

Samuel Emanuel Hemby lived a life committed to service to mankind and his deeds will live on in the social order where he lived, moved and had his being.

Born to the late Reverend Samuel Hemby, Jr. and the late Mrs. Mamie Foreman Hemby, the earthly journey of this servant of humanity, ended Sunday, October 29, 1989 at the Pitt County Memorial Hospital, Greenville, North Carolina.

The great men of this world are the ones who have served the greatest number of people. What the deceased has done for others remains and is immortal.

Early preparation was made for his life service at Eppes High School, Greenville, NC, Elizabeth City State University from which he received his B.S. and from North Carolina Central University, Durham, NC a Masters Degree. A thirst for knowledge led him to Boston University, and East Carolina University for further study. He became an instructor in the public schools of Pitt County. Here he molded the minds of the boys and girls, whose lives were made richer and happier because of his teaching concerns. Today, both students and parents gladly attest to this fact.

Like Timothy, he was taught the good life by his parents and at a very young age, he became a member of the Mt. Calvary FWB Church. Here he became a regular Sunday School attendant, Financial Secretary, Church clerk, Trustee and Deacon, Organizer of the Rosebud Usher Board, a founder of the Ruth Hill Gospel Chorus, keeper of records and church historian.

He was united in holy wedlock to the former Miss Reather Tucker and the radiant warmth of their home was shared with family and friends.

State and National affiliations include: NEA, NCAE, Eva J. Lewis Alumni Association of ECSU of Pitt County, The General Alumni Association of Elizabeth City State University, Pitt County Council on the Aging, NAACP, Pitt County Retired Teachers Association, and District 15 Retired Teachers Association of Eastern North Carolina. Fraternally he was: Past Worships Master of the Mt. Hermon Masonic Lodge #35, Roanoke Consistory #248, Anderson Lodge of Oddfellows #11972, Past secretary Masonic District #10, Worthy Patron of Ladies of Ladies Delight #10 OES PHA, member of Administrative Council District 6 OES PHA, and district Recorder of GUOOF of North Carolina.

The Obituary

Calvin Eugene Hemingway son of the late Samuel H. and Rosa Gore Hemingway, was born in Brunswick County, North Carolina on September 3, 1918, and departed this life on August 23, 1994.

Calvin received his education in the Columbus County Public Schools in North Carolina. He was a veteran of World War II, and was a career United States Merchant Marine for more than forty years.

In 1958, he received his Electrical Engineer's License from Coyne Electrical School, Chicago, Illinois. He also received his Second and Chief Engineer's License of steam vessels of any horsepower in the United States Merchant Marine School Seaman's Church Institute of New York, New York. He served as chief engineer for American Export Isbrandtsen Lines, Farrell Lines, United States Marine Lines and many others during his career with the United States Merchant Marines Calvin sailed in various job capacities and traveled to Africa, Central and South America, Australia, Europe, Asia and many Islands. He was a member of the Brotherhood of Marine Officers.

Calvin was a faithful member of the St. Joseph's A.M.E. Church where he was a member of the Berean Sunday School Class and served on the Steward Board.

After Calvin's retirement in 1981 he was engaged in various civic organizations and activities. Calvin was a dedicated volunteer for the American Red Cross for seven years. During this time he worked with disaster relief projects and helped transport patients to various places. For this dedicated work he received a Certificate of Appreciation from the American Red Cross. He also received the Valuable Service Award from the Durham Committee on the Affairs of Black People in 1990. He served as Chairperson of Precinct 34 in Durham County, N.C. and was a life member of the NAACP and the James E Shepard Sertoma Club. He joyously supported and participated in the Crop Walk, sponsored by the Church World Service and was a member of the Shepard Early Morning Walkers.

Calvin leaves to cherish his memories a wife, Catherine Boswell Hemingway; four sisters, Mrs. Emma Hemingway Smith of Leland, N.C., Mrs Hattie Hemingway Jefferson, Mrs. Theresa Hemingway Reese and Ms. Dorothy Hemingway of New York, New York; and one sister-in-law, Rev. Frances Springer and one brother-in-law, Bishop James E. Springer of Durham, N.C.; several nieces and nephews and a host of relatives and friends.

He loved life and enjoyed it to the fullest. He was cheerful and shared his talents and skills with many who called him or needed his help. He was devoted to his family and loved people.

