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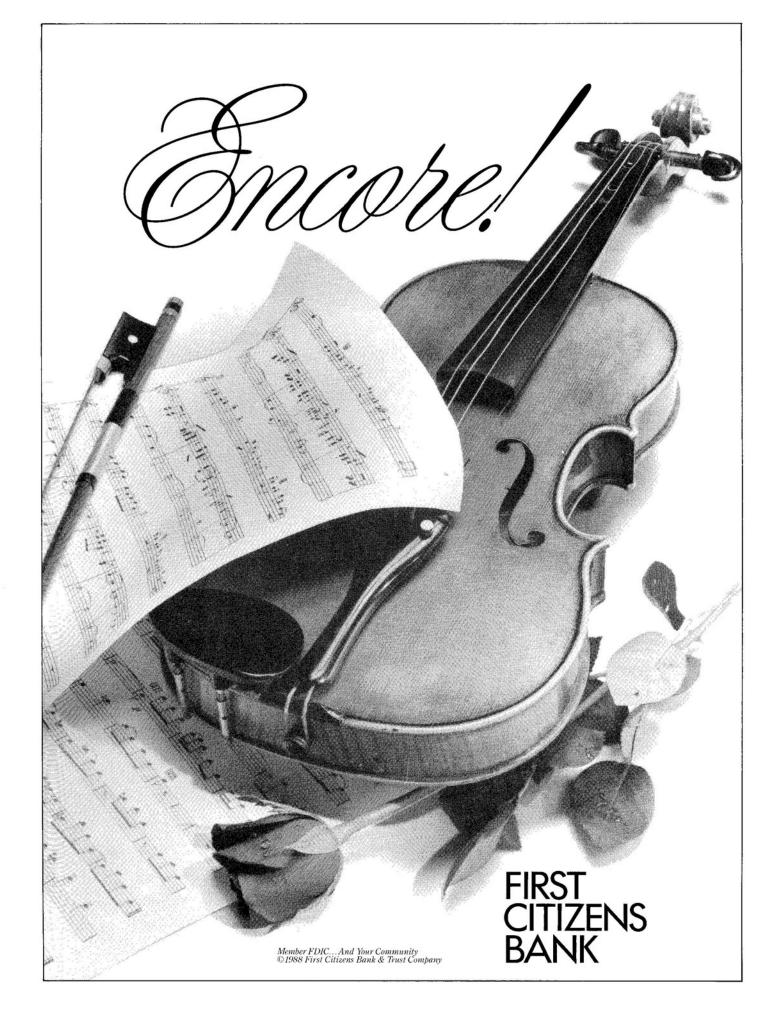
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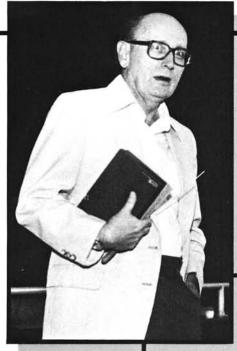
This is Henry Janiec's Silver Anniversary at the Brevard Music Center. Since 1965 he has served as principal conductor of the BMC Orchestra and the Opera Workshop, in addition to making guest appearances with all the other performing groups of the Center.

In addition to his artistic duties, in which he is charged with the direction of the educational and performance programs of the Center, he also serves as its principal administrative officer.

A native of New Jersey, Janiec joined the faculty of the School of Music at Converse College in 1952, after graduating from Oberlin Conservatory. He was appointed Dean of the School of Music in 1967.

Janiec has been principal conductor or music director of the Spartanburg Symphony, the Charlotte Symphony, the Charlotte Opera, the Converse College Opera Workshop, plus a number of community, chamber, and school groups. For eight years he was principal opera conductor at the Chautauqua Institution; for two years he conducted at Tanglewood.







His wide experience as a conductor, pianist, accompanist, and performer has made Janiec much in demand as a guest artist, conductor, lecturer, and

commentator. As a writer, he has also worked on radio and television projects, including the national radio series Music From Brevard, Voice of America, Radio Free Europe, plus network and local shows.

Converse and Brevard join in the common goal of serving talented youth through extraordinary programs of education and performance in the arts.

Two separate institutions with individual charters and governing boards, Converse College School of Music and Brevard Music Center have been affiliated since 1964. The commitment of both is the same: excellence in musical performance!







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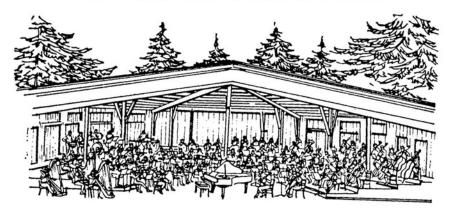

The Trustees and staff of the Music Center are grateful for the dedication and unswerving enthusiasm with which he served, and his stewardship will be felt for many years to come.

