


FROM THE PRESIDENT WELCOME

As this is my last season as artistic director and principal conductor of Brevard Music Center, I often think back on the eleven wonderful years I have been privileged to be part of this organization.

THE ESSENTIAL DAVID EFFRON: A MAESTRO'S LEGACY AT BREVARD 1997-2007

What many patrons see of David Effron is limited to the view of his back as he conducts Brevard Music Center (BMC) summer performances with his usual great energy and verve. As David retires this summer after eleven years as artistic director and

principal conductor of BMC's summer institute and festival, music lovers will remember the skilled conducting and the range and quality of orchestral and operatic programming he

brought to Brevard.

But to know the essential of Maestro Effron, you have to appreciate his connection with the students. They are his reason for being here.

BMC board member Phillip Jerome spoke of the maestro's particular brand of magic with young people. "It's such a joy to watch David rehearse an orchestra. He is totally engaged, and his passion for the music is magnetic. The students are relaxed and yet completely alert. Somehow, when he communicates to the students, it seems as if he's reaching the inner person."

When Effron puts down his baton at BMC for the final time this August, he leaves a legacy unmatched in the history of the Music Center. His own reputation for excellence in musicianship and conducting students has attracted faculty

of the highest caliber, and, together, Effron and his colleagues have drawn the best and brightest young musicians from around the country. During his tenure at Brevard, applications for the summer institute have soared, and, most importantly, the quality of the students has soared as well.

Bruce Murray, the Music Center's artistic administrator and dean, credits Effron with the positive changes. "David attracts students who love to play important works under his

direction. He inspires young people to play at a very high level because he has the knowledge and expertise in working with students. David provides clear directions so they understand what he wants and how he wants them to play. He's among the finest university conductors in the country-if not the finest."

Effron's tremendous impact on young musicians reaches beyond Brevard, said Bill Campbell, head of the trumpet program at the University of Michigan and a six-year veteran of Brevard's faculty. He notes that Effron has taught the basics of excellent orchestral playing to generations of students at stellar music school across the country, as well as at BMC.

Campbell himself benefited from the maestro's teaching some two decades ago when he was a student at the Eastman School of Music. He remembers Effron's special gifts: "It's not just about the music. David's interested in students as people. He took me under his wing, and I'll always be in his debt for that. But I'm not unique. Many of us on the faculty here have experienced David's kindness, and our lives are richer for it." (The tradition of learning under Effron's tutelage has passed to the second generation of Campbells, as his eldest teenage son is now a Brevard student.)

Effron and the Music Center draw praise from another faculty artist and prominent educator, violist Roberto Díaz, a member of the Díaz Trio and president of the Curtis Institute of Music. "The main mission here is to educate young people—and that makes Brevard unique. Many other fine summer music festivals, such as Aspen and Tanglewood, have an educational component, but the concerts are the main thing. At Brevard, it's the education that leads up to the concerts that's important. And that reflects David's philosophy. He focuses on excellent preparation, so the

young musicians are truly ready by performance time. And he gets incredible results while providing a great opportunity for students."

Effron sets the bar high. Pianist Andrew Campbell, a nine-year faculty member and assistant professor at Arizona State University, remarked, "The term 'tough love' is a cliché, but it fits here. David knows what it takes to be a professional performer and he wants his students to have the tools to be successful. He's honest in his feedback and knows that it's a disservice to go easy on the students. At the same time, he's very encouraging."

CAREER COMBINES PERFORMING AND TEACHING

Effron tasted that combination of hard work and encouragement himself when he came to Brevard as a fourteen-year-old piano student in the mid-1950s. He had grown up in a family of professional musicians—his father was concertmaster of the Cincinnati Symphony, and his mother was a pianist—so he was immersed in music from an early age. He remembers seeing his first opera as a child of four or five, and also sat in on numerous rehearsals and performances in Cincinnati. He began violin studies under his father at age five, switching to piano at twelve.

