President's Message

On Tuesday, February 4th at 6:30 PM, the City Council will hold a public hearing on the petition submitted in December 2002 by Peace College and the Raleigh Housing Authority (RHA) to close a section of E. Franklin St and Harp St.

Please let your views be heard. Call the City Council at 890-3050. Leave a message for Mayor Meeker, the At – large Council members and our district representative James West. Attend the Hearing next Tuesday even if you do not plan to speak. Share this information with a friend and neighbor.

Maps showing the proposed closing and recent developments in the area are enclosed and may be found in color at the SPHO web site, www.historicoakwood.com.

The SPHO Board of Directors voted unanimously to oppose closure at its regular monthly meeting on January 9, 2003. "The Society for the Preservation of Historic Oakwood (SPHO) is concerned about plans to permanently alter the historic grid pattern of downtown Raleigh by closing a section of Franklin street between Blount and Halifax Streets. The neighborhood is also concerned about the negative effects of this closure on traffic patterns through and around our neighborhood as well as the Mordecai neighborhood. We also believe that this section of street is an important connector between our business district on Person Street and the Semart warehouse business district. Therefore, we oppose the closure of the street. If mitigating strategies that address these concerns are proposed, we will consider them."

The streets to be closed are shown on the Overview Map of the area. This map shows the several new developments that, when complete, will result in more than 2,000 people living, working, shopping, attending school or recreating in the area immediately surrounding the two streets. These developments include: Pilot Mill tenants including the Raleigh Charter High School, Alien Skin Software, EcoScience Corporation.

- Pilot Mill Village new homes now under construction ez of Pilot Mill.
- The new Capitol Park neighborhood including Park View Manor senior housing, day care and community centers.
- Redevelopment of the Seamart warehouses next to Loga Trading Company.
- Revitalizing the business and retail spaces near the intersection of N. Person St and E. Franklin St.
- The Raleigh Housing Authority offices.
- The future increases in Peace College enrollment.

The current Raleigh Comprehensive Plan and the RHA Capitol Park Plan show Franklin and Harp streets remaining open. The Peace College Master Plan encloses Franklin and Harp Streets within its enlarged campus borders. One block of Harp St is eliminated. The westernmost block of Franklin St will be replaced (and blocked) by several new buildings and a courtyard.

No information has been provided by Peace College, the Raleigh Housing Authority (RHA) or the City of Raleigh about the impact of the proposed closures of Franklin St and Harp St on existing neighborhoods and future developments. No alternatives have been evaluated. Only one alternative has been suggested. The City Transportation Department recommends opening a new public street if City Council approves the request.

The Mordecai Community Citizens' Advisory Council (CAC) voted unanimously to "oppose the petition to close portions of Franklin St and Harp St until further information is available on which to base a sound decision."

The North End Destination Project also opposes closure in a motion adopted January 22nd. The Project, formed in 2001, is a coalition of neighborhood groups, business and property owners, developers, Peace College and others who want to promote the economic development and neighborhood linkages in the area, just north of Peace Street, that extends from the Logan Trading Post eastward to the shops along Person Street. One participant voted against the motion. Peace College abstained.

Raleigh Historic District Commission

Oakwood is one of five Raleigh Historic Districts designated by City Council. City code provides that any exterior change to a house or lot within the boundaries of the Oakwood Historic District must be done in conformance with the Design Guidelines for Raleigh Historic District. Property owners or occupants must receive a Certificates of Appropriateness (COA) from the Raleigh Historic Districts Commission before beginning work. This includes smaller projects like paint color changes or construction, additions or parking lots. Minor work items can be submitted any time and are approved by staff within 10 working days; major projects go to the COA Committee for review at their monthly hearing. The commission staff is available to help property owners design appropriate projects. 



High Speed Chases

A meeting was held at the home of Ransom Creech, with concerned neighbors and the RPD concerning the high speeds reached by a stolen car and the police, through Oakwood, reaching speeds of over 80 mph. Other issues mentioned were the daily speeding though Oakwood, the possibility of more stops, more lights or even speed bumps. The issue of the "pursuit" has been addressed by speaking with the officers, putting out a memo to the whole dept., and by asking the training center to stress the policy on pursuits in class. Speed checks were set up on three streets one week and on two other streets a few weeks later. I have requested that they return at another time to set up the speed checks during the late afternoon/evening hours. The other issues are being considered by their transportation/traffic division.

