



Obituary

Shelton Lauriston Aiken was born in New York City, May 18, 1929, to Ezra and Mavis Aiken. He was baptized at St. Phillip's Episcopal Church by the legendary Reverend Shelton Hale, Bishop for whom he was named. Moving with the family to Jamaica, Queens at the age of two, Shelly went to P.S. 116, Shimer Junior High School and Jamaica High School. In addition to playing local football and basketball, his mandatory piano lessons engendered his lifelong love of music.

While in the air wing of the U.S. Marines, he married "Bea", his high school sweetheart on September 6, 1952 at St. James the Less Episcopal Church. After being honorably discharged from the service, he completed undergraduate studies at Long Island University and went to Howard University Dental School from which he graduated in June 1959. Always socially and community aware, Shelly worked as a recreational counselor at the site of the Youth Board at P.S. 40/Samuel Huntington in South Jamaica. After completing his dental internship at Queens General Hospital, he began private practice with his mentor Dr. J. Logan Young. Some of the youths from P.S. 40 were Dr. Shelly's initial patients.

He was a member of the Queens Clinical Society which pioneered group medical practice in Southeast Queens. He was also a member of the Manhattan Guardsmen, the Howard University Alumni and the American Dental Association. Last summer at Camp Atwater's Alumni Reunion, he stated that it was the Atwater experience that caused him to "take a right turn motivationally."