Before his first summer here, the young Effron had led a disciplined and somewhat sheltered life. Coming to Brevard was exciting, he recalled, "a time of discovery and fun. And a modest walk on the wild side!" In the relative freedom of the summer, Effron recalled bending a few rules, like sneaking out of camp with buddies at night and heading to a pool hall in town. And there was the time he "borrowed" a car—never having learned how to drive—with predictable results. But what the conductor remembers most of all was the firm but friendly tutelage of his principal piano teacher, the late Loren Withers. "He was very kind and supportive—a gentle soul."

After high school, the trajectory of Effron's education first took him to the University of Michigan where he began to immerse himself in study and hone his musical skills. Although he assumed that he would forge a career in music as an accompanist, he had long harbored the dream of becoming a conductor. Effron chose Indiana University for his graduate work in piano, in part because of the school's outstanding reputation for opera. While there, he was given his first opportunity to conduct, and the memory remains vivid: "It's a thrill to realize that you do a motion with your hand and out comes a sound [from the orchestra] right back at you."

Although he did not set out on a clear career path to the podium, Effron began to move in that direction after he completed his master's degree at Indiana and won



Former BMC student named as new director

David Effron, the next artistic director at Brevard Music Center, is no stranger to the place.

As a young teen, Effron was a student at the famed music camp, playing timpani in the band and orchestra. "Those were fun days, special summers," he remembered.

This October, he moves into the top artistic spot at BMC, taking over from longtime maestro Henry Janiec, who is retiring.

That connection is one reason Effron took the job, he said. Another is the BMC's "fabulous reputation," he said. "To have the opportunity to work in such an environment, with an established festival, is an honor."

A native of Cincinnati, Effron grew up in a musical family. His father was concertmaster with the Cincinnati Symphony for a quarter of a century and his mother was pianist with the orchestra.

Effron said he has a "really good feeling" coming to Brevard. "Henry (Janiec) is a legend. I know of no one who has been with an organization for such a length of time, and kept it in such good condition. That helps the next guy (taking over) a lot. He's been very gracious in helping me understand the complex workings of this organization. "I'm fortunate to follow someone who has had such an impact."

a Fulbright scholarship to study in Germany. While there, he had the serendipitous opportunity to assist Wolfgang Sawallisch, conductor of the Cologne Opera House. Since then, Effron's career has spanned more than four decades of conducting major symphonies and opera companies throughout North America, Europe and Asia. Last year, he led performances in South Korea.

Effron has always combined conducting and educating. He has trained young people at the most prestigious music schools in the country, including the Curtis Institute of Music and Eastman School of Music. He currently serves as professor of conducting at Indiana University and chairs their conducting department.

As an educator, Effron said he has tried to instill high standards in all the young people he works with and to help them understand the challenges of the profession. "I go beyond and try to teach them about life, as well as music. I think I've helped many people, and that gives me a great deal of satisfaction."

LEADING BMC TO A NEW LEVEL OF EXCELLENCE

Effron's reputation as an outstanding educator and conductor caught the attention of the Brevard Music Center's leadership in 1995, as they began searching for a replacement for Henry Janiec. After more than 30 years as head of the summer institute and festival, Janiec was retiring, and the institution needed a new artistic leader.

Murray recalled Effron's audition. "By chance, I was

the soloist at David's audition concert, when he led the high school orchestra. Before the concert, I remember observing him back stage as he talked to the students. He gave them an inspiring pep talk, and they responded by playing wonderfully."

Of all the candidates who applied for the coveted position at Brevard, Effron was the clear choice, and he accepted the challenge. "I understood my marching orders were to lift the quality of the Music Center and push it to become of national, not just regional, significance."


And, according to a wide range of music professionals, that's exactly the transformation that Effron has brought about during his eleven years at Brevard.

"Clearly, he's attracted some outstanding faculty to Brevard, people who are excellent teachers and performers," said BMC board president, Mitchell Watson. "As a result, David and Bruce have been able to attract a significantly improved quality of students. Plus, the expanded repertoire has drawn both students and concert audiences."

