1936 - 1983

Educational institutions often define their mission as a Search for Excellence. The Brevard Music Center began its quest forty-seven years ago.

The Center was born in 1936, the idea having been conceived seven years earlier by James Christian Pfohl, who inaugurated the plan for a summer music camp while he was Director of Music at Davidson College. At the outset, Transylvania Music Camp was known as the Davidson College Music Camp for Boys, and was held on the campus of the North Carolina college. During World

War II, the camp became coeducational and was operated for a time on the campus of Queens College in Charlotte, North Carolina.

The present site was selected after the war, and the Transylvania Music Camp evolved as a business enterprise controlled by a corporation of four men. Later it became a non-profit educational institution under the guidance of a Board of Trustees, and was chartered by the State of North Carolina. Thus, Brevard Music Center came into existence.

Like most other institutions, the Music Center has grown in many new areas, developed innovative programs and techniques, and built a constituency and a reputation. It has matured as an honored and effective instrument in the young musician's quest to "dream the impossible dream."

Over forty-five years of continuous promotion of the

artist, and constant encouragement and guidance of artistic talent give the Brevard Music Center justifiable satisfaction.

Thousands of young musicians have received an indispensable part of their training at the Center. For many other students, music has become an important part of their lives as an avocation. And hundreds of thousands have enjoyed the music-making as audiences.

The Search for Excellence cannot be compromised. There is no "passing grade of 70" in a musical performance since the other thirty percent which is incorrect will in fact make the composition quite different or even unrecognizable. The **Brevard Music Center continues** to fulfill basic needs: the need for artists to express themselves, and the need for all humanity to find fulfillment through the creation and re-creation of man's highest dreams as expressed in music.

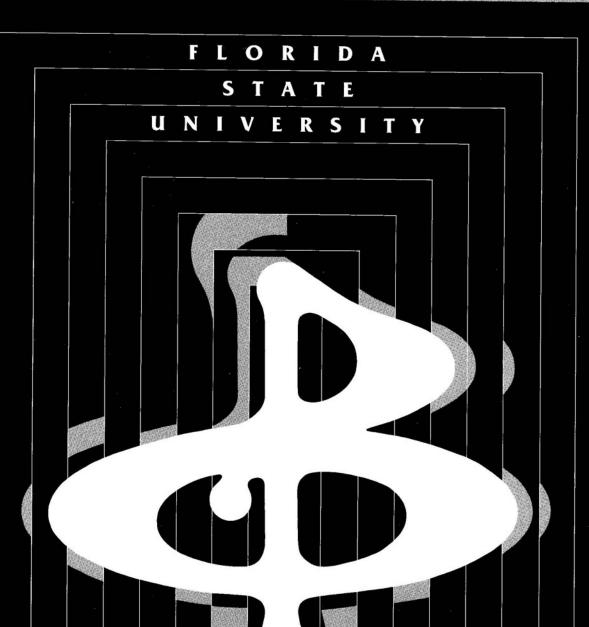

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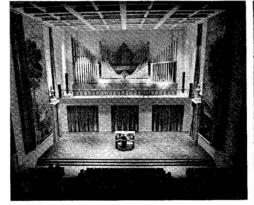

#### HENRY JANIEC, Director

Henry Janiec, Artistic Director of the Brevard Music Center since December of 1964, has served through the years as principal conductor of the Brevard Music Center Orchestra and the Opera Workshop, and has done "guest" appearances with all of the other performing groups of the Center.

In addition to his duties as Artistic Director in which he is charged with the direction of the educational and performance programs of the Center, he also serves as principal administrative officer of the institution.

A native of New Jersey and trained at the Oberlin Conservatory, Janiec joined the faculty of the School of Music at Converse College in 1952, and was appointed Dean in 1967.

Janiec has been principal conductor or music director of the Spartanburg Symphony Orchestra, the Charlotte Symphony, the Charlotte Opera Association, the Converse College Opera Workshop, and a number of community theatre groups, chamber orchestras, and school groups. For eight years he was principal opera conductor at the famed Chautauqua Institution, and for three years conducted the Chautauqua Student Symphony in national broadcasts. For two years he studied and conducted at Tanglewood.

Janiec has had wide experience as pianist, accompanist, and guest conductor. In his work with young musicians, he has conducted All-State orchestras in most of the southeastern states. He has also worked as performer, commentator, and writer on radio and television, including the national radio series Music From Brevard, Voice of America, Radio Free Europe, and other network and local shows.



Janiec is a member of Pi Kappa Lambda, national patron of Delta Omicron, life member of the National Federation of Music Clubs, and holds membership in many professional societies in music. He has served on the South Carolina Arts Commission, its Music Advisory Panel, and the South Carolina Arts Foundation. In 1969, he received the honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters from Wofford College. and in 1971 a Presidential Citation from the National Federation of Music Clubs. He has been Program Director of the Music Foundation of Spartanburg since 1967 and has been honored by many groups for his activities as a musician and teacher.

