## Week Driver Down Two

After the 4:15 o'clock accident Sunday afternoon.

ing and improving service to their Coleridge and Farmer exchanges.

Extended Area Service is a means of providing local calling between exchanges and thereby eliminating the toll charges or long distance rates which would otherwise be charged for calling between the towns listed.

If the Extended Area Service plan is approved by Central's Asheboro customers, the present toll charges will be eliminated.

Included in the plan will be elimination or decreasing of mileage charges which will affect some 2,215 Asheboro customers. This will be accomplished by moving the present Base Rate Area which is 1.6 miles in each direction from the old office location to take into the new Base Rate Area those developed areas in practically all directions. Distances of more than one mile will be included in the new Base Rate Area in some directions. Outside the present Base Rate Area one-party customers have been paying 63 cents for each quarter mile of circuit mileage.

Two and four-party customers share in these charges. Those customers inside the new base rate area will have mileage charges eliminated completely. Those customers outside the new base rate area will have reduced mileage charges.

The North Carolina Utilities Commission has authorized Central Telephone Company to conduct a poll of their Asheboro customers to determine if a majority of the customers desire to have the new Extended Area Service plan. All Asheboro customers will be contacted either personally or by mail and given the opportunity to express their desires concerning this new service.

Each customer will be allowed to vote regarding the proposed Extended Area Service plan. If approved by Asheboro customers and North State Telephone Company's Randleman customers, the planned Extended Area Service would allow Asheboro telephone users to reach an additional 1,700 telephones in the Randleman exchange area on a local call basis, and to have expanded and improved service to Coleridge, Farmer, Ramseur and Seagrave exchanges, thereby having a total of 12,650 telephones which could be reached

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# Drug Store, Theater Hit By Sit-In Wave

Arrests continued here this weekend as Negroes sat-in at the Little Castle, Walgreen's Drug Store and the Carolina Theatre.

There were 52 Negroes arrested and charged with trespassing and resisting arrest.

Two white men were also arrested and charged with carrying a concealed weapon, interfering with an officer performing his duty, inciting a riot and one of the men was charged with using indecent and profane language.

Those arrests came at 4:10 p.m. in front of the Little Cas-

tle and the men arrested are Charles Douglas Deese of Salisbury and Edward Donald Powell of 416 Levaurn Drive. Deese is 32 years old and Powell 29.

Sgt. B. S. Cagle reported that "while (I was) assisting in the arrest of demonstrators . . . (Deese) called (the demonstrators) s.o.b.s. . ."

Deese was arrested, and while he was being placed in the police car, passed a .22 caliber pistol to Powell. There were approximately 190 persons in the area at the time.

Both men were placed in Randolph County Jail and later released on \$1,000 bond each for appearance in court March 17.

Of the 51 Negroes arrested 40 were adults (19 females and 21 males) and 11 were juveniles — eight males and three females. One person was arrested three times.

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## Board's Search For Bs. Manager Being Abandoned

The City School Board Thursday night voted to suspend its search for a business manager.

The action was taken after David Stedman, chairman of the academics committee made the recommendation.

Stedman said there were two main reasons for the recommendation. First, he said, was "difficulty in finding the right man".

"We all agreed if we could not present to the board an unusually qualified man, we would not present one."

He said Guy Teachey, superintendent, had interviewed a number of applicants but had only recommended two to the committee.

Stedman said the second reason for the recommendation was the fact "there seems to be some concern among members of the board where the money (to pay the salary) will come from."

In other action Chairman T. Henry Redding named Leslie Morgan and Ed Hughes to a committee to study the current expense budget for a presentation to the board at its next meeting, and named Dick Sweeney and Dr. Hugh Fitzpatrick to a similar committee to study the capital outlay budget.

It was also rumored three Negro members of Committee on Human Relations had resigned, but city man Rev. Z. T. Piephoff said today he had received resignation letters yet.

The 51 Negroes arrested Sunday included 40 adults, 11 juveniles and one person arrested three different times. A number of demonstrators were from out of town, not Siler City.

The adults were detained in jail Saturday night and released on bond between 3 and 9 p.m. Sunday.

A mass meeting was scheduled Sunday night at St. Joe Baptist Church on Salisbury Road and 1,000 were supposed to be in attendance, but also fell far short. The church only held approximately 400 and only 40 cars were parked near the meeting site.

## Loan Granted For New Lines In REMC System
