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

Found in the Ransom A. Chauncey Papers, Rare Book, Manuscript & Special Collections Library, Duke University, Durham, NC. These deeds were recorded in the missing Pitt County Deed Book A. Since these deeds were later copies it is evident that the Register was not familiar with the old writing style and could not understand certain letters and words. Contributed by Roger Kammerer.



## Deed from James Conner to Joseph Gainer, March 6, 1761

"North Carolina Pitts County}

Know all men by these presents that I James CONNER of the province aforesaid and county of Tyrell, for and in consideration of the sum of fifty-two pounds Current Money of Virginia to me in hand paid by Joseph GAINER of the province aforesaid and County of Tyrell the receipt whereof I do hereby acknowledge and myself therewith fully and entirely satisfied Contented and paid Have given, granted, Bargained Sold Aliened enfeossed conveyed and and confirmed and by these presents do fully freely clearly and absolutely give grant Bargain sell alien enfuff convey and confirm to the said Joseph GAINER his heirs and assigns forever a certain tract or parcel of Land Situate lying and being on the north side of Tranters Creek in Pitts County aforesaid being a tract of Land granted to Martin CRUMMEY in the year One thousand seven hundred and Thirty Butted and bounded as follows. Beginning at a White Oak Running thence N.60.Es 60 pole to a white oak, thence No.30.W. 32 poles to a pine a corner tree in a branch Then down the said branch to the Creek then the meanders of the Creek to the first Station Containing by estimation 320 acres be the same more or less together with privileges and appurtenances thereunto belonging or in any wise appertaining to the said Joseph GAINER his heirs and assigns forever. To have hold use occupy possess and enjoy as his and their own proper Right of inheritance in fee simple and I the said James CONNER do for myself, my heirs, Executors, and Administrators Covenant and agree to and with the said Joseph GAINER his heirs and assigns forever to warrant and defend the above demised premises from the Lawful claim challenge or demand of any Person or Persons whatsoever and have in myself Lawfull right, full power and authority to sell and dispose of same. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 6th day of March in the year of our Lord One James CONNER thousand seven hundred and sixty and one-

#### Deed from Austin Swinson to Joseph Gainer, Jan. 3, 1762

"State of North Carolina Pitt County}

Know all men by these presents that I Austen SWINSON of the State aforesaid & County of Duplin for and inconsideration of the sum of fourteen Pounds Specie to me in hand paid by Joseph GAINER of the County & State Affsd. the receipt wherof I do hereby acknowledge & myself therewith fully & entirely satisfied contented & paid have given granted Bargained Sold aliened enfeossed conveyed and confirmed and by these presents do fully freely Clearly & absolutely Give Grant Bargain Sell alien Enfuff convey & confirm to the sd. John SWINSON Senr. for and in consideration of the love and good will which I have and do Bair unto Osten SWINSON have given and granted and by these presents do freely clearly and absolutely give and grant to the said Osten SWINSON his heirs and assigns 2 hundred akers of Land in Pitt County on the Est side of Tranters Creek to have and to hold the said Land unto ye sd. Osten SWINSON his heirs and assigns as their proper rite forever without any manner of condition as Sthe sd. John SWINSON have absolutely and of my one accord set my hand and seal this 3 Day of Janery 1762.

"State of North Carolina Pitt County Court of Pleas & Quarter Sessions May Term 1846. To the worshipful the Justices of said Court, respectfully sheweth, the Petition of James R. CONGLETON & Simon GURGANUS and wife Lezina, that in or about the 10th August 1829. James CONGLETON died having made his last Will & Testament, which was duly proved at Nov. Term 1829. of said Court. That by said Will he devised among other bequests all his lands to his wife Salley, for her natural life, and all the lands whereof he was seized in the County of Pitt, (which are herein after described) after her death to his son Abram CONGLETON in fee simple That the said testater at his death was seized & possessed of the following four several pieces of land in the County of Pitt (viz) 1st Beginning at a corner in the run of Flat Swamp in Nathaniel KEELS line, runs up the swamp to James R. CONGLETONS Corner, then with his line to said KEELS corner, then with said KEELS line to the beginning Containing about 357 1/2 acres. 2nd Beginning in George BRITENS line in the great branch, runs with his line to Caswell KEELS line—then with Samuel KEELS to the great branch, & with the great branch to the beginning. 3rd Beginning at the watery hole branch in George BRITTONS line, runs his line to Lemuel PERKINS line: then his line to Willis CRANDALLS line, then his line to Caswell KEELS line, then his line to the watery Hole branch, & with the branch to the beginning 4th In the great Pocosin Containing about 50, acres. That on or about the 5th day of May 1840, the said Abram CONGLETON died intestate in said County, whereby his estate in said lands descended to his heirs at law, who were your Petitioners James & Lezina and Nancy now wife of Benjamin GURGANUS who is absent from this State and supposed to reside in Tennessee, who were the brothers & sisters of said Abram and Ely GURGANUS, Sarah GURGANUS, Lucinda GURGANUS & James GURGANUS, who are the infant children of Bethuly, who was the sister of said Abram and died before him. That the said Salley widow of said James CONGLETON died on the 4th of May 1846, having previously rented out said first described piece of land to your Petitioner James R. who had planted the same and is therefore entitled to the use thereof until he shall have gathered his crop. That your Petitioners James R. & Simon GURGANUS in right of his wife Lezina are entitled each to one undivided fourth part of said lands—and said Children of Bethuly, in right of their said Mother are entitled to the other undivided fourth part thereof. And that you would appoint a Guardian to defend the interest of said infants, in the premises. And Cause your Subpoena to issue commanding the said Benjamin GURGANUS & wife Nancy & said Ely, Sarah, Lucinda, & James GURGANUS to appear at the next term of this Court, & answer the premises & then & there Submit to, abide by, & obey the further order, direction & decree of this court in the premises and that you would give your Petrs. such other & further relief as their Case may from time to time require, & to you may seem meet, and your Petitioners as in duty bound, will ever pray &C. 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"Greenville Pitt County N. C.

Greenville December 5, 1856 Friday 8 o'clock, A. M.

My Dear Cousin:

It is the first time that I take my pen in hand to write you a few lines it was through Cousin thro HOUSE request I write you a few lines hoping that this may find you all that I found that you were living through well and enjoying good health my Fathers family is all well at the present I am the Daughter of David HOUSE he had had Ten Children & nine living all his brothers are dead except one that is Uncle [Surrot? I should like to know how you are getting along in this low ground (?) of sorrow Cousin time is (overwritten to are) very lively in old North Carolina yet we have lot of fun sometime the young people do I should be very glad to see you ..... more to this old North State Father and Mother send their love to you and family Thing(s) are altered about here very much since you left I guess they have altered since i could recollects they have been severall new familys sprung from here since you left if they us any person you want to hear from write to me who they are and I will write to you all about them Give my love to all they family except a portion of it for yourself to is getting late I must close by saying as this is the first letter that I have written to you it may be the last life is uncertain and death is certain so if I never see you may our b(l)essed lord bless you and family is the Prayer of your Cincere Cousin and now you have all my best wishes they are for thee as the Poets says I even will remember the though I will forget Cousin now be .... In the March 1866 session of the North Carolina General Assembly, an Act was passed concerning negroes and persons of color. Justices of the Peace were to collect and record in the County Clerk's office, a record of the cohabitation of former slaves to ratify their state of marriage. The Court clerk was required to maintain a record book for this purpose and to receive 25 cents per entry for this service. In Section 6, Chapter 40 of the Act, it was a misdemeanor if negroes did not record their marriage by Sept. 1, 1866. This section of the Act was amended by Section 1, Chapter 70 (ratified March 1867), to extend the time of recording these marriages to Jan. 1, 1868. Contributed by Roger Kammerer.

I Robert WRIGHT of Edgcomb. County. In North Carolina. January the Seventh. Day. 17(2?)3. Being very Sick and weak in body but of perfect Mind and Memory. thanks be given unto God therefore Calling unto Mind the Mortallity of my body And knowing that it is Appointed for all men once to dye. 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

Fall Term 1858- Manning BRYANT vs. Henry P. BRYANT. Sarah PEARCE maketh oath and saith that some time during the month of August 1855 she was at the house of Henry P. BRYAN, Manning BRYAN came there and he and Henry P. BRYAN had a settlement about the building of Ines Chapel & Bethel Meeting House. I was called upon to look over the papers with them, is what improper the fact so fully upon my mind, they did then and there make a settlement of said matters and while Manning BRYANT was in the yard & before he left, Henry P. BRYAN sheweth me a receipt which Manning BRYANT had given him on said settlement. I did not see Manning BRYAN sign said receipt as I now remember, but I saw the receipt at the time and one shewn to me by henry P. BRYAN today I believe is the one shewn to me on that day. I remember that it was in August 1855 because I had gone out there to open a school.

# Moses Willoughby, Former Slave

The following interesting deposition of Moses Willoughby, former slave, was found in the estate papers of John Willoughby, folder 2; Pitt County Estates, C. R. 079.508.75; NC Archives, Raleigh, NC. Contributed by Margaret Phillips.

