Annual Reports of Officers-1945-1946

PRESIDENT

Today brings the close of the twenty-fourth year of the Winston-Salem Junior League and my term as President. All of us should have a feeling of satisfaction in that the year has been a successful one, a great deal of constructive work having been accomplished, and that the League has made definite development and progress.

To the Board goes my praise for their leadership and deepest appreciation for their cooperation and dependability, and my admiration for the conscientious way in which they have undertaken their responsibilities. To all of you go my thanks for your

splendid cooperation.

It is my duty to evaluate the work accomplished by our League this past year. At the beginning of the year we were faced with the fact that more unity was needed within the League. With this in mind, the Board and I made plans to propose changes to strengthen the League.

At this time every League member was placed on a committee. This tended to create interest among members who had never been privileged to plan the League's total program.

Compulsory attendance was enacted, due to the sharp decline in attendance at meetings during the past few years. Attendance this year has been excellent and members have naturally taken more interest in League activities when they are present at meetings to know what is happening. There is some dissatisfaction on the part of members over the system of excuses,

probably a better plan can be arranged this year.

Conference Day, although a terrific undertaking for a new administration was very successful and brought about several good results. All members, both sustaining and active, were made more aware of the League's purpose in relation to the community, what our programs are doing for the community and were impressed with the fine record made by the League in the past. It was with a feeling of pride that members left Conference Day. Representatives of agencies and organizations present were impressed with the fact that the League is a vital force in the community. It was a splendid way to start a new year and created a great deal of spirit and enthusiasm among members, improving at the same time our public relations.

Facing the year with two methods of money making and with a very large surplus community fund invested, the Board realized the need of a staff visit from the A.J.L.A. Ways and

Means Department.

Valuable advice was gained from Mrs. Kennedy Plunkett's and Mrs. Robert Dingman's visit to us in June. Our financial condition was reviewed and appraised. Its soundness from the League's viewpoint and policy was discussed.

The following was accomplished: 1. The League voted (by unanimous vote of the members present) to close the Beauty Parlor, leaving the only method of money making the Thrift

Shop, whose operation and management is better fitted to League members. Reasons for closing this Shop are found in

the Beauty Parlor Chairman's Annual Report.

2. The League voted to give to Winston-Salem Foundation and thus to the community—the Junior League Hospital for incurables, which at the present time is under lease for twenty-five years (with privilege of renewal for another twenty-five years) to the Bowman Gray School of Medicine. As the years go by I feel confident that the League will realize more than ever the wisdom of their decision in deciding not to hold the deed to this property. Reasons for this action I gave to you at the February meeting. The presentation has been filed with the minutes. With enough cash surplus to finance your program for the next three years, the League voted, in March, to spend a part of its invested surplus, and to turn over to the community four hundred (400) shares of Reynolds B. Stock in the following ways:

1. Proposed War Memorial Building.

City-County Hospital.
 Mental Hygiene Society.
 The City Library.

You will be able to look with pride upon long range postwar planning for Winston-Salem and realize that you had a share in this and have contributed to the realization of many civic needs, which will be felt in the community for generations. You have also strengthened the League from within and strengthened your position in the community on the outside. With the invested surplus placed in the community and the problems of the beauty parlor operation out of the way, members should unite to put their forces behind the Thrift Shop, whose responsibility it will be in the future to finance our community program. Enlargement and expansion to take care of overcrowded conditions now existing should be made as soon as possible. A booming business was done this year caused by a well organized and a well run committee and increased supply of volunteers. I feel sure that the Conference delegates will want to find all helpful information possible in looking to the future of the Thrift Shop.

Placement was well planned and intelligently supervised. Much well deserved praise has gone to our chairman for the Placement Bulletin which is being studied and copied in other cities. A large percentage of volunteer jobs was done in support of the League's program, however we must show the public that we believe in our own programs we have started by supporting them with volunteers. It is significent also to know that eighty-three jobs are held in the community by Junior League girls, either in an executive capacity or on community boards. This proves that we are maintaining our high standard of leadership and that membership in the League is an excellent training school to teach members how to take their place in the

community.

Regarding your League Community Program under contract, in Radio and Arts and Crafts, great strides have been made in these fields. Winston-Salem is unusually fortunate in having

the services of Mrs. Chester Marsh. She is performing miracles in developing interest in Arts and Crafts. Enrollment at the Arts and Crafts Workshop increasing from 100 to 900 in three months shows the rapid strides which have been made. It is thrilling to contemplate what can be done in this field.

Miss Virginia Lee Comer, A.J.L.A. Consultant, on Cultural Arts, visited us in February to advise us as to the future of Arts and Crafts program. The cultural field is now standing where the welfare field was twentyfive years ago. Since the League is pioneering in this field, it must continue its responsibility, both financially and with volunteers. With this help from the League rapid development can be accomplished.

A challenging opportunity is in store for the League in regard to the new Library Building, in interpreting to the community, through assisting in an educational program as to the needs of the present library. League support and interest, handled in the proper way, can help assure for Winston-Salem a new Library Building, which should include some phase of the cultural program in which you are now interested.

The Wachovia Historical Society has not yet taken full advantage of the contribution you gave them in trying to build up the society through the Museum. They should be looking toward the time when League funds will be exhausted. This is not altogether the League's responsibility, however a step has been made recently in that direction by the appointment of a joint committe to work out detailed plans for the Museum.

