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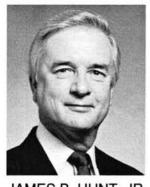
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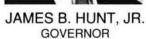

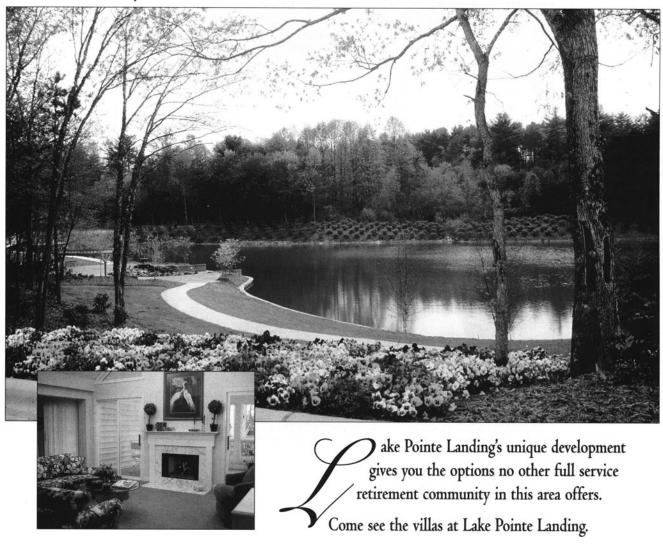

Janiec has occupied the Music Center podium since 1964. The August 11th finale of the 1996 season will mark the end of a distinguished era in the history of the Music Center.

Henry Janiec has been Brevard's Artistic Director since 1964. In addition to his administrative responsibilities, he served as principal conductor of the BMC Orchestra and Opera Workshop. Prior to 1964, he had served as principal opera conductor at the Chautauqua Institution and, for two years, conducted at Tanglewood.

A graduate of the Oberlin Conservatory, Janiec joined the faculty of the School of Music at Converse College in 1952 and, for forty-two years, conducted the Spartanburg Symphony Orchestra. He also served as musical director of the Charlotte Symphony and the Charlotte Opera for many years. Upon his retirement from Converse as Dean of the School of Music and Vice President of the College, he was appointed Daniel Distinguished Professor of Music from which he retired last year.

Several years ago, Janiec announced the Center's 60th anniversary would be his final year as Artistic Director. The August 11th finale of the 1996 season will mark the end of a distinguished era in the history of the Music Center.

Dr. Bartolo, a crusty old fellow, is guardian of the fascinating Rosina. Hoping to win her as his wife, he keeps strict watch over her. Count Almaviva has been entranced by her, but Rosina herself feels a strong inclination for a swain (who is really Almaviva) known to her as Lindoro. Enter Figaro, the town factotum, who tries to get the lover into Dr. Bartolo's house. Disguised as a drunken sailor, Almaviva manages to make himself known to Rosina and narrowly escapes arrest by revealing his identity to a group of soldiers.

Almaviva next impersonates a music master and gains entry to Dr. Bartolo's home, but then the real music teacher (Don Basilio) returns. Figaro convinces the musician that he is ill and must leave. Meanwhile, Bartolo, having obtained a marriage promise from Rosina, calls for the notary, who is persuaded by Figaro to draw up a marriage agreement between Count Almaviva and Rosina. Bartolo gives his blessing, finally realizing the old saying is true: "Love Laughs at Locksmiths!"

ACT I Sc. 1: The ruins of Ravenswood Castle. Lord Henry Aston desires his sister, Lucia, to marry Lord Arthur Bucklaw, hoping by the match to avoid financial ruin. The unhappy girl has refused and he learns she is in love with Edgar of Ravenswood, his most hated enemy. Sc. 2: The great hall of the castle. In a park near the castle, Lucia learns from Edgar that he must go to France on a diplomatic mission. He begs her to let him ask permission to be married, but she is afraid of her brother's consuming hatred. They part promising to remain true to each other. ACT II Sc. 1: Lammermoor Castle. Lord Henry hopes to force his sister to marry Lord Arthur. He shows Lucia a forged letter proving Edgar's infidelity and tells her that he himself has been implicated in a plot against the King, and only an alliance with Lord Arthur will save him. Lucia, believing the letter, agrees to marry Lord Arthur to save her brother. Sc. 2: The great hall of the castle. Just as Lucia signs the marriage contract, Edgar rushes in to stop the ceremony. Believing Lucia false, he curses her and departs. Lord Henry, infuriated, challenges him to a duel. ACT III. Sc. 1: The great hall of Lammermoor Castle. The wedding night celebrations are interrupted by the wild appearance of the bride... she has gone mad and killed her husband. Her ravings finished, she falls dead among the guests. Sc.2: The churchyard of Ravenswood Castle. In the churchyard Edgar awaits a duel with Henry. On learning that the castle bells toll for the dead