Fannie AVERETTE vs, C. J. O'HAGAN Adm of Jno. WILLOUGHBY}

"In pursuance of an Order of the court in the above named cause, I Calvin COX have caused to come before me, on this, the 30th day of March 1871, Moses WILLOUGHBY and others witnesses, to testify in Said cause, whose depositions are taken as follows; Counsel E. C. YELLOWLEY and G. W. JOHNSTON for Plaintiff and Defendant

Moses WILLOUGHBY being duly sworn deposes as follows:

Question What is your Age and occupation, and where do you reside?

Answer I am about Fifty One or Two years old — Am a Laborer, and reside with Gray JAMES in Pitt County. I was formerly a Slave and belonged to Fannie AVERETT. I was given to her (Fannie AVERETT) by John WILLOUGHBY who was Father of John WILLOUGHBY, the Intestate of Defendant.

Question Where did you live in the year 1844 and from that date up to the death of John WILLOUGHBY, the said

Intestate and who had the control of you?

Answer I lived with John WILLOUGHBY the Intestate of Defendant, three years. This was after the death of Margaret WILLOUGHBY. Upon her death John WILLOUGHBY, the Intestate of Deft. the next day after, took me and carried me to his house, where I remained three years under his Control. After that, I lived with William WILLOUGHBY, brother of the said John WILLOUGHBY, two years. Thereafter, I lived with Major John PEEBLES One year. And then I lived with Josiah WILLOUGHBY for three successive years. I then lived with Arden NICHOLDS for five years. After that I stayed home with plaintiff (Fannie AVERET). I then stayed with William BURNETT One year. After that to the time of my freedom, I stayed with Plaintiff.

Margaret WILLOUGHBY died some five or six years- he believes- after the death of John WILLOUGHBY Senr. I don't Know who hired me on William WILLOUGHBY, nor what price was paid for me. My Mistress, Plaintiff,

told me where to go to.

John WILLOUGHBY asked me what the Note given for my hire was- I told him, some Forty odd Dollars, I believed. Willoughby said will thus. I must go, and get it. He didn't say where he was going to get it. Don't Know who hired me to Major John PEEBLES, nor for what amount I was hired. I was hired to Josiah WILLOUGHBY by his, Josiah WILLOUGHBY'S father the said Intestate, to work in the Turpentine Business, in Cumberland County, North Carolina. I lived with him three successive years, hired by the same man. The first year I was hired for One Hundred Dollars. The Second year the Intestate said that Josiah WILLOUGHBY might have him for One Hundred and Eighty Dollars. My Mistress the Plaintiff told John WILLOUGHBY not to hire me out to go to the Turpentine Country, she would rather I was hired out here where she could see me, even at a less price, and that if he did hire me out to go there, she would sue him. He said he would hire me out then, and if it was any body else but Josiah he would charge Two Hundred Dollars. I heard this conversation between John WILLOUGHBY, Josiah WILLOUGHBY and Fannie AVERETT, at John WILLOUGHBY'S House.

The third year, I don't Know what price I brought. I came home at the end of every year. Grown Turpentine hands were hiring, at this time, from One Hundred and fifty to Three Hundred Dollars. Deponant was about Thirty years of age at that time was a healthy man at that time and weighed about One Hundred and seventy seven pounds. Worked Eighteen years successively in the Turpentine business- All the time I was hired out, I worked in the Turpentine business, preceeding Emancipation. I knowing my weight, because I was weighed at Robert TURNER's, at a Hog Killing, with others who were weighed at the same time. At the time I worked with John WILLOUGHBY the intestate of Deft Josiah WILLOUGHBY and John PEEBLES, I worked in the Turpentine business. I was hired to Arden NICHOLS by Joseph L. BALLARD during the time I lived with him. The time I was with William BURNETT I don't Know who hired me out.

Jordan AVERETT the husband of Fannie AVERETT, the Plaintiff, died the second year I was living with John

WILLOUGHBY the Intestate of Defendant. Josiah WILLOUGHBY was the Son of said Intestate.

I was always hired out privately, never publicly. One of the years that I lived with John WILLOUGHBY, Mr. Gray JAMES wamted to hire me, and offered Seventy Dollars for me. So the said John WILLOUGHBY told me. He said he wanted a good hand at house and would Keep me and not let Mr. Gray JAMES have me. Further this Deponant sayeth not.

Moses (his mark) WILLOUGHBY Attest-Calvin COX Clerk Pitt Supr Court"

# BRIERY SWAMP PRIMITIVE BAPTIST CHURCH RECORDS, 1827–1829

At a meeting at Grindle Creek Meeting House by William COOPER and William CLARK, two licensed ministers of the United Baptist Denomination, holding their fellowship in the church at Tranters Creek on Saturday and Sunday, Oct. 13 and 14, 1827.

On Saturday, doors opened for reception of new members, no one came forward. On Sunday, Oct. 14, Elder Thomas D. MASON preached and afterward opened door for new members when: Robert L. LANIER, Lucilla Eliza EBORN, Esther, belonging to Lemuel PERKINS, Clarissa, belonging to estate of Seth WILSON dec'd and Hannah, belonging to Mrs. JORDAN came forward, each relating an experience of grace and were received. On Tuesday, Oct. 16 following they were all baptized by Elder MASON at VAN NORDEN'S Mill. The call was made for new members and Benjamin F. EBORN, Beazer BARROW, Priscilla LOYD and Tom BOSTON, a man of colour, property of Thomas JORDAN came forward and all were baptized by Elder MASON by immersion.

Wed., Oct. 24, 1827 All the above named members produced Letters of Dismission from the Church at Tranters Creek. William COOPER, William CLARK, Louisa P. CLARK, Eliazar BARROW met at Grindles Creek Meeting House in Pitt County and after a sermon by Elder William S. NEWBERN and Thomas D. MASON, they came there and agreed to associate themselves in a church to be known as Grindle Creek Church. After the association, they called Elders NEWBERN and MASON to assist them in constituting themselves into a church recognized by the United Baptist denomination. A convenant was presented Oct. 24, 1827, signed by: William COOPER, William CLARK, Robert F. LANIER, Benjamin F. EBORN, B\_\_\_\_\_\_(torn), Louisa P. CLARK, Elling BARROW, Lucilla E. EBORN, Penelope LOYD, Nancy MOOR, Tom BOSTON, Clarrisa, Hannah and Esther.

22 Rules of Decorum given.

Oct. 24, 1827 – Thomas D. MASON, moderator. The church presented William CLARK, a licensed minister of the gospel to Elders William J. NEWBERN, Thomas D. MASON and Jeremiah LEGGETT, for ordination and by them ordained. Door opened for new members: Elizabeth M. A. LANIER, Elizabeth LITTLE, Esther VICK. Baptism to take place 2nd Sunday in Nov. next.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in November, 1827—Thomas D. MASON, moderator. Door opened for new members: Jacob D. HARRINGTON, Archabald DUDLEY, Tallitha Cuma DUDLEY, Winny, property of Vallentine JORDAN. Benjamin F. EBORN unanimously elected Church Clerk

Elder Thomas D. MASON called to be pastor of the Church and he arose and informed the Church he could not take pastoral care of it longer than 6 months, which was agreed to.

Conference adjoined by Thomas DANIEL.

On 2nd Monday in November, met at VAN NORDEN'S mill, Elder MASON gave a lecture on baptism and the above people were baptized by immersion.

4th Sunday in November 1827—Thomas D. MASON gave a sermon. Door opened for new members: Lastley DUDLEY, Fanny the property of Hugh TELFAIR, Matilda, belonging to William CLARK, and Peter, belonging to James ALBRITTON.

# COHABITATION RECORDS, 1866

#### Part 4

(continued from previous issue)

In the March 1866 session of the North Carolina General Assembly, an Act was passed concerning negroes and persons of color. Justices of the Peace were to collect and record in the County Clerk's office, a record of the cohabitation of former slaves to ratify their state of marriage. The Court clerk was required to maintain a record book for this purpose and to receive 25 cents per entry for this service. In Section 6, Chapter 40 of the Act, it was a misdemeanor if negroes did not record their marriage by Sept. 1, 1866. This section of the Act was amended by Section 1, Chapter 70 (ratified March 1867), to extend the time of recording these marriages to Jan. 1, 1868. Contributed by Roger Kammerer.

S. of the 13th of May and proceeded to organize and chose officers whin the following persons were chosen (vs)

2nd Do A. G. JORDAN

Saturday week is appointed for meeting together again for more perfect when also more privates will be allowed to offer their services. # WILL OF ELIZABETH SIMPSON, 1804

Found in NC Supreme Court Case #5952; NC Archives, Raleigh, NC. Contributed by Roger Kammerer.