Under the direction of the artistic team, the concert programming has increased both in quality and sophistication. "It's easy to design a program of crowd-pleasing music," said board member Phillip Jerome. "David and Bruce don't do that. Instead, they select programs that are needed to develop successful students. Although David does incorporate some popular performances, he always keeps in mind that BMC is an educational facility first and foremost."

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As an example, five of the nine Mahler symphonies will have been performed in Brevard by the summer's end. Effron also launched an advanced chamber music program and introduced innovative contemporary musical theater, such as work by Steven Sondheim. And the opera offerings have been breathtaking, as technical improvements in lighting and set design came to match the high quality of performances.

Not all of the changes were applauded in Effron's first year. A few of the faculty resisted his new approach, while some of the audience disliked the more challenging programs. But Effron had a mandate and he had patience. By the second year, tensions had eased. He recalled, "People realized that I knew what I was doing, and that the changes were for the good of the organization, that I wasn't just on an ego trip."

Every change agent needs supporters, and Effron found two individuals who have become important collaborators and close personal friends. John Candler, the Music Center's president and CEO, is the ideal boss and partner, according to Effron, "We both speak the same language. We're honest and straightforward. I have come to know two things about John: I will never have a more loyal friend—and if I screw up in my job, he'll be the first to tell me! When we disagree, which is rare, the mutual respect is always there."

The other deep friendship is with Bruce Murray. The two have collaborated closely on developing curriculum and the hiring of faculty and guest artists, conferring daily by phone during the academic year. For both men, the mission to raise the quality of the Music Center is an intense, ongoing commitment. Murray declared, "David has a very old-school ethic about his role here. He comes for the entire summer and wants to conduct everything. He gets absolutely and completely invested in the projects and the place."

CAMARADERIE AND MUSICAL EXCELLENCE DRAW ACCLAIMED GUEST ARTISTS

Effron has also made his mark by bringing world-class guest performers to Brevard. Artists such as violinist Joshua Bell, pianist André Watts, sopranos Renée Fleming and Deborah Voigt, as well as other musical superstars, have come to perform in this picturesque setting. Initially drawn by their connections with Effron, once here, many are "hooked" and wish to return. Effron believes "they sense the spirit of this place and are moved by the hospitality of so many people."

He added, "Some first-time guest artists are surprised the artistic level is so high. Others are surprised at what a great time they have here playing music. They value the trust and camaraderie they find at Brevard. That's what keeps them coming back."

"I am very fortunate to have played both Brahms Piano Concerti with David at the Brevard Music Center. In those two visits, I witnessed and appreciated the wonderful work he has done there. He is a committed and inspiring musician and devoted music-lover at the same time."

Camaraderie, yes-but also the professional satisfaction of playing music under Effron's direction.

André Watts (who performs two Beethoven piano concerti July 8) praises Effron's conducting. "He has an absolute commitment to the music at hand. There's no dodging. He's just so fantastic-he knows the music and the practicalities of conducting a piece, but he takes it to a higher plane. Playing under David's direction is almost beyond time and space."

As a celebrity who first came to Brevard because of his friendship with Effron, Watts acknowledged, "It's a special blessing when you form a friendship with a person you respect so much. I have a wonderful time at Brevard-and a lot of that has to do with David. He's the reason I'm coming back, and I'm glad to be part of his last season."

Timothy Adams, timpanist with the Pittsburgh Symphony and head of the percussion department at Carnegie-Mellon

University, has been a faculty artist for ten summers at Brevard. He remarked on David's confidence and skill in working with musicians, especially in opera. "He's very clear and knows the scores well. There's just a high level of consistency in the quality of his conducting, both in rehearsals and performances."

Angela Brown, the celebrated soprano who won rave reviews as Aida in her 2004 Metropolitan Opera debut,

also applauds Effron's skills as a conductor. "He is a singer's conductor-one who's very giving to singers." She recalled his contributions to her interpretation of Tosca when she sang the role for the first time. "The main character has a dynamic personality, but the singing is very lyrical. David helped me understand that complexity." She also noted that he understands the importance of breath and how to articulate the words. "He makes it easy for the singer and, at the same time, puts on a stellar show."