James J. "Babe" Henderson, Sr. was born in Bristol, Tennessee to Sallie Ann and William T. Henderson, on January 22, 1908. He was the eldest of eight children born of this union. After attending Slater High School in Bristol and completing high school at Hampton Institute Academy, Hampton, Virginia, he received the Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration from Hampton Institute. After receiving his B. S. degree, he moved immediately to Durham, North Carolina in 1932, where he met and married Julia M. Hicks in 1937. Of this union, two children were born. Mr. Henderson remained a devoted father and husband for over 60 years. He died on February 23, 1998 after a lingering three year illness.

Mr. Henderson came to Durham in 1932 to accept employment with Bankers Fire Insurance Company as chief bookkeeper, field auditor and later Assistant Secretary. Although he left Bankers Fire in 1937 for a position with North Carolina Mutual Life Insurance Company to establish and systematize the North Carolina Mutual Life Insurance Real Estate Department, he continued to serve Bankers Fire as

Assistant Secretary and member of its Board of Directors.

Mr. Henderson remained a loyal and devoted employee of North Carolina Mutual Life Insurance Company from the time of his initial employment as Chief Clerk in the Real Estate Department in 1937, and later assignments including member of the Investment Committee, the Real Estate Committee, Manager of the Comptroller Department, Assistant Comptroller, Assistant Treasurer, and Treasurer until his

retirement in 1973 as Financial Vice-President of North Carolina Mutual Life Insurance Company.

As chief financial officer for North Carolina Mutual, then America's largest Black-owned business, Mr. Henderson utilized his financial acumen to provide leadership toward continued growth of the company. His financial talents were utilized as a member and later Chairman of the Board of Directors of Mutual Savings and Loan Association, as Trustee of Mechanics and farmers Bank, as a member of the Board of Directors of the Chain Investment Corporation, and as Founder and co-organizer, president, treasurer and member of the Board of Directors of the Durham Business and Professional Chain. Although his loyal and dedicated employment with North Carolina Mutual ended with his official retirement in 1973, he enjoyed continued involvement and service with North Carolina Mutual as a member of its Finance and Investment Committee and as consultant through the mid-1980s.

Mr. Henderson was a viable force in the Durham community. He considered service to his community to be of equal importance as excellence in his profession. He approached community service with the same intense enthusiasm and zeal as he approached all of his other

responsibilities.

Until his health began to decline, his affiliations were as an "active" member. When critical events were anticipated or were happening

in Durham, Mr. Henderson's advice was usually sought, and his involvement was always felt.

He served over 20 years on the Durham Housing Authority, of which 11 years were as Vice-Chairman, and then Chairman in 1971 until he retired in the late 1980s. He was honored in 1978 with the distinction of having a federally financed nine-story senior citizens public

housing complex, the J. J. Henderson Housing Center, bear his name. His many community service affiliations included the Durham Human Relations Commission, the Board of Directors of the March of Dimes and the Durham Chamber of Commerce.

His leadership and financial talents were utilized as a member and officer of boards of directors to advance the missions of numerous organizations and programs, including the John Avery Boys and Girls Club, the Daisy E. Scarborough Nursery School, the National Negro Business League and the State of North Carolina Business League. He was a member of the Board of Directors and Chairman of the Durham Committee on the Affairs of Black People. Mr. Henderson served on the Advisory Board of North Carolina Central University, and Durham Business College. As a consultant and member of the federal governmental inspection teams sponsored by the U.S. State Department Agency for International Development, he provided consultation and advice for development and training progrms in order to make

recommendations on ways developing nations can assume a greater role in the monetary economy of West Africa.

While serving his profession and his community, Mr. Henderson performed continuous service to his college, Hampton Institute (renamed Hampton University). Through the National Hampton Alumni Association, and also the Regional Hampton Alumni Association, he recieved the "Hamptonian of the Year" award. He was highly pleased to be selected as one of the few alumni to be an honored recipient of the Hampton "Centennial Medallion" for exceptional service on behalf of the university. The Centennial Award is presented to an alumnus/alumna who has provided exemplary and unparalleled service to Hampton University. In 1955, Mr. Henderson was elected to the Hampton Board of Trustees and served on the Board for over twenty-five years. He retired as Chairman Emeritus after serving fifteen years as Chairman of the Board of Trustees.

