



A Word to Our Audiences

This long-range plan was adopted during the skillful leadership of Doug Booth, chairman emeritus.

Doug joined the BMC team in 1971 and has been instrumental in the development of thoughtful policies and the adoption of *Vision 2000*. In addition to his significant contributions to the Music Center, Doug established a distinguished business career as president of Duke Power Company and upon retirement served as county commissioner in Mecklenberg County. All the while, he has remained highly active in his church, the arts, and education. Doug's wisdom and counsel continue to be of great benefit, and we acknowledge his many contributions to the Center with lasting gratitude.

Virtually all of the stated goals and objectives of *Vision* 2000 will be achieved by the turn of this century. For this tremendous achievement, I congratulate and thank members of the Board, the Music Center staff, and our Brevard Music Center Association volunteers for their collective energy, insight, and perseverance – without which this plan could not have been achieved. Since the adoption of this plan, we have renovated Whittington-Pfohl Auditorium, added the Burt Alumni House, constructed 17 new housing facilities and numerous teaching studios, and hired some of the country's best professional musicians to teach and perform at BMC.

In addition to these many improvements, we continue to take great pride in our exceptionally gifted students who "camp" with us each summer. They come from more than 40 states and numerous foreign countries and contribute vastly to the quality of life in our beautiful Blue Ridge Mountains. Just as these students come to BMC to challenge themselves musically, we, the governing body, will continue to challenge ourselves to provide the best possible musical experience for young musicians and you, our devoted audiences.

The trustees and staff warmly welcome all of you who visit with us this summer.

Distinguished Service Paul Thomas

The 1999 Distinguished Service Award will be given posthumously to Mr. Paul Thomas who was a member of the BMC Board of Trustees from 1960 until his death in 1972.

In the late 1950's-early 1960's, the Brevard Music Center was suffering through the financial difficulties that grip most arts institutions. Fully in support of BMC's educational and artistic mission, Thomas used his business background to approach the problem. As chairman of the BMC Board of Trustees, he insisted on establishing fiscal goals and responsibilities for BMC and, more importantly, held BMC accountable to its policies.

Paul Thomas facilitated an affiliation with Converse College and its School of Music in 1964.
Converse guaranteed a loan so that BMC could pay off its debts and continue operation. That affiliation proved to be the turning point. The Brevard Music Center began to rid itself of the deep financial burdens which had plagued it. 1964 was also the year that Henry Janiec assumed artistic direction at BMC, bringing with him several colleagues from Converse as faculty, staff and trustee additions.

Under the leadership of Thomas, the Brevard Music Center started on the road toward fiscal responsibility. In fact, BMC is now an anomaly among arts institutions; it is a fiscally sound organization, having maintained a balanced budget and incurring no debt for twenty consecutive years.

The Brevard Music Center and Thomas's family are honoring him with construction of Thomas Hall, a multi-purpose rehearsal facility to be

Mentoring Our Mission

JAMIE HAFNER, DIRECTOR OF EDUCATION

Mentor. I know what the word means. It is synonymous with teacher, guide, coach, counselor, trainer, instructor, tutor and guru. Mentoring is what we do with our students at the Brevard Music Center. It is our primary method of teaching. Over sixty years of mentoring has produced thousands of BMC alumni who are in the music business. It is the best way we have found to teach music as a practical art. At BMC mentoring means, "do as I do and you'll sound better"

rather than, "do it better, please."

Knowing our educational program leads me quite naturally to think back to my own education and those aspects of it which were strongest and most beneficial. I think the most rapid progress I made as a young tubist entering the professional world was during my study with Harvey Phillips, now one of the world's most respected advocates of our noble instrument. Harvey is articulate, intellectual and knowledgeable, and he could explain how things worked with remarkable clarity. The information he gave to me through verbal explanation was encyclopedic, and I faithfully took notes on all he said. Those notes are still useful today. But, as good as Harvey's information was, I sounded best when we played duets.



Jamie Hafner is BMC's Director of Education and Professor Emeritus of University Bands at The University of Toledo. Mr. Hafner was tubist with the resident brass quintet of the US Military Academy Band, West Point, NY, director of bands at Glyn Academy High School in Brunswick, GA, and tubist with the Savannah Symphony Orchestra. He was the recipient of The University of Toledo's Outstanding Teaching Award. He also conducts the BMC Wind Ensemble.