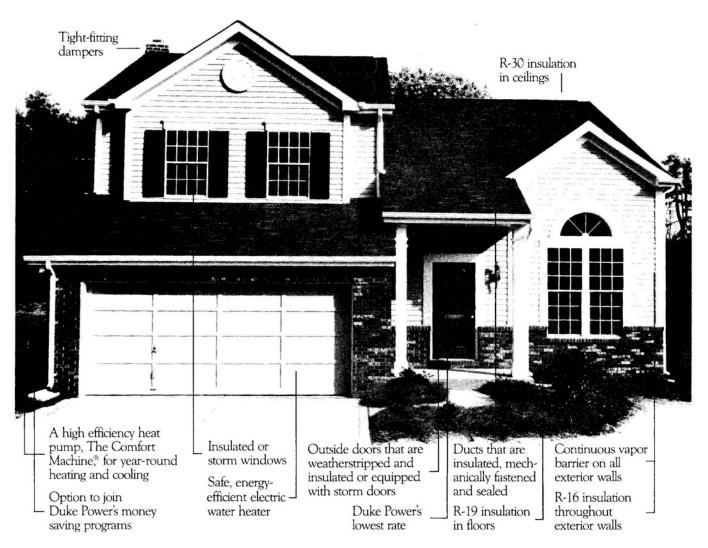
Mrs. Jackson G. Henderson

Mrs. Henderson served as an inspiration to all, and her optimistic outlook will be greatly missed.

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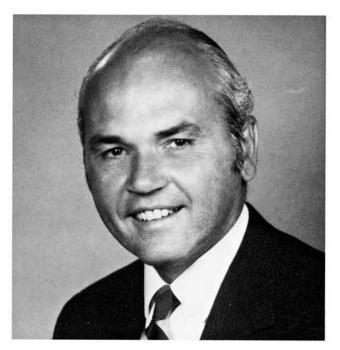
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To Our Audiences

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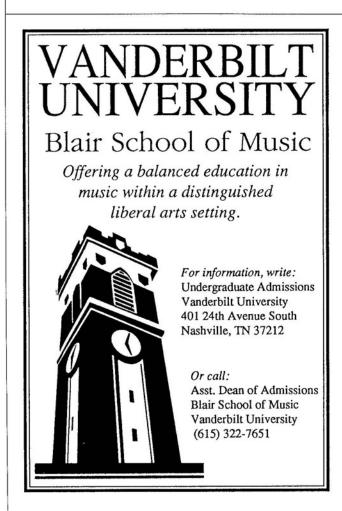
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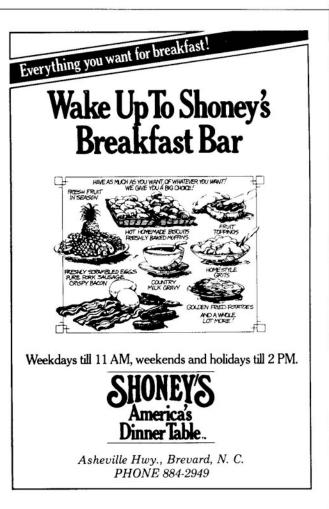
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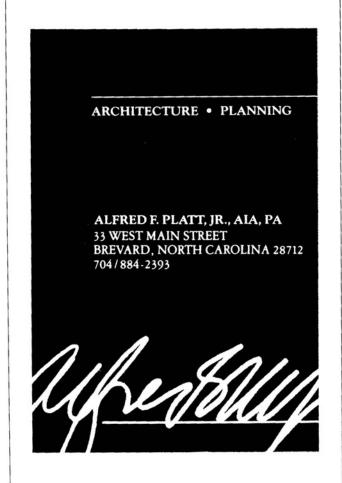
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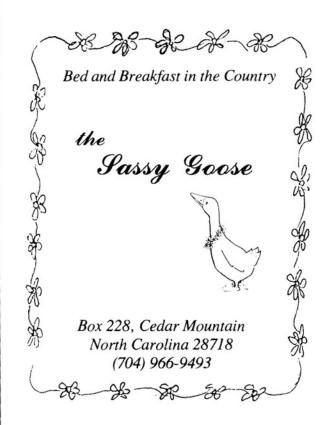


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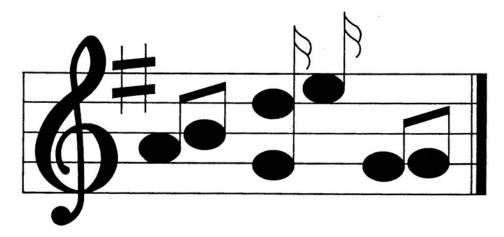




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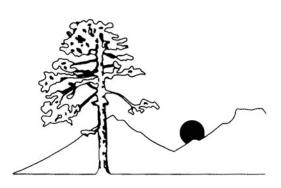
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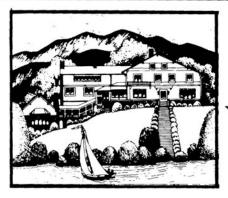


