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HISTORY OF THE ASSOCIATION OF JUNIOR LEAGUES OF AMERICA

The Junior League represents a serious endeavor on the part of young women to become active and constructive factors in the communities in which they live, to be intelligent citizens, and to assist in promoting human welfare. In addition to providing the member with channels of work and training for volunteer service, the Junior League helps her to realize two vital concepts: (1) that she is not an onlooker, but is herself a part of the community; (2) that the community, in turn, is not an isolated unit but part of the nation and of the world.

It was in 1901, at the beginning of a new era for American women, that the first Junior League was organized in New York. At that time Mary Harriman (Mrs. Chas. Carey Rumsey) and Nathalie Henderson (Mrs. Joseph Swan) realized what might be achieved if a group of young women were encouraged to take a more active part in some form of active service to their own neighborhoods through the settlement houses and other organizations in existence at the time.

Soon similar organizations to that in New York were formed in various other of the large cities—Boston, Brooklyn, Portland, Ore., Baltimore, Philadelphia and Chicago. In the spring of 1912 six of the seven Leagues then in existence held their first national conference in New York City. In 1921 the Association of the Junior Leagues of America, Inc., was founded by the thirty Leagues then in existence. Mrs. Willard Straight (Mrs. Leonard K. Elmhirst) was elected president and a Board of Directors was appointed and instructed to draw up a constitution.

After 1921 the Association grew rapidly until, in 1923, there were sixty-three Leagues. In order to establish a closer contact between the Leagues and the Association, the country was divided into six territories and in each a League member was appointed regional director to act as liaison officer between the Leagues of the region and the Association and to serve on the latter's Board of Directors. Now there are twelve regions, in each of which the Leagues elect every second year a member to serve as their regional director.

At the time the Association was first formed most League activity was in the realm of social work but the Board of Directors, realizing the opportunities which would eventually offer themselves to Junior Leagues, set down in the constitution the social, economic, educational, cultural and civic fields as those in which Junior Leagues should interest their members.

Gradually the Leagues realized that a benevolent "doing for others" was not enough, that they must form a partnership with professional community workers to effect the improvement of conditions. To do this required knowledge. As evidence of this the first course for provisional members was established in 1921 and such a course, which includes an examination of the various forces at work in the community, has been a prerequisite for

active membership since 1927. Originally League projects were large enterprises—convalescent homes, day nurseries, curative workshops and the like. It was discovered, however, that to support these undertakings a disproportionate amount of time and energy often was going into money-raising to the exclusion of the educational process of volunteer service. Today where Leagues have projects the recommended type is one in which the demonstration element is present, the choice being based on the needs of the individual community in the light of the interest and money-raising capabilities of the League.

The League's realization of the need for expert guidance in their welfare activities soon led to the establishment of a trained social work staff at the Association's offices. Members of this staff were available for visits to Leagues to study the local situation and give advice. Similar service was then made available for Children's Theatre, Arts, Ways and Means, and Publicity. The Association also publishes the *Junior League Magazine*, issued monthly to each Junior League member. At the present time the Association has 181 member Leagues, 173 in the United States proper, one in Honolulu, one in Mexico City, and six in Canada, comprising a total of some 60,000 members.

HISTORY OF THE WINSTON-SALEM JUNIOR LEAGUE

The local League was organized in 1923 by about forty of the girls and young women of Winston-Salem with Mrs. Thurmond Chatham as president. We were the 46th League to be admitted to the Association, and the first in North Carolina.

During the second year, under the presidency of Mrs. Paul Montague, our League adopted the point system, and sponsored a pre-natal clinic, which, at the time, was the only one of its kind in North Carolina.

In 1925, with Mrs. Kenneth Mountcastle as president, we brought Will Rogers and the de Reschke quartet to town, opened a gift shop, and began a training course for Provisional members.

During Mrs. Fay Huntley Spencer's (now Mrs. Edwards) administration we undertook the financing of our Hospital for Incurables.

In March, 1928, Mrs. Charles Long become president and on the fifteenth of that month we opened a Beauty Parlor. On May fifteenth we had Paper Day. In this same year the Arts and Interests and Children's Play Committee was formed.

In 1929 Mrs. Ralph Hanes was elected president and was instrumental in starting our monthly Newsheet with Miss Dell Norfleet as its first editor.

In 1930-31, under Mrs. Elsie Hines Norfleet's (now Mrs. Charles Siewers) leadership, we became more nationally minded with respect to the Junior Leagues of America, and began to take a more active part in community affairs as well. We helped to organize the Civic Music Association, began our yearly assistance to the Community Chest Drive, opened a Rag Market (later the Thrift Shop), and initiated Occupational Therapy classes in our hospital.

With Mrs. James Hanes as president in 1932, work began on a placement system, and under Mrs. Linville Martin in 1933, we put the system into effect.

From 1934 to '35, with Mrs. James Hanes serving her second term as president, the League's most important work was the continued operation of the Hospital for Incurables.

In 1935, under Mrs. W. H. Sprunt's presidency, the Winston-Salem Play Group was chosen to represent the medium-sized Leagues at the Children's Theatre Conference in Baltimore.

In March, 1936, Mrs. W. K. Hoyt was elected president. During her term of office we employed a Professional Placement Secretary, and the League as a whole became more familiar with the needs of the community. On June 1, 1937, after the opening of the Forsyth County Hospital and the satisfactory placing of all our patients, the Hospital for Incurables was closed.

In the spring of 1937, we assisted in the organization of the Mental Hygiene Society of Winston-Salem. This society asked the League to finance a Child Guidance Clinic for a demonstration period, and on November 1, the Clinic was opened in the League's Hospital Building. Through professional Placement secretaries we were able to give specialized training to our volunteers.

In 1938, Miss Aurelia Plumly (now Mrs. Ralph Spaugh) was elected president. The League at a cost of \$1,200 per year, continued to sponsor and finance the Child Guidance Clinic, which was under the supervision of the Mental Hygiene Society. Our projects included assistance at the Christmas Exchange, the new Hall of History, and the presentation by Jr. Programs, Inc., which we brought to town. The chief undertaking, however, was the bringing to the community of four New York Dramas of the Contemporary Theatre Series, from which a profit of \$5,000 was made.

With Mrs. A. S. Johnson as president in 1940, the Child Guidance Clinic was moved to new quarters, reorganized, and became affiliated, through its director, with the Bowman Gray School of Medicine in this city. The play group was most active and received national acclaim for its excellent work. Acting on advice from Mrs. Dingman, Secretary of Ways and Means of AJLA, our system of budgeting was revised and a plan for maintaining separate accounts for Administrative and Community Program funds was put into effect. A plan was worked out for conservative spending of the surplus over and above a contingency fund.

In March, 1941, Mrs. Linville Martin was elected to serve as Director of this Region for a two-year term.

The League joined with other interested community groups in forming the Children's Theatre Board, whose purpose is to provide a year-round program of entertainment for the city school children. The League is represented on this Board by the Children's Theatre Committee chairman and two other members of the committee. The Board is responsible for the promotion, financing, and transportation of the children to the entertainments it sponsors. The League's major production became a part of the Board's yearly series, and the League ceased the annual trouping of a smaller play to the city schools.

During the presidency of Mrs. Thomas Rice, from 1941-43, many changes took place. The program of planned expenditure of surplus, advised by the AJLA Staff, was begun: \$3,000 was donated to the Red Cross War Fund, \$1,000 was given to the Library Fund of the Winston-Salem Teachers College, and \$5,000 was given to the Family Service Agency for the establishment of a Child Placing Agency.

A Radio Institute, conducted by Miss Gloria Chandler, AJLA Consultant, began our entrance into the cultural field, and the League allocated \$4,500 to the Community Council for the development of the Radio Plan.

In 1942 the Director of the Child Guidance Clinic resigned, and no replacement was available. The Clinic was evaluated by a

special committee which recommended that it be closed.

Mrs. Helen Lipscomb, of the Staff, conducted a Board members' institute.

The League was very proud to have one of its members, Mrs. Linville Martin, elected President of the Association of Junior Leagues of America. On March 1, 1943, the gift shop was sold to Miss McPhail.

During the term of Mrs. Irving Carlyle, 1943-44, the League began to feel the full impact of World War II. Many of the younger members were away with their husbands, who were in service, while those at home devoted the major part of their volunteer service to war-related activities, such as Red Cross, Bond Sales, Rationing Board, and USO.

A Cultural survey of the community was made by Miss Virginia Lee Cromer, AJLA Arts Consultant, which revealed a need for the development and expression of the creative arts.

From 1944 to 1945 Mrs. George Walker served as president. The League voted to support the Radio Council for a three-year period, allocating \$2,500 per year. A donation of \$1,000 was made to the Wachovia Historical Society to provide a part-time Director for its Museum. The League gave \$600 to the Piedmont Festival and assisted in the sale of tickets to its performances.

In 1945 the Beauty Parlor was sold because the League deemed it unwise to operate a shop in competition with local business, and its community service program was amply protected by a contingency fund.

In a Staff visit for the Arts program, Miss Cromer advised: "Conditions in Winston-Salem indicate that the League would be wise to strengthen already established agencies; i.e., museum, library, recreation department, public schools . . ."