Under the guidance of Mrs. Bruce Williams and Mrs. Linville Martin, advancement has been made in the radio field. Two hundred fifty-six community volunteers have been used this past year. There has been wonderful promotion in the Children's Programing Committee and schools have been definitely aroused as to what part radio can play in education. You are entering your last year under financial contract with the Community Chest in radio. The Radio Council is beginning to look for other means of financial support.

In The Children's Theatre, Jack and the Beanstalk was presented by the Junior League on the Children's Theatre series. This production was most popular. There was a decided increase in ticket sales from the schools for the Junior League

play this year.

This past year your League was voted by the Association Board one of the four outstanding Leagues in the Association

in initiating significent community services.

Publicity has been exceptionally good this year, having had five front-page articles and two editorials. The Press no longer

considers the League a social club.

The News Sheet has continued to live up to its high standard of being a consistently good one, having received favorable National comment in that "it keeps members linked with community affairs, events of the League and at the same time increases members' interest with respect to subjects of national importance."

We were very proud to have had articles and pictures of

our Arts and Crafts Program in the March issue of our Na-

tional Magazine.

The selected theme, "We Look At Our Town" for League education was excellent. You have been one of the first to realize that over-all long-range community planning is an essential need in Winston-Salem. The Education Committee has endeavored to impress its members with this through the programs at League meetings.

Eighteen provisionals were accepted into membership this year. It has been suggested that the provisional chairman be selected in spring in order to allow more time for planning and preparation of provisional course. This chairman should have

board membership.

The admissions system was completely revised this year. As a result, the committee should work more effectively, its chief

function being membership building.

A banquet in honor of provisionals was given this year—the first to be held in many years. The Hospitality Committee did a splendid job, and the banquet definitely brought League members closer together. We were honored to have Mr. Willis Henderson, our regional director, with us for this occasion.

Regarding League administration—this past year you voted to employ an office secretary who will relieve chairmen and officers of a great deal of telephoning and clerical work.

The continuation of League office and secretary will depend on whether or not the League wishes to raise its dues, as this type of money spending can only be taken out of administrative fund. I wish to remind you that your dues are in the lowest bracket in Association. You are spending \$400.00 more than your income in this fund, which should prove that to keep such a large administrative budget, a raise in dues should be considered next year.

I feel that the League starts a new year with its house in order. It is my hope that the League will assist in every way possible with the future development and coordination of the cultural field in which you are now pioneering.

You have a wonderful year to look forward to under the competent leadership of your new president. It has been an honor, a privilege and a liberal education to have served you.

JUNIOR LEAGUE BEAUTY PARLOR

When we took over the Junior League Beauty Parlor in April, it was soon seen that, due to prevalent war conditions, there were many difficult problems to be faced. Our biggest problem was the lack of experienced operators. We had, a few months earlier, lost our two best operators. They started their own shop and, of course, took their customers with them. Our equipment, while adequate, was showing signs of wear. The committee met, and it was decided that new life had to be pumped into the Beauty Parlor, and in business new life costs money. Due to the lack of operators mainly, our profits for the past year had fallen off, so it was not a particularly good time to spend money, although it was the only chance we had for a We started an intensive search for more operators and planned to give the ones we had more training. Also, it was decided to concentrate on sales of cosmetics and buy attractive gifts to be sold at Christmas. This had not been done for some time, so we ran into difficulties trying to find wholesale houses who would sell to us, as supplies were limited, and naturally regular customers were given first consideration. We nevertheless went on with our plans and were going to culminate them with some real advertising. As Mrs. Dingman said when she was here, our Beauty Parlor was bound to succeed with the backing of an organization as influential and powerful as the Junior

In June, however, Mrs. Plunket and Mrs. Dingman came to Winston-Salem to consult with our members about the Junior League financial status. It was found that we were much too rich. The first thing they suggested was to sell the Beauty Parlor, not because it seemed on the down-grade, but because it was a big business in direct competition with businesses that were the livelihood of the people whom we were endeavoring to

serve.

Mrs. Plunket and Mrs. Dingman met with the Beauty Parlor committee, and by a unanimous vote we decided to recommend to the League that the Beauty Parlor be sold. It was then taken to the Junior League at a call meeting in June and the recommendation of the committee passed on to the League.

Mrs. Dingman gave us her reasons for wanting us to sell and

they were, in part, as follows:

1. Changing of Chairmen every year hurt the Beauty Parlor and was very hard on our paid personnel.

- 2. It was bad for the League's Public Relations to be in competition with other businesses.
- 3. The Beauty Parlor was started before the A. J. L. A. was organized as it is today, and the idea (owning a beauty parlor) was as obsolete as the old A. J. L. A. ideas.
- 4. We no longer support projects that are so large that we would need more than the Thrift Shop to take care of them.
- 5. Our present policy is to keep only enough money on hand to protect our programs.

6. By combining all the efforts of the Junior League toward

the Thrift Shop we can make plenty of money and have no

division of purpose.

7. It was the perfect time to realize on our property because people were looking for new businesses and equipment was impossible to buy other than used equipment.

- 8. The operators would have no trouble in finding other employment as all operators were much in demand. (We would like to add here that all our personnel was kept on by Mrs. Lamberti when she purchased the shop.)
- 9. We had lost so many Junior League customers in the preceeding year that it was obvious that the League, as a whole, had lost interest in the Beauty Parlor and that was harmful to our Public Relations.