Duet playing with Harvey Phillips was one of the highlights of my education. When we played duets we usually sat facing each other. I could see how he took breath, how he held the instrument, how his embouchure changed from low register to high. I could see how he tuned the instrument as he played. I could see how his eyebrows bent (probably in pain) when our intervals weren't correct. I found that narrow major thirds and wide minor thirds kept his eyebrows in the "good" position. I could see and hear everything he did. I couldn't help but imitate his playing. He was teaching me intonation, tone quality, interpretation, rhythm and musicianship. Without having to say a word, he showed me how to play

the instrument.

All of us have had learning experiences of that quality, and we look back on those wonderful teachers as mentors. That happened to James Christian Pfohl, founder of the Brevard Music Center. When Pfohl was growing up in Winston-Salem he was a cornet player in the high school band. The US Marine Band, with John Philip Sousa on the podium, was engaged to play a concert in Winston-Salem. As part of the show, Sousa invited selected members of the high school band to

Performing — Our Passion

DAVID EFFRON, ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

There is nothing like the feeling of adrenaline before a concert or opera, the excitement as a particular musical phrase touches the soul, and the warm afterglow following a successful performance. This passion for performing sustains and nourishes the soul of a musician just as food and drink sustain and nourish the body.

It is this yearning to express oneself through music that we hope to share with students at the Brevard Music Center. Performing directly beside professional musicians, students witness and experience the rush which occurs just before a concert begins, appreciate the satisfaction of collaborating with their colleagues, and savor the pleasure of sharing music with the audience. Musicians must find joy in bringing to life the notes printed on the page and aspire to share that joy with an audience.

Hand in hand with the pleasures of performing are the practical aspects of a professional musician's life. Mere survival as a performer demands a passion to create and communicate through the art. As performers, we owe the audience a performance which is fresh and exciting but, with standard repertoire, still familiar. We also owe the composer a performance which is true to his or her original intent.



David Effron is BMC's Artistic Director and Principal Conductor. Mr. Effron is professor of instrumental conducting at Indiana University. Before assuming his position at Indiana, he was music director and conductor at the Eastman School of Music, on the conducting staff of the New York City Opera, and principal conductor of the Curtis Institute of Music.

At BMC we show the students how to be performing, working musicians. We ask our students to prepare concerts in the same amount of time as a professional does. They perform these concerts for an audience of people who pay admission, just as in the real world. In doing this, students learn what it's like to rehearse and perform when the schedule requires rather than when it is convenient. They do it week after week, learning new repertoire for each performance, and performing at the quality level a paying audience demands. Because they receive mentoring from a faculty of accomplished performers, BMC students learn what it takes to survive the rigors of professional performance.

It is a joy to be a part of an organization which shares the passion of performance with young musicians. It is heartening to know that some of our students will first experience this passion in the hills of Western North Carolina, guided by the BMC faculty and guest artists.

Once upon a time there was a young boy who attended the Brevard Music Center for two summers. He soaked up music, bonded with other musicians, rehearsed and performed, just as students do now. At the time he could not describe the feelings he had after the combined summers,







The Mikado

Victorian England, as implied in Gilbert & Sullivan's 1881 hit Patience, "longed for all one sees that's Japanese," due largely to the popular aesthetic movement that Patience satired so effectively. The newly imported trappings of that then exotic culture even caught the fancy of W.S. Gilbert who kept a large

Japanese sword hanging over the desk in his study. One day in 1884 it supposedly clattered down off the wall and the inspiration for The Mikado descended upon him. This, the sixth surviving full-length work of the team of Gilbert & Sullivan, was destined to become the most successful and often performed of the Savoy operettas and has been performed in more countries and languages than any other. At its premier, "Three little maids from school" was encored seven times, and the tradition of encoring the short comic numbers persists today.

There are many reasons for this deserved popularity. There is charm in seeing western institutions and such a variety of truly universal human foibles masquerading in such



fanciful Japanese guise. Even the names of the characters and town make us smile. Gilbert's well-crafted libretto contains more memorably clever rhymes and famous quotes in its two acts than any other. The score is one of Sullivan's most sparkling and though it tips its hat to oriental music (in the odd flash of a pentatonic scale or in the appearance of an authentic war song of the Japanese army to accompany the entrance of the Mikado in Act I), it also brims over with a parody of occidental grand opera so beloved by Sullivan. His musical wit is exemplified in the Mikado's Act I song, where he mentions "Bach interwoven with Spohr or Beethoven," he quotes the "Little" G minor fugue of the former in the orchestra!