In 1945-46, upon the return of many members who had been away during the war, the League expanded its program under the leadership of Mrs. Thomas Moore, and, on the advice of AJLA, donated the major part of its surplus to the community. Three Staff visits, two in connection with League finances, and one for the Arts program, helped to get the plans under way.

A portion of the invested surplus, consisting of four hundred shares of Reynolds B stock, was turned over to the community: fifty shares to the City-County Hospital; fifty shares to the War Memorial Building Fund; one hundred twenty shares to the Mental Hygiene Society; one hundred eighty shares to the City Library.

The Junior League Hospital Building was deeded to the Winston-Salem Foundation.

The League brought Mrs. Chester Marsh to the community for a three-year demonstration as Arts and Crafts Director for the City Recreation Department, which made space available for a Workshop to carry on the activities.

From 1946-47, Mrs. Bowman Gray served as president. During the summer a story-telling program was conducted at the Wachovia Museum. In January a Staff visit for reorganization of the Thrift Shop resulted in improved management of this project, and we were advised to appoint a project-finding committee.

The League continued its financial support of the Radio Council and the Arts and Crafts program. A survey of fifty-six groups in the community revealed interest in the establishment of an Arts Council, and \$7,200 was put aside from surplus for the employment of a Community Arts Coordinator when the Council proved its readiness to handle the money. The remainder of the invested surplus was donated as follows: \$1,800 to the City Library; \$950 to the Radio Council.

The League contributed \$500 to the Piedmont Festival and sponsored a concert of the newly-formed Winston-Salem Civic Orchestra (now the Winston-Salem Symphony) by selling tickets and handling newspaper and radio publicity. \$750 was given the Leisure Time Division of the Community Council for a coordinator of youth activities at the Fairview Playground, which is in an area not served by any other organization.

During the two-year term of Mrs. Robert Lawson, from 1947-49, a change in the Arts and Crafts Program took place. Half-way through the three-year demonstration, the City Recreation Department withdrew its support when the building which housed the Department was sold. The advice of AJLA was sought, and a visit from the AJLA Arts Consultant, Miss Virginia Lee Cromer, helped to clarify the situation. In the letter of recommendation following her visit, Miss Cromer advised that a strong Board with committee structure be formed for the Workshop. An Interim Committee, composed of League members and others interested, was formed for the Workshop. This committee organized the Arts and Crafts Association, which assumed responsibility for the administration, financing, and promotion of the Workshop. The League agreed to pay the salary of the Director for a three-year period ending October, 1950, and pledged its support to see the program stabilized in the community.

Further advice in Miss Cromer's letter of recommendation was that: a Board Members' Institute be held; we considered ways of lightening the president's job in order that she might be able to serve for two years; our League should adjust its thinking concerning projects, and should know the workings of any agency with which we have a project in the future.

The League voted to contribute \$500 per year for a two-year period toward the support of the Children's Programming Committee of the Radio Council, and also loaned \$1,200 to this committee for the transcription of a radio series, "Storytime."

Mrs. Albert Butler, Jr., was president during the year 1949-1950, when our financial commitments to the Radio Council and to the Arts and Crafts came to an end. The League voted to continue its yearly appropriations of \$3,000 to the Arts and

Crafts Association through March 1951, \$250 to the Piedmont Festival, and \$250 to the Winston-Salem Symphony.

Working with the Piedmont Festival and the Chamber of Commerce, the League helped to organize the Arts Council.

A Project-Finding Committee was appointed.

During the term of Mrs. Clifton Pleasants, 1950-51, the League voted to release the gift of \$7,000 which it had held in trust for the Arts Council, and in August 1950, Miss Gertrude Elliot was employed by the Council as Coordinator.

The request of the Arts and Crafts Association for further support of the Workshop in the amount of \$3,000 was granted through March 1952. \$250 was given to the Winston-Salem Symphony Association. The Junior League play, "Indian Captive," was presented to the county school children at the Mineral Springs Auditorium.

From 1951-52 Mrs. John Whitaker served as President. The Arts Council established an Art Center by moving its member groups, including the Workshop, into a building owned by the Winston-Salem Foundation.

The Project-Finding Committee received a letter from the Arts and Crafts Association, requesting that "... the Junior League consider association with the Arts and Crafts on a permanent basis." The Board turned down this request for permanent support and recommended to the League that it ask the Association to make a specific request.

The League was advised by AJLA to evaluate, to continue Project-Finding, and to have a League Administration Institute. A comprehensive evaluation of the League's administration and program was made. Mrs. Emma Buettner, General Program Consultant from AJLA, conducted the League Administration Institute, and upon her advice a Manual of Procedure was compiled for the use of Board members.

The county school children were brought to Reynolds Auditorium to see the Junior League play, "Tom Sawyer."

After careful consideration, the Board voted to release the Children's Programming Committee from its obligation to return to the League the \$1,200 loaned it for the purpose of transcribing "Storytime."

On March 31, the League's financial contribution to the Arts field was completed through coordination of fund raising for the Arts groups under the Arts Council.

The League entered its 30th year with Mrs. Frank Borden Hanes as president. The Project Finding Committee was re-activated, and after long and hard studies in the many fields open for our sponsorship, a Children's Program emerged as the most popular field for a project. After further studies the League voted a three-fourths majority for a Children's Activities Program at the new City-County Library. A letter of contract was drawn up between the Library Board and the Junior League, allocating \$1,500 to the Program the first year, and limiting the League's sponsorship to three years.

The 30th anniversary was celebrated with a Mardi Gras Ball

on February 6. Commemorating the League's 30 years of volunteer service, the Public Relations Committee published a Brochure interpreting the functions and purposes of the League.

The Thrift Shop was budgeted for \$5,000 to assure the League of sufficient funds to undertake its new project, maintain a contingency fund and continue its membership in local organizations. To help raise this money, a fall Fashion Show was held and a Strip for Thrift dance during the anniversary celebration. Both of these functions netted the Thrift Shop approximately \$1,000 and they were able to turn over to the League in March, approximately \$4,800.

"Beauty and the Beast" was presented to the City School children in March.

The League continued its interest in the Arts Council by voting to give them \$500 to assist in financing their expanded program and again voted to support the Arts Follies one hundred per cent.

At the annual conference in May, Region V was divided and Region XIII formed. We thereby became a member League of Region XIII.

ANNUAL REPORTS OF BOARD OF WINSTON-SALEM JUNIOR LEAGUE

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

The Winston-Salem Junior League was most fortunate to begin its 30th year with an enormous amount of spadework already accomplished—the work of the Evaluation Committee. With a Board Manual of Procedure including duties, calendars, and procedures for each job, continuity of the Executive Committee assured by the Treasurer serving two years, and Special Committees set up to avoid an unwieldy Board, Administration in the League was strengthened considerably. The League also followed through on the Evaluation Committee's recommendations to broaden the scope of League program. Our financial commitments to the Community were over, and the time seemed ripe to proceed on new plans.

The total membership of the Junior League is now 355, 19 of whom are Provisionals. Until their Placement interviews this Fall, they will be taking a well-planned course in Community and League affairs.

Three Conferences were attended during the year by elected delegates. To the Association Conference in Lake Placid, you sent your President and Mrs. Spencer Hanes, Jr. The Regional Conference was held in Atlanta, Ga., and we were ably represented by Mrs. Charles Wade, Jr. and Mrs. Claude Strickland, Jr. The President attended President's Council in Columbia, South Carolina.

In October, we were fortunate to have a visit from Mrs. Moragne Whitney, director of Region V, who gave us an intimate picture of the Association, and good advice on the workings of our League.

Other contacts with the Association have included my visit with Miss Ina Bacon at Association Headquarters in New York to discuss project plans; correspondence with the Staff; and announcements and requests handled by the Board and League whenever necessary. Per capita dues have increased from \$5.00 to \$5.50, but our League was able to absorb this without raising our membership fee. The Board studied the problems of Leagues in Metropolitan areas, initiated by the Boston League, and sent our delegates to Regional Conference prepared to discuss this issue. Winston-Salem is behind the move to split Region V into two Regions. North Carolina and South Carolina will become Region XIII, Georgia and Florida will remain Region V. This will be voted on at the next Association Conference.

There were nine regular meetings of the Winston-Salem Junior League held during the year, and the average attendance was 119. The Annual meeting in April was held at night to include all classifications of membership. The employed members had four regular meetings and one called meeting. These meetings were conducted by the Vice-President.

Although detailed reports of the officers and committee chairmen are incorporated in this yearbook, in order to summarize our year's work, I shall have to touch on each of them briefly. It has been a full year, and I shall be ever indebted to the Board for their tireless and loyal devotion to their duties.

The Project Finding Committee was re-activated and met in September to start their investigations. After thorough study was made on all requests, and speakers on each project had been presented to the League, the Membership met in December to vote their choice of the three proposed projects. It was decided that a three-fourths majority for a project should be required. One project was discarded by the first vote, but no clear majority was reached between the remaining two. In January, the request for the second project was withdrawn, and the League voted to undertake a Children's Activities Program in the new Public Library. A letter of contract was drawn up between the Library Board and the Junior League by the President and the League lawyer. \$1,500 was allocated for the first year, and our sponsorship was limited to three years. Copies of the contract are in the files of the President, Treasurer, and Library Chairman.