The Junior League, at the call meeting, voted unanimously to sell the Beauty Parlor after much discussion. At the time of closing, after all bills were paid and bonuses given to the personnel, we turned over \$1,001.70 to the Treasurer of the Junior League. Mr. Ed Shepherd, a real estate agent, handled the sale for us. The shop equipment and good will were valued at \$4,942.50 by approved appraisors. Mrs. Lamberti bought the shop at that price. Mr. Shepherd was paid \$250.00 for selling it, and Mr. Luther Ferrell was paid the same for his legal services in the transaction. There were a few other minor expenses in connection with the sale; these and the above were taken out of the Beauty Parlor account.

It was hard to close the Beauty Parlor for sentimental reasons, as it had been operating for more than twenty years, but it had outlived its usefulness, as everybody realized since the vote to close it, we repeat, was unanimous.

CHILDREN'S THEATRE

"Jack and the Beanstalk," a major production in three acts, was given by the Children's Theatre Group as the first entertainment offered by the Children's Theatre Board in their series for the year.

There were two performances, the first on November 15 and because of technical requirements of the play, both were presented at the Reynolds Auditorium. The total number of tickets sold for this play was 3,438. The children were provided bus

transportation by the Children's Theatre Board.

Over two thousand hours were given by sixty-six League members, and the entire production was handled by League volunteers with the exception of technical help backstage during actual performance. Publicity, consisting of pictures and articles, was given nine times in the newspapers and twice in the Newssheet.

CULTURAL ARTS

The Cultural Arts Committee points with pride to its accomplishments during 1945-46. The actual realization of some of our dreams in the cultural development of Winston-Salem have be-

gun to take shape.

During the summer of 1945 a series of three story hours was conducted by the Wachovia Museum with a most gratifying response. In addition, new signs were donated to the Museum, arm bands were furnished for the guide service. Letters were sent to all City and County schools and to all P.-T.A. presidents concerning their use of the Museum during the winter, and an article, "Suggestions to Teachers concerning a visit to the Museum," was sent to all teachers. Under the new joint Museum-League Committee, plans are developing for a course in story-telling and a new series of story hours for the Spring and Summer. It is hoped that there will be a continued use of the Museum and a growing interest in it throughout the entire community.

Junior League volunteers assisted with the Arts and Crafts Committee of the Piedmont Festival and with the sale of tickets for the Festival. Mrs. Chester Marsh brought from the West-chester workshop exhibits of crafts used there. Plans for the 1946 Festival include an exhibit of early Moravian Crafts to

be demonstrated by volunteers in Moravian costume.

The Arts and Crafts Workshop, under the able direction of Mrs. Chester Marsh, opened on October 1st, in the Old West End School building. A formal opening with an exhibit by local artists was held on November 14th, with members of the Art Committee serving as hostesses. The growth of interest in the workshop has surpassed our greatest expectations—the total registration in November exceeding 900. So much has been accomplished that we cannot go into detail, but a few highlights should be mentioned:

- A series of courses in various phases of Art Work has been presented to the public by outstanding artists in their fields.
- The establishment of an Art Guild in Winston-Salem.
 A series of exhibits, one each month at the workshop.
- 4. The use of trained volunteers in the various recreational centers. This has far-reaching possibilities, and Mrs. Marsh hopes to see the Workshop and its opportunities presented to every school child in the city.

The training of the organizational leaders of both races, of teachers and of recreation directors, all of whom are in

turn fitting this training to their immediate needs.

6. The employment, for the summer months of an artist, who will teach and direct sketching in the recreation centers in order to step up the program. The salary of this instructor to be paid by the League.

Much interest in the promotion of a new City-County Library has been manifested by the League during the year. Interest gained impetus following a League meeting at the Library in January 1946. A Library Committee has been appointed to promote education on Library needs during the coming year. The League is planning to provide the salary for a staff member to the present Library for two years, to start and direct an educational program. This program is to begin in the fall.

In February at the request of the Cultural Art Committee, Miss Virginia Lee Comer, staff-consultant on Community Arts for the A.J.L.A., came to Winston-Salem. Her visit was most helpful, and she clarified the League position in connection with the Library, the Piedmont Festival, the Wachovia Museum. and the Arts and Crafts Workshop.

There is still much to be done in the Cultural field in Winston-Salem. The surface has been scratched, but the deeper we dig, the greater we find the challenge. May we commend this challenge to future Arts Committees.

EDUCATION

A committee which I consider too large (19), unless subdivided, was appointed and has functioned well. It is obvious that the surface in "Education" has not been scratched, either in depth or breadth, nor has the general community been reached except in the program on the Library.

In September a sub-committee on Provisionals was set up with Mrs. Strudwick Nash as Chairman, three members of the Education Committee, and two others forming the group. They were at a distinct disadvantage in being set-up so late. In the Secretary's files may be found a group of recommendations already made to the Board in December, covering many points considered weak this year.

In May a questionnaire was passed at the request of the President, to survey members' ideas on meeting-time and subjects. Nothing startling was revealed. The group still runs from controversies; however, more people are hoping for a consideration of Labor-Management relationships.

