Durham Tech Students Should Know About Campbell Study-Tracks and Scholarships!

As a result of the articulation agreement signed by the presidents of Campbell University and Durham Technical Community College in March 2011, Durham Tech students now have at their fingertips a plethora of study-track options (see www.durhamtech.edu/asut/premai ors/campbell/campbellstudytracks. htm) for seamless transfer to Campbell. Many Durham Tech students have shown interest in Campbell's School of Pharmacy, whose pre-pharmacy program is regarded as one of the best in the nation. Campbell also offers a Bachelor of Science degree in Pharmaceutical Sciences and Clinical Research and a joint PharmD/MSCR (Master of Science in Clinical Research) degree. These degree options are attractive for Durham Tech students because of the proximity of jobs in Biotechnology and Pharmaceutical Sciences in the Research Triangle area. Campbell's School of Pharmacy is adding a Physician Assistant program in 2011, and the University plans to open a medical school in 2013.

For students interested in financial services and banking, Campbell offers premier undergraduate and graduate degree programs in Trust and Wealth Management.

Success Again: Durham Tech UT Program Makes the Grade on Annual Performance Report

Once again, Durham Tech received high marks in the North Carolina Community College System's annual Critical Success Factors Report to the NC General

Assembly and the state's citizens. The 2011 Critical Success Factors indicate how well the state's 58 community colleges met



statewide performance measures and served students, business and industry, and the community.

Specifically, "Performance of College Transfer Students" results affirm the strength of Durham Tech's Associate in Arts and Associate in Science programs. DTCC University Transfer students continued to perform well at University of North Carolina System institutions. In the 2011 report, **89 percent** of DTCC transfer students had a grade point average (GPA) higher than 2.0 after one year at a UNC System institution, exceeding the state standard of 83 percent, the community college system average of 87 percent, and the state standard for Exceptional Institutional Performance of 87 percent.

In other areas, student satisfaction with the quality of the college's programs and services was 97 percent. The college also received a 100 percent approval rating for customized training to area companies and agencies.

Delegation from Turkey Learns about University Transfer Programs, Partnerships

On Thursday, July 28, the Arts, Sciences, and University Transfer (ASUT) Department hosted nine visitors from Turkey who were invited through the US Department of State's International Visitors Leadership Program. Dr. Thomas Gould, dean of the ASUT Department; Tracy Mancini, assistant dean, Associate in Arts; and Lee Ann Spahr, assistant dean, Associate in Science, met with the Turkish visitors for a two-hour presentation on Durham Tech's transfer program; the Comprehensive Articulation Agreement (CAA); and university and corporate collaborations with the college, such as C-STEP, BRITE, and the Blue Cross Blue Shield Curriculum Education Partnership.

The visitors enjoyed Pepsi and Krispy Kreme doughnuts, authentic North Carolina refreshments, and were given UT program pens. They also visited Harvard and MIT in Boston and went to NC State University after their visit with Durham Tech.

After the visit, the representative from the International Affairs Council wrote: "They really enjoyed the meeting and got a lot of useful information. They were impressed how well you were prepared for the meeting."

In the past, the ASUT Department, in partnership with the Center for the Global Learner, has made similar presentations to international visitors, including groups from the China, Russia, and Ukraine.