Because of an unusual amount of League business to transact, the Education Committee was limited in the scope of outside programs. They were able to present a few, however, and they were well-planned and well-presented. This committee also planned and executed the small group meetings in connection with the final decision on the project. Membership attendance at these meetings was record high, and showed the careful thought behind them. The League voted in June to make the Legislative Chairman a member of the Education Committee. This was done, and the activity of this chairman was confined to working with the Ballot Battalion, meeting with the State Legislative Committee in Raleigh, and informing the Membership of citizen's duties. No bills from other Leagues were sent for our approval.

The Placement Committee studied all possibilities of correct placement procedures, and was able to present a clear and fair picture to the League at the end of the year. They evaluated all Placement jobs and clarified Placement standards. Four new fields of volunteer opportunities in the Library, both Hospitals, Old Salem, and the Child Guidance Clinic, have been added to the Placement program, which should stimulate new interest among many of our volunteers. The talent file and statistics on sustaining members have been brought up-to-date. There are 81 League members serving on 21 different community boards. Almost every Community Agency using volunteers has Junior League help.

The Newssheet had one new feature this year. In connection with the League's 30th Anniversary, "Way Back When" was introduced. It consisted of excerpts from the files of old News-sheets.

The Public Relations Committee increased its activity due

to the potential news-worthy items in connection with the 30th Anniversary. A full-page "spread" in the Journal and Sentinel featured the Mardi-Gras Ball, and included a resume of the League's 30 years of community service. A Brochure was prepared with infinite care interpreting the functions and purpose of the League. The Newspapers printed pictures and articles of our Thrift Shop, new project, and many other important League activities, and this helped to bring to the public an accurate account of Junior League purpose.

The Finance Committee budgeted the Thrift Shop for \$5,000 this year so that the League would have money to spend on a project and on worthwhile requests from the Community, and to set up and maintain a contingency fund. The League remained a member of local organizations and added another to its list. A gift of \$500 was made to the Arts Council to assist in financing their expanded program. \$1,500 was set aside for the Library project, and an equal amount has been set aside as a contingency fund and will be invested in Building and Loan to draw interest.

The Ways and Means Committee was mainly concerned with ways of helping the Thrift Shop secure additional merchandise in order to meet its increased quota. They recommended a Fall Fashion Show and a Strip-For-Thrift dance. The League approved these suggestions and a chairman of each activity was appointed. These functions proved successful, and brought in about \$1,000 for the Thrift Shop. The committee felt it might be advisable to move the Shop to larger quarters, but after intensive investigation by one of its members, the Membership decided a move would be too costly, and voted to remodel the Shop in its present location.

The Thrift Shop in an effort to increase the profits of the shop this year began the year by asking the Membership to increase their quota of rummage from \$20.00 to \$25.00, and the volunteer hours from five to six hours. This was accepted, and with the extra Ways and Means projects, the Thrift Shop was able to turn over approximately \$4,800 to the League. The Shop has been proven to be an excellent way to earn money for our Community Fund in an over-burdened city, previously committed to other fund drives.

"Beauty and the Beast" was acclaimed by 4,200 city school children, but due to an unavoidable misunderstanding, the County children were not able to participate this year. It is hoped that this can be avoided in the future. Manuals were made for each of the nine committee heads. They helped define the different jobs to everyone's satisfaction.

An article on the Winston-Salem Arts Council was submitted to the Magazine, and appeared in the March issue in a composite article. A write-up of the 30th Anniversary celebration with pictures has been submitted to the Magazine.

The By-Laws Committee revised the League's Admissions system, strengthening the vote of the Admissions Committee and

dropping the vote of the Board. This Committee recommends that this system be evaluated after two years and changed if necessary. Another By-law change involved the Administrative structure of the League. It is no longer mandatory for the past President to serve on the Executive Committee.

With the visit of the Regional Director, the 30th Anniversary, the Christmas dance, the Provisional Coffee and the June luncheon, the Hospitality Committee had an unusually heavy schedule. This committee worked with a special committee to plan the 30th Anniversary dance. They combined three functions into one, so that the sustaining and provisional members were honored at the same time the Strip-for-Thrift dance was held. Thus, the Mardi Gras Ball was evolved.

In connection with the 30th Anniversary, a detailed history of the Junior League was written, and this will be put in the permanent files. The history will be kept up-to-date, and will be valuable reference material.

The Library asked the Junior League to sponsor and finance the Museum of Modern Arts' traveling exhibit, "Musical Themes" from April 26th to May 16th, 1953, The Board voted to accept, believing this to be a wonderful opportunity to benefit the Community and the League. A portion of the \$1,500 allocated for the Library will be spent on this project. Members of the Cultural Arts Committee will handle publicity, promotion, and the technical end. The new Placement Committee will supply volunteer guards during the hours the exhibit will be open.

The League voted to support the Arts Council Follies 100% in 1952, and again in 1953. In this way, we hoped to help an old project become financially independent.

The delegates to National Conference in April of 1952 were proud of our League's exhibit on evaluation. Many requests from other Leagues for copies of our Board Manual of Procedure proved its success.

In looking back, the Junior League has experienced a full and satisfactory year. We accomplished much, but there is more to be done and there is an increasing pressure on members to fulfill the many obligations. This is a challenge that the Junior League has never failed to meet, so I am confident that the next 30 years will be as happy as the past thirty.

It has been a privilege to serve as President this year. My associations with the Board and Membership were most pleasant and gratifying, and I would like to extend my thanks to each of you.

The Professional members of the Winston-Salem Junior League held four regular meetings in 1952-53, in April, October, December, and February, one call meeting in March and one coffee meeting in November. The coffee meeting and the February meeting were held in homes and the others were held at the Arts Council Center. There were 22 regular members in this group with two others who attended when their part-time jobs made it impossible for them to attend the regular meetings. At the end of the year our members numbered 19, two girls having moved out-of-town and three having become regular members, eight new provisionals were added to the group at the February meeting making the total membership of the group number 27.

All of the important business matters that occurred during the year were brought before the members and, like the full League meetings this year, much time was spent concerning projects and by-law changes. Appropriate Board members were invited to attend the professional meetings regarding these two meetings of great importance (projects in December and by-laws in February and March).

The Professional's ability to serve in a variety of volunteer jobs in the committee has always been limited and the members are pleased that two new volunteer possibilities have come out of this year's discussion. They have shown much interest in Library opportunities and also in recreational therapy. It is very important for all professional members to work on the same project with the League at large whenever possible and these new placement fields seem to hold much promise of this.

Approximately ten of the professional members were volunteers for the Arts Council Follies, both selling tickets and participating in the production and they plan to give their time in this same way for the second Follies production since this fits ideally into their working schedule.

BY-LAWS

The By-Laws Committee was assigned the job of revising the League's Admissions system, with the suggestion that election of provisional members be placed entirely in the hands of the Admissions Committee.

A study was made of the procedures used by twelve other Leagues in Region V. It was found that the method of nominating and electing the Admissions Committee, as well as the number of members who serve, varies, but all Leagues in this Region give the committee the power to elect the provisionals. Following its study and discussion of the systems of other Leagues and a review of past procedures in this League, the committee drew up a set of recommendations which were discussed with this year's Admissions Committee. A set of proposed changes, incorporating these recommendations, was presented to the membership, and after discussion and revision was adopted. The major changes are: the vote of the Board has been dropped; the number of affirmative votes necessary to pass the Admissions Committee has been increased; the power to nominate, as well as to elect, the Admissions Committee has been given to the membership.

The By-Laws Committee recommended a method for limiting the number of provisional members to be admitted each year, but this was voted down by the membership. A proposal from the floor to enlarge the Admissions Committee and to make the vote less restrictive was likewise voted down.

Due to the important and far-reaching effects of the Admissions system, the By-Laws Committee recommends that it be evaluated after two years' experience under the new set-up (in March, 1955). It is suggested that this evaluation be made by the chairmen of the Nominating and Admissions Committees during the next two years, and that their findings be presented to the Board and to the membership. We also recommend that the advisability of a less restrictive vote with a quota be further considered.

Another By-Laws change was made involving the Administrative structure of the League. This was to strike out the provision making it mandatory for the president to serve on the Executive Committee and the Board the year following her term of office. This provision had been included to insure continuity in Administration; however, it was emphasized during the President's Council that this purpose is best served through more officers and committee chairmen serving second terms in the same jobs.

Fifteen meetings were held by this committee.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Finance Committee met periodically during the year to study and supervise the financing of the League's administrative and community programs. Recommendations were made to the Board in this regard.

By vote of the Board a membership fee of \$25.00 was paid to the State Legislation Committee; also, \$25.00 was given to the Forsyth County Ballot Batallion. This, in all probability, will be an annual request.

In January, the Arts Council requested \$500 to assist in financing their expanded program for the current year. This request was approved by the Board and League at large.

Upon selecting the Children's Activity Program at the Library as a project, the League obligated itself in the amount of \$1,500 for the coming year. An equal amount has been set aside as a contingency fund and will be invested in the Building and Loan to draw interest until needed.

The League voted to remodel the Thrift Shop this year. The Shop will try to absorb this expense itself. However, the League has sufficient funds available to supplement the project if necessary. If not used, these funds should be invested and added to the contingency fund.

