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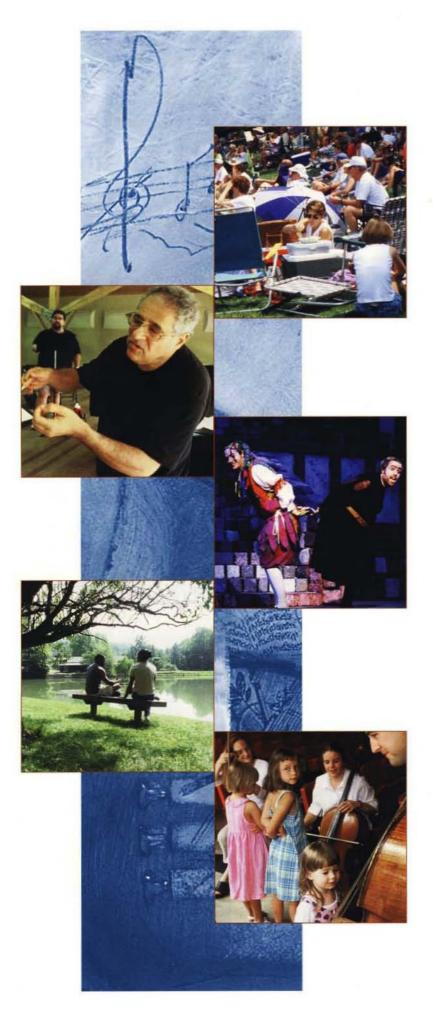

What is the Brevard Music Center

Each summer the Blue Ridge Mountains of North Carolina echo the sounds of the South's most outstanding summer celebration of music, the Brevard Music Festival. From chamber music to opera, Brevard offers more than eighty concert events, most of which feature student performers.

BMC originated in 1936 when James Christian Pfohl founded a summer band camp for boys on the campus of Davidson College in Davidson, NC. In 1944 the Transylvania Music Camp, named for the county to which Pfohl moved, opened outside the town of Brevard. In 1945 the Brevard Music Festival began as a three-week addition following the conclusion of the regular camp schedule. The Festival showcased the talents of advanced students along with faculty and guest artists. The performance series is now an integral part of the Center's educational program.

The Brevard experience is designed to give students a taste of the real world of professional music. Students prepare concerts in the same number of rehearsals as professional organizations and perform them for an audience whose members expect high quality performances.

When you attend a concert at the Brevard Music Festival, not only will you experience a wonderful concert, but you may be hearing the next Keith Lockhart, Pinkas Zukerman, or Marilyn Horne!

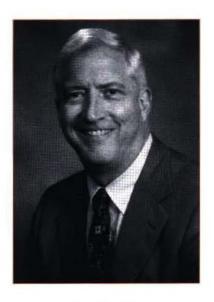

A Word to Our Audiences

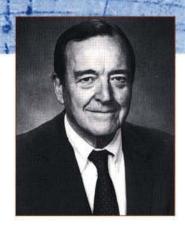

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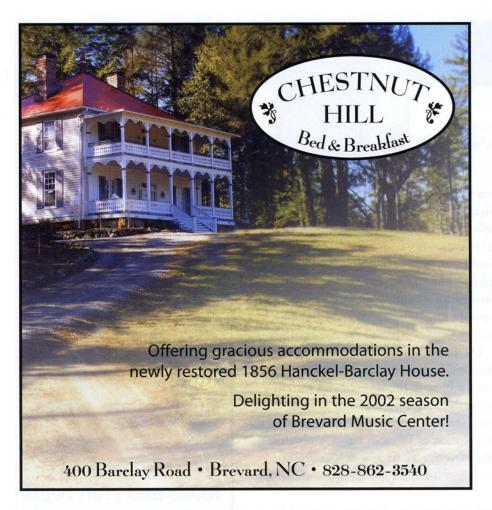
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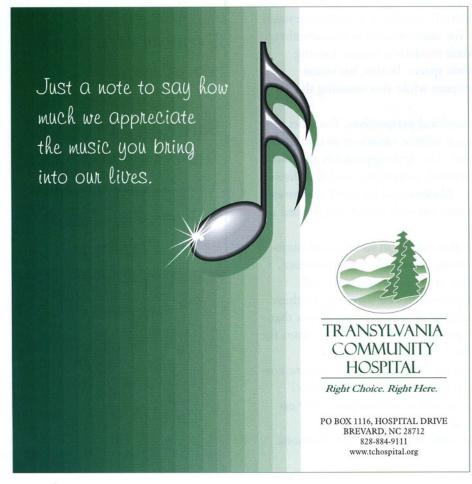

Emanuel was born in 1966 in Shiraz, the heart of Iran's cultural and artistic civilization. Inspired by the

poets and philosophers of his native land, Emanuel's artistic gifts matured through extensive training in painting, serigraphy and photography at the Atlanta College of Art and the Art Institute of Atlanta. The result is an imagery of many textures and cultures, embracing past traditions and present concerns in both the western and eastern worlds. Just as the Polish-born author Joseph

Conrad became an eloquent and unique voice in English literature, Emanuel's art has begun to mark the evolution of Western art. Combining a profound knowledge of history with a sensitive awareness of his current cultural surroundings, Emanuel's art presents an original expression of our time.

Built primarily on the art of collage, Emanuel's art is woven from a fabric of tradition. Much more than a theoretical exercise or a decorative statement, his approach to collage embodies the masters, such as Rauschenberg, Braque and Carra, but also transcends their modernist stance, moving toward a more sensuous and sincere artistic space. In this, his vision encompasses the twentieth century experience while also intuiting the aesthetic outlook of the new millennium.

Seeking new psychological and philosophical perspectives, Emanuel paints almost exclusively *en serie* – allowing infinite variations to unfold and multiply from a single, rational framework. This style approaches the postmodern, de-centered attitudes of late twentieth century art, and this diversity mirrors our own multicultural society. Moreover, as his work is saturated with the theme of music, each canvas is injected with sound and opened up to additional senses and interpretations.

Emanuel's sense of space and color is also unique in its balanced disorder. Especially in the large-scale abstractions, color strikes an immediate, emotional chord, delivering sensations that are at once emphatic and romantic, concrete and metaphysical, post-modern and baroque. In these paintings, platonic ideals mingle with tangible objects to create scenes that could be straight from Donne's poetry—always transferring energy from the physical world into a more spiritual realm.

Emanuel's work is avidly collected around the globe. It has most recently been the subject of the much-awaited publication, *Vigil of a Winter's Moon*, featuring over 100 vibrant images, as well as an extensive essay on Emanuel and his artistic evolution.