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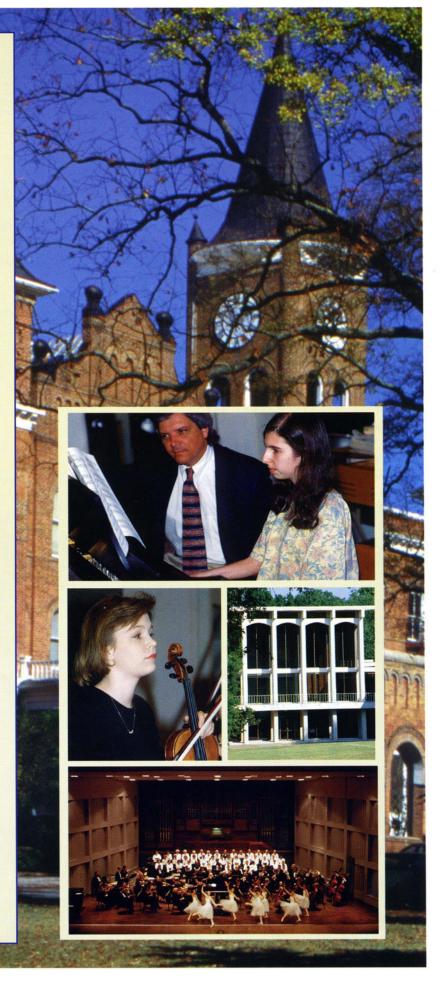
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IOCKING BACK

A reminiscence and farewell from retiring Artistic Director, Henry Janiec

Jeminiscence—A Joy in One's Later years and unknown territory for the young. Once again I was asked to reminisce for an anniversary issue of our Program Book and, this time around, my own retirement. Where to begin? The opening paragraph is always the hardest.

On the day I started to write, the morning mail brought my copy of our quarterly report to the trustees of BMC. As I read it, the memories really started to flow. Here we were, talking about new building projects, increasing enrollments, new educational programs, and so many other things we dreamed about several decades ago. And all of this on a solid financial base—a rare commodity in the arts these days.

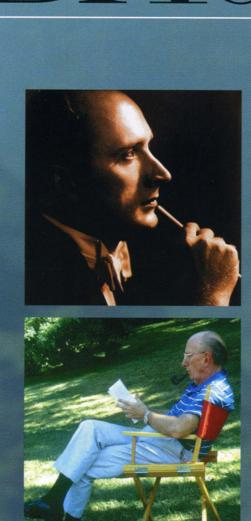
It's been a fantastic trip of thirty-plus years for this baton-waver. We've come from counting rubber bands and paper clips to planning VISION 2000 for the next century. Goodness knows, the center is not "rich" by any stretch of the imagination. We still count those paper clips! But as many of our trustees have said over the years, we really get "the bang for the buck"—and they weren't referring to the 1812 Overture.

But the "people factor" is always the richest source of reminiscence. The thousands of

teachers, trustees, staff, friends, and so many people in our audiences who found favor in what BMC does for the "Brevard kids" who make the glorious music. The youngster whose proudest possession is a beat-up school instrument hears someone play like a whiz and heads for a secluded spot in the woods to practice, practice!

The truly great international artists we've brought to the center! The list reads like a "Who's Who" of musical excellence—Ricci, Cliburn, Elman, Yo Yo Ma, Bachauer, Tucker,

Peerce, Albanese, Horne, and more recently, our beautiful friend "Flicka" von Stade and so many others. Pop artists like Doc Severinsen, Benny Goodman, Peter Nero, Tony Bennett, Andy Williams, and the incomparable Victor Borge. All great artists, and each of them captivated by the special quality of Brevard and our "kids."

