Nine top-ranking students at Fayetteville State Teachers College, two seniors and seven juniors, have been named to the 1952-53 edition of "Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities."

Local selections were limited to upper classmen, and were based upon scholarship, leadership and citizenship records.

This is the third consecutive year that students at Fayetteville State Teachers College have been listed in the nation-wide study.

Pakistan Official Speaks At College

FAY Mme. Begum Shasta Ikramullah, an official of the Pakistan Constituent Assembly and an authority on problems incident to the Middle and Far East, appeared in

She is a holder of the doctor's degree and has acquired a complete command of the English language. Her first-hand experiences on once and her wide travel account for the challenging view points she presents as to the strength and weakness of Pakistan as a new-born democracy.

She began her political career as a convenor of the all-India Moslem Woman's Federation in 1941, and in 1946, she was elected to the Constituent Assembly of the undivided India, and has served in that body ever since.

and a statement of the history of the Delta Sigma Theta Sorority by A. Watson, the guest speaker. Mrs. Neatrice W. Merritt of Clinton, N. C. spoke from the topic "Building Roads."
