OUR FORTIETH YEAR 1936-1976

The past few years of the life of Brevard Music Center have been years of challenge, activity and fulfillment. The face of the Center is gradually changing, and new educational services and projections are evolving. But the present is a mirror of the past at Brevard, for the history of the Center is one of constant challenge and growth.

The Center was born in 1936, the idea having been conceived seven years earlier by Dr. James Christian Pfohl, who inaugurated the plan for a summer music camp while he was Director of Music at Davidson College. At the outset, Transylvania Music Camp was known as the Davidson College Music Camp for Boys, and was held on the campus of the North Carolina college. During World War II, the camp became co-educational and was operated for a time on the campus of Queens College in Charlotte, N. C.

The present site was selected after the war, and the Transylvania Music Camp evolved as a business enterprise controlled by a corporation of four men. Later it became a nonprofit educational institution under the guidance of a Board of Trustees, and was chartered by the State of North Carolina. Thus. Brevard Music Center came into existence.

Forty years of continuous promotion of the artist and constant encouragement and guidance of artistic talent give Brevard Music Center cause to look with some satisfaction at its history. Thousands of young musicians have received an indispensable part of their training at the Center, and hundreds of thousands have enjoyed the concerts and operas presented in the Festival series. Each year new programs are instituted at Brevard Music Center, and larger, more enthusiastic audiences enjoy the Center's offerings.

Brevard Music Center is fulfilling a basic need, the human need for artists to express themselves, and the equally important need for those who appreciate the arts to be uplifted by the inspired performances of these artists.

Henry Janiec, a conductor and educator, has been artistic director of the Brevard Music Center since December of 1964. As a performer he has served as principal conductor of the Brevard Music Center Orchestra and the Opera Workshop with occasional "guest" appearances with the other organizations of the Center.

A native of New Jersey, trained at the Oberlin Conservatory, Janiec has been on the faculty of the School of Music at Converse College since 1952, and since 1967 has served as Dean of the School of Music. In the past few years he has also administered the Theatre and Visual Arts programs at Converse.

As a conductor, Janiec has served as principal conductor or musical director of the Spartanburg Symphony Orchestra, the Spartanburg City Schools Orchestra, the Spartanburg Little Theater, the Converse College Opera Workshop and Chamber Orchestra, the Charlotte Symphony, and the Charlotte Opera Association. For eight years he was principal opera conductor at the famed Chautauqua Institution, and for three years conducted the Chautauqua Student Symphony in national broadcasts.

He has had wide experience as a pianist and accompanist, and has appeared on many occasions as a performer, commentator, and writer on radio and television. His work as a clinician, speaker, and teacher has found him in demand throughout the country. He was regular commentator on the national radio series, Music From Brevard, and has performed many times on Voice of America and Radio Free Europe.

Janiec is a member of Pi Kappa Lambda, and is a national patron of Delta Omicron. After a three-year term on the South Carolina Arts Commission, he now serves as chairman of the Commission's Music Advisory Panel and as a member of the S. C. Arts Foundation. In 1969 he received an honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters from Wofford College, and in 1971 he received a Presidential Citation from the National Federation of Music Clubs. He is also a member of the American Arts Education State Committee in South Carolina, program director of the Music Foundation of Spartanburg, and serves on several Bicentennial committees.

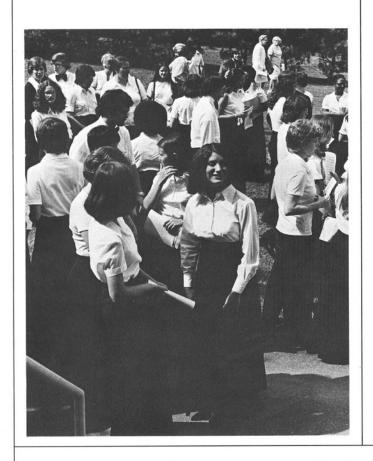

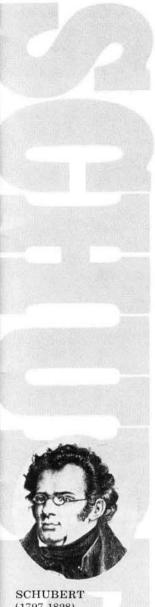

Creator of some of the most beautiful lieder ever written, expressing every shade of poetic meaning. His works for piano include sonatas, impromptus, fantasies, and duets which are virtuoso concert pieces. Of his symphonies, the two-movement "Unfinished" is probably the most popular, but his ninth is considered the greatest of the series. Schubert also composed many chamber works for various instruments. and seven masses, the most original known as the "German Mass.