The great Benny Goodman was not a man of many compliments, but he turned to me in the dressing room after rehearsal and said, "If I knew you had such a good band, I woulda played somethin' hard!" Can we forget Benny calling two young people out of the orchestra to improvise an encore with him? And Victor Borge signing autographs on programs, cello cases, and even napkins for an hour after an exhausting concert. Great artists. Great people!

Of course, the real bottom line in education is the effect you have on your students. The little guy from a small town in Pennsylvania who steps out on our stage, opens his mouth, and lets out his voice like a cannon. In a few years he's singing with Pavarotti at the Met. The young violinist who buys her first formal voice lesson at the BMC faculty auction and is later also singing with the Met. The solo oboist of the New York Philharmonic, the bass trombonist of the Chicago Symphony, the principal bassist in the Met orchestra...the list goes on and on.

And those alumni in non-musical careers—doctors, lawyers, bankers, administrators, and virtually every other profession you can name. Their letters in every week's mail tell us how their lives were affected by their summers at Brevard with an abiding love for music and respect for the discipline which comes from music studies.

Our trustees have been incredible people, sharing the triumphs and woes over the decades. Most of them were not musicians. Most professed no musical knowledge at all. But each was committed to what he or she saw in our work with young talents and they helped in countless ways.

I could recount tales about many of our trustees, too many for these pages. Two will have to do. Paul Thomas, an industrialist and long-time trustee and chairman of our board, spray-painting one of our decrepit old dorms. There he was, covered from head to foot with brown stain. The only things that were not brown were his great smile of satisfaction and his head when he took off his painter's cap. Curiously enough, Harley Owen, head of our maintenance crew, didn't have a speck of stain on him. He was using a brush on the other side of the dorm! I always wondered how Paul confronted his dear wife, Josephine, that evening when he returned from this adventure.

And there was Bill Hartman, a very successful advertising executive, who chaired our Buildings and Grounds Committee. The expansion of our old cafeteria necessitated the felling of a very large (and dead) oak tree. Everything went well except the stump. It just wouldn't budge. So, Bill went out and bought some dynamite, placed the charge himself, and blew it out of the ground. Miraculous that it didn't bring that old cafeteria down with it!

No one recognizes more than I that the past is prelude to the future, and the last three decades are just another chapter in the long history of this magical place. Great institutions don't just happen and then remain great. They must be made to happen year after year. And that will happen. Count on it!

And I'll be out front with all of you, cheering it on, rejoicing in its growth, probably grumbling about a few things, and continuing to be dazzled by the incredible feats that talented young people can achieve in a magical place like "our Brevard."

Happy anniversary to all of us, and I'll see you at the 100th!

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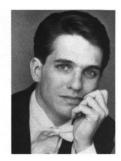

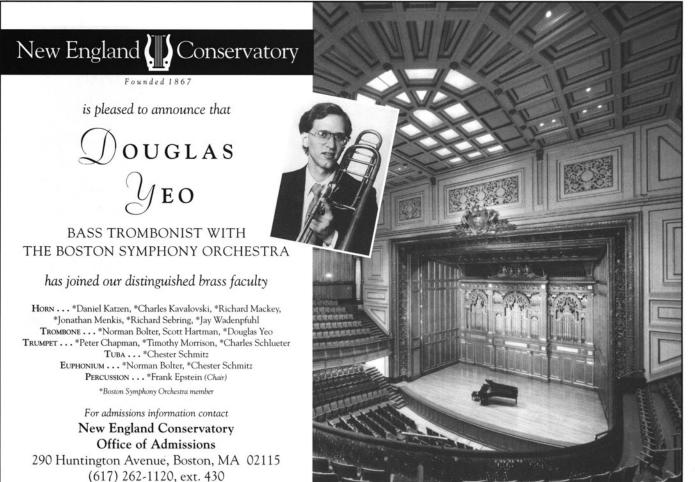

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Brevard's success lies in its consistent emphasis on educating talented young musicians. "You can't learn music out of a book—you have to live it." Spoken more than 40 years ago by Brevard Music Center's founder Dr. James Christian Pfohl, those words have etched an unwritten philosophy on one of the nation's oldest and most prestigious summer music institutions. Today, 60 years after its inception, BMC is known by students and teachers alike for unique music education.

