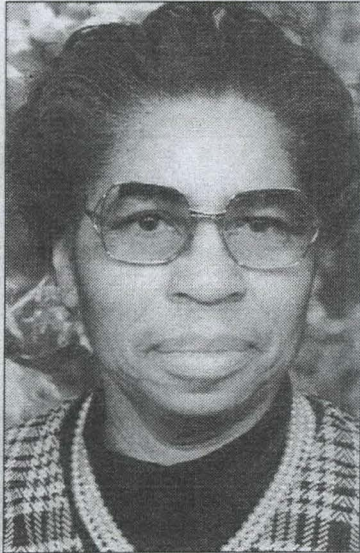
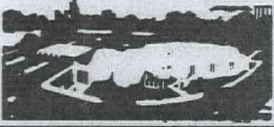

Obituary

JULIUS FRANCIS KNIGHT was born in Henderson, North Carolina, November 17, 1922 to Julius L. and Mary Frances Knight. As a high school student at Henderson Institute, he won numerous awards as a basketball player.

He served in the European Theater of operations during World War II and then returned to North Carolina College to complete his B.S. degree in Physical Education and Education. In 1947, he was married to Elizabeth Alston.

Julius Knight taught in the Duplin County School System and Virginia Seminary as a teacher of Physical Education and Mathematics. In addition, he coached the boys' and girls' basketball teams. He returned to North Carolina College and earned a M.S. degree in Sociology, Recreation and Education in 1955. Between 1954 and 1979 he was employed as a Probation Officer, Assistant Chief Probation Officer and Supervisor of the Intake Division in the Durham County Juvenile Court. In addition, he taught on a part-time basis in the Physical Education Department at North Carolina College.

Julius Knight continued his interest in sports throughout his life. He was a member of the North Carolina High School Athletic Association, the North Carolina Athletic Officials Association, the CIAA, and the MEAC. His other affiliations included the North Carolina Juvenile Correctional Association, the Governor's Council on Juvenile Delinquency, Omega Psi Phi Fraternity and Covenant United Presbyterian Church, USA. He received many awards through his service in athletics and juvenile work. As a member of Covenant, he taught Sunday School and was a member of the Men's Council.

He is survived by his wife, Elizabeth Alston Knight; two children, Julius Francis Knight, Jr. and Darlene Knight Harvey; two grandchildren, Dalila Dawn Harvey and Francesca Elise Knight; his mother, Mary Frances Knight; three sisters, Virginia Knight Butler, Helen Knight Clifton and Agnes Knight Royster; two brothers, Clarence Vernon Knight and Alphonso Wilbert Knight; nieces, nephews and other relatives and friends.

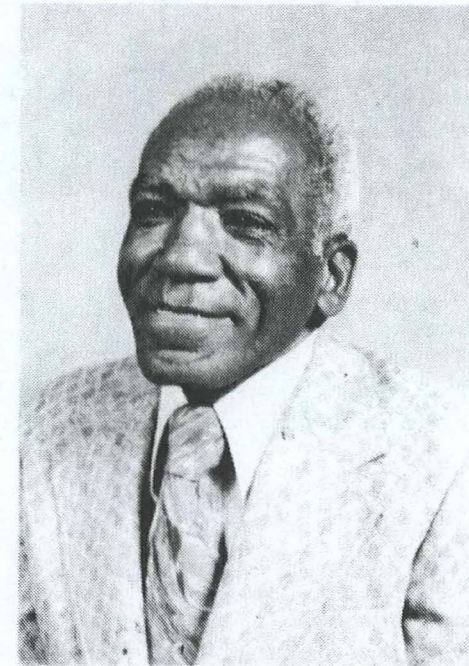

The Obituary

Lucious Sherman Knox, only son of the late Charles and Cora Corley Knox, was born on February 11, 1916 in Magnolia, Mississippi. He departed this life on Wednesday, January 13, 1993.

The family moved to Kentwood, Louisiana where he received his early education. He graduated from Southern University with a B.S. degree in Mathematics and did additional studies at the North Carolina Central University, Duke University and North Carolina State University.

