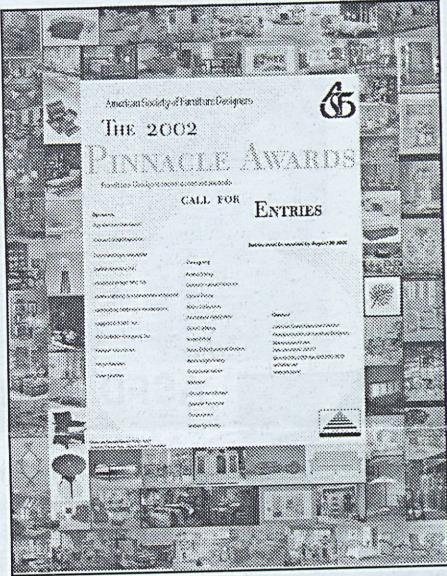
# 2002 ASFD Pinnacle Design Achievement Awards

New London, NC - Celebrating the first six years of the Awards, the 2002 Pinnacle Poster shows thumbnails of all of the ASFD Pinnacle winners from 1996 to 2001. The 2002 cd/press book to be distributed to approximately 1,000 newspapers and magazines following the October market will include institutional advertising by corporate sponsors.

The only difference in entry design categories is the elimination of the RTA category which is in response to the wishes of many designers and manufacturers. "RTA manufacturers feel that their designs have matured to allow them to compete against assembled fine furniture in each category," said Karl D. Felperin, ASFD 2002 Pinnacle Awards Chairman.

Pinnacle award judges include Ray Allegrezza, Editor-in-Chief of Furniture/Today; Richard Bennington, Professor of Business and Director of the Home Furnishings Program at High Point University; Larry Chilton, Corporate Buyer and Merchandise Manager for Wood-Armfield Company, Deborah Neely, Senior Editor of Home Lighting & Accessories; Ellen Gefen, President, Gefen Productions; Becky Boswell Smith, Editor-in-Chief of Casual Living, Home Accents Today, and Garden Decor; Jaclyn Hirschhaut, Vice President of Public Relations, AFMA; Max Shangle, Professor of Furniture Design at Kendall College of Art & Design; Julie Smith, Editor of FurnitureStyle; Mary Frye, President of the Home Furnishings International Association, Lee Buchanan, Editor-in - Chief of InFurniture; and Tony Wilkerson, Senior Vice President of Havertys Furniture.

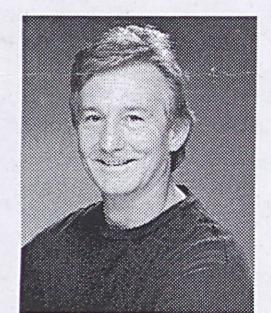

Their diverse but complimentary educational and experience backgrounds have enabled them to pursue a broad spectrum of furniture design disciplines - ranging from 18th century reproductions to leading edge contemporary designs, in a variety of categories and mediums.

His background in engineering and keen interest in art and aesthetics has enabled Rick to combine an "artistic design" approach with a working knowledge of manufacturing capabilities, materials, and technologies. This mode has resulted in many innovative and functional, yet practical and marketable designs.

# Tribute to O.B. Solie.....

as presented at the ASFD Market Dinner on April 19

In all begin in June of 1954 when O.B. Solie was asked to participate in a press conference at the American Furniture Mart in Chicago to discuss furniture trends. It was the first press conference panel that O.B. had ever been asked be on and unsure of his ability to communicate his ideas quickly, he arrived with sketches he had prepared ahead of time that conveyed his ideas. Those sketches were a a big hit and were immediately printed on the front page of the Life Styles section of the New York Herald Tribune.

Since then, for over 40 years, O.B. Solie has been entertaining colleagues and friends with his drawings that parody furniture trends. His work has been presented at numerous press

conferences, speaking engagements and trade show publications. Inspiration can be from a current movie, a trip to the zoo with his daughter or from a lighthearted discussion on politics and culture. He expresses his idea in an object of furniture that gives dual meaning to the drawing. Some drawings use

cultural icons such as a Rolex watch or a 520 BMW sedan. Other drawing are made by taking the letter of a word such as "faux" or "yuppies" and constructing an item of furniture from them. However, in every drawing you will see the relationship of humor to furniture.

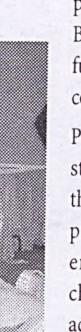
He describes his work as having as "design quality" instead of a "cartoon quality." He begins each drawing with a good design, a pleasing shape, and then renders it as if there were going to be a product sketch made from it. When he gets an ideas, he draws a quick sketch to get a good flow of lines and then goes back in and adds color and texture. Most of the drawings took less than ten minutes to create. Most of the drawings were made "just for the fun of it." But what is apparent in every drawing is the generous spirit and prolific imagination of the man who created them. Hope you have a chance to go by and see the exhibit at High Point's Furniture Discovery Center on display now through September 2002. Admission is free. Enjoy.

But no matter where we walked the HI Ob's! HI Ob's! were coming from everywhere. It looks like everybody knows OB in this industry.

Later on, OB and I collaborated on several design projects together. But he always stipulated - "Arto, you do the traditional designing and I do the contemporary". It worked out perfectly, as you know

his flair for contemporary is legendary. All you have to do is to look at OB's designs for Ello, year after year.

On the other hand most of OB's great designs, like the "Orangatub", "Designer Genes", "Octopussy 007", "Club Chair", "Almond Croissant Chair", "Sportsofa", "Hush Yuppie Lounger", "Yuppies Chaise", "Nashville Brass", and many other designs never made it to any market or production. But OB is a smart businessman, he simply recycled these designs as cartoons, so at least everybody can enjoy his unwanted, unmakeable fantastic designs, at least on paper, in newspapers and magazines. All these fabulous, one of a kind designs are now on display at the ASFD sponsored exhibit at the Furniture Discovery Center, just across the street. I hope all of you will go to see it.

There is a mystery about OB's name, what OB stands for. When anybody says JFK or LBJ you know right away that these are initials of the name of our former presidents. When it come to OB, you are dumbfounded.

I always wondered whether OB is an abbreviation for Old Boy, Over Board, Obese Boy, Oversized Bra, Opium Buyer, Off Broadway, Obscene Bohemian, Old Brigadier or such things like that.

So, at one time while OB was visiting us with his family in Greenwich I had a chance to find out. We had dinner at a local restaurant, and after OB had a few Old Brew I did ask him what OB stood for. "This is a secret and a long story Arto" and then proceeded with the explanation. It was a nice Viking tale and I was happy to hear it. - To tell you the truth, this happened such a long time ago that I forgot the details. Therefore I can't spill this big secret to you, and shall remain a secret.

Congratulations OB on your LifeTime achievements, for your design leadership and for your funny Funiture cartoons!

OB, If you get you knees together, may be we can play a few tennis sets again.