For seven weeks each summer the picturesque Blue Ridge mountain town of Brevard (pop.5,376) thrives on a spirited deluge of musical artists, teachers, students of all ages, avid audiences and renowned performers from around the world. The Music Center, as well as the town, literally comes to life.

More than 350 carefully chosen musicians from thirteen years old through post-graduate come from all over the United States, descending on western North Carolina in anticipation of a rewarding summer of musical performance. A professional faculty and staff of 120 is drawn from the nation's leading universities, conservatories and symphonies.

On days when the Center's Whittington-Pfohl Auditorium isn't bulging at maximum capacity with Festival audiences, as it often does during the season, a lone trombone may be heard practicing amid chirping cicadas near Lake Milner. Students may be seen hiking, swimming or just enjoying the Center's beautiful mountain setting. Of course there are classes, private practice, rehearsals, lessons and a full program of music education activity, which always comes first.

Brevard Music Center's seeds were planted in 1936, when the Davidson College Music School-Camp for Boys' faculty of eight taught 50 campers. Since then, the Music Center has evolved into a premier music festival and a non-profit, state-chartered educational institution, with a year-round staff. According

In 1964 Janiec came to Brevard and reorganized the education program into three divisions, added an opera workshop and initiated innovative programming changes. The Festival became an integral part of Brevard's learning experience.

As BMC's Artistic Director, Henry Janiec also took on duties as principal conductor of the BMC Orchestra and the Opera Workshop. Over the years, he has attracted the "big names" in professional music to the Brevard stage. Names such as pianists Gina Bachauer, Alicia de Larrocha and Van Cliburn; clarinetist Benny Goodman, trumpeter Doc Severinsen, pop singers Andy Williams and John Denver, the Canadian Brass, soprano Hildegarde Behrens and mezzos Frederica von Stade and Marilyn Horne, cellist Yo-Yo Ma and violinist Ruggiero Ricci to name a few. Many of the guest

performers chose to stay extra time and conduct master classes for the students, a tradition that continues today. Unlike other reputed musical institutions that function either as a school or as a performance series, Brevard Music Center harmonizes both: professional instruction in a soothing, mountain atmosphere, along with a concurrent Music Festival. This renowned series of more than 50 different concert events, including musicals, pops concerts, concertos, operas, symphonies, bands, choral and chamber music, annually attracts thousands Each student at Brevard learns and grows, fed by personal instruction and performing with professionals. It is an intense and strenuous program, fit for those eager to learn and willing to stay late and work hard.

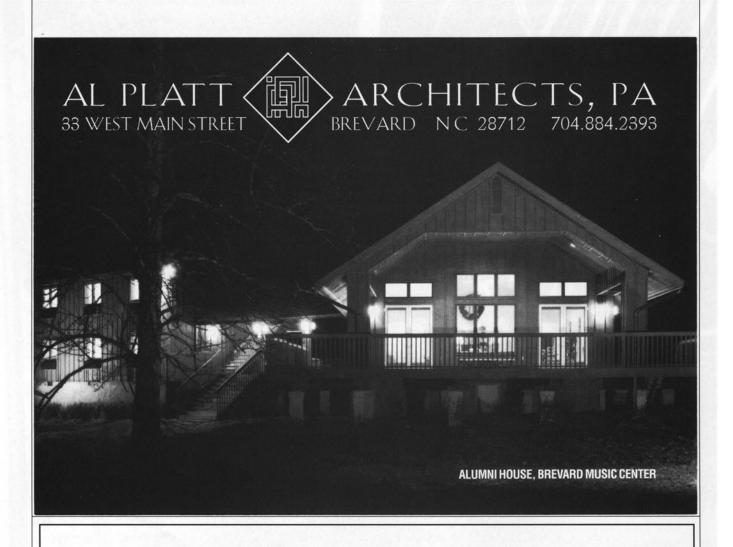
A rigorous academic and performance schedule, complemented by a summer camp atmosphere and recreational facilities for swimming, boating, and hiking, beautified by rolling skylines and refreshingly clean mountain air, all make the unique Brevard Music Center experience work.

But perhaps the clearest indicator of the program's success is the attitude and spirit which permeate the Center. Everyone is a participant—not just faculty and students, guest artists and audiences, but also the groundskeepers and auditorium technicians, the switchboard operators and ticket-takers. The Center is for everyone, and as Dr. Janiec says, "AVacation with a Purpose." That purpose, for seven magical weeks a year, is to live music.

