# George Washington Logan, Jr.

MR. GEORGE WASHINGTON LOGAN, JR., son of the late George Washington and Maud Esther Lewis Logan, was born on May 7, 1918 in Augusta, Georgia. He departed this life on Tuesday, October 7, 2003 at Pettigrew Rehabilitation and Healthcare Center.

He was educated in the Durham Public Schools and was a graduate of Hillside Park High School. He furthered his education at Hampton University and North Carolina Central University. He was a member of the boxing team at NCCU.

He was a World War II Army veteran having served from July 16, 1941 until September 22, 1945. He received the American Defense Service Medal, Good Conduct Medal, EAMET Campaign Medal with 4 bronze service stars with 1 bronze arrowhead.

George married the former Alice Wilhilmina Jones on October 19, 1942.

He had been the manager of the Regal Theatre. Later, he worked at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and the Durham Public Schools.

He was a member of White Rock Baptist Church.

He was preceded in death by his parents, a sister, Mrs. Jessie L. Pearson; and two brothers-in-law, Dr. David B. Cooke and Judge William G. Pearson, II.

He leaves to cherish his loving memories, his wife of 60 years, Mrs. Alice J. Logan of the home; a son, George Washington Logan, III of Durham, NC; two daughters, Mrs. Wenda L. Ashford (Ronald) of Boston, MA and Ms. Bonnie D. MR. GEORGE WASHINGTON LOGAN, SR., son of the late Jesse and Bell Logan, was born May 16, 1889. He departed this life Tuesday afternoon, March 15, 1977 at his residence, 601 Lawson Street, Durham, North Carolina.

Mr. Logan, a pioneer businessman and a civic activist, had lived in Durham since 1927. He was a native of Scottsburg, Va., He graduated from Hampton Institute in 1908.

After teaching school in Augusta, Ga., he became affiliated with the BIJOU Amusement Co. and managed theaters in Augusta, Ga., Goldsboro, N. C., Kinston, N. C., Winston-Salem, N. C., Roanoke, Va., and Charlotte, N. C. From the early 1930's he operated the Wonderland Theatre and founded and operated the Regal Theatre in Durham and later built the Logan Building which housed the Do-Nut Shoppe.

Mr. Logan attracted national attention in the 1940's by hosting Henry Wallace's campaign for national political office. When Wallace was a guest in the Logan home, unprecedented local security measures were taken to protect the residence.

Among his affiliations with numerous local, state, and national organizations, Mr. Logan was a member of the Board of Directors of John Avery Boys' Club, a Board member Emeritus of the Mutual Savings and Loan Association, and one of the first local members of the NAACP. In White Rock Baptist Church, he was a District Leader, a Deacon and a Trustee.

He was married on September 2, 1914 to Miss Maude Esther Lewis, who preceded him in death.

Surviving are: two daughters, Mrs. Jessie L. Pearson and Mrs. Barbara L. Cooke, both of Durham, N. C.; one son, George W. Logan, Jr. of Durham, N. C.; three granddaughters, Mrs. Wenda L. Ashford of Boston, Mass., Miss Bonnie D. Logan of Baltimore, Md., and Miss India M. Cooke of Ann Arbor, Mich.; four grandsons, George W. Logan, III, of Durham, N. C., David B. Cooke, III of Washington, D. C., Logan L. Cooke of Durham, N. C., and William G. Pearson, III of Marysville California; and one great-grandchild, Tamara W. Ashford of Boston, Mass.

## Pioneer In Black Theaters Dies

Funeral services for George W. Logan, a pioneer Durham black theater owner and civic leader, will be held Thursday at 2 p.m. at White Rock Baptist Church by the Rev. Lorenzo A. Lynch. Burial will follow in Beechwood Cemetery.

Logan, 87, died Tuesday afternoon at his home at 601 Lawson St. after a lengthy illness. He had lived in Durham since 1927.

A native of Scottsburg, Va., Logan graduated from Hampton Institute in 1908.

After teaching school in Augusta, Georgia, he managed theaters in Goldsboro, Kinston, Winston-Salem, Roanoke and Charlotte. He founded the Wonderland and Regal Theatres for blacks in the 1930's and afterwards started the Do-Nut Shoppe.

He attracted national attention in the 1940's when he served as host to Henry Wallace's campaign for national political office.

For a number of years, he

was affiliated with the Bijou Amusement Co., which operated a chain of theatres for blacks in the South.

In addition to his activities as district leader, deacon and trustee of White Rock Baptist Church, Logan was one of the first local life members of the NAACP. He was actively associated with numerous local and state organizations. He was a member of the board of directors of John Avery Boys' Club and board member emeritus of Mutual Savings and Loan Association.