In June came the first task of the full committee, cooperating in developing and executing plans for the June Day program. This job was done under disheartening and constantly changing circumstances, and was well done. The day's plan, "An Appraisal And A Challenge," with many guests present, went well and with a gay flourish. The speaker was Mrs. C. W. Tillett, vice-chairman of the National Democratic Committee, talking on "Woman's Place in the Post-War World."

In September came real planning for League meetings. Two sessions of general discussion took place; Mr. Harry Krusz was especially helpful as we determined the theme for a series—"We Look At Our Town." The committee divided itself according to interests, and became responsible for definite programs. October — Junior League Placement

A quiz program planned with Placement Committee, fun and informal, touching pertinent points.

November — Introduction, "We Look at Our Town," pointing up value of community-planning. Speaker, Mr. Felix Grisette, N. C. State Planning Board. (Too general.)

December — Banquet with Regional Director speaking. Delightful occasion arranged by Hospitality Committee.

January — Second in series, "A Physical Need, A Library" (held in crowded library, to good advantage).

 History and background of present library — Douglas Rights, Library Commission.

Present inadequacies as seen by staff trying to serve public — Mrs. Jessie Stroupe.

3. Possible services to schools - Miss Gladys Moore.

4. Prospects for the future — Irving Carlyle, Library Planning Board.

This program has already begun to have effect on community consideration for the future.

February — Miss Virginia Lee Comer, on staff visit, concerning League plans. (Veterans were to be the topic.)

March — Simulated broadcast, series 3, "Our Town and Its Youth," Prepared by Hannah Williams and staff of Junior Town Meeting of the Air, a part of the Radio Council.

As for recommendations, I would suggest that in the case of a large committee, it be divided after determining policies and general plans, into Community and League Education. Also, it seems to me that the vice-president should never also be chairman of this committee which is held to be very vital. The vice-president naturally feels the pressure of business and problems of administration, as she assists the president. In trying to fulfill an entirely different task, the Education Chairman and her committee should have a different impulse for their planning, if they want at all to broaden the mental and spiritual horizons of the members—or at any rate to try.

PLACEMENT

If a name is descriptive of a job, Placement in the year 1945-46 should have been rightly called "Replacement vs. Displacement," for the biggest problem we faced was in dealing with a constantly shifting population. The first post-war year saw the world going back home, and the Junior League file, though normally a more-or-less stationary record, became a perpetual motion machine. It is, therefore, impossible to give an accurate account of volunteer service, and the following figures range from one month's work on the part of some volunteers to twelve months on the part of others. Regardless of the time given to the job, it was done, with few exceptions, willingly and faithfully, and we have reason to believe we are developing in efficiency. It is that line of our growth in which we need to concentrate, and it is hoped that the good volunteer of 1945 will become in every case the efficient volunteer of the future.

Along with the difficult task of adjusting our personal lives this past year, the following record of service-to-others becomes

all the more outstanding.

During the course of 12 months, the Junior League had at one time or another 120 Active members and 17 Active Provisionals. Twenty-one of these members were "professional," and 13, for varying and mostly justifiable reasons, were inactive.

Perhaps the most noteworthy indication of our development into useful citizens is the fact that 93 executive and board positions were held by members in organizations outside the League.

Eighteen held "full-time" jobs as chairmen of the various

League committees.

Thirty members have had (or are taking) Arts and Crafts training.

Three members took a course in Scout leadership. Two members are taking training in ceramics.

Add to that the following over-all record of volunteer service for the year:

Children's Theatre, 62 volunteers; Thrift Shop, 38 volunteers;

Newssheet, 13 volunteers; Scout leaders, 5 volunteers; Community Radio, 21 volunteers; Arts and Crafts, 14 volunteers; Y. W. C. A., 19 volunteers (in advisory or committee work); Family and Child Welfare, 4 volunteers; Health Agencies, 6 volunteers; U. S. O., 7 volunteers; Red Cross, 18 volunteers; Church School, 17 volunteers (executive positions are included in other figures). Staff Assistants to Community: Volunteer office, 6 volunteers; Salem Museum, 7 volunteers; Surveys and Correlation, 12 volunteers; Telephone Committee work, 6 volunteers.

These figures do not include the volunteer time spent in canvassing for community drives and projects or an untold amount of time spent in other fields of volunteer work that the Placement Chairman has no way of tabulating.

I humbly salute the splendid achievement of the Junior League volunteers which the above record represents, and I thank you for the privilege and the genuine pleasure of working with you.

RADIO

At last the plan for bringing Radio into the schools via the "Books Bring Adventure" series, has met with big success. Not only the series but the correlation study which was so cleverly prepared by Mildred Cayer and the Junior League members of her committee and which accompanied each broadcast, has been enthusiastically received by the teachers and recognized as a constructive and helpful tool in the understanding of the day's program. In fact the program has been so thoroughly approved that the request has been granted to repeat the series together with an improved and more informative correlation study. These programs are beamed to the schools every Wednesday morning at 9:45. It might be interesting to know that this correlation study prepared by the Children's Programming Committee has received national recognition. It has been sent to thirty-five other cities through the suggestion of A.J.L.A.

On Saturday mornings at 11:00 a program called Saturday Playhouse was broadcast to the children. This was a series of fairy tales prepared for radio by Julia M. Street, and the children were encouraged to send in requests for their favorite stories and to come down to the station to witness the live show when it was presented. At the termination of this very popular program, a lyric-writing contest was held in each school. Any child who so desired, was asked to write words to the Saturday Playhouse theme song which had been written by Nell Glenn. The winners were chosen and interviewed the following Saturday over WSJS. Each was awarded an album of records. At present the fairy tale series has been substituted for a series of programs on North Carolina history also written by Julia M. Street.