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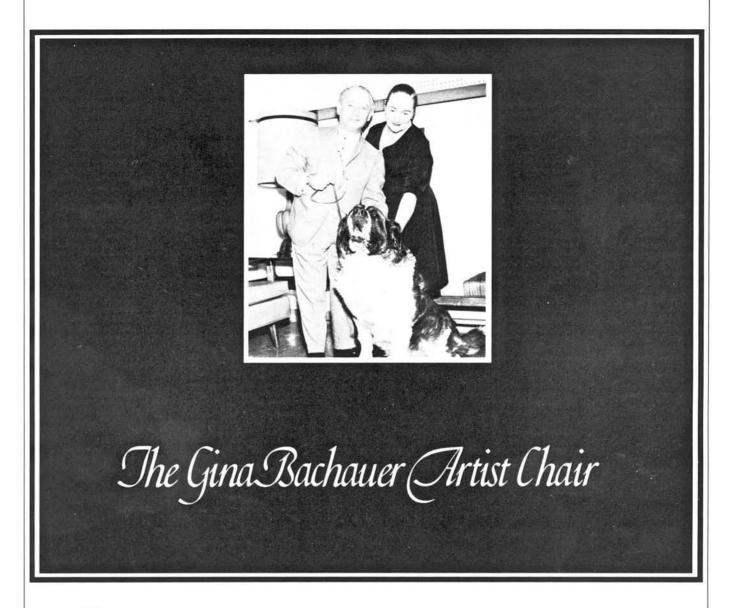
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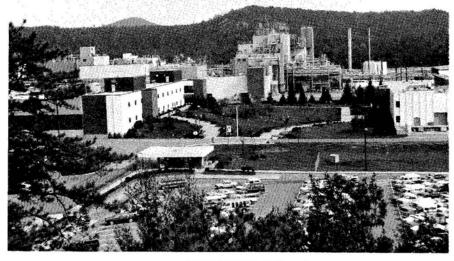
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The Gina Bachauer Endowment Fund has enabled the Music Center to invite internationally renowned performers to extend their time at Brevard as guest artists, conducting seminars and master classes. In honor of the great Greek pianist, keyboard artists Rudolph Firkusny, Alicia de Larrocha, Jorge Bolet, Leonard Pennario, Alexander Peskanov, and Peter Frankl, have given generously of their time and talent in establishing the Gina Bachauer Artist Chair.

During her lifetime, Gina Bachauer appeared at the Brevard Music Center many times. She always found extra time to spend with the students at the Center. Soon after her untimely passing, she was memorialized around the world by her many friends and admirers. In 1980 a memorial fund was set up at Brevard through the efforts of her longtime friends, Mr. and Mrs. Carlo Renzulli. Conductor Alec Sherman, Gina's husband, was in the audience as pianist Rudolf Firkusny performed an unforgettable concert to inaugurate the Gina Bachauer Artist Chair.

The tradition continues this season, as Misha Dichter performs at the Music Center on Sunday, July 30, and holds master classes for student pianists during the week.



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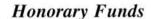


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In 1981 the Trustees of the Brevard Music Center established this scholarship endowment fund to more effectively memorialize or honor individuals who have had an interest or active participation in the Music Center. Many persons have chosen this fund to institute memorials to friends and family, or to honor those still living.

The earnings from the aggregate total of this endowment are used annually to award scholarship assistance to talented students. When an individual memorial or honorary endowment reaches a total principal of \$5,000 or more, or if the initial gift is \$5,000 or more, the fund will be designated as a separate endowment in perpetuity, identified and acknowledged accordingly.

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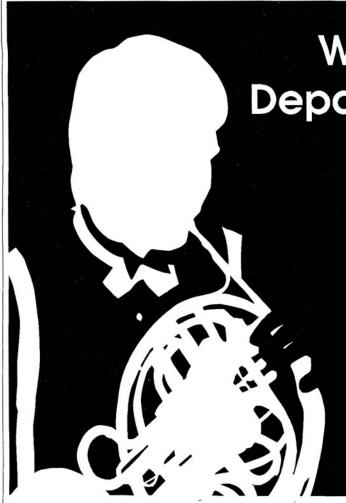

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The Brevard Music Center is most grateful to the National Federation of Music Clubs, and in particular those in the Southeastern Region, for invaluable encouragement and tangible support. State Federations, local chapters and individual members contribute scholarship funds to make it possible for talented and deserving students to study at BMC. NFMC special projects have included The Lucile Parish Ward Chair in Opera, the Hinda Honigman Library and its Gladys Manuel Wing, the Whittington-Pfohl curtain fund, and numerous practice cabins.

BMC joins with host state Tennessee, and its President, Mrs. Frances Cuyler, in welcoming Southeastern Region members for the 1989 meeting at Brevard, July 14-15. NFMC Young Artist Award winner John Koch sings with the Transylvania Symphony Saturday, July 15.

Together, the Music Center and the Southeastern Region pledge renewed effort and dedication to our common goal... the pursuit of artistic excellence!

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The Composer-In-Residence program at the Brevard Music Center was established in 1978. It had been a long-time dream to begin such a program and was finally made possible through an endowment created by the international music fraternity, Mu Phi Epsilon.

The list of composers who have spent a summer at Brevard reads like a miniature catalog of some of America's leading writers: Elie Siegmeister, Ulysses Kay, Leo Smit, Robert Ward, Wayne Barlow, Martin Mailman, Fisher Tull, Ron Nelson, David Ward-Steinman, and Crawford Gates.

Not only has the program added a new and significant dimension to both the educational and performance programs of the Music Center, it provided the impetus for a number of commissions of new works during Brevard's 50th anniversary. Premieres of works by Siegmeister, Smit, Mailman, Tull, Nelson, Kay and Barlow were presented.

This year the Music Center is pleased to present the 1989 composer-in-residence, **Dan Locklair**. A composer with a distinctly American style, **Dan Locklair**'s prolific output includes symphonic works, a ballet, an opera, plus numerous chamber, vocal and choral compositions. This energetic young writer has had works premiered by ensembles such as the Gregg Smith Singers, the Pittsburgh New Music Ensemble, and the Charlotte Symphony. In addition to winning many awards and commissions, he is a superb organist and concertizes widely in the United States.

Dan Locklair will present three open lectures on aspects of his compositional style while at BMC: July 5, July 19, and August 2, at 7:00 p.m. in Straus Auditorium, with free admission to the public.