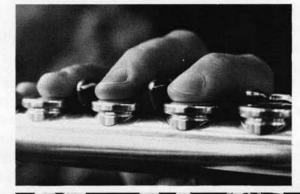

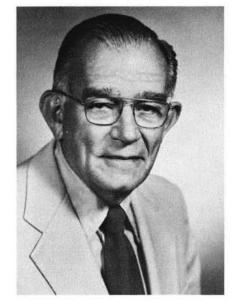


TO OUR FRIENDS AND PATRONS

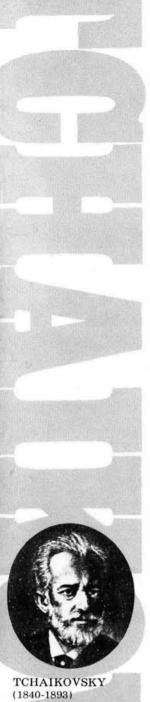

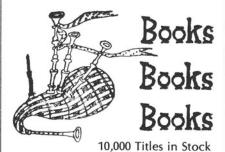

IVES (1874-1954)

As a boy, he was taught "to stand up and receive dissonance like a man." As a composer, he was far ahead of his time. He experimented extensively with "outrageous" polytonality. His first major composition, the "Third Symphony" completed in 1904, was not performed until 1946, at which time it won the Pulitzer Prize. He incorporated folk and other native tunes in his music. Bernstein called him the "Washington, Lincoln, and Jefferson of Music."

His natural form of expression stems from Romanticism. His wide appeal has made him perhaps the most frequently performed American composer. Eloquently lyrical are his songs, his "Essays for Orchestra," the "Adagio for Strings," and the virtuosic piano sonata. In his "Capricorn Concerto" for chamber ensemble, he ventured into a more modern idiom. Included in this period are some of his best works, notably "Knoxville: Summer of 1915." He composed two operas — "Vanessa" and "Anthony and Cleopatra."







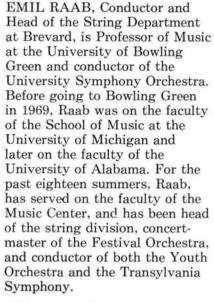


CONDUCTORS DIRECTORS & SOLOISTS

JOHN RICHARDS McCRAE has been producer-director of the Brevard Opera Workshop and Director of Academic Activities at the Music Center since 1965. A native of South Carolina. McCrae received his training at the University of South Carolina, the Institute of Musical Art, and Julliard Graduate School in New York. During his singing career, he appeared with many national orchestras, in various opera companies, and concertized in all of the states. Since 1952, he has been Professor of Voice and founding director of the Opera Workshop at Converse College's School of Music. He has been General Director of the Charlotte



Opera Company and head of the performing arts division of South Carolina Tricentenial Commission, and guest director for many other companies.









WILLIAM NOLL returns to the Music Center for the third year. Once again he will be in charge of the Repertory Orchestra, coconductor of the Chorus, and do some coaching in the Opera Workshop. A fine pianist and conductor, he came to this region at the invitation of Robert Shaw and the Atlanta Symphony where he made a significant mark as a choral specialist. More recently he has formed his own William Noll Chorale and next season will be heading a new opera company in Atlanta. His critical acclaim indicates a major career for this talented young man.



MARIO MANCINELLI returns to conduct the Youth Orchestra of the Center and to teach and play violin after a one-year absence. Trained at Ohio State, he did post-graduate study at Peabody College and the University of Illinois, with additional work under Wilfred Pelletier and Bernard Goodman. Presently Professor of violin and Director of the orchestra at Illinois Wesleyan University, he is a member of the faculty trio and performs in the Peoria and Springfield orchestras.