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2002 Distinguished Alumnus Award

This year's Distinguished Alumnus Award recipient, David Effron, is BMC's third artistic director. In his 40-year career, Mr. Effron has conducted major symphony orchestras and opera companies throughout the United States, Canada, Europe, and the Far East. His

lifelong love affair with music began as a student at Brevard in 1953-1954. Those pivotal summers were a key influence in his decision to pursue a professional career in music, a celebrated career that has taken him literally around the world.

Effron conducted for the New York City Opera from 1964-1982, taught at the Curtis Institute of Music from 1970-1977, served as principal conductor at the Central City Opera from 1973-1977, and was music director of the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra in Ohio. In 1980 he became general music director of the Heidelberg Castle Festival in Germany, installing the Eastman Philharmonia as the first foreign ensemble to be the official orchestra of the European Summer Festival. He relinquished his post at Heidelberg in 1991 to become music director and con-

ductor of the Chautauqua Music School Festival Orchestra. He was also professor of conducting at Eastman School of Music between 1977-1998, where he trained hundreds of instrumentalists now in professional orchestras worldwide. After leaving Eastman, Effron moved to Bloomington, Indiana, to become professor of conducting at Indiana University's School of Music, where he remains today.

A graduate of the University of Michigan, Mr. Effron received his Master of Music degree from Indiana University. In his early career as a pianist, he accompanied such esteemed artists as Placido Domingo and Sherrill Milnes, and had several successful recordings. His 1987 Pantheon recording with the Eastman Philharmonia, featuring Benita Valente, won the German Critics Prize. Flutist James Galway joined him in an RCA recording of John Corigliano's Pied Piper Fantasy that won a top recording prize from Ovation magazine. His recording of Lincoln Portrait garnered him a Grammy award in 1984.

Since assuming the position of artistic director at BMC in 1997, David Effron has set goals for the Brevard Music Center to expand on its remarkable success by bringing new programmatic ideas to the festival, as well as innovative educational and outreach programs, all of which bring Brevard recognition as the foremost festival of its kind in the world.

Sykes Family Preservation Fund

The Sykes Family Preservation Fund was created in 2000 after a magnanimous gift from the late BMC trustee, Doug Sykes, and his wife Fran. This endowment provides monies to preserve BMC's 140 acre campus,145 buildings, and to undertake needed infrastructure improvements. Earnings from the endowment this year helped to renovate three faculty residences.

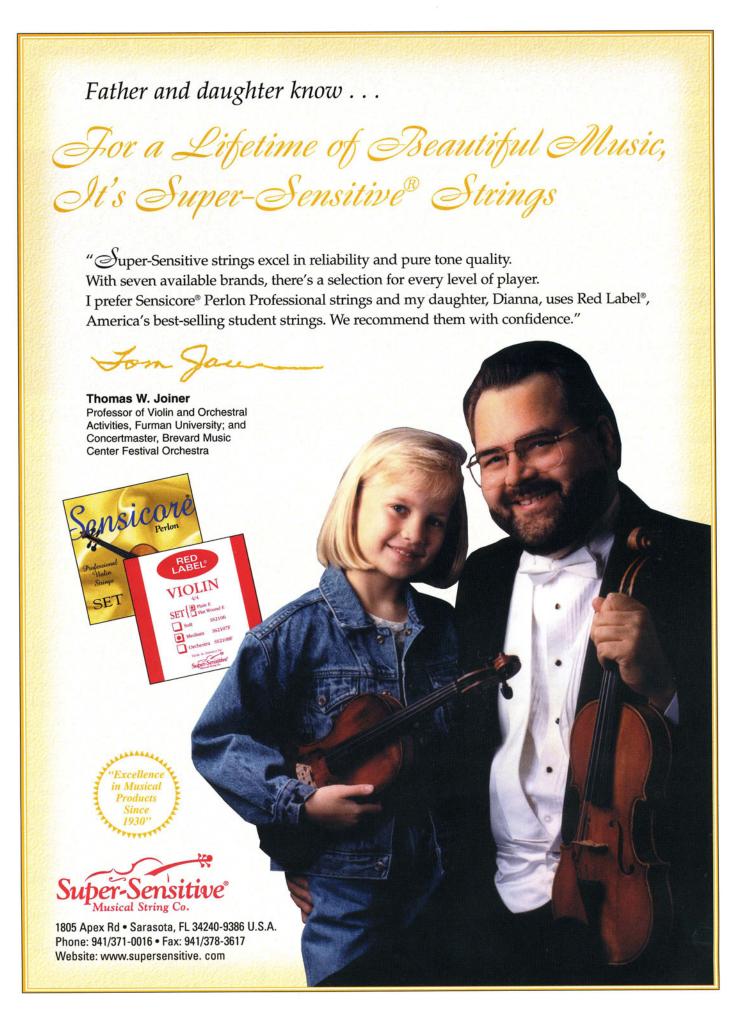
The Sykes Family Preservation Fund honors the long relationship between the Sykes family and the Brevard Music Center. Both of Mr. Sykes' parents were BMC trustees. His father, JD Sykes, served from 1968 until his death in 1973 and his mother, Naomi Sykes, was a trustee from 1974-1978. Doug Sykes followed his parents as a BMC

trustee and served as Chairman of the Building and Grounds Committee until his death in 2001.

During Doug Sykes' tenure as trustee, BMC completely renovated the campus. The Center has spent more than \$6 million on capital improvements and new facilities including 14 student dorms, 12 new faculty houses, more than 60 teaching and practice rooms, renovation of the Whittington-Pfohl Auditorium, and completion of Thomas Hall, a multi-purpose rehearsal hall and teaching facility. The Sykes Family Preservation Fund will protect the significant investments made to the Center's physical plant by providing funds in perpetuity.



The Sykes Family Preservation Fund acknowledges Doug Sykes' history as an engineer and teacher of engineering at Furman University as well as the Sykes family's relationship to BMC. Members of the Sykes family have been ardent supporters of the Brevard Music Center for more than four decades. This fund ensures that the Center's beautiful campus will remain one of BMC's greatest assets and will always honor the Sykes family's deep commitment to BMC.

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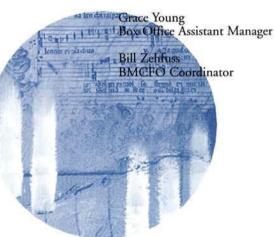

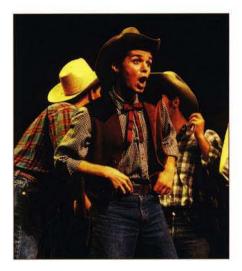

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The Jan and Beattie Wood Concerto Competition

The competition, named after board member and development committee chair M. Beattie Wood and his wife Jan, honors the financial and leadership contributions made by Mr. Wood and the long relationship between BMC and the Wood family.