The Thrift Shop paid the League \$4,696.96 during the year. The amount budgeted for the Thrift Shop in 1953-54 will be decreased since the contingency fund has already been established and because of the added expense in remodeling the Shop.

All dues were collected except one. This case, along with another, was granted honorary membership. These members will be entitled to all the privileges of the League without financial obligations.

The 1953-54 budget was drawn up and submitted to the Board and League. It was approved and accepted.

PLACEMENT

It is impossible to calculate the number of volunteer hours given to the League and to the community by our membership this year. We know it would be a staggering total. The Fashion Show and the Strip-for-Thrift Ball for the benefit of the Thrift Shop were extra this year. The Project Finding Committee and all the ground work that went into the choice of a project. The By-Laws Committee with their thorough and extensive study of admission procedures; the Public Relations Committee and their all-out effort for the Brochure, these were additions to routine League business.

Much time and energy on the Follies—past and present. Forty-three girls produced the play. Thirty-seven League girls did volunteer jobs with the Radio Council. Thirty-eight worked for the Council.

A total of twenty-two are doing Scout work—fifteen as leaders; eighteen in Red Cross work; eight on YWCA committees; four at OB clinic. There are eighty-one League members on twenty-one different community boards.

We have added four new fields to our Placement Program this year. There are eight regular volunteers at Old Salem, Inc.; four at the Child Guidance Clinic; thirty-four signed up for the Library; sixteen are doing Recreational Therapy with convalescing children in our hospitals.

Upon recommendation of AJLA to keep in contact with our non-resident members, the Placement Committee mailed to each non-resident member a blank asking for information on their volunteer activity where they are now living. We have heard from sixteen, and they are all doing some form of community work and mention how much their membership in the Junior League has meant to them.

Mrs. Lois DeHart has helped compile statistics on our sustaining members, and this will be kept in the files.

The talent file has been brought up-to-date as recommended by last year's committee.

The League passed two by-law changes relating to Placement this year. The first pertains to the composition of the Place-

ment Committee. The new by-law reads as follows: "The Placement Committee shall be composed of a chairman, vice-chairman, interviewers, and such persons as they shall designate."

The second by-law change is an attempt to make clearer to the membership placement requirements for volunteer service. The new by-law reads: "Active members shall justify their membership by the equivalent of one-half day's work a week in established community agencies using volunteers and/or activities identified with the Junior League."

In addition, we have passed on to next year's Placement Committee several recommendations which we feel will be helpful. These were sent to the membership in a letter from the Placement Committee in March.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank each and every one who has cooperated so willingly and enthusiastically in answering the many calls for volunteer work.

The Placement Committee feels that the Junior League has had a most successful year and we are proud of our membership.

PROJECT FINDING

The Project Finding Committee met for the first time in September to outline and analyze our work for the coming year. At this time two girls were appointed to study each of the three projects under consideration. These proposed projects were—(1) A children's program at the new Public Library; (2) Salem Restoration and; (3) A recreational program for convalescent children in the City and Baptist Hospitals. Leaders in each of these fields in the community were interviewed in order to ascertain the needs and the suitability of League sponsorship and the reports from the interviews were discussed at our next meeting. It was decided, after a thorough investigation, that the request from the Salem Restoration Program should be rejected as a possible League project because their need was, primarily, for a small number of volunteers and their request was turned over to the Placement Committee.

At this time, our Committee received a new request from the Arts Council, asking that the Junior League be a co-sponsor of the Children's activities program. The request was investigated and the Committee decided that it should be presented to the League for consideration along with the two other projects.

Three men were invited to talk to the League at the November meeting, each one presenting the Project which he wished the League to adopt. Mr. Ralph Hanes spoke on the Children's Program at the Library; Mr. Stanley Kimball on the Children's activities of the Arts Council; and Dr. Robert Lawson talked on the convalescent care of children. He especially pointed out the great need for a new convalescent children's hospital and requested that the League be the "spark-plug" in getting such

a Hospital started in the city. Each speaker gave an excellent talk and presented a clear picture of his particular proposed project—pointing out to the League what would be involved both financially and volunteerwise.

The Committee requested that a series of coffees be given in November in order that the entire membership could meet in small groups to discuss the three proposed projects and to clarify any questions raised by individual members. A meeting was also held for Sustaining members and a number of Leagues which have projects dealing with children's Hospitals and Library Programs were contacted. Members of the Committee acted as group leaders for the coffees and the secretaries were chosen from the Board. It was felt that these coffees were highly successful and the primary fact established was that the League, as a whole, was now ready to undertake a new project.

The December League meeting was given over entirely to a general discussion of the three proposed projects and it was voted by the membership that a three-fourths majority was necessary to adopt any one project. A vote was then taken at which time the Program for the Arts Council Children's activities was completely eliminated. A second vote was then taken between the two remaining projects and a three-fourths majority was not established for either one.

In January, Dr. Lawson withdrew his request for the League to sponsor a convalescent Children's Hospital but he pointed out the still existing need for recreational care for the children of the City and Baptist Hospital. His letter was read at the January League meeting and (at this time) it was voted to turn this Program over to the Placement Committee. A final vote was then taken and the Winston-Salem Junior League voted to adopt the sponsorship of a Children's Program at the Public Library as our new project for 1953-54. The amount of \$1,500 was allocated from the Community Fund to be used for this project starting April 1st.

I want to take this opportunity to thank every member of my Committee for her excellent and untiring support and cooperation throughout the past year. I feel that the League has chosen carefully and wisely and that the new project will be a source of increasing pride in the years to come.

PROVISIONAL

On April 1st, 1952, we had seventeen Provisionals on the membership list of the Winston-Salem Junior League. Two of the group transferred as Provisionals to other Leagues, one transferred as an active member to another League, and one was granted a year's extension of time to complete her course, another was granted a two year extension of time to complete her course; the remaining twelve were voted into active membership in February.

The Children's Theatre Course was held in February and March; each girl chose the job in which she was most interested.

During the month of April, the Community Lecture Course was given; each Provisional selected the subject in our Community life in which she wished to do research work. Active members of the League were called on to work with Provisionals in securing sources of material for their papers. The following subjects were included: Health, History, Industry, Cultural Development, Recreation, Education, Government, Housing, Future Planning and Welfare. In addition to these lectures, seven field trips were planned in connection with the subjects discussed.

In May the girls met at the Thrift Shop and during June, July and August, they worked at the shop marking and selling.

A Radio Course was given in September, while the months of October and November were spent introducing the girls to Arts and Crafts Workshop.

The January Newssheet was put out by the Provisionals.

In February, 1953, sixteen new Provisionals were invited to join the Winston-Salem Junior League. The committee planned in outline form the year's work which was explained to each Provisional at an interview before she accepted her invitation. The Children's Theatre Unit, the discussion on History of the Winston-Salem Junior League and the Association of Junior Leagues of America, and two meetings of the Community Lecture Course have been completed.

There are nineteen Provisionals on the membership list of the Winston-Salem Junior League at this time.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

The Public Relations Committee was composed of a representative from five League committees, in addition to the chairman and vice-chairman. Other League committee chairmen were consulted when necessary. A meeting was held at the first of the year to explain our purpose and to plan the work for the coming year. It was pointed out that it is the sum total of impressions made on the public through the membership and their activities, in their policies, plans, and their project, that makes our public relations.

Our plans for the year centered on the fact that this was the League's thirtieth anniversary. The anniversary celebration, the Mardi Gras and Strip-for-Thrift dance, was featured in the Journal and Sentinel in a "spread" written by Miss Elizabeth Trotman, Woman's Editor of the Journal, which included a resume of the principal community services the League has rendered in the past thirty years.

Committee members met several times during the year to plan and prepare a brochure in honor of our thirtieth anniversary, interpreting the functions and purpose of the League. Copies of this brochure have been distributed to all members

of the League, agencies with whom the League works, the Chamber of Commerce, the editors and reporters of the newspapers, and the other Leagues in Region V.

An excellent newspaper story about the Thrift Shop was written by Miss Trotman for the Journal to publicize the fashion show given by a local store for the Shop's benefit. This story created much new interest in and business for the Thrift Shop.

A meeting was held to prepare an article for the Newsheet which might help to explain to the members the total League program, and the place of a project in our program. The ensuing articles, called "Let's Straighten Out Our Thinking," appeared in the January issue of the Newsheet. Also, a notice was printed in the Newsheet in February, asking members, when interviewed by a reporter, to point with pride that she is a member of the Junior League, since each member, through her activities is an interpreter of the League program to the public.

The Sentinel handled the press releases, received from Miss Kay Bailly, Public Relations Counsel for AJLA, as well as the coverage of the conferences. The monthly meetings and the Christmas dance, in addition to the feature on our anniversary and the article on the Thrift Shop, were covered by the Journal. All of these articles, in addition to all articles concerning League members' activities, were filed in a scrapbook for a permanent record.

A letter was written to Mr. Wallace Carroll, Executive Editor of the Journal and Sentinel, to express our appreciation for the splendid cooperation and service given to the Junior League during the year by the staffs of both papers.