A NEW CHAPTER BEGINS

Glorious as the eleven Brevard summers have been. Effron decided three years ago that it was time to step down. He was ready to moderate the demanding pace of his professional life at Brevard and Indiana. He promised John Candler and the board that he would give them enough time to thoroughly search for a successor. (Keith Lockhart was chosen last year to succeed Effron and begins his first season as artistic advisor this October.)

Effron acknowledged that he will miss being in the trenches and seeing how future summer programs unfold. "You don't give up a position like this easily. There are more things that I wanted to do here-but I realized I could say that for the next hundred years!" With the approaching summer, his final season at the helm, Effron has mixed feelings, "Of course there's some sadness. You can't be associated with a wonderful place like this for so many years and not feel sad at leaving. Still, at my age (he will be 69 this summer), I have the desire not to work twelve months every year and am looking forward to

new opportunities and challenges—even if that challenge is doing nothing! I'm a workaholic by nature, so this will be a big change."

So, in the summer of 2008, for the first time in more than a decade, Effron and his wife, Arlene (his number one fan and a familiar presence at the Music Center), will have their summers free. Plans? Effron mused, "Travel-maybe to Australiareading, taking in the home games of the Cincinnati Reds. organizing a career's-worth of photographs. For the first summer, I want to take it easy and have the freedom to do what I want to do-even if that means hanging out and looking up at the sky."

ACCOLADES ABOUND


When friends and colleagues try to define what's unique about David Effron, they tend to speak in superlatives. People speak of his passion and commitment, his personal warmth and his giving nature.

"He's a renaissance man," said Andrew Campbell. "He can do symphonies and opera back-to-back, and both at a very high level. One summer, he was directing an opera, a symphony, a conducting workshop and a recital at which he played-all within five days!"

Campbell added, "He also has a great zest for life. He's hospitable and warm. He understands that a lot of work involves blood, sweat and tears. But then, he can go out and still have a good time."

Steve Cohen, a 29-year faculty artist and associate professor of clarinet at Northwestern University, remarked on Effron's open, straightforward nature. "David is a great guy with no pretense at all. What you see with David is what you get, and you always

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know where you stand with him."

Effron's many friends appreciate his talent as a raconteur, with a story for every situation. And his sense of humor is legendary. His jokes and mischievous side endear him to all. "Laughter is one of David's special gifts," said André Watts.

Virtually everyone comments on Effron's prodigious energy and oldschool values. "He has the right ethics," said Bruce Murray. "Music is what matters—not money, not self-aggrandizement. At the same time," Murray continued, "David is so caring about everyone. He's like a counselor, a big uncle, the go-to guy. He wants people to do their best and he wants them to be happy."

Effron's personal connection with students is invaluable, said Nancy Glass, a board member who chairs the education committee. "One

of the most remarkable things about David is that he really 'gets' the possibility that the close relationship between students and teachers can have a transformative power in the student's life—that spending time with the students, talking about music or life, positively influences these young people. Encouragement, support, commitment to high standards, professionalism, learning to work together, passion for music—all of these 'lessons' carry over into the students' lives, whether they continue in music or not. David creates these opportunities for young people, and he cares deeply about what happens to them. The music is the vehicle, the power that draws them together, but the real value is in the relationships and mentoring."

In fact, that kind of experience is one of the goals Effron set early on in his tenure at Brevard. "I believe that nurturing a young person is the greatest gift you can give. When I came here, I thought it was important that young musicians learn on all levels, and not just about music, but also to develop an awareness and sensitivity to other people. I've wanted people—faculty and students—who come to Brevard to feel that it's more than a job, more than a place. I think that building community and camaraderie is as important as the music education, and I've tried to be a role model for that."

The maestro's final word on his experience at Brevard? "I've never had a job as memorable as this one. It has changed my life. It certainly helped my career, but more important, it's given me an opportunity to create a positive environment where trust and friendship flourish."

