no less of for having Milattoe Children for she said people said Neal WATSON kept her I made answer and said that was no reason I should ah says she you have had one Child by me after the Negroes and no thanks to you now you have got it there might be more said but I hohe there is Enough though she has told me often times that interrupting her about the negro would be her death and that I did not pity her she said and that is not all

Benjamin Venters Murdered

Tarboro Press, Sat., May 21, 1836

[Taken from the New Bern Spectator]..."A few days ago, a negro was committed to the jail of this county, charged with the murder of his master, Mr. Benjamin VENTERS, late farmer on Swift Creek. Mr. VEN-TERS, it appears, had been at a log-rolling on the previous evening, accompanied by family. He had returned home before them, and when they arrived next morning they found him dead, lying in the fireplace, shockingly burned. Nearly one half of his head had been consumed. An inquest was convened, and without examination, the jury came to the conclusion that he had come to his death by having fallen into the fire. Suspicion first rested on the prisoner in consequence of his having denied being at home during the time that intervened between the return of his master and that of his family, as he had been seen on the premises during that time by a white man who was passing the house. This gave rise to inquiry, and two negroes strengthened the suspicions by asserting that the prisoner had formerly made an attempt to poison his master, and having failed to execute his wicked design, he had sworn that "he would yet he his death." This, they said, he had told them himself. When this information was given, the neighbors passed into Pitt county, where Mr. VENTERS had been buried a few days before, had him disinterred, and a new inquest convened; when it was found that his skull had been split, and his collar bone broken, apparently by blows with an axe. An axe had previously been found near the house in which the deceased lay, which was stained with blood."

Jesse King Left Pitt County in 1918

Found in the Daily Reflector, Sept. 14, 1950. Contributed by Roger Kammerer.

"The North effected a reconciliation with the South this week when a former Greenville Negro returned here for a few days visit with relatives before going back to New York and his "temporary" home. Though a prodigal for 32 years, Jesse KING, grandson of Moses KING, who was for a time a Negro policeman on the Greenville force during the middle 1890s, spent a few days here reminicing over familiar sites of his childhood and with friends he had known before leaving for work in the north. KING now resides at Fort Washington, Long Island, New York, and has been employed with one of the Brooklyn branches of the Post Office as a postal clerk. Having lived in New York since leaving the South in 1918, the 57-year-old Negro has established a home in New York but still considers Greenville and Pitt County his real "home." That fact was strongly brought out when he stated yesterday he is coming back here in three years when his retirement from the postal service can begin. As a young school boy Jesse worked in his grandfather's meat market, the first of its kind to be operated in town by a Negro. Located in the first block on Fifth Street east of Five Points, he delivered parcels of meat to his granddad's customers during the afternoons. After finishing his schooling here he went away, never to return for any length of time. Prior to going to work with the government, Jesse worked at odd jobs in Rocky Mount and in New York City. Now he has a wife and two children, both of whom are married and have children. When his retirement begins in 1953, he oplans to bring his family down here to live permanently. It will be hard to leave his friends and associates in the north, particularly those friendships he has formed in the church of which he is a trustee and deacon. "But, after all, a person can't forget his raising," he says.

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

That your Petitioner served in North Carolina line and for his Service obtained a Warrant No 381 for two hundred & twenty eight acres of Land. That some time following the issuing of said Warrant, he sold & transfered the same to a certain David ADAMS of Craven County, and received in part payment a Certain tract of Land in said County. That the said ADAMS afterwards removed out to the Westrn Country some time in the Year 1798. And it has been represented to me that the said David ADAMS is deceased leaving his Widow Winifred ADAMS, Administratrix on his Estate. It is farther represented to me that the said ADAMS in his life time lost said Warrant & transference crossing Neuce River. The Widow of said ADAMS having made application to me on the subject, & being willing that all possible justice should be done her in the transactions aforementioned. The Prayer of your Petitioner is, that the Secretary be directed to issue a duplicate Warrant in my name to the end that, I may again transfer my right of the same for the benefit of the Widow of the said ADAMS And yr Petitioners will Pray &c David ADAMS NB. Cooper House Burned, 1951

"Winterville, April 10— The old COOPER House, located on the H. H. WORTHINGTON farm, about a mile from Winterville, was destroyed by fire yesterday, it was learned this morning. The fire which was of unknown origin swept the entire two-story frame building and very little of the furnishings of the WILLIAMS' family, occupants of the house, was saved. The Winterville fire department responded to a call for aid but was unable to render any assistance, it was reported."