"North Carolina Pitt County}

In the name of God Amen I Elizabeth Simpson of the State & County aforesaid being at present of sound & disposing mind but in a low State of health Blessed be God for all his mercies calling to mind the uncertainty of this life I do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament—

Imprimus, my soul to God who gave it in humble hopes his services through the merits of Jesus Christ my saviour my body to be decently buried as to what worldly estate it has pleased God to bless me with I dispose of in the manner & form following — Item it is my Will and desire that my executors sell and dispose of as much of my property as will pay all my just debts and also to raise the sum of nine hundred Dollars which sum is to remain and be kept in the possession of my Executors for the following purposes and to be paid and accounted foe in the following manner (to wit) the sum of four hundred dollars to be divided in two equal parts, the one half being two hundred dollars to be paid by my executors to Susanna OBRYAN the daughter of Lawrence OBRYAN & Elizabeth his wife when she shall arrive at to the age of Seventeen years or to her child or her children or if she die and have no child or children then the said sum of two hundred dollars to go to Lawrence OBRYAN Jnr his child or children the other half being two hundred dollars to Lawrence OBRYAN Jnr son of Lawrence OBRYAN and Elizabeth his wife when he shall arrive at to the age of twenty one years to his child or his children but in case he die & leave no child or children then the aforesaid sum of two hundred Dollars to go to the said Susanna OBRYAN her child or her children they the said Susanna & Lawrence being the children & heirs of Lawrence OBRYAN & his wife Elizabeth OBRYAN in full for their share of my estate, but provided the said Susanna and Lawrence OBRYAN Jnr. should die before she arrives to the age of seventeen & leave no child or children and Lawrence die before he arrives to the age of twenty one years & leave no child or children then the sum of Four hundred dollars shall return into the hands of my Executors and to be equally divided between James EASTON and Joseph BRICKELL or their heirs.

Item It is my will & desire that twelve months after my decease my executors pay unto Mary Nixon SIMPSON two hundred dollars and to Elizabeth Hardee SIMPSON the daughter of my son Samuel SIMPSON and Penelope SIMPSON his wife two hundred dollars in full for their share of my estate

Item It is my will and desire that my executors pay unto Elizabeth BROOKS the daughter of James BROOKS Jr. and Mary his wife when she shall arrive at the age of Seventeen years one hundred Dollars to her & her heirs-Item It is my will & desire that all the residue of my estate excepting what I have disposed of prior to this date by Deed of Gift or otherwise to Ann EASTON and her children and to Sarah BRICKELL and her children consisting of Notes, bonds, negroes, Horses, cattle, Sheep, hogs with all and singular the estate which I shall die Seized and possessed of to be divided into two equal parts the one half of which I will unto Henry POTTER of the City of Raleigh in trust (to wit) notes bonds negroes horses cattle Sheep hogs and one half of any residue of my estate in trust and for the use and benefit of James EASTON and Ann EASTON his wife for and during their joint lives and to the Survivor for life. And upon the death of the said James EASTON and Ann EASTON his wife my will is and I give the aforesaid notes bonds negroes horses cattle Sheep hogs household & Kitchen furniture and any residue of my estate as above described to Elizabeth Hardee Simpson EASTON and John Simpson EASTON and the future issue of the said James & Ann EASTON and if any or either of the said Children or the future issue shall die before their right shall fall to them as last mentioned leaving issue if living shall represent their deceased parent and be entitled to the same shall he or she would have been entitled too if living and to them their heirs and assigns forever. And upon the death of the aforesaid James & Ann EASTON then shall the Trustee his heirs Executors administrators shall forthwith deliver all the aforesaid described property unto the said Elizabeth H. S. EASTON & John S. EASTON as aforesaid or to her or his Guardian or their heirs & upon the delivery as aforesaid then this trust shall instantly cease.

Item It is my will and desire that the other half of my estate as aforesaid (to wit) consisting of notes bonds negroes horses cattle Sheep hogs and one half of any residue of my estate and I give the same unto Joseph BRICKELL and Sarah BRICKELL his wife for and during their joint lives & to the survivor for life & upon the death of the said Joseph & Sarah BRICKELL I will the aforesaid one half of notes, bonds, negroes, Horses cattle, Sheep, hogs, Household & Kitchen furniture & one half of any residue of my estate unto the children of the said Joseph & Sarah BRICKELL to be equally divided between them or the survivor of them, their heirs & assigns forever. Lastly I constitute and appoint James EASTON & Joseph BRICKELL Executors to this my last Will and testament renouncing and declaring all others by me made to be void. In testimony wherof I the said Elizabeth SIMPSON hath hereunto Set my hand and seal with this last Will and Testament this the twenty seventh day of April one thousand eight hundred and four (1804)

I do hereby Certify that the within copy purporting to be the last Will & Testament of Elizabeth SIMPSON is true as will show in the Clerks office of Pitt County & state of North Carolina Given under my hand and seal off office at Greenville on the 25th day of November AD 1852.

# In Memory of Frank M. Clark 1934-2005

The Pitt County Family Researchers has lost a dear friend and supporter with the passing of Frank Milton Clark, our Vice-President, who died on Aug. 11, 2005, in Greenville, North Carolina. Frank was always full of fun, loved to joke and loved the company of those who would joke with him. He belonged to many organizations and was always in a hurry trying to get to one meeting or another. He seemed to always be receiving awards and the members of the board of PCFR would continually tease him for being on the local news. He was an avid family historian and would help anyone he could track their family genealogy. Frank was very proud of his twenty-three years of service as the family historian and national coordinator on the executive board of the Clark-Rodan Family Reunion. Thankfully, Frank contributed much of his research on his family to the new Chronicles of Pitt County, Vol. II. According to his own biography, Frank Milton Clark was born in 1934 in Greene Co., North Carolina, fifth of the six children of Warren H. Clark (1874-1945) and his second wife, Etta Ellis Clark. Warren had married first to Alice Rodan, by whom he had twenty children. Frank served in the army in the Korean War and later lived in New Jersey where he worked for the State. After receiving numerous awards, he retired after 33 years of service and relocated to Greenville, North Carolina, in 1989.

Besides his work with the Clark-Rodan Family Reunion, he was a member of VFW Post 7032, an adjutant historian of American Legion Post 39, Vice-President of the Pitt County Veteran's Council, member of the Pitt County Fair Board, and was an active member of Mt. Calvary Free Will Baptist Church in Greenville, NC. Frank had a daughter who predeceased him. He is survived at his death by a brother, Henry Clark, and sisters: Lessie Edwards of Walstonburg, North Carolina; Susie D. Vines of Winterville, North Carolina; Marie Wallace of Grifton, North Carolina; and Louise Williams of Snow Hill, North Carolina. He leaves a wide circle of relatives and friends. He was buried at Homestead Memorial Gardens in Greenville, North Carolina. His friends will miss him, but will never forget his smile.

# BRIERY SWAMP PRIMITIVE BAPTIST CHURCH RECORDS, 1830–1833

#### Part 2

These are abstracts from the church minutes found on microfilm, MF 31.1; East Carolina Manuscript Collection, J. Y. Joyner Library, East Carolina University, Greenville, NC. These records are continued from PCGQ, May 2005. Contributed by Roger Kammerer.



Conference, 2nd Sat. in January 1830- Jesse MOORE, moderator. Report on Benjamin BELL being accused by brother James SHEPHERD. SHEPHERD said he was not at all the quarrel, but saw BELL fight Mr. EVANS and appeared ready to fight as much as Mr. EVANS. SHEPHERD did not recollect if BELL had too much ardent spirits, but had seen him at other times when he thought he was. SHEPHERD was asked if he thought BELL'S moral character and walk was such that he would be satisfied if he was in church with him. SHEPHERD said that at the combat and several times previous to that his feelings were much injured and hurt by BELL'S conduct, so much that he could not reconcile being in the same church with him. But since the fight he could fellowship with BELL. BELL came forth and acknowledged he had transgressed and had sorely grieved for the same and hoped the church would forgive him. Brother BELL continued in fellowship with the church. James ALBRITTON informed the church that on Jan. 1, 1830, he drank too much ardent spirits and was drunk. He was much wounded by his actions and hoped the church would forgive him. Church nearly unanimously agreed to keep him in fellowship. Rachel HARRIS asks for Letters of Dismission. It was agreed that Jacob D. HARRINGTON have leave to exercise his ministerial gifts in the adjoining churches. Tom BOSTON made application for liberty to preach which was laid over to next conference. Brothers Josiah DANIEL, Robert F. LANIER and Benjamin F. EBORN appointed a committee to inquire among the colored members as to BOSTON'S moral character and make report. Adjourned with singing.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in February 1830— Elder William HYMAN, moderator. Elizabeth COOPER, Abigail PEARCE, Nancy BARROW, Nelly ROSS and colored members Tom ORMOND, Fanny and Hannah had been absent 3 conferences. Brother COOPER and Brother PEARCE gave excuses and sister Martha ALBRITTON gave excuse for Sister Nancy BARROW. The case of Tom BOSTON taken up. The report says his walk since his profession of christianity has been sensorable. but his walk of late was better than formerly. The church decided he did not have leave to preach. Brother Obediah MOORE informed the Conference that John S. DANIEL had trespassed on his feelings and he had lost fellowship for him. The charge that John S. DANIEL had removed or taken a house out of his possession without his consent. Howell WHITEHEAD, Benjamin F. EBORN, Lewis SPEIR and Beazer BARROW appointed a committee to examine the trespass. Elder CLARK charged John KINSAUL with using profane language. Brother PERRY related that he heard KINSAUL say that Brother PEARCE "was a damm raskel & a dam Liar." Also heard by Howell WHITEHEAD. John KINSAUL was excommunicated from fellowship with the church. William PERRY asks for Letters of Dismission. Adjourned with singing.

