SECOND LT. GEORGE DAIL, JR., son of Mr. and Mrs. George Dail of Wilson county, was killed in action in Germany February 26. Lt. Dail was a member of the 30th Division and entered the service on February 11, 1942. He had been awarded the Bronze Star and Combat Infantryman badge.

He is survived by his wife, the former Sudie Vick and small son, George R., parents, four brothers and seven sisters of Stantonsburg.

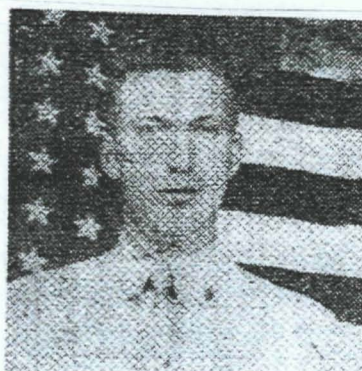
*Synopsis:*

The President of the United States takes pride in presenting the Distinguished Service Cross (Posthumously) to George Dail (0-2001056), Second Lieutenant, U.S. Army, for extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy while serving with the 1st Battalion, 117th Infantry Regiment, 30th Infantry Division, in action against enemy forces on 26 February 1945. Second Lieutenant Dail's intrepid actions, personal bravery and zealous devotion to duty at the cost of his life, exemplify the highest traditions of the military forces of the United States and reflect great credit upon himself, the 30th Infantry Division, and the United States Army.

PFC. RALPH LEE DAIL, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Dail of Stantonsburg, entered the service November 1941, and was sent overseas September 1943. He is now stationed in England in a hospital suffering from shell shock. He was attached to General Patton's Third Army in France.