"My Dear Frank; July 27—1915

Your letter came to-day, tho' not in time to reply by to-day's mail—I'm sorry that my stock of information is so limited; but I know that my (our) Grandfather, John HODGES, was the Son of James & Charity JUDKINS HODGES; was born during the yr. 1792; was married in 1814 to Sallie, daugher of Harry and Millie GRIFFIN PERRY; Grand father died June 1880. in the 88th year of his age—Grand mother Jan. 6. 1881 in 83 yr. To them were born 9 children; 8 sons, Harry, Frank P., John Gray, Edwin Gorham, Noah Benjamin, Robert T., James Redding (who died when a youth) James Wilson and one daughter, Mary Louisa——Grandfather had two Brothers, and two sisters Simon & James, both younger than himself. They were all born 8 miles north of Washington, Baufort County, N. C. Grand father, as you know, was born, lived & died on the same farm—was a large land owner and a large slave owner— He & his wife were members of the Primitive Baptist ch. & were good, honest, intelligent people.

The oldest son, Harry HODGES, married twice, 1st to Marcella KEEL her Father's name was Sam of Pitt County, 2nd to Malinda ASKEW of Martin County— The 2nd Son (my Father) Francis P. married Miriam W. ROBINSON, daughter of Benjamin & Sallie WALLACE ROBINSON of Carteret Co. N. C. To them were born 11 children, four sons and seven daughters, 3 of each are living. John Gray HODGES married Mary Etta STANCELL daughter of Henry & Margaret STANCELL of Pitt County—had 8 or nine children, one only, living —— Edwin Gorham HODGES married Olivia EWELL Parents, Jesse & Eliza of Martin County, left 9 children 4 are living, (one of them John Walter HODGES having died during last month in Jax. Fla.) I guess. Noah Benjamin HODGES married Marth LATHAM daughter of Alfred & Lucinda HARDISON LATHAM of Beaufort County, died during the Civil War, leaving 5 children. Robert T. HODGES married Ann Eliza LATHAM daughter of Dempsey & Marina GRIFFIN LATHAM of Beaufort County left three children, one son & 2 daughters. James Wilson HODGES was twice married; 1st to Mary BROWN, daughter of Richard & Nancy BROWN of near Greenville, Pitt Co.—2nd to Amanda STANCELL daughter of Henry & Margaret STANCELL left 6 children 3 sons & 3 daughters. Mary Louisa HODGES (only daughter of John & Sallie HODGES) was married in 1853 to John WARD of Martin County, N. C. To them were born 7 children 3 of whom 2 sons & 1 daughter are now living-Richard HODGES, Brother of John HODGES was cousin Hetty GORHAM'S Father but I don't know who he married; perhaps you know. He lived where cousin Church G. died—left one child who married Mr. Edwin GORHAM, & left 5 children 4 sons & 1 daughter—2 are living—

James HODGES, Brother of John HODGES married Jenny HODGE, of Beaufort Co. and left 4 children 1 son & 3 daughters—

Frank, I don't know whether you can make anything of this rigamyrole or not— I have neen told that Grandfather H's grand father came from Virginia don't know who told me or if it was true—but this is as far back as I can go-

I have often wished I had asked him about his people. I surely would like to have known, & probably, he would like to have told me—but you know he was a very reserved man, & think I was always afraid of him—and yet, tho he seemed very stern to us children, I know he was a very harmless man. In his stern, reserved way I know he was kind to all around him—'Am going to get me a Type writer for if I don't, no one will be able to decipher my scribbling after a while—Crops are good—"am making a nice lot of Butter—Much love for all, from us

It was 20 minutes after I read the clipping in your last letter before I saw the significance of the location of the mistletoe on the preachers coat."

Son of L. A. Mayo Accidently Shot

Eastern Reflector, Greenville, NC, Tues., Oct. 30, 1900

"A few days ago Mr. L. A. MAYO, who lives about three miles from town, went over in Greene county to attend some business. As his wife and children would be left alone while he was away, he took a pistol out of a bureau drawer where he kept it locked up and put it in his wife's dressing case, telling her she could use it if used during his absense. Later their 8 year old son, Willie, found the pistol in the dresser and took it out to play with. The little fellow had the pistol by the barrel and amused himself by pulling the trigger and seeing the hammer rise. He pulled it too far and the weapon was discharged, the ball passing through the boy's knee and grazing the arm of his baby brother sitting near by. Willie is getting along with his wound as well as could be expected. It is fortunate that the accident was no worse."