M. Beattie Wood, elected to the Board in 1997, has been involved in the gifting of two student dormitories; one named for Beattie's father, Robert N. Wood, after his death in 1990. The second Wood dorm was dedicated in 1998. Beattie and Jan are from Atlanta, Georgia, and are the proud parents of three children: Bobby, Will and Genevieve.

The Concerto Competition is a season-long event with the winners playing as soloists with a full orchestra in a concert near the season's end. The competition is open to all instrumentalists and each year more than fifty of the best students compete.

This competition enhances the skills required for a serious audition and provides significant performance opportunities. The winners are awarded a full scholarship to return to BMC the following year.

The faculty for each instrument group chooses the performance pieces before the season begins. The music must be performed from memory and preparation begins as soon as the student decides to attend the Music Center. Preliminary judging is by BMC faculty members from each of the orchestra groups and the BMC conductors judge the final round.

The Concerto Competition has been a focal point of the Brevard experience since the days of BMC's first artistic director, James Christian Pfohl. A former Concerto Competition winner in 1964, New York Philharmonic Associate Concertmaster Charles Rex remem-



bers his solo performance of the first movement of Mendelssohn's *Violin Concerto*. "I had never encountered an orchestra of that caliber before in my young life and to have that backing me up as accompaniment was something I will never forget."

In summation of the Concerto Competition, Mr. Wood stated, "The pursuit of excellence that this concerto competition encompasses is one of the most important aspects of the educational experience at Brevard, and we are honored to support it."

The Brevard Music Center Piano Competition

A highlight of the season for piano students is the BMC Piano Competition, sponsored by the Zimmerli Foundation. During the penultimate week of the season, full-session piano students have the opportunity to compete for professional judges by performing a 30 – 40 minute program of their choice. Three winners are chosen; the first prize is a cash award of \$3,000; second prize is \$1,500; and third prize is \$500. All prize winners also receive full scholarships to attend BMC. The Brevard Music Center is grateful to the Zimmerli Foundation for making this important competition a possibility.

Message from the Director of Education

STEVEN T. ZVENGROWSKI, Ph.D.

There are several major curricular changes in place for the 2002 season that will result in substantial improvement to the BMC education program. These changes represent significant steps in realizing the goals set forth in the BMC Vision 2000 statement that "the Brevard Music Center is recognized as the premier and distinctive summer music educational festival and is an institution of choice among top students."



Here is a summary of the changes that become effective this summer:

- Students participate in a major performing ensemble that gives a concert on a weekly basis. This provides each student the opportunity to participate and perform in a large performing organization.
- Every student will have a well-conceived and organized chamber music experience. Learning and experiencing chamber music is essential to the development of a complete musician at all levels. There are three two-hour blocks of time each week for the young artists and advanced division students that are exclusively designated to chamber music. At the end of each two-week period, students will participate in a public performance of the chamber music they

have been studying.

 Starting this summer, students will receive one-hour private lessons instead of half-hour lessons as in the past. This will provide adequate time for sufficient study of the depth and breadth of solo literature while providing

time for work in

technique and sight-reading.

 The music theory curriculum has been expanded to reflect a comprehensive approach to the acquisition of basic musicianship skills.
 New courses such as music of the world's cultures, computer technology in music, selected topics in music history, and the Alexander
 Technique are available this

summer. These courses will provide an eclectic, holistic approach to contemporary music education as well as essential knowledge and skills for BMC students.

 All wind students are receiving both an orchestral and band experience this summer. A new ensemble quota system along with a rotational plan provides wind

students with a wellbalanced educational experience.

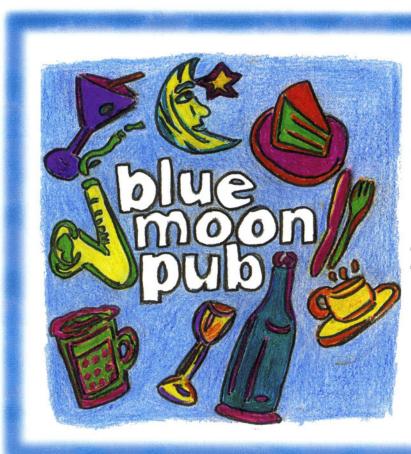
 Students have regularly scheduled master classes in their instruments this summer. They will have opportunities to work with visiting artists and BMC faculty to develop their skills as soloists in a public setting.



These educational changes help provide a setting for substantial growth and development of each student. In addition, through a rigorous audition process, you will notice a higher caliber of performance in each ensemble.

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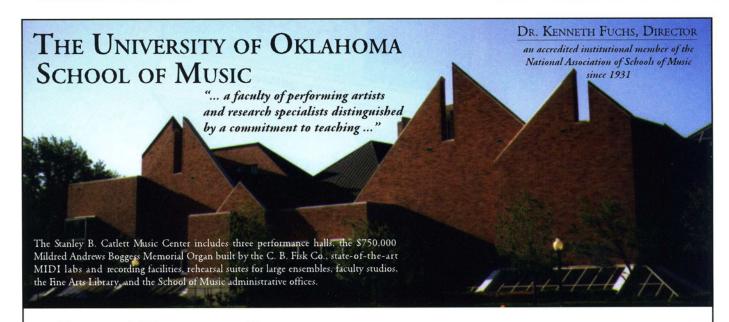

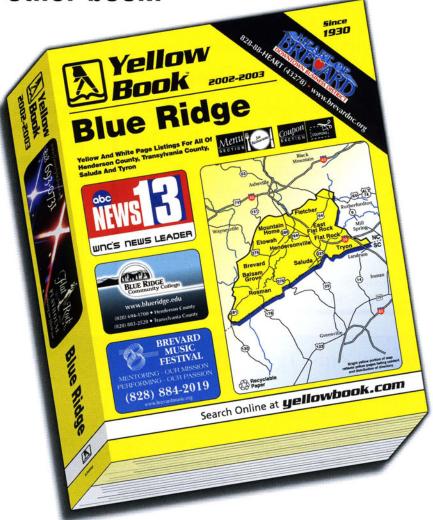

David Effron, Artistic Director and Principal Conductor



Distinguished symphony and opera conductor David Effron is the third Artistic Director in Brevard Music Center's history. In his forty-year career,