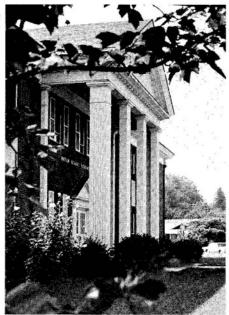

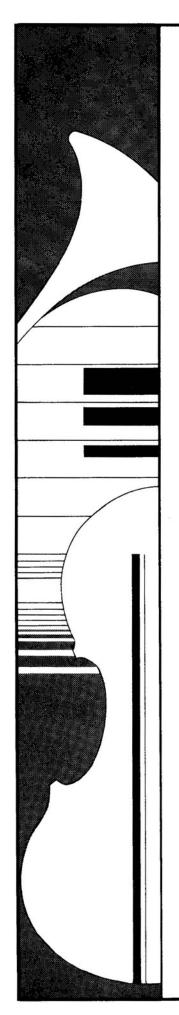

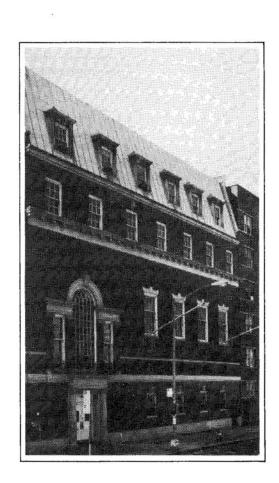

# THE REPERTORY TRAINING

PROGRAM is designed to provide playing experience in a broad segment of the traditional symphonic literature for young instrumentalists who are already in professional music through employment in an established orchestra. Its ultimate purpose is to decrease the years of

"apprenticeship" which a younger symphonic musician must serve before being qualified to join a major symphony orchestra. Conceived in the mid-1960's, the Program was partially funded for a number of years by the Martha Baird Rockefeller Fund for Music. It is presently funded entirely through the scholarship program of the Brevard Music Center.

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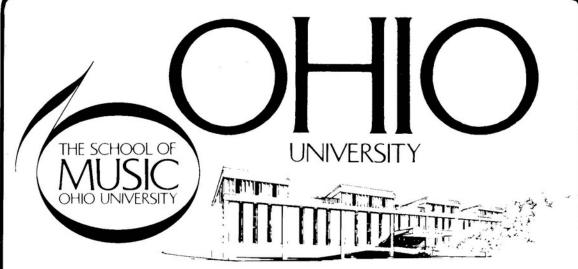
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# Composer-in-Residence Program

MARTIN MAILMAN Composer-In-Residence, 1983

Dr. Martin Mailman, head of compositional studies at North Texas State University at Denton, Texas, has been appointed to the post of Composer-in-Residence for the 1983 Season. The Brevard Music Center is honored to have Dr. Mailman, a distinguished American composer, conductor, and musician.

Dr. Mailman has published a wide variety of music, with major works for orchestra, symphonic band, opera, chorus, and solo works, in addition to television and film scores. A number of the compositions are scheduled for performance by the BMC Orchestra and other BMC performing organizations. Three lectures, open to the public without admission charge, include: "Exploring Creativity: Musical Elements"; "Exploring Creativity: Improvisation", and "Exploring Creativity: Other Cultures/Other Arts".

In 1959, Dr. Mailman was selected as a Ford Foundation Composer, participating in the prestigious Young Composers Project for three years. In addition to other numerous awards, he has received many commissions for new music. Among those was the Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia Foundation commission for a piece to celebrate the National Music Camp's 50th Anniversary.

Dr. Mailman received undergraduate and graduate degrees from the Eastman School of Music, where he studied with Howard Hanson and Wayne Barlow.

The Composer-in-Residence Program is made possible by an endowment created by Mu Phi Epsilon, a national music fraternity. The purpose of the endowment is to make available the talents of prominent American composers to BMC students and audiences. Established in 1978, the honored position has been occupied by Elie Siegmeister, Ulysses Kay, Leo Smit, Robert Ward and Wayne Barlow.

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#### THE NATIONAL FEDERATION OF MUSIC CLUBS

The Brevard Music Center is grateful to the National Federation of Music Clubs, and particularly to the states comprising the Southeastern Region, for their encouragement and tangible support through the decades. The Center has received significant scholarship funds from State Federations, local chapters and individual members, making it possible for many talented and deserving students to attend the Music Center. In addition to this important scholarship support, its members have voted to inaugurate and implement a number of special capital improvement projects for the benefit and development of BMC.

# The Gina Bachauer Artist Chair

COMMEMORATIVE MEMORIAL STAMP IN HONOR OF GINA BACHAUER

In 1981, the Postal Authority of the Government of Greece authorized a six million issue of a commemorative memorial stamp in honor of the great Greek pianist, Gina Bachauer. Stamp collectors and admirers of Mme. Bachauer have enjoyed the design and excellent presentation here reproduced.

The Brevard Music Center has hosted scores of the world's greatest artists. Many of them have left a special mark on the institution and its students through their sincere concern for the education of music's coming generations. No artist had these qualities in fuller measure than did the great Greek pianist, Gina Bachauer.

Gina Bachauer appeared at the Brevard Music Center soon after her arrival in this country and returned regularly through the years. Her performances were always inspired and consummate. Eager to perform with and for Brevard's "children," she would seek out ways to help them, counsel them, teach them. Perhaps the greatest lesson she taught, though she would have been the last person to admit it, was the true humility and generosity which must always accompany great artistry.