His grandfather, John HARRINGTON, was a Pitt County native and was a farmer and a Democrat. Shade's father, Henry HARRINGTON was born near Ayden, NC and was educated in a private school. He served in the Civil War, worked as a farmer and also was a skilled carpenter and blacksmith. He was a staunch Democrat and served on the local school board. In his later years he quit work and moved to Ayden. His wife, Nancy JACKSON HARRINGTON, was also born near Ayden and was educated in a private school. She was a member of the Free Will Baptist Church. Henry and Nancy had six children: Lorena, who died in infancy; Macy E., widow of Lawrence STOCKS of Ayden; William Henry, who is deceased; Fannie, widow of Elias MCLAWHORN of Ayden; Shade Edgar; and Walter L. HARRINGTON of Ayden. Shade Edgar HARRINGTON was educated in the public school system and was reared on the farm. He started farming for himself early and eventually purchased the old family homestead of 75 acres near Ayden and another tract of 18 acres. He later sold this land and in 1936 bought a 123 acre farm near Grifton, NC, where he carried on general farming, maintained a gas station and operated a bonded winery. He is a member of the Free Will Baptist Church and loves to hunt and fish. Shade was married to Miss Mamie BUCK, b. near Grimesland, NC on May 18, 1881, a daughter of James BUCK and __ Ayden. James BUCK was born near Grimesland, Pitt Co., was a farmer, a Democrat and a member of the Primitive Baptist Church. Mrs. BUCK was a native of Pitt Co. and was educated in a private school. Her grandfather was Thomas MOORE, a native of England, who came to Pitt County and took up farming. Shade and Mamie HARRINGTON had ten children: Mitchell, who is deceased; Lloyd, of Baltimore, Md.; Margaret, who is deceased; Walter Glenn, living at home; Mack; of Vanceboro, NC; Allie; living at home; Edwin; living in Pitt Co.; Mary Frances, a student of Guilford College; and Elsie and Geraldine, both living at home.



Joseph Warren Parker

Joseph Warren PARKER, a retired farmer living in Farmville, Pitt Co., was born in Pitt County on May 30, 1859 and died July 3, 1939, the son of George Washington PARKER and Mary Elizabeth KING. George Washington PARKER was born in Pitt County on Jan. 24, 1821 and died on May 16, 1874. He was a planter until the Civil War. He served as 2nd Lt. of Company D, 44th NC Regiment and later as Captain of infantry. He suffered a wound which caused him the loss of his leg and he was discharged from service. George was married first on Jan. 2, 1844 to Mary Elizabeth KING, born in Pitt County Feb. 24, 1826 and died June 30, 1863. George Washington and Mary Elizabeth PARKER had ten children: Allen Francis, b. Aug. 6, 1845, d. Aug. 11, 1847; John Thomas, b. Dec. 29, 1847, d. July 11, 1925; Samuel James, b. Feb. 12, 1850, d. Apr. 23, 1914; William Robert, b. July 27, 1852, d. Mar. 9, 1906; George W., b. July 29, 1855, d. Mar. 19, 1931; Joseph Warren, the subject; Charles E., b. Nov. 22, 1861, d. May 3, 1863; Mary Amelia, b. Apr. 28, 1863, d. Oct. 18, 1937, was the wife of John Robert NEWTON. George Washington PARKER and had: Margaret E., b. Aug. 16, 1868, the wife of Watt PARKER of Farmville, NC and Zadock, b. Mar. 4, 1871 and is now deceased. Joseph Warren PARKER was educated in the public schools and went into farming and merchandising. He served on the Farmville Board of Alderman, was a Democrat and a member and steward in the Methodist Church. Joseph Warren PARKER married first on Jan. 8, 1884 to Mrs. Victoria SUGG, b. Aug. 16, 1846 and died May 18, 1901. They had one daughter, Mary Vivian PARKER, b. Jan. 8, 1885, d. Mar. 22, 1929, wife of John Thomas HARRIS. Joseph Warren PARKER married second on Apr. 28, 1903 to Alice Harvey HARPER, b. in Snow Hill, NC on Nov. 11, 1884, daughter of Jesse Francis HARPER and Nancy Joe SUGG. Jesse Francis HARPER was born at Snow Hill, NC on