2nd Sunday in February 1830 – Met at VAN NORDEN'S mill. Cesar, belonging to V. JORDAN, Esq. and Mahala, property of B. F. EBORN baptized. Afterwards went to the meeting house. Sermons given by Elders HYMAN and MASON. Absent colored members called and gave satisfactory excuses.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in March 1830— William CLARK, moderator. The case of Obediah MOORE against John S. DANIEL. The facts are that MOORE'S christian feelings were hurt when DANIEL took a certain house that MOORE considered in his possession. MOORE in the first instance gave his consent for said DANIEL to take the house (DANIEL having told MOORE that he had bought the house and that it was on his risk). Some 2 or 3 weeks after MOORE told DANIEL not to take the house away for he had understood that he had not bought it. The Committee says that DANIEL carried or had carried the house away after it had been pulled down by some other persons. DANIEL says he had bought the house as he told MOORE, and there was no evidence to show he had not. The Committee says that after Daniel heard that MOORE'S feelings were hurt he wanted to meet with him on the subject. DANIEL took one of the church brothers twice to see MOORE, but both attempts failed to produce a reconciliation. No evidence that MOORE had ever been to see DANIEL to talk about the subject. Two Brothers heard MOORE say he would never forgive DANIEL. When the Committee visited MOORE, he left them before

they had got through with the business and said to them as he walked off "Goodby. I shall not be at the next meeting do as you please." The Committee's opinion was that the trespass was a private one and MOORE carried it into the church contrary to church decorum. DANIEL was to talk to MOORE and make amends and MOORE continues to be unforgiving and unchristian like in disposition towards DANIEL. The Committee recommends excommunication of MOORE from fellowship which was given. William CLARK says there is a report that Jim, belonging to William JONES, is the father of a white womans child in Jim's neighborhood. Lewis SPEIR, John BUGH, Lastly DUDLEY and James ALBRITTON appointed a committee to check out this report. Committee to take up Tom BOSTON'S request to preach again. Thomas TYSON and Nancy PERRY ask Letters of Dismission. Jacob D. HARRINGTON to write a letter to Skewarky Union Meeting praying for dismission of this church from said Union for the purpose of forming a union with Great Swamp and Flat Swamp Churches and HARRINGTON to present the letter to Skewarky Union Meeting.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in April 1830— Lewis SPEIR, moderator. Excuses given by Ellinor BARROW, Mary BRINKLEY and Sarah JOLLY. The cases of Tom BOSTON, belonging to Thomas JORDAN and Jim, belonging to W. JONES put off till next conference.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in May 1830— Jesse MOORE, moderator. Ordered Benjamin BELL and Ezekial LANGLEY be called to next conference for nonattendance. The Committee report on Tom BOSTON says that all the colored members, except one, say he never trespassed on their christian feelings to not talk to him. The one that did say, it was predicated on a report which he had no knowledge of himself. Tom satisfied him on the subject. The case of Jim, belonging to William JONES, the Committee went and saw Sally MCDUEL (mother of the child) and she said it was Jim's if it was black and would swear it was Jim's. Jim said he was not guilty and denied the charge. The Committee said the child is black and charge Jim by the evidence. The church in conference DO NOT concur with the Committee that Jim is guilty. The woman is of a debased character and her word should not be taken against a member, to the excluding of him from the church. Jim was released from the charge. Lanier DANIEL then charged Jim, property of William JONES, with being a common liar and absenting himself from said JONES' service without provocation. Lastly DUDLEY said Jim had told him a lie. Jim being present called to make defense but failed to make satisfactory excuse. Trial was given on his fellowship and Jim was excommunicated. Mary BRINKLEY died April 22, 1830.

2nd Sunday in May 1830 - Sermons given by John S. DANIEL and Elder William CLARK. Communion held and they washed each others feet.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in June 1830— J. S. DANIEL, moderator. Nelly ROSS asks for Letters of Dismission to Flat swamp Meeting House. Jacob D. HARRINGTON did not present letter to Skewarky Union Meeting because the letter had no Clerk's signature. He to give letter to Skewarky Union praying for dismission of this church to form a union with churches more convenient.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in July 1830—Jesse MOORE, moderator. HARRINGTON presented letter and ordered church clerk to sign it and Jacob D. HARRINGTON, Robert F. LANIER and Josiah DANIEL to present it to Skewarky Union. Alfred PEARCE said he saw James ALBRITTON drunk on Sat., July 3, 1830 and engage in a quarrel with Richard HODGES at Yankee Hall. He saw ALBRITTON go up to HODGES and clear him of the law and told Hodges to strike him. Ordered ALBRITTON to attend next conference and answer charges. Conference adjourned by prayer by Josiah CARNEY.

Yearly Meeting, 2nd Fri. in August 1830- Jacob D. HARRINGTON, moderator.

Yearly Meeting, 2nd Sat. in August 1830. Case of James ALBRITTON, he failed to give satisfactory excuse, he was excommunicated. Church chose delegates to next Association by private ballot. Ballot conducted by Brother STOKES and Brother Ed. ANDREWS. William CLARK and Benjamin F. EBORN elected. Agreed to send \$2.00 to Association Fund. Sisters COOPER, CLARK and Nancy MOORE absent 3 conferences.

Yearly Meeting, 2nd Sun. in August 1830. Communion held. Sermons by John S. DANIEL and Elder CLARK.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in September 1830—Mercer WILSON, moderator. Benjamin BELL absent 3 conferences. \$3.00 to be sent Association, not \$2.00. Louise P. CLARK asked conference to indulge her if she should not meet in conference, they agreed. Agreed that Robert F. LANIER and Jacob D. HARRINGTON have license to preach.

<u>Conference</u>, <u>2nd Sat. in October 1830</u>— William CLARK. moderator. Sally LANGLEY absent 3 conferences. The case of Benjamin BELL brought up and he was excommunicated. Door opened for new members: Bridget, property of Robert F. LANIER. Jim, property of William JONES restored to fellowship.

2nd Sunday in October 1830- Met at VAN NORDEN'S mill. Bridget was baptised.

<u>Conference</u>, <u>2nd Sat. in November 1830</u>— James BROWN, moderator. Ezekiel LANGLEY, Mary LANGLEY and Piety CRANDELL absent for 3 conferences. Satisfactory excuses given. Door opened for new members: Noah, the property of Samuel ALBRITTON, Jr. The case of Nancy MOORE for nonattendence, she states she and her child were sick on conference days.

2nd Sunday in November 1830 – Met at VAN NORDEN'S mill. Services in meeting house. Door opened for new members: Mrs. Harriet LITTLE.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in December 1830— Jesse MOORE, moderator. Abigail PEARCE charged Jincy HODGES with being intimate with her husband Alfred PEARCE. HARRINGTON asks Letters of Dismission to join the United Baptist Church at Old Ford, which was objected to. Laid over.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in January 1831 – J. S. DANIEL, moderator. Committee found Jincy HODGES and Alfred PEARCE not guilty. Abigail PEARCE found guilty of adultry, she was excommunicated. Case of Jacob D. HARRINGTON laid over. Conference adjourned by prayer by Thomas DANIEL.

Quarterly Meeting, 2nd Sat. in February 1831 – Jacob D. HARRINGTON, moderator. Jacob D. HARRINGTON withdrew his Letters of Dismission.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in April 1831 – Jacob D. HARRINGTON, moderator. Elder William CLARK asks Letters of Dismission.

Conference, 2nd Sun. in May 1831—Door opened for new members: Dick, the property of James LANGLEY and Mary, the property of John CHERRY, both with Letters of Dismission from Tranters Creek Church. Conference agreed that any person Elder William CLARK baptized on a confession of faith in Christ that may offer for membership in this church shall be received.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in June 1831— Jesse MOORE, moderator. On motion, Elder William CLARK called to be pastor. Not agreed to by some brethren, who say he cannot become pastor without some alteration in the church covenant. Laid over till next conference. Elder CLARK called to next conference to suggest alterations in the covenant he thinks right to be made and on what condition he would again take pastoral care of this church.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in July 1831—Robert F. LANIER, moderator. Elder William CLARK appeared and after making considerable remarks on creeds and church covenants, issue laid over.