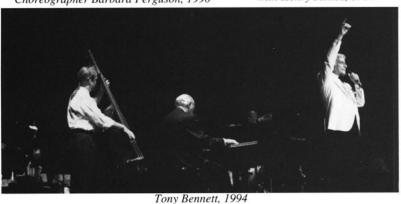

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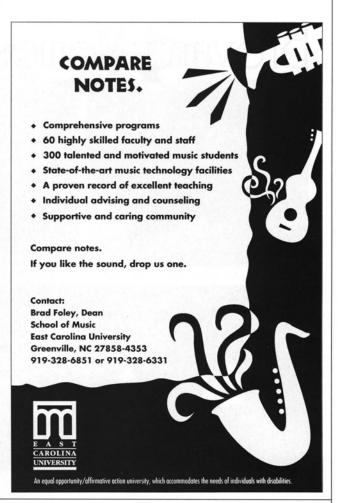
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Life After Brevard

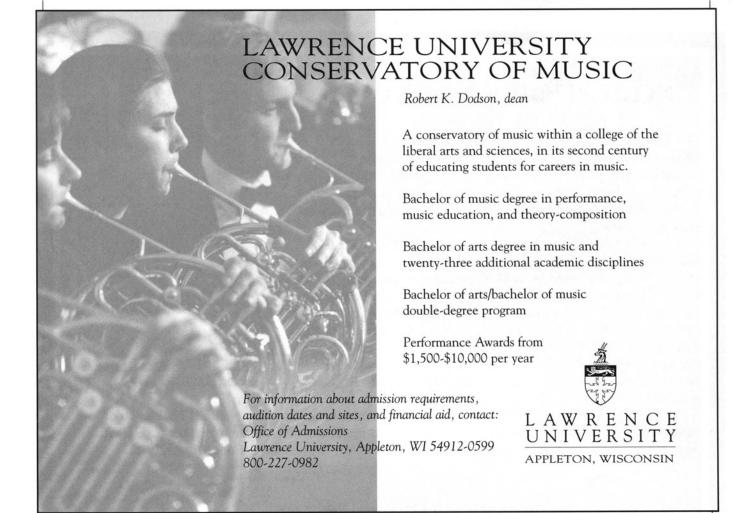

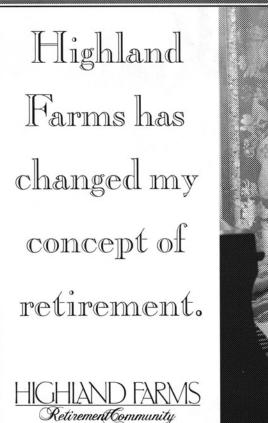

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OUR MISSION,

What is the Brevard Music Center today, and





Our program is designed to expose students to many shows and scores to expand their repertoire. To make this kind of experiential training available, we have an accomplished artist-faculty that works directly with the students in lessons, rehearsals, and performances.

You may be reading this before a public performance of the Brevard Music Festival, a schedule of over 50 concert events given at the Brevard Music Center every summer. If this is your first visit, you might be wondering, "What exactly is the Brevard Music Center?" The Music Center is an educational institution. just like a high school, college or conservatory, except that we only teach music during the summer months. The performance you see and hear at Brevard display an internationally respected educational program. Each program of our Festival features mostly students, and that comes as a distinct surprise to some people, mainly because of the high standards of performance at BMC. But, the performance itself is really a means to an end, not the end itself, and that is what sets us apart from other similar institutions.

Mission

As a publicly supported not-for-profit educational institution, we have a mission statement defining our purpose:

The Brevard Music Center is an artistic, educational, not-for-profit institution devoted primarily to the training in performance and theory of musicians with demonstrated talent under repertory conditions.

At the heart of our mission is the need to do something different for music students from the training they receive in their academic school environment. Once students learn a piece of music or an opera, it can be "relearned" in the future with a minimum of rehearsal. It becomes part of their repertoire. Brevard's program is designed to provide exposure to many shows and scores, and thus expand the student's resume and repertoire.

This is an all-important intermediate step that prepares them for the professional world. BMC provides an invaluable link between formal education and the music profession itself.