Nov. 11, 1846 and died Oct. 20, 1927. He was a merchant and planter. He served in the Civil War as a member of Company F, 40th NC Infantry Regiment. He was a Democrat and he and his wife were both members of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Nancy Joe SUGG was born in Greene Co., NC on May 25, 1850 and is living in Snow Hill, NC at the advanced age of 90. Jesse Francis and Nancy Joe HARPER had ten children: Lena Elizabeth, b. Jan. 5, 1871 and died June 5, 1871; Emma Cornelia, b. Apr. 13, 1872, wife of M. H. POTTER of Snow Hill; Mary Etta, b. Apr. 13, 1874, d. Oct. 22, 1934, wife of J. Edward SUGG; Mary Virginia, b. May 6, 1876, d. Oct. 11, 1878; Jesse Francis, b. Jan. 14, 1879, d. May 22, 1879; Charles H., b. June 26, 1880, md. Margaret HOLMES and lives in Snow Hill; Lemuel Thomas, b. Jan. 28, 1883, d. Mar. 6, 1883; Alice Harvey, wife of the subject; Edward Johnston, b. Aug. 19, 1887, md. Catherine SUGG and lives in Snow Hill; and Jesse Francis HARPER, b. May 19, 1893, md. Laura COBB and lives in Snow Hill. Jesse Francis HARPER served in WWI. Mrs. Alice Harvey HARPER PARKER was educated in the public schools and at St. Mary's College in Raleigh, NC. She is active in Eastern Star and White Shrine. She was State Historian in the U. D. C. and was a member of the D. A. R. She was also a member of the Farmville Literary Club, the Merry Matrons Club and the Methodist Church. Joseph Warren PARKER and Alice H. HARPER had four children: Vira Lee, b. Feb. 28, 1904, d. July 22, 1904; an infant, b and d. Feb. 22, 1910; Joseph Warren, Jr., b. Oct. 12, 1911, d. Nov. 20, 1911; and Alice Harper, b. Jan. 4, 1925.



Hon. J. Loyd Horton

J. Loyd HORTON was born Feb. 3, 1894 in Farmville, Pitt Co., the second child of Moses Tyson HORTON and Dora ASKEW. His paternal grandfather, McDonald HORTON, was a native of Martin Co., NC. McDonald was a farmer in Martin and Pitt Counties and served in the Civil War. Judge HORTON'S maternal grandfather was Wen ASKEW, a Pitt County native and farmer. Wen ASKEW married Victoria SUGG, a Greene County native and daughter of Josiah SUGG. Moses Tyson HORTON, was born and reared on a farm in Pitt County and received a public school education. He was a merchant in Farmville, NC for many years and was a member of the Primitive Baptist Church. Moses died on June 1, 1909 and his widow still lives in Farmville. Of their five children, four survive. J Loyd HORTON attended the public schools of Farmville, NC. He spent two years at UNC Chapel Hill and later graduated in 1914 with a Batchelor of Laws Degree from Washington and Lee University at Lexington, Va. He immediately set up a law practice in Farmville, NC and at the age of 21 was elected Pitt County Solicitor. After three years, Horton then served as District Solicitor for another two years. He returned to private practice for a time and then was elected Judge of of the Fifth Judicial District, serving until March 23, 1925. He then resigned and moved to Raleigh, NC were he connected himself with the law firm of W. B. Jones & Son in the Lawyers Building. The firm then became Jones, Jones and Horton and is a very successful law practice. Horton is a member of the North Carolina Bar Association and the American Bar Association. William Walter DUNN, born June 15, 1832, was educated at Lovejoy Academy in Raleigh, NC. He lived in Texas from Jan. 1854 to Nov. 1857. [Abstract] Hall County Georgia] Questions to John MOORE asked by the Judges of the Inferior Court

John MOORE says he was born in Pitt County, NC in 1759. He never had any record of his birth, but was told his birthdate by his parents. He lived in NC when called into service, then lived for 1 year in SC and then lived ever since in Georgia. When he entered service first, he was a volunteer and then he enlisted for six months, then served as drafted Militia. He received a discharge from Col. THARSTON, but lost it.

"Georgia Hall County} Personally appeared before me the undersigned a Justice of the Peace in and for Said County John MOORE who being duly sworn deposeth and Saith that by render of old age and the consequent loss of memory he cannot Swear positively as to the precise length of his Service but according to the best of his recollection he Served not less than the period mentioned below and in the following grades. For the year 1776 I Served one month under Capt. HUDSON and at the end of that tour I enlisted in the regular army under Jeremiah MCCLAIN and Served one tour of duty of three months in the militia I think under Capt N GRIST? and was attached to Colo ARMSTRONGS Regiment during all of which time I was a private Soldier and with an embodied Corps Called into Service by competent authority and was in the Garrison at Wilmington North Carolina and that during the time Said Service was performed I was not employed in any civil pursuits. I Know of no person whose testimony I can procure who can testify to my Service and for Such Service I claim a pension. John (his mark) MOORE Sworn to and Subscribed before me this 14th day of May 1833

[Abstract] Forsythe County Ga.} April 10, 1844

Mary MOORE appeared before George WILLINGHAM, Justice of Forsythe Co. and turned over a piece of paper, being a bible record cut out of the bible, showing her marriage date with John MOORE, in the handwriting of William DANIEL.