ROBERT BARR, Director of Bands, attended the Cincinnati Conservatory, University of Georgia, Auburn University, and East Central Oklahoma State College. Barr has had wide performing experience with the famous Armco Band under Frank Simon, the Indianapolis Symphony, and Cincinnati Summer Opera. He is past president of the Georgia Bandmasters Association, the Georgia Music Educators Association, and Past National Vice President of the National Bandmasters Fraternity. Barr is a member of the faculty and administrative staff of the School of Music at Converse College and was recently chosen one of the nation's ten outstanding educational music directors by the "School Musician" magazine.



(1911-Attended New England Conservatory and later taught composition at Boston University. Of Armenian descent, he developed an individual and exotic style of composition based on Armenian melodic and rhythmic patterns, which includes music for orchestra, strings and chamber groups. He has also composed church music and incidental music for film and ballet.

WARD WOODBURY, from Rollins College in Florida, returns as Director of Choral Activities and Conductor at the Music Center. His formal musical training was done at Western State College of Colorado and the Eastman School of Music. Dr. Woodbury has wide experience as a conductor of choral, operatic. and symphonic music, and is active in numerous regional and national professional organizations. In addition to his duties at Rollins College, he is also Conductor of the famed Bach Festival of Winter Park, Florida.

JAMIE HAFNER joined the faculty of the Music Center in 1971 as tubist, a position he still occupies. A native of Brunswick, Georgia, he did his undergraduate and graduate work at the University of Cincinnati. Following a stint with the West Point Band, he directed bands in his hometown and is presently on the faculty of the University of Toledo where he also directs the band. Mr. Hafner will be conductor of the Wind Ensemble this year and will continue as principal tubist with the Music Center Orchestra.









JAMES MENDENHALL first came to Brevard as a counselor in 1969 while he was a student at the University of Missouri-Columbia. A fine bassoonist, he has been with the Music Center Orchestra since that time and has assumed other duties as resident counselor for men at the Center. Following his studies, he joined the faculty of Brandon University in Manitoba, Canada where he has been active as a performer, director of various Collegia, and currently as conductor of the Provincial Workshop Band. Mr. Mendenhall will conduct the Concert Band this season and will continue as bassoonist with the Music Center Orchestra.

RUGGIERO RICCI has been acclaimed for more than four decades as one of the giants of the concert stage. His fantastic technique and superb musicianship have always astounded critics and audiences. His most recent recitals of music from 19th century virtuosos have brought raves in Europe and America. Mr. Ricci is playing a benefit at Brevard this year in honor of his friend and colleague Benno Rabinoff in whose memory a special endowed scholarship has been established at the Center. Many young violinists will be aided in the future through the generosity of Mr. Ricci and will be living memorials to our dear friend Benno Rabinoff.

JAMES HAWTHORNE joins the artist-faculty of the Center for the first time after a fantastically busy career as a singer and actor. He appeared on Broadway in five different productions, in over 30 leading roles in major summer and provincial theatres, on such television shows as Omnibus and Voice of Firestone, and with opera companies such as Sadlers Wells and New York City Opera. Add to this a busy concert career with great orchestras and a number of directorial stints in opera and theatre, and Brevard welcomes a versatile, experienced artist who will appear both in our productions and as a director.

JANICE JANIEC has appeared in concert and opera at Brevard a number of times. Her leading roles in "My Fair Lady", "Sound of Music" and "Music Man" are particularly memorable. Her singing career encompasses theater, oratorio, recital work, and appearances with orchestras. She is a Lecturer in Vocal Pedagogy at Converse College at the present time.

JOAN YARBROUGH and ROBERT COWAN return to Brevard for the eighth year as performers and teachers. As a young husband and wife piano team, they have attracted international attention for their virtuosity and artistry. Their studies have included training at some of the greatest institutions in the world and with noted teachers. Their performances have inspired a number of fine composers to write compositions specifically for them.















