

Women's History Hall of Fame had its beginning in March 2000. Thereasea C. Elder, a charter member of the Charlotte Club of The National Association of Negro Business and Professional Women's Clubs, Incorporated, expressed a desire to have a Women's History Hall of Fame to honor women during National Women's History Month. This Hall of Fame would include women who are trail blazers; women whose contributions significantly impact the community; and those who exemplify life-long service of dedication to improve the quality of life for humanity.

Thereasea C. Elder presented her ideas to the Charlotte Club of The National Association of Negro Business and Professional Women's Clubs, Inc. and to Levine Museum of the New South. Both organizations embraced her ideas and a partnership was formed. This is our sixteenth annual induction ceremony honoring outstanding women during National Women's History Month.

Today, the Charlotte Club of The National Association of Negro Business and Professional Women's Clubs, Inc. in partnership with Levine Museum of the New South will induct four women into the Women's History Hall of Fame. The nominees are Carolyn Flowers, Judge Shirley Fulton, The Honorable Vi Lyles and The Honorable Joyce Waddell. These women work untiringly in the community making outstanding contributions on local, state and national levels. They are role models for others to emulate. It is with esteem pleasure that these women are nominated for induction into the Women's History Hall of Fame 2015.

Carolyn A. Flowers



Ms. Flowers is currently Senior Advisor to the Administrator of the Federal Transit Administration, having been appointed in January 2015 by U.S. Transportation Secretary and former Charlotte Mayor Anthony Foxx.

Before moving to Washington, Carolyn Flowers served as CEO and Director of Public Transportation for the Charlotte Area Transit System, a position where she was responsible for leading bus and rail service in Charlotte/Mecklenburg.

Ms. Flowers has held financial positions in both the public and private sectors. She was the CEO for the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (MTA) and the Executive Officer of Operations Administration with responsibility for administrative and budget oversight for all transit operations. She was budget director for the City of Beverly Hills, a financial manager at Wang Laboratories, and a financial analyst and budget officer at Rockwell International Automotive Operations.

She has been a member of the National Forum of Black Public Employees, American Society of Public Administrators, Women Transportation Seminar, Women's Transportation Coalition and Conference of Minority Transportation Officials.

In 2007, she received recognition as the Tom Bradley Alumnus of the Year by the UCLA Black Alumni Association. This award was named after the first African-American Mayor of Los Angeles, who championed an expanded transportation vision for Los Angeles County. In 2008, she was named as the Woman of the Year, by the Los Angeles Chapter of the Women's Transportation Seminar. She also received the Ambassador award for her volunteer work with the American Stroke Association and was given a special recognition award by the Greater Los Angeles African-American Chamber of Commerce. In 2010, she was selected by the UCLA Anderson School of Management as one of the 100 most inspirational graduates in its 75 year history for her work in transit. In 2011, she was selected by the Charlotte Business Journal as one of their top 25 Outstanding Business Women to receive their Women in Business Achievement Awards.

Her involvement in the Charlotte community included being on the Board of Visitors for Johnson C. Smith University and a member of the advisory board for the Women's Intercultural Exchange.

Ms. Flowers has a B.A. degree from UCLA in History and Political Science and a MBA from the UCLA Anderson School of Management.

The Honorable Shirley Fulton



Shirley L. Fulton is perhaps the most recognizable figure in Mecklenburg County, having spent over 20 years in the court as Senior Resident Superior Court Judge, Resident Superior Court Judge, District Court Judge, and Assistant District Attorney. In 2006, Judge Fulton was recognized by "Super Lawyers" magazine, as a Char otte Super Lawyer, a distinction earned by only 5% of the practicing lawyers in a given state or region.

A community leader widely admired for her ability to build bridges between hostile groups, Judge Fulton led the revitalization of Wesley

Heights community, an inner city neighborhood; served on the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools Task Force; chaired the board of trustees for the Charlotte School of Law; served as a member of North Carolina Board of Law Examiners, Vice-President of the North Carolina Bar Association and as President of the Mecklenburg County Bar. She is a graduate of North Carolina A & T State University, Duke University School of Law, and the McColl School of Business at Queens University.

Shirley continues her lifelong commitment to active leadership in community-based programs through her work with the Charlotte School of Law and Law and Community Foundation and as the owner of The Wadsworth House, a meeting place for corporate, civic and community leaders, weddings, receptions, social gatherings events and all special events.