SYNOPSIS

The comedy revolves around the Mikado's decree that all men who flirt be condemned to death. Nanki-Poo, the Mikado's son, disguises himself as a wandering minstrel to escape his intended fiancee, the bloodthirsty matron Katisha. He has his eye on the beautiful

young Yum-Yum, also loved by Ko-Ko, the Lord High Executioner. The cowardly Ko-Ko must perform an execution or be executed himself and persuades a suicidal Nanki-Poo that he will allow him to marry Yum-Yum if the prince will then agree to be executed in a month. As the happy couple prepare for a bittersweet honeymoon, the Mikado and Katisha arrive in Titipu. Ko-Ko discovers with horror that he has claimed to have executed the heir to the throne, and the only way to save his skin is to court Katisha himself. This successfully accomplished, all live happily ever after.

Join us for the dress rehearsal of The Mikado on July 8, or the performance on July 10.

Manon

Massenet had long cherished the idea of writing an opera based on the novel of the same title by Abbé Prevost, and when his reputation was secured, he had the opportunity at last. He writes in his memoirs of stopping by to see Henri Meilhac, the future librettist of Manon: "I can still see him writing on a small round table of the purest Louis

XIV style. He had hardly seen me when he smiled his good smile, as if pleased, in the belief that I brought news of our Phoebe (a libretto the director of the Opera-Comique was anxious for them to collaborate on.) 'Is it finished?' he asked. I retorted illico to this greeting, in a less assured tone: 'Yes, it is finished; we will never speak of it again.' A lion in his cage could not have been more abashed. My perplexity was extreme; I saw a void, nothingness, about me, when the title of a work struck me as a revelation. 'Manon!' I cried, pointing to one of Meilhac's books. 'Manon Lescaut, do you mean Manon Lescaut?' he said? 'No, Manon, Manon short, Manon, it is




Manon!' 'Come to lunch with me tomorrow at Vachette's, said Meilhac, 'and I will tell you what I have done...' It is easy to imagine whether in keeping this engagement I had more curiosity in my heart or appetite in my stomach. I went to Vachette's, and there to my inexpressible and delightful surprise, I found beneath my napkin - the first two acts of Manon."

Massenet began work composing the music during the summer of 1881, between frequent trips to Brussels and rehearsals for his opera Herodiade. At five o'clock he would meet with his librettist to talk over the arrangement of the words and scenes, apparently without any dis-

cord. Massenet had the habit of memorizing the librettos he was working on, in order to be able to scribble away at any time or place: "in the streets, in society, at dinner, at the theatre, anywhere that I might find time." Work continued throughout the summer of 1882, and did so under unusual circumstances. Massenet writes: "A Dutch gentleman, a

great lover of music, made me the most singular visit, as unexpected as it well could be. He had learned that I was working on the romance of the Abbé Prevost, and he offered to install my penates at the Hague, in the very room in which the Abbé had lived. I accepted the offer, and I went and shut myself up in the room which the author of Les Memories d'un homme de qualité had occupied. His bed, a great cradle, shaped like a gondola, was still there." The work was completed by the Spring of 1883 and opened in Paris in January 1884, with Marie Heilbronn as the first Manon. Unfortunately, the following year, after a successful run of eighty

In 1999, BMC provided almost \$480,000 in scholarships so that talented young musicians could have the BMC experience. Gifts of any size help make these students' dreams come true. For a minimum gift of \$300, you can be matched with a specific student, meet the student at the scholarship picnic and watch him or her perform throughout the summer.

A gift to the unrestricted fund helps cover the costs of operating the Brevard Music Center. The BMC's 1999 budget is more than \$2 million – this includes housing and feeding over 600 people during the season, maintaining over 138 buildings on 140 acres of land, providing faculty salaries and guest artists' fees, printing programs, and buying or renting instruments too large or expensive for students to bring with them.