To make this kind of experiential training available for an annual enrollment of 350-plus students, we have an accomplished artist-faculty that works directly with the students in lessons, rehearsals, and performances. The performance becomes part of the learning process itself.

In addition to our resident faculty, the Brevard Music Festival brings in world-class artists, many who stay to give master classes for the students. For our advanced division students, performing alongside these professionals offers a "hands on" learning opportunity that is not available elsewhere. Our younger students also have numerous and varied performance opportunities. The low 6:1 student/teacher ratio provides a personalized, nurturing environment rare in today's educational world.

Critical to achieving our mission, although not as glamorous as the on-stage presence, is a devoted staff behind the scenes providing cafeteria services, doing the laundry, maintaining the grounds and buildings, and insuring health and other assistance for students and faculty. Just to provide housing, practice and teaching studios, performance facilities and other needs of our students and faculty, we have 134 buildings spread out over the 140 acres of campus. And the Music Center is one of the few organizations of our type that owns and operates our physical facilities.

Results

Beyond the public performances, how effective have our programs been in providing training for music students? Many Brevard students have gone on to careers in major symphonies and opera companies nationwide.

Chicago Orchestra bass trombonist Charlie Vernon, Met baritone Mark Oswald, and NY Philharmonic solo oboist Joseph Robinson are among them. And many others play in regional musical organizations and enjoy semi-professional careers. Many remain in the musical field but have gone into non-performance roles such as teaching, administration or media critics. Some have left the artistic world as a profession, but remain active as board members, volunteers, and as avid supporters and patrons of the arts.

In addition to our "product" - the students who have attended Brevard - the Music Center continues to be a significant economic factor in Western North Carolina and the Southeast region. In marketing surveys, the Center is frequently cited among the top 2 or 3 reasons why people come to this region of the country. The Brevard Music Festival plays an important part in attracting tourists and summer residents and influencing retirees to relocate in this area.

The Future

What does the future hold for Brevard? The music field is a difficult one. The level of music students has improved dramatically over the past twenty years and the competition for professional careers has become intense. Brevard's repertory and performance program continues to fill a unique need in preparing students to become professionals. The general disappearance of musical programs of any consequence in our public schools means that students must look elsewhere to receive quality instruction. And that is the future of Brevard.

Several years ago, our Board of Trustees began a process of reviewing our rich history and developing a long term strategic plan to take us well into the twenty-first century. Our VISION 2000 plan states that Brevard will continue providing the best in repertory training for serious young musicians. The major elements of VISION 2000 are:

- We will maintain and build our reputation as a premier and distinctive summer music educational institution;
- •We will recruit ever higher quality students;
- •We will build and develop our public audiences;
- We will rebuild our aging physical facilities;
- •We will focus on expanding our curriculum to keep pace with the changing musical world;
- We will build our endowment to insure that we can continue to offer the very best educational experience to our students.

More Than a Music Education

But beyond our special programs and our mission, we offer young people that unique "Brevard Experience". We are a community with a difference. The students meet and play alongside other talented young people. While they are of many different ages, backgrounds and perspectives, they are all focussed on performing music to the best of their abilities.

At Brevard these talented young people learn the value of self-discipline, perseverance and old-fashioned hard work – all in the pursuit of excellence. And they learn that a true musician has a passion for the music, reaching out to touch the audience. Most importantly, they learn the cooperative effort necessary to produce the ethereal magic of beautiful music.

Whether or not our students continue in musical careers, they will become active, involved citizens who support the cultural life of their communities. Look around you at the students on stage, in the audience, walking about the Brevard campus. Here, at the Brevard Music Center, you are seeing the cultural and community leaders of tomorrow.

By the standards of today's educational and artistic organizations, Brevard is a financially healthy, debt-free institution, with seventeen consecutive years without a deficit.

The continuing exemplary reputation of the Brevard Music Center is the most fitting tribute to the generations of students who have gone on to become outstanding professional musicians and community leaders and to the remarkable faculty who teach here. We will look to our friends to preserve and extend this proud tradition. Our supporters are aware that our true role is as an educational institution (see Our Mission, Our Vision on the previous two pages), although most people know the Music Center as a performance venue that hosts over 50 concert events each summer. Most of our costs and expenses (faculty and student residences, teaching studios, practice rooms, and other facilities of a residential campus) remain out of sight of the public that attends our weekend concerts.

