

Brevard Music Center 1936 — 1985

Educational institutions often define their mission as a Search for Excellence. The Brevard Music Center began its quest

forty-nine years ago.

The Center was conceived by James Christian Pfohl, who inaugurated the plan for a summer music camp while he was Director of Music at Davidson College. At the outset, Transylvania Music Camp was known as the Davidson College Music Camp for Boys, and was held on the campus of the North Carolina college. During World War II, the camp became coeducational and was operated on the campus of Queens College in Charlotte, North Carolina.

The present site was selected after the war, and the Transylvania Music Camp evolved as a business enterprise, later becoming a non-profit educational institution under the guidance of a Board of Trustees. It was then chartered by the state of North Carolina.

Since 1936, the Music Center has grown in many new areas, developing innovative programs and techniques, while building its constituency and reputation. It has matured as an honored and effective instrument in the young musician's quest to 'dream the impossible dream'.

Almost 50 years of continuous promotion, encouragement and guidance of artistic talent give the Brevard Music Center justifiable satisfaction.

Thousands of young musicians have received an indispensable part of their training at the Center. For many other students, music has become an important part of their lives as an avocation. And hundreds of thousands have enjoyed the music-making as audiences...all as a direct result of their Brevard experience.

The Search for Excellence cannot be compromised. There is no "passing grade of 70" in a musical performance, since the other thirty percent, if it is incorrect, will make the composition quite different or even unrecognizable. The Brevard Music Center continues to fulfill basic needs: the need for artists to express themselves, and the need for all humanity to find fulfillment through the creation and re-creation of man's highest dreams...as expressed in music.

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
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
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

CONVERSE and BREVARD

Since 1964 the Brevard Music Center has been affiliated with Converse through the School of Music. Converse College accredits college-level music courses offered at the Music Center.

Two separate institutions with individual charters and governing boards, Brevard and Converse join in the common goal of serving talented youth through extraordinary programs of education and performance in the arts.

HENRY JANIEC, Director

Henry Janiec, Artistic Director of the Brevard Music Center since December of 1964, has served through the years as principal conductor of the Brevard Music Center Orchestra and the Opera Workshop, and has done "guest" appearances with all of the other performing groups of the Center.

In addition to his duties as Artistic Director in which he is charged with the direction of the educational and performance programs of the Center, he also serves as principal administrative officer of the institution.

A native of New Jersey and trained at the Oberlin Conservatory, Janiec joined the faculty of the School of Music at Converse College in 1952, and was appointed Dean in 1967.

Janiec has been principal conductor or music director of the Spartanburg Symphony Orchestra, the Charlotte Symphony, the Charlotte Opera Association, the Converse College Opera Workshop, and a number of community theatre groups, chamber orchestras, and school groups. For eight years he was principal opera conductor at the famed Chautauqua Institution, and for three years conducted the Chautauqua Student Symphony in national broadcasts. For two years he studied and conducted at Tanglewood.

Janiec has had wide experience as pianist, accompanist, and guest conductor. In his work with young musicians, he has conducted All-State orchestras in most of the southeastern states. He has also worked as performer, commentator, and writer on radio and television, including the national radio series Music From Brevard, Voice of America, Radio Free Europe, and other network and local shows.



Janiec is a member of Pi Kappa Lambda, national patron of Delta Omicron, life member of the National Federation of Music Clubs, and holds membership in many professional societies in music. He has served on the South Carolina Arts Commission, its Music Advisory Panel, and the South Carolina Arts Foundation. In 1969, he received the honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters from Wofford College, and in 1971 a Presidential Citation from the National Federation of Music Clubs. He has been Program Director of the Music Foundation of Spartanburg since 1967 and has been honored by many groups for his activities as a musician and teacher.

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
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WELCOME!

THE TEACHER-AIDE PROGRAM began

as a pilot study funded by the Rockefeller Foundation, Converse College, and the Brevard Music Center to discover a practical means whereby talented students could lend assistance in the teaching and management of school music programs in economically limited or emerging school systems in the Southeast. The Program has been cited by many educators,

organizations, and publications as a helpful and workable vehicle to aid hometown music programs and to inspire identified talents to share their expertise with less experienced students at the grassroots level. The Program is funded entirely through the scholarship program of the Brevard Music Center with the aid of the North Carolina State Arts Council and other institutions.