Soon after her sudden and untimely passing, Gina Bachauer was memorialized around the world by her many friends and admirers. One of her closest personal friends, Mrs. Carlo Renzulli, better known to many of us as "Josie," envisioned such a memorial at Brevard Music Center. Mrs. Renzulli was in fact introduced to Brevard by Gina Bachauer and her husband, Conductor Alec Sherman. It was soon decided that a particularly fitting tribute would be a program which would directly benefit "the children" of the Music Center. Thus, in 1980 the Gina Bachauer Artist Chair was established.

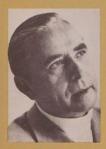
The ceremonies inaugurating the Gina Bachauer Artist Chair were held at the Music Center in July, 1980. Mr. Sherman, Mrs. Renzulli and her late husband, Carlo, and many distinguished friends and admirers participated, including the great Czech pianist, Rudolf Firkusny who, as guest artist, contributed his fee to the Bachauer Endowment Fund in memory of his friend and fellow artist.

The Gina Bachauer Artist Chair is a restricted endowment fund, the earnings of which have permitted the Music Center to invite internationally noted musicians to extend their stay at Brevard as guest artists, and conduct seminars and master classes for the enrolled students of the Center. The Music Center hopes to be able to broaden further this fruitful interchange as between distinguished artist and student. Your continuing interest and support will make it possible for us to do so.



The first artists sponsored by the Gina Bachauer Artist Chair were Charles Rex, Associate Concertmaster of the New York Philharmonic Orchestra, and his brother, Christopher Rex, Principal Cellist of the Atlanta Symphony. Theirs was followed by a residency of the New York Philharmonic Brass Quintet, and cellist Lorne Munroe; pianist Rudolf Firkusny; violinist Dylana Jenson, and flutist Julius Baker. This year, pianist Jorge Bolet and soprano Victoria de los Angeles will conduct master classes and dialogues with the students of the Music Center.

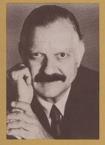

#### BMC MEMORIAL (ENDOWMENT) SCHOLARSHIP FUND

In 1981 the Trustees of Brevard Music Center established this scholarship endowment fund to more effectively memorialize or honor individuals who have had an interest or active participation in the Music Center. Many persons have chosen this fund to institute memorials to friends and family.

The earnings from the aggregate total of this endowment are used annually to award scholarship assistance to talented students. When an individual memorial endowment reaches a total principal of \$5,000 or more, or if the initial gift is \$5,000 or more, this memorial fund will be designated as a separate memorial endowment in perpetuity, identified and acknowledged accordingly.

Brevard Music Center is deeply grateful to the contributors who have established or perpetuated memorials during the past year.

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#### BREVARD MUSIC CENTER ASSOCIATION

The BMC Association, now in its fourth year, was formed to enable interested persons to support the Music Center in many new ways. While our most successful project has been the creation and continued sale of our fine "Cooking in Harmony" cookbook, we have a number of other projects now underway.

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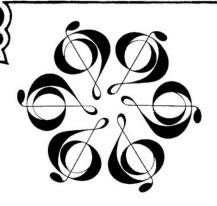
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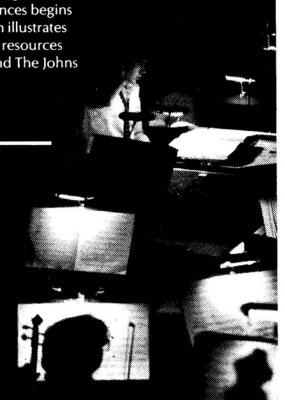
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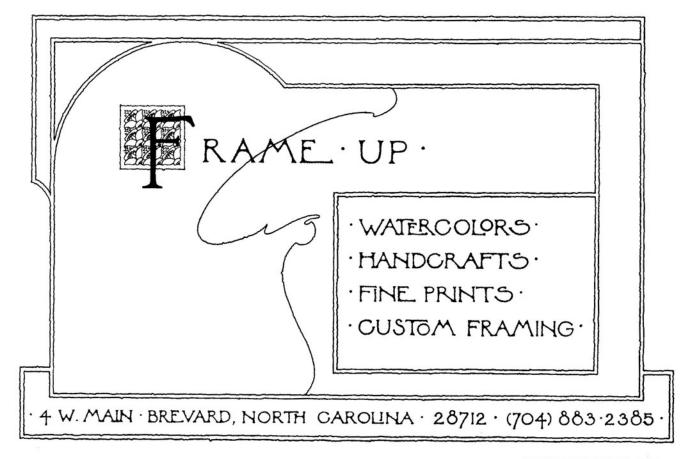
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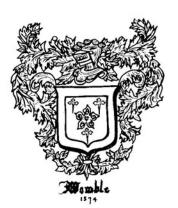
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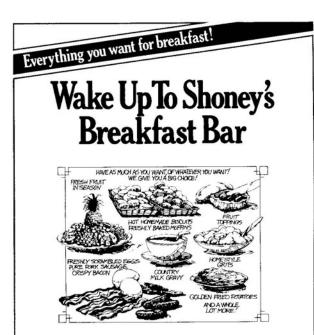
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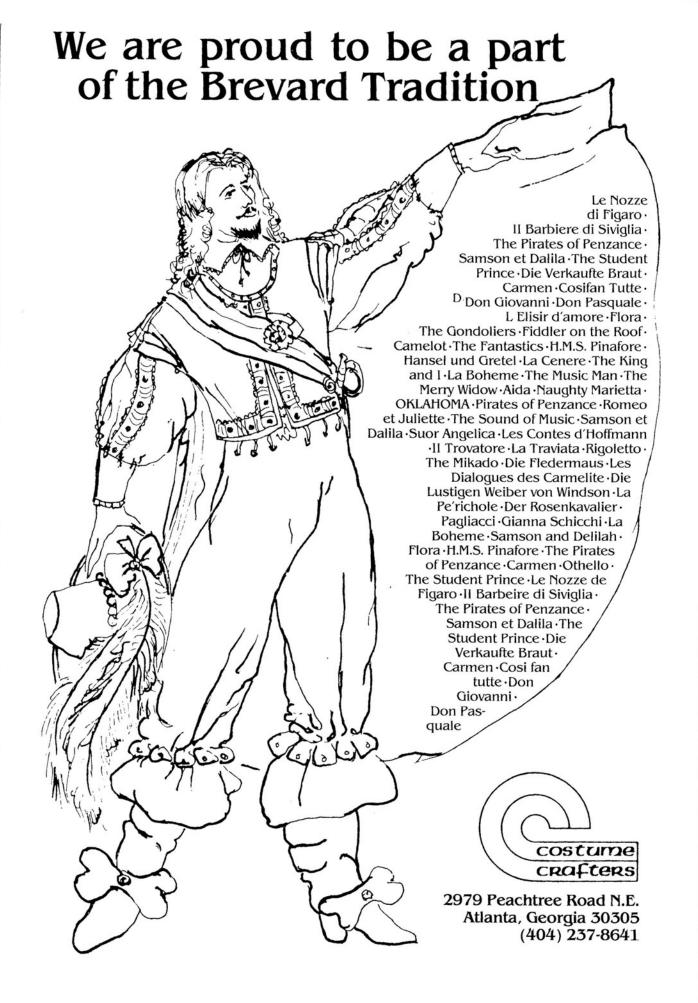
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All seems to be going well, when Sulpice happens to meet the Marchioness of Berkenfield and delivers to her a letter which he had discovered addressed to her at the time the baby Marie was found on the battlefield. Marie being the child of a secret marriage to an army captain, far below the Marchioness in rank, the haughty woman does not even choose to acknowledge the marriage. She, therefore, says that Marie is her niece and forbids her marrying Tonio; she must come to live with her in her castle.