Effron conducted for New York City Opera between 1964-1982, taught at the Curtis Institute of Music from 1970-1977, served as principal conductor at the Central City Opera between 1973-1977, and was music director of the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra in Ohio. In 1980 he became general music director of the Heidelberg Castle Festival in Germany, installing the Eastman Philharmonia as the first foreign group to be the official orchestra of a European summer festival. Effron relinquished his post at Heidelberg in 1991 to become music director of the Chautauqua Music School Orchestra. Justin DiCioccio is chair of the jazz department at Manhattan School of Music, where he teaches percussion and coaches ensembles. He is currently

program director for Carnegie Hall Jazz Education and acts as a consultant to Wynton Marsalis and Lincoln Center Jazz, with whom he also performs and gives clinics. Mr. DiCioccio's other educational positions include clinician/educational outreach director of the Vanguard Jazz Orchestra in New York City and educational consultant/concert pro-

grammer of VH-1's "Save the Music" campaign. In 1997 he helped establish the Henry Mancini Summer Music Institute in Los Angeles, where he remains a guest artist, conductor, and teacher of improvisation. Mr. DiCioccio is the recipient of a citation from the mayor of New York for "Distinguished and Exceptional Service to Young Instrumentalists" and is currently active with the National Foundation for Advancement in the Arts and the National Foundation for Jazz Education. He is a three-time recipient of the Presidential Scholars teacher recognition award in the jazz field, presented by the US Department of Education. He was awarded the first annual Award for Outstanding Service in the New York City Schools' Commission Project in 1998.



Gerard Floriano

Music) Dr. Floriano
is an active conductor in both orchestral and choral

areas. He serves as assistant professor of conducting and director of choral activities at the State University of New York-Geneseo and is currently music director of the Greater Buffalo Youth Orchestra. He has been associate conductor of the Eastman Philharmonia Orchestra, conducting assistant to Maestro John Nelson with the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra, and director of choral activities at Memphis State University. His performances have been broadcast on NPR, WXXI's "Live from Hochstein" in Rochester, and WNED in Buffalo. Other guestconducting engagements include performances with the Rochester and Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestras, and the Orchard Park and Finger Lakes Symphony Orchestras. Formerly of the University of Toronto Opera Division and music director of Eastman Opera Theatre in Rochester, he is currently music director of the University of Maryland Opera Studio. He has worked for several opera companies and summer festivals across Canada, including the Canadian Opera Company, Victoria's Opera Piccola, Ottawa's Opera Lyra, the Toronto Gilbert & Sullivan Society, Opera Hamilton, and the Banff School of Fine Arts. Mr. Greer is also an active accompanist, vocal coach, composer and arranger. His compositions include nine song cycles and two children's operas, The Snow Queen and The Star-Child.



Thomas Joiner (Education: BM-Furman University, MM-Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, DM-Florida State

University; Studies: Elaine Richey, Dan Boda, Guido Lamell, Gerardo Ribiero) Dr. Joiner is professor of violin and orchestral activities at Furman University (Greenville, SC), as well as music director and conductor of the Hendersonville (NC) Symphony Orchestra, He has performed in Carnegie Hall and the Kennedy Center as a principal player with the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra and as a violinist with orchestras in Louisville, Aspen, Charleston and Savannah, As an Artistic Ambassador for the US Information Agency, he presented recitals with pianist Douglas Weeks during a 1996 five-week tour of West Africa and the Middle East, Dr. Joiner served as director of orchestral activities and professor of violin at the University of Georgia. In the spring of 2001 he spent a sabbatical in Paris, France, working with maestro John Nelson, music director of the l'Ensemble Orchestral de Paris. Dr. Joiner and his wife, violist Anna Barbrey, perform as the Joiner Duo. He is co-concertmaster of the BMC Festival Orchestra and conducts the Transylvania Symphony Orchestra.



Carlton McCreery (Education: BM-Bowling Green University, MM-University of Michigan; Studies: Gregor Piatigorsky,

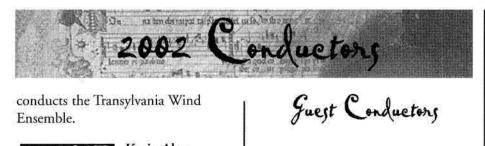

Symphony Orchestra, Mr. McCreery has conducted and performed throughout the United States, Europe, South America, and Asia, and has taught at Southwest Missouri State University, Lawrence Conservatory of Music, and Pittsburgh State University. He has performed with the Toledo Symphony Orchestra, the New Orleans City Ballet Orchestra, and at the Mozarteum Festival in Salzburg, Austria. He has also held appointments as resident conductor and music director of the Tuscaloosa Symphony Orchestra. Mr. McCreery is a spokesperson for Super-Sensitive String Company.



Sarah L. McKoin (Education: BM-Michigan State University, MM-Wichita State University, DMA-

University of Texas-Austin) Dr. McKoin is associate professor of music and director of bands at the University of Missouri-Kansas City Conservatory of Music, where she conducts the Wind Ensemble and teaches graduate and undergraduate conducting. Formerly she was the director of bands at SUNY-Buffalo and served on the faculty of Fredonia State College. She has performed world and regional premieres of works by Lukas Foss, Dan Welcher, Donald Freund, David Maslanka and others. She is executive producer for a recording project with the Israeli Chamber Orchestra on the Fleur De Son label, which features the Castellani-Andriacchio guitar duo, Arie Lipsky conducting. She has authored an analysis of Leslie Bassett's Colors and Contours. She cofounded the Western New York Youth Wind Ensemble and is music director and artistic advisor of the Kansas City Youth Wind Ensemble. Dr. McKoin is active in the College **Band Directors National Association** and has served as the New York State chairperson. At BMC Dr. McKoin



conducts the Transylvania Wind Ensemble.



Kraig Alan Williams (Education: BA, MM-California State University; Studies: Jerry Iunkin, Sir David Whitwell, David

Aks, Gary Pratt, John Alexander, Kurt Sanderling, Maurice Abravanol, Lawrence Leighton Smith) Mr. Williams is currently in his third year at Duke University as assistant professor and conductor of the Duke Wind Symphony and chamber ensembles and director of the Duke in Vienna Program. He is completing a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in conducting from The University of Texas at Austin, assisting in all aspects of the Longhorn Band program. He has made several appearances as conductor of the Dallas Wind Symphony. Mr. Williams was an assistant professor of music and director of bands and chamber ensembles at California State University, Los Angeles, assistant conductor of the Inland Empire Symphony and the Los Angeles Solo Repertoire Orchestra in Burbank, and music director of the Lake Elsinore Civic Light Opera. He has performed in Carnegie Hall and has recorded for Mark Records, Good Vibrations, and ADK in Prague, Czech Republic. He has commissioned and premiered numerous works for Duke University, and in 2001 led a collaborative commissioning project between the Duke Dance Program and the Wind Symphony. Mr. Williams conducts the Transylvania Symphonic Band at BMC.