Also, on Saturday morning over WAIR, Junior Town Meet-

ing of the Air was presented, with young people participating in the discussion of national problems and making suggestions for improvements in any phase of every day life. Dr. Depp was moderator on national and international problems and George Chandler served as moderator on local problems.

On adult programming time which comes over WAIR at 7:45 on Wednesday evenings, we are now presenting the series, "Keeping Up With the Wigglesworths." This is authentic, conomic information for the average listener via the efforts of

"top talent" in the soap opera technique.

The Radio Council has gone far in the entertainment and education of children, but its interests are more varied than that, its scope wider. The radio stations have been most cooperative in its public service programs. At the time of the clothing drive, there were several programs on United Clothing Collection. And again, when the March of Dimes campaign was on, radio came to the fore with seven live adult shows.

The most interesting part of radio; however, is not in the listening but in the actual production of the shows. Last September, \$250.00 was appropriated by the Community Council to send Hannah Williams to New York University for a six-weeks course in radio production. Upon her return many improvements were made in our local set-up and a workshop course was started on February 7th for the purpose of teaching interested high school students and adults the varied phases of radio production. This course consisted of classes (held once a week) in spot writing, reading, auditions, studio technique, sound effects, acting, radio diction, script writing, etc.

Radio has succeeded in getting its foot in the door of community interest. With all the opportunities open to us to become educated to Radio and to teach others what we learn, there is no reason why the door should not be pushed until it stands,

not ajar, but opened wide.

THRIFT SHOP

March 31st, 1946 ends another successful year for the Thrift Shop. The net profits for the year were \$3,875.00. The committee chairmen and their individual members, giving of their time, talents and cooperation, have made this an outstanding year at the Thrift Shop. This year, instead of turning over all surplus profits to the Junior League, we are holding in reserve such funds as will be necessary for the future enlargement and expansion of the shop.

Our main undertaking for the year has been in the volunteer field. By working closely with the Placement Chairman, the Shop Chairman and the Volunteer Chairmen feel that this great need for volunteers has been filled. We have had an average of 15 regular volunteers per week, with around six substitutes. With this increase in volunteer help, it has been possible to run the

shop more efficiently, as well as give the manager, Mrs. Perry, more time for bookkeeping, which, of course, increases with every year.

The Marking Committee working regularly each week, has

made it possible to realize a quick turnover in the stock.

The General Shop Committee has kept the shop running smoothly by keeping the stock in order, keeping supplies on hand, and improving the appearance of the shop.

The Rummage Committee has kept in contact with each member about her quota, and has taken care of collecting any outside

merchandise.

The Publicity Committee has taken care of all newspaper

and Newssheet publicity, as well as advertisements.

Another aim for the year has been to secure a larger building in a suitable location. This has been impossible, although the committee has faithfully worked on this all year.

During the year 18 Provisionals have been trained at the

shop, either as sales girls, or stock markers.

Commission sales for the year have been exceptionally good,

and a big increase over previous years.

Serving the community is the most important function of the Thrift Shop. This year the agencies receiving contributions of clothing from us have been the Salvation Army, Family Service Agency, Goodwill Industries, Victory Clothing Drive, Greek Relief. Outside of the different agencies and drives, a number of individuals have been helped. In that the Thrift Shop is the only money-making project carried on by the League, each Junior League member should feel toward it a definite responsibility greater than ever before realized. This may be accomplished in a number of ways: by serving as volunteers, sending in quota on time, sending the kind of merchandise the shop must haveclean and useful—giving constructive criticism, which is always welcome, frequent visits to the shop by each member.

With this kind of cooperation and the continued splendid efficiency of Mrs. Perry, shop manager, the Thrift Shop should

be headed for the biggest boom it has ever had.

WAYS AND MEANS

MARGARET WARD TROTTER

The Ways and Means Committee has numerous and diverse duties; the most important of these is making and adjusting a yearly budget. In addition to this, the Committee has the responsibility of recommending to the Board changes in financial policy.

This Committee was invested with the power to dispose of the Junior League Beauty Parlor, after the League had voted to do so. It was sold for \$4,942.50; cash on hand and collection of accounts amounted to \$4,483.39; expenses of sale and other charges amounted to \$857.82. The League realized from the sale of the Beauty Parlor's closing \$8,568.07.

Upon recommendation, the Board and the League approved to employ a part-time secretary to assist the various committee chairmen and to keep the books and records in a central place where they would always be available.

For several years, the Committee has considered disposing of the invested surplus. Since postwar plans are now being realized, the present Committee recommended to the Board that the time had come to bring about the disposition of the invested surplus, and presented two plans for disposing thereof.

As the vote now stands, the following items in the plan of expenditure have been approved by the League:

50 shares Reynolds "B" to the War Memorial Fund 50 shares Reynolds "B" to the City-County Hospital

120 shares Reynolds "B" to the Mental Hygiene Society 180 shares Reynolds "B" to the Library Commission for an

Educational Program

The League has not yet come to an agreement as to the expenditure of our \$10,000.00 worth of Building and Loan stock.