New Police Districts

On Tuesday, 1-21-03, I attended an open house to explain/celebrate the new "Downtown District" of the RPD. This was simply a brief, "get to know you" meeting, which I will follow up with a visit to the new station house located at 221 South Wilmington Street. What I can tell you now is very encouraging. The police chief stated that s was her 1st priority, along with her captains and other officers, to make downtown a safe place to come and enjoy and LIVE. Raleigh has been divided up into "districts" with station houses being set up in the districts. This will mean closer, more personal responses in each area. One of the most positive changes that I can see for Oakwood will be that our whole neighborhood will be covered by one group of the RPD, not divided in two, as before. I will let you know of other changes/information.

Help!

Last, but not least, I would like to ask for your support, and 2-3 volunteers to help on the safety committee. I find that although crime has dropped dramatically in Oakwood since last spring, our better communication and willingness to ask questions and pass along information, has led to more, less serious, but important still, issues arising such as street lights out, loose dogs, suspicious activities etc., which I find that I can not fulfill to the degree that I want, alone. Please consider volunteering for this occasionally frustrating, but ALWAYS rewarding effort in our neighborhood.

Exciting Challenges for Our Neighborhood. Seamart Development Moving Ahead!

The good news is that the redevelopment of the Seamart warehouses near Logan's is moving ahead – with community involvement. After fall meetings with the Mordecai CAC and the North End Destination Project, the developers went back to the drawing board, looking for new ideas when those they first presented, did not meet with enthusiasm. The new plans will be presented at the next North End meeting on Wednesday, May 7th at 7 pm. at 5 West Franklin Street in one of the warehouses. Retail, restaurants and possibly a grocery store are the likely candidates for the redevelopment.

This will be an important opportunity for the developers to receive further input from the community surrounding these buildings! Renovation of some of the properties is imminent!

Kiss This Street Goodbye!

The bad news is that the City Council voted 5-2, with the Mayor as the deciding vote, on April 2nd to close Franklin and Harp Streets after a 3-month battle with small businesses and neighbors against Peace College and the Raleigh Housing Authority. James West and Benson Kirkman voted against closing. The streets are not likely to close until Delway Street, one block to the north of Franklin, is constructed in an effort to replace lost connectivity when Franklin and Harp streets close. There is a discussion underway about appealing the decision.

But there's even some good news embedded in the bad. Issues that are important to the vitality of Person Street are now understood by the City Council as well as the Transportation and Planning departments. Issues such as Blount and Person streets becoming two-way, resolution of parking issues on Person Street, and allowing pedestrian access through the Peace campus, are just a few issues that will now be discussed. These issues will move forward because our community is working hard toward a thriving business district.

Why not come out on May 7th and see what's happening in the North End.

And to those already involved in the North End or the Community Development Committee, thanks for all your work!

"Pink Truck" Trash Pick Up Wednesday May 14th.

The pink truck is not actually a "pink truck", but it is a once a year curbside trash pick up service. Please have items out at curb by 7:30am. Place items at curbside to be picked up by truck crane. Do NOT place items under low trees or overhead lines.

Items that WILL BE picked up include: air conditioners, bathroom fixtures, clothes dryers, dishwashers, furniture, mattresses and springs, refrigerators, sinks, stoves, TVs, water heaters, wood scraps and other ready to discard items. Yard waste must be separated from household items and must be in clear bags as usual. Please





Once again, our July 4th parade and picnic was a great success thanks to Jean Earp and the many others who worked hard so the rest of us could kick back and enjoy the music, food and friends. During the festivities, three special individuals were recognized with awards for outstanding service to our neighborhood. See the article on page three describing the contributions Lisa Finaldi, Darla Brown and Alan Gray have made in making Oakwood such a great neighborhood in which to live.

Franklin and Harp Streets Update

SPHO and its neighbors in Mordecai and Oakdale, as well as businesses along Person Street, the Seaboard Warehouse District and Pilot Mills, have banded together to appeal the impending closing of East Franklin and Harp Streets. In April, the City Council voted to allow the closing.

While we all want and support Peace College's anticipated growth, our opposition to the decision to close Franklin and Harp Streets is that it accommodates Peace

College to the detriment of surrounding neighborhoods and businesses whose long-term prospects for growth and revitalization depend upon pedestrian and vehicular connectivity. Our coalition of neighborhoods and businesses has filed a lawsuit against Peace College, the City of Raleigh and the Raleigh Housing Authority appealing the decision to close the street. Such an appeal process is part of state law.

To date, the SPHO Board of Directors has approved spending \$3,300 to support this appeal. Private individuals and businesses have contributed substantially more, but even more is needed. If you're interested in contributing to this effort, please contact Lisa Finaldi (834-8086) or Jean Earp (832-6420).

