
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Henry Janiec, Artistic Director

Henry Janiec came to the Brevard Music Center in 1964 as Artistic Director and principal conductor for the BMC Orchestra and the Opera Workshop, posts which he holds presently. For many years, he also served as principal administrative officer.

Janiec received his training at the Oberlin Conservatory and joined the faculty of Converse College's School of Music in 1952 to conduct the Spartanburg Symphony and the opera productions. He served as Dean of the School of Music from 1967 to 1994 and as a Vice President of the College for four years. He has been appointed Daniel Distinguished Professor of Music at Converse for 1994-95.





Prior to his coming to Brevard, Janiec was the principal opera conductor at the Chautauqua Institution for eight years and conducted at Tanglewood for

two years. He also served as music director of the Charlotte Opera for twelve years and the Charlotte Symphony for five years. He is active as a guest conductor, speaker, and writer.

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
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
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
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Tribute to a Musician

Hans Schmettau

Brevard lost a great friend and musician on January 20, 1994. Hans Schmettau passed away after having suffered a massive heart attack the previous month.

Concert audiences at BMC knew this man well - if not personally - certainly by sight. He was at the head of the BMC Orchestra cello section for some thirty one seasons, never missed a performance, and was the anchor of "his" part of the orchestra. He did the same thing in the Spartanburg Symphony since 1966, the year he joined the Converse College School of Music faculty.


To say that Hans was a fine cellist is an understatement. His standards of excellence, coupled with his good humor, made his demands as a teacher and performer a privilege rather than a

reprimand. Few players knew the symphonic and chamber music repertoire as well as he. A look of genuine concern clouded his face if someone mentioned a piece or a composer that he didn't recall. You could count on the fact that he knew all about it at the next rehearsal.

Most people use the word "musician" to identify someone who happens to work in music, either as a vocation or a serious avocation. But the word means a great deal more to a professional musician. "Musician" signifies a person who uses his technical skills as tools in searching for the heart and meaning of every piece he performs. Many can "play the notes." Far fewer can fathom the depths of this intangible and ephemeral art form.

And so we have lost a musician in the truest meaning of the word in Hans Schmettau. How fortunate we are that he came our way and shared his talent with us for so many years.





Federation Weekend at Brevard

The Brevard Music Center is most grateful to the National Federation of Music Clubs, and particularly those in the Southeastern Region, for invaluable encouragement and tangible support. State Federations, local chapters and individual members contribute generously to scholarship funds. NFMC special projects have included the Lucile Parrish Ward Chair in Opera, the Hinda Honigman Library and its Gladys Manuel Wing, the Whittington-Pfohl Curtain Fund, and many of the Center's practice cabins. Baritone Anthony Turner received the 1993 Young Artist Award for male voice in the National Federation of Music Clubs competition. An alumnus of Brevard, he will appear with the Transylvania Symphony in the Hinda Honigman Memorial Concert on July 9, the featured performance of Federation Weekend.

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In 1981 the Trustees of the Brevard Music Center established this scholarship endowment fund to more effectively memorialize or honor individuals who have had an interest or active participation in the Music Center. Many persons have chosen this fund to institute memorials to friends and family, or to honor those still living.

The earnings from the aggregate total of this endowment are used annually to award scholarship assistance to talented students. When an individual memorial or honorary endowment reaches a total principal of \$5,000 or more, or if the initial gift is \$5,000 or more, the fund will be designated as a separate endowment in perpetuity, identified and acknowledged accordingly.

Brevard Music Center is deeply grateful to the contributors who have established or perpetuated honorary or

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
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


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

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




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Life After Brevard

Orchestra League, in addition to being a Brevard Music Center Trustee.







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
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DON PASQUALE

Gaetano Donizetti First performance, Paris, 1843

Act I: In early 19th century Rome, an aged and wealthy bachelor (Don Pasquale) is of a mind to get married. His nephew and sole heir, Ernesto, is enamored of the lovely Norina, a young widow. The Don's old friend, Dr. Malatesta, says he has found the perfect bride... his sister!

The Don tells Ernesto of a marriage arrangement and Ernesto stalwartly refuses, declaring his love for Norina: a heated exchange follows.

Norina is reading aloud to herself when a letter from Ernesto arrives, relating his broken heart. Malatesta proposes a solution: he will wed Norina to Pasquale in a mock ceremony; then she will make life so miserable for the Don he will do anything to annul the "marriage."