Luis Biava

Maestro Luis Biava is conductor in residence for the Philadelphia Orchestra, where he served as principal second violin



for nearly two decades. Recently appointed professor of music at Temple University's Boyer College of Music, he has been music director and conductor of the University's Symphony Orchestra since 1986. For the past 14 years, Maestro Biava has also served as music director and conductor of the Temple University Youth Chamber Orchestra, an ensemble for advanced players in Temple's pre-college Center for Gifted Young Musicians. A native of Colombia, South America, Maestro Biava joined the Philadelphia Orchestra in 1968. He was a founding member of the Philarte String Quartet and continues to play first violin with the Philadelphia Chamber Ensemble.

Arthur Fagan

Arthur Fagan is music director of the Queens Symphony Orchestra; he also enjoys an active guest conducting career throughout North America and Europe. Recent conducting engagements have included the Vienna State Opera, Berlin State Opera, Hamburg State Opera, the Czech Philharmonic, Radio Symphony Orchestra of Berlin, Tokyo Philharmonic, and numerous others. Mr. Fagan has also conducted performances at the Metropolitan Opera, Lyric Opera of Chicago, New York City Opera, Baltimore Opera, Cincinnati Opera, and the Spoleto Festival in Italy. Mr. Fagan began his career as a conductor with the Frankfurt Opera as assistant to Christoph von Dohnanyi. He is a native of New York City and studied conducting with Max Rudolf at the Curtis Institute after graduating from Wesleyan University.

Keith Lockhart In February of 1995, Keith Lockhart was named 20th conductor of the Boston Pops Orchestra since its



founding in 1885. Now in his eighth season, Mr. Lockhart has conducted more than 350 concerts, made 38 television shows, led 12 domestic tours with the Boston Pops Esplanade Orchestra, and a nineconcert tour of Japan and Korea in June of 1997. His first major professional appointment was as associate conductor of the Cincinnati Symphony and Cincinnati Pops Orchestras, with whom he was affiliated from 1990 through 1995. Prior to those appointments, he served on the faculty of Carnegie Mellon for six years, was music director of the Pittsburgh Civic Orchestra and Akron Youth Symphony, and assistant conductor of the Akron Symphony. In January of 1998, Mr. Lockhart was appointed music director of the Utah Symphony. As a guest artist, Mr. Lockhart has conducted the Chicago Symphony, the Cleveland Orchestra, the Los Angeles Philharmonic, the Montreal Symphony, the New York Philharmonic, the Philadelphia Orchestra, the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra, and the Washington Opera. He is a former BMC student and currently serves as a member of the Brevard Music Center's Board of Trustees.

Alasdair Mitchell

Since 1985 Mr. Mitchell has been the permanent conductor of the Edinburgh (Scotland) Symphony

Orchestra. He has won second prize in the Nicolai Malko International Conducting Competition in Copenhagen and has undertaken conducting engagements in Scandinavia including the Danish National Radio Symphony Orchestra, the Aarhus Symphony Orchestra, and the Norrkoping Symphony Orchestra (Swedish Radio). In Britain he has made guest appearances with the Royal Scottish National Orchestra, the BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra, the Ulster Orchestra, and the Scottish Chamber Orchestra, Mr. Mitchell has been musical director of the Dundee Choral Union, where he conducted the major choral repertoire with orchestras such as the R.S.N.O. and the Scottish Opera Orchestra. He is on the conducting faculties of Edinburgh University and the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama. Mr. Mitchell has recorded with the London Philharmonic Orchestra and the Philharmonia Orchestra (London) on the Chandos label.

Donald Pippin

Music director of New York's famed Radio City Music Hall, Donald Pippin is also one of Broadway's most hon-



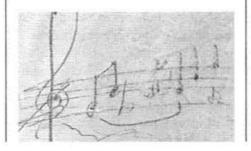
Broadway's most honored conductors. He is the recipient of the Tony Award for *Oliver*, the Emmy Award for *Broadway Sings Jule Styne*, and a gold record award for the original cast album of *A Chorus Line*. Mr. Pippin has conducted major symphony orchestras throughout the world including the Cleveland Orchestra, the Houston Symphony, the London Symphony Orchestra, the Los Angeles Philharmonic, the Jerusalem Symphony Orchestra, and he was

invited by Beverly Sills to be guest conductor for the New York City Opera's production of *The Music Man*. Donald Pippin conducts Marilyn Horne's performance at BMC on July 30.

Gunther Schuller Gunther Schuller has developed a musical career that ranges from composing and conducting to extensive work as



an educator, jazz historian, administrator, music publisher, record producer, and author. At the age of seventeen, Mr. Schuller was appointed principal horn of the Cincinnati Symphony; two years later he received a similar position with the Metropolitan Opera Orchestra. Mr. Schuller has received the Pulitzer Prize, two Guggenheim Fellowships, the Darius Milhaud Award, and the Rodgers and Hammerstein Award. In 1998, he was elected as one of the original twenty-six members of the American Classical Music Hall of Fame in Cincinnati. His 1997 appearance with the New Zealand Symphony Orchestra included performances at the Brisbane Biennial and throughout New Zealand. Mr. Schuller taught at the Manhattan School of Music and at Yale University before being appointed as president of the New England Conservatory of Music in 1967, where he served until 1977.

Since last season, death claimed three of our finest—trustee J. Douglas Sykes, Jr., and trustees emeriti William Alexander and Alfred O. Munk. We sadly miss each of them.