In 2010, Judge Fulton was honored with the NC Governor's Order of the Long Leaf Pine and is featured in AT&T's 2015 Heritage Calendar Celebrating the NC African American Experience. She also received the N.C. Supreme Court Justice Professionalism Award in January 2015.

The Honorable Vi Lyles



Vi Lyles is an At-Large representative on the Charlotte City Council. She was elected in 2013 and is serving her first term on Council. Lyles worked for the City of Charlotte for almost 30 years, starting off as an analyst in the City's budget department before becoming budget director. She was Assistant City Manager for the City from 1996 to 2004. During her time with the City, she helped create the City's first capital budget and led the restructuring of government programs to evaluate and assess performance audits for City programs. She also led and presented the Community Safety Plan and helped develop the City's affordable housing plan and

Mecklenburg County's Minority and Women's Business Enterprise Program for small businesses. She worked with the Charlotte Housing Authority's Moving Forward initiative, the Committee of 21 transportation initiative, the Charlotte-Mecklenburg African American Agenda and the Achieve Together community-based advocacy education initiative.

After retiring from the City, Lyles joined the Lee Institute and Flynn Heath Holt Leadership as a consulting director, assisting non-for-profit governmental organizations in strategic planning and project implementation. She also provided consulting services, leadership development for rising executives and reviews of work processes leading to mergers and efficiencies for nonprofit organizations. She served as the startup director for the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Coalition for Housing, working with a citizen's advisory group to revitalize the local government plan to prevent and end homelessness. In 2012, she served as the director of community outreach for the 2012 Democratic National Convention.

Lyles served as the project manager for the Foundation for the Carolinas' initiative to conduct research supporting the creation of a local rental subsidy endowment for families and veterans. Currently, she owns and operates Vi Lyles Consulting, a firm that builds a platform for government and nonprofit organizations to move toward successful programs, policies and procedures through strategic engagement and planning. In 2009, the Southern Piedmont Chapter of the National Forum for Black Public Administrators created the "Viola 'Vi' Lyles Young Public Administrator Award," which recognizes energy, commitment and drive for excellence in work and community service.

She has a bachelor of arts in political science from Queens University and a master of public administration from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. She is a trained facilitator and executive coach, completing programs at the Institute of Government, North Carolina State University and the Lee Institute's American Leadership Forum.

The Honorable Joyce Waddell



Joyce Davis Waddell is a graduate of South Carolina State University with a B. S. degree. She holds a M. S. degree from A& T State University; a M. A. degree from Appalachian State University and a PhD degree from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro.

Dr. Waddell worked in the Charlotte-Mecklenburg School System for over 21 years and is retired. Her service in the school system included media specialist, classroom teacher, counselor, staff development coordinator, principal and curriculum supervisor.

A stalwart in the Charlotte community and beyond, Dr. Waddell gives of her time and resources to worthy causes and organizations. She is a volunteer in several areas, including past and present: the Women's Commission; Chairperson of the Housing Appeals Board, City of Charlotte; Life Member, South Carolina State University Alumni Association; Member, Democratic Women, Mecklenburg County; Ten Year Volunteer for Hospice Care; the Florence Crittenton Home Board; Solid Waste Board; Spirit Square Community Advisory Board; Nursing Home Advisory Board and Reorganization Chair of the NAACP, Charlotte Branch.

Several other organizations are beneficiaries of Dr. Waddell's skills, resources and services including: Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Rho Psi Omega Chapter; the Black Political Caucus of Charlotte-Mecklenburg; National Council of Negro Women, life member; State Executive Committee of the Democratic Party; African American Caucus and Board Member, College Downs Community. She is a member of Friendship Missionary Baptist Church.

In 2009, Dr. Waddell was elected to the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Board of Education, District 3, in a highly competitive race with seven candidates seeking the position. She was elected again in 2013 with no opposition. Seeking to expand her political experiences, Dr. Waddell ran for North Carolina State Senator of District 40 in 2014. This race, too, was highly competitive with five candidates seeking the position. She won with 42 percent of the votes cast in the primary and no opponent in the general election. The winning of elections is a testament to Dr. Waddell's commitment and vision to make a difference. While serving on the Board of Education, Dr. Waddell was a frequent advocate for the less fortunate and sought to bring about positive changes. Her voice has been a staple in the Charlotte community for many years.

She spent many wonderful years with her late husband, the noted educator Dr. E.E. Waddell, in whose honor the Charlotte Mecklenburg Language Academy is named.