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"apprenticeship" which a younger symphonic musician must serve before being qualified to join a major symphony orchestra. Conceived in the mid-1960's, the Program was partially funded for a number of years by the Martha Baird Rockefeller Fund for Music. It is presently funded entirely through the scholarship program of the Brevard Music Center.

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During the annual summer meeting of BMC Trustees at Brevard in 1981, a special joint session was held of Trustees and prominent friends and supporters of the Music Center. The interest and response manifested at this meeting resulted in the establishment of BMC's National Board of Advisors.

The main purposes of the NBA are to act as a recommending body to the Trustees and Administration of the Center, to assist in generating avenues of financial support, and to inform the broadest possible national constituency of the aims and activities of Brevard Music Center.

The Music Center is privileged to have the Governor of North Carolina, James Martin, serve as Honorary Chairman. 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
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
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
RON NELSON Composer-In-Residence, 1985

Dr. Ron Nelson, Professor of Composition at Brown University, is the 1985 Composer-In-Residence for Brevard Music Center's 1985 season. He is the eighth American composer to fill the position.

A widely-honored composer, Dr. Nelson studied at Eastman School of Music, France's Ecole Normale de Musique, and at the Paris Conservatory under a Fulbright Grant. He has gained national recognition as a composer of choral, band and orchestral works. His cantata, "The Christmas Story", an oratorio, "What is Man?", and an opera, "The Birthday of the Infanta" are commonly accepted as standards in contemporary American literature.

A number of his works are scheduled for performance at the Music Center this season, and he will deliver three Wednesday evening lectures (July 10, July 24, and August 7) which are open to the public.

The Brevard Composer-In-Residence Program is made possible by an endowment created by Mu Phi Epsilon, a national music fraternity. The purpose of the endowment is to provide a forum for the talents of prominent American composers to BMC students and audiences. Established in 1978, the honored position has been occupied by Elie Siegmeister, Ulysses Kay, Leo Smit, Robert Ward, Wayne Barlow, Martin Mailman, and Fisher Tull.




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he Gina Bachauer Endowment Fund has enabled the Music Center to invite internationally renowned performers to extend their time at Brevard as guest artists, conducting seminars and master classes. In honor of the great Greek pianist, keyboard artists Rudolf Firkusny, Alicia de Larrocha, Jorge Bolet, and Leonard Pennario have given generously of their time and talent in establishing the Gina Bachauer Artist Chair.

During her lifetime, Gina Bachauer appeared at the Brevard Music Center many times. She always found extra time to spend with students at the Center. Soon after her untimely passing, she was memorialized around the world by her many friends and admirers. In 1980 a memorial fund was set up at Brevard, through the efforts of her longtime friends, Mr. and Mrs. Carlo Renzulli. Conductor Alec Sherman, Gina's husband, was in the audience as pianist Rudolf Firkusny performed an unforgettable concert to inaugurate the Gina Bachauer Artist Chair.

The tradition continues this season, as Horacio Gutierrez performs at the Music Center on Sunday, July 14, and holds master classes for student pianists during the week.









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In 1981 the Trustees of Brevard Music Center established this scholarship endowment fund to more effectively memorialize or honor individuals who have had an interest or active participation in the Music Center. Many persons have chosen this fund to institute memorials to friends and family, or to honor those still living.

The earnings from the aggregate total of this endowment are used annually to award scholarship assistance to talented students. When an individual memorial or honorary endowment reaches a total principal of \$5,000 or more, or if the initial gift is \$5,000 or more, the fund will be designated as a separate endowment in perpetuity, identified and acknowledged accordingly.

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
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
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
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




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


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Along a street in 17th century Seville stands the fine house of Dr. Bartolo, the shutters tightly drawn and bolted. Within. the old Doctor zealously guards his beautiful ward Rosina from all suitors, intending to marry her himself and acquire her sizable fortune

Collaborating in this plot is one Basilio, teacher of music to the fair Rosina and more a master of sly intrigue than of the keyboard.

