



Dear Fellow Workers in Christ:

Christmas Day is a holiday in 140 nations of the world and in all of the fifty states of the United States. Christmas is a Christian holiday that celebrates the birth of Jesus Christ. No one knows the exact date of Christ's birth, but most Christians observe Christmas on December 25th. During the christmas season they also exchange gifts and decorate their homes with holly mistletoe, and christes maesse, an early English phrase that means mass of Christ.

The story of Christmas comes chiefly from the Gospels of Saint Luke and Saint Matthew in the New Testament. In the late 300's Christianity became the official religion of the Roman Empire. By 1100, Christmas had become the most important religious festival in Europe and Saint Nicholas was a symbol of gift giving in many European countries. In the 1800's, Santa Claus replaced Saint Nicholas as the symbol of gift giving in many countries.

The popularity of Christmas grew until the Reformation, a religious movement of the 1500's. During the Reformation, many christians began to consider Christmas a pagan celebration.

The celebration of Christmas became increasingly important to many kinds of businesses during the 1900's. Today, companies manufacture christmas ornaments, lights and other decorations throughout the year.





REFLECTIONS

Symbols of Christmas

The Christmas season is a time when we celebrate the coming of the Christ child. There are many rich symbols of this blessed season, and taking the time to reflect on these symbols will be spiritually uplifting for us who know this King of Glory.

I recently attended a service at one of the local churches, entitled, "Hanging of the Greens", which was the beginning of the celebration of the coming of the Christ child - the advent of Christmas. The sanctuary was transformed with symbols of the

season and their meaning.

The Advent wreath and its colored candles are the visual focus of Advent. One of the candles is lighted each week as Christmas approaches. The circle of the Advent wreath has no beginning and no end. It portrays for us God's timelessness and His eternal plan. The evergreen color denotes eternal life. The shape of the wreath is round, reminding us of the fellowship of believers around the world who share with us the celebration of His coming. The white candle in the center of the wreath represents the light of Jesus' presence among us; the flame, His holiness and purity.

Many kinds of greenery are used to adorn the church building at Christmas time. The laurel and bay are symbols of victory and triumph; mistletoe symbolizes peace, but the prickly leaves and red berries of the holly help us remember the crown of thorns and the scarlet wounds of Christ. The fresh scent and color of the

evergreen garlands are compelling symbols of life.

The Chrismon tree is another symbol of Christmas. Chrismon is a combination of two words, Christ and monogram. The Chrismons (decorations) to be placed on the tree are symbols of Christ, dating back to the early church. The symbols were used by early Christians to identify themselves or designate meeting places. The Chrismons are composed of white and gold materials - white being symbolic of our Lord's purity and perfection; gold, the symbol of His majesty, glory, and triumph. The green Balsam tree is symbolic of promised healing.

The poinsettia is a vivid plant, full of meaning. A cluster of small yellow flowers spring forth from among crimson leaves. The star-shaped formation of the red leaves suggests the guiding star of Bethlehem. The crown of yellow flowers reminds us of Him who was born the infant King. The blood-red leaves foreshadow the cruel cross, and underneath, the carpet of green leaves- the

reflection of abundant life.

Of all the symbols of Christmas, the one that is most meaningful and most universal is light, pure and perfect light, (I John 1:5). This was the keynote of God's plan for men -- to give men light -- a Redeemer who would be the light of the world. And in the fullness of time, God made His announcement. High in the celestial sky, He hung a star. Light is a perfect metaphor for Christ, the son of God, and for His presence among us. The lights we put on our trees and in our windows are a symbol of His presence. Like the love of Christ, even the flame of the tiniest candle dispels the darkness. This is God's Christmas gift to us. Let the love of Christ shine through you this Christmas season as you take it into a sin-darkened world.







At Christmas time, we often think of presents. There are many things we sometimes want.



Some gifts are small, some are large. But, what is the best gift of all?




Do you think fancy toys or new clothes are the best gifts? No, these are nice but not the best.

Lemon Jello Cheesecake

- 1 3 ounce package of lemon jello
- 1 cup of boiling water
- 1 tablespoon of lemon juice dissolve together
- 1 8 ounce package of cream cheese
- 1 cup of sugar
- 1 teaspoon of vanilla cream until smooth

Mix jello mixture and sugar mixture well. Whip 1 can of Pet milk until stiff peaks form. Fold gently into jello mixture. Pour over vanilla wafer crust. Congeal in a 3 quart pyrex dish.

Angel Food Bavarian Cake

- large angel food cake or 2 small ones
 pint of milk
 tablespoons of flour
 cup of sugar
 pinch of salt
 eggs separated
 packs Knox gelatin
 coconut
 cup cold water
- 1 1/2 pints of whipping cream

Beat egg yolks, combine sugar & flour, add to eggs, heat milk and add slowly to eggs, sugar, and flour mixture. Place above top of double boiler and cook until it coats the spoon, add gelatin which has been dissolved in cold water, allow to cool. Fold into the above, 1 pint of whipped cream, and 4 stiffly beaten egg whites, break the angel food cake into pieces, place cake and custard into a large tube pan alternating layers. Sit cake in refrigerator over night, remove from pan, top with 1/2 pint whipped cream, sprinkle with coconut. * For pineapple omit water and dissolve gelatin in 1/2 cup of pineapple juice, add 1 large can of pineapple (crushed) drained to custard after custard has cooled.