In addition to annual scholarship and unrestricted funds, BMC must also raise money for capital projects. These projects include building new student dorms and faculty cabins as well as practice and teaching studios. join the Marine Band on stage in a combined piece. The kids knew in advance who was going to get to play and they had to have a quick rehearsal with the band before the concert. Young Pfohl sat next to Herbert L. Clarke, Sousa's principal cornetist, and soaked up new information about how to be a professional musician. This was in a different arena than the private studio or the school band and the learning experience was different. It was something that Pfohl never forgot. It was also that pivotal moment when he knew he wanted to choose music performance as a career.

The experience with the Marine Band was remembered by Pfohl and he adopted a similar teaching method when he founded BMC over 60 years ago. In this fledgling institution, faculty members would become mentors for students by playing with them in performing ensembles. Pfohl found that the students, sitting and working with professional musicians, learned the art of rehearsal, how to handle the instrument, how to prepare the music and how to respond to an audience. In short, he found that BMC students learned the art of music professionalism better than when they simply studied privately. The addition of music theory and traditional private study to the professional experience made an educational program that was unique among similar institutions.

When Henry Janiec came on board as Artistic Director he embraced the educational philosophy begun under James Christian Pfohl and he called it "coaching". Under the leadership of David Effron, coaching is still the major educational



tenet of the Brevard Music Center. As mentors we show the students stage etiquette, how to read, how to prepare, how to rehearse, how to follow a conductor, how to make rehearsal marks in the music, how to turn pages, how to practice, what to practice, how much to practice, when to practice, etc. Our methods are adjusted to the various ages of the students, but our educational goals are essentially the same for all students. In the purest sense, we show them how to be professional musicians.

While much of our teaching is done using traditional pedagogical methods in the private studio and in rehearsal, the unique part of our educational process comes from the close association between the faculty and students. We coach the students, give them master classes, rehearse and perform with students, dine with students, and spend the summer closer to students than in normal academic settings. We show the students how we negotiated our career paths so they can better judge how to negotiate their paths. They need guidance, advice, encouragement, examples, hankies for their tears and occasional reprimands. As mentors, we provide all of these in whatever amounts are required.

A student who sits next to a professional musician will learn a great deal of practical knowledge through osmosis. That's why you see BMC faculty or teaching assistants rehearsing and performing in student ensembles. It's why you see so many students in the BMC orchestra and why our faculty hold regular sectional rehearsals. It's why our singers rehearse and perform with professionals in the opera business. It's why we have over

performances, Marie Heilbronn died, and Massenet stopped any future performances "rather than to see it sung by another." Some time afterwards the Opera-Comique went up in flames. Manon was not performed again for ten years.

When the work was remounted in 1895, it was an American from California who made the biggest impression on Massenet and future generations of Manons - the singer Sybil Sanderson. Studying the score and deciding that the vocal advantages fell to the tenor, she made revisions in the soprano line that were ultimately incorporated into the published score. By lengthening appoggiaturas, adding coloratura passages and interpolating higher phrasings she made the character more seductive, and certainly better heard in the ensembles. She also pointed out that if Massenet added a dramatic section before "Adieu, notre petite table" in Act 2, it would be an intensely moving contrast. The composer obliged her with a highly emotional introduction, turning the former ariette into an important aria. An orchestra member at the time wrote: "We watched that opera change from day to day as we copied all of Massenet's alterations into our scores. There wasn't a page that gorgeous woman didn't leave her personality on... Sanderson used her lyric-coloratura voice to become a different woman in every act. With the exception of Heilbronn, I have heard every important Manon to date, and none of them could compare with her... She was Manon."

period of the play: "We don't know ourselves. You see, we selected one date, and then the costumer decided that another would give him more latitude in the designing of his costumes, so it is all a little indefinite, but it is sometime during the eighteenth century."

Naughty Marietta departed on its inevitable tour after 136 performances. The first season in 1911 was a triumph throughout, although Trentini as Marietta was becoming more and more a law unto herself and quite eccentric. It was not unusual for the theater managers to have to go to her hotel at 7:30 and drag her to the theater. She had to be teased and flattered and pampered in every conceivable way, including the payment of all her tips. Although she was earning \$1,000 a week, she was extremely parsimonious with her money. However, she could sing magnificently when she wished and plans were afoot to have Herbert compose another operetta for her. Then came a special gala performance in New York conducted by Herbert himself. Everything was ready for a stunning performance. Herbert had heard of Trentini's tantrums but paid them little heed, assuming it was the whims and fancies of a prima donna. The show went beautifully until Trentini came to "The Italian Street Song." She sang it gloriously and reaped tremendous applause, whereupon Herbert signaled for an encore. She merely returned to the stage and bowed a couple of times to the audience. Again Herbert signaled her to sing the encore and even started the orchestra. This time Trentini looked at him, deliberately ignored his motions, and walked off the stage.