THRIFT SHOP

The Thrift Shop Committee this past year has attempted to increase the profits of the shop to help the League build up the Contingency Fund. Many members as well as the Committee itself have worked extra hours to make this possible.

At the beginning of the year the League raised the Thrift Shop's quota to the League from \$2,500 to \$5,000. The membership also voted at this time to raise the member's quota to the shop from \$20.00 to \$25.00 and the compulsory working hours as salesgirls from five hours to six per year.

To assist the Thrift Shop raise this extra money the Ways and Means Committee set about finding projects that would bring in additional merchandise. A Fashion Show, with Mrs. John Creech as chairman, was held at Montaldo's on September 12th, for which the admission was a bundle of clothes. Mrs. Luther Upton and her committee marked the merchandise received, which was valued at approximately \$450.00. In February, a Mardi Gras Ball, under the chairmanship of Mrs. Sam Orr, was held at the Old Town Club. This event was a com-

mination of a Strip-for-Thrift dance, a 30th Anniversary celebration, and a party for the new Provisionals and Sustaining members, and prizes were given to the persons wearing the most articles. The merchandise given was marked again by Mrs. Upton and her committee and was valued at approximately \$435.00.

At the June meeting the League voted to have the Ways and Means Committee investigate any other locations that might be available for the Thrift Shop. This Committee completed their investigations and after hearing their report in January, the Thrift Shop Committee recommended to the membership that we discontinue the search for a new location and invest in redecorating and modernizing our present shop. It was suggested that an architect be asked to submit suggestions as to how it could best be done.

During the three weeks before Christmas we had displayed in the shop window six prizes, donated by members and all customers who came into the shop were given chances. We felt this was successful both for sales, which were up from the previous December and in good will publicity.

During the year the Marking Committees were reorganized and three committees were formed. One for Professionals which meets in the evening, and two which meet alternate Wednesday afternoons.

The new policy of holding commission goods went into effect the first of February. The shop will hold these goods for three months only, instead of one year, with two weeks granted to the consignee to pick up her merchandise, after which time it becomes the property of the shop.

The stock has been gone through periodically and liberal donations given to the Goodwill Industries.

The total sales for this year are \$10,906.84, the operating expenses and commission totaling \$6,620.58, showing a net profit of \$4,286.26. A total of \$4,696.96 was turned over to the League Treasurer.

As chairman, I would like to express my thanks for the help and co-operation given me by the members of this committee, and also to those League members who have given generously of their time.

WAYS AND MEANS

The Ways and Means Committee first met in May, 1952 to make plans for the year and to review the duties and procedures of this committee. For the year 1952-53 the committee was mainly concerned with ways of helping the Thrift Shop secure additional merchandise in order to meet its increased quota to the League's Community Fund. After studying FINANCIAL FINESSE and Ways and Means of other Leagues, a list of suggestions was drafted for the Thrift Shop—ways in which to secure additional merchandise for year-round selling.

For the two large money-raising activities, the committee recommended and the Board passed the following events: The Fall Fashion Show, held in September, and the Strip-for-Thrift Ball which was held in February. Chairmen for these events were Mrs. John Creech and Mrs. Sam Orr, respectively. Both of these functions proved successful for the Thrift Shop since they brought in around \$1,000 worth of extra saleable goods.

The committee felt that it was advisable to explore possibilities of moving the Shop to larger quarters and more desirable surroundings, since it is the only money-making project the League has to finance its Community Program. After intensive investigation by Mrs. John Glenn, Jr. and her report to the membership, it was decided by the League to keep the Thrift Shop in its present location—mainly due to much higher building rents elsewhere. The membership voted to remodel the present shop rather than change the location.

Each member of this committee gave excellent support and cooperation to the chairman, and through their efforts the Ways and Means Committee was able to function successfully.

By-Laws of the Junior League of Winston-Salem

ARTICLE I—NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Junior League of Winston-Salem, Incorporated.

ARTICLE II—OBJECT AND POLICIES

Object: The object of this League shall be to foster interest among its members in the social, economic, educational, cultural and civic conditions of the community and to make efficient their volunteer service.

Policies: The policies of the League shall be in harmony with the policies of the Association of Junior Leagues of America, Incorporated.

ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Classes of Membership.

The membership of this League shall consist of young women who shall comply with the requirements of the Association. The classes of membership shall be Provisional, Active, Sustaining, Non-Resident.

A. Provisional Membership

Provisional members are those who are engaged in complying with the requirements for admission to Active Membership and are not eligible to vote or hold office. Provisional members shall be required to complete a provisional member's course, which shall meet the standards set by the Association, and a period of volunteer service satisfactory to the Placement Committee within twelve months after their election to provisional membership. An extension of time may be granted by the Board of Directors in the case of provisionals who for unavoidable reasons are unable to complete the course. Provisionals who have completed these requirements are admitted to active membership by a three-fourths vote of the Board of Directors. Those members failing to meet the provisional requirements shall be dropped from membership by a three-fourths vote of the Board of Directors and may not come up again for membership within two years.

B. Active Membership

Active members are those who have completed the requirements for Provisional Members and have been admitted to Active membership. They may not be over forty years of age, with the exception of Board members completing their term of office. They may hold office and vote. They shall justify their membership by the equivalent of $\frac{1}{2}$ day's work per week in established community agencies using volunteers and/or activities identified with the Junior League.

C. Sustaining Membership

Sustaining members are those who have reached the age limit for Active membership. They may not vote or hold office.

D. Non-Resident Membership

Active and Sustaining members in good standing are entitled to Non-Resident membership which is open to those living outside the county of Forsyth, North Carolina nine months a year. They may not vote or hold office.

Section 2. Admission to Membership

A. Eligibility

A proposed member shall be from nineteen to thirty-three years of age, shall have completed her schooling, and shall have been a resident of Winston-Salem or its vicinity for at least one year. She shall have a personal interview with the President and the Provisional Chairman. Before she accepts the invitation, she shall agree to fulfill the duties and obligations of membership.

B. Proposal of Members

Each candidate shall be proposed by one member and seconded by two members on an application blank provided for the purpose. No candidate shall be proposed or seconded by a member of the Admissions Committee nor of the Executive Committee, nor by her relative (mother, mother-in-law, sister, sister-in-law, aunt, niece, or first cousin). No candidate shall be considered whose name has been proposed and voted on four times.

Application for membership shall be received by the Chairman of the Admissions Committee at any time during the year. The deadline for applications for those members to be taken in the following February shall be June 1. Only one blank for each candidate shall be accepted by the Admissions Committee.

Any eligible Active or Sustaining member may propose one candidate and second one candidate during a given year, but no member shall write to the committee in behalf of a candidate. No member of the League shall contact any member of the Admissions Committee in behalf of a candidate except at the open meetings held for this purpose.

C. Election to Membership

The chairman shall present the names of proposed candidates to the voting members of the Admissions Committee, and each shall vote by secret ballot. Eight affirmative votes of the Admissions Committee shall qualify a proposed candidate for membership. Invitations shall be mailed immediately to those elected, and the names of those who accept shall be announced by the Admissions Chairman at the February meeting.

If a candidate is unable to take the Basic Provisional Course or to transfer to another League, she must decline the invitation to membership. In this event, the invitation shall be re-issued the following year only.

Section 3. Changes in Membership

Applications for change to another class of membership shall be made in writing to the Corresponding Secretary and will be acted upon by the Board of Directors at any time during the year.

Inter-League Membership

A member of any League who is subject to frequent change in residence may have an Inter-League card issued to her by the League of which she is regularly a member, accrediting her temporarily to the League in the city where she is temporarily residing. An inter-League member shall continue to be listed as a member of and shall pay her regular dues to the League which issues the card; she shall also have all privileges of membership in the League to which she is temporarily accredited, except the right to vote or hold office; she shall comply with the requirements of such League.

Transfer of Members

Only Provisional, Active, Sustaining and Non-Resident members in good standing shall have the right of transferring membership to another League. The right of transfer granted in this section need not extend to a person who has lived for some time in Winston-Salem without being a member of this League, a person who has been refused membership or who has been dropped or expelled from membership by this League. Transferred Provisional members shall take the additional training required by Leagues to which they transfer. The Board of Directors is not required to accept transfers which exceed twenty-five per cent of all admissions to membership in any one year. If it is necessary for transfers to be put on a waiting list they shall be accepted in the order in which they apply.

Section 4. Resignations, Dropped Members, Re-instatements

A. Resignations

Any member of the League who is not in arrears in dues or in the performance of League duties may resign. Resignations shall be made in writing to the Recording Secretary

of the League at least two weeks before dues become payable; otherwise members shall be liable for dues for the coming year.

B. Dropped Members

Members may be dropped from the League for cause by a three-fourths vote of the Board of Directors.

C. Re-instatements

Members who have resigned while in good standing may be re-instated by a three-fourths vote of the Board of Directors, upon paying a sum determined by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS

Section 1. Personnel

The officers of this League shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, and Assistant Treasurer.

Section 2. Nomination

The Nominating Committee shall present a slate of one candidate for each office to be filled. The slate shall be sent by the Recording Secretary to each voting member of the League at least two weeks before the election meeting.

Independent nominations may be made in writing by five active members of the League, provided the nominee has given her consent.

It shall be the duty of the Nominating Committee to insure continuity of administration by retaining one or more members of the Executive Committee for two terms.