His career began in Mound Bayou, Mississippi and continued at Okolona College, Alcorn College, and Claflin College. In April 1947, the late Dr. James E. Shepard brought him to Durham as the Superintendent of Building and Grounds at North Carolina College. In 1954, he joined the faculty at Hillside High School as a Mathematics Instructor. He served in the city school system for twenty-five years teaching at Whitted Junior High and Brogden Junior High before retiring as Chairman of the Mathematics Department at Durham High. He continued to serve after retirement at Durham Technical Institute and with the St. Joseph's Tutorial Program. He also used his mathematical ability as a Volunteer Income Tax Assistant. He was a member of the National Education Association, the North Carolina Association of Educators, and the Retired School Personnel.

He joined St. Joseph's African Methodist Episcopal Church shortly after moving to the city. He served as Steward, Class Leader and a member of the Parsonage Committee.

He was instrumental in forming the Delta Zeta Sigma Chapter of the Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, of which he was a member for over fifty years. He was also the first president of the Rosewood Street Neighborhood Club.

He married the former Ruth Lucille Blackburn in 1939. Four children were born to the union. A son and wife preceded him in death.

He married the former Gladys Grady in 1970 who survives. Other survivors are a son Dr. Charles David Knox of Atlanta, GA; two daughters, Mrs. Ruth Shirley Knox Denny of Pine Bluff, AK; Mrs. Mildred Knox Walker of Seabrook, MD; and a step-daughter, Lauren E. B. Green of Durham, NC; three devoted sons-in-law, Richard Denny, Larry Walker and Larry Green; four grandchildren, C. David Knox, II, Richard Derrick Denny, and Michael and Marchelle Green; two sisters, Mrs. Helena Knox and Mrs. Loreen Knox Locks of New Orleans, LA; several nieces, nephews and a host of other relatives.

MRS. RUTH LUCILLE KNOX

MRS. RUTH LUCILLE KNOX, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. David Blackburn, was born in Hermanville, Mississippi, April 19, 1915. She was educated in the Chicago Public Schools, Southern Christian Institute and Indiana University.

Survivors include her husband, L. S. Knox; two daughters, Misses Ruth Shirley and Mildred Elizabeth Knox; one son, Dr. Charles David Knox of Washington, D. C.; one brother, Dr. Cleo Blackburn of Indianapolis, Indiana; four sisters, Mrs. Deetsy B. Gray of St. Louis, Missouri, Mrs. Alice B. Cowan of Indianapolis, Indiana, Mrs. Bernice B. Holmes and Mrs. Edwyne McKeeley, both of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; two aunts, Mrs. Annie E. Murray of Shelby, Mississippi and Mrs. Emma Blackburn of Port Gibson, Mississippi.

Mrs. Knox moved to Durham from Claflin College in Orangeburg, South Carolina in 1947 with a loving husband and two small children. Soon afterwards the third child was born to this wonderful woman, whose love and goodwill had even then begun to spread over the neighborhood in which she lived. Her boundless energy was spent taking care of the needs of her family, but always included anyone who might be in need of a helping hand, kind or encouraging word, or even a portion of her worldly goods. She became known as "Mama Knox" to the little friends and neighbors of her children, fixing up their hurts, real and imagined, never too busy to take up a little time with little children. It is little wonder that the love, devotion, care, and concern that she showed for her family would carry over to others she came in contact with. She was really directing a "service through love" for the little ones of her friends at her home before she ventured out into community work.

Her concern, love for her fellowman, and interest in the uplifting of youth led her to her first community work at the play school of McDougald Terrace. Here she devoted time and energy, instilling high ideals in the young ones who lived in McDougald Terrace. She moved on to wider possibilities of service to children and young people in her next position as Director of the T. A. Grady Recreation Center. Her accomplishments and varied successful activities at the Center are endless, having brought inspiration, joy and cheer, recreation and play, to countless youngsters who had no outlet for their energies and could have strayed away from the ideal and wholesome life provided by the loving hand and heart of Ruth Lucille Knox. She had a way with them. They brought their joys and triumphs to "Mama Knox," oftentimes because there was no one else who could listen and advise. "Mama Knox" was never too busy, too tired, and yes, never too ill, to go to the aid of anyone who needed and called upon her.

Under her guidance the T. A. Grady Recreation Center became "the Center of Durham." The varied activities touched the lives of children and young people from all areas of Durham. Her interests never waned. At the onset of her final illness, her thoughts were of the activity she had planned for the blind of Durham at Thanksgiving.

Her philosophy of life can be summed up in a favorite quotation of her's: "In all thy ways acknowledge Him, and He will direct thy path."