Herbert laid down his baton and left the orchestra pit. Backstage he told his assistant to conduct the remainder of the performance, as he was through. The next day he told Hammerstein that he had never been so insulted in his whole life, would have nothing more to do with Trentini, and would definitely not compose music for her ever again.

The music world may have lost in another operetta written for Trentini, but the fame of Naughty Marietta has given it a solid place in American musical theater history. At MGM motion pictures Naughty Marietta was the first film in which Jeanette McDonald and Nelson Eddy teamed up together. The uniqueness of the music has been universally praised, and it has proven to be as popular with audiences now as when it was first written.



Artists-in Residence

One of the highlights of the Brevard Music Center's approach to education is the Artist-in-Residence program. Since BMC's inception, all three artistic directors have shared a common vision of bringing prominent guest artists to BMC to perform for audiences and also to mentor students in coaching sessions, master classes, and on occasion, private lessons. The guest artists augment the BMC faculty and broaden the educational experience for young musicians. These artists typically spend four days to two weeks in residence, mingling with the students, living on campus, eating in the BMC cafeteria, presenting informal talks, and performing with students.

the staff has nearly tripled, and the facilities are continually being upgraded. These ongoing improvements have led to the ever-increasing quality of the designs in every production.

Backstage at BMC, the growth process continues year-round. Each year, with input from the staff, we explore ways to improve our work and our facilities. Over the fall and winter, the list is revised and edited, in preparation for the upcoming season.

Likewise, each year the staff renews itself – some return, some move on, some are promoted. The 1999 season finds 11 members of the technical staff returning from 1998. Such a large group of returnees provides maturity, experience, and continuity for the new crew members.

The process of mounting a show requires an incredible amount of teamwork both within individual departments and across the entire spectrum of contributors. The hours immediately preceding performances are a beehive of activity behind the curtain. This flurry of activity brings with it a layer of choreography and interdependence of personnel that is a tribute to the multiple talents of the BMC staff. It is not uncommon to see a carpenter focusing a light or a costumer touching up some paint. There are no divas backstage; even the lead in that night's opera is not above lending a hand when asked.

It is an enormous challenge to work backstage at BMC and a remarkable achievement to create the beautiful worlds that surround the singers every night. There is no one here who works less than 60 hours per week, no one who offers less than 100%, and no one who can't offer you a smile and a handshake at the end of the day.



La Bohème

Many consider *La*Bohème to be Puccini's
finest score, which sparkles
with merriment, is eloquent of love, and at times
filled with despair. The
story of young artists
struggling in Paris has its
roots in Puccini's own
youth, for the opening
music comes from a theme
in the central section of
Capriccio sinfonico, composed when he was still a
student at the

Conservatory. Based on the novel Scenes de la Vie de Bohème by Henri Murger, the piece was ardently sought after by Puccini's rival composer Leoncavallo and in fact, set to music by Leoncavallo in May 1897. Puccini's rendition had already opened the year before at the Teatro Regio in Turin. The two Bohèmes were even performed at the same time in Milan, at the Teatro Lirico and the Dal Verme. The public interest was aroused by the comparison of the two, although the critics initially were warmer toward the Leoncavallo work. While history has shown some interest in the Leoncavallo Bohème, it is the work by Puccini that has won the hearts of audiences around the world.

The piece went through changes and rewrites by the librettists Giuseppe Giacosa and Luigi Illica.




Puccini was originally in favor of cutting Act III in the courtyard, for in the original version Mimi left Rodolfo for a Viscount. Illica, who proposed the solution to begin Act IV with a discussion between Marcello and Rodolfo of Mimi's new love, flatly refused Puccini's suggestion that they replace the scene with another chapter from the novel. Puccini also fought off attempts to change the Latin Quarter scene in Act II, stating it should be done "the way I described it... With Musetta's scene which I invented." Other changes were made, such as a drinking song and a diatribe against women, both allocated to the character Schaunard.