Despite precautions, the Count Almaviva has caught sight of Rosina, has fallen in love with her, and serenades her beneath her balcony window. He pretends to be 'Lindoro,' a poor student. He has already written to her, as such.

The town barber, Figaro, suggests a quicker way to meet the lady would be to disguise himself as a drunken soldier and demand billeting within Bartolo's house.

Meantime, Rosina has answered 'Lindoro's' note with tender affection. . . and Bartolo has become suspicious. Basilio tells him the Count has been seen in the neighborhood, and their next course is to spread evil rumors about the nobleman's character to force his withdrawal.

Figaro pleads 'Lindoro's' case to Rosina and she gives him another letter to deliver to her suitor. . . The Count, disguised as a drunken soldier, enters with a letter of his own for her. Dr. Bartolo orders his arrest. But on learning his true identity the arresting officers release the Count - and he tries again.

This time the Count gains admittance by posing as a substitute music teacher, saying that Basilio is ill and has sent him. As the "music lesson" progresses, Figaro elaborately suds and shaves the old Doctor whilst the lovers make plans for elopement. He also snitches the balcony key.

Entrance of the teacher Basilio threatens the ruse but he is quickly bribed, and departs.

Bartolo finds out how badly he's been duped, and in his rage he plays his last card . . .he convinces Rosina that her lover is commissioned to abduct her and deliver her to the wicked Count Almaviva. She believes him, is infuriated, and directs him to arrest 'Lindoro' and Figaro when they return. She will then marry the old Doctor.

Bartolo triumphantly rushes out for the police-and a marriage broker.

Lindoro (the Count) and Figaro use the balcony key to enter as planned, and Rosina meets them with a scorching torrent of abuse. The Count then reveals his true identity.

As they embrace at last, Basilio pops in with the papers to unite the Doctor and Rosina, but with the aid of a pistol is persuaded to do the honors for the lovers

When the Doctor hurries in with more police it's too late. Or is it?... The ecstatic Rosina turns over her inheritance to the old scoundrel

If there's a moral to the story—could it be that: Right or wrong, persistence leadeth to its own reward, in the end.

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

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
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
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Opera Notes "THE GONDOLIERS"

The years before the opening of the action, when Casilda (the heroine) was yet a baby, she and the infant heir to the throne of Barataria were married. Shortly thereafter he disappeared, supposedly abducted to Venice by the Grand Inquisitor, Don Alhambra, and there brought up. After the insurrection the throne of Barataria became vacant and Casilda's father, the somewhat moth-caten Duke of Plaza-Toro, wished to establish his daughter as the Queen. Accompanied by his wife, daughter and Luiz, his attendant, he went to Venice in search of his daughter's missing husband.

As the curtain rises, a chorus of "contadine" (peasant girls) are waiting for the two leading gondoliers, Giuseppe and Marco, to come and choose their brides. By a sort of blindman's bluff, they choose Tessa and Gianetta; and they all dance off to the altar.

The Duke of Plaza-Toro then arrives in Venice, and tells Casilda about her childhood marriage. Luiz and Casilda (who are secretly in love) accordingly renounce their love. Don Alhambra appears to tell them the person they are seeking is either Giuseppe or Marco. He will send for the nurse who took care of the infant prince: surely she will be able to tell which one it is. Meanwhile, Giuseppe and Marco are to go to Barataria and rule jointly.

The two men are overjoyed at the prospect; and, with plans for instituting an ideal state in Barataria, they set sail. Tessa and Gianetta must remain behind, with the vague promise from Don Alhambra that they may later join their husbands, and that one of them will then be Queen.

ACT II is set in Barataria, where Giuseppe and Marco have established their extremely limited monarchy. Everything seems to be going well, except for the fact that they miss their wives. Suddenly, Tessa and Gianetta appear, having become impatient and made the trip to Varataria in spite of Don Alhambra's injunction. General happiness now reigns, and all dance a "cachucha."

A slight cloud appears on the horizon when Don Alhambra enters to point out the weaknesses of Giuseppe's and Marco's government. When he learns that Tessa and Gianetta are there, he tells them about the prince's infant marriage. This revelation is a heavy blow to the two women; for not only is neither of them to be Queen, but also one of them is not married at all. The Duke of Plaza-Toro enters and attempts to teach Giuseppe and Marco some court etiquette. At length, the nurse of the baby prince arrives; she discloses that neither Giuseppe nor Marco is the rightful heir, but Luiz. Thus Casilda is united with the man she loves, and Giuseppe and Marco may return to their wives and gondolas.