Doug Sykes served as a trustee for twelve years and in recent years led campus upgrade initiatives as chairman of the Building and Grounds Committee. His love of the Center was evidenced by his hands-on involvement with campus projects ranging from conceptual planning to personally pitching in and getting the work done. Doug and his wife, Fran, created the Sykes Family Preservation Fund with a magnanimous gift in 2000. This endowed fund will provide financial resources to protect the significant investments made during his tenure. 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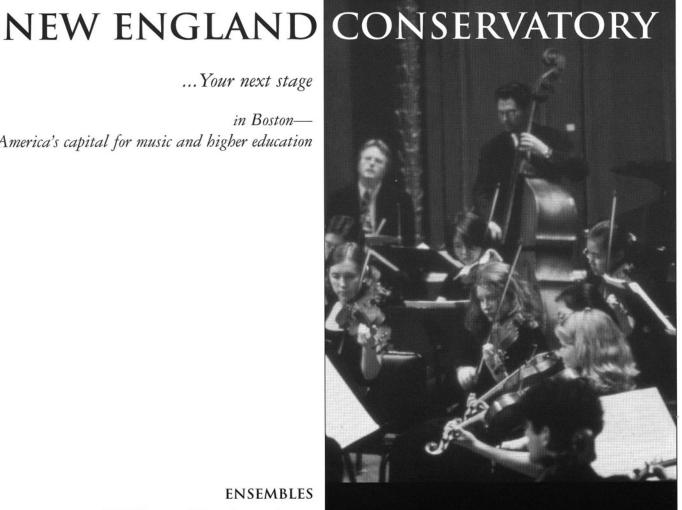

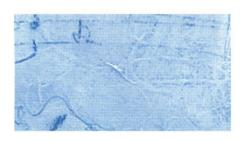


In Memorian: Martha Aiken Fendergrast

MAY 13, 1920 -APRIL 20, 2002

A native of Atlanta, Georgia, Mrs. Pendergrast graduated cum laude with a major in biology and a minor in music from Wesleyan College in Macon, Georgia. She pursued a master's degree in biology from Emory University and taught at Agnes Scott College. Upon retiring from teaching, she became involved in real estate in Atlanta.

A love of music and the promotion of musical excellence played a large part in the life of Martha Pendergrast. She was a talented pianist, lover of duo piano, and an avid supporter and great friend of the Brevard Music Center. Always looking toward the future, Mrs. Pendergrast's support of the Music Center often came in the form of endowment funding for faculty. 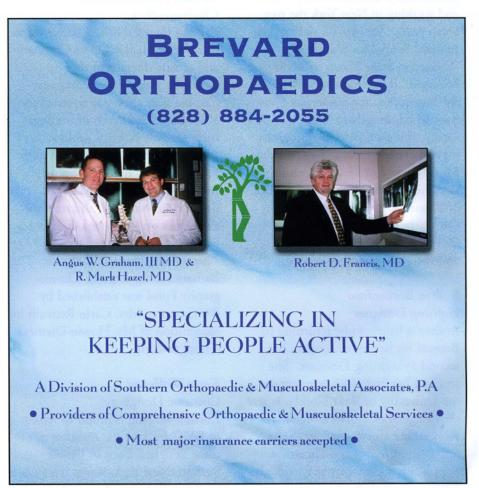


Trumpeter Fred Mills will perform at the Joe Utley Memorial Concert on July 13

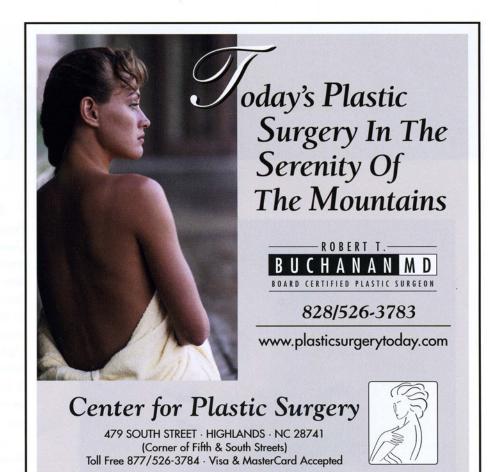
David Morelock

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The Gina Bachauer Artist Chair

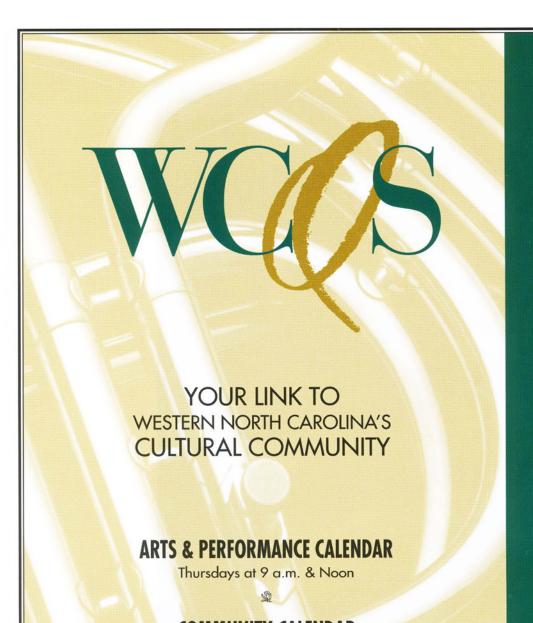

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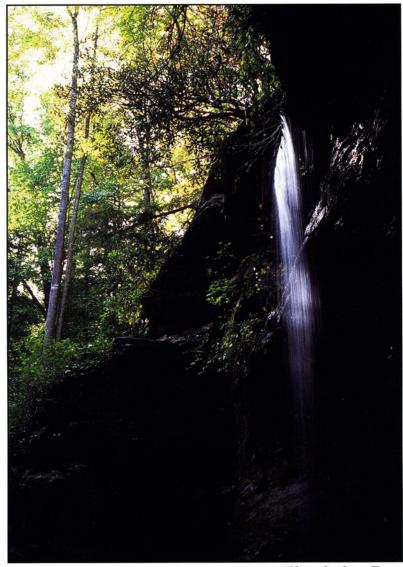


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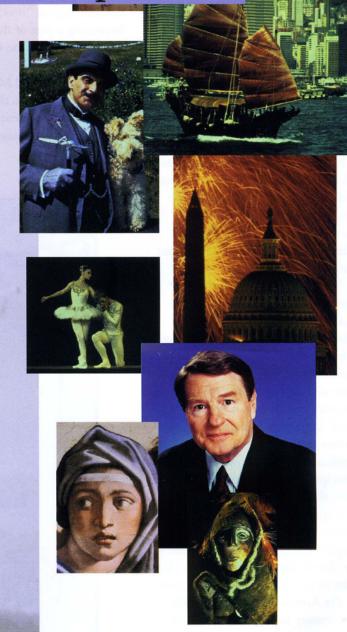

Since attending BMC, Anna Christy has earned critical acclaim for her performance of lyric-coloratura roles. In 2001-2002, Ms. Christy sings Annabelle in The Glass Blowers, Zerlina in Don Giovanni, Yum-Yum in The Mikado, and Papagena in Die Zauberflöte with New York City

Early this year, Mr. Cook was heard performing on National Public Radio's Saint Paul Sunday as part of the Marilyn Horne & Friends presentation of promising young singers in song recitals. Mr. Cook said of the Brevard Music Center, "It made me want to be an opera singer, I'd never seen or even heard an opera before I attended Brevard."

