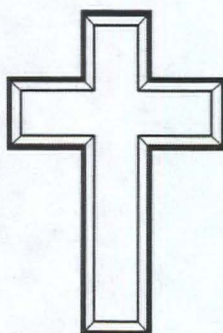

Obituary

CLYDIE QUINN FULLWOOD SCARBOROUGH was born May 13, 1899, in the home of her paternal grandfather, Fatus Fullwood, in Oak Bowery, near Opelika, Alabama. She was the third child of the wedlock of Robert Fullwood and Irene Waller.

She was the widow of the late Mr. J.C. Scarborough, Sr., founder of the Scarborough and Hargett Memorial Chapels and Gardens.

Mrs. Scarborough attended school in Thomasville, Alabama until she entered Elementary Practice School of Talladega College in the sixth grade, finished high school an honor student and continuing, graduated from Talladega College an honor student, Magna Cum Laude and was Valedictorian of her class. Chemistry was her major and Education, her minor. She received her kindergarten training at Talladega College and did further study at North Carolina College in Early Childhood Education.

In 1922, after graduation she received a position at Hillside High School in Durham. She taught Science and History and was head of the Science Department for three years. While there, she organized various extra-curricular activities, including the first Junior-Senior Prom.

Sensing the need for better health conditions and better care for young children, Mr. J.C. Scarborough purchased the old Lincoln Hospital in 1925 and renovated it for use as a day care home for young children. He supported the home financially. Infants, pre-schoolers, and school-age children received care. With this beginning, Mr. Scarborough donated property and set up the Daisy Scarborough Foundation to assist in the care of young children. Kindergarten facilities were instituted by Mrs. Scarborough in 1932. Realizing more the need, nursery school accommodations were added, and in 1938, the school was licensed for sixty children by the North Carolina Department of Social Services. As the School grew, there was need for more funds and a campaign was conducted in 1943. Scarborough Nursery School, Inc. qualified for Federal funds in 1944 through the Emergency Child Care Association which ended with the close of World War II. The school became a member agency of the United Way in 1946. It is now supported by tuition receipts, the Daisy Scarborough Foundation, and the United Way of Greater Durham.

Under the direction of Mrs. Scarborough and because of her devotion, dedication, and service for fifty-six years, Scarborough Nursery School, Inc. has grown to occupy three State Licensed facilities accommodating 194 children. The program was extended to include a First Grade which was accepted by the State Department of Public Instruction. Also, during the past fifty-six years, Mrs. Scarborough and Scarborough Nursery School, Inc. private and social services have cared for over 10,000 children and releasing 8,000 mothers for work.

Mrs. Scarborough has been a member of St. Joseph's A.M.E. Church for fifty-seven years. During this period, she taught Sunday School; was an active member of the Church Improvement Club; is a Missionary; and is President of the Senior Stewardess Board. In 1951, she organized St. Joseph's Nursery School and gave the services as Director for eight years. Recently, she was honored for her over-fifty years of devotion and service as a member of St. Joseph's A.M.E. Church.

Mrs. Scarborough was a life member of the YWCA, where she served as chairman of the branch committee of administration for six years. She was a member of the board of directors of the family counseling service for two years. She was also a member of the Durham Committee on Negro Affairs, where she served as chairman of the education committee. She served as president of the North Carolina Day Care Association and served on the Executive Board of the National Association for the Education of Young Children.

Her other memberships include the National Association for the Education of Young Children, the Durham Day Care Council and the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. She was a life member of Women-In-Action for the Prevention of Violence and Its Causes, Inc. She was a life member of the Talladega Alumni Association and served as treasurer of the Cruise Committee, Inc.

Mrs. Scarborough received the Silver Award from the Durham United Way and the Helen Hall Jones Service Award from the North Carolina Day Care Association. She also received a certificate of Recognition Award in 1978 by the Durham County Department of Social Services for community service and received a Fifty Year Member Certificate of Merit by the Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority.

Surviving are one daughter, Mrs. Edythe Fullwood Scarborough Stanford of Gary, Indiana; one stepdaughter, Mrs. Ernestine Scarborough Bynum of Durham; one stepson, Mr. Ronald Scarborough, Sr. of Durham; one sister, Mrs. Irene Crane of Durham; five grandchildren, seven great grandchildren, seven nieces and nephews.

Mrs. Scarborough, Nursery School Founder

Mrs. Clydie Quinn Fulwood Scarborough, founder of Scarborough Nursery School, Inc., died Wednesday morning in Duke Hospital.

Mrs. Scarborough was the widow of J.C. Scarborough Sr., founder of Scarborough & Hargett Memorial Chapel and Gardens.

