
Richard B. Harrison Library

Richard B. Harrison, a native North Carolinian, was a professor of drama at North Carolina A & T in Greensboro. Harrison is recognized for his contribution to black drama and best known for his protrayal of De Lawd in the movie Green Pastures.



Molly Huston Lee, the driving force behind the Richard B. Harrison Library, became the head librarian in September 1935. The first black to receive a scholarship to study library science at Columbia University, Mollie Lee was founder of the Negro Library Association. The Mollie Huston Lee Collection of Black Literature is named in her honor.