But when Marie goes to live in the luxurious surroundings of her supposed aunt, she is unhappy and longs for her regiment and Tonio. Soon, however, there are sounds of drums and her regiment arrives, led by Tonio who is now a colonel. Tonio immediately sues for her hand, but the Marchioness refuses. Marie agrees to elope with Tonio. In vain the Marchioness tries to persuade her to marry a count, but Marie refuses. As a last resort the Marchioness reveals herself as Marie's own mother. Marie, realizing the seriousness of disobeying one's parent, consents to marry the count. Her mother, touched by such filial devotion, relents and all ends happily with the lovers reunited.

Iolanthe Operetta in Two Acts W. S. Gilbert & Arthur Sullivan

Iolanthe, a fairy, committed the capital crime of marrying a mortal, but the Queen of Fairies commuted the death penalty to banishment for life on the condition that she leave her husband, never to see him again and without explanation. A son was born to Iolanthe and was named Strephon. He has grown to manhood, half fairy and half mortal, and toils as a shepherd. Strephon and Phyllis, a shepherdess. meet and fall desperately in love, but she being the ward of the Lord Chancellor, they see no future in their relationship.

The Queen is persuaded by other fairies to recall Iolanthe from exile as the operetta begins. There is a joyous reunion, and Strephon tells his mother he will marry Phyllis in spite of the Lord Chancellor's objection. To help in the cause the Queen manages to get Strephon elected to Parliament. The entire House of Lords are enamored of Phyllis, and they appeal to the Lord Chancellor to let her choose one of their number as her future husband. Phyllis declines to marry a Peer.

Strephon goes to Parliament and, with the help of the fairies, persuades both Houses to pass a bill that would throw the peerage open to competitive examination. When they realize what they've done, the Peers see they have sealed their doom and appeal to the fairies for help.

Having fallen in love with the Peers, the fairies are about to relent and undo their electioneering, when the Queen arrives and rebukes them for their feminine weakness.

Strephon and Phyllis ask Iolanthe to appeal to the Lord Chancellor for approval of their marriage. She agrees, but in doing so she reveals her identity and the fact that the Lord Chancellor is her husband, thus incurring the death sentence again. The other fairies, having married the other Peers, announce to the Queen that they too have incurred the death penalty. Seeing this dilemma, the Lord Chancellor suggests that the law should be changed to read "every fairy who does NOT marry a mortal shall die." All ends happily with the Peers being turned into fairies. They fly off with their consorts to Fairyland, and leave the House of Lords to be reformed in accordance with intelligence rather than birth.

