The stars will shine at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, May 5, 2011, when the Arts, Sciences, and University Transfer department will recognize student accomplishments for the year. "We take great joy in celebrating the achievements of the students who have completed the AA or AS degree and those who have been accepted at some of the best universities in the country,' said Dr. Thomas Gould, dean of Arts, Sciences, and University Transfer. Durham Tech and Campbell University Sign Articulation Agreement

Campbell University and Durham Technical Community College have announced a new partnership that streamlines the process for Durham Tech associate degree graduates to

transfer to Campbell University bachelor degree programs.



Presidents Jerry Wallace of Campbell and Bill Ingram of Durham Tech signed the agreement at Durham Tech's main campus on Thursday, March 3, 2011. The new partnership, Campbell-Durham Tech Transfer Opportunity Program, or TOP, will expand educational opportunities for community college students. Campbell University is located in Buies Creek, North Carolina.

Components of the agreement include the following:

- If a Durham Tech student completes an Associate in Arts (AA) or Associate in Science (AS) degree program with a GPA of 2.0 or greater, Campbell will guarantee admission and seamless acceptance into the Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, or Bachelor of Business Administration degree programs. This is in accordance with the NC Comprehensive Articulation Agreement (CAA).
- Campbell will waive the application fee for Durham Tech graduates who meet the requirements for admission.
- Durham Tech students will be allowed to take courses at Campbell

- toward the completion of their associate's degree. (Students will be responsible for the tuition and fees for the Campbell courses.)
- Durham Tech graduates will be eligible to participate in the full range of academic programs and honors programs at Campbell.

Durham Tech Library Receives Nord Collection

Last month, Durham Tech's library was the beneficiary of a large donation of books and audiovisual materials from the library of Warren Nord, who died of Leukemia in June 2010. Nord was the founder of the Program for Humanities at UNC-Chapel Hill, out of which grew the Adventures in Ideas seminar series that many Durham Tech faculty have attended for professional development. After Nord's death, his widow, Nancy Ehle, contacted Irene Laube, Assistant Dean of Durham Tech's library, and expressed the couple's desire that Durham Tech have the books in Nord's personal library for our collection, especially for our Orange County Campus library.

Nord was an avid reader, thinker, and teacher who specialized in the philosophy of religion and education, but his interests reached far beyond that. The collection includes books on ethics, economics, political science, history, logic, world religions, theology, education, global cultures and civilizations, and art, as well as many classic works of fiction. The librarians are busy cataloguing the more than 1,100 hardbacks, paperbacks, and videos to make them available for use as soon as possible.

"It is a remarkably generous gift," said Laube, "one that will keep Warren Nord's spirit alive by continuing to nurture thoughts and conversations about the humanities among students, staff, and faculty."

Need A Schedule? Check Out the Open Class List

Before meeting with your assigned advisor, University Transfer students should always create a schedule of desired courses, using their Plan of Study and Pre-Major or Study Track. For summer semester advising, students can use the Open Class List, a unique tool to help develop a potential course schedule. Students connect to the Open Class List from the Virtual Transfer Center website.

The Open Class List allows University Transfer students to review courses offered in a particular semester. By hovering over course abbreviations on the computer screen, students quickly learn a course's full name, a course's credit hours, and a course's prerequisites and corequisites. The sections of the course offered for a particular semester are also provided. Hovering over a particular section number allows you to learn the course instructor's name (if known); the course dates; the course availability; and the day, time, and location of the course. This function enables you to select a course appropriate for your particular needs. Once a course is selected, the system automatically creates a course list at the bottom of the screen, developing a potential semester schedule. When all necessary courses are selected, you can print multiple copies of the course list.