Section 3. Elections

Officers shall be elected at the February meeting of the League for a term of one year with the exception of the Treasurer, who shall be elected for a term of two years. They shall assume their duties immediately after the April meeting.

Section 4. Duties

The powers and duties of the officers shall be as follows:

A. President

The President shall preside at meetings of the League, Board of Directors and Executive Committee; shall appoint the Admissions Chairman and personnel of Committees, not otherwise provided for with the approval of the Executive Committee, and shall be a member ex-officio of all committees except the Nominating Committee. She shall, with the Treasurer, sign all contracts, and obligations authorized by the Board of Directors, and shall perform the duties pertaining to the office.

B. Vice-President

The Vice-President shall assist the President and perform the duties of the President in her absence.

C. Recording Secretary

The Recording Secretary shall keep minutes of the meetings of the League, the Board of Directors, and the Executive Committee. She shall keep a correct, classified list of the names and addresses of all members and shall maintain a file of essential records which shall be transferred to her successor at the close of her term of office. She shall, with the Corresponding Secretary, compile the annual reports and edit the year book, and she shall inform all independent nominees of their nominations.

D. Corresponding Secretary

The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the general correspondence of the League. She shall assist the Recording Secretary in compiling the annual reports and editing the year book.

E. Treasurer

The Treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the League and shall receive all monies except for those activities which have their own treasurer or other person specifically appointed to handle finances. Such persons shall be under supervision of the Treasurer. She shall serve as Chairman of the Finance Committee. She shall make payments in accordance with the budget on written authorization of the President: expenses not provided for in the budget shall be incurred and paid only upon order of the Board of Directors. She shall keep full and accurate accounts and shall present financial statements at regular meetings of the League and Board: she shall turn over to her successor all books and financial records and shall take a listed receipt therefor.

F. Assistant Treasurer

The Assistant Treasurer shall collect all dues and assessments, check attendance records, and assist the Treasurer when necessary.

Section 5. Executive Committee

There shall be an Executive Committee, composed of the officers, which shall assist the President in making appointments. It shall have all the powers of the Board of Directors during the months in which there are no regularly scheduled Board meetings. The minutes of the meetings of the Executive Committee shall be submitted to the Board for ratification at its next meeting.

ARTICLE V—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. Personnel

The Board of Directors shall consist of the officers and the chairman designated by the Executive Committee each year. Chairmen are appointed by the President with the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Term of Office

Officers are elected for a term of one year; chairmen appointed for a term of one year. No officer or chairman shall hold the same office for more than two terms in succession.

Section 3. Duties and Powers

The Board of Directors shall have general charge and control of the affairs, funds and property of the League. It shall be the final arbiter in matters of interpretation of these By-Laws. It shall present to the membership all proposed major program activities for ratification.

Section 4. Vacancies

Vacancies among the offices shall be filled by election by the Board of Directors. Vacancies among the chairmen shall be filled by the President with the approval of the Executive Committee until the expiration of the term of office.

Section 5. Meetings

The Board of Directors shall hold regular monthly meetings from October through June. Special meetings may be called by the President and must be called upon the written request of three members of the Board.

Section 6. Quorums

Eight members of the Board of Directors and three members of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum respectively.

ARTICLE VI—COMMITTEES

There shall be the following Committees who shall present plans for work to the Board of Directors. No work shall be undertaken without the Board's approval.

A. Admissions Committee

There shall be an Admissions Committee, whose function shall be to pass upon all applications for membership in the League. This committee shall be elected at the time and in the manner herein provided, and shall serve for one year.

(a) Personnel of Committee

The committee shall be composed of eleven members: A Chairman, who shall be appointed by the Executive Committee, and shall not be entitled to vote; a Sustaining member who shall be elected by the League, and shall NOT be entitled to vote; and nine voting members, who shall be elected by the League as provided in this Article.

(b) Eligibility to Serve on Committee

To be eligible for election to the Admissions Committee, a member must have been active for at least one year, and a resident of Winston-Salem or its vicinity for at least five years. A voting member shall be eligible to serve for two consecutive years, and shall be ineligible to serve for the following year, except as chairman. The chairman may have been a voting member of the Admissions Committee for two consecutive years prior to her chairmanship but after her term as chairman shall be ineligible to serve for the following year. The Sustaining member shall have been sustaining no longer than ten years and shall have served on the Admissions Committee during her active membership. No one who has a sister, sister-in-law, daughter, daughter-in-law, niece, or first cousin proposed for membership shall serve on this committee.

No mother and daughter nor two or more sisters shall serve on the same Admissions Committee.

Neither the President nor the Vice-President shall be eligible to serve on this committee.

(c) Election of Committee

Election of this committee shall be held at the April meeting.

At the March meeting, the Nominating Committee shall present to the active members a list divided into three age groups of all active members eligible for election, and the names of those present members of the Admissions Committee who are eligible for re-election. These age groups shall be as follows: 21 to 29, 29 to 35, and 35 through 39. Each active member present shall nominate, by secret ballot, 4 members from her own age group, and 5 members from the present Admissions Committee.

Consent of a nominee shall be obtained by the Nominating Committee before her name is placed on the ballot. At the April meeting, the Nominating Committee shall present a list of the 4 nominees receiving the highest number of votes from each age group, the 5 nominees receiving the highest number of votes from the present Admissions Committee, and 3 nominees from the Sustaining members.

Each active member present shall vote for 2 nominees from each age group, for 3 nominees from the present Admissions Committee, and for 1 Sustaining member.

In the event that close relatives are elected to this committee, it shall be the duty of the Nominating Committee to determine which of them shall serve.

In case of a tie vote, in either nomination or election of this committee, it shall be the duty of the Nominating Committee to determine which members shall serve.

The names of the Admissions Committee members shall be announced by the President.

(d) Vacancies on Committee

Vacancies on the Admissions Committee shall be filled by the Nominating Committee from among the nominees in the categories in which the vacancies occur. No sponsor of a candidate shall be eligible to fill a vacancy on this committee.

(e) Duties of Committee

It shall be the duty of the Admissions Committee to consider all proposed candidates by acquainting themselves concerning each individual's desirability and qualifications for membership in the League.

A secretary shall be elected by the Admissions Committee from among its members. She, with the Chairman, shall be responsible for keeping an accurate record of all names considered by the committee. These records shall be kept in a permanent file which shall be kept confidential and handed from chairman to chairman for reference by the Admissions Committee.

Members of the Admissions Committee shall take an oath of secrecy, as follows: "I swear that, to the best of my ability, nothing which is said in these Admissions Committee meetings shall be divulged by me, either by statement or implication. I swear that to the best of my ability, my vote will be cast considering the best interest of the Junior League, disregarding my personal feelings."

The Admissions Committee shall hold at least eight meetings during the year, one or more of which shall be open meetings.

If a candidate or her family is not known to at least seven members of the Admissions Committee by its fifth meeting, the application blank shall be returned to the sponsors with an explanatory note.

B. Placement Committee

The Placement Committee shall include the Placement Chairman, and a vice-chairman, the Interviewer and such other members as they shall designate. The function of the Placement Committee shall be to plan and supervise the volunteer service program of the League. It shall interview all active members at regular intervals and offer them a free choice of placement in the Community Service program conducted by the League.

C. Education Committee

The Education Committee shall include the Education Chairman, and a member of each committee responsible for any part of the Education program. These committees being designated by the Executive Committee each year. The duties of the Education Committee shall be to plan and supervise the educational program of the League.

D. Nominating Committee

The Nominating Committee shall be composed of five members; two elected by the Board, one a Board member, the other not a board member; and three elected by the League one who has been active from one to four years inclusive, one active from five to nine years inclusive, and one who has been active over nine years. These shall be nominated from the floor at the April meeting from a roster of eligible League members. The Committee shall elect its own chairman. The Placement Chairman shall serve ex-officio.

E. Public Relations Committee

The Public Relations Committee shall include the Public Relations Chairman, and a member of each committee responsible for each phase of the League program. The duties of the Public Relations Committee shall be to plan and supervise the publicity of the League. No member of the League shall give out to the press any news item or information concerning the League without the approval of the Public Relations Committee.

F. Newssheet Committee

The Newssheet Committee shall consist of the Newssheet Editor, as Chairman, and such assistants as she may require. The duties of the Newssheet Committee are to edit and publish the Newssheet.

G. Finance Committee

The Finance Committee shall include the Treasurer, as chairman, the Assistant Treasurer, the treasurer of any money-raising activity either permanent or temporary, and a past League Treasurer. The duties of this committee shall be to plan the financing of the total League program, com-

pile the budget, study and oversee the League's funds and investments, and to present facts to the Board and to the League of the League's financial status in any discussion regarding financial expenditure.

H. Magazine Committee

The Magazine Committee shall consist of the Magazine Chairman and such assistants as she may require. The function of the Magazine Committee shall be to report to the Junior League Magazine any developments in the League program considered to be of publication interest and value, as well as to follow up suggestions and requests from the Junior League Magazine Editor for material. It shall also develop the use of the Magazine as a program aid in its own League.

I. Special Committees

Special Committees shall be appointed by the President with the approval of the Executive Committee which shall designate their powers and the term of the committee's appointment.