GARY TOWLEN appeared at Brevard some years ago as a guest artist and joins us this year as a soloist and member of the artist-faculty. A native of New York, he graduated from Columbia and Juilliard and immediately began a concertizing career which took him on seven European tours and won for him a number of important prizes and recognitions. In recent years, Mr. Towlen has been an affiliate artist in Wisconsin and more recently Musician-in-residence in North Carolina under a grant by the North Carolina Arts Council. He is particularly noted for his knowledge and extraordinary presentations of American music. He is a virtuoso performer in every sense of the term.

PERRY DANIELS, a Brevard alumnus, returns for his eleventh season on the faculty of the Music Center. Daniels has had wide experience in oratorio and concert, and sang with the Amato Opera Theatre in New York and the Civic Opera Association in Dubuque, Iowa. He has studied and taught at a number of institutions and holds a Doctorate in Musical Arts from the University of Michigan. Daniels is presently on the faculty of the School of Music at Converse College.

EDWARD VITO is a special favorite of Brevard audiences. Presently on the faculty of the University of Miami and solo harpist with the Miami Philharmonic, he was for many years associated with NBC and the great Arturo Toscanini. His many appearances, recordings, and honors bear witness to his being one of the world's premier harpists.



DELLO JOIO (1913-A distinguished American composer with many awards bestowed upon him, including the Pulitzer Prize for music. Studied with the noted composer Hindemith, Adapted antique forms of music to modern techniques and idioms as in his well known "Ricercare" for piano and orchestra. Composed music for various instruments with full or chamber orchestras and sonatas. nocturnes and preludes for piano.

GIANNA ROLANDI, an alumna of whom Brevard is justifiably proud, made her debut at the New York City Opera this past year to great critical acclaim. She returns to Brevard after singing the summer season at Central City. Now under professional management, she is increasingly in demand by opera companies around the country. Her many awards, grants, and scholarships speak well for her excellent talent, training, and stage abilities. We are proud to claim her as one of ours!





WILLIAM McDONALD returns as a member of our Artist-Faculty. Young in years but an old favorite of Brevard audiences, his magnificent lyric tenor voice has been heard in numerous opera houses and concert halls in this country and abroad. He has been an affiliate artist with the Houston Opera Company and appeared in a heralded role with Beverly Sills in "Daughter of the Regiment" on ETV stations around the country. His career is indeed a bright one.

JEROME HINES has been a member of the Met since 1946 and few singers can match the number and breadth of roles which he has portrayed to international acclaim. His appearances in musical comedy, on recordings, and the media have earned him a place as one of the singing world's superstars. A talented composer and mathematician, he has had his works in both areas published or performed. His performance of music from "Boris Godounov" at Brevard recaptures some of the triumphant moments of his resounding successes in this role in Russia and America. We are honored to welcome Jerome Hines back to Brevard.





JOHN ALEXANDER returns to Brevard in answer to innumerable requests after his last triumph on our stage in 1974. An American born and trained singer, he joined the Met in 1961 after a number of years with the New York City Opera and guest appearances with many other companies. This was followed by debuts in the great opera halls of Europe, including Covent Garden and the Vienna State Opera. His appearances and recordings with Joan Sutherland and others have been acclaimed by critics everywhere. We are proud that John Alexander appeared with the Brevard Opera Workshop in the early days of its existence in "Traviata", and we welcome a marvelous singer and a good friend.

WILLIAM WALKER appears at Brevard for the first time in a much overdue engagement. A native Texan, he made his Met debut in 1962 after winning the Met Auditions and has sung an amazing range of roles with that company and many others. His appearances on Broadway, in recital, and on television on the Johnny Carson Show have made him well-known to millions. But most importantly, he is a genuine artist and a magnificent baritone who honors our list of distinguished singers presented over the years.

THE UPPER ECHELON QUARTET has been heard twice at Brevard during Pops Concert Barbershoppers nights. Formed in 1972 to play the barbershoppers in a Spartanburg production of "Music Man", the group has won various barbershop competitions and has appeared before numerous civic clubs, massed audiences, and in concert. Though each of the members is employed fulltime outside the music business, they are certainly "professional" in their singing as they will prove once again in our production of "Music Man".