After carrying out the above plans, there still remains a cash surplus sufficient to protect our community projects for the next three years.

The Junior League Thrift Shop paid to the League in the

past year \$1,500.00.

BY - LAWS

of the

Junior League of Winston-Salem, N. C.

ARTICLE I-NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Junior League of Winston-Salem, Incorporated.

ARTICLE II—OBJECT AND POLICIES

Object: The object of this League shall be to foster interest among its members in the social, economic, educational, cultural and civic conditions of the community and to make efficient their volunteer service.

Policies: The policies of the League shall be in harmony with the policies of the Association of the Junior Leagues of America,

Incorporated.

ARTICLE III-MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Classes of Membership.

The membership of this League shall consist of young women who shall comply with the requirements of the Association. The classes of membership shall be Provisional, Active, Sustaining, Non-Resident.

A. Provisional Membership

Provisional members are those who are engaged in complying with the requirements for admission to Active membership and are not eligible to vote or hold office. Provisional members shall be required to complete a provisional member's course and a period of volunteer service satisfactory to the Placement Committee within twelve months after their election to provisional membership. An extension of time may be granted by the Board of Directors in the case of provisionals who for unavoidable reasons are unable to complete the course. Provisionals who have completed these requirements are admitted to active membership by a two-thirds vote of the Board of Directors. Those members failing to meet the provisional requirements shall be dropped from membership by a two-thirds vote of the Board of Directors and may not come up again for membership within two years. Provisional members are those who are engaged in complytwo years.

B. Active Membership

Active Membership
Active members are those who have completed the requirements for Provisional Members and have been admitted to
Active membership. They may not be over forty years of
age, with the exception of Board members completing their
term of office. They may hold office and vote. They shall
justify their membership through some form of community
service satisfactory (in quality and amount) to the Placement Committee.

C. Sustaining Membership Sustaining members are those who have reached the age limit for Active membership. They may not vote or hold office.

D. Non-Resident Membership Active and Sustaining members in good standing are entitled to Non-Resident membership which is open to those living outside the county of Forsyth, North Carolina. They may not vote or hold office.

Section 2. Admission to Membership.

A. Eligibility Proposed members shall be from twenty through thirty-four years of age, shall have completed their schooling, and shall have been residents of Winston-Salem or its vicinity at least

one year. Before accepting the invitation to membership, they shall agree to engage in community service in connection with the program of the League.

B. Proposed for Membership

Each candidate shall be proposed by one member and seconded by two members on a form provided for the purpose. Active and Sustaining members may propose one candidate and second one candidate during a given year, but no member of the Membership Committee nor of the Board of Directors may propose or second a candidate. No member may propose a relative. Application for membership shall be received by the chairman of the Membership Committee any time during the year. The deadline for applications for those members to be taken in the following October shall be April 1. No candidate will be considered whose name has been proposed more than four times.

C. Election to Membership

The Board of Directors shall vote by secret ballot on the
list submitted by the Membership Committee. A three-fourths
vote against a name shall disqualify a name for membership. The Board shall have at least two meetings to consider the proposed candidates for membership. Invitations shall be mailed immediately to those elected, and the names of those who accept shall be announced by the membership chairman at the October meeting.

Changes in Membership

Applications for change to another class of membership shall be made in writing to the Recording Secretary and will be acted upon by the Board of Directors at any time during the year.

Inter-League Membership

A member of any League who is subject to constant change of residence may have an Inter-League Card and shall be listed as a member of the League issuing the card.

Transfer of Members

Only Provisional, Active, Sustaining and Non-Resident members in good standing may have the privilege of transferring membershim to another League. The right of transfer granted in this section need not extend to a person who has lived for some time in Winston Salem without being a member of this League, a person who has been refused membership or who has been dropped or expelled from membership by this League. Transferred Provisional members shall take the additional training required by Leagues to which they transfer. The Board of Directors is not required to accept transfers which exceed twenty-five per cent of all admissions to membership in any one year. in any one year.

Section 4. Resignations, Dropped Members, Re-instatements

A. Resignations

Any member of the League who is not in arrears, in dues or in the performance of League duties may resign. Resigna-tions shall be made in writing to the Recording Secretary of the League at least two weeks before dues become payable; otherwise members shall be liable for dues for the coming year.

B. Dropped Members

Members may be dropped from the League for cause by a three-fourths vote of the Board of Directors.

C. Re-instatements

Members who have resigned while in good standing may be re-instated by a three-fourths vote of the Board of Directors, upon paying a sum determined by the Board of Di-

ARTICLE IV-OFFICERS

Section 1. Personnel

The officers of this League shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer,

and Assistant Treasurer.

Section 2. Nomination

The Nominating Committee shall present a slate of one candidate for each office to be filled. The slate shall be sent by the Recording Secretary to each voting member of the League at least two weeks before the election meeting.

Independent nominations may be made in writing by five Active members of the League. They shall be received by the Recording Secretary at least two days prior to the election meeting and shall be announced with the Nominating Committee's slate.

Section 3. Elections

Officers shall be elected at the February meeting of the League for a term of one year. They shall assume their duties immediately after the April meeting.

Section 4. Duties

The powers and duties of the officers shall be as follows:

A. President

The President shall preside at meetings of the League, Board of Directors and Executive Committee; shall appoint the Membership Chairman and personnel of committees, not otherwise provided for with the approval of the Executive Committee, and shall be a member ex-officio of all committees except the Nominating Committee. She shall, with the Treasurer, sign all contracts and obligations authorized by the Board of Directors, and shall perform the duties pertaining to the office.