ARTICLE VII—MEETINGS OF THE LEAGUE

Section 1—Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the League shall be held in April for the purpose of receiving the annual reports and of installing officers for the ensuing year.

Section 2—Regular and Special Meetings

Regular meetings shall be held from October through June, the February meeting being designated for the election of officers. Other meetings shall be held at the discretion of the Board of Directors or upon written request of ten members of the League.

Section 3. Quorum

A quorum of the League shall consist of one-third of the voting members.

ARTICLE VIII—FINANCIAL ARRANGEMENTS

Section 1. Fiscal Year, Audit and Bonding

The fiscal year shall be from April 1 through March 31.

The books and accounts of the League shall be kept in accordance with sound accounting practices. The League shall maintain a community fund separate and distinct from its administrative fund, the two being carried in separate banking accounts. All money in the community fund shall be distributed solely for the benefit of the community.

All League books shall be audited at least annually by a certified public accountant and a copy of the complete audit shall be distributed to each member.

The Treasurer shall be bonded in the amount determined by the Board of Directors.

Section 2. Membership Dues and Fines

All classes of membership shall pay annual dues of not more than \$12.00, which shall include the Association dues of \$5.50, part of which covers the subscription to the Junior League Magazine. Provisional members shall pay an initiation fee of \$10.00.

There shall be a fine of one dollar to each active member for non-attendance of regular meetings, and a fine of two dollars for non-attendance of the Annual meeting. Sickness, absence from the city, or an unusual emergency shall be the only acceptable excuses for an absence. It shall be made in the form of a letter to the Assistant Treasurer, written the week of the meeting. Such fines shall be payable monthly.

Any Junior League member, other than Non-Resident and Sustaining, shall be required to pay annually on March 1st, in cash, to the Thrift Shop, any amount not otherwise contributed in rummage to complete her Thrift Shop quota.

A. Payment

Dues shall be payable on the first day of the fiscal year. The Treasurer shall send notices to each member on April 1. Members whose dues and fines are not paid by May 1 will be notified by card by the Treasurer. Members whose dues and fines are not paid by May 15 will be sent a registered letter. Members whose dues and fines are not paid by June 1 will be dropped. The only acceptable excuse for non-payment is financial disability, made in writing each year, and received by the Treasurer on or before June 1.

B. Refunds

Refunds of dues will not be made to members resigning during the fiscal year.
Refunds will not be made to Provisionals failing to meet the requirements.

C. A. J. L. A. Indebtedness

Members delinquent in paying this indebtedness to the A. J. L. A. shall be considered in arrears in their dues to this League.

Section 3. Association Dues

The Treasurer of the League shall pay yearly per capita dues for all classes of Membership to the Treasurer of the Association.

Section 4. Letters, Agreements and Contracts

Before any letter, agreement, or contract involving the expenditure of Junior League funds shall be signed and delivered, it shall be approved by the Board of Directors. If it involves more than \$500.00, it shall also be approved by the Junior League Attorney.

ARTICLE IX—DELEGATES TO ASSOCIATION CONFERENCES

Delegates to the Annual Meeting of the Association shall be Active members elected by the League.

Delegates to special meetings or conferences shall be Active members appointed by the Board of Directors.

The full expenses of delegates to conferences and the Annual Meeting of the Association shall be paid by the League.

ARTICLE X—AMENDMENTS AND RULES OF ORDER

The By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting at any meeting of the League, provided the proposed amendment has been mailed to each voting member at least two weeks prior to the date of the meeting; or provided the proposed amendment shall have been presented over the signature of five Active members at least one meeting prior to that at which action is taken, and due notice of such meeting or action is given the membership.

Roberts Rules of Order shall be the parliamentary authority for all matters of procedure not specifically covered by the By-Laws or by special rules of procedure adopted by the League.

STANDING RULES

1. It shall be the duty of the Board to enforce the By-Laws of the League and the Association Policies binding on all Leagues.

2. It shall be the duty of the Board to create, maintain, evaluate, and revise, the Manual of Procedure by which it carries out the duties and powers delegated to it in the By-Laws.

3. It shall be the duty of the Board (before the beginning of the working year) to present to the League a suggested program for ratification.

4. It shall be the duty of the Board, in drawing up the program, to give serious consideration to the interests and capacities of the members, and the number who can take an active part.

5. It shall be the duty of the Board to see that a contingency reserve be maintained in the community fund.

ASSOCIATION POLICIES BINDING ON ALL LEAGUES

AS REVISED APRIL, 1952

POLICY I

- A. The Association shall act in an advisory capacity to the Leagues except as otherwise stated in the By-Laws or in the policies and standing rules adopted pursuant thereto.
- B. The Association shall have the right to protect the Leagues from action by one League which may adversely affect the program, standing or fund-raising of other Leagues.
- C. The Junior League shall encourage their members to accept the responsibilities of good citizenship and to educate themselves in all legislative, political and governmental movements which affect the life of their communities, their countries and the world, and shall endeavor to stimulate their members to exercise their respective citizenships intelligently.

POLICY II

- A. The Association may participate in, cooperate with or sponsor any organization, movement or program, which in the judgment of the Board of Directors, as represented by a three-quarters affirmative vote of the members of the Board, will further the purpose of the Association. The Board will inform any such organization that active participation by the individual Leagues is optional. The association shall not engage in legislative action.
- B. A Junior League may participate in, cooperate with or sponsor conferences or institutes of other national or international organizations, provided approval has first been obtained from the Association office.
- C. A Junior League may hold or sponsor a group meeting of League members in connection with conferences and institutes of other national or international organizations, provided approval has first been obtained from the Association office.

POLICY III

- A. A Junior League may take action on a national, international, state or local public question, provided that a study of the specific problems and the legislative or administrative measures involved has been made, and that the action taken by that League is compatible with the stated purpose of the Association and its member Leagues; does not adversely affect any other League; is not contrary to the policies of the Association; and is subject to the following:
 1. Action may be taken on a national or international public question provided the League has first obtained approval from the Board of Directors of the Association, as represented by a three-quarters affirmative vote of the Board of Directors.
 2. Action may be taken on a state public question provided the League consults its Regional Director and follows Association legislative procedures.
 3. Action may be taken on a local public question at the discretion of the League.

POLICY IV

- A. The Association shall not act for others as a fund-raising agent.
- B. The Association shall not make financial contributions to individuals, other organizations or agencies. Financial support may be rendered for direct services.

POLICY V

- A. The Association shall endeavor to protect the name "Junior League" from misuse, and shall take all action which may be advisable to that end.

- B. All references to the Association should be based on accurate facts from current material made available from the Association. This material can be secured from the Regional Directors or the Association office.
- C. Any use of the Junior League name in connection with publicity shall identify the League or Leagues involved.
- D. Any publicity of a Junior League designed to extend beyond its community area must be approved by the Association office.
- E. A Junior League member may publicly identify herself as such only when such identification is in connection with an affiliation or activity compatible with the stated purpose of the Association and its member Leagues and the policies of the Association.

POLICY VI

- A. The Association shall not recommend the exclusive use of a specific commercial product for the services of a specific commercial concern.
- B. A Junior League membership list shall not be made available for commercial purposes or for purposes of solicitation.
- C. A Junior League may cooperate with commercial concerns, provided the attachment is consistent with the standards of quality and dignity expressed by the Junior Leagues and the Association, and does not recommend exclusive use of a specific product or concern.
 1. Sponsorship of a Junior League activity by reputable firms is permitted for local broadcast, telecast or other media of communication.
 2. Sponsorship of a Junior League activity by reputable firms on a regional, national or international basis is permitted provided such sponsorship has been approved by the Association office.
 3. Direct selling in a commercial portion of a radio or television program, or in other media of communication, is permitted so long as it is in keeping with the quality of the presentation itself, feature articles in good taste, and does not recommend the exclusive use of a product by the Association, any member League, League member, or person representing the Junior League. Samples of the commercial copy must be submitted for approval by the sponsoring League to the Association office.
- D. A Junior League member may be identified as such in commercial endorsements, only in League publications and/or in connection with League money-raising projects. No Junior League member may be identified as such for personal gain.

Policies VII and VIII embody the "Minimum Standards" which all Leagues require of themselves and each other. Their observance and enforcement are the responsibility of each individual League and its officers. Visiting Board and Staff members are obligated to point out apparent deviations from these standards, but the responsibility for constant self-evaluation rests with the League, not with the Association. These policies should be printed with each League's By-Laws. These are policies as revised April 1952.