GRANT JOHANNESEN made his New York debut in 1944 and has since harvested enormous critical acclaim on five continents. He has played with most if not all of the great orchestras of the world and was hailed in the Soviet Union as few pianists before or since. In addition to his busy concert career, recording dates and joint concerts with his cellist wife Zara Nelsova, he is head of the Cleveland Institute of Music. A frequent visitor to Brevard, he has proven himself to be a most congenial and favorite star to his many friends and the students of the Center.













THE AMERICAN CHAMBER BALLET has grown in just a few short seasons into one of the most popular young troupes performing in the country. Under the direction of Joel Benjamin, the fifteen dancers in the company have had nearly 100 performances this past season and have brought a new dimension to the dance scene as a chamber group devoted to the classical idiom. Though ballet is not regular fare at Brevard, we are particularly pleased to present this young group as a special during the Bicentennial year.

SHARON KAY EDGEMON appears at Brevard as a winner in 1975 of the Young Artist Competition of the National Federation of Music Clubs. Trained at the University of Oklahoma, she has also studied and coached with a long list of superb artists and teachers. Her performances have taken her throughout the United States and Europe in opera, concert, and with USO tours, and her appearances with symphony orchestras are encreasing annually. Again, the National Federation can be proud of sponsoring a rising young talent of great promise and acclaim.

THE BACH ARIA GROUP, organized by director William H. Scheide in 1946, has achieved an international reputation through concerts, recordings, radio, television, and films. The members of the Group are all world famous instrumental and vocal soloists in their own right who have joined to perform arias and duets from the cantatas of Johann Sebastian Bach, a repertoire which is not as well known as it should be. Mr. Scheide is a graduate of Princeton and Columbia and has served for many years on the faculty at Cornell. Brevard is honored to welcome this unique and prestigious group to its series.

BERNSTEIN (1918 -In 1943, was catapulted into the limelight when he substituted for another conductor. Acclaimed for his dramatic conducting style, he has appeared with outstanding success with most of the major orchestras. Has received awards for his

JEANETTE LOMBARD, perhaps known to Brevard audiences better as Jeanette Pecorello or Mrs. Talley-Schmidt, returns to the Music Center after toolong a time. After studies in Philadelphia and a debut there as Carmen, Miss Lombard studied in Europe under a Fulbright scholarship. Her fine work won her a renewal of the grant as well as operatic and lieder appearances in Italy and Germany. A versatile artist, her operatic roles are many and varied, and Brevard audiences recall her appearances in oratorio during previous festivals. Welcome back to a fine artist.

EUGENE TALLEY-SCHMIDT is a native of Rome, Georgia, a community which has given Brevard many talented musicians over the years. He made his operatic debut in San Diego while serving in the Navy. After several years of study in America, he studied and performed throughout Europe. He has done "Trovatore" more than 100 times. Returning to America, Talley-Schmidt joined the faculty at Florida State University from which base he has appeared in concert, oratorio, opera, and in recording sessions throughout the country. As is his wife, he is a familiar artist at Brevard and we welcome him back for his first full operatic role at the Center.





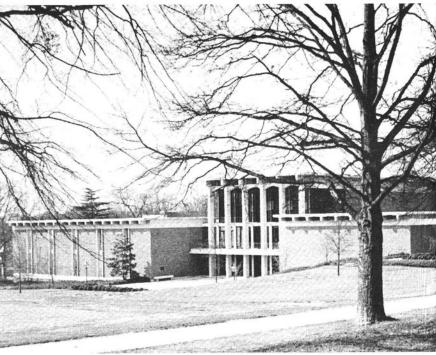

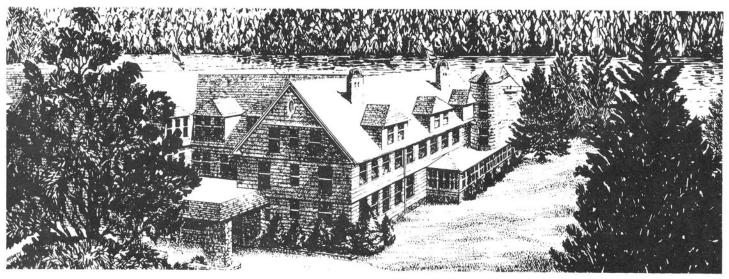