The first of three open lectures by the Music Center's distinguished composer-in-residence for the 1985 season. The event is open to the public.

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Opera Notes "CAVALLERIA RUSTICANA"

Soon after dawn a small Sicilian village comes to life as a cheerful crowd of villagers prepare for Easter mass. The young peasant, Santuzza, enters to ask the aged innkeeper, Lucia, for news of her son, the girl's former lover, Turridu. The carter, Alfio, now enters gaily singing of his beloved horses and his new wife, Lola. Alfio admits that Turridu has been seen near the house. After the Easter hymn Santuzza confesses to Lucia that Turridu has deserted her for the carter's wife, Lola, whom he had loved in his youth. Forbidden by excommunication to enter the church with her friends, Santuzza accosts the returning Turridu and detains him while Lola minces in singing her famous ditty and throws him a flower on the way to church. Santuzza vainly begs Turridu to return to her. He hurls her to the ground and goes off to join Lola in church. Desperate with jealousy Santuzza, torn by guilt, rushes after him. After the Intermezzo the congregation assembles in the square and Turridu leads them in a toast to Lola. The infuriated carter breaks in and challenges Turridu to fight him with daggers. The crowd disperses leaving Turridu alone with his mother, Lucia, to whom he bids farewell and asks her to protect Santuzza should he be slain. Turridu runs off the stage to fight Alfio. A distant murmur is heard outside and a woman runs on stage with the news, "Neighbor Turridu has been killed."

Opera Notes "GIANNI SCHICCHI"

The grasping relatives of the wealthy Buoso Donati gather at his deathbed in 13th century Florence to mourn his loss and investigate his bequests. Young Rinuncio finds the will and exacts a promise from his aunt to let him marry his beloved Lauretta if there is money enough left to them. The will is read and the relatives find Donati has left his money to the church. The relatives now weep in earnest. Rinuncio suggests that Lauretta's father, Gianni Schicchi, be sent for as he is a shrewd man and perhaps he can help them get the will changed. Lauretta and Schicchi arrive and Gianni agrees to impersonate Donati and rewrite his will. The body of Donati is removed from the bed and Dr. Spinellocio not knowing his patient is dead arrives to ask after his health. Schicchi simulates the voice of the dead man and convinces the doctor that he should come back later. Then Schicchi puts on Donati's night cap and gown and sends for the notary to dictate a new will. The relatives beg and bribe Schicci to leave them Donati's property, but when the notary arrives and Schicchi dictates the new will he leaves most of the property to himself. No sooner is the notary out of the house than the relatives begin to pillage all the property they can carry away with them. But the lovers are happy as Schicchi has provided them with a dowry. As the curtain falls Schicchi steps in front of it and asks the audience to render a verdict of "Not Guilty."

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Opera Notes "BRIGADOON"

ACT I: Brigadoon is the story of two Americans, Tommy Albright and Jeff Douglass, who are lost in the Scottish Highlands and stumble upon a village, not on the map, called "Brigadoon." At the village fair that sunny May morning, Down on Mac-Connachy Square, Tommy meets a pert and lovely lass named Fiona MacLaren. who is busy today helping her sister prepare for her wedding to young Charlie Dalrymple, which is to take place that evening. Fiona, the older, is not married but is, as she says, Waitin' for My Dearie. The men arrive at the square and hear Charlie tell of his feelings about his approaching marriage in I'll Go Home with Bonnie Jean. Tommy, intrigued by the talk of a miracle and the odd quaintness of the town and his sudden attraction to Fiona, decides to stay the day out, and he and Fiona go off to gather heather for the wedding, to The Heather on the Hill.