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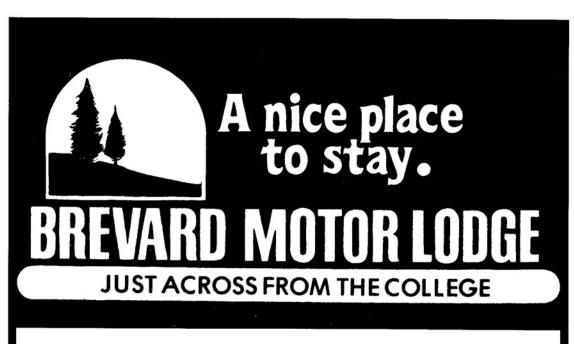
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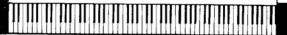
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The Brevard Music Center is one of very few summer institutions in the country which owns and operates its own physical plant. Unlike similar programs, it has both the advantage and responsibility of building (and rebuilding!) to serve its unique programs.

After its founding on the campus of Davidson College, and several years during World War II on the campus of Queens College, the Transylvania Music Camp, as the Music Center was then called, moved to the outskirts of Brevard, North Carolina. Its site was the old Camp Transylvania, a camp for boys. The rustic buildings, many of them still in use today, had to accommodate students, faculty members and their families, plus a support staff.

Audience size increased steadily with the founding of the Brevard Music Festival and its growth from a one-week presentation to a three-week festival. Performances were held in Straus Auditorium, a former camp gymnasium, which could seat 400 comfortably,

500 "if the audience was friendly!" One performance of Beethoven's Ninth Symphony reportedly had an attendance of 1,000 . . . where all the people sat remains a mystery!

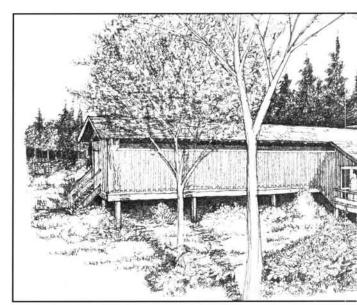
By the early 1960's, audience numbers had grown to the point that a new auditorium was the only answer, and ground

was broken in 1964. But, after the main frame and roof were up, the money ran out. The Center reorganized in December, contracts were let again and the new Whittington-Pfohl Auditorium opened on July 4th of 1965 with 1,200 new seats, a new director in Henry Janiec, and some new programs which immediately caught the fancy of even larger audiences. The operas and pops concerts began to develop a whole new constituency for the Center.

Although many thought BMC had over-built with a 1,200 seat auditorium, it was only a few years until more seating was necessary and the capacity was enlarged to 1,647. Even at that, some performances required folding chair seating and lawn passes for the "blanket crowd."

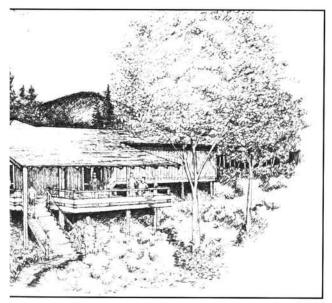
As the Center's reputation and popularity grew, the

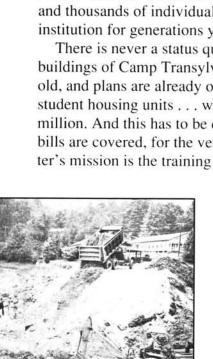

demands on the physical plant multiplied. Parking lots were enlarged at least four times, cables had to be buried, lighting installed, mountainsides moved, creeks diverted, dams built, roads widened, and support facilities provided. The auditorium itself underwent expansion in 1984 to create production and storage space. Soon afterward, a new scenic shop was built to replace the old one which burned down on Easter Sunday of 1985.

Brevard's outdated dining hall was a priority item for years. The original cafeteria had been rebuilt, expanded, and patched innumerable times, and it simply had to be replaced. It happened in 1988 with the Carolina Pavilion, one of the largest and most expensive projects in BMC's half century history. Typical of all building projects at the Center, the Pavilion serves

many purposes besides serving more than 1,200 meals a day. It also accommodates meetings, banquets, lectures, teaching and rehearsing, post office, camp store, and many other uses.

The 135 acres of today's Brevard Music Center are dotted with more than 120 structures and nearly every one bears the name of a generous donor: the list would literally fill every page of this booklet. Indeed, the Music Center could not exist, let alone grow, without the beneficence of foundations, businesses, music clubs and thousands of individuals who have built this institution for generations yet to come.

There is never a status quo at Brevard. The original buildings of Camp Transylvania are over a half-century old, and plans are already on the books for at least ten student housing units . . . with an estimated cost of \$1.5 million. And this has to be done AFTER the yearly bills are covered, for the very heart of the Music Center's mission is the training of hundreds of the world's

most talented young people. That is a challenge indeed, but one that will surely be met.