La Traviata An Opera in Four Acts Giuseppe Verdi

At one of her brilliant supper parties, the beautiful but frail demi-mondaine, Violetta Valery, meets the well-born Alfredo Germont, and for love of him abandons her feverish life of pleasure. Alfredo's father intrudes on their idyllic existence in the country and, although realizing her sincerity, persists in his demand that Violetta renounce Alfredo. Violetta determines to make the sacrifice and departs, leaving only a note for Alfredo. Overwhelmed with despair when he discovers her flight, he follows her. She appears at a ball in Flora's house on the arm of an old admirer, Baron Dauphol, to the fury of Alfredo. The two men play at cards; Alfredo wins consistently. Unable to persuade Violetta to go with him, Alfredo insults her and is challenged by the Baron. Heartbroken, Violetta becomes ill. All her friends desert her, leaving her virtually penniless. She returns home to die. Alfredo, too late, learns the truth, and discovers the sacrifice she has made to secure his happiness. Penetrated with grief and shame, he hastens, with his father, to comfort and console her, and to offer her his hand and name in reparation of the wrong he has done her - but too late. One gleam of happiness, the purest and brightest that she has known, arising from Alfredo's assurance of his truth and desire to restore her reputation, gilds the closing moments of her life, and Violetta dies in Alfredo's arms.

#### Carousel Musical Comedy Richard Rodgers & Oscar Hammerstein

The time is 1873 - the place, a small town on the coast of Maine. Billy Bigelow, handsome and proud barker for the carousel in the local amusement park, and Julie Jordan, a lovely young girl who works in a factory, fall in love and go off together, though it costs them both their jobs. When they return, married, they face a hostile town. In the difficult months that follow, Billy is unable to get work and Julie becomes pregnant. Finally it is June, time to get ready for the first clambake of the season. But Billy is desperate and bitter, and agrees to join his unsavory pal, Jigger, in a robbery. The robbery goes awry, and Billy, trying to escape, falls on his own knife and is killed.

Fifteen years later Billy, looking down from heaven, sees that all is not well with his child, now an attractive but rejected young girl. He returns to earth for a day, makes himself visible to his daughter, and gives her a star. This star, together with Billy's fatherly advice, brings the girl new joy and assurance. Billy, satisfied that he has at last done something good for his child, returns to heaven.

#### The Tales of Hoffmann An Opera in Three Acts Jacques Offenbach

The poet Hoffmann meets Councillor Lindorf in Luther's Tavern and addresses him as his eternal evil antagonist. Currently in love with the opera singer Stella (who embodies three women, as he points out), Hoffmann relates to Nicklausse and his other friends the stories of his past loves. Olympia, the first, was but a lifeless automation whom Hoffmann saw through rose-colored glasses supplied by the mad genius, Coppelius. Giulietta, the second, was a treacherous courtesan who, lured by the offer of a magic diamond, obtained Hoffmann's mirrored reflection for the sinister Dapertutto. The third, Antonia, had been forbidden by her father Crespel to sing, for he knew the exertion would kill her. Nevertheless, her love for Hoffmann and the insistent goading of the diabolical Dr. Miracle led her to a fatal outburst of song.

Sigmund Romberg & Oscar Hammerstein

In the grand salon of his mansion, near New Orleans, the wealthy owner of "The New Moon" (a ship), Monsieur Beaunoir, is told by a French police agent, Ribaud, that he suspects the Chevalier Robert is working incognito as a bond-servant on his estate. Robert, knowing he must escape, still declares to his fellow-worker Alexander that he loves Beaunoir's daughter, Marianne. Marianne is the sailors' mascot, "The Girl on the Prow."

In the Chez Creole tavern, Ribaud, disguised, is trying to pump Philippe (Robert's tenor friend) for information on any revolutionaries. Had Philippe any women friends? The words are incompatible, to Philippe, and in "Softly, As in a Morning Sunrise" he expounds his theories on the fickleness of women. Robert enters, unmasks Ribaud, and calls for Stouthearted Men to "fight for the right they adore."

A cotillion is to be held at the Beaunoir mansion, during which Marianne will raffle off One Kiss; she dreams of a real lover. Robert manages it so that he wins the raffle, and during the five minutes he has alone with Marianne, they declare their love (Wanting You). But Robert is captured by Ribaud and ordered back to France for his execution. Worse still, Robert thinks Marianne had a part in his arrest.

One the deck of The New Moon, sailing for France, Marianne is desperate that Robert know she wants only to help him, so she sends him a note she has scribbled on the back of one of her favorite poems, Lover Come Back to Me. Though Ribaud intercepts the note, he is captured, and Robert freed by some "pirates," who turn out to be Philippe and friends. All sail off to their republican Isle of the Pines, and all the lovers are married. Marianne, who at first does not enjoy the idea, later accepts her title of "citizeness" when French ships arrive and announce the burning of the Bastille on the fourteenth of July.

DAVID BECKER, conductor-violist, is presently the Director of Instrumental Ensembles and Conductor-in-Residence at the University of Miami, Coral Gables, Florida. He is Music Director of the University of Miami Symphony Orchestra, Chamber Orchestra and Chamber String Ensemble. Beginning with the 1982 season, Mr. Becker is also Music Director of the Greater Miami Youth Orchestra and principal viola with The Greater Miami Opera Orchestra. In addition to his very active solo, orchestra and chamber music performing schedule, Mr. Becker is a clinician and guest conductor of orchestras throughout the country. At Brevard, he is conductor of the Transylvania Youth Orchestra.





