My dear Mrs. Brooks,

It is with very great sorrow that I write you concerning the death of your son, Robert Lee Brooks, Gunner's Mate third class. He was initially listed as missing, but a review of the facts has led to the conclusion that Robert was killed in action.

On the night of 2 December 1944, the U.S.S. COOPER proceeded with two other destroyers to Ormoc Bay to seek out and destroy Jap shipping. From about 11:00 to 12:00, we were under constant attack by enemy planes. A few minutes past midnight, the COOPER made her first surface contact and we opened fire immediately. After assisting one of the other destroyers in sinking a Jap ship, we were hit by what I think was a torpedo. The ship sank very quickly. The torpedo hit in the engineering spaces on the starboard side and a terrific shock was transmitted throughout the ship as she listed to forty-five degrees immediately. About one half of the officers and crew were lost.

At the time we were hit, your son, Robert, was at his battle station in charge of the 40 and 20 millimeter guns on the superstructure deck. He was in the vicinity of the explosion and must have been instantly killed. Robert was a fine boy and greatly admired by his shipmates. Memory of him is an inspiration, and we must now carry on the struggle to preserve the ideals for which he so valiantly gave his life. He was a credit to his home and country and performed his duties in accordance with the highest traditions of the Naval service.

On 3 and 4 December, Catalina Flying Boats rescued the survivors from Japanese held Ormoc Bay. The area in which the COOPER was sunk was thoroughly searched and, as you recall, since about 7 December the surrounding shores have been in the hands of friendly forces. My words cannot lighten the burden which is yours, but I hope knowledge of Roberts's splendid service and devotion to duty will give you some comfort and courage. To bring you this sad news is very hard but it is not fair that you should maintain hope when the facts indicate none should exist.

As the District Chaplain, may I extend to you and to your family, the sympathy and concern of our Personnel. We realize the deep anxiety and worry you are experiencing during this period of waiting for further news of your son and wish it could be within our power to assure you of his safe return. However, many men who are reported "Missing" are found, or find their way back to their unit, so you must not lose your faith and courage.

The only source of information is the Bureau of Naval Personnel, Director of Dependent's Welfare Division, Navy Department, Washington, 25, D. C. This department endeavors to furnish all the available information possible to the families of Naval Personnel, but if you do not hear, after a reasonable time, it will be in order for you to write to them and request the desired information.

The Commandant of the Sixth Naval District and all Officers and Personnel here present send you, herewith, sincere hopes that you may soon receive word that he has returned.

May the Grace of God and His love abide with you and yours.

USS Cooper (DD-695)

USS Cooper (DD-695), a Allen M. Sumnerclass destroyer, is the only ship of the United States Navy to be named for Elmer Glenn Cooper, a naval aviator who died in a seaplane accident in 1938. The Cooper was launched 9 February 1944 by Federal Shipbuilding and Drydock Company, Kearny, N.J.; sponsored by Mrs. Elmer G. Cooper; and commissioned 27 March 1944, Commander J. W. Schmidt in command.

Cooper cleared Boston 23 July 1944 for Pearl Harbor arriving 4 September. After operational training, she sailed 23 October for Ulithi, arriving 5 November, and put to sea at once to screen carriers in air attacks on Luzon, Ormoc Bay, and Manila Bay until 19 November.

After repairs at Ulithi, she entered San Pedro Bay, Philippines, 29 November and joined in patrols in Leyte Gulf until 2 December, when she sailed with *Allen M. Sumner* (DD-692) and *Moale* (DD-693) to destroy shipping in Japanese-held Ormoc Bay. Here the ships engaged two small enemy destroyers and numerous small craft. At about 00:13 on 3 December, *Cooper* was torpedoed by the Japanese destroyer *Take*.^[1]

Reports state that she suffered an explosion on her starboard side, then it broke in two, and sank within a minute. The presence of enemy forces prevented rescue of survivors until about 14:00, when "Black Cat" airplanes were able to save 168 of Cooper's crew; 191 were lost.

In the Battle of Ormoc Bay, *Kuwa* was sunk and *Take* was damaged by the American destroyers. In addition to the loss of *Cooper*, *Allen M. Sumner* and *Moale* were both damaged.^[2]

A documentary TV film, USS Cooper: Return to Ormoc Bay, was produced by Bigfoot Entertainment and made its debut in mid-2006. It featured deep-sea diver Rob Lalumiere and survivors of the *Cooper* sinking.

Cooper was awarded one battle star for World War II service.