WEBSTER Esqr. in September 1847 that said transcript was drawn by her brother Moren MOORE from the one furnished said attorney last September by the request of her parents during their life time as the orrigonal record had become dim & mutilated from age and usage and that said transcript was taken from the family bibles of her parents left in her possession by her mother Mary MOORE deceased and deponant further states that if the foregoing transcript does not sattisfy the Comr. of Pensions as to the marriage of her Parents she Knows of no living witness to prove said marriage by and can only refer the Comr. of Pensions to the proof furnished here by her Mother Mary MOORE in her Declaration made out in 1844 and forwarded and handed to the Comr. of Pensions by her grand son William M. WAITS in April 1844 and she further states that she does not know how long the enclosed transcript was transcribed by her brother before the death of her father John MOORE but believes it was done a number of years before that period Nancy WAITES Sworn to and subscribed before me this the 18th. day of March 1848 Bartin Lovless J. Peace"

STOCKS told me his grand father was named Amos STOCKS and had 8 brothers and one was named Isaac which went away but he did know where he went he had 4 sister which one was my great grand Mother one of the brothers was named Asa he gave my father a negro man which I can recollect I am 67 years old my father was born in 1812 which would make it about the right time you say your great-great grandfather went to Ga of being one of the 9 Brothers he further says he has heard there was another Isaac STOCKS an older man than these 9 Bros that came from Scotland and owned Lots of land but he does not know if he was the father of these 9 Bros or not I think the one named Isaac that went away must have been your greatgreat grandfather was he married when he came to Ga and he tell me he has heard that several of his grand fathers Bros was in the Re<u>veln</u>ary war I can recollect one named Cannon STOCKS that drawed a pension has been dead about 25 years he was about or nearly 100 years old when he died I do not know what war he was in whether rev<u>el</u>ution or 1812 the first time I go to Greenville I will look over the transfers of land and divisions of land and the record of marriges and see if I can find out any information also there is and old lady that lives about 8 miles that Claude BURNEY told me might know about the Stocks family I will write you again any information I can get I will gladly let you know the reason I did not write sooner was hoping I might be able to give you something more definite But I believe we are kin and by the Stocks family so write me again yours very truly Jesse CANNON PS what county do you live in and how old are you"

Benjamin Joyner's Lost Mare

Newbern Herald, New Bern, NC, Feb. 2, 1809

"Strayed or Stolen- From the Subscriber on the 24th of January, near Beaufort, Carteret County, a Black Mare, inclined to be roan near the flanks, with a number of saddle spots, her tail has been cut, and drags her hind feet considerable, 5 feet and perhaps an inch high, 7 years old, very long legged and is with foal, as forward as the 1st of May. As she is my riding beast I presume she is well known among the Baptists, where I have travelled, and I wish them and all my friends to watch for her, and if found to send her to me in Pitt County. If she is stolen, I will give 25 dollars reward, if strayed I will pay all reasonable charges. Benjamin JOYNER"

T. A. Vinson, Counterfeiter

New Bern Daily Times, New Bern, NC, Jan. 5, 1869

"A man named T. A. VINSON, from Pitt county, was detected and arrested yesterday morning for attempting to pass a bill at Patterson's, that he had changed from a five to a fifty dollar note. The figures he used he had cut out of three 50 cent pieces of scrip which were found on his person, and the work was miserably done, only a part of the figures being covered. He was taken before Mr. LEHMAN, who put him under \$200 bail to await his trial before Superior Court, which not obtaining, he was put in jail. A man who would attempt to pass such miserably manufactored stuff, should be sent to a lunatic asylum, rather than a prison. A person that was half witted, would have known better than to have tried it."

Shooting at Ballards'

Daily Reflector, Greenville, NC, Mar. 7, 1910

"Dr. J. H. HUDSON Seriously Wounds Mr. Jed ELKS.

News came by telephone this morning, that Dr. J. H. HUDSON, a physician who has been located at Ballard's X Roads the past year, had shot Mr. Jed ELKS, a merchant there. While particulars are meagre, the report says five shots were fired by HUDSON and that ELKS was seriously wounded. It was further stated that the two men had been out with each other for some time, and that as HUDSON was on the eve of moving elsewhere they got together this morning to settle the matter.