JAMIE HAFNER is a native of Brunswick, Georgia, and did his undergraduate and graduate studies at the University of Cincinnati. Following a stint with the West Point Band, he directed bands in Georgia and is presently on the faculty of the University of Toledo where he directs the band. At Brevard, Mr. Hafner conducts the Symphonic Band and serves as principal tubist with the Music Center Orchestra.

ROBERT GERLE is an internationallyacclaimed violinist, many of whose recordings have received prestigious awards. Since his debut with the Budapest Philharmonic as a youngster, he has traveled the world as a soloist and recitalist. His conducting activities are equally impressive with full-time appointments and guest appearances in both North and South America. At present, he is conductor of the Symphony and Chamber Orchestra at the University of Maryland in Baltimore County, the Walters Chamber Orchestra in Baltimore, and the Friday Morning Music Club Orchestra in Washington, D.C. Mr. Gerle is conductor of the Transylvania Symphony at Brevard Music Center.





JOHN RICHARDS McCRAE has been producer-director of the Music Center's Opera Workshop since its founding in 1965. A native of South Carolina, he received his training at the University of South Carolina, the Institute of Musical Art, and the Juilliard Graduate School in New York. During his singing career, he appeared with many national companies. Since 1952, he has been Professor of Voice and founding director of the Opera Workshop at Converse College's School of Music. He was General Director of the Charlotte Opera Company for many years and guest director with numerous other companies. For the second year, Mr. McCrae has been designated honoree of the Lucile Parrish Ward Chair in Opera established by the South Carolina Federation of Music Clubs.

JACKSON PARKHURST, a native of Clemson, South Carolina, returns to the Music Center as Conductor, and as Coordinator of Educational Programs. He attended Duke University and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and received his master's degree in Orchestral Conducting in 1974 from the Manhattan School of Music in New York where he studied with George Schick and Anton Coppola. In addition to conducting orchestra, Mr. Parkhurst is also an accomplished conductor of opera threater. In 1976, he founded the Brevard Chamber Orchestra and was its music director until 1980. At present, he is Assistant Conductor of the North Carolina Symphony and its Director of Education.

WILLIAM PHARRIS is a native of Columbus, Georgia and received his formal training at Florida State University. He has done graduate work at Auburn University and Columbus College. Mr. Pharris has taught in Alabama and Georgia schools, and in 1980 was appointed band director at the Hardaway High School in Columbus, Georgia, which continues to produce the top-notch bands that have been a tradition. He has served as adjudicator and clinician at contests and festivals in the Southeast, and is a member of numerous professional organizations. At Brevard, Mr. Pharris is conductor of the Transylvania Wind Ensemble and Coordinator of the Teacher-Aide Program.

ARVID KNUTSEN, an alumnus of Brevard Music Center, and presently Director of Opera at UNC-Greensboro as well as Music Director of their Summer Repertory Theater, brings expertise in all facets of opera and theater performing. As Guest Stage Director at Brevard this season, he will direct two Opera Workshop productions: Daughter of the Regiment and La Traviata. Dr. Knutsen received undergraduate and graduate degrees from Northwestern University, and attended the Hochschule fur Musik in Vienna. He is the recipient of numerous prestigious awards and honors, and continues his professional career in opera, oratorio and musical theater as performer and director.













MARY NELL SAUNDERS holds her doctorate in Choral Conducting from Indiana University. Teaching positions have included Queens College, Davidson College, and the University of Michigan at the National Music Camp, Interlochen, Michigan.

Presently, Dr. Saunders is Music Director of the Oratorio Singers of Charlotte, North Carolina. This summer marks her fifth season at Brevard. Major choral works to be directed by Dr. Saunders this year include Poulenc's "Gloria" and Orff's "Carmina Burana."

WARD WOODBURY serves as conductor and chorus master for the Brevard Opera Workshop in addition to other special performances with orchestras at the Center. His formal musical training was done at Western State College of Colorado and the Eastman School of Music. Dr. Woodbury has wide experience as a conductor of choral, operatic, and symphonic music and is active in numerous regional and national professional organizations. In addition to his teaching at Rollins College, he is conductor of the famed Bach Festival in Winter Park, Florida.

THE BREVARD FESTIVAL TRIO was founded in the summer of 1982, and its members include Marilyn Neeley, pianist, Won-Mo Kim, violinist, and Hans Schmettau, cellist, all part of the Center's Artist Faculty. During its first season the Trio has performed in the South and conducted a weeklong workshop, coaching ensembles from throughout the Southeast, at Converse College. Also active as solo artists during the year, Ms. Neeley, Dr. Kim and Mr. Schmettau are faculty members at the University of Maryland, the University of Georgia and Converse College, respectively. During this summer, the South Carolina Public Radio Network is featuring performances by the Trio.

THE AUGUSTA BALLET, founded in 1961, has been guided by Mr. Ron Colton, Artistic Director since 1964. Colton, formerly with the New York City Ballet, has developed a truly fine ballet company of excellence and professionalism. Assisting Mr. Colton are Zanne Beaufort and Ron Jones, Associate Directors and principal dancers. Mr. Colton served a threeyear term on the dance advisory panel of the National Endowment for the Arts and remains a consultant for the dance program. He is also on the dance advisory panel of the Georgia Council for the Arts and was the 1980 recipient of the Governor's award in the Performing Arts. Known for its outstanding programming and dazzling performances, The Augusta Ballet, this year, presents its acclaimed production of the complete ballet, "Coppelia."