Act II: Ernesto bemoans his fate when Pasquale enters to strut and brag. His shy, veiled "bride" is presented and the counterfeit contract is drawn up. Ernesto is called upon to witness the signing and the act ends with Norina playing the shrew and Pasquale slowly realizing his sad mistake.

Act III: Pasquale's ruination continues as Norina and the servants conspire to torment him. Malatesta suggests that he and the Don surprise Norina and her unnamed lover (Ernesto) in an assignation in the garden. He escapes just as the Don arrives. Schemes unravel as Malatesta announces that another bride will appear on the morrow: none other than the widow Norina. The disguised Norina explodes, calling for proof of the new marriage's legality. The confusion is finally halted as Malatesta reveals the plot. The old Don finally gives the two lovers his blessing.



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

The Gina Bachauer Artist Chair

The great Greek pianist Gina Bachauer appeared at Brevard many times, and always found time to spend with students. For the last fourteen years, the foremost pianists of our generation have appeared at the Music Center under the auspices of a memorial endowment fund established through the efforts and generosity of Mr and Mrs Carlo Renzulli. The fund has also enabled visiting pianists to continue in Gina Bachauer's tradition, conducting seminars and master classes in addition to their festival performances.

Gina's advice to students:

"The life of an artist is a beautiful life. but it is very strenuous life. I adore to play the piano and that is why I do it.

"And certainly with all that I said about perseverance, discipline, and very hard work - Music needs a little madness. If you aren't a little mad, you will never undertake this life!"

Sunday, July 31, Vladimir Feltsman makes his second appearance at Brevard as the Gina Bachauer Artist, performing with the BMC Orchestra.

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Giuseppi Verdi First Performance, Venice, 1853

Act I: The story upon which "La Traviata" is based is that of the book and play "Camille." The four acts of the opera present the principal incidents of the play and book. A party is in progress in the house of Violetta, a Parisian courtesan. Alfredo, a young man of a respectable Provencal family, who loves the woman, joins in the merry-making; his love is passionate and earnest, and is met by the love of Violetta, who at his solicitation agrees to abandon her dissolute life and live with him alone.

Act II: The pair are found housed in the suburbs of Paris. Alfredo leans that Violetta has sold her city property to maintain their country home, and goes to Paris to recover it; he returns to find his companion gone. In his absence **Germont**, Alfredo's father, had visited her and persuaded her, by appeals to her love and sympathy for his son, to abandon him. She returns to her old life in the city.

Act III: At a ball given by one of her associates, Alfredo finds her again, overwhelms her with reproaches, and ends a scene of excitement by denouncing her publicly and throwing his gambling gains at her feet. In the last act Violetta dies in the arms of her lover, who had learned of her sacrifice for his family and hurried to her side to find her in the last stages of consumption.

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

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Jacques Offenbach First Performance, New York, 1914

Prologue: In Master Luther's beer-cellar at Nuremberg, Councillor Lindorf, the first of four incarnations of evil in the imagination of the poet Hoffmann, intercepts and steals a note which the opera singer Stella has sent to Hoffmann to arrange a meeting with him. The poet and his friend Nicklausse arrive. The students in the beer-cellar ask the poet if he has ever been in love and he starts to recount his fantastic adventures.

Act I: In the workroom of the physicist, **Spalanzani**. Hoffmann has become his pupil in order to be near **Olympia**, whom he believes to be the scientist's daughter. In fact, she is a mechanical doll constructed by Spalanzani with the assistance of his strange collaborator, **Coppelius**. In vain the faithful Nicklausse tries to warn him; Hoffmann is in love and does not listen to reason. A sudden noise of breaking springs and machinery, and Coppelius, a reincarnation of Lindorf, enters with the shattered doll.

Act II: In Venice, a gallery on the Grand Canal. Hoffmann is now in love with the courtesan, Giuletta, who is under the influence of the demonic Dapertutto. In order to please him she has already captured the reflection of her lover Schlemil and is preparing to do the same to Hoffmann. In vain, Nicklausse tries once again to get the poet to come to his senses, but he is deaf to all reason. In a duel, Hoffmann kills Schlemil and obtains the key to Giulietta's room only to find out that Giulietta has gone away with another lover.

Act III: In Munich, in the house of the lutemaker Crespel. This time Hoffmann is in love with Antonia, Crespel's daughter. The girl is singing a lovely song when her father scolds her and reminds her that the strain of singing could kill her as it did her mother. The villainous Dr. Miracle arrives (the fourth incarnation of the evil genius of the poet). He conjures up the spirit of her mother to encourage Antonia to sing. She cannot resist his diabolic persuasion and sings until she dies exhausted.