Yearly Meeting, 2nd Fri. in August 1831— Jacob D. HARRINGTON, moderator. The issue of Elder William CLARK being pastor. He said he would on condition the church would let him preach concientously the Doctine which he believes to be contained in the Scriptures or Word of God. It was decided he be pastor of the church. John BUGH and Alexander BRINKLEY ask Letters of Dismission to Galloways Meeting House in Pitt County. Josiah DANIEL saw Lastly DUDLEY engage in a fight, DUDLEY satisfied the church and restored to fellowship. Louisa P. CLARK, Nancy MOORE, Sidney DANIEL, Susannah DUDLEY, Mary MOORE, Zilpha JOLLY and Elizabeth COOPER absent 3 conferences. Robert F. LANIER and Jacob D. HARRINGTON chosen delegates to the Association and send \$1.50 to the Association Fund. Clerk to prepare letter and sketch of the history of the church to the Association.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in September 1831 – Elder William CLARK, moderator. Ruben WHICHARD asks Letters of Dismission to Great Swamp Meeting House. Josiah DANIEL asks Letters of Dismission. Application by Brother EBORN for Letters of Dismission for John S. DANIEL, not granted because he and Lucilla E. EBORN and Talitha CHERRY absent 3 conferences.

<u>Conference</u>, 2nd Sat. in October 1831 – James DANIEL, moderator. Case of Nancy MOORE for nonattendance, her mind is deranged and could not attend conference. Committee of Beazor BARROW, Josiah DANIEL and Lanier DANIEL to visit her and ascertain her sanity or insanity. Brother John S. DANIEL gave satisfactory excuse for his absences.

Quarterly Meeting, 2nd Sat. in November 1831—Elder William CLARK, moderator. Louisa P. CLARK, Margaret BRINKLEY, Asia DANIEL, Mary LANGLEY and Piety CRANDELL absent 3 conferences. Committee on Nancy MOORE said she was not in her right mind and a disgrace to the cause of religion. She was excommunicated. Jacob D. HARRINGTON asks Letters of Dismission to join the Baptist Church at Old Ford Meeting House in Beaufort County, granted.

Quarterly Meeting, 2nd Sun. in November 1831 - Sermons by Brothers DUNN and CONGLETON.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in Dec. 1831-Jan. 1832- no meeting.

Quarterly Meeting, 2nd Sat. in Feb. 1832 – E. A. DANIEL, moderator. Josiah DANIEL wanted his name removed from the church list, he was excommunicated. Door opened for new members: Jim, belonging to the heirs of Seth WILSON, Jr. dec'd.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in March 1832 - Brother COOPER, moderator.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in April 1832 - no conference due to bad weather.

Quarterly Meeting, 2nd Sat. in May 1832 – Elder William CLARK, moderator. Agreed Robert F. LANIER be ordained minister. James DUDLEY asks Letters of Dismission, which application was not granted. He having given no reason for requesting a Letter other than he did not like Brother CLARK'S Doctrine, nor the man. Committee of BARROW, CRANDELL, WHITEHEAD and SPEIR to get them together and try to settle differences. Notice to John BUGH to give up his Letters of Dismission and why he has not attached himself to some other church.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in June 1832—Jeremiah LEGGETT, moderator. On charge of CLARK against James DUDLEY, the Committee clears Clark of charges and James DUDLEY was excommunicated.

Conference, 2nd Sun. in June 1832—Robert F. LANIER was ordained by Elders Jeremiah LEGGETT and William CLARK. Door opened for new members: Stephen, belonging to Harman MAY'S heirs, Judea, belonging to Miss Cornelia VAN NOORDEN, Tabby, belonging to old Mrs. Elizabeth JORDAN.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in July 1832— Elder William CLARK, moderator. Case of John BUGH continued. Elder William CLARK charges Brother John S. DANIEL of unchristianlike conduct towards him when he was chosen pastor the second time. Also unchristianlike conduct by coming to church and sitting outside during preaching and setting a bad example to others. Also for want of christian charity in perverting his motives when he talked to him for affecting a reconcilliation and when CLARK invited him to dine out and DANIEL accused him of electioneering to be pastor and mocked him in conference.

Yearly Meeting, 2nd Fri. in August 1832—William CLARK, moderator. Case of Ezekial LANGLEY for absence satisfied. John BUGH excommunicated for not giving up his Letters of Dismission. John S. DANIEL excommunicated for unchristianlike conduct. Robert F. LANIER says he saw Hodges LITTLE drunk and engaged in a quarrel. Polasky DUDLEY and his wife Susannah DUDLEY ask Letters of Dismission.

Yearly Meeting, 2nd Sat. in August 1832— Jesse MOORE, moderator. Hodges LITTLE was excommunicated. Resolution of Robert F. LANIER, whereas the last Kehucky Association was held at Flat Swamp Meeting House in Pitt County, and the Association published articles and rules of Doctrine by Calvin, Gill and others as a condition upon which they could be members of the body. The Grindle Creek Church dissents from these articles and recognizes no foundation but the Doctrine of the Apostles and Prophets. Jesus Christ himself being the chief cornerstone and no other guide but the Bible. Resolved that a copy of this resolution and delegates be sent to our sister churches at Tranters Creek, Old Ford, Great Swamp, Greenville, Galloways, Red Banks, Rountrees, Unity and Little Sisters. Delegates: R. L. LANIER, William CLARK. Conference adjourned by Brother William CLEMENTS.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in Sept. 1832—William CLARK, moderator. Mary MCKEEL, Penelope LLOYD, Mary A. LITTLE, Sally LANGLEY, Nancy SPEIR and Frederick VICK absent 3 conferences. John BUGH still hasn't given back the Letters of Dismission. Letters of Dismission for Robert F. LANIER and wife, Elizabeth M. A. LANIER; Beasor BARROW and wife Ellinor BARROW; Talithy CHERRY to Great Swamp Baptist Church; Archiball DUDLEY and Urvin DUDLEY.

<u>Conference</u>, 2nd Sat. in Oct. 1832—William CLARK, moderator. John BUGH gave up his Letters of Dismission. Frederick VICK and Penelope LLOYD tried and excommunicated. Church agreed to petition the Neuse Association for admittance.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in Nov. 1832-William CLARK, moderator. New deacons: Lewis SPEIR and Howel WHITEHEAD.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in Jan. 1833- Elder William CLARK, moderator.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in Feb. 1833— Elder William CLARK, moderator. Conference opened by brother COOPER. Visiting brethren invited to sit with us. John KINSAUL came forward and was restored to fellowship. Brother Lewis SPEIR contributed 3 shillings to church fund. We agreed that we inform the Baptist Church at Tranters Creek and Old Ford that we are willing to join them in a union, to hold union meetings on the 5th Sunday that may come in the month or such other times as said church may agree. Brother EBORN to write them letters on the subject and Brother EBORN to deliver the letters to Tranters Creek and Elder CLARK to Old Ford. Signed B. F. EBORN clerk.

GORHAM from Tranters Creek and John LEGGETT from Old Ford Church informed us that they are willing to join us in forming a union meeting. The first union meeting to be held in Old Ford Meeting House on the Saturday before the 5th Sunday in June next. Sister Sidney DANIEL was excused for nonattendance.

He gives excuse and promises to be more faithful in attendance. Alfred PEARCE case taken up and he was excommunicated from the privileges of the church.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in Sept.-Nov. 1833- No meeting

On Sunday of [blank] Old (or Ola?) ROGERS was received and baptized.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in Dec. 1833— Lewis SPEIR, moderator. Conference opened by prayer from Brother EBORN. Brother EBORN informed the Conference that he saw John KINSAUL drunk. From Brother KINSAULS concessions and promises the church agreed to continue. Brother EBORN informed the Conference that there was a report in circulation that sister Nancy LANGLEY had a child of the wrong color; which report her husband Ezekiel LANGLEY says is true. She was tried on her fellowship in the Church and was excommunicated.

# COHABITATION RECORDS, 1866

#### Part 5

(continued from previous issue)

In the March 1866 session of the North Carolina General Assembly, an Act was passed concerning negroes and persons of color. Justices of the Peace were to collect and record in the County Clerk's office, a record of the cohabitation of former slaves to ratify their state of marriage. The Court clerk was required to maintain a record book for this purpose and to receive 25 cents per entry for this service. In Section 6, Chapter 40 of the Act, it was a misdemeanor if negroes did not record their marriage by Sept. 1, 1866. This section of the Act was amended by Section 1, Chapter 70 (ratified March 1867), to extend the time of recording these marriages to Jan. 1, 1868. Contributed by Roger Kammerer.

#### Calvin Cox Murdered, 1888

Washington Progress, Washington, NC, Oct. 23, 1888. Contributed by Roger Kammerer.

"On Saturday Oct. 12, the county candidates addressed the people at Venter's store or Calico. Sometime during the day previous the murder, Halsey BRANCH and Bud VENTERS two young men of that section, of whom we know nothing, got into a dispute with Calvin COX, a young man from Haddock's X Roads. At this time they did not come to blows until about night when BRANCH and VENTERS came upon COX while he was sitting down in conversation with a Mr. BUCK. BRANCH had a piece of plank and VENTERS a round stick. They proceeded to beat COX. He was badly beaten, his friends proceeded to take him home but before reaching their he died. He was examined by a doctor, who found a hole in COX'S skull that corresponded with a nail in the plank with which BRANCH beat him. It seems from the facts as they have been sent in to us from the section of the murder, that these parties might not have had any intention to kill COX. They are now in the Greenville jail. We learn from the *Reflector* that these parties were very much in liquor."

