



1996 Candlelight and Preview Tour



Capital Trees Program





Neighbors! If you put your trash out on the curb, please try to do this the night before or the morning of the pickup. Make sure to use a sealed container. This will down cut problems with insects or rodents and will prevent bags from tearing open and littering the sidewalk.

Certificate of Appropriateness

When you start planning a renovation project, remember to check with the Historic Districts Commission about a Certificate of Appropriateness (COA). These

certificates ensure that your proposed renovations will preserve the historic nature of our neighborhood. Some recent projects in Raleigh historic districts have proceeded without a COA. This often results in delays, unnecessary hassle, and occasionally in extra expense, to the owner.

Those of us who have lived in Oakwood for a while know that all changes to the exterior of a building need to have a COA. This applies no matter how small the change and includes those seen only from your own back yard. COA's are not required for repairs where there is no change at all (in material, color, size, style, or finish).

COA. All fencing, major landscape changes, grading, arbors, etc. fall into this category. If you want to cut down a tree that has a diameter of 8 inches or larger at 4 feet above the ground, you must apply for a COA since this is considered demolition. Like all demolition there is a 365 day delay. If the tree is very sick or presents a danger, or occasionally for other reasons, the COA will be approved with no delay.

The Historic Districts commission staff, Dan Becker and Doug Hill, can be extremely helpful in giving guidance especially before you make an application. Application forms are available at the Municipal Building, or you may save yourself a trip by calling Dan or Doug at 832-7238 and they will send you one.

Most COA's go through as "Minor Work." This means that they do not have to be heard by the commission at one of its regular meetings but may be handled directly by the staff. My experience is that turnaround on minor-work applications is within a few days. Projects that cannot be handled as "Minor Work" must go before one of the regular monthly meetings of the commission. The commission meets on the second Monday of each month at 4 p.m. Applications must be submitted two weeks before the meeting. The recording at the commission's number is updated regularly for application deadline and time and date of the next monthly meeting.

When you receive the COA, which is a blue certificate, post it where it can be seen from the street. Taping it on the inside of the window is usually fine. The Historic Districts Commission often gets calls about work proceeding without a COA when in fact one has been obtained but just not posted.



Garbage and Trash Pickup Schedule and Disposal Regulations

After years in Oakwood many of us are still not sure what the garbage pickup schedule is or what can be thrown away. Here's the deal!



Blount Street to Seawell Avenue and New Bern Ave to Boundary St.:

Tuesdays and Fridays after 7a.m.

North of N. Boundary St:

Mondays and Thursdays after 7a.m.

Disposal Regulations:

Garbage should be in bags and will be picked up from the side or back of the house. It should be placed in leakproof containers with fitted lids and two lifting handles. These trash cans should be placed in an accessible location outside of porches, decks, garages, or fenced yards and beyond the reach of dogs and other pets. You do not have to put your bags out by the street. Please use trash cans with lids so critters aren't tempted to tear into your trash. Do not leave garbage cans by curbside all the time.

Yard waste collection schedule:

Wednesdays from the curb

Bagged yard waste must be in clear plastic bags. Sticks or branches must be no longer than five feet and in bundles no more than 18 inches in diameter. Due to Hurricane Fran yard waste is currently collected curbside as they get to it. Of course hazardous materials such as paint, building materials and rocks cannot be put out for pick up. The city has special days and locations for their disposal. This information is provided with your water bill. Large items such as appliances can be put out once a year in the spring. Call the Raleigh sanitation department at 831-6890 for details.

Yard waste is picked up on Wednesdays from the curb only.

Recycling:

The city recycling program provides you with wonderful calendars of service on a regular basis. Call 831-6122 for more information.





David Philbrook will become immediate-past president and Sharon Waidler will finish her two-year term. A Garden Club representative and a tour chair will be appointed at a later date.

Proposed bylaws update

Earlier in the year we reviewed the bylaws to ensure the society was in compliance with the City of Raleigh Fiscal Requirements for Agency Activities. Two changes were considered desirable, namely a new clause on conflict of interest and an extension of the existing clause on non-discrimination. The proposed changes are therefore (a) to insert a new article VI as follows:

Article VI - Conflict of Interest

Board members, and any persons who may be employed from time to time by this Society shall avoid conflicts of interest and any conduct which may suggest the appearance of impropriety when exercising their responsibility to this Society. Board members and employees shall not benefit directly or indirectly from this Society's activities except in their role as board members or employees.

(b) Renumber the existing articles VI through XII as articles VII through XIII and (c) change the non-discrimination article (old article X or new article XI) to read

Article XI - Restrictions.

The Society shall be non-partisan and nonsectarian, and shall not discriminate on the basis of race, creed, color, or sex, national origin, age, handicap or sexual orientation That is, add national "origin, age, handicap or sexual orientation" as specific things against which we will not discriminate.

The society will vote on these proposed amendments at the November general meeting.