He was the husband of the late Mrs. Maude Esther Lewis Logan.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Barbara L. Cooke and Mrs. Jessie L. Pearson, both of Durham; one son, George W. Logan Jr. of Durham; and seven grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

The family requests that flowers be omitted and contributions be made to the building fund of White Rock Baptist Church.

At an early age she joined Free Union Baptist Church.

She then attended Hampton Institute and was graduated in the year of 1909.

For two years she taught school at West Point, Virginia and later became Supervisor of Public Schools in Sussex and Prince George Counties under the Anna Jeanes Foundation for three years.

On September 2, 1914 she married George W. Logan of Scottsburg, Virginia. To this union three children were born: Jessie Winifred Pearson, George Logan, Jr. and Barbara Esther Cooke.

She lived in Augusta, Georgia for several years, then in 1919, the family moved to New Bern, North Carolina, where Mrs. Logan joined her husband in the theater business.

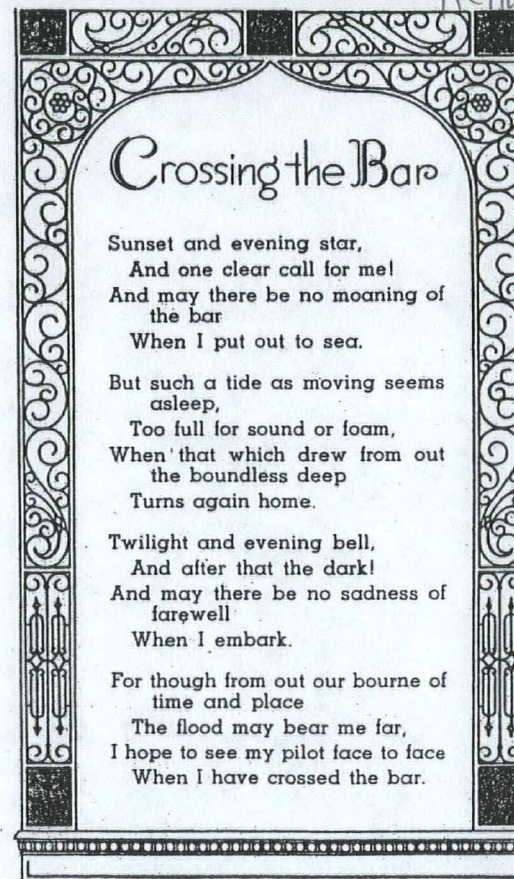

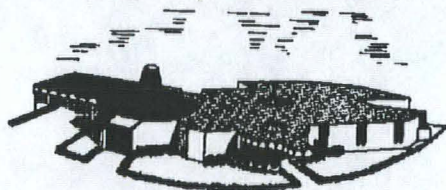

**A Human Architecture of Greatness**  
**Joe Louis**

May 13, 1914, was a blessed day when Joe Louis was born to the parents, Monroe and Lillie Barrow. He was one of eight children. Their Christian home was the foundation on which Joe built a rare philosophy of decency, respect, humility and pride. He attended the Calvary Baptist Church in Detroit, Michigan.

At an early age he was attracted to gymnastics, outdoor sports and boxing. His concentration on boxing soon created a new dimension for his career. At the early age of twenty-two, he earned the title and the greatest recognition and the right of ownership — "the World Heavyweight Championship." His long victorious fights gave to the world a dignity that he preserved. He brought to the ring a message with his gloves and a prayer in his heart.

Joe did not need "press pageantry or showmanship to build a gate." He was an unassuming symbol of greatness. History was made when pages of his victories were recorded in the annals of world statistics.

In 1954, Joe Louis, "The Brown Bomber," was elected to the Boxing Hall of Fame.

In 1968, Joe Louis was installed in Madison Square Garden Hall of Fame. John Condon, Vice President of the Hall, said, "Joe is one of the originals," and knew of no one who has done more or is more deserving than Joe Louis. "He is the topmost celebrity of them all." The inscription in the Hall of Fame reads:

"Highly respected sports celebrity and most active heavyweight champion in boxing history, the Brown Bomber put his title on the line twenty-five times. Eight defenses were made in the Garden with six ending in knockouts. His aggressive style and punching power accounted for ten first-round victories.

As a soldier in World War II twice he donated large purses to service relief.

Joe was not only an American but fought to preserve the dignity of the human race. He carved out of his championship fights courage, matchless skill, determination, and quiet confidence.