"John BUTLER by his will, February 1799— bequeathed to his widow the remainder of his stock of Cattle & hogs, and household furniture during her life or widowhood— then to be equally divided between his two daughters Elizabeth and Mary—

Answer: The increase of the Stock lent to a person for a particular time belongs to such person absolutely— The Executor of BUTLER is entitled to receive from the widow only what remains of the original Stock— if any part of the original Stock has been Killed or sold by the widow she must make good its value, but she is not bound to make up any deficiency by death— The increase belongs to the widow and the Executor cannot intermeddle with that—

Mary one of the legatees, died an infant and intestate— Elizabeth died after Mary leaving two illegitimate children— in 1810— Marys Share of the Stock &c. will be divided among the Mother & the brothers & Sisters—the two children of Elizabeth will take one Share (their mothers) between them—they also take their mothers legacy—Septr. 14. 1812 J STANLY"

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

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# ANTHONY DAWSON, SLAVE NARRATIVE

The following interview was made in the mid 1930's in Tulsa, Oklahoma when Anthony Dawson was 105 years old. The interview was taken from the "Slave Narrative Collection", Library of Congress, Washington, DC. Contributed by Roger Kammerer.



"Run nigger, run,
De Patteroll get you!
Run nigger, run,
De Patteroll come!
Watch nigger, watch,
De Patteroll trick you!
Watch nigger, watch,
He got a big gun!"

Dat one of the songs de slaves all knowed, and de children down on de "twenty acres" used to sing it when dey playing in de moonlight round de cabins in de quarters. Sometime I wonder iffen de white folks didn't make dat song up so us niggers would keep in line.

None of my master's boys tried to get away 'cepting two, and dey met up with evil, both of 'em. One of dem niggers was fetching a bull tongue from a piece of new ground way at de back of de plantation and bringing it to my pappy to get it sharpened. My pappy was de blacksmith. Dis boy got out in de big road to walk in de soft sand, and 'long come a wagon with a white overseer and five, six niggers going somewhere. Dey stopped and told dat boy to get in and ride. Dat was de last anybody seen him.

Dat overseer and another one was cotched after awhile and showed up to be underground railroaders. Dey would take a bunch of niggers into town for some excuse and on de way just pick up a extra nigger and show him where to go to get on de "railroad system." When de runaway niggers got to de North dey had to go in de army, and dat boy from our place got killed. He was a good boy, but dey just talked him into it. Dem railroaders was honest, and dey didn't take no presents, but de patrollers was low white trash! We all knowed dat if a patroller just rode right by and didn't say nothing dat he was doing his honest job, but iffen he stopped his hoss and talked to a nigger he was after some kind of trade.

Dat other black boy hoeing cotton way in de back of de field and de patrollers rid up and down de big road, saying nothing to nobody. De next day another white man was on de job, and 'long in de evening a man come by and axed de niggers about de fidshing and hunting! Dat black boy seen he was de same man what was riding de day before and he knowed it was an underground trick. But he didn't see all de trick, bless God!

We found out afterwards dat he told his mammy about it. She worked at de Big House and she stole something for him to give dat low white trash I reckon, 'cause de next day he played sick along in de evening and de black overlooker—he was my uncle—sent him back to de quarters. He never did get back there, but when dey started de hunt dey found him about a mile away in de woods with his head shot off, and Old Master sold his mammy to a trader right away. He never whipped his grown niggers.

Dat was de way it worked. Dey was all kinds of white folks just like dey is now. One man in Sesech clothes would shoot you if you tried to run away. Maybe another Sesech would help slip you out to the underground and say "God Bless you, you poor black devil," and some of dem dat was poor would help you if you could bring 'em somethin' you stole, like a silver dish or spoons or a couple of big hams. I couldn't blame them poor white folks, with the men in the War and the women and children hungry. The niggers didn't belong to them nohow, and they had to live somehow. But now and then they was a devil on earth, walking in the sight of God and spreading iniquity before him. He was de low—down Sesesh dat would take what a poor runaway nigger had to give for his chance to get away, and den give him 'structions dat would lead him right into de hands of de patro;;ers and get him caught or shot. Yes, dat's de way it was. Devils and good people walking in de road at de same time, and nobody could tell one from t'other.

I remember about de trickery so good 'cause I was "grown and out' at that time. When I was a little boy I was a house boy, 'cause my mammy was the house woman, but when the War broke I already been sent to the fields and Mammy was still at de house. I was born on July 25, 1832. I know, 'cause Old Master keep de book on his slaves just like on his own family. I was born on the plantation, soon after my pappy and mammy was brought to it. I don't remember whether they was bought or come from my mistress' father. He was mighty rich and had several

hundred niggers. When she was married he gave her forty niggers. One of them was my pappy's brother. His name was John, and he was my master's overlooker. We called a white man boss the "overseer," but a nigger was a overlooker. John could read and write and figger, and Old Master didn't have no white overseer.

Master was a good man, and Old Mistress was de best woman in de world! Master's name was Levi DAWSON, and his plantation was eighteen miles east of Greenville, North Carolina. De plantation had more than five hundred acres and most was in cotton and tobacco. But we raised corn and oats, and lots of cattle and horses, and plenty of sheep for wool. It was a beautiful place, with all the fences around the Big House and along the front made out of barked poles, rider style, and all whitewashed. The Big House set back from the big road about a quarter of a mile. It was only one story, but it had lots of rooms. There was four rooms in a bunch on one side and four in a bunch on the other, with a wide hall in between. They was made of square adzed logs all weatherboarded on the outside and planked up and plastered on the inside. Then they was a long gallery clean across the front with big pillars made out of brick and plastered over. They called it the passage 'cause it didn't have no floor excepting bricks, and a buggy could drive right under it. Mostly it was used to set under talk and play cards and drink the best whiskey Old Master could buy. Back in behind the Big House was the kitchen, and the smokehouse in another place made of plank, and all was whitewashed and painted white all the time.

Old Mistress was named Susie and she was born an ISLEY. She brought forty niggers from her pappy as a present, and Master Levi just had four or five, but he had got all his land from his pappy. She had the niggers and he had the land. That's the way it was, and that's the way it stayed! She never let him punish one of her niggers and he never asked her about buying oir selling land. Her pappy was richer than his pappy, and she was sure quality!

My pappy's name was Anthony, and Mammy's name was Chanie. He was the blacksmith and fixed the wagons, but he couldn't read and figger like Uncle John. Mammy was the head house woman but didn't know any letters either. They was both black like me. Old man ISLEY, where they come from, had lots of niggers, but I don't think they was off the boat.

Master Levi had three sons and no daughters. The oldest son was Simeon. He was in the Sesech army. The other two boys was too young. I can't remember their names. They was a lot younger and I was grown and out before they got big.

Old Master was a fine Christian but he like his juleps anyways. He let us niggers have preachings and prayers and would give us a parole to go ten or fifteen miles to a camp meeting and stay two or three days with nobody but Uncle John to stand for us. Mostly we had white preachers, but when we had a black preacher that was heaven. We didn't have no voodoo women nor conjure folks at our "twenty acres." We all knowed about the Word and the unseen Son of God and we didn't put no stock in conjure. 'Course we had luck charms and good and bad signs, but everybody got dem things, even nowadays. My boy had a white officer in the Big War and he tells me that man had a li'l old doll tied around his wrist on a gold chain.

We used herbs and roots for common ailments, like sassafras and boneset and peach tree poultices and coon rot tea, but when a nigger got bad sick Old Master sent for a white doctor. I remember that old doctor. He lived in Greenville and he had to come eighteen miles in a buggy. When he give some nigger medicine he would be afraid the nigger was like lots of them that believed in conjure, and he would say, "If you don't take that medicine like I tell you and I have to come back here to see you I going to break your damn neck next time I come out here!" When it was bad weather sometimes the black boy sent after him had to carry a lantern to show him the way back. If that nigger on his mule got too far ahead so old doctor couldn't see de light he sure catch de devil from the old doctor and from Old Master, too, lessen he was one of Old Missy's house niggers, and then Old Master just grumble to satisfy the doctor.

Down in the quarters we had the spinning house, where the old women card the wool and run the loom. They made double weave for the winter time, and all the white folks and slaves had good clothes and good food. Master made us all eat all we could hold. He would come to the smokehouse and look in and say "You niggers ain't cutting down that smoke side and that souse like you ought to! You made dat meat and you got to help eat it up!"

Never no work on Sunday 'cepting the regular chores. The overlooker made everybody clean up and wash de children up, and after the praying we had games— antny over and marbles and "I Spy" and de likes of that. Sometimes de boys would go down in de woods and get a possum. I love possum and sweet 'taters, but de coon meat more delicate and de hair don't stink up de meat.