Oakwood, its immediate neighbors and nearby businesses are at the cusp of enjoying an extraordinary opportunity for growth and we want to work together constructively with Peace College in achieving our common goals. What Peace College and our coalition do agree on is that restoring two-way traffic to Person and Blount Streets will benefit us all. Peace has proposed building a new cross street just south of the Housing Authority's new headquarters building, but refuses to consider making this street and its parking public. Peace also refuses to consider allowing any permanent pedestrian access across the present Franklin Street corridor.

A suggestion -- next Saturday, grab lunch at the Seaboard Cafe at Logan's. Go by car. Next week, walk around the north end of the Peace campus and assume that Franklin Street is closed and that Peace College also has closed their now enlarged campus to pedestrian traffic.

When you get near Logan's, note the already large number of people and parked cars. Imagine how many more will be there once the Seaboard Station is developed. Seaboard Station will be a new commercial and retail hub of downtown, with many shops, restaurants and service businesses located there. Note the homes just being completed as part of Capital Park and Pilot Mill Village, the community center, senior center, a daycare center under construction and the proposed improvements to the Halifax Center. All will add more vehicle and pedestrian traffic from throughout Raleigh.

The potential lost connectivity is more than the minor inconvenience Peace College says it is. Remember, the only reason Oakwood is intact today is because a group of people came together and fought against overwhelming odds to keep a north-south superhighway from dividing the neighborhood forever. The very fabric of our community, its growth and its future are built on linkages and connectivity, not on walls and isolation.

The North End Destination Project

September 3rd meeting At the three representatives from the Triangle Transit Authority discussed the status and station plans for the system that should begin construction in 2004, and begin running in late 2007. The first stage of development will run from Durham to the Raleigh State Government Station, which will be located behind the Afghan Roofing building just west of where Capital Boulevard becomes Dawson Street, at the intersection with Lane Street. The other downtown Raleigh station will be in the location now occupied by the warehouses just across the street from Jullian's and in the next block south. Local funding sources are in place for these stations. A third downtown station site, near Pilot Mill, has been identified for study; however, the site is not included in current plans to extend the system to North Raleigh.

Expanding the railroad bridge across Peace Street was identified as one way to provide pedestrian and bike access from Logan's and the neighborhoods north of Peace Street. This and other access issues need to be addressed in the coming year, working with the city and the TTA. Maps showing the station locations will be included in the next newsletter.

Please come to the next meeting on Wednesday, October 1st, at which the Raleigh Department of Transportation will be meeting with us to discuss the feasibility of creating two way streets on Person and Blount, as well as addressing parking regulations in the Person Street business district that make it difficult for businesses to locate there. The October meeting will be held from 7:00 - 8:30 p.m. at the new Parkview Manor Senior Center on Delway and Blount Streets. All are welcome and encouraged to attend what should be a very informative session. For information, contact Lisa Finaldi, 834-8086.

The North End Destination Project

The next meeting of the North End Destination Project is scheduled for Wednesday, November 5th, 7:00 p.m. at Parkview Manor, 911 N. Blount Street. All are welcome to attend. Currently, we are working with the city to study the feasibility of opening Blount and Person Streets to two-way traffic from Peace Street north.

At the September meeting, TTA representatives discussed two proposed rail stations serving the downtown Raleigh area. According to the TTA:

Station No. 12 - Downtown Raleigh

As a gateway to the Capital City, this station, located partially below Hargett Street near West Street, will connect residents and visitors to downtown and foster opportunities for more housing, restaurants and entertainment.

No. 13 - State Government Center

State government employees will be able to use this station to commute to work. Other Triangle residents will be able to access museums, downtown neighborhoods and the Glenwood South area. The station will be located between Harrington Street and Capital Boulevard.

Rail Station Cluster Meetings

TTA also is holding Rail Station Cluster Meetings to preview and discuss station designs and artwork. Upcoming cluster meetings for the Downtown Raleigh and Government Center Stations are scheduled for October 30 and November 20 from 5-8 p.m. at the Raleigh Urban Design Center, Historic Alexander Building (Hargett St.), 133 Fayetteville Street Mall, 1st floor. Children's Committee to Upgrade Playground

Late last year an article was posted in the Oakwood newsletter regarding updating the playground equipment at the Oakwood Common. After several months of communication (and phone tag) with the City of Raleigh and the Parks Department, it has been determined that the current equipment does not meet the newly revised National Consumer Products Safety Commission guidelines. This is a wonderful opportunity to not only redesign the Common area but to purchase new equipment for our ever-burgeoning population of little tikes.

