The Society meets monthly (except December) at the Tucker House, 416 North Person Street. Meeting times are 7,30 P.M. when daylight savings time is in affect and 8:00 P.M. otherwise

- Formation of "Political Action Committee"

The society will also be cooperating with the City of Raleigh year-long Bicentenial Celebration

OAKWOOD COMMON UPDATE

Work continues toward the development and completion of the Oakwood Neighborhood Common. The current and final phase is being implemented. Most of the work for the final phase should be completed by April which is the deadline for spending the funds from Wake County Parks and Recreation grant.

The wood screening fence that is requires by the city landscape ordinance is in place. The landscaping, which is also required by the ordinance, and the play area base will be installed next. The pre-school equipment, benches and accessories must also be installed.

The final installation of the ornamental iron fence and entry will then be done, depending on funds available. The encroachment request for the placement of this fence has been approved by the City Council.



OAKWOOD COMMON UPDATE

The Oakwood Common is an ongoing project to establish a public greenspace within the Oakwood Historic District. The land was bought and paid for in December 1990 with a combination of neighborhood, city and county monies.

The Society deeded it to the City of Raleigh in 1991 and it is now part of the City's park system.. This neighborhood project was a recipient of a Wake County Parks and Recreation Commission matching funds grant and the design/development of this site is being done exclusively by neighborhood volunteers. Work on the site by any volunteer is reimbursed by the County grant at a laborer's rate.

On February 29th, the required landscape materials were planted by:

Brenda Brickhouse, in charge, with Bill Flournoy, Doug Wellman, Scott Fortenberry, Wade Brickhouse, Greg Kelly, Laura Kelly, Rod Taylor, Duane Lawrence, Sara Lawrence, John Clay. Helpers were: Phillip Zucchino, Paul Zucchino, and Andrew Zucchino.

Many, many thanks to this crew and Robert Logan of Logan's Trading Company (Logan's donated \$250.00 worth of shrubs required by the City's landscape odinance - most of which are behind the 6 foot-high screening fence).

On March 16th, to celebrate 100 years of forestry in America, a Wake County tree planting took place on the Common sponsored by the North Carolina Forestry Association, the Georgia Pacific Corporation, and the Carolina Power & Light Company. Thanks to Brenda Brickhouse, our Common received Wake County's symbolic tree, an oak, donated by Georgia Pacific. Brenda's efforts at the Common over the last few months have been very beneficial and greatly appreciated. The play equipment has been ordered and

should arrive in May. Anyone willing to help with its installation should let me know. The April deadline for spending the funds from the County grant has been extended to December. Remember, it is a matching funds grant.

INMAN PARK NEIGHBORHOOD IN ATLANTA

One and a half miles east of downtown Atlanta lies a charming, tough, and vibrant historic neighborhood: Inman Park. On a weekend in mid-April I visited there as a guest of the Inman Park Neighborhood Association and as ambassador of Historic Oakwood. Leaders of Inman Park convened a one-day conference to celebrate and showcase themselves, but more importantly, to take their pulse, to ask the question, "How are we doing as a neighborhood?"

The answer in short: "They're doing fine!"

Inman Park was developed in the I880's by Joel Hurt, on land that comprised his family farm. Fifteen years earlier the battle of Atlanta had swirled around the tract, commemorated today in the Cyclorama whose central vantage point is a specific spot on the Hurt farm. The premier suburb of post-war Atlanta had curving streets, large lots, and Springvale Park with Crystal Lake, designed by America's preeminent landscape designer Fredrick Law Olmsted. Home of the Candlers, the Woodruffs, and the Hurts, the neighborhood was served by the nation's first financially successful electric street trolly, the Atlanta and Edgewood Street Railway Co., which terminated at the now-renovated Trolly Barn.

The next part of the story is familiar: prominent families moved, houses eventually were subdivided into eight, ten apartments. By the early 1950's, the neighborhood's original glory was no more than a memory. A few years later, an urban pioneer arrived, who rescued and restored an old home, followed by others, and in 1970 Inman Park Restoration, Inc. was formed,

which assisted in restoring 40 homes the next year. Along with reclaiming homes, residents re-wove the fabric of a neighborhood and created a living community of people who cared about one another.

The struggles are not over. An empty corridor of land, originally acquired for a now-abandoned East-West Toll Road, bisects Inman Park, offering challenges and dangers of new development. An accessway through the neighborhood to the Carter Library has been temporarily halted. Big money is needed to finish restoring Springvale Park to a semblance of its former grand design. Maintaining the network of community organizations, services, and social life requires vigilance and time-consuming work from hundreds of caring Inman Park residents.

It was a privilege for me to attend Inman Park's conference, to share in discussing common joys and issues with people from Macon, Savannah, Philadelphia, San Francisco, and, of course, Atlanta, and I hope I can find ways to share information and contacts for the advantage of Oakwood. I certainly want to share with others the story of lovely Inman park. Just ask me!

One final agenda item posed by the Inman Park organizers has to do with the feasibility of an organization of Historic Neighborhoods sometime in the future, to more broadly share the benefits of such conferences. I will bring more information about this as it develops.


HAVEN HOUSE TO OPEN NEARBY

OLD FASHION CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS Jackie Lurwick

Living in a Historic District provides each of us the opportunity to preserve Christmas traditions and customs as well as the houses in which we live. So much hard work, time and money goes into preserving our homes it is a shame not to follow the same theme when it comes to decorating for the Holidays.

People from all over come to visit Oakwood at Christmastime to conjur up memories of holidays past and to remember a time when life was peaceful in its simplicity. There were no electric santas, plastic greenery or blinking/flashing lights; there was only what nature provided.

Two distinct types of "Old-Fashion" Christmas decorating that should surface in the neighborhood at Christmastime are Colonial and Victorian. Even though both are quite different in presentation, they depend heavily on live greenery such as cedar, magnolia, and holly to set the mood. Emphasis is on style, not expense, on simplicity not gaudy. Fruits such as apples, oranges and berries were used for color. At one time fruit on a house was the symbol of a good harvest and a prosperous year for the family who lived there. 
