# Transportation Plans

Society Chairman Carolyn Parlato recently appointed Ann Reed to serve as Chairman of a committee to study traffic problems within the Historic District. The committee will report its findings to the Board and will prepare recommendations to the City of Raleigh. Ms. Reed suggested at a recent Board Meeting that a preliminary analysis has revealed the following problems, goals and means:

#### A. Problems

- 1. Excessive traffic noise
- 2. Dangerous streets & intersections
- 3. Vibrations caused by large trucks

#### B. Goals

 The goal of the committee is to promote Oakwood as a quiet and peaceful residential community with a village atmosphere.

# C. Means

- 1. A 25 m.p.h. speed limit
- 2. 4-way stops at all streets except Person Street
- 3. Ban on thru traffic for trucks
- 4. Convert Jones & Lane Streets to two-way streets within the District

Ms. Reed further stated that Oakwood has qualities peculiar to it which make necessary certain distinctions from general residential traffic laws. These differences include the following facts;

- 1. Residential districts normally are not so near a major business area and thus do not have the excess of through traffic experienced in owkwood.
- 2. Residential districts normally have wide streets without excessive on-street parking.

- 3. Residential districts normally do not have old homes constructed from materials which are affected by excessive vibrations from heavy and fast traffic as are found in Oakwood.
- 4. Residential districts normally do not have excessive traffic of large trucks as experienced in Oakwood.
- 5. Residential districts normally include houses which are farther from the streets, in contemplation of traffic noise unlike Oakwood, which was constructed in an era when transportation was less noisy.
- 6. Oakwood is, unlike other residential areas, designated as historic in an attempt to save an inner-city residential district, and thus aids in the revitalization of downtown Raleigh. Certain distinctions must be allowed to achieve the image of Oakwood as a peaceful district in which to maintain a residence.

From a vacant lot to a neighborhood park! Plans are underway to develop the small lot on Oakwood Avenue at Linden Avenue directly in front of the entrance to Oakwood Cemetery.