In their preface to the printed libretto, Giacosa and Illica claimed to have made their heroine a composite of Murger's Mimi and Francine. In fact, she is based almost entirely on Francine, a marginal character in the novel who appears with her lover in one chapter only, entitled "Francine's Muff." By basing Mimi on Francine a stronger musical contrast was made between Mimi and Musetta, something the Leoncavallo opera was never able to do. This also allowed Mimi to blossom slowly over the development of the piece, from the shy seamstress who

loves the flowers she sews in Act I to the soaring, passionate declaration of love for Rodolfo in Act IV.

With Bohème, Puccini was able to extend the scope of his compositional abilities beyond what he had done before. The writing is less symphonic and more concerned with describing the small moments of everyday life, a part of the aesthetic of verismo that was prevalent in those days. Yet, melodic invention is not lost, and the talent to convey a variety of emotional states was developed further, while the harmonic element is bolder and subtler. La Bohème has proven to be one of the favorite operas for all audiences, and its popularity shows no signs of diminishing.

A Masked Ball

THE UTLEY FOUNDATION

In 1857 Giuseppe Verdi was in search of a plot for his next opera. Always looking for elements of human struggle and drama, he chose a true story, the assassination of King Gustavus III of Sweden. The king's political enemies plotted and killed him in 1792 while he attended a masked ball. Gustavus received an anonymous note warning him of danger if he attended the ball. The gunman would not reveal his associates and therefore only he was put to death for the murder.

Eugene Scribe wrote the original libretto for the opera *Gustave III ou Le bal masque* presented in Paris by Daniel Auber in 1833. Verdi selected Antonio Somma, a well-known Venetian playwright, to translate the text to Italian and edit it for the composer's music.

Verdi was quite used to governmental censors. However, when the censoring committee in Naples returned his prose synopsis of the libretto, their demands were considerable. They wanted to change the hero from a King to an ordinary gentleman, place the time of occurrence a few centuries back, omit the ball all together, have the murder occur off



stage - and on and on. The authorities were chiefly concerned that killing a king on the stage might incite a similar response by someone in the public. Only recently a bomb had been thrown under the carriage of Napoleon III as he traveled the streets of Rome. Although Verdi had signed a contract with the Teatro San Carlos in Naples for a performance in January 1858, the changes were too much for him to bear. He canceled the opera all together. The theater brought legal action. Verdi and his lawyer counter-sued and ultimately the case was settled out of court.

Smarting from the experience, Verdi took his libretto to authorities in Rome wanting to stage the opera at the Teatro Apollo. Again he had to deal with censors but agreement was finally reached. The king became Riccardo, the 'Governor' of Boston at a time before the War of Independence in America. Because one of the characters in A Masked Ball is a fortune teller, there was logic in using the American location, near Salem, where the witch trials of 1692 had occurred.

The premiere in Rome on February 17, 1859 was a great success. After the show the crowds in the streets shouted, "Viva Verdi" a term with double meaning. They loved the composer. But V-e-r-d-i also was an acronym for a revolutionary battle cry, 'Vittorio Emanuele, Re D'Italia'. Vittorio Emanuele II was the titular leader of the Kingdom of Italy. The people yearned for independence from foreign rulers and domination.



Naughty Marietta

Victor Herbert had a varied and complex background. Born in Ireland, raised on Continental Europe and trained as a cellist, he moved to the United States when his wife accepted a contract to sing at the Metropolitan Opera. Soon he was conducting all over New York and composing works that took in the whole cli-

mate of musical culture then present.

Herbert's greatest achievement of 1910, and one of the greatest of his life, was that classic of American operetta Naughty Marietta. He would later write music of its equal, but he never wrote an entire score which so seized the minds and hearts of his countrymen and became so firmly entrenched in operetta literature. In May of 1910 a contract was drawn up between Herbert and Oscar Hammerstein, the opera impresario of New York at the time, to compose



the music for a comic opera called Marietta Be Bad!, and to deliver a completed piano score by the first of October. Just when the title, and presumably the concept, changed to Naughty Marietta is not known perhaps not until he was hard at work with the librettist, a Mrs. Rida Johnson Young. Hammerstein was proud of securing Herbert's services. He was also proud of having one of his star sopranos from the Manhattan Opera Company on

hand to create the title role. This was little Emma Trentini, whom he had discovered in a Milano cabaret after a long day of discouraging auditions. She was quite temperamental: a compact bundle of trouble, who did as much to hinder Naughty Marietta as to make it an incredible sensation. The conductor was Gaetano Merola, who was later

to head up the San Francisco Opera for many successful years.