I met David Effron in 1995 at Brevard. We collaborated on the Grieg piano concerto. I'd known him by reputation, of course, but it turned out we had many mutual friends. Perhaps his reputation as a fire-breathing tyrant of the podium was overblown. We hit it off pretty well, and it must have been good, because he invited me to once again play the Grieg with him this summer on opening night.

I began working year round at Brevard in 2003 as the artistic administrator and dean. Since then, I have spoken to David almost every weekday, as we've endeavored to keep the ship afloat. We have issues from time to time—he gets upset, I get upset—but we make up. We agree and disagree on many things, but hold some very important things in common. For example, we both get excited about great music and great performances. And in the music business, we prefer to concentrate on the "artistic" side, as opposed to the "business" side—the politics, the marketing, the buying and selling. We always aim to do better every time we plan for or walk onto the stage, no matter how old we get.


Whatever his biological age, David has the spirit of a ten-year-old. He is fond of inventing jokes, and if you laugh at one, it's sheer bliss for him, as if he'd won the lottery. David is a straight shooter and straight talker. Simply ask the dean at Indiana University how often Effron has spoken aloud what everyone else in the room was silently thinking.

David's warmth and sheer humanity have affected countless students who have remained devoted to him throughout their careers. He is one of my closest friends, a mentor, a sounding board and someone I trust. I love him like the big brother I never had (if the big brother I never had were both brilliant and a little over the edge). David thinks I'll never call him after his retirement from Brevard. He's wrong.

"When I was eight or nine, a traveling teacher gave a presentation to my third grade class, introducing instruments of the orchestra. I was at that age when boys like big things—dinosaurs and dump trucks—and I told my parents I wanted to play the bass. They wanted me to try the violin, but I insisted on the bass. I began playing the next year."

Current positions: principal bass of the Houston Symphony; associate professor of double bass at Rice University's Shepherd School of Music; principal bass of the Mainly Mozart Festival for the past twelve summers

Former positions: member of the Cleveland Orchestra (1985-92); faculty member of the Oberlin Conservatory; principal bass of the Boston Pops Esplanade Orchestra and Handel and Haydn Society

Early education: "Believe it or not, back in high school, I had string class every day in the Greenville public school system, as well as advanced placement in music history. When I was a junior and senior, I used to drive a school bus with about five other kids from our high school to a fine arts center where we studied music during the afternoons. Other kids went to vocational school to learn carpentry and mechanics; I studied the bass."

Degree: Bachelor's of Music from the New England Conservatory of Music in 1981

Principal teachers: Lawrence Wolfe and Edwin Barker

Recent highlights: United States premiere of John Harbison's Concerto for Bass Viol and Orchestra with Houston Symphony; Houston performance of Bottesini's Gran Duo Concertante with violinist and BMC alumnus Robert McDuffie

"My first chamber music experience was at the arts high school. There was no cellist, so I was put into a quartet to fill the role. We had this really harsh teacher, very demanding, and he assigned us Schubert's "Death and the Maiden" for our first concert. It must have sounded horrible, but he made us do it."

Family: wife, violinist Kathleen Winkler; daughters Nina (age nine) and Kiri (age six) are adopted from China and both study cello

BMC: 1974, '75, '76

BMC memory: "In August of 1975, I attended a performance at Brevard of the Shostakovich Fifth Symphony. The thunder and lightning were so severe during the concert that we could barely hear the music. The next morning, we learned of Shostakovich's death the night of the concert. Very eerie!"

BMC's influence: "I believe that being surrounded by all of the great teachers and performances at Brevard at such an early age gave me an enormous head start toward achieving my musical goals."

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2007 DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD

CAROL WINCENC



Flutist Carol Wincenc is the recipient of the 2007 Distinguished Alumni Award. One of today's international stars of the flute, Wincenc has appeared as soloist with major orchestras around the world and has premiered works written for her by many of today's most prominent composers.


