Judge Susie Sharp of Reidsville was guest of honor at the ladies' night event.

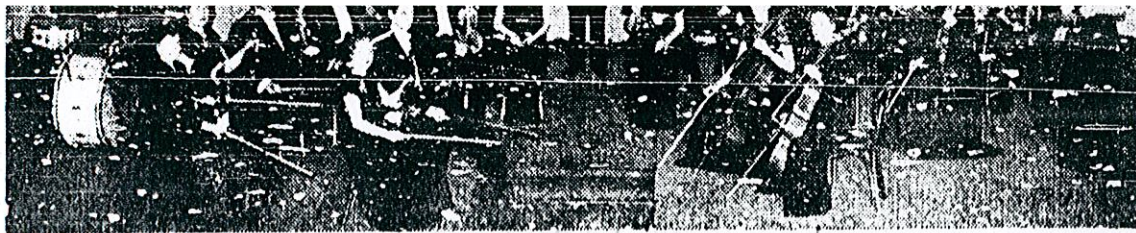
The group enjoyed a steak and chicken dinner.

**County Commissioners Approve Proposal; Issuing Courthouse Bonds**

**OKAY ROAD PETITIONS**

Randolph county commissioners voted last week to appropriate \$1,155 in the 1950-51 county budget to support the work of a negro home demonstration agent whose work would be supplementary to the work of the white home demonstration agent and assistant.

The amount to be allotted by the county is to be supplemented by state and federal funds, it is understood.

S. G. Richardson, chairman of the Randolph county commissioners, stated the board approved the sum on the basis of one-half year's salary and expenses, since it is expected negro home agent will not be employed before January or February.

The county board ordered the issuance of \$22,400 of courthouse addition bonds. The bonds are to be issued, Chairman Richardson explained, under a provision that a county can issue in any fiscal year a specified percentage of the amount of bonds paid off during the previous fiscal year.

The commissioners set May 15 at 10 a. m. as the date of their next meeting.

The board approved two petitions for road improvements, one requesting tar and gravel surfacing on a road leading from highway 64 to the end of the pavement on the Franklinville-Pleasant Ridge road, and the other requesting widening and stabilizing a road from the Liver road west of Seagrove via Maple Springs church to the W. E. Garner place, known as the Maple Springs road.

**REQUIREMENTS FOR REGISTRATION ARE LISTED BY BULLA**

**Saturday, May 13, Is Last Date For Registering For Primary**

**ASHEBORO REGISTRARS**

Requirements for registration for the primary election to be held May 27 have been announced by T. F. Bulla, chairman of the Randolph county board of elections.

Registration will end Saturday, May 13, and voters desiring to cast ballots in the primary must see that their names are on registration books in their precincts by that date, Mr. Bulla stated.

To register, he explained, a voter must: (1) be a resident of North Carolina for one year, (2) be a resident of the county for four months, (3) be a resident of the precinct four months, and (4) declare your party affiliation.

Persons unable to go to the precinct voting place to register next Saturday, the chairman said, can register by applying to the precinct registrar at his home any day of the week except Sunday, before May 13.

**Officers Of County Executive Committee Are Elected Unanimously**

**CONVENTION SATURDAY**

Hal Hammer Walker of Asheboro, state senator representing the 12th district, was reelected chairman of the Randolph county Democratic executive committee at the Democratic county convention held Saturday afternoon at the courthouse in Asheboro.

The county chairman had previously announced he was not a candidate for reelection, but he accepted the post after being elected unanimously by the convention.

All executive committee officers were unanimously elected in the convention when the report of nominations was presented by John Taylor, temporary chairman.

Officers elected included E. C. Routh of Franklinville and Mrs. Lillian Price of Henderson, vice chairman; Thad T. Moser, secretary; and R. L. Bunch, treasurer.

A proposal to create a new precinct in North Asheboro to lighten the registration in some precincts here was discussed and was held for future consideration.

Chairman Walker recognized several Democratic candidates. Among them were Tom Pressnell, candidate for reelection as clerk of court; Max Cramford for representative to legislature; B. F. Morgan, candidate for reelection as sheriff, and L. Q. Yow, candidate for election as sheriff; Dewey English, George Lamar and G. W. Pugh, candidates for county commissioner; and Jim Tatum, for constable.

**BISHOP TO PREACH AT FIRST CHURCH DURING NEXT WEEK**

**Columbus, Ohio, Leader of Methodist Church To Lead Services**

**SERIES BEGINS SUNDAY**

Hazen G. Werner, residence bishop of the Ohio area of the Methodist church, Columbus Ohio, will preach at the First Methodist church all this week. The services begin this evening May 8, at 7:30, and continue each evening, including Saturday. Bishop Werner will preach twice on Sunday, May 14, at 11 a. m. and at 7:30 p. m.

For eleven years Bishop Werner was pastor of the large Grace Methodist church, Dayton, Ohio. He was professor of Drew Theological Seminary from 1945-48. In 1948 he was elected bishop in the Methodist jurisdictional conference in Indianapolis, Indiana. For 11 years, 1943-52, he is assigned to the Ohio area.

Bishop Werner is especially able in the realm of pastor psychology and has distinguished himself in this field. At a large downtown church in Dayton he pioneered in developing a personal trouble clinic. This was done in collaboration with a psychiatrist and a family was done in collaboration with the police, health department and other public agencies.

The visiting Bishop is a man of extensive travels. He was in Britain when war was declared in 1939 and in 1949 he conducted a preaching itinerar in England under the direction of the British Council of Churches.

In addition to these and many other accomplishments he has written the following books: "And We Are Whole Again," "Real Living Take Time" and "The Pre-Marriage Conference." For years he has been a regular contributor to various religious magazines, especially articles on counseling and personal problems.