After the shooting Dr. HUDSON drove to Farmville to surrender himself to officers, and from there telephoned to Sheriff TUCKER. He stated that Mr. ELKS fired the first shot.

Dr. E. A. MOYE, who went out to examine Mr. ELKS, says he was struck by only one ball, which entered the back just above the hip and lodged under the skin in the side. The ball was easily removed and it is thought he will soon recover from the injury.

Policeman G. A. CLARK, of Farmville, reached Greenville about 2 o'clock with Dr. HUDSON, and turned him over to the sheriff."



"DECLARATION was made in Union County Georgia April 1855, on the 24th by John Cook age 81 on the 10th December last, stating he is the son of THOMAS COOK AND ELIZABETH his wife both deceased; that his father Thomas Cook was a private soldier in the North Carolina in the Revolution; that Thomas and his mother Elizabeth were married October 29, 1772 in PITT COUNTY NORTH CAROLINA by justice of the peace named Bryan; that his mother's name before marriage was Elizabeth BOWEN; that this deponent was their first born child; that when he was a child he recollects his father start off with his gun and they told him that his father was going to the war; and he was gone a good while and recollects his coming home. That his said father Thomas COOK died in Buncombe Co North Carolina. November 23, 1831. leaving this deponent's mother Elizabeth COOK his widow, and remained his widow until her death in said Buncombe Co NC. February — 1837, leaving Obed. COOK and this deponent John COOK, her only surviving children.

"The leaf of records filed on the first page were made in hand writing of Edmond ANDREWS, a friend of the family, and on the 2nd page, the record of his brother Obed is in the hand writing of a surveyor who come to this father to survey land when this affiant was a little boy. That the record of his brother Rheuben is in affiant's own hand writing. [follows the Bible records given above] ...

"John COOK made another affidavit 1854 in Union Co Ga and Wm TEAGUE and Joseph KILPATRICK witnessed his signature."

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

"State of North carolina Edgcomb County This may Certify that Dempsey STOKES of Said county Personally Came before me Benjamin MOORE one of the Justices of the Peace in and for Said county and made oath that David DRAKE in and for Said county and made oath that David DRAKE of Said county was Balleted in the nine months Service in the revellution ary war under the command of Col Jonas JOHNSTON who was the commanding Col of Said County at that time and that Said David DRAKE hired a man to the best of his recollection by the name of Henry STOKES who then lived in Pitt County and that he went of under Capt Griss CAPEL of Edgcomb county and the Said Henry STOKES went and Served the time and returned home and was taken Sick in a short tim and died the above Surtifficat was Sworn to and SubScribed before me this 4 day of Septembr 1824 Benja. MOORE JP Demsey STOKES"

"State of North Carolina

To the Honble General Assembly of the said State

The petition of David DRAKE now a resident of Caswell County, but formerly of the County of Edgecomb Shews to your Honorable body, that during the Revolutionary war he was Called into the Service in the Said State, for a tour of duty of nine months under the Command of Colo. Jonas JOHNSON: that he hired as a Substitute a man by the name of Henry STOKES, for which the petitioner paid him 125 pds. that said STOKES served the full term of time & returned home & shortly there after died, never having received from the State any part of his wages. The petitioner further shows, that by the agreement between STOKES & this af, he the petitioner was entitled to the pay which right be given by the State, but that he never has recd any part of it, nor has the said STOKES, or any body claiming under him, & that the same still remains due from the State, as will appear by reference to the Muster Rolls of the State in the office of Secretary of State. The petitioner states that the reason why he has not sooner applied for his claim, is, that he did not know until lately of what plan, he aught properly to apply in order to obtain the money. He prays that you would adopt a resolution directing the Treasurer to pay him the aforesaid Sum due for the services aforesaid and for which he has paid the said STOKES as will appear by an affidavit attached to this petition. David DRAKE" [GRANTED]

Ferd Barnhill, Aged Colored Man, Dies at Home Here Daily Reflector, Tues., Aug. 27, 1935