Wincenc is deeply committed to expanding the flute repertoire. Telarc released her

world premiere recording of a flute concerto by Pulitzer Prizewinning composer Christopher Rouse. She gave the world premiere of Gorecki's Concerto-Cantata and has subsequently performed the work in England, France and Poland, recording it for Nonesuch. She has also commissioned concerti by Peter Schickele, Joan Tower, Paul Schoenfield and Tobias Picker.

As a result of her fascination with the flute and its family of instruments, Wincenc created and directed a series of international flute festivals at the Ordway Theatre in Saint Paul, Minnesota. The overwhelming success of these festivals—which featured such diverse artists as Jean-Pierre Rampal and Herbie Mann—led to a sold-out United States tour.

Wincenc was first prize winner of the Walter W. Naumberg Solo Flute Competition and is presently professor of flute at The Juilliard School of Music. Carl Fisher published the first in a series of Carol Wincenc Signature Editions which feature her favorite flute repertoire. She resides in New York City with her husband and son.

As a featured guest artist on BMC's 2007 Chamber Music Series, Wincenc presents a flute recital on Monday, July 2, at the Porter Center for Performing Arts. Her program includes music by Poulenc, Bach, Enesco, Debussy and Varese.





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
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ANDRÉ WATTS HOLDS THE 2007 GINA BACHAUER ARTIST CHAIR



A NIGHT (AND MANY DAYS) AT THE OPERA

When the curtain goes up on the opening night of an opera production, here at Brevard or anywhere else in the world, it represents the culmination of days of hard work. Even the smallest production requires the active participation of many artists. Each of these individuals has a set of goals, a special focus and their own idea of what will make the best production.

As you can imagine, whenever so many people are working toward several goals, there must be a team leader. In sports, we generally acknowledge the coach to be that person, and in opera, it is the stage director. If you have ever wondered what stage directors really do, the answer is this: they provide a plan (call it a "game plan" if you like) so that the talented people who sing or play music, design, build and do the myriad other tasks can

agree on a common goal and focus their efforts on achieving it. You might say that each new production is similar to preparing for the big game.

For us at Brevard, this process begins many weeks before students and faculty arrive on campus. Decisions such as what operas to perform and whom to cast in various roles happen months before curtain time. As soon as these decisions have been made, the production team (the more than twenty people who work backstage to bring the opera to visual reality) meets with the stage director to develop a unified idea of how the opera should look and feel.

Once the summer season begins, everyone—singers, musicians and production staff—gather and work an average of twelve hours per day for two intensive weeks prior to the actual performance. It is a challenge every participant accepts gladly, for it is our profession, our passion and, most importantly, our privilege to present each Brevard Music Center production to you.


Below is a typical day for the opera production staff:

Carpenters are in full swing building sets. The stage crew sets the first of four orchestra rehearsals for the day. On an opera performance night, rehearsals are set offstage, with the crew also helping with the evening's production.

9 am Scenic artists paint set pieces, prop artists build props and costumers make alterations for each singer's wardrobe.

10 am Stage managers run rehearsals, using notes from directors to communicate changes and additions to the design staff.

2 pm Electricians prepare lights, gels and build any special effects needed for the production.

Destined to rule England, the noble Arthur builds a magical kingdom with the assistance of the Knights of the Round Table, only to be ruined by the devious Mordred and betrayal of his beloved wife Guenevere with her lover Sir Lancelot. The memorable score makes this a timeless classic. Sung in English.

Puccini's La Bohème

An audience favorite, *La Bohème* takes us to the impoverished garrets and cheap cafés of 18th-century Paris. Follow the lives of Bohemian artists as they sing their way through friendship, jealousy, romance and passion. The soaring arias and spectacular score are sure to touch the hearts of all. Sung in Italian with English titles.



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
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
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NATIONAL FEDERATION OF MUSIC CLUBS



SOUTHEAST REGION

The National Federation of Music Clubs (NFMC) Southeast Region has held its annual meeting at the Brevard Music Center since 1948. Members participate in a weekend of conferences and performance. NFMC is an organization dedicated to music education and the promotion of creative and performing arts in the United States. Its American Music Program is dedicated to providing scholarships and awarding monies to talented American performers and composers, encouraging performance of American musical works. Each summer, the Music Center presents a concert in memory of Hinda Honigman who served as president of NFMC from 1967 to 1971 and as a BMC trustee from 1966 to 1985.