The operetta opened in Syracuse, New York on October 24 after a discouraging dress rehearsal. It was an instant success, and went west for further try-outs to Rochester and Buffalo, and finally opened to great acclaim in New York on November 7. The music exceeded expectations, and the book was also lavishly praised. However, the librettist Mrs. Young replied when asked about the

Backstage at Brevard

JOE SAINT, PRODUCTION MANAGER AND LIGHTING DESIGNER

Three weeks before the 1999 summer season opening night, the Brevard Music Center backstage crew arrives and begins construction. Nine weeks later, they pack up and go home. In between – and with the help of singers and instrumentalists performing work scholarship hours – the 30 artists that constitute the BMC technical staff will design, build, paint, prop, costume, record and light every opera, operetta and concert you will see this season, more than 70 performances in all.

In the cold winter of February, when Brevard's summer warmth is still months away, the design process begins. Designers and directors exchange ideas which evolve into sketches and then into blueprints. After a few weeks of matching the dreams of the designs with the practicalities of time and money, the designs are ready to become reality. Librettos of most operas mandate very few specific requirements for the designs. The entire world which you see on stage must be conceived, researched, and shaped by the design team from their own analysis of the text and the score.



Every step along the way, from the initial idea to the final touches of makeup minutes before the curtain opens, must fit each production's concept. Every light cue, every paint technique, every stitch of clothing, must relate to the others to maintain the integrity of that vision in order to create a world for the audience to embrace.

Realizing these dreams requires the contributions of the entire technical staff. Within the program, you will find the names and titles of the 30 designers and technicians that make up that staff, a listing that only begins to describe the contributions they make to your enjoyment of the summer's performances.

For many on the technical staff, the Brevard Music Center may be their first or second foray out of academic theatre and into professional theatre. Therefore, BMC creates a professional environment to offer these young technicians an adjunct to their academic training. From "day one" each summer, the technical crew learns and practices professional techniques, etiquette, and chain of command. This emphasis engenders an atmosphere that allows maximum efficiency and a pleasant climate for all - singers, instrumentalists, and technicians.

Long-time BMC patrons will recognize that recent seasons have brought dramatic increases in the size and quality of the production values (i.e. sets, lights, costumes) for the operas and musicals. This change is a direct result of our goal to enhance the design and technical aspects of the opera program and to bring BMC's productions to a level competing with any regional opera program in the country. The size of

Charles Vernon

1999 DISTINGUISHED ALUMNUS

Trombonist Charles Vernon attended the Brevard Music



Center as a student in the 1960s. Immediately after completing his studies at Georgia State University, he won the audition for bass trombonist with the Baltimore Symphony; he returned that same year to join the BMC faculty. From 1972 until 1981, Mr. Vernon spent his summers teaching and performing at BMC. In the meantime, his professional credentials continued to mount as he accepted bass trombone positions with the San Francisco Symphony (1980-1981), the Philadelphia Orchestra (1981-1986), and the Chicago Symphony Orchestra (1986present). He has also served on the faculties of such prestigious institutions as the Curtis Institute, the Philadelphia College of Performing Arts, Temple University, and DePaul University.

Despite his demanding performing and teaching schedule, Mr. Vernon continues to carve out time to revisit BMC as a master teacher and performer, spending a week or more with students in master classes and coaching sessions. In recognition of his outstanding contributions to music education and achievements in the professional realm, the Brevard Music Center will present Charles Vernon with the Distinguished Alumnus Award during the Sunday, July 25 Superband Gala.

Life After Brevard

Since 1936 the Brevard Music Center has played host to thousands of young musicians. The "Brevard Experience" is unique, producing a deep appreciation and a passion for music. The intense rehearsal and performance schedule teaches students more than music; the lessons students learn about themselves during a summer at BMC last a lifetime. The self-discipline, perseverance and work ethic students develop at BMC prepares them to be leaders in their communities. Regardless of whether they continue performing, Brevard Music Center alumni are active arts supporters.