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

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



Act I: Nanki-Poo, son of the Mikado of Japan, has fled the court to escape a prearranged marriage to Katisha. Disguised as a musician, he has fallen in love with Ko-Ko's Young ward, Yum-Yum. The act opens with Nanki-Poo hastening to the court of Ko-Ko in Titipu.

From Poo-Bah (a corrupt public official) and Pish-Tush (a nobleman) Nanki-Poo learns the Ko-Ko has become the Lord High Executioner and is going to marry Yum-Yum that very afternoon. Ko-Ko's plans are thwarted by the Mikado's letter ordering him to execute someone. The solution appears in the form of a suicidal Nanki-Poo, who is persuaded to undergo public execution in exchange for one month's marriage to Yum-Yum. Jilted Katisha shows up, demands Nanki-Poo, and is driven away, threatening to tell the Mikado everything.

Act II opens with marriage preparations, marred when Ko-Ko discovers the law stating that the widow of an executed man must be buried alive with him. Nanki-Poo decided to kill himself at once, then volunteers to be Ko-Ko's first victim. Ko-Ko, inexperienced in decapitation, has Pooh-Bah falsify an affidavit of execution, bidding Nanki-Poo and Yum-Yum to leave the country. This solution is complicated by the appearance of the Mikado in search of his lost son. Ko-Ko lustily decries the "execution," only to be declared guilty of "compassing the death of the Heir Apparent," whereupon he hastily produces the heir and his bride, much to the consternation of Katisha, Nanki-Poo's rightful fiancee. Ko-Ko, fearing for his head, offers his hand to Katisha. The opera ends happily for all, as Nanki-Poo accepts his role as the son of the Mikado.

New Opera, "The Mikado" or "The Town of Titipu," produced at the Savoy Theatre with every sign of real success. A most brilliant house. Tremendous reception. All went very well except Grossmith, whose nervousness nearly upset the piece. A treble encore for "Three Little Maids" and for "The Flowers that Bloom in the Spring." 


BARBARA HOWSE-MEADOWS is in her fourth year as BMC's choreographer.

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

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Composer-In-Residence


The Composer-in-Residence program at BMC was established in 1978, made possible through an endowment created by the international music fraternity, Mu Phi Epsilon. Since that time, the list of music writers who have spent summers at Brevard reads like a miniature catalog of America's leading composers: Elie Siegmeister, Ulysses Kay, Leo

Smit, Robert Ward, Wayne Barlow, Martin Mailman, Fisher Tull, Ron Nelson, David Ward-Steinman, Crawford Gates, Lee Holdridge, Dan Locklair, John Lennon, Robert Starer, and Francis McBeth. And most have had works premiered at Brevard.

The sixteenth composer to occupy the Mu Phi Epsilon endowed chair at the Music Center is **James Curnow**. He is a unique American composer, having worked and taught in all areas of instrumental music, from public school through the university level. As a conductor, clinician and composer, Curnow has traveled throughout the United States, Canada, Australia, and Europe, winning both critical acclaim and numerous composition awards.

Mr. Curnow has become one of the world's most prolific writers for brass and concert bands, averaging four major work commissions a year. One of his recent commissions was for the US Army Band (Washington DC). The US Army Brass Quintet visits Brevard on July 15 to perform Curnow's "Five Concord Diversions" with combined BMC bands.

The Music Center takes great pride in welcoming this exceptional artist and composer for the 1994 festival season.

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
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
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While BMC audiences are very knowledgeable, an occasional review of basics might aid enjoyment of concert fare. It always helps to know where the players are.

The seating diagram below is the Boston Symphony's standard arrangement, utilized by many major orchestras; but each conductor has his own preferences. For instance, Henry Janiec (The BMC Orchestra's leader since 1965) likes to have harpists on stage left (his right). His brass placement leans toward stage left, too, with low brass taking positions on the back row (BMC trombones and tubas refer to themselves as "back row brass"). Janiec says the piano, when used, can go just about anywhere, but he usually places it extreme stage right. The rest of the diagram approximates BMCO seating. But don't be surprised if things change during the season to provide optimum sound projection. The one arrangement that does not change is... violins on the left, cellos on the right!



Stage right - From the performer's perspective: his right (facing the audience) is the audience's left.

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


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
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