The Brevard Music Center has a close relationship with the National Federation of Music Clubs, especially the clubs of the Southeast Region. In 2005, the BMC Board of Trustees established a new *ex-officio* position to the BMC board for

the Vice President in Charge of the Southeastern Region of NFMC. Dr. Mabry Miller fills that position today.

INNA FALIKS, PIANO

As a first place winner of the 1999 National Federation of Music Clubs Competition, Ukrainianborn pianist Inna Faliks returns to Brevard for her second solo appearance at the Music Center. She gave her professional debut with the Chicago Symphony at



age fifteen and made her Carnegie Hall debut in 2000. She was recently awarded the Pro Musicis International Award and grand prize at the 2005 Saint Charles International Piano Competition. Season highlights include a duet recital with cellist Colin Carr, solo concerts at the Music Institute of Chicago and an appearance on WNYC radio's "Spotlight" series. Faliks regularly shares her playing with various communities such as the Jewish Guild for the Blind, Salvation Army, Red Cross and a number of public schools. She currently pursues an artist diploma at the Accademia Pianistica Internazionale in Imola, Italy, and a doctorate at the University of New York at Stonybrook.

Faliks performs on this year's Hinda Honigman Memorial Concert the Ravel Piano Concerto for Left Hand with the Repertory Symphony Orchestra on July 13.



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CHAMBER MUSIC AT BREVARD

Nearly all of the 384 students and 68 faculty artists who bring to life the Brevard Music Center each summer participate in some form of chamber music activity. For an aspiring young artist, chamber music can be an important part of the overall learning experience. It teaches group collaboration, and with only one instrument or voice per part, the musician is far more exposed than in a section of a 100-piece orchestra or 40-member opera chorus.


Students may choose to be assigned to a chamber ensemble for the summer, receive coaching from a faculty artist and then perform on a student concert. Each year, more than 50 groups are formed. Instrumental students may form a trio or quartet, and vocal students are paired with a collaborative pianist to prepare works from the art song repertoire. And in the evening, it is not unusual to see friends get together, a stack of music in hand, for a few hours of reading—just for fun.

Chamber music is an intimate experience for all those involved, from the musicians to the listener, and at Brevard Music Center, there are numerous chamber outlets for students, faculty and patrons to enjoy. One can attend such free events as the Bach's Lunch series, Transylvania County Library series, art song recitals and afternoon faculty chamber concerts at the Porter Center. One can also hear such BMC ensembles as I Solisti di Brevard (a Baroque chamber orchestra) and *itch* (a new music group).



2007 CHAMBER MUSIC SERIES

The eleven-concert Chamber Music Series, held at the acoustically acclaimed 700-seat Porter Center for Performing Arts at Brevard College, includes a Romantic Piano Trio concert, an All-American program and a Percussion and Improvisation recital. It also showcases world-class guest artists, including violinists William Preucil and Andrés Cardénes, violist Roberto Díaz, cellists Andrés Díaz and Evelyn Elsing, flutist Carol Wincenc and hornist Gail Williams. The series concludes with a perennial favorite among chamber music lovers, BMC's resident Baroque orchestra, I Solisti di Brevard, performing an all-Bach program.





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





Each summer, the Brevard Music Center features world-renowned guest artists for performance and teaching. In addition, select entertainers are invited to appear at the Music Center on a Variations Concert, named as such because these performances are a variation on the core classical programs presented throughout the season. Variations concerts play an important role in supporting the organization's mission, as all proceeds from these concerts benefit BMC educational programs.