Following his debut with the Florida Symphony at age thirteen, Charles Rex won the Hinda Honigman Scholarship Award to the Brevard Music Center in 1964 where he played the first movement of Mendelssohn's Violin Concerto with the BMC Festival Orchestra. Rex remembers that "I had never encountered an orchestra of that caliber before in my young life and to have that backing me up as accom-

paniment was something that I will never forget. It was indeed most thrilling, but naturally I also recall being scared out of my mind!" His first

position after graduating cum laude from FSU with a bachelors and masters degree was with the Philadelphia Orchestra under Eugene Ormandy where he played for eight years. Rex then moved to his present position as Associate Concertmaster of the New York Philharmonic where he has been since 1980. He has also served as concertmaster of the Dallas, Reading and Delaware Symphonies and has been a guest concertmaster of the London Symphony under Sir Colin Davis. During the Philharmonic's 1993-1994 season, Rex and his brother Christopher (principal cellist of the Atlanta Symphony and also a BMC alum) premiered a new double concerto by Stephen Paulus, a New York Philharmonic 150th Anniversary Commission in conjunction with the Atlanta Symphony. The Rex brothers are also featured soloists on the recent compact disc Music for Doubles where they perform Saint-Saëns' The Muse and the Poet for violin, cello, and orchestra. Most recently Charles performed a Brahms concerto with the Tucson Symphony Orchestra. While there he spent time reminiscing about Brevard with fellow BMC alumnus James Stroud (viola, '64), who is now a lawyer in Tucson and listed in the Best Lawyers in America.

Scott Watkins ('86, piano) has just finished recording a compact

disc of late romantic lieder with baritone Steven White in New York's Town Hall, which is due out

this summer. Watkins is also working on a debut solo disc of music by Norman Dello Joio and is preparing a new edition of Tchaikovsky's piano sonatas for G. Henle. In addition to a busy recording career, Watkins has recently performed Rachmaninov's Rhapsody on a Theme of Paganini, Op. 43 in a pair of concerts with the Brevard (Florida) Symphony Orchestra (Christopher Confessore, conductor). April through June of this year Watkins was on a recital tour of the East Coast concluding with his New York recital debut at Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall on June 25th. Watkins has degrees in music from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music and the University of South Carolina and has studied with Eugene Istomin and Alexis Weissenberg. Last year, he accompanied Metropolitan Opera soprano Elizabeth Futral in her Chicago recital debut. Scott was a student of Marilyn Neeley's while at BMC and played Tchaikovsky's Piano Concerto No. 1 with the Transylvania Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Robert Gerle.


Mrs. Floride Smith Dean ("Miss Floride") grew up in Belton, SC, and graduated from Converse College before studying piano at Columbia and Juilliard. She devoted her life to teaching piano and nurturing the talents of young musicians. She continued to play and teach piano until she was in her late 80's. She was a long time supporter of BMC and was active in the South

Carolina and Georgia Federation of Music Clubs. A friend of Miss Floride said that she "got a thrill" from helping BMC students and used to carry students' letters thanking her for her scholarship support in her pocketbook.

Mrs. Martha Andrews was a resident of Spartanburg, SC, and a national skeet-shooting champion. When BMC presented its first production of *Annie Get Your Gun* in 1965, Henry Janiec borrowed some rifles from her and invited her to Brevard as a "consultant." BMC students, particularly the opera program students.

Even though they are no longer with us, these special ladies wanted to make sure that talented young musicians will continue to have the opportunity to study at BMC. The endowments, named after these generous women, will ensure that they have a lasting connection to the Brevard Music Center and to its students.


The Gina Bachauer Artist Chair





Brevard Music Center Memorial Scholarship Endowments

Scholarship funds for talented and needy students will be a constant requirement of the Brevard Music Center. Many people have chosen a scholarship endowment to institute memorials to friends and family, or to honor those still living. If the initial gift is \$10,000 or more, a separate endowment fund in perpetuity is established.

In 1981, the Trustees of the Brevard Music Center established the BMC Memorial Scholarship Endowment fund to more effectively memorialize or honor individuals who have had an interest or active participation in the Music Center. This fund recognizes that not all funds in memory or honor of someone will reach an endowment level, but that there should be public recognition. If an individual memorial or honorary fund reaches the endowment level, the fund will be designated as a separate endowment in perpetuity, identified and acknowledged accordingly.

The following are the individuals in whose honor or memory funds were donated to BMC during the period May 15, 1998 to May 14, 1999. In the spring of 1998, the Music Center started a "Seat for a Song" campaign to allow people to name a seat in memory or honor of someone. A list of those names is available at the Box Office during normal box office hours.


