Get Ready to Register for Summer

It's time to see your academic advisor for Summer Term 2013! Registration priority days are reserved for returning students who are eligible students with an assigned academic advisor and have enrolled in classes during the past three semesters.

Students new to the college, newly admitted to a program, or visiting students are not eligible for priority registration.

Priority registration through WebAdvisor will be available as follows:

Starting Monday, April 8: upper level students with 35 or more credits;

Starting Wednesday, April 10: admitted program students with 17 or more credits;

Starting Friday, April 12: admitted students with 4 or more credits;

Starting Tuesday, April 16: admitted students with fewer than 4 credits.

Fall registration information will be posted in June.

HIS 131 Students Help Launch "This Week in Durham History"

by Dr. James DePalma As part of the Year of Service associated with

the school's fiftieth anniversary celebration, Durham Tech forged a partnership with the **Museum of Durham History** – an online repository of historical images and personal accounts that document the past 150 years of growth and

development in Durham, North Carolina. (Learn more about the Museum at http://museumofdurhamhistory.org/index.html.) The Museum subsequently approached me concerning a project called "This Week in Durham History." They desired to highlight events of local historical interest and asked for my students' assistance on the project. The request led to the introduction of a service project during the Spring and Summer Semesters 2012 for students enrolled in my

HIS 131 course. Each student was to identify, research, and write entries corresponding to events that occurred during his or her assigned calendar week. By the end of the summer, the students' enthusiasm and hard work had resulted in the creation of several dozen entries, chronicling various aspects of Durham's political, cultural, and economic history. The entries were then submitted to the Museum for historical verification and copy editing, in preparation for their weekly publication in *The Herald-Sun*. (Publication began on Sunday, February 24, 2013.)

Durham Tech's Erin Riney, Sally Parlier, and Patrick Hines provided valuable assistance on the project, as did ASUT student Parker Roberson, who assisted in researching photographs to accompany entries. The first feature appears on the right.

This Week in Durham History

(The article below is reprinted from the February 24, 2013, edition of The Durham Herald-Sun.)

On Feb. 26, 1989 [sic] – 124 years ago Tuesday – the first issue of the Durham Daily Sun appeared. Apparently no trace of that



first issue remains, but an issue from a month later gives some flavor of the front-page news of the time. For example:

Volume 6, Issue 7

"The meeting of the Y.M.C.A., last night was opened with prayer by the

President, J.H. Southgate....The Reading Circle met at the residence of Mr. W. E. Foster, on Main street, last night, and adjourned as a mark of respect to the memory of Col. Eugene Morehead, without attracting any business....Rev. J. L. White, the new pastor of the First Baptist Church, with his family, arrived in Durham yesterday evening and are now with Mr. John L. Markham."

The Durham Morning Herald began publication four years later, started by four former employees of the shrinking Durham Globe.

The Durham Morning Herald acquired The Durham Sun in 1929, and published the newspapers separately – the Herald in the mornings, the Sun in the afternoon — until merging into The Herald-Sun in 1991.
