The Obituary

The life of Miss Ruth Helen Gillum came to a close at Pine Knoll Family Care Home, Durham, North Carolina on Wednesday, October 23, 1991, when she went to be with the Lord. Miss Gillum was born on December 9, 1906 in St. Louis, Missouri.

Miss Gillum received a Bachelor of Music degree (piano), and a Master of Music degree (piano) from the University of Kansas, Lawrence, Kansas. Further doctoral study was completed at Indiana University, Bloomington, Indiana. Miss Gillum was an outstanding music educator, pianist, composer, arranger and conductor. She taught at Philander Smith College, Little Rock, Arkansas for eight years, (1934-1942), and at North Carolina Central University, Durham, North Carolina in the Department of Music for twentynine years, (1942-1971), until her retirement.

Miss Gillum took great pride in the music profession by gaining recognition with the published compositions of "There's No Hiding Place", "Roll, Jordon Roll", and "Choric Dance." She will be remembered by her students and friends as "a woman full of beauty and virtue, with great dedication."

Mrs. Bessie Shearer Gilmer, daughter of D. Bass and Sophia Shearer, was born September, 1883 in Lynchburg, Virginia. She was educated in the public schools of Lynchburg, Virginia, Seminary, Smith Business College, and New York University.

Following completion of her academic and business training she was employed by the People's Benevolent Relief Society of Charlotte, North Carolina.

Upon moving to Durham she was employed by the Royal Knights of King David, where she subsequently became Treasurer.

Mrs. Gilmer was the widow of the late Ed Gilmer of Durham.

"Miss Bessie" as she was affectionately known, was formerly a member of White Rock Baptist Church. Following her marriage to Mr. Gilmer, a member of Saint Joseph's she joined her husband's church.

Her training and personality made her a definite asset to any group with which she affiliated. Her connections with Saint Joseph's were outstanding as secretary of the Trustee Board and Superintendent of the Sunday School. She was a charter member of the Ladies Aid Society and a member of the Moxahella Sunday School Class. Her local memberships include the Senior Citizens Club, to which her presence always brought sunshine; Rho Chapter of Iota Phi Lambda Sorority, which she was a charter member for nine years; and Schubert-Shakespeare Club. "Miss Bessie" served as hostess at the Harriet Tubman Branch of the YWCA and was greatly loved by the staff and the girls who referred to her as "Mother Gilmer." Her interest in and activities with the "Y" were city-wide.

She was one of the original members of the Women's Division of the Democratic National Committee.

Her past employment was with the Employment Security Commission of North Carolina, from which she was awarded a Certificate of Merit and was the first Negro in the Department in the State of North Carolina.

Survivors include: two sisters, Josephine S. Pannell and Carrie J. Shearer; one nephew, Patrick S. Pannell; one grand nephew, Patrick W. Pannell; a stepdaughter, Thelma Gilmer Gibson.