Our Current Support

By the standards of today's educational and artistic organizations, Brevard is a financially healthy institution. The Music Center has had seventeen consecutive years without a deficit and is debt-free. A little over two-thirds of our annual budget is covered by our revenues (mostly tuition and ticket sales).

Each year we designate a special concert event as a benefit for BMC educational programs. This event is not part of our season ticket package and is sponsored by a group of organizations. The 1995 Benefit concert featuring Victor Borge was sponsored by the organizations shown on the right. Our 1996 Benefit concert on July 16th features Brevard alumnus Keith Lockhart, who is currently the conductor of the famous Boston Pops Orchestra.

The State of North Carolina, through the

Department of Cultural Resources and the North Carolina Arts Council, is a generous contributor to the Music Center. However, the vast majority of the remaining one-third of our budget is contributed by the many individuals, corporations, foundations and organizations listed on the following pages.

Another source of contributions and donated volunteer help is the Brevard Music Center Association (see page 83 for listing). This devoted group holds fund raisers, operates the Harmony House gift shop at the entrance to the auditorium, helps with maintenance and administrative projects at the Center, and generously makes their time, talent and experience available wherever needed at BMC. We are enormously grateful for all that they do for us.

Continuing Requirements

Challenging needs remain to be met. Our Board of Trustees developed a long range strategic growth plan,VISION 2000, which is designed to carry the Music Center well into the twenty-first century. The continuing requirements of scholarships, faculty support, facilities improvement, and endowment must be funded. Approximately 70% of our students receive some amount of scholarship aid. BMC will continue to seek scholarship funding to help talented, dedicated, deserving young people have the "Brevard Experience".

Our faculty consists of individuals who are that rare combination of talented teacher and performing artist. The fact that our students can perform alongside professionals on stage before a paying public is one aspect that makes Brevard unique among summer music institutions. We must continue to attract and

retain such teachers. In addition to our high quality full time faculty, the Center is beginning a program to bring in other exceptional teachers for a short period to lead master classes on specific techniques, particular music pieces, and other special needs. A highly popular program with our students, this will lead to increased salary expenses over future years.

The Brevard Music Center is one of the few organizations of our type who own and operate our physical facilities. There are 134 buildings to maintain spread out over our 140 acre campus. Many buildings have been donated and are identified with a person's name as an honor or memorial. New this year, the Mark Hunting Studio and the Dorothy Hill Studio were built as memorials. Mark was a member of our staff and Dot was a long term board member. One anonymous supporter donated a dormitory for boys and named it "Allegro", the musical tempo marking that matches the lively and happy feelings of these young people. Some of our aging facilities need replacement and as we continue to grow, the Center will need more dorms, practice and teaching studios, faculty residences, and rehearsal and performance venues.

Your Role in Brevard's Future

Reading through this program book, you will see what the Brevard Music Center strives for and what we have already achieved. We have grown enormously in role and stature and our core base of support is broader than ever. With VISION 2000, we are more focussed than ever before. We thank the individuals, corporations, foundations and other organizations that have supported us over the years. The Brevard Music Center would never

have reached the level we have without the help of so many people, like you.

Whether a donation comes from a corporation, a foundation, a music club, or a single person, an individual must agree with our vision, feel the need, and want to participate in our future. The opportunity is to be a part of a growing, healthy, high quality institution that fills a unique niche in making a difference in students lives. The best reason to get involved is the current and future body of young people who will benefit from our programs. They, in turn, will pass along those benefits to the many lives they will touch.

"Thank You" BMCA members and volunteers! 1996 has been a remarkable year for BMCA. In an effort to keep pace with the Music Center's *VISION 2000* strategic plan, we have instituted several operational changes. We hope these will become apparent as we near the year 2000.

One significant change is the establishment of a perpetual scholarship. Known as the Brevard Music Center Association Scholarship Fund, it will be funded in the amount of \$20,000 in each of the ensuing three years. 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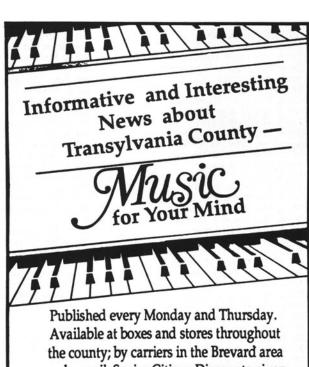


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Brevard Music Center Memorial Scholarship Endowment

In 1981 the Trustees of the Brevard Music Center established this scholarship endowment fund to more effectively memorialize or honor individuals who have had an interest or active participation in the Music Center. Many persons have chosen this fund to institute memorials to friends and family, or to honor those still living.