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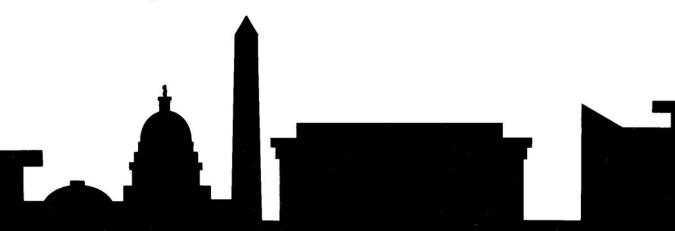
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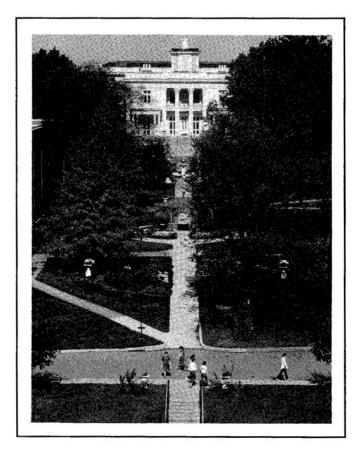
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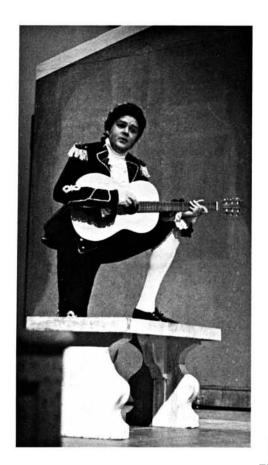

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"BARBER OF SEVILLE"

Dr. Bartolo, a crusty old fellow, is guardian of the fascinating Rosina. Hoping to win her as his wife, he keeps strict watch over her. The Count Almaviva has seen her, and is bewitched by her. Rosina herself feels a strong inclination for the swain (Almaviva) known to her only as Lindoro. Enter Figaro, the town factotum, who tries to get the lover into Dr. Bartolo's house. Disguised as a drunken soldier, Almaviva manages to make himself known to Rosina, and narrowly escapes arrest by revealing his identity to a group of real soldiers.

Next the lover impersonates a music master and gains entry to Dr. Bartolo's home, only to be frustrated by the return of the real music teacher (Don Basilio), who is then convinced by Figaro that he is ill and must leave. Figaro obtains the key to the balcony, planning an elopement; however, a missing ladder foils the strategy. Meanwhile, Bartolo, having obtained a marriage promise from Rosina, calls for the notary, who is persuaded by Figaro to draw up a marriage agreement between Count Almaviva and Rosina. Bartolo finally realizes the old saying is true: "Love laughs at locksmiths," and gives his blessing.

The story deals with an impresario's troubles in dealing with two prima donnas. As the libretto states, "Before they are engaged, opera singers are very engaging, except when they are engaged in singing."

After suffering heavy setbacks, an impresario is given the job of building up a new opera company for Salzburg, whose first production will be "The Magic Flute." Two sopranos, Madame Herz and Madame Silberklang audition for parts and a loud argument breaks out concerning their fees. Monsieur Vogelsang has to intervene and, in the final vaudeville, peace is restored.

Written at the request of Emperor Joseph II, the opera was first performed at Schonbrunn in 1786.

"I PAGLIACCI"

A modest troupe of strolling players arrives in a typical Italian village and Canio, "the prince of comedians," invites the villagers to attend the evening's performance.

Tonio, a hunchback clown of the company, makes an unsuccessful play for Canio's wife, Nedda, who is having a secret romance with Silvio, a young villager. Tonio betrays the affair to an enraged Canio, who demands that his wife reveal her lover's name; she refuses and a terrible quarrel ensues. Beppe, another troupe member, intervenes to remind them that the show begins shortly. There follows the famous outcry of despair; Canio must perform as Pagliaccio - the clown - even though his heart is breaking.

Act II. The play's theme parallels life, as a trusting husband is deceived by a faithless wife. Tonio plays a servant, Taddeo, who is scorned by Columbine (Nedda). Beppe plays her lover, Harlequin, whose identity she refuses to divulge to Pagliaccio. The similarities to his own tragic reality overcome Canio, and the play within a play climaxes when he kills both wife and real life lover on stage. The end comes with the murmur, "The comedy is ended!"

The story upon which "La Traviata" is based is that of the book and play "Camille." The four acts of the opera

"Camille." The four acts of the opera present the principal incidents of the play and book. A party is in progress in the house of **Violetta**, a Parisian courtesan. **Alfredo**, a young man of respectable Provencal family, who loves the woman, joins in the merry-making; his love is passionate and earnest, and is met by the love of **Violetta**, who at his solicitation agrees to abandon her dissolute life and live with him alone.

In Act II the pair are found housed in the suburbs of Paris. Alfredo learns that Violetta has sold her city property to maintain their country home, and goes to Paris to recover it; he returns to find his companion gone. In his absence Germont, Alfredo's father, had visited her and persuaded her, by appeals to her love and sympathy for his son, to abandon him. She returns to her old life in the city.

Act III, at a ball given by one of her associates, Alfredo finds her again, overwhelms her with reproaches, and ends a scene of excitement by denouncing her publicly and throwing his gambling gains at her feet. In the last act Violetta dies in the arms of her lover, who had learned of her sacrifice for his family and hurried to her side to find her in the last stages of consumption.

