

STANLY COUNTY.

Brief History by A. C. Huneycutt Esq. of the Albemarle Bar.

Stanly County although rapidly becoming one of the wealthiest and most progressive counties in North Carolina, is not as old as her sister counties roundabout. Stanly was created by the General Assembly of 1841, and named in honor of Honorable John Stanly. From 1749 to 1841 it was a part of Montgomery. Up to the year 1749 the territory now embraced in Stanly was a part of Anson County, according to Foot's Sketches of North Carolina History, and was largely settled by Dutch, Germans and Scotch-Irish. When Montgomery County was created, Stanly being a part, a place named Tindalsville seems to have been the first county seat. This county seat was located on the Yadkin River just at the landing at what is now Lowder's Ferry on the Stanly side. We are indebted to the private diary of Dr. Kron for this information. This French physician, who by the way, was French teacher at the State University in 1824, came to America and settled at Henderson, Montgomery County in 1823, according to his diary, Henderson then being the county seat. About two years later he purchased a tract of land on the Stanly side of the Yadkin and moved there, it being on the public road one mile west of Lowder's Ferry. There he was living in 1835, when on the 25th day of November of that year he recorded that portion of his log-book containing a bit of interesting history for the sake of which we quote. It reads as follows: "Nov. 25th. Cloudy in the morning. Fair and very cold at night. Begin my great tour today fitted out as for a siberian campaign, cloak and leggins. From my house to the river we count a mile. The road runs on a ridge, expires not far from the landing; in wet weather is miry enough. There is the place of an old meeting house (Stony Hill), on reaching the top of the ridge, afterwards only one plantation with dwelling house is to be found between me and the ferry. It is the former seat of Montgomery Court house where life and property were formerly deliberated on. The Yadkin is seen winding from N. E. to S. E. and the roaring of the Great Falls is distinctly heard and the whole neighborhood in fact; the east displays itself too, in a pleasing landscape. At the landing are the frames of those houses which twenty years ago (1815) formed the bulk of Tindacelle, a town which then promised itself great things from the contemplated improvement of the navigation of the Pee Dee River, for this is the name of the Yadkin assumes after its junction with the Uharrie and which name it carries to the sea. The river here is very nice, could be forded at places (at low water). It is a solid rock in which slate and quartz are visible; here and there huge fragments stand above the common water mark, and in general the bed is very uneven and rocky. On the east side of the Uharrie flows in at almost right angles. On either side the landing is bad, the ground being soft and sandy, and rather steep. For ten cents the ferryman sets you across and tells you funny stories on his neighbors. On the east side of the Pee Dee is another abandoned town, Henderson, equally for once the seat of Montgomery Court house; now the sole property of the heirs of one McArthur and my wife's uncle Henry De Lamonthé. From Henderson I direct my course towards Lawrenceville, the present county seat. The road passes through a poor, broken country, intersected by several creeks. Island Creek is the first; it has been honored with a bridge. Not far from it I reach Blackely, also an abandoned county seat for Montgomery. It appears that this court house was first built under a migrating star, its fate will be a wonder C.

Thus it will be seen that Montgomery County while Stanly was a part had four county seats, Tindalsville, Blackely, Henderson and Lawrenceville, and if according to Dr. Kron Blackely was wonder C. Lawrenceville can now be added as "Wonder D"

What the population of Stanly was when cut off from Montgomery in 1841, and what its total property value was at that time we can't say as there are no records at hand from which we can secure that information, however, we would say from general knowledge of conditions that possibly two or three thousand people composed Stanly during its first days. In 1841 when the General Assembly of North Carolina carved out Stanly in her present form, Albemarle was unborn. The place where this now thriving little city of near 8,000 people stands was then the productive farm of Mr. Eben Hearne, father of our townsman, Mr. S. H. Hearne, and over the spot