POLICY VII

Each member League shall incorporate in its charter, constitution, or By-Laws, the following material:

- A. A statement of its name, which shall be limited to the words "Junior League of (name of city, town or community in which located)."
- B. A statement of its purposes, which shall include the statement of individual purposes stated in Article I, Section 1 of the By-Laws of the Association.
- C. A statement that its policies shall be in harmony with the Policies of the Association.
- D. Provisions complying with the requirements of Article II of the By-Laws of the Association. (No other classes of membership shall be permitted; provided, however, that

- (a) individual Leagues may have a limited number of honorary members, and (b) Leagues which now have other classes, including life members, may continue such classes for their present membership, but shall not admit any additional members thereto.)
- E. A requirement that all provisional members shall complete a course which shall meet the standards set by the Association, and shall perform voluntary service for a period and in a manner satisfactory to the Placement Committee.
 - F. A requirement that all active members shall justify their membership through some form of community service satisfactory, in quality and extensiveness, to the Placement Committee (the term community service being defined as including volunteer work for, and service on Boards and Committees of, any philanthropic or humanitarian community organization of high standing in the educational, civic, cultural or social welfare fields.
 - G. A requirement for the following committees:
 1. An Admissions Committee whose functions shall be to pass on applications for membership in the League or to make recommendations to the Board with respect thereto.
 2. An Education Committee, whose function it shall be to plan and supervise the educational program of each League.
 3. A Finance Committee, among whose duties shall be the initial preparation of the annual budget of each League.
 4. Magazine Committee (or Chairman)
 5. A Nominating Committee whose function it shall be to prepare slates of candidates for election to the various elective offices of the League.
 6. A Placement Committee, the function of which shall include the interviewing of all active members at regular intervals and the offering to them of a free choice of placements as provided in F above.
 7. A Public Relations Committee (or Chairman).
 - H. The books and accounts of each League shall be kept in accordance with sound accounting practices; each League shall maintain a community fund separate and distinct from its administrative fund; all money in the community fund shall be distributed solely for the benefit of the community. Annually a copy of the audited balance sheet (statement of Assets and Liabilities) and profit and loss statement (statement of income and expense) shall be distributed to each member of the League.
 - I. A requirement that the Board of each League shall present to the membership all proposed major program activities for ratification.

POLICY VIII

- A. The course for provisional members of all Leagues shall include all topics covered in the Association's basic provisional course outline. Each League shall send to the Association annually, for evaluation and criticism, an outline of its provisional course as soon as reasonably possible after the completion thereof.
- B. The Placement Committee of each League shall keep as nearly as possible uniform records concerning the activities of the members under its supervision.
- C. No individual League shall associate itself with nor endorse any welfare or other similar project, program or activity which does not meet accepted standards in its field, or show evidence of working toward such standards.
- D. All money-raising, on the part of individual Leagues, shall be consistent with standards of dignity and good taste and in keeping with the laws and customs of the community.
- E. Each League shall send to the Association annually a copy of its audited annual statement.
- F. Each League shall maintain the same standards as required of applying groups under Article II-A, Section 2 of the Association By-Laws.

Association Procedures Applying To All Leagues

INTER-LEAGUE MEMBERSHIP PROCEDURE

A member of any League who is subject to frequent change in residence may have an inter-League card issued to her by the League of which she is a member, accrediting her temporarily to the League in the city where she is then residing. An Inter-League member shall continue to be listed as a member of and shall pay her regular dues to the League which issues the card; she shall also have all privileges of membership in the League to which she is temporarily accredited, except the right to vote or to hold office; she shall comply with the requirements of such League.

Transfer of Members:

Provisional, active, sustaining and non-resident members in good standing shall have the right of transferring membership from one League to another. The right of transfer granted in this section need not extend to a person who has been dropped or expelled from membership by the League to which transfer is desired. Provisional members shall take any additional training required by Leagues to which they transfer. A League may require all active members who are applying for transfer to take an orientation course before their transfers are accepted. A League shall not be required to accept transfers which exceed twenty-five per cent of all admissions to membership in any one year. If it is necessary for transfers to be put on a waiting list, they shall be accepted in the order in which they apply.

Fiscal Matters:

The books of account of each League shall be audited annually by a certified public accountant. Members of individual Leagues who are delinquent in paying any indebtedness to the Association shall be considered in arrears in their dues to their own League.

Arranging Inter-League Memberships:

Section 1

Inter-League cards issued pursuant to Article II-B, Section 2, of the By-Laws, shall be for a term of one year, unless extended by the League to which the card is issued. Any extension shall be limited to an additional year.

Section 2.

The League to which a member is temporarily accredited may charge such member for special club privileges or for the actual cost of her membership.

Section 3.

(a) A member desiring an Inter-League card shall notify the secretary of the League to which she belongs.

(b) The secretary, or other authorized League official, and the treasurer of the League in consultation with the Placement Chairman shall be empowered to determine whether said member is in good standing.

(c) To a member in good standing the League secretary, or other authorized League official, shall issue an Inter-League card; notifying the Association headquarters that such card has been issued; and furnishing to the member the name and address of the secretary of the League to which the member may apply for temporary affiliation, and notifying that secretary about the member.

(d) Inter-League membership shall become effective immediately upon presentation of the Inter-League card to the secretary, or other authorized League officials, of the League with which the member wishes to be temporarily affiliated. This League shall notify the home League within fifteen days of the date the Inter-League card is received.

(e) When the period of Inter-League membership expires, the inter-League card shall be returned to its owner.

(f) Upon return to her home League, an Inter-League member shall return her Inter-League card for cancellation to the secretary, or other authorized League official, who shall notify Association headquarters of the cancellation of the card.

Transfer of Members:

Section 1.

The corresponding secretary and the treasurer of the League from which a transfer is made shall be responsible for filling in the information regarding the member's record called for by the transfer card supplied by the Association. They shall also certify that the transferring member is in good standing and shall then forward the transfer card to the secretary of the League to which the transfer is made.

Section 2.

Transfers shall be accepted by the Board of Directors or the Executive Committee of any League unless the member has no right to transfer under the provisions of Article II-B, Section 3 of the By-Laws. Transfers shall be accepted in order of application, except that applications of members under 40 may be given precedence over those of sustaining members. Transfers shall become effective upon acceptance. Within 15 days thereafter the secretary of the League to which the transfer has been made shall notify on transfer cards supplied by the Association, the member involved, the treasurer's office at Association headquarters, and the member's former League.

Section 3.

A member transferring from one League to another shall become subject to the jurisdiction of the League to which she transfers on the date on which such transfer is accepted.

A League receiving a transferring member may charge such transferring member the actual administrative costs incurred by such League in connection with her transfer.

A.J.L.A. GUEST ROOM INFORMATION

Junior League Section

The Junior League Guest Room Section of The Waldorf-Astoria which is located on the 19th and 20th floors, West (Park Avenue) side, consists of 32 rooms. When these rooms are taken we have an option on rooms in the hotel at their minimum rate.

For the convenience of our members a lounge is maintained on the 20th floor. A maid is in attendance from noon until 7:30 P.M., to serve tea and beverages.

Cots and cribs may be put into guests' rooms upon request. A cot is \$3.00 per night, but there is no charge for a crib.

In all cases, a 5% municipal hotel tax is added to the price of rooms.

Nurses, etc., for children may be secured through the hotel. The usual charge is \$1.00 an hour until midnight, \$1.25 per hour after. Guests are requested to state the time they would like the nurse to arrive and about how long she will be required.

Cars may be stored at a nearby garage for \$3.00 per night, including pick-up and delivery.

Accommodations

20th Floor—17 rooms; each with private bath, consisting of: 16 rooms—double occupancy. Double \$9 daily. 1 room—single occupancy only. Special rate of \$5.00 daily due to less desirable location.

19th Floor—15 single rooms—14 rooms—7 at \$3.50 daily, 2 at \$4.00 daily and 5 at \$5.00 daily. Suites of two rooms, sharing a bath. Prices differ according to size and location of rooms. 1 room—\$5.00 daily. Has a private bath.

Additional Rooms in Hotel—Double or single occupancy. Double \$11.00 daily—Single \$8.00 daily.

Reservations

In writing for information or to make a reservation, always ad-

dress Guest Room Hostess, Association of the Junior Leagues of America, Inc., The Waldorf-Astoria, New York 22, N. Y.

It is advisable to write for reservations as far in advance as plans will permit. In case of cancellation an immediate wire is requested. This not only protects the Association against loss, but prevents turning away other members who could be accommodated in your place.

Reservations received by wire are answered by Western Union collect. Please indicate the name of your League when making reservations.

Since there are so few rooms in the Junior League section, it is possible to assign the best accommodations only if we know in advance the exact date of arrival and the maximum length of your stay. It is often impossible to retain rooms longer than the time specified in the reservation, due to the fact they are reserved for the very date they are to be vacated.

Registration

8 A.M. to 10 P.M.—Upon arrival, please take the West elevators and go directly to the guest room desk in the A.J.L.A. office on the 19th floor to register.

Length of Stay

Because of the great demand for accommodations, it has been found necessary to limit the length of stay to one month for members and two weeks for guests who are put up by members.

Those retaining their rooms after departure hour will be charged for another day. Due to heavy bookings, we are unable to promise that accommodations always will be assigned immediately upon arrival.

Hotel Departure Time: 3 P.M.

Eligible Guests

Relatives of members may be put up for a period not exceeding two weeks, and may stay for a month if accompanied by members.

Written authorization from a League member is **REQUIRED** for putting up guests.

The AJLA Board adopted new arrangements on rooms in the Waldorf-Astoria through room facilities. Such rooms will be available for use of Junior League members and their immediate families only.

Members are requested to write headquarters for the necessary form to be filled out for non-members, who cannot be accepted until this form is received (No form is necessary for members or non-members who accompany members.)

When bringing guests, it is well to send their names in advance. This insures holding of messages and communications received at the hotel previous to arrival.