Later that day, at the MacLaren house, Charlie arrives to sign the family Bible and, because of the old superstition preventing the bride and groom from seeing each other the day of the wedding, sings to her through the closed door Come to Me, Bend to Me. Now Tommy and Fiona return from a lovely day together and tell Jeff they find it's Almost Like Being in Love. But Tommy presses her to explain the mystery of the village, and Fiona takes him and Jeff to visit the Schoolmaster of the town, Mr. Lundie. Mr. Lundic reveals that Brigadoon was miraculously blessed two hundred years ago, and that it lapses into a sleep from which it awakens only one day in every hundred years. No villager is allowed to leave, or the enchantment will be broken and the town will disappear forever. A stranger, however, can stay if he falls in love.

Now all go down to the church yard for the wedding. Following the simple ceremony, the bride's broken-hearted suitor decides to run away and destroy the town. As he runs from the church yard, the curtain falls for the end of Act One.

ACT II: The men, in an exciting chase through the forest, succeed in stopping the runaway, but only when he is found dead, seemingly from having struck his head on a rock.

Back in the glen, Tommy tells Fiona he is in love with her, in **There But for You Go I**, and makes up his mind to stay in Brigadoon with her. As they leave to see Mr. Lundie, a lass of the village, Meg Brockie, entertains the wedding guests with **My Mother's Wedding Day**.

Now Tommy tells Jeff of his decision to stay. But then discovers that Jeff was the inadvertent killer of the runaway. The shock of his friend's confession, and Jeff's persuasion that the place is a dream, makes him doubt Fiona and the town. So as the day ends, he leaves her, in From This Day On.

How Tommy returns to New York, finds himself haunted by Fiona's memory and returns to Scotland to find her and Brigadoon...this is the story of the last half of the second act.

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"CARMEN"

ACT I: Soldiers from the nearby guardhouse and townspeople are lounging in front of a cigarette factory in Seville. A simple peasant girl, Micaela, shyly enters and asks after the brigadier Don Jose; not finding him on duty, she becomes frightened by the soldiers and runs away. Jose enters with the changing of the guard. At noon the girls from the cigarette factory enter the square and begin to flirt with the soldiers. They are followed by the gypsy temptress Carmen, who casts suggestive glances at the soldiers. She throws a rose to Don Jose then returns to the cigarette factory with the other girls. Immediately Micaela returns, and runs to Jose with news from the village and his mother. Micaela leaves, and Jose takes Carmen's flower and prepares to discard it, when terrified cigarette girls rush in and exclaim that Carmen has stabbed another girl. Captain Zuniga orders Jose to arrest Carmen. She reminds him of the rose and, hinting of a rendezvous at the inn of a friend, tempts him to untie her hands. Jose succumbs to her gypsy charms, loosens her bonds, and agrees to meet her later. Zuniga returns and orders that Carmen be taken to prison. She quickly frees her hands and escapes; Jose is arrested.

ACT II: After dinner at Lillas Pastia's inn, Carmen dances and sings songs about the joys of gypsy life. As the inn is preparing to close for the evening, one of the officers tells her that Don Jose has been released. Cheering shouts herald the arrival of Escamillo, matador of Granada, who boasts of his triumphs in the bull ring and who becomes fascinated by Carmen. After he leaves, Carmen tells her smuggler friends that she cannot join in their business because she must await Jose. He enters and embraces Carmen, who dances to express her joy. When Jose hears the bugle, he says that he must return to the barracks. Carmen becomes vivid with rage and Jose is unable to reason with her passion. He shows her the rose which she threw to him, but she is determined to have him join her gypsy band. Hunting Jose, Zuniga enters and insults him; these insults lead to fighting which the gypsies stop. They remove Zuniga, and Jose finds that he ia a traitor and thus must become a gypsy.

ACT III: As gypsy smugglers pitch camp in a mountain pass. Don lose regrets his decision to join the smugglers, but he pledges his love to Carmen, who joins Frasquita and Mercedes in telling fortunes with cards. In contrast with the favorable predictions of Frasquita and Mercedes, Carmen draws a spade - the death card. The smugglers prepare to leave and Micaela enters in search of Jose. A shot rings out; Jose is firing at Escamillo. The gypsies break up the fight just as Jose is holding a knife at the throat of his foe. His composure recovered, Escamillo invites all to his next bull fight. Remendado discovers Micaela, who begs Jose to return to his dying mother. Carmen scorns him as he leaves.