The Parks Department has suggested reconfiguring the new equipment and its location to maximize use of both the shady and sunny areas. An important part of this project is to continue providing a general open area for the community while also updating our recreational space for the children. Unfortunately, due to the limited acreage and the need for open space, the playground equipment will only be able to accommodate the younger children in the neighborhood. The targeted age group would be from infancy to seven years old.

Ideally, the new configurations would accommodate more swings (a mix of traditional belt style and infant swings), and a new, more complex climbing gym with a slide. There may be space for a small "spring" type toy or two. Several volunteers are needed for drafting a configuration of the current park and for developing a few (3?) proposals to submit to the Oakwood Historical Society and the Parks Department. The Parks Department

has indicated that we have creative freedom as long as we have neighborhood support.

Volunteers are also needed to "shop" other city parks and/or the internet for ideas and to approach playground equipment manufacturers for quotes. These manufacturers are eager to assist us with our project if we can give them dimensions and general ideas. They will incorporate the new safety guidelines into their proposals. Undoubtedly, other volunteers will be needed as the project progresses.

So, to all of the parents, grandparents and non-parents(!) who have visited the park and felt that it could benefit from a facelift, THIS IS YOUR OPPORTUNITY TO GET INVOLVED!!! You can help be an integral part of the Oakwood Common re-design, which will benefit all of our young children and our neighborhood.

President's Message

In this column over the past two years, I have commented on the changes -- past and present -- that enable our neighborhood to share an ever-strengthening spirit of community unmatched, I believe, in the Triangle. This spirit derives from and is energized by the diversity of our Oakwood places and people, and by the diversity of our surrounding neighborhoods. Green Living: Raleigh Food Co-op Organizing Drive Takes Off

There's good news for Raleigh-area residents who care about what they eat and where it comes from: An effort is underway to open a new food cooperative that will emphasize organic and sustainably raised local produce. It is a grocery store where everyone can shop, not just members and would join the Triangle area's two other cooperative groceries, the Durham Food Co-op and Weaver Street Market in Carrboro, in offering shoppers an alternative to corporate supermarkets.

"We'd like to have something that's a community gathering place as well as a grocery store," says Uli Gratzl, one of the Raleigh Food Cooperative's organizers.

The organizers' goal is to open the co-op in 2005 in or near Raleigh's downtown. A founding membership campaign drive is currently underway to raise startup capital, and a benefit concert is tentatively scheduled for early December at Kings Barcade in downtown Raleigh.

The idea for a Raleigh co-op arose among Gratzl and others who participated last year in Hilltop Farms' Community-Supported Agriculture (CSA) initiative. The organizers now have a mailing list of more than 400 interested people, and they've sold enough founding membership shares at \$100 per individual or \$150 per household to begin hiring business advisors and consultants. They also have landed their first major sponsorship from an independent local business: Larry's Beans, a fair-trade coffee roaster located in Raleigh's Five Points community.

A Sea Change From Noah's

The Raleigh Food Co-op would not be the first food co-op in North Carolina's Capital City. In 1975, as consumer interest in natural foods burgeoned, a buying club opened that later became Noah's Food Co-op. Noah's operated out of a 500 square-foot space in the back of a building on West Johnson Street until closing in 1996, the victim of a less-than-ideal location, increasing competition from other health-food purveyors, and some serious mismanagement.

Some of the people involved in the current organizing effort also were involved with Noah's. But the model for the new co-op is quite different. Unlike Noah's, for example, it won't rely on volunteers for staffing.

The plan is to structure the operation as an equity-based cooperative corporation, like Weaver Street and many other food co-ops around the country. The people who pay to become members or who work at the store would also be the owners. By purchasing owner shares, or equity, in the organization, members become shareholders. As such, they get to vote in elections for the board of directors and participate in annual ownership meetings.

The owners also would get a discount on select products and classes and workshops sponsored by the coop. And they would get to take advantage of a patronage refund system. If the co-op turns a profit, a percentage of each individual owner's purchases would be refunded at the end of the year.

The organizers are currently recruiting founding members. These members pay their entire ownership share up front and in return receive a store coupon worth 15 percent of their ownership share and a canvas shopping bag embroidered with the words "Raleigh Food Cooperative Founding Owners." These memberships will be available only through next April 22, which is Earth Day.

The Raleigh Food Co-op will include the usual natural-foods store sections: produce, dairy, freezer, baked goods, bulk foods and grocery items such as canned goods and snacks. The organizers hope to eventually include a café/deli, a demonstration kitchen, a local crafts and music section, an information center and a play area for children. They also hope to find a space that includes an outdoor area for community gatherings and live music, like Weaver Street offers.