where the public square now is, that prosperous Stanly planter's slaves cultivated corn and cotton as they sang their negro melodies in that careless semi-monotone so characteristic of the anti-bellum negro slave. There was immediately erected a large two story, wooden court house. . . . Eben Hearne was the first Sheriff, he having been the sheriff of Montgomery when Stanly was cut off. The old court house stood on the spot now known as the public square with streets laid off on all sides. Soon a number of new homes were built and gradually but surely Albemarle came into being, having been bequeathed the name after the Duke of Albemarle one of the Lords Proprietors. Stanly sent something over 500 troops to fight for the Southern Confederacy during the civil war, and no Stanly citizen has cause to be ashamed of the record made by them on the various battle fields. At Gettysburg there was at least one Stanly soldier who crossed the stone wall in Pickett's famous charge and engaged in hand to hand combat with the foe, returning alive. At Bentonville when Hoke's troops turned General Sherman's forces in their wild raid, for the first time after Sherman destroyed Atlanta, more than 100 Stanly soldiers bravely bore the brunt of the hottest of the battle, and the first lieutenant of company H of 42 Reg., himself a Stanly man, with only 18 men all from Stanly, captured upwards of an entire company of Federals. We could take up numerous instances of the valor of Stanly soldiers in this great struggle, but space will not permit. In the great world war just closed Stanly gave approximately 1000 men to the cause of World Liberty and if space would permit we should like to dwell upon some of the accomplishments and deeds of valor performed by soldiers from this county.

In 1891 the first railroad was finished in Stanly, The Yadkin Railroad from Salisbury to Norwood. This cost the county one hundred thousand dollars. This amount was voted in bonds. The election was held on the Sept. 15th, 1889 and the records of the election returns show that the vote stood for bonds 1264 and against bonds 235. A dispute arose over the legality of the bonds issued and after a long suit finally ending in the supreme court of the United States it was decided that the county would have to pay the amount of one hundred thousand dollars. Our people then thought one hundred thousand dollars a big amount and many said the county was unable to pay, but we now consider this a small amount when compared with the great amounts raised by this county for War Savings Stamps, Liberty Bonds, the Red Cross and other causes, all told approximating around one and one half millions and also when we think of the fact that for the year 1918 the sheriff will collect in clean cash more than \$100,000. tax money for one year only.

When the Yadkin railroad was finished in 1891 Albemarle had a population of less than 400 people. Then the entire value of all taxable property in Stanly County was less than one million dollars. In 1900, after two or three cotton mills had been built the entire taxable value of all property in the county amounted to \$2,093,635. In 1918 the total taxable value of all property in the county was \$9,615,193, or more than 3 times as great as 18 years before in 1900. Is there another county in the state that can truthfully boast of such rapid progress as Stanly, and ought we not to be proud of our country? We now have more than 100 miles of railroad in our county; we have the main line of the Southern Power Company passing across from southwest to north via of Albemarle, with a branch line of towers from Albemarle to Badin furnishing all power needed for manufacturing; twelve large cotton and knitting mills and another in course of construction at this writing; we have one of the largest aluminum factories in America and numerous other growing industries which all taken together have greatly added to Stanly's prosperity. Sad to say we have not such schools as we should have. Albemarle has three excellent graded schools, Badin, Norwood, New London, Oakboro and Albemarle have fine educational advantages by reason of good, well managed, long term schools with possibly two or three other special tax district schools, but outside of these our schools are 30 years behind. Besides our public schools Albemarle and all Stanly ought to proudly boast of being the home of The Albemarle Normal, founded a score of years ago by Misses F. E. Ufford and H. J. Northrop. This is a school for girls and is and should be so considered one of our greatest possessions. Let us say in passing that Stanly must wake up to the all important fact that she needs and must have better schools, otherwise all other progress will, in a way, be in vain. Another great drawback to this county are our roads. How long shall Stanly County continue to neglect the building of better roads? We stand in great need of a bridge across the Yadkin with a good highway crossing the county to it so as to put us in touch with our neighbor county Montgomery. This is a necessity. We also ought to bridge the Rocky where the Wadesboro-Albemarle road crosses it. Shall we continue to live shut in from our adjoining neighbors in an uncivilized manner? Stanly is finding herself. She is beginning to rub her sleep eyes and look about. She is beginning to realize that she has possibilities undreamed of a few years ago. And when she gets thoroughly awake she will cloth herself in purple and fine linen and become the leader. throughout North Carolina, in wealth, population, education, industry and progress.