ACT IV: Escamillo and Carmen are in his arena dressing room. Her gypsy friends warn her that Jose is lurking in the crowd. Carmen replies that she no longer cares for him. The crowd has entered the arena, and Carmen finds herself facing Jose, who pleads for her love. She denounces him, and, over shouts from within the arena, Jose stabs her in a fit of passion.

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

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DAVID BECKER, conductor-violist, is presently the Director of Orchestras, University of Wisconsin-Madison. In recent years he has been Music Director of the University of Miami Symphony, and conductor of the Lawrence Conservatory Symphony Orchestra. In addition to his active solo, orchestra and chamber music performing schedule, Mr. Becker is clinician and guest conductor of orchestras throughout the country. At Brevard, he is conductor of the Transylvania Youth Orchestra.

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ROBERT GERLE is an internationallyacclaimed violinist, many of whose recordings have received prestigious awards. Since his debut with the Budapest Philharmonic as a youngster, he has traveled the world as a soloist and recitalist. His conducting activities are equally impressive with full-time appointments and guest appearances in both North and South America. At present, he is conductor of the Symphony and Chamber Orchestra at the University of Maryland in Baltimore County, the Walters Chamber Orchestra in Baltimore, and the Friday Morning Music Club Orchestra in Washington, D.C. Mr. Gerle is conductor of the Transvlvania Symphony at Brevard Music Center.











JAMIE HAFNER is a native of Brunswick, Georgia, and did his undergraduate and graduate studies at the University of Cincinnati. Following a stint with the West Point Band, he directed bands in Georgia and is presently on the faculty of the University of Toledo where he directs the band. At Brevard, Mr. Hafner conducts the Symphonic Band and serves as principal tubist with the Music Center Orchestra.

ROSS MAGOULAS is a native of South Carolina and received his formal musical training at Converse College and Florida State University. He has been delighting Brevard audiences with his comic artistry and portravals since 1966, during which time he has also served as voice teacher and registrar for the Music Center. Magoulas has taught voice at Berry College and has directed the Concert Choir and the Berry Singers. In 1982, Mr. Magoulas was appointed Associate Professor of Voice and Opera at Converse College in Spartanburg, S.C.

IOHN RICHARDS McCRAE has been producer-director of the Music Center's Opera Workshop since its founding in 1965. A native of South Carolina, he recieved his training at the University of South Carolina, the Institute of Musical Art, and the Juilliard Graduate School in New York. During his singing career, he appeared with many national companies. In 1952, he founded the Opera Workshop at Converse College's School of Music, and directed it for thirty years. In addition to being General Director of the Charlotte Opera Company for many years, he was guest director for numerous other companies. For the third year, Mr. McCrae has been designated honoree of the Lucile Parrish Ward Chair in Opera established by the South Carolina Federation of Music Clubs.

ROBERT HART BAKER is in his fifth season as Music Director and Conductor of the Asheville Symphony. He made his professional debut at 17, conducting the Mozarteum Orchestra in Salzburg, where he studied under Herbert Von Karajan. An oboist and pianist, Mr. Baker is also the conductor of the St. Louis Philharmonic Orchestra, Music Director and Conductor of the York (PA) Symphony, and guest oboist with the Round Top Festival Chamber Players in Texas. He will conduct the August 2 "Carmen" production, and work with the Repertory Training Orchestra at the Music Center.

VAL PATACCHI's career as a singer has included many years of touring with various opera companies after his formal training at the Academy of Vocal Arts in his native Philadelphia. He has appeared throughout the country as guest artist with numerous opera companies, festivals and threatres and is regarded as one of our most versatile and experienced singer/actors today. Mr. Patacchi has served as head of the voice and opera departments at Stephens College for a number of years. He returns to Brevard this year as Stage Director of the Opera Workshop.

WILLIAM PHARRIS is a native of Columbus, Georgia and received his formal training at Florida State University. He has done graduate work at Auburn University and Columbus College. Mr. Pharris has taught in Alabama and Georgia schools, and in 1980 was appointed band director at the Hardaway High School in Columbus, Georgia, which continues to produce the superior bands that have become traditional. He has served a adjudicator and clinician at contests and festivals in the Southeast, and is a member of numerous professional organizations. At Brevard, Mr. Pharris is conductor of the Transylvania Wind Ensemble and Coordinator of the Teacher-Aide Program.