In 1925, J.C. Scarborough purchased the old Lincoln Hospital and renovated it for use as a nursery. Supporting the center financially, Scarborough set up the Daisy Scarborough Foundation to assist in the care of young children. Kindergarten classes were begun by Mrs. Scarborough in 1932. A nursery school was added, and in 1938 the school was licensed for 60 children by the North Carolina Department of Social Services.

As the need for more money grew, a campaign was conducted in 1943 and Scarborough Nursery School qualified for federal money in 1944 through the Emergency Child Care Association. The school became a member agency of the United Way in 1946 and is now supported by tuition receipts, the Daisy Scarborough Foundation and the United Way.

In 1972, the nursery school moved to its present location at 309 Queen St., near the Durham County Library.

Under the direction of Mrs. Scarborough for 55 years, Scarborough Nursery School has grown to occupy

three state licensed facilities accommodating 162 children, including a first grade that is accepted by the State Department of Public Instruction.

Mrs. Scarborough was a life member of the YWCA, where she was chairman of the branch committee of administration for six years. She was a member of the board of directors of the family counseling for two years. She was also a member of the Durham Com-

mittee on Negro Affairs, where she served as chairman of the education committee.

Her other memberships include the National Association for the Education of Young Children, the North Carolina Association for the Education of Young Children, the North Carolina Day Care Association, the Durham Day Care Council and the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. She was a life member of Women-In-Action for the Prevention of Violence and Its Causes, Inc.

Mrs. Scarborough received the Silver Award from the Durham United Way and the Helen Hall Jones Service Award from the North Carolina Day Care Association. She also received a Certificate of Recognition Award in 1978 by the Durham County Department of Social Services for community service and received a Fifty Year Member Certificate of Merit by the Alpha Kappa Sorority.

Mrs. Scarborough was a member of St. Joseph's AME Church for 57 years, where she was a Sunday school teacher, a member of the Church Improvement Club, a missionary and president of the Senior Stewardess Board. In 1951, Mrs. Scarborough organized St. Joseph's Nursery School, where she was director for eight years. She was recently honored for more than 50 years of service as a member of the

church.

A native of Oak Bowery, Ala., Mrs. Scarborough attended school in Thomasville, Ala., until she entered Elementary Practice School of Talladega College. Mrs. Scarborough received her kindergarten training at Talladega, where she graduated magna cum laude and was valedictorian of her class. Afterward, she studied early childhood education at North Carolina College.

After graduating, Mrs. Scarborough was a science and history teacher at Hillside High School in Durham, where she was head of the science department for three years. While there, she organized various extracurricular activities, including the first junior-senior prom.

The funeral will be conducted at 2 p.m. Sunday in St. Joseph's AME Church by the Rev. W.W. Easley. Burial will be in Beechwood Cemetery.

Mrs. Scarborough is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Edythe Fulwood Scarborough Stanford of Gary, Ind.; a stepdaughter, Mrs. Ernestine Scarborough Bynum of Durham; a stepson, Ronald Scarborough Sr. of Durham; a sister, Mrs. Irene Crane of Durham; five grandchildren; and seven great-grandchildren.

The family will receive visitors from 7 to 8 p.m. Saturday at St. Joseph's AME Church.

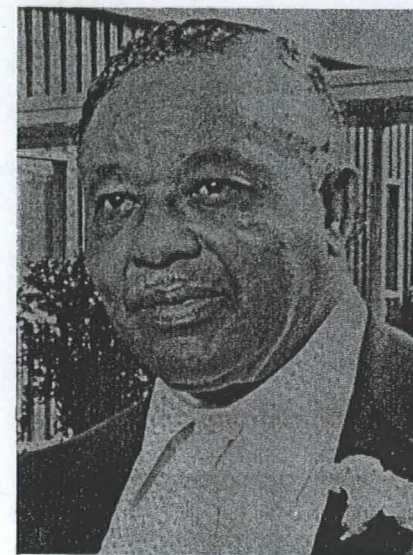

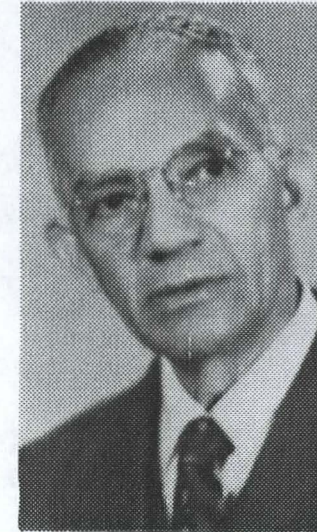

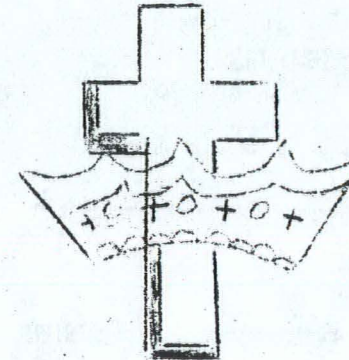