B. Vice-President

The Vice-President shall assist the President and perform the duties of the President in her absence.

C. Recording Secretary

The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of the meetings of the League, the Board of Directors, and the Executive Committee. She shall keep a correct, classified list of the names and addresses of all members and shall maintain a file of essential records which shall be transferred to her successor at the close of her term of office. She shall, with the Corresponding Secretary, compile the annual reports and edit the year book.

D. Corresponding Secretary

The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the general cor-respondence of the League. She shall assist the Recording Secretary in compiling the annual reports and editing the year book.

E. Treasurer

The Treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the League; shall collect all dues and assessments and receive League; shall collect all dues and assessments and receive all monies except for those activities which have their own treasurer or other person specifically appointed to handle finances. Such persons shall be under the supervision of the Treasurer. She shall make payments in accordance with the budget on written authorization of the President; expenses not provided for in the budget shall be incurred and paid only upon order of the Board of Directors.

She shall keep full and accurate accounts and shall present financial statements at regular meetings of the League and

financial statements at regular meetings of the League and Board; she shall turn over to her successor all books and financial records and shall take a listed receipt therefor.

F. Assistant Treasurer

The Assistant Treasurer shall perform the duties of the Treasurer in her absence and assist her when necessary.

ARTICLE V-BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. Personnel

The Board of Directors shall consist of the officers and the chairmen designated by the Executive Committee each year. Chair-

men are appointed by the President with the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Term of Office

Officers are elected for a term of one year; chairmen appointed for a term of one year. No officer or chairman shall hold the same office for more than two terms in succession,

Section 3. Duties and Powers

The Board of Directors shall have general charge and control of the affairs, program, funds and property of the League. It shall be the final arbiter in matters of interpretation of these By-Laws.

Vacancies

Vacancies among the officers shall be filled by election by the Board of Directors, Vacancies among the chairmen shall be filled by the President with the approval of the Executive Committee until the expiration of the term of office.

Section 5. Meetings

The Board of Directors shall hold regular monthly meetings from October through June. Special meetings may be called by the President and must be called upon the written request of three members of the Board.

Section 6 Executive Committee

There shall be an Executive Committee, composed of the officers, which shall have all the powers of the Board of Directors between meetings. The minutes of the meetings of the Executive Committee shall be submitted to the Board for ratification at its next meeting.

Section 7. Quorums

Eight members of the Board of Directors and three members of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum respectively.

ARTICLE VI-COMMITTEES

There shall be the following Committees who shall present plans for work to the Board of Directors. No work shall be undertaken without the Board's approval.

A. Membership Committee

Names of the Membership Committee shall be announced by the President upon election. There shall be ten members

and a chairman.

At the regular November meeting, the Nominating Committee shall present a list of 22 names to the voting members. This list shall contain the names of five active members who have served on the membership committee the year before, 3 of whom are to be re-elected for a one-year term; 11 active members, 5 of whom are to be elected for a one-year term; 21 active members who have been life-long residents of Winston-Salem, 1 of whom is to be elected for a one-year term; and 3 sustaining members, 1 of whom is to be elected for a one-year term. To this list nominations from the floor may be added.

B. Placement Committee

The Placement Committee shall consist of the Placement Chairman, the Education Chairman and the chairmen of groups of volunteers designated by the Executive Committee each year. The function of the Placement Committee shall be to plan and supervise the volunteer service program of the League.

C. Education Committee

The Education Committee shall consist of the Education Chairman, the Placement Chairman, the chairmen of groups of volunteers designated by the Executive Committee each year, and/or other persons. The duties of the Education Committee shall be to plan and supervise the educational program of the League.

D. Nominating Committee

The Nominating Committee shall be composed of five members, two appointed by the President and three elected by the League at the April meeting, and the Placement Chair-man ex-officio. The Nominating Committee shall elect its own chairman. The Nominating Committee shall serve for one year, and shall submit nominations for officers, the Membership Committee and delegates to the annual conference.

E. Public Relations Committee

Public Relations Committee
The Public Relations Committee shall consist of the Public
Relations Chairman, Newssheet Editor, Magazine Chairman,
other chairmen designated by the Executive Committee each
year and/or other persons. The duties of the Public Relations Committee shall be to plan and supervise the publicity
of the League. No member of the League shall give out to
the press any news item or information concerning the
League without the approval of the Public Relations Chairman.

F. Newssheet Committee

The Newssheet Committee shall consist of the Newssheet Editor, as Chairman, and such assistants as she may require. The duties of the Newssheet Committee are to edit and publish the Newssheet.

G. Ways and Means Committee
The Ways and Means Committee shall consist of the Treasurer, as Chairman, the Public Relations Chairman, the Placement Chairman and the Chairman of any money-raising ac-tivities either temporary or permanent. The duties of this Committee shall be to supervise and plan for the financing of the League's administrative and community program and to make recommendations to the Board in that regard; to compile the budget for presentation to the Board and to the League.

H. Special Committees
Special Committees shall be appointed by the President with the approval of the Executive Committee which shall designate their powers and the term of the committee's appoint-

ARTICLE VII—MEETINGS OF THE LEAGUE

Annual Meeting

The Annual meeting of the League shall be held in April for the purpose of receiving the annual reports and of installing offi-cers for the ensuing year."