I wasn't at the quarters much as a boy. I was at the Big House with my mammy, and I had to swing the fly brush over my old mistress when she was sewing or eating or taking her nap. Sometime I would keep the flies offen Old Master, and when I would get tired and let the brush slap his neck he would kick at me and cuss me, but he never did reach me. He had a way of keeping us little niggers scared to death and never hurting nobody.

I was down in the field burning brush when I first heard the guns in the War. De fighting was de battle at Kingston, North Carolina, and it lasted four days and nights. After while bunches of Sesesh come riding by hauling wounded people in wagons, and then pretty soon big bunches of Yankees come by, but dey didn't act like dey was trying very hard to catch up. Dey had de country in charge quite some time, and they had forages coming round all

the time. By dat time Old Master done buried his money and all de silver and de big clock, but the Yankees didn't appear to search out dat kind of stuff. All dey ask about was did anybody find a bottle of brandy!

When de War ended up most all de niggers stay with Old Master and work on de shares, until de land get

divided up and sold off and the young niggers get scattered to town.

I never did have no truck with de Ku Kluckers, but I had to step mighty high to keep outen it! De sure 'nough Kluxes never did bother around us 'cause we minded our own business and never give no trouble. We wouldn't let no niggers come round our place talking about delegates and voting, and we just all stayed on the place. But dey was some low white trash and some devilish niggers made out like dey was Ku Klux ranging 'round de country stealing hosses and taking things. Old Master said dey wasn't sure 'nough, so I reckon he knowed who the regular ones was.

These bunches that come around robbing got into our neighborhood and Old Master told me I better not have my old horse at the house, 'cause if I had him they would know nobody had been there stealing and it wouldn't do no good to hide anything 'cause they would tear up the place hunting what I had and maybe whip or kill me. "Your old hoss ain't no good, Tony, and you better kill him to make them think you already been raided on," Old Master told me, so I led him out and knocked him in the head with an ax, and then we hid all our grub and waited for Kluckers to come most any night, but they never did come. I borried a hoss to use in the day and took him back home every night for about a year.

The niggers kept talking about being free, but they wasn't free then and they ain't now. Putting them free just like putting goat hair on a sheep. When it rain de goat come a-running and get in de shelter, 'cause his hair won't shed the rain and he get cold, but de sheep ain't got sense enough to get in the shelter but just stand out and let it rain on him all day. But the good Lord fix the sheep up with a woolly jacket that turn the water off, and he don't get cold, so he don't have to have no brains. De nigger during slavery was like de sheep. He couldn't take care of hisself but his master looked out for him, and he didn't have to use his brains. De master's protection was like de woolly coat. But de 'mancipation come and take off de woolly coat and leave de nigger with no protection and he cain't take care of hisself either.

When de niggers was set free lots of them got mighty uppity, and everybody wanted to be a delegate to something or other. The Yankees told us we could go down and vote in the 'lections and our color was good enough to run for anything. Heaps of niggers believed them. You cain't fault them for that, 'cause they didn't have no better sense, but I knowed the black folks didn't have no business mixing in until they knowed more. It was a long time after the War before I went down to vote and everything quiet by that time, but I heard people talk about the fights at the schoolhouse when they had the first election.

I just stayed on around the old place a long time, and then I got on another piece of ground and farmed, not far from Greenville, until 1900. Then I moved to Hearn, Texas, and stayed with my son Ed until 1903 when we moved to Sapulpa in the Creek Nation. We come to Tulsa several years ago, and I been living with him ever since.

## Lost Will of Samuel Brown, Greene Co., NC, 1817

Contributed by Roger Kammerer

This will was originally recorded on Oct 8, 1825 in Will Book A, Haywood County, Tenn., which was later destroyed by fire. During WPA, a copy of the Will was found among some old papers and it was transcribed into a book of old records from the Haywood County Clerk's Office, Brownsville, TN.

An abstract of the Will states:

"I Samuel BROWN of the County of Green and State of North Carolina...leaves to wife Elizabeth BROWN, son Abel BROWN, land on the south side of Nantrenta Swamp, 140 acres adjoining A. DARDEN. To son John BROWN land lying in Pitt County, 370 acres on Beaver Dam Swamp adjoining Simon KEAL. To son Samuel BROWN, plantation where I now live on Nantrenta and Appletree Swamp, to said Samuel BROWN, tract of land on the Long Branch adjoining J. HOLMES. To daughters, Peggy BROWN and Clary BROWN and 'all my children." The Will dated Nov. 6, 1817 was signed with a mark, and was witnessed by A. DURDEN and J. HOLMES.

Johnnie STOKES, a 16 year old son of Mr. Edward STOKES, of Swift Creek township, this county, dropped dead in the field on last Friday. He had not complained of being sick and fell dead while at his work.

#### William Cleve, Sr. Dead

Newbern Daily Journal, Newbern, NC, March 31, 1897.

William CLEVE, Senior, of this County, who died at his home in Vanceboro, on the 29th inst. was born in Frankfort, Germany, in 1827. The first part of his life was spent in Germany, he leaving that country when 27 years old, and coming to the United States. By trade, Mr. CLEVE was a silversmith, being educated in that profession. For a good many years, Mr. CLEVE has lived the life of a retired merchant, trading in cotton and other commodities he was generally successful, and quietly amassed a comfortable fortune. For three tears he was a Commissioner of Craven County, and at the time of his death was a stockholder and director in the Farmers and Merchants Bank of this city, and a stockholder in the Bank of Washington, N. C. Mr. CLEVE was greatly respected in this community, and was an honored citizen. He lived and died a bachelor. The funeral services will take place, this morning, Wednesday, at 11 o'clock, at Christ Church. The body was buried at Cedar Grove Cemetery.

We regret to learn of the death of Miss Lizzie, daughter of Mr. John O. POLLARD, of Beaver Dam township, last Friday night. Miss Lizzie was a most excellent young lady, and was universally admired and respected for her beauty of face and disposition. She was engaged to be married and had made all of her preparations, when she was stricken down with typhoid fever, which shortly ended her life. The bereaved family and friends have our sympathy.

#### James Oxley and others Drown

Eastern Reflector, Greenville, NC, Wed., May 23, 1883

James OXLEY, a young white man, about 18 years of age, and two negro women were drowned at Bell's Ferry last Saturday evening. Five persons were in a small boat and in attempting to cross Moccasin River the boat was capsized and Mr. OXLEY and the two women were drowned. The other persons whose names we did not learn, escaped.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in March 1834.—Opened by Brother COOPPER, Brother UTLEY, moderator. Brother EBORN told the church, at the request of the Union Meeting held at Grindle Creek Meeting House on Saturday at the 5th Sunday in Dec. 1833, in relation to sending delegates to meet in Convention at the Little Sister Church, Friday before the 5th Sunday in March 1834. To advise and consult together in relation to some plan of forming a more closer union of those churches agreeing in sentiment on the truths of the Gospel—agreed to send delegates. Elder William CLARK, Lewis SPEIR and Benj. F. EBORN named as delegates.

<u>Conference</u>, 2nd Sun. in March 1834— After preaching, door opened for candidates for baptism: Louisa FORBES was received on Thurs., March 20, appointed for her to be baptized at Greenville.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in April 1834 William CLARK, moderator. List of absentees noted.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in June 1834— William CLARK, moderator. A letter of dismission granted Nicy EDWARDS. Ordered the Brothers and Sisters that have received letters of dismission from this church and have not joined other churches, be requested to give up their letters and unite with us or give satisfaction to the church for not attaching themselves to some Baptist church. Those who do not commune with us of our church are requested in brotherly love to let the church know the cause that we may try to remove it.

<u>Conference</u>, 2nd Sat. in July 1834—William CLARK, moderator. Respecting those with letters of dismission, Urvin DUDLEY offered his reason for not joining some other church and was excused. Archabald DUDLEY case laid over.

Yearly Meeting, 2nd Sat. in August 1834—Jacob D. HARRINGTON, moderator. Archabald DUDLEY case laid over. Rebecca DUDLEY desired her name to be taken off the Church Roll, she is no longer a member of this church.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in Sept. 1834 no conference

Conference, 2nd Sat. in Oct. 1834—The case of Archabald DUDLEY was taken up and ordered his name to be taken off the Church Roll, he is no longer a member of this church. Brother Daniel HILL applied for letters of dismission for himself and wife Axe HILL to the church at William CLEMENTS schoolhouse—granted.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in Nov and Dec. 1834 no conference

Conference, 2nd Sat. in Jan., Feb., Mar. 1835 - no conference

Conference, 2nd Sat. in Apr. 1835 - William CLARK, moderator.

Quarterly Meeting, May 1835 – William CLARK, moderator. Letters of dismission granted Sarah MCKEEL. Elder William CLARK gave up the pastoral care of this church.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in June and July 1835 - no conference

Quarterly Meeting, 2nd Sat. in Aug. 1835—Brother UTLEY opened by singing and Elder HEARN, moderator. Letters of dismission granted Elder William CLARK and wife, Louisa P. CLARK and two servants, Sarah and Matilda, granted.