Joe had two previous marriages. He was formerly married to Marva Trotter and from the union were two children: Jacqueline Barrow and Joseph Barrow, Jr. He later married Rose Morgan. Both marriages were dissolved in divorce.

He is survived by the eminent Martha Malone Louis, prominent attorney, who is nationally known for her contributions in the field of law, as a devoted wife, homemaker and mother. They were happily married for more than twenty-two years. He also leaves Jo-Jo, John-John, Joyce and Janet; other children are Candice, Colaluca and Amber Young; his immediate brothers and sisters; Emmarell Davis, Alvanious Barrow, DeLeon Barrow, Eulalia Bobo, Vunles High; nieces, nephews, and a host of other relatives and treasured friends.

Good night, Joe — thanks a million for being our champion, the Brown Bomber!

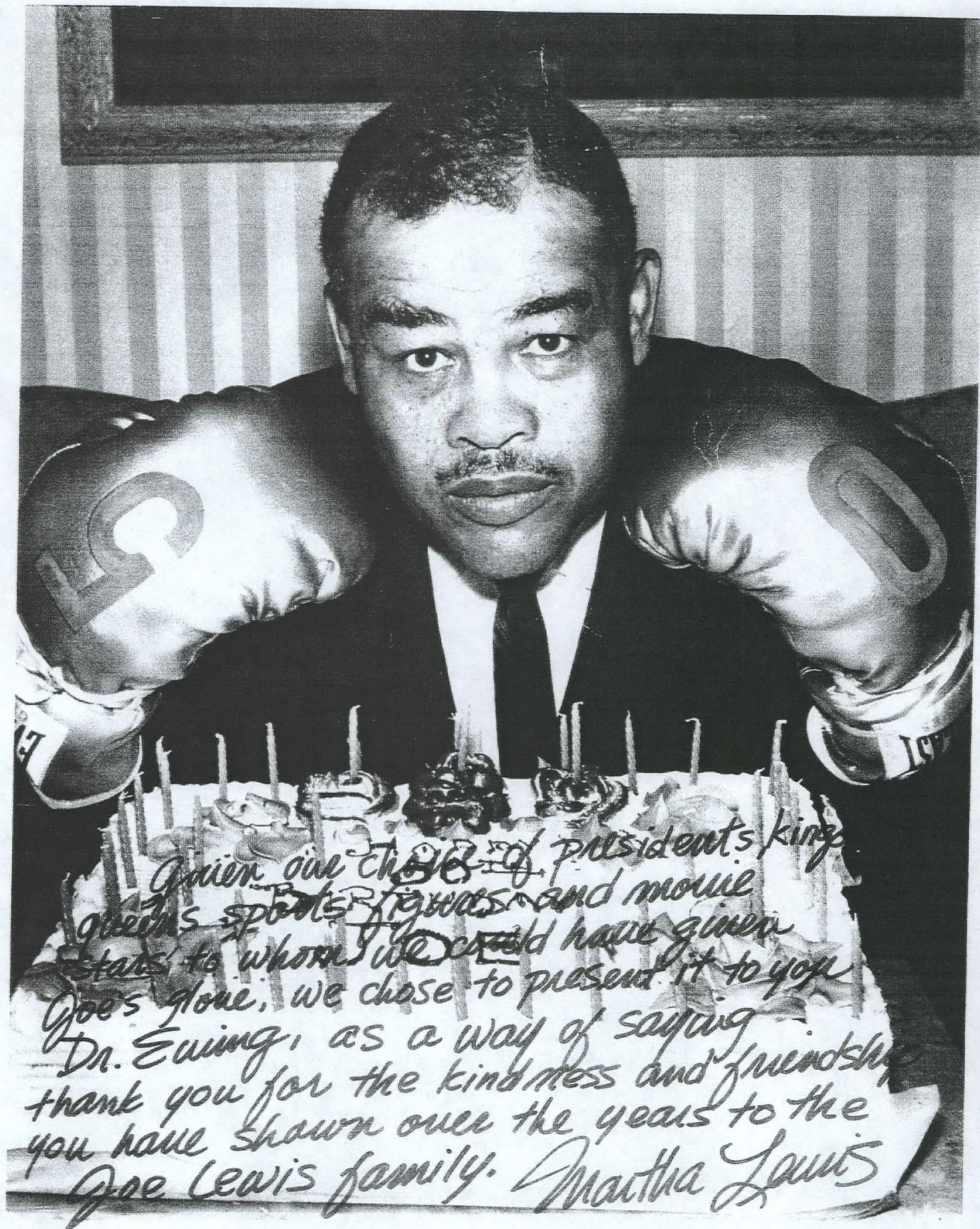