Chick and Dee Dee Davis, served on the BMC faculty for over 20 years. Chick served as the Dean of Students from 1970-1996 and Dee Dee served as a member of the piano faculty from 1975-1996. After serving on the faculty of Emory and Henry College for many years, the couple retired to Fairfield Glade.

Mr. Davis started his tenure at BMC after his football coach introduced him to BMC's Artistic Director at the time, Henry Janiec. In Chick Davis, Dr. Janiec found not only a Dean of Students but a golf partner as well. According to Mrs. Davis, the two could be found on the golf course every Monday morning during their summers at Brevard.

The Davises' youngest daughter, Alicia, spent every summer here with her parents from the time she was 6 months old until the Davises retired. When she was old enough, Alicia enrolled as a student at the Brevard Music Center.

Both the Davises agreed that their summers at Brevard were "some of their happiest times" and so many people came back year after year that it "became like a second family to them."



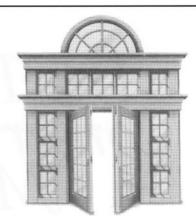
R. ALLEN SPANIER

A native of Cedartown, Georgia, R. Allen Spanjer attended BMC in 1968, 1969 and 1970 as a student, and he currently serves as a member of the

Music Center's horn faculty. BMC served as his first serious musical experience. After attending the Interlochen Arts Academy and later The Juilliard School, Mr. Spanjer worked as a freelance musician in New York City, performing in many Broadway shows, commercial recordings, movie soundtracks, operas, ballets, and concerts with most of the major New York performing institutions. In February 1993 Allen Spanjer joined the New York Philharmonic as Second Horn. In 1995 he appeared with the orchestra as a featured

soloist in Schumann's Konzertstück for Four Horns, a performance he repeated during the Philharmonic's 1996 European tour.

Mr. Spanjer is a certified teacher of the Alexander Technique and maintains an active studio teaching both Alexander Technique and horn. He has written for The Horn Call, the journal of the International Horn Society, and was featured at the 1999 Symposium of the International Horn Society. "I spent three summers at Brevard when I was just getting started on the horn. They were my first experiences with serious musicians, and got me started on a path that has led to a very fulfilling life and career as a musician. I am very pleased to be able to come back to teach and play, and share my experience with a new generation of students, as well as to work with great colleagues on the faculty, some of whom are old friends I first knew as a student while at BMC." ■



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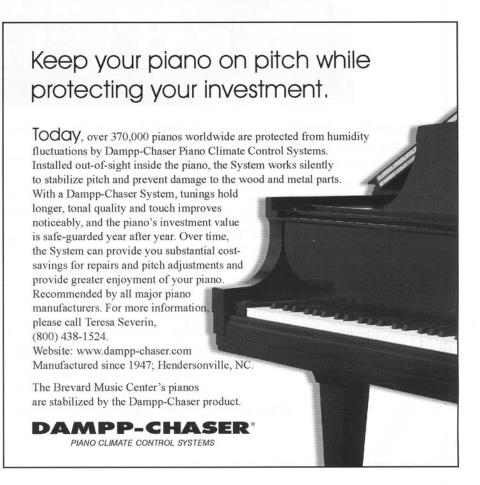
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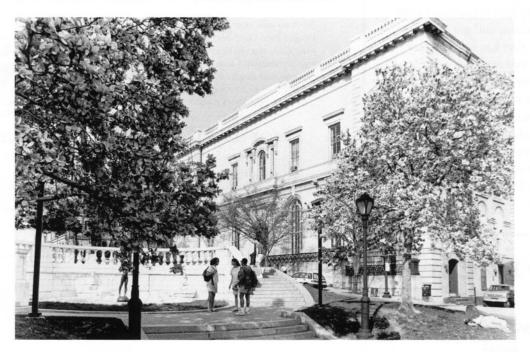

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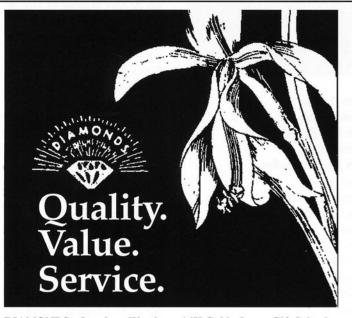
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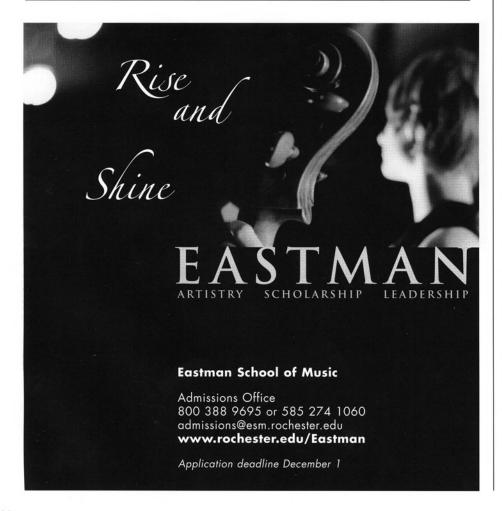
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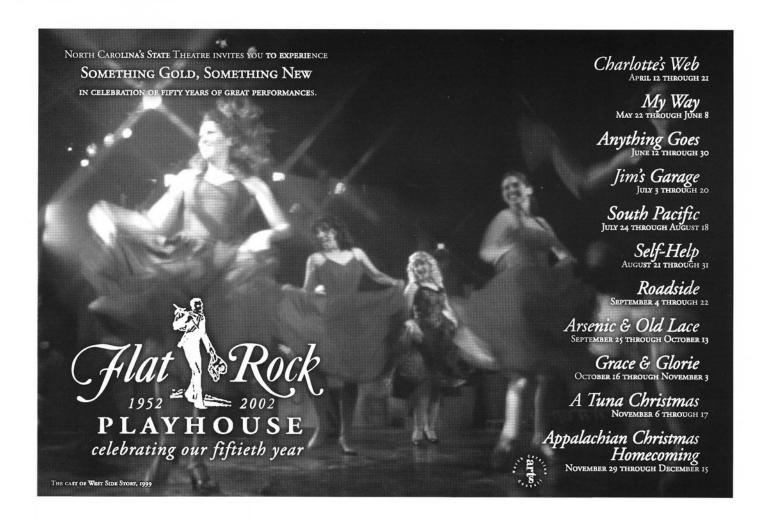


Each year the trustees of the Brevard Music Center select an individual or entity to receive the Distinguished Service Award, an honor given in recognition of outstanding contributions supporting the development of the Brevard Music Center and the education of young musicians. This year Dr. Henry Janiec of Spartanburg, South Carolina, is the recipient of this prestigious award.