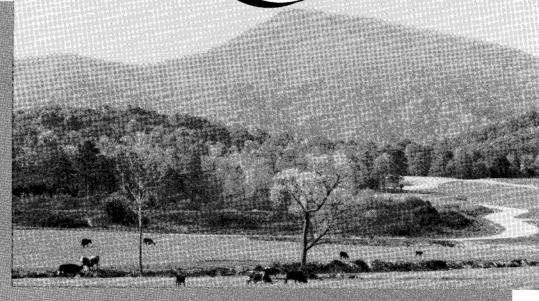

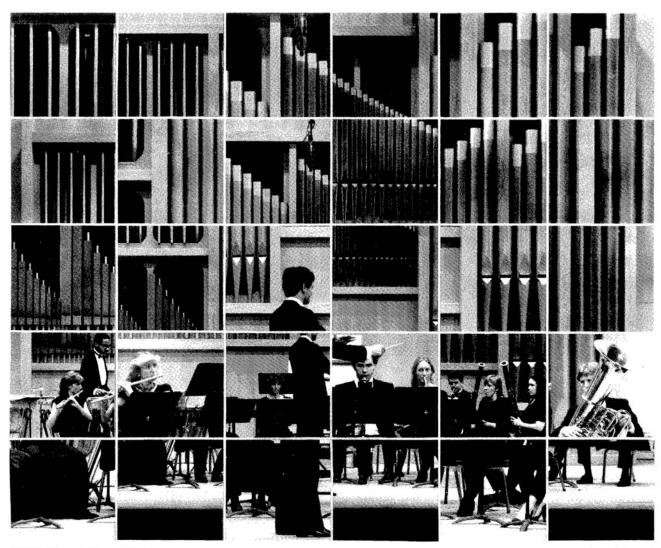

Mezzo-soprano Susan Fleming received her bachelor's and Master's degrees in music from James Madison University and Ball State University, respectively. She recently earned the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Maryland, where she studied with Louise McClelland and George Shirley.

Dr. Fleming has performed with the Washington Opera, the Wolf Trap Opera Company, and the Prince Georges Civic Opera.



Karen Kaufmann White received the B.M. and M.M. degrees from the Eastman School of Music, where she was awarded a Performer's Certificate in Voice and Opera. As a Fulbright scholar, Ms. White studied in West Berlin for two years with Elizabeth Grümmer and Elsa Varena. She has performed with the Chautauqua Opera, Eastman Opera Theater, Indianapolis Symphony, Rochester Opera Under the Stars, and the St. Louis Municipal Opera.



Edward White, Professor of Music and Coordinator of the Voice Area, is Director of the University Opera Theatre. He received the B.M. with distinction and the M.M. from the Eastman School of Music with Performer's Certificates in Voice and Opera. Mr. White has an extensive performing career, having served as principal artist with opera companies both in the United States and Europe. He has given over 300 performances of 30 major operatic roles. He has been described by critics as a "serious and sensitive singer," with "the highest degrees of poise, stage presence, and confidence, reflective of years in professional opera."

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Stephen Cary received the B.M., M.M., and D.M.A. degrees from the University of Illinois. Dr. Cary has taught at Iowa State University, Union University in Jackson, Tennessee; Kent State University, Kent, Ohio; and University of Texas at Arlington.



Carlton McCreery, Director of Orchestras at Alabama, maintains an active career as cellist, conductor and clinician. His collegiate teaching experience includes positions at the Lawrence Conservatory of Music, Southwest Missouri State University and Pittsburgh State University. His conducting studies have included work with Elizabeth Green at the University of Michigan and Karl Melles at the Mozarteum in Salzburg, Austria.

The pair has no money for food, much less a marriage license, and Paquillo leaves the girl in the town square while he tries to remedy the situation. Don Andres finds the lass, is thunderstruck with love, and takes her to the palace to be a lady-in-waiting. To make the living arrangements legal he must find a husband for her; through highly fortuitous circumstance his henchmen decide on a disconsolate

Act II takes place at the palace, where the Lord Chamberlain, **Tarapote**, and some of the **Viceroy's** ladies-in-waiting are offended by the new mistress, she being a common street singer. **Paquillo** makes a well hung-over entry, discovers it is his lost love whom he has "married," flings her at the **Viceroy's** feet, and is immediately arrested and consigned to a dungeon reserved for recalcitrant husbands.

newcomer... Paquillo!

Act III. La Perichole and Paquillo are united in prison, escape and take refuge in the "Cafe of the Three Cousins." The Viceroy appears and, along with his dragoons, luncheons at the same cafe, where the two lovers, in the very teeth of their captors, sing of their love so convincingly that the generous Don Andres forgives them and confirms their new titles and estates. So the lovers depart, living proof of the power of music to soothe and the power of virtue to save.

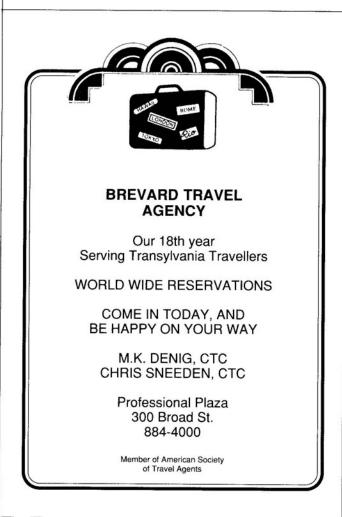
DAVID BECKER, Conductor-Violist, is presently the Director of Orchestras, University of Wisconsin-Madison. In September, 1985, he was appointed Associate Conductor of the Madison Symphony. In recent years he has been Music Director of the University of Miami Symphony, and Conductor of the Lawrence Conservatory Symphony Orchestra. In addition to his active solo, orchestra and chamber music performing schedule, Mr. Becker is clinician and guest Conductor of orchestras throughout the country. At Brevard, he is Conductor of the Transylvania Symphony.