JORGE BOLET has been recognized as "one of the few living superpianists" and one of the most sough-after artists on the contemporary concert platform. He began piano studies in his native Cuba at the age of five and became a student at Philadelphia's Curtis Institute of Music when he was twelve, graduating with top honors, and was the first and only recipient of the Josef Hofmann Award. Currently, Mr. Bolet is the head of the Piano Department at Curtis. Each season, his crowded schedule of engagements takes him all over the world. The Music Center is proud to present Mr. Bolet in concert with the BMC Orchestra.

VICTORIA DE LOS ANGELES. soprano, has been acclaimed throughout the world for her mastery of the operatic repertoire, and of the German lieder, French Art songs, and the Spanish songs of her own country. During her career, Mme. de los Angeles has collaborated with the world's greatest conductors in her extensive and repeated tours around the globe. In recent seasons, Mme. de los Angeles has continued not only to perform orchestral and lieder concerts but also a program of Spanish music accompanied by guitar. Her many recordings include over twenty-two complete operas and other arias, some of which have received prestigious awards. Brevard extends a warm welcome to a consummate artist.









JAMES HOBACK, young American tenor, joins the Artist Faculty this year at the Music Center. A native of West Virginia now residing in New York City, he studied at the North Carolina School of the Arts and the Curtis Institute in Philadelphia, and continues to fulfill his promise as one of the most gifted artists on the opera scene. Mr. Hoback apprenticed with the Central City Opera Company in Colorado and studied with Tito Gobbi in Italy. His versatility has been demonstrated by the many diverse roles in opera, and in oratorio. Future plans include the role of Don Jose in the production of "Carmen" in Paris, as well as appearances in cities throughout



RALPH EVANS, violinist, a cum laude graduate of Yale University and a Fulbright Scholar, began his musical studies at the age of five at the Vienna Academy and later studied with Broadus Erle and Szymon Goldberg. He was a prize winner in the 1982 International Tchaikovsky Competition held in Moscow and the Dallas Symphony Dealey Awards Competition. Mr. Evans was also a winner of the 1981 National Federation of Music Clubs Young Artists Competition and the Concert Artists Guild Competition in New York. He concertizes extensively in the United States and in the music capitals of Europe, including recent appearances in London, Paris, Moscow, Bonn, Berlin, Vienna, among other cities. Recently, Mr. Evans was appointed first violinist of the distinguished Fine Arts Quartet.

FRANK LITTLE, tenor, may be proudly claimed as one of Brevard's "own" since he performed as a singer/actor and served as director of public relations at the Center for a number of years. He is now a regular performer at the Met and the Chicago Lyric Opera, as well as appearing with other companies and orchestras in this country and in Europe. A native of Tennessee, he received his doctorate from Northwestern University, and presently combines an active singing career with his duties at Furman University as Chairman of the Music Department. Dr. Little returns this season for BMC's Opening Night "Salute to the Met" in celebration of its Centennial.

ROSS MAGOULAS is a native of South Carolina and received his formal musical training at Converse College and Florida State University. He has been delighting Brevard audiences with his comic artistry and portrayals since 1966, during which time he has also served as voice teacher and registrar for the Music Center. Since 1956, Magoulas has taught voice at Berry College and has directed the Concert Choir and the Berry Singers. In 1982, Mr. Magoulas was appointed Associate Professor of Voice and Opera at Converse College in Spartanburg, S.C.

WILLIAM McDONALD returns as a member of the Artist-Faculty and leading tenor at the Music Center. Born and trained in this country, his magnificent tenor voice has been heard in numerous opera houses and concert halls around the world. A member of the New York City Opera and a recent affiliate artist with the Houston Opera Company, he has appeared with many noted artists in live performances and on national ETV. A versatile singer, his roles have encompassed musical comedy, oratorio, choral groups, and teaching.

JOSEPH McKEE, bass-baritone, received his training at the Oberlin College Conservatory of Music where he earned his bachelor's and master's degrees. Equally acclaimed for performances in opera and on the concert stage, recent triumphs attest to the variety that has become a hallmark of Mr. McKee's career. He made his New York City Opera debut in 1982, and was immediately re-engaged for future seasons. Mr. McKee has appeared at many of the major opera houses in the United States, including those of Chicago, Santa Fe, San Francisco, Washington, Philadelphia and Baltimore, and has sung with many distinguished orchestras.













ROBERT MERRILL is one of the world's most celebrated baritones. He is well-known to millions through his performances on opera and concert stages, as well as his frequent appearances on television and at major music festivals. Throughout his career, Mr. Merrill has performed as soloist with every major orchestra in the United States, conducted by many of the greatest conductors. A published author of several books, his autobiography, "Once More from the Beginning" was a best seller. The Music Center is proud to welcome back this noted and honored musician.

CARLOS MONTOYA, guitarist, native of Madrid, is as the Spaniards say, "Gypsy on all four sides." This directly affects his music and his playing. Herein lies the difference which distinguishes Flamenco from classical guitar. As Mr. Montoya says, "Flamenco must come from the heart." After years of accompanying singers and dancers, he went on to give full solo concerts of Flamenco guitar music in Europe, the United States and Canada, to critical acclaim. The music he performs is original and based on the Spanish gypsy tradition. In 1966, the world premiere of his "Suite Flamenca" for guitar and orchestra brought raves from the critics. Brevard is proud to welcome back this innovative and tremendously exciting performer.