Ferd BARNHILL, about 70 years of age, on of the best known colored men of this city, died at his home here last night. Although funeral arrangements had not been completed today, it was said that final rites would be held tomorrow afternoon. "Uncle Ferd," as he was known to hundreds of the older residents of the city, years ago constituted a "one man" street department here. He looked after street cleaning for a number of years and in 1915 when the new post office building was erected here became employed by the government. He was retired at the age of 65 on pension, and since that time has been engaged in various lines of business. Ferd was always interested in fire-fighting, and was one of the organizers of the "Rough and Ready" colored fire department here. He appeared before the Board of Aldermen on a number of occasions in recent years to ask for funds for his company, and because of his loyalty to the community, usually got what he asked. He was one of the prime forces behind the building of the Sycamore Hill Baptist Church. Ferd had always exerted a great influence in the religious life of his race and was one of the mainstays of the denomination. He was interested in the cause of the education of members of his race and used his influence in all movements looking to increasing the advantages of the colored race. He was also said to have been prominently identified with the fraternal life of the city and will be buried with honors of one of the local lodges, it was reported today. One of the highest type representatives of his race, because of his loyalty and service, the death of this aged and humble colored man was received with sorrow by both white and colored people.

EASON or COBB; volunteered in Pitt Co., N. C., 1 Nov. 1812, for she supposed 6 months; continued in service 6 months; honorably discharged at Newbern, N. C., 1 Dec. 1812; she married John POPE, in Pitt Co., N. C. 10 Jan. 1785; married by J. P. FORBES; her name before marriage was Sallie TEELE; husband died in Muscogee Co., Ga., on 10 Aug. 1834; she did not know whether there was a public record of her marriage but knew of no private record; she appointed Marion BETHUNE, Talbot Co., Ga., her attorney. She signed by mark, attested by A. Cee TEELE and James S. W. ALLEN, Talbot Co., Ga. Leonard P. BREEDLOVE, J. P., and William BACON, J. P., certified 18 Oct. 1855. The Third Auditor of the Treasury certified on 9 Oct. 1856, that the name of John POPE was not on the rolls of Capt. George EASON'S N. C. Militia, July 1813 nor Sept. or Oct. 1814."

"Report of the Chairman of the board of Superintendents of Common Schools for the County of Pitt for the annual year ending the 1st of October 1848.

In Consequence of the School Committees not having returned to me the number of Children between the ages of 5 & 21 years and the number that has been taught in each district to us required by Act of Assembly I am unable to make such return as the law requires- I have recd. a part-but as I was unable to return the whole- I will make these general remarks- we have 31 School districts in the County- & the average of the districts- between 5 & 21 years - is about 80- There is a school house in each district & in several there are two, the most of them have had Schools from 3 to 4 months-during the past year-Having no blank return in proper form I hope the present will Suffice- I shall endeavour to Stimulate the School Committees hereafter- to a more vigilant discharge of their duty.

Mrs. George Adams Loses Three Children

Charlotte Daily Observer, Charlotte, NC, June 1, 1912

Greenville, N. C., May 31— Special news reached here of a distressing occurence just across the Pitt line in Craven county, in which three children of George ADAMS lost their lives. His wife was doing some washing in yard while the children, the eldest 8 and the youngest 1- year- old played nearby. Noises were heard from a nest occupied by a setting hen, when Mrs. ADAMS told the eldest boy to go throw the fowl off the nest. The boy went and without looking, put his hand into the nest to catch the hen. He quickly withdrew it crying that she had pecked him. The second boy volunteered to throw off the hen, but soon screamed that he had been pecked also. The mother rushed to the nest and found a rattlesnake in it, and to her horror, saw that the snake had bitten both the boys. In her anxiety to do something for the older boys, the 1- year- old child was forgotten for the time being, and when she returned for it, found that it had climbed over in the tub of water and was drowned. The two boys that had been bitten by the rattlesnake died the same day, and all three children were buried together in the same grave.

Mrs. W. H. Mizelle Mysteriously Poisoned

Eastern Reflector, Fri., Sept. 14, 1900

Mrs. W. H. MIZELLE, formerly Miss Pennie BULLOCK, of Oakley, died mysteriously on last Thursday, and was quietly buried Friday morning. Her body was exhumed Saturday and the Coroner held a post mortem examination. It is supposed from circumstantial evidence that she was poisoned by her husband. The jury brought in a verdict that the deceased came to her death by causes unknown to them, but ordered that her stomach and liver be sent to the State chemist for a chemical examination to see whether or not she was poisoned. Mr. MIZELLE had been to Dr. WARREN and questioned him previously as to whether or not she had consumption, and Dr. WARREN told him that she never had any of the symptoms of that disease. Mr. MIZELLE insisted that she did have consumption and that he was afraid to stay with her, as he feared she had it and was liable to drop dead any time. She had been apparently well up to Thursday. It is said Mr. MIZELLE had been mistreating his wife for several months and on last Wednesday went to Washington to get her some medicine. Thursday morning Mrs. MIZELLE had a hard chill and her gave her some medicine and went off and left her. When he returned later she was dead and wanting to bury her soon as possible he had her buried Friday morning. Mr. MIZELLE left Saturday morning for Ocracoke on a pleasure trip, knowing that his wife's body would be taken up for an examination. The woman's stomach has been sent to Raleigh to the State Chemist.

