OBITUARY

Lillie Freeman Rodgers is the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Freeman of Chatham County. She was born December 30, 1911, and departed this life December 3, 1982. A faithful and devoted servant of God now rests in peace in His care.

Zion Church with her loving husband and became a devoted and dedicated church member involving herself with any activities with which she could be helpful — not caring what the role was — just wanting to help. Over a faithful and long membership she has served as a class leader, member of the missionary, directress of children's department, served on the usher board, recreation department, publicity committee member, senior choir member, director of youth choir, Sunday School teacher, and many more too numerous to mention.