Regular and Special Meetings Regular meetings shall be held from October through May, March meeting being designated for the election of officers. Other meetings shall be held at the discretion of the Board of Directors or upon written request of ten members of the League.

A quorum of the League shall consist of one-third of the voting members.

ARTICLE VIII—FINANCIAL ARRANGEMENTS

Section 1. Fiscal Year, Audit and Bonding

The fiscal year shall be from April 1 to March 31.

All League books shall be audited at least annually by a certi-

fied public accountant.

The Treasurer shall be bonded in the amount determined by the Board of Directors.

Section 2. Membership Dues and Fines

All classes of membership shall pay annual dues of \$8.00 which shall include the Association dues of \$4.00, part of which covers the subscription to the Junior League Magazine. Provisional members shall pay an initiation fee of \$10.00.

There shall be a fine of one dollar to each active member for non-attendance of regular monthly meetings, and a fine of two dollars for non-attendance of the Annual meeting. Sickness, absence from the city, or an unusual emergency shall be the only acceptable excuses for an absence. It shall be made in the form of a letter to the Assistant Treasurer, written the week of the meeting. Such fines shall be payable at the time of the payment of dues.

A. Payment

Dues shall be payable on the first day of the fiscal year. The Treasurer shall send notices to each member on April 1. Members whose dues and fines are not paid by May 1 will be notified by card by the Treasurer. Members whose dues and fines are not paid by May 15 will be sent a registered letter. Members whose dues and fines are not paid by June 1 will be dropped. The only acceptable excuse for non-payment is financial disability, made in writing each year, and received by the Treasurer on or before June 1.

B. Refunds

Refunds of dues will not be made to members resigning during the fiscal year.

Refunds will not be made to provisionals failing to meet the requirements.

C. A. J. L. Indebtedness

Members delinquent in paying this indebtedness to the A. J. L. A. shall be considered in arrears in their dues to this League.

Section 3. Association Dues

The Treasurer of the League shall pay yearly per capita dues for all classes of Membership to the Treasurer of the Association.

Section 4. Letters, Agreements and Contracts

Before any letter, agreement, or contract involving the expenditure of Junior League funds shall be signed and delivered, it shall be approved by an attorney retained by the Junior League. It shall also be approved by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IX—DELEGATES TO ASSOCIATION CONFERENCES

Delegates to the Annual Meeting of the Association shall be Active members elected by the League.

Delegates to special meetings or conferences shall be Active members appointed by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE X-AMENDMENTS AND RULES OF ORDER

The By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting at any meeting of the League, provided the proposed amendment has been mailed to each voting member at least two weeks prior to the date of the meeting; or provided the proposed amendment shall have been presented over the signature of five Active members at least one meeting prior to that at which action is taken, and due notice of such meeting or action is given the membership.

Roberts Rules of Order shall be the parliamentary authority for all matters of procedure not specifically covered by the By-Laws or by special rules of procedure adopted by the League.

ADDENDA

Policies and procedures which have been voted by the Leagues in Association Annual Meetings are binding on all Leagues and League members. They shall be printed as addenda to our By-Laws in the year book. For lack of space they are here omitted. See Page 102-105 in the Junior League Handbook for information.

STANDING RULES

1. Administrative

A. Meetings

A meeting of the Junior League shall be held on the first Tuesday of the following months, unless otherwise desig-nated with proper notice: April, November, December, Jan uary, February and March.

B. Expenses of Delegates
The full expenses of delegates to conferences and the Annual Meeting of the Association shall be paid by the League.

C. Thrift Shop Quota Any Junior League member, other than Non-Resident members, shall be required to pay annually on April 1 in cash to the Thrift Shop any amount not otherwise contributed in rummage to complete her Thrift Shop quota.

2. Departmental

A. Membership Committee

In the case of ties, the active members shall cast a second ballot. The Membership Committee shall acquaint themselves concerning the individual candidates and shall be responsible for finding out their qualifications. After thorough discussion, a vote by secret ballot shall be taken. Seven affirmative votes of the Membership Committee are necessary for election by this committee.

B. Provisional Training Course
Punctual attendance by the Provisional members upon all
lectures planned for the Training Course is compulsory.
A written notice of the dates and hour for all lectures must
accompany each letter of invitation to provisional members.
No further notice need be given unless there is a change of

No further notice need be given unless there is a change vadate or hour for any lecture.

All explanations for absence from any lecture must be sent in writing to the Provisional Membership Chairman. If an excused absence is granted by the chairman, the actual time of the lecture not attended must be made up, and notes of lectures not attended must be secured for study. If the absence is not excused, the entire course and examination must be taken over the following year.

When Beard of Directors shall pass upon the record of each

The Board of Directors shall pass upon the record of each Provisional member and shall determine whether or not said Provisional has satisfactorily performed the requirements

laid down by it.

C. Duties of Committee Chairmen

It shall be the duty of each committee chairman to create and/or maintain a manual for her committee which outlines the methods and procedures by which the committee fulfills the function and duties assigned to it by the By-Laws or by the motion or executive order which creates the committee. Such methods and procedures are subject to change, at the discretion of the committee, provided they do not conflict with the By-Laws, or with any Standing Rules adopted by the League or the Board of Directors.