STANLY LADS KILLED IN ACTION

Alfred H. Hartsell, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Adam Hartsell, was born at Locust, N. C., February 28th, 1896.

Enlisted at Concord, N. C., in Company L., June 1916.

Killed in action in France, October 8th, 1918. Age 21 years, 8 months and 10 days.

Good bye dear brave lad,
Who answered his Country's call,
And who gave and was only glad
To give his BEST, his very ALL.

Clyde Ingram, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. F. H. Ingram. Born July 29th, 1894. Killed in action in France October 10th, 1918. Was in the famous "Old Hickory" or 30th Division.

Clyde was a good boy and was loved by all who knew him. Was a constant attendant of Y. M. C. A. and other religious services while in camp. He gave his ALL for Victory and Liberty of humanity, and we have no doubt that he won a GLORIOUS VICTORY for himself.

We miss you our dear boy—
And we prayed for your return again,
But wherein is our loss and sorrow
We know is Heaven's eternal gain.

Wade Hampton Miller was the first Stanly County soldier to be killed in the World War. He was instantly killed by a bullet which went through his head on July 15th, 1918, and is buried at about six miles north of Chalons, at the Chalons-Suippes-La Chappe-Vadenay Crossroads. After death he was cited for extraordinary bravery in action, and awarded the Croix de Guerre with Palm. He was a son of Thomas L. Miller and Mary Austin, born November 5th, 1895. He volunteered for immediate service on July 15th, 1917, and was killed in action on the first day of the battle on the Vesle and Aisne.

Walter B. Hill was killed near Verdun at 10:30 on the morning of Nov. 11th, 1918, a half-hour before the war ceased. No particulars have ever been received. He was of Co. H, 321st Infantry, 81st division. He was the son of Mr. Peter Hill, of Albemarle, and the son shared with the father in the love and respect of the community.

OUR SOLDIER LADS WHO DIED IN CAMP

James Herndon Ratterree was born in Cleveland County May 26, 1897. Graduated at Piedmont High School, Business Course in 1915. Bookkeeper for Stanly Auto Co., Albemarle 1915-18. Manager of Piedmont Motor Co., Salisbury, 1918.

He was a high toned Christian young man, member of the Presbyterian Church.

Too young to register, volunteered for service in the Coast Artillery, turned down there, he waited patiently until called to Camp Jackson. August 28th, transferred to Camp Sevier, where he died of Influenza and Pneumonia, October 2nd, 1918.

Here ended a noble young life, the first one to die who went from Stanly County.

Lawrence M. Smith, born September 19, 1895. Went to Camp Jackson October 6, 1917, remained there two weeks, was transferred to Co. A. 120 Inf., Camp Sevier, where he died in Base Hospital January 28th, 1918.

His remains was laid to rest in the cemetery near the home of his parents Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Smith, and a beautiful and costly monument now marks his resting place.

As a young man, Lawrence was active and industrious. While in Camp, he manifested a brave spirit, and was anxious to be sent "over there."

We, his loved ones, have reason to believe that he has met the Great God of battle in everlasting peace.

Reece W. Smith, born August 1st, 1893. Went to Camp Greenleaf, July 6th, 1918. Remained there about six weeks, then was transferred to Medical Corps at Camp McClelen where he died in Base Hospital October 13th, 1918.

In early life Reece was bright and attractive. In camp he was faithful and obedient to his Commanders.

Our Great Commander has called him higher, and we believe he was ready to obey the call.

His body was laid to rest by the side of his soldier brother, and we trust these two brothers, with the multitude of others that have fallen on the battlefields, have joined the Great Army described in Revelations 7: 9:: 17.

QUINCY ADAM MORTON was born Oct. 5, 1887. Died in Aberdeen hospital, Maryland Md. Oct. 16, 1918. Left home for Camp Jackson June 25, 1918. Was a member of Silver Springs Baptist Church, Stanly County.