Mr. Henderson was a very spiritual man, one who espoused and lived the philosophy and precepts of positive thinking. His spirituality was most visibly evident through his membership and work for St. Joseph's A. M. E. Church. For over 20 years, he could be found on Sunday mornings singing in the Senior Choir. However, he did more for the church than sing. He was elected to the St. Joseph's Board of Trustees, and held various offices including secretary, treasurer, Chairman of the Finance Committee, and very shortly thereafter, Vice-Chairman

and then Chairman of the St. Joseph's Church Trustee Board, a position he held approximately 12 years.

Long after his retirement from formal employment and as he began to "really cut-back" on many positions of responsibility in civic organizations, he became aware of the threat of demolition of the original edifice of St. Joseph's Church (built in 1871) because of downtown plans for urban renewal. J. J. "Babe" Henderson became re-energized and directed his resources of influence, time, energy and persuasion towardthe preservation of the original structure, its approval as an historical landmark, and the establishment of the St. Joseph's Historical Foundation. The original church structure and more recent additions function as a Durham Community Cultural Arts Center.

As a member of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc., Mr. Henderson served untiringly, and held elected offices on the local, state and national levels. His impact streamlined and strengthened the fiscal health and management of his fraternity. He was a charter member of the Hampton Institute Chapter. For his continued achievements in the field of business, his long and devoted service to his community, and his fraternity, James J. "Babe" Henderson was awarded the highest honor of Kappa Alpha Fraternity, Inc..."The Laurel Wreath for

exceptional merit in commerce, in social welfare and in education, as well as to the Fraternity."

Mr. Henderson is survived by and will be dearly missed by his wife, Julia; his two devoted children, Dr. Ann Henderson Brockenborough of Upper Marlboro, MD and Mr. James J. "Biff" Henderson, Jr. of White Plains, NY; one son-in-law, Mr. Bland T. Brockenborough; one daughter-in-law, Mrs. Carolyn McIntosh Henderson; two grandchildren, Ms. Celeste K. Henderson and Mr. James J. Henderson, III; one brother and sister-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Henderson; one sister and brother-in-law, Mrs. Kathryn Henderson Valentine and Mr. John Valentine; six sisters-in-law, Mrs. Vivian Hendrson (Anna), Mrs. William T. Henderson (Thelma), Mrs. Forest Henderson (Ruth), Mrs. Wendell Smith (Wyonella Hicks) and Mrs. Clarence Hicks (Tessie); nineteen nieces and nephews, cousins and many, many friends and associates.

'Babe' Henderson, Durham civic leader, dies at 90

Businessman J.J. "Babe" Henderson, whose contributions to Durham's civic life encompassed economic development, housing, politics, education and recreation, died Monday at his Durham home. He was 90.

Like others of his generation who rose to prominence in the centerpiece of Durham's black business community, N.C. Mutual Life Insurance Co., Mr. Henderson moved easily between corporate and community responsibilities. He led the way for blacks at a time when public housing was segregated, becoming the Durham Housing Authority's first, and for years its only, black board member. When he was made the authority's chairman, many people thought the recog-

nition was long overdue and underscored it by naming the authority's apartment building on South Duke Street after him.

At a time when the Greater Durham Chamber of Commerce didn't admit black members, Mr. Henderson's response was characteristic, founding a counterpart to promote black-owned businesses. The Durham Business and Professional Chain continues to thrive.

"It was that kind of positive approach that he always took," said the Rev. Philip Cousin, pastor of St. Joseph AME Church, where Mr. Henderson served as an officer. The Rev. Cousin will officiate at Mr. Henderson's funeral at the church on Fayetteville Street on Sunday, with visitation at 1 p.m. and the service beginning at 2 p.m.

Mr. Henderson is survived by his wife, Julia. His son, Mr. James J. "Biff" Henderson Jr. of White Plains, N.Y., is "Late Show" host David Letterman's stage manager and occasional on-air straight man. He also is survived by a

daughter, Ms. Ann Henderson Brockenborough of Upper Marlborough, Md.; a brother, Mr. Arthur Henderson of Bristol, Tenn.; a sister, Ms. Katherine H. Valentine of Henderson; and two grandchildren.