GIANNA ROLANDI, an alumna of whom Brevard is justifiably proud, returns to sing the leading role of Marie in "The Daughter of The Regiment." Winner of many prestigious awards, and firmly established in the front rank of important young singers, Miss Rolandi appears on the opera, concert and recital stages. Her New York City Opera debut in 1975 was followed by her Metropolitan Opera debut in 1979, and her European debut at Glyndebourne in 1981. Orchestral engagements have included the New York Philharmonic, Cleveland Orchestra, Philadelphia Orchestra, Atlanta Symphony and the Handel Festival at Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. Miss Rolandi's 1983-84 schedule includes the Metropolitan Opera, New York City Opera, San Diego Opera, and Carnegie Hall's French opera series.

OLGA ROSTROPOVICH, cellist, is one of today's most promising young performers whose burgeoning international career has taken her to three continents where she was acclaimed for her excellent technique and musicality. Highlighting her recent European tour were performances at the Theatre de Champs Elysee in Paris and at the Harrogate Festival in Great Britain. Born in Moscow, Miss Rostropovich is the daughter of the noted soprano Galina Vishnevskaya and the renowned cellist Mstislav Rostropovich, who was one of her earliest teachers. She attended the Moscow Conservatory, and is presently studying at the Juilliard School in New York.





CHARLES VERNON is presently bass trombonist with the Philadelphia Orchestra. Before joining the Philadelphia Orchestra, he held the same position with the Baltimore and San Francisco Symphony orchestras. Mr. Vernon was on the faculties of the Brevard Music Center (1972-1981) and Catholic University (1972-1980). He presently teaches at the Philadelphia College of the Performing Arts and The Curtis Institute of Music. Mr. Vernon is a clinician for the Selmer Instrument Company and a frequent soloist for the International Trombone Association.

#### BARBERSHOP HARMONY

SOCIETY for the Preservation and **Encouragement of Barbershop Quartet** Singing in America, has made a real place for itself in the programming at Brevard Music Center with their three appearances on Pops concerts in past years. Few professional artists or organizations find as much sheer joy in making music or can enliven an audience with their enthusiasm as can the Barbershop Harmony Society. The often-intricate close harmonies of their barbershopping is amazing to musicians and non-musicians alike, and is truly a genuine part of Americana. Brevard extends a warm welcome to all.





DOUGLAS WEEKS, pianist, returns to the Music Center's Artist Faculty for his second year. A native of Dayton, Ohio, he holds a Master's degree from Indiana University and is a Doctoral candidate at Florida State University. In 1978 Mr. Weeks was a Semi-finalist in the First New York International Tchaikovsky Competition and went on to compete in the Sixth International Tchaikovsky Competition in Moscow. Mr. Weeks was a Finalist in the 1979 Robert Casadesus International Piano Competition, and has received numerous other honors and awards, including the "Licence de Concert" from the Ecole Normale de Musique in Paris, and a "Performer's Certificate" from the Indiana University School of Music. Mr. Weeks joined the faculty of the Converse College School of Music in 1982. This season, he will be a soloist with the Transylvania Symphony Orchestra.

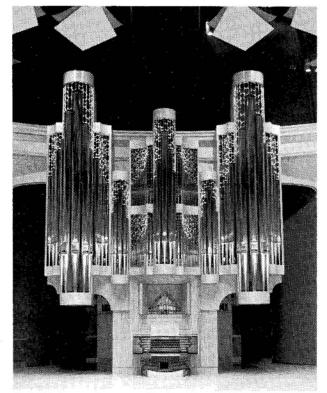
BRUCE SCHOONMAKER, baritone, a native of Charlotte, North Carolina, attended Davidson College and Furman University before pursuing graduate work at Northwestern University. At Northwestern, Mr. Schoonmaker won every competition open to singers and became well-known in the Chicago area as a solosit and operatic singer-actor. In 1975, he was chosen to study interpretation and characterization under Tito Gobbi at the Gobbi Opera Workshop in Florence, Italy. Mr. Schoonmaker has been invited to study next year with Carlo Bergonzi, Renata Tebaldi, and Piero Capucilli at the Bel Canto Seminar in Busseto, Italy. He is presently Assistant Professor of Music and Director of the Opera Theater at Furman University, and joins the Music Center's Artist Faculty this season.

They will be featured in Mozart's "Sinfonia Concertante. BMC is pleased with the opportunity to present its Artist Faculty in concert.





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Over 130 students participated. Friday, April 15, 1983, Miss Wasson won the Corbett Scholarship to attend Cincinnati Conservatory (full tuition plus \$5,000 stipend).

Miss Wasson and Michael Shannon are state and regional winners of the National Federation of Music Club Student Artist Auditions and they are also National Finalists.

Theresa Hamm won a special award in the Southeastern Regional Metropolitan Opera Auditions. Evelyn Lear described her voice as "the most exciting sound we heard here tonight." Miss Hamm also won the National Music Award of the Mothers of America Association competition in New York April 21, 1983.

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