MARY NELL SAUNDERS holds her doctorate in Choral Conducting from Indiana University. Teaching positions have included Queens College, Davidson College, and the University of Michigan at the National Music Camp, Interlochen, Michigan. Presently, Dr. Saunders is Music Director of the Oratorio Singers of Charlotte, North Carolina. This summer marks her seventh season at Brevard.

HORACIO GUTIERREZ made his professional debut in 1970 with Zubin Mehta and the Los Angeles Philharmonic, Just after winning the Moscow Tchaikovsky Competition Silver Medal. Over the ensuing seasons, his artistry has been acclaimed by critics internationally who compare him to giants such as Robinstein, Horowitz, Serkin, Arrau, and Franz Liszt. Mr. Gutierrez has collaborated with numerous major orchestras, such as the London Symphony, the Chicago Symphony, the Boston Symphony, the Pittsburgh Symphony, the Orchestre de Paris, the Berlin Philharmonic and the National Symphony. The Lincoln Center Avery Fisher Prize was recently awarded him on the occasion of his fourth appearance with the New York Philharmonic.

THE BREVARD FESTIVAL TRIO was founded in the summer of 1982, and its members include Marilyn Neeley, pianist, Won-Mo Kim, violinist, and Hans Schmettau, cellist, all part of the Center's Artist Faculty. During its first season the Trio has performed in the South and conducted a week-long workshop, coaching ensembles from throughout the Southeast, at Converse College.

CHESTER LUDGIN, a truly extraordinary American artist, has appeared on the roster of nearly every leading musical organization in North America. From Portland to New York, he has given masterful performances of the over one hundred operas in his repertoire. He sang the World Premieres of Robert Ward's "The Crucible" and of Ellstein's "The Golem", both with the New York City Opera. Brevard welcomes Mr. Ludgin as Tony in "Most Happy Fella," August

MARILYN NEELEY, native of California and internationally-acclaimed pianist, has concertized from coast to coast in the United States and throughout Europe, Mexico and Canada. A prize winner of the Van Cliburn International Competition, the Geneva International Competition and other coveted awards. Miss Neelev has been soloist with over one hundred symphony orchestras, and was chosen as soloist for the premiere performance of the Vaughan-Williams Piano Concerto at Carnegie Hall. Miss Neeley is on the faculty at Florida State University as Professor of Piano.

ROBERTA PETERS was born in the Bronx and, at the tender age of 19, burst on the operatic scene with her Metropolitan Ópera Debut as Zerlina in Mozart's Don Giovanni. Miss Peters is currently in her 35th consecutive season with the Met - a record unequalled by any other coloratura in the famed company's history. She also maintains a busy scheduled of recitals, concerts and personal appearances throughout the world.















CHRISTOPHER PARKENING, who ranks as America's leading virtuoso of the classical guitar, was declared "... a great artist — one of the most brilliant guitarists in the world," by none other than Andres Segovia. A much sought-after recording artist in addition to his concert dates, Mr. Parkening will soon release his tenth recording for Angel Records. He has appeared as guest artist with the major symphony orchestras of America, and appears regularly with European orchestras.

WILLIAM McDONALD returns as a member of the Artist-Faculty and leading tenor at the Music Center. Born and trained in this country, his magnificent tenor voice has been heard in numerous opera houses and concert halls around the world. A member of the New York City Opera and a recent affiliate artist with the Houston Opera Company, he has appeared with many noted artists in live performances and on national ETV. A versatile singer, his roles have encompassed musical comedy, oratorio, choral groups, and teaching. DAVID BEUCHNER, the only American to have placed in the 1984 Leeds Competition, stands out among pianists with a nearly endless list of awards and distinctions. The list includes the Gina Bachauer Grand Prize, First Prize in the Beethoven Foundation Competition, First Prize in the Kosciusko Foundation Chopin Competition, and many more. He was selected to participate in the Xerox Affiliate Artists program, and is currently performing with major orchestras across the country.

SARAH REESE was catapulted into the musical limelight immediately upon her Boston recital debut in 1981, followed by her triumphant New York debut in the American premiere of Verdi's I1 Corsar, with Carlo Gergonzi.