Mr. Henderson served on many more civic boards and organizations, working for many years in the Durham Committee on the Affairs of Black People and eventually chairing the political action group. He sat on the boards of the John Avery Boys and Girls Club and the Scarborough Nursery School, both positions reflecting his abiding interest in opportunities for young people.

For at least 20 years he was chairman of the board of trustees of his alma mater, Hampton University in Virginia.

He served on several business corporate boards, most prominently Mutual Savings Bank, which he chaired.

Mr. Henderson chaired the board of trustees at St. Joseph and served on the church's finance committee. He also sang in the church choir for at least two decades. When in 1976 the church left its old home on Fayetteville

Street for a new building several blocks south, Mr. Henderson played a seminal role in forming the St. Joseph Historic Foundation to preserve the 1890s architectural landmark, building an annex to it as a home and venue for cultural programs of the Hayti Heritage Center.

Mr. Henderson was born in Bristol, Tenn., the eldest of eight children. After graduating from Hampton, where he gained the nickname "Babe," he came to Durham as a clerk and bookkeeper with Bankers Fire & Casualty Co. After five years, that company was bought by N.C. Mutual. Mr. Henderson, whose field was finance, worked in the new company's real estate section and rose through the ranks to positions as comptroller, treasurer, and, finally, vice president and chief fi-

nancial officer, from which he retired.

He remained active in civic affairs until about five years ago. A series of strokes impaired his mobility, but he remained alert to the end, the Rev. Cousin said. And he continued to work on behalf of his church. When the congregation paid off its mortgage on its new buildings, he was pleased, the pastor said.

"I always knew him to be a man of quiet determination, just a gentleman," the Rev. Cousin said. "He had a concern for people, and it ran the gamut from children to the elderly."

Many people remember being invited into the Hendersons' Pekoe Avenue home for dimes at Christmas and candy at Halloween.

Mr. F.V. "Pete" Allison Jr., who as chief executive of Mutual Savings Bank worked closely with Mr. Henderson, said he depended on Mr. Henderson for his financial knowledge and wisdom.

"He had the knowledge. He was well prepared, and he was connected to all phases of the community," Mr. Allison said. "He had a lot of energy. He liked to see things move and get things done."

J.J. 'BABE' HENDERSON

A civic giant

Few people have woven themselves into the fabric of an adopted hometown the way Bristol, Tenn., native J.J. "Babe" Henderson did when he arrived in Durham in the early 1930s.

Mr. Henderson, who left a most impressive legacy of community service and good works, died Monday at his Pekoe Street home. He was 90.

Mr. Henderson was a civic giant who fully understood his responsibilities to the community. And it wasn't long after he arrived in Durham in 1932 that Mr. Henderson began to build a distinguished record of community service.

It is not surprising that Mr. Henderson found Durham an attractive city in which to sink his roots shortly after he graduated from his beloved Hampton Institute (now Hampton University) to work for Bankers Fire & Casualty Co. After five years, that company was bought by N.C. Mutual Life Insurance Co. Mr. Henderson eventually rose to the position of chief financial officer at N.C. Mutual, from which he retired.

Durham was the perfect town for Mr. Henderson to put his newly acquired financial talents to work. At the time, Durham was fast building its reputation as the Black Wall Street of America.

Mr. Henderson also founded the Durham Business and Professional Chain, the black counterpart to the Greater Durham Chamber of Commerce, which did not admit black members at the time. It was truly their loss.

The people who knew Mr. Henderson say his founding of the Business Chain was a typical response to the obstacles that Jim Crow placed before him.

"It was that kind of positive approach that he always took," said the Rev. Philip Cousin, pastor of St. Joseph AME Church, where Mr. Henderson served as an officer.

But even so, Mr. Henderson understood that social change requires political activism. He worked for many years in the Durham Committee on the Affairs of Black People and eventually became chairman of its influential political action committee.

There was, however, much more depth to Mr. Henderson than the bottom line of an insurance company's financial report or the politics of race. And nowhere is that more evident than in his longtime support of the John Avery Boys and Girls Club and the Scarborough Nursery School.

Mr. Henderson also was the first black person to serve on the Durham Housing Authority Board, of which he eventually became chairman. A public housing apartment building on South Duke Street is named in his honor as a testament to his commitment to improving the living conditions of poor people.

J.J. "Babe" Henderson was a civic giant of the first order, and Durham is a much better place because he chose to sink roots here.