In 1964 Henry Janiec began his 32-year tenure as Brevard Music Center's second artistic director. During that time he reorganized the educational program, added an opera workshop, and initiated innovative programming changes such as popular artists and pops concerts. Prior to his arrival at the Brevard Music Center, the festival component consisted of two weekends of concerts. Dr. Janiec incorporated daily performances as part of the educational program, eventually extending the festival to a seven-week season that became an integral part of the students' studies.

Henry Janiec also served as Brevard Music Center's primary administrator, overseeing all aspects

of finance and operations for most of those 32 years. Under his leadership, all debt was retired in 1978. Since that time, the Center has operated "in the black" for 23 consecutive years, and remains debt free; Henry Janiec was at the helm for 18 of those years. Amazingly, Dr. Janiec also managed to work as dean of Converse College's Petrie School of Music during his time as BMC's artistic director, serving both institutions with great distinction.

Since retiring from Brevard Music Center, Henry Janiec returns each summer to conduct a pops concert, illustrating his continued support and love for this special place.

It is with tremendous gratitude and appreciation that Henry Janiec is awarded the 2002 Distinguished Service Award.

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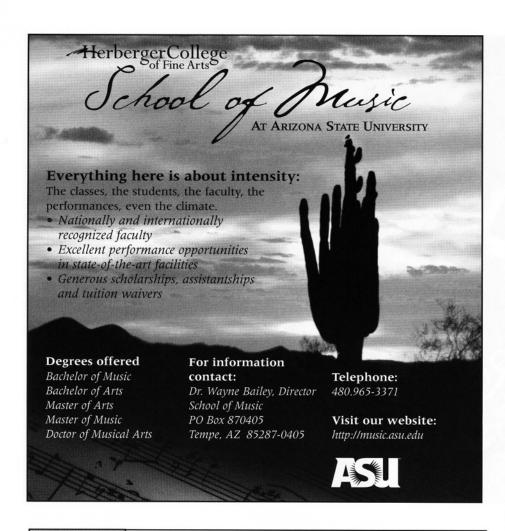
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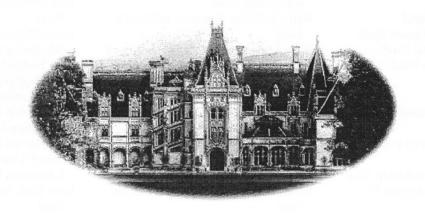
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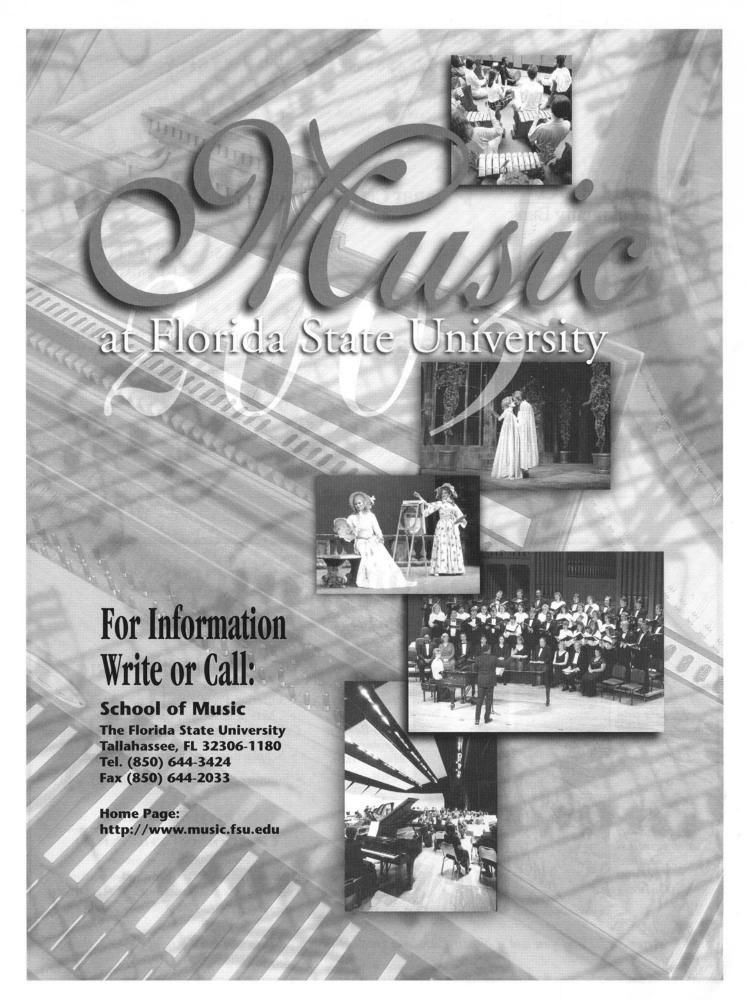
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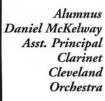
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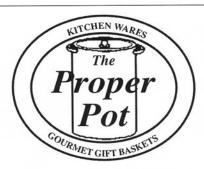
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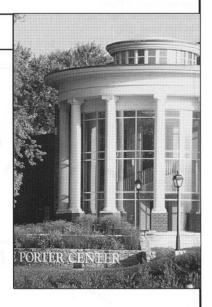
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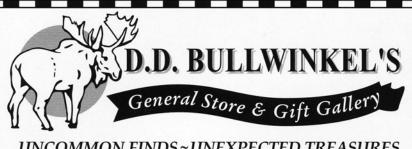
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Brevard Hosts National Federation of Music Clubs

The Brevard Music Center is most grateful to the National Federation of Music Clubs, and particularly those in the Southeast Region, for invaluable encouragement and unwavering support.

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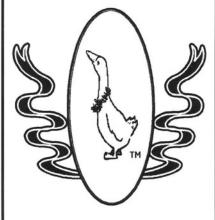
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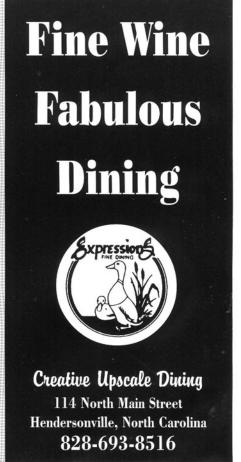
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