Quarterly Meeting, 2nd Sun. in Aug. 1835 - Brother Willie NOBLES preached first and then Elder HEARN and Elder William CLARK.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in Sept., Oct., Nov., and Dec. 1835- no conference

Quarterly Meeting, 2nd Sat. in Feb. 1836 – Elder Daniel LEGGETT, moderator. Door opened for new members: Eliza A. L. EBORN received. She was baptized in September last by Elder William CLARK in Greenville.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in Mar. 1836 - Elder Daniel LEGGETT, moderator. Absentees charged. All the Sisters gave excuses.

<u>Conference</u>, 2nd Sat. in Apr. 1836 – Elder Daniel LEGGETT, moderator. Ordered Lanier DANIEL and wife and Brother Howell WHITEHEAD and wife give reason for non-attendance.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in May 1836—Elder Daniel LEGGETT, moderator. Brother EBORN informed the church that he had seen Brother Howell WHITEHEAD who said he wanted his name off the Church Roll and his wife said she had been unwell and that is why she had not attended. She was excused for non-attendance. Ordered Brother Howell WHITEHEADS name be stricken from the Roll and he stands excommunicated from the privileges of the Church. The case of Lanier DANIEL and wife laid over.

<u>Conference</u>, 2nd Sat. in June 1836—Lewis SPEIR, moderator. Letters of dismission given Frances A. GORHAM. The case of Lanier DANIEL and wife laid over.

Conference, 2nd Sat. in July 1836- no conference

Yearly Meeting, 2nd Sat. in August 1836—Daniel LEGGETT, moderator. Nancy DANIEL Jr. wants her name taken off the Church Roll and she is excommunicated. Brother EBORN informed the Church that he had talked to Lanier DANIEL and his wife about non-attendance. Lanier DANIEL said they attended Flat SWAMP Meeting House, that he had been to hear Daniel LEGGETT over and for himself he did not believe in Daniel LEGGETT. Sister DANIEL said she was old and infirm and it wasn't convenient for her to go about. She said she thought the Church in which she was first baptized in was right for her. Sister DANIEL excused. Lanier DANIEL was excommunicated. Adjourned by prayer by Brother Jacob UTLEY.

Yearly Meeting, 2nd Sun. in August 1836 – Brother UTLEY and Brother LEGGETT preached. Letters of dismission given to Louisa FORBES and Equilla BENNETT.

# SUPREME COURT, BEDDARD VS. HART, 1860

The following are notes taken from NC Supreme Court Case #8319; Oliver Beddard admr. vs. Sindy Hart et all, Dec. 1860, not reported in NC Reports. Contributed by Roger Kammerer.



March 11, 1859—Oliver BEDDARD, admr. of Noah TYSON vs. Sindy HART, Abner SMITH and wife Holland, John SMITH, Micajah T. HART and wife Sophia and their children, Josiah COX and wife Ann, Henry S. CLARK and Charles GREENE.

Oliver Beddard states that Noah TYSON made his Will in 1837 and died shortly thereafter. His Will was proved in Pitt County Court. The executor named therein died soon after intestate and BEDDARD was appointed administrator de bonis. In January 1858 the Pitt County Court House burned along with Noah TYSON's Will.

Noah TYSON's Will gives slaves Lewis and Judy to his wife Sarah for life and then to daughters Sindy TURNAGE, Elizabeth STOCKS, Holland SMITH, Sophia TYSON and Sally Ann TYSON. The widow Sarah TYSON possessed the slaves until her death in 1857. After the death of her father, Sindy TURNAGE married Hewell HART, who died before 1857 and she survives him. Elizabeth STOCKS married Oliver BEDDARD and has children. Holland TYSON, wife of Abner SMITH, lives in South Carolina and has one child, John SMITH. Sophia TYSON married Micajah T. HART and moved to Texas and has several children whose names are unknown. Sally Ann TYSON married Josiah COX and has children.

The slaves Lewis and Judy remained in possession of the widow Sarah TYSON during her life and they had children: Ned, John, Fanny, Henry, Warren, Violette and one more name unknown. All were in possession of Oliver BEDDARD.

Oliver BEDDARD was ready to give the slaves to the persons entitled. Under the Will all claimed that their titles were absolute, but that was denied by the children of the daughters.

Henry S. CLARKE claimed share as assignee of estate of Sophia HART.

Charles GREENE claimed share as assignee of estate of Holland SMITH.

Oliver BEDDARD the administrator was doubtful how to act and prayed advise from the NC Supreme Court.

In Dec. 1860 Pitt County Court, BEDDARD was told to deliver the slaves and children to the daughters of Noah TYSON, as tenants in common. The administrator was to sell the wider part of the estate and divide the proceeds among the daughters. The administrator was to pay for all costs of proceedings. The Pitt County Court of Equity was to keep an account of the heirs and profits.

# COHABITATION RECORDS, 1866

# Part 6 (continued from previous issue)

In the March 1866 session of the North Carolina General Assembly, an Act was passed concerning negroes and persons of color. Justices of the Peace were to collect and record in the County Clerk's office, a record of the cohabitation of former slaves to ratify their state of marriage. The Court clerk was required to maintain a record book for this purpose and to receive 25 cents per entry for this service. In Section 6, Chapter 40 of the Act, it was a misdemeanor if negroes did not record their marriage by Sept. 1, 1866. This section of the Act was amended by Section 1, Chapter 70 (ratified March 1867), to extend the time of recording these marriages to Jan. 1, 1868. Contributed by Roger Kammerer.

Know all persons that I Sarah ELKS of the County of Pitt and State of North Carolina, being in a moderate state health and of sound mind and memory blessed by god for it, Knowing the uncertainty of human life and conscious of my advanced age that my departure draweth nigh doth make this my last will and that is to say first I bequeath my soul to God who gave it and my body to the dust from whence it came Secondly often all my just debts are paid doth give and bequeath to my son William ELKS one negro boy by the name of Amos, and one bay mare I give and bequeath unto my daughter Nancy SHIVERS one negro man by the name of Ned one negro woman by the Airy one negro woman by the name of Celi to her and her heirs forever

Item I give and bequeath unto my grandson William ELKS one feather bed and furniture Item I give and bequeath unto my grand daughter—Patsy Ann ELKS one feather bed

Item I give and bequeath unto my grand daughter Amy Caroline SHIVERS one featherbed and furniture Item I give and bequeath unto my grand daughter Sally BUCK one featherbed and furniture Item I give and bequeath unto my three grand children Sally BUCK Randolph BRIGHT and Gatlin BRIGHT two hundred dollars to be equally divided between them as for the part which shall descend to Gatlin Bright to remain in the hands of Benjamin SHIVERS in trust for him till he becomes twenty one years of age and if his Gatlin BRIGHT should die before he is twenty one years old and having no lawful heir of his body then his part of this money to be divided between Randolph BRIGHT or his Children & Sally BUCK or her children. #### Death of Mr. T. H. Fleming

Daily Reflector, Greenville, NC, Tues., July 9, 1907

Quinerly, N. C., July 8th 1807......There is a spirit of gloom recently cast over our community by the death of one of our best men. On Friday evening, July 15th, the spirit of Mr. T. Heber FLEMING took its flight after an illness of nearly four weeks. The death of Mr. FLEMING is especially sad as he and his little girl were both taken down about the same time with typhoid fever, and both have been nursed most of the same time in the same room, until Mr. FLEMING became so very low, then the little girl was removed to another room. It was seen for some time that it was a battle between death, and the nurse and we had all hoped the nurse would be victorious, but fate it seems had decreed otherwise and at exactly 9 o'clock his life passed out as gently as the falling leaves of autumn tide. Mr. FLEMING'S death removes from our midst one of our leading men in everything which goes to make for material progress. In the Sunday school, the church, and as a citizen of the community, he was always ready to assist and take part in any work that would in any way rebound to the good of the community. He came to our neighborhood about 15 years ago and soon after purchased the Spencer WOOTEN place where he has since built a nice home and was just entering upon that period of man's life when he need not devote all his time to the pursuits of worldly things, but may take a day when he will to enjoy with his friends or family. The deceased was about 40 years old and leaves a wife and four children. The little girl has not been considered dangerously sick at any time, and we hope for her speedy recovery. To his family we extend our deepest sympathy, their loss is irreparable.

Mr. EVANS, son of the late William Franklin and Annie SERMONS EVANS, was born in Greenville and reared in Goldsboro. He taught school in Pitt County for several years and passed the bar examination in 1908 and practiced law in Greenville for about ten years. He lived in Raleigh from 1917 to 1930, where he served as district solicitor. He then moved to Washington, D. C., and was employed by the U. S. Internal Revenue Department. In 1941 he was transfered to New York and had been attorney for the Bureau of Internal Revenue in New York. He was a former member of the Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church and was an Odd-fellow. He was married to the former Eva ALLEN of Greenville in March 1904. Surviving are his wife; two sons, Robert H. EVANS of New York and W. F.