The earnings from the aggregate total of this endowment are used annually to award scholarship assistance to talented students. When an individual memorial or honorary endowment reaches a total principal of \$5,000 or more, or if the initial gift is \$5,000 or more, the fund will be designated as a separate endowment in perpetuity, identified and acknowledged accordingly.

Brevard Music Center is deeply grateful to the contributors who have established or perpetuated honorary or memorial funds during the past year.

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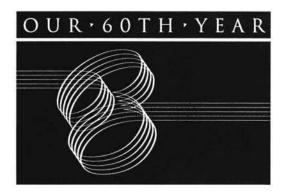
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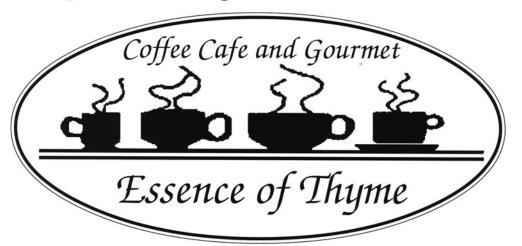
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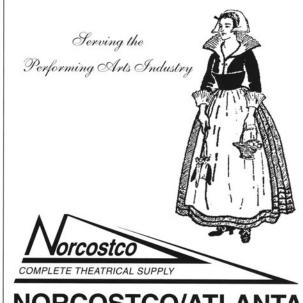
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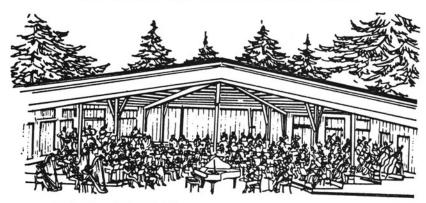
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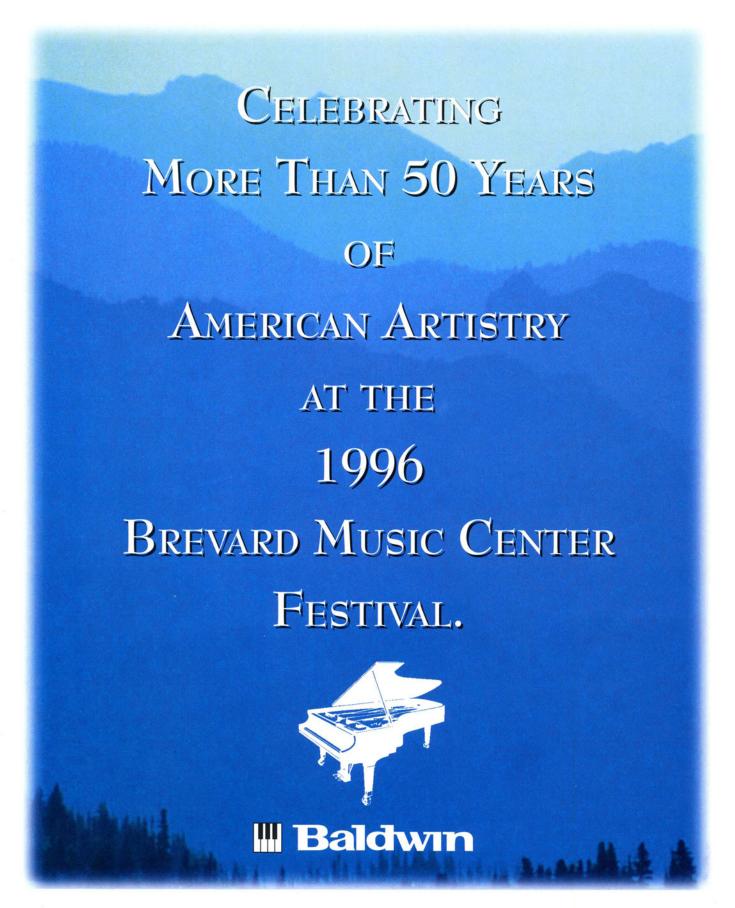
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