Mark O'Connor's Appalachia Waltz July 10 at 8 pm • \$20-\$30

ENSEMBLES OF BMC

The **Brevard Music Center Orchestra** is the flagship ensemble, led by Artistic Director and Principal Conductor David Effron. The BMC Orchestra performs nearly every Sunday afternoon and sometimes on Friday or Saturday evenings. The majority of the Music Center's instrumental faculty perform in the ensemble, leading sections of advanced students. The BMC Orchestra is also the central ensemble for all operas, musicals and pops concerts.

Students in the Music Center's Advanced Division (college age and older) comprise the **Repertory Symphony Orchestra**. Most string students participate in the RSO for the entire summer, while wind and percussion players rotate in and out. The RSO is the ensemble for BMC's annual student concerto concert and the annual National Federation of Music Clubs concert. Steven Smith is the RSO conductor.

High school age students, part of the Music Center's Young Artists' Division, make up the **Transylvania Symphony Orchestra**. String students participate in the TSO for the entire summer, and wind and percussion players rotate in and out. Members of the BMC artist faculty perform as soloists with the TSO, and the orchestra also presents the annual free Young Person's Concert. Thomas Joiner leads the TSO.

The Janiec Opera Company continues the Music Center's long tradition of presenting opera during the summer. Named after former music director Henry Janiec, the JOC is comprised of 40 young vocalists selected by audition from

hundreds of applicants. Each summer, they present three full opera productions and one musical. The JOC also features a full production staff of set and costume designers, make-up specialists, stage managers and crew.

High school students make up the **Transylvania Symphonic Band**. Wind and percussion students perform in the TSB when they are not appearing with the Transylvania Symphony Orchestra. The TSB performs on the annual Patriotic Pops Concert during the July 4 weekend. Kraig Williams leads the TSB.


I Solisti di Brevard, founded in 2004, is the Music Center's string chamber orchestra. Members are drawn from the Young Artists' Division, selected by audition after the third week of the summer. They perform a concert of Baroque music with faculty soloists during the final week of the season.

The **BMC Jazz Ensemble** makes its debut this summer performing a concert of jazz standards from the Basie era. Members come from BMC's student body and are selected by audition. Rich Willey is the ensemble's director.

Transylvania Symphony Orchestra cello section in rehearsal; the TSO is made up entirely of students from the Young Artists' Division

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
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

BMC PIANO COMPETITION

The annual piano competition is sponsored by The Zimmerli Foundation. BMC trustee emeritus Kurt Zimmerli and his wife, Nelly, have been supportive of the organization over many years, building facilities, establishing endowments and making generous contributions. The piano competition is open to all full-session pianists. Students compete with a solo program of their choice, lasting 30 to 40 minutes in length containing repertoire chosen from at least three style periods. Finalists

compete publicly on July 29. The winners are announced at the end of the public concert, with five cash prizes awarded totaling \$7,000 and full scholarships to Brevard for the following summer.

JAN AND BEATTIE WOOD CONCERTO COMPETITION

In 2001, third generation BMC trustee Beattie Wood and his wife, Jan, were recognized for their continued support of the Music Center with the naming of the annual concerto competition and concert. Any full-session instrumental student is eligible to compete by selecting a concerto movement from an approved repertoire list and performing it from memory with piano accompaniment before a panel of judges. The final round on July 15 is free and open to the public. Winners will receive scholarships to the 2008 institute and festival, as well as the opportunity to perform with orchestra July 27.

PENDERGRAST FAMILY PATRIOTIC POPS

The Pendergrast Family Patriotic Pops Concert was named in honor of a magnanimous gift to the BMC's endowment fund by Dr. William Pendergrast and his late wife Martha. The couple's contribution to the Music Center also included the establishment of four family-named faculty chairs, as well as a chair honoring Henry Janiec, artistic director emeritus. The Pendergrast children and grandchildren have been students at BMC. The annual Patriotic Pops concert celebrates America's Independence Day with a rousing program of live band music. This year's concert, held July 1, features Tchaikovsky's 1812 Overture, complete with real cannons!

Together, the couple became well known art collectors, and Mrs. Love donated

many of their best pieces to museums in her husband's memory after his death in 1973.