THE EMPIRE BRASS has been called "The foremost of American brass ensembles." It was the first brass ensemble to win the prestigious Naumburg Chamber Music Award, the Brass has given a command performance for Queen Elizabeth II, appeared at a Presidential inaugural concert, played in the dedicatory concerts for newly-renovated Carnegie Hall, and toured the world with its impeccable brand of music. The Chicago Tribune said, "If there is a brass quintet that has more charisma, virtuosity and imagination than the Empire Brass, it hasn't yet played Chicago." Brevard welcomes this outstanding group of musicians on Sunday, August 6.



KATHERINE CIESINSKI is an accomplished American mezzosoprano pursuing a finely integrated career, exploring the world of today's composers as well as the established classics of the lyric stage. The New York Times called her "a singer of rare communicative presence, and a musician of discrimination and intelligence." In her Metropolitan Opera debut she won critical praise for her singing of Nicklausse in Les Contes d'Hoffman. Miss Ciesinski performs with the BMC Orchestra during the Festival's opening weekend (July 2).







JULIAN DAWSON was born and educated in Dublin, Ireland, where he began a brilliant piano career by winning all the major keyboard trophies in Dublin's Feis Ceoil competition festival. Recently he completed a recording of Violin and Harpsichord Sonatas by 18th century English composer Joseph Gibbs. As a conductor, Mr. Dawson serves as opera and orchestra director for Illinois State University, and is music director for the Bloomington-Normal Symphony Orchestra. At Brevard for his second season, he will be the conductor for The Impresario, I Pagliacci, and La Perichole productions.



MISHA DICHTER is now in the third decade of an international career that began with his triumph at the Tchaikovsky Competition in Moscow, he has established himself as one of the foremost pianists of our time. He was born in Shanghai in 1945, his Polish parents having fled Europe at the outbreak of the war. They later moved to the United States, where he studied piano with principal teachers Aube Tzerko, a student of Artur Schnabel, and Juilliard's Rosina Lhevinne. Mr. Dichter is Brevard's 1989 Gina Bachauer artist, performing on July 30.



BARBARA FERGUSON is wellknown in the two Carolinas as a director, choreographer and dance instructor. Last season she made her dramatic debut at the Center, narrating Honnegar's King David. She continues this season as director for The Impresario and The Mikado, in addition to more dramatic narrations with orchestra. A BMC veteran, Miss Ferguson's work has won consistent critical acclaim both at Brevard and at Converse College, where she works with the Opera Workshop and teaches dance.



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JAMIE HAFNER is a native of Brunswick, Georgia, and did his undergraduate and graduate studies at the University of Cincinnati. Following a stint with the West Point Band, he directed bands in Georgia and is presently on the faculty of the University of Toledo where he directs the band. At Brevard, Mr. Hafner conducts the Symphonic Band and serves as principal tubist with the Music Center Orchestra.



MATT HAIMOVITZ was twelve years old when his mentor Itzhak Perlman introduced him to Leonard Rose; that introduction started what has become a meteoric career. In 1984, Rose invited him to perform in a musical celebration of his 65th birthday. In 1985, Haimovitz joined Maestro Zubin Mehta and the Israel Philharmonic for a concert, film, and an American tour. Performances with professional music's top names, including Isaac Stern, Shlomo Mintz, Pinchas Zukerman, Mstislav Rostropovich, Jaime Laredo, and Yo-Yo Ma. The sky is the limit for this young cellist who appears with violinist Midori on July 21 to perform the Brahms double concerto.



ERIC HOOVER is principal flutist of the Brevard Music Center Orchestra, and is a veteran member of the Brevard artist-faculty. At Brevard he is a familiar face to both symphonic and chamber music audiences. Constantly busy serving as soloist and clinician across the United States, Mr. Hoover is presently Professor of Flute at the Arizona State University.

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JAMES HOULIK was called "the Andres Segovia of the tenor saxophone," by the Washington Post. That kind of rave review has followed this unusual concert artist around the world, winning him the title as the pre-eminent performer on his instrument. He has introduced the unexpected beauty of the saxophone wherever open ears seek a refreshing new voice. Mr. Houlik performs with the Transylvania Symphony on July 29.



THOMAS JOINER is a faculty member of the University of Georgia, and does extensive playing in concerts and recitals in many Southern states. A veteran member of the Brevard artist-faculty, he serves as Conductor of the Transylvania Youth Orchestra. He appeared at Carnegie Hall and the Kennedy Center as a principal player in the Indianapolis Symphony, and recorded with the louisville orchestra in the First Edition label. He is Assistant Conductor of the University of georgia Orchestra, and first violinist if the Franklin Quartet.



RICHARD KAUFMAN is Director of Music for MGM/ United Artists Television Productions in Hollywood, California. He and composer Lee Holdridge will be guest conductors on the July 22 "Pops Goes to the Movies" program, performing a wide variety of film scores. On that program BMC will host a world premiere of the music to "The Old Gringo," a western starring Gregory Peck and Jane Fonda, which will be released this fall. Mr. Kaufman and Mr. Holdridge will also conduct a film music workshop for Brevard students.

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JOHN KOCH is the 1987 Artist Winner in the National Federation of Music Clubs competition.
Currently working on his Doctor's degree from the University of Cincinnati, he also studies with Andrew B. White, teacher of the Met's Sherrill Milnes. He has already sung a number of major operatic roles, with high critical praise for both his singing and acting. Mr. Koch performs during NFMC Weekend at the Center, July 15



ROSS MAGOULAS is a native of South Carolina and received his formal musical training at Converse College and Florida State University. He has been delighting Brevard audiences with his comic artistry and portrayals since 1966, during which time he has also served as voice teacher and registrar for the Music Center. In 1982, Mr. Magoulas was appointed Associate Professor of Voice and Opera at Converse College in Spartanburg, S.C. Mr. Magoulas is the general manager of the Music Center's Opera Workshop.