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

"The Comittee of Propositions and Grievances to whom was refered the petition of Richard JORDAN of Pitt County praying for assistance, having considered the subject, respectfully–Report That the Petitioner alledges, that he served in the Militiua during the revolutionary War, and performed several tours of duty, to wit the first tour of five months service, under Capt. CANNON, to the State of Georgia when he assisted at the battle of Brier creek, he having been drafted for that purpose, secondly a tour to Charleston as a substitute, and two others of short duration—The Petitioners five months tour, is attested by the affidavit of Joseph THIGPEN and is believed in his neighborhood that he did perform the other service as stated- Your Comittee is satisfied that the Petitioner is old-that he has lost the sight of one of his eyes since the War and is afflicted with the palsy, which disables him to gain a support from labour, and from irregular habits in his early days it would appear he has failed to provide for old age-Although your Comittee have no reason to disbelieve the Petitioners statement as to his service supported by the exparte affidavit of THIGPEN, yet they doubt the propriety of granting assistance in application of the kind except upon the strongest testimony, & that given in the most solemn manner according to some selected rule, to act upon any other principle, would as your Comittee conceive, not be justifiable—they therefore recomend the adoption of accompaning resolution Resolved that the prayer of the Petitioner be not allowed"

Sailing to Texas

Arrived Safe (Wilmington Journal Weekly, Wilmington, NC, Fri., Jan. 24, 1851)

"The Brig Calendar, from this port, for Galveston, Texas, is announced as having arrived there on the 30th ult. The Calendar left Wilmington last month, with some eighty persons, consisting of planters and their families and servants, chiefly from Sampson, Duplin, and New Hanover counties, who went to settle in Texas."

Texas Immigration (*Tarboro Southerner*, Tarboro, NC, Sat., February 5, 1853)

"On last Sunday week, a large body of very respectable citizens, left Rocky Mount for Texas. The company consisted of 127 persons, white and black, under the protection of Mr. Chas. Holy Bible Containing The Old and New Testament Translated out of the Tongues; South Western Co., publishers and book seller, Nashville, Tenn. Contributed by Frank M. Clark. According to Frank Clark, historian for the Clark and Rodan families, he searched for many years to find a Clark or Rodan family Bible. In 1989, Frank discovered a cousin, Hazel B. Boomer Barden, owned the Rodan family Bible. She returned to her home in New York and mailed photocopies of the family listings to Frank. The Bible was originally the property of Rev. A. J. Rodan of Pantego, Beaufort Co., NC until his death on Nov. 26, 1898. It then was owned by his son, Abner Jerome Rodan, Jr., who died in Kinston, NC on Apr. 26, 1971. At his death the bible came into the possession of his cousin, Juanita Speller Steinbergen Atkins. After her death on April 16, 1990 in New York City, the bible went to her cousin, Hazel B. Boomer Barden of Mt. Vernon, NY. After Hazel died on Nov. 12, 2001 in Newburgh, NY, the bible became the property of her daughter, Beverly Rose Barden Johns. In the year 2002, the bible became the property of Hazel Barden's neice, Hazel P. McCloud Phillips of District Heights, MD. These dates appear to be taken from an earlier record or bible.

Personally appeared before me David STONE Esqr. one of the Judges of the Superior Courts of Law and Equity in and for the State aforesaid, at Newbern in the County and State aforesaid on this 25th of October 1808. Mary HARPER being duly sworn deposeth and saith that she is the widow of Abraham HARPER deceased, and that Samuel HARPER the son of this Deponant and of her aforesaid husband is detained in custody of and abridged of his liberty by Lieutenant Wm. JOHNSTON Junr of the United States Army, under the pretence of being a regularly enlisted soldier in the company now under the command of the said Lieutenant, whereas this Deponant doth on her oath declare that her son the aforesaid Samuel hath been unlawfully enlisted and is now unlawfully detained in confinement in as much as the said Samuel is under the age of twenty one years and will not complete the said age until the twentieth day of next March, and his said enlistment and detention have been and now are against the Consent of this Deponant his sole surviving parent.-