CHARLES MATTHIESSEN attended Brevard Music Center four summers as a high school and college student, winning the Concerto Contest and the Outstanding Male Musician award. He is now in his ninth season with the Jacksonville Symphony, and has been principal trumpet with the BMC Orchestras for five years.

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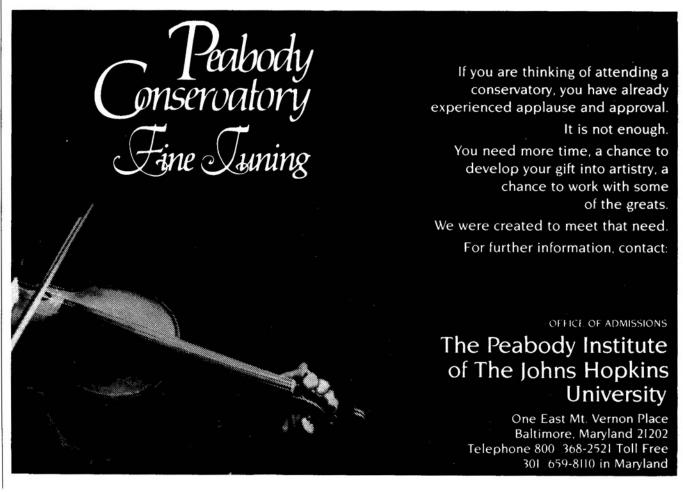

Born and trained in this country, his magnificent tenor voice has been heard in numerous opera houses and concert halls around the world. 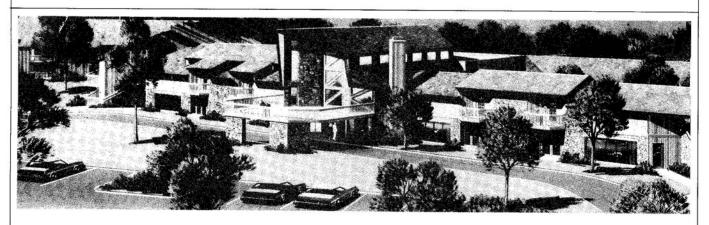

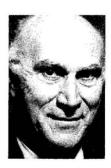

Brevard welcomes this brilliant classical guitarist to the Whittington-Pfohl stage on Sunday, July 16.



MARY NELL SAUNDERS, a native North Carolinian, holds her doctorate in Choral Conducting from Indiana University where she was a student of the late Julius Herford and the first woman to graduate from the program.

Presently she is Music Director and Conductor of the Oratorio Singers of Charlotte, its Chamber Chorus and the Charlotte Youth Oratorio Singers. At Brevard, she serves as Director of Choral Activities.

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BRUCE SCHOONMAKER is now in his seventh season at Brevard. His wide range of dramatic vocal roles includes Gianni Schicchi, a remorseless Enrico in Lucia Di Lammermoor, and Mayor Shinn in The Music Man, and the Narrator in The Fantasticks! His vocalism and dramatic ability have endeared him to audiences of the Fayetteville Symphony, Charlotte Symphony, Chicago Opera Theatre, Columbia Lyric Opera, and Oratorio Singers of Charlotte. Mr. Schoonmaker serves on the music faculty of Furman University.



MAURICE STERN is a dramatic tenor who has steadily gained admiration from European and American critics for his stage work in the larger roles such as Otello, Cavalleria Rusticana, La Forza del Destino, Aida, and others. The Washington Post said, "Stern has such a well-produced, powerful voice and is so effective that he stole the show . . ." Mr. Stern sings the role of Canio in I Pagliacci at Brevard on Friday, July 7.



PAUL SWEENEY has been the scenic designer for the BMC Opera Workshop for two decades, and has been cited by the press each year for his outstanding and innovative work. He and his staff are the principal reason BMC can offer 6 different staged productions each season. Though he rarely takes a bow on stage, his behindthe-scenes labor is evident each week of the season in the form of sets that complement productions so well that they are literally taken for granted.



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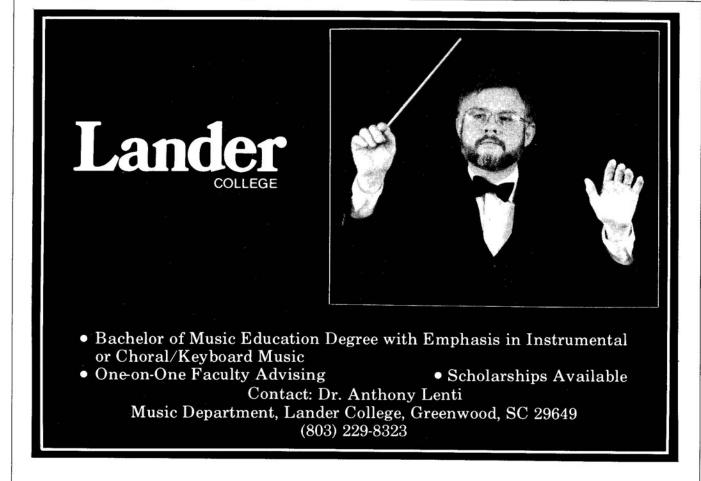
