CHAPEL HILL - The Rev. Dr. Frank A. Kostyu, 81, an award-winning photographer, writer, minister, and craftsman, died peacefully in his sleep on Tuesday, March 6. Formerly of Durham, Dr. Kostyu was the co-author of "Durham: A Pictorial History," one of ten books he wrote or contributed photographs to. The 1962 re-

recipient of the prestigious Freedoms Foundation Award for his sermon "Dare to be a Daniel," Dr. Kostyu served churches in Milwaukee; Blue Island, Ill.; and West Alexandria, Dayton, and Alliance, all in Ohio. He moved to Durham in 1981 after retiring as senior editor of "A.D." magazine, which was a New York City publication of the United Church of Christ and the Presbyterian Church (USA). He was a resident of Carol Woods Retirement Community at the time of his death.

While living in North Carolina, Dr. Kostyu was an accomplished wood craftsman, whose work garnered prizes at craft fairs across the Southeast. A world traveler, Dr. Kostyu's photographs appeared in books and magazines and won prizes in two international competitions.

A native of Lorain, Ohio, Dr. Kostyu graduated from Heidelberg College in Tiffin, Ohio, with a bachelor of arts degree. He also held an honorary doctor of divinity degree from the same school, as well as a master of sacred theology degree from Oberlin (Ohio) College; a bachelor of divinity degree from Eden Theological Seminary in Webster Groves, Mo.; and a doctor of ministry degree from Vanderbilt University. He was a member of Pilgrim United Church of Christ in Durham.

CHAPEL HILL — Sara Frances Goodhart Kradel died August 4, 1999. She was the last surviving member of a family which included 2 brothers and a sister. Born in Cente County, Pennsylvania on December 14, 1905 she was raised on a farm where her parents bestowed traditional values. After graduating from Penn State University and marrying, she and her husband raised their children in the Pittsburgh/Ligonier area. In 1969, after 30 years as a Home Economics teacher she retired and moved to Orange County from Vineland, New Jersey. For over 20 years she was a member of the Orange County Chapter of the Friendly Acres Home Extension. She had a strong faith and was an active member of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Chapel Hill. In her retirement years, she became well known for her expertise and leadership in maintaining the art of quilting and fine sewing. Her hobbies included the cultivation of flowers and bird watching.

She was preceded in death by her husband of 40 years, Joseph Charles Kradel; daughter, Esther Schaub and daughter-in-law, Sue Kradel. Surviving are four sons, David Charles Kradel of State College, Pennsylvania; John Frederick Kradel of Ligonier, Pennsylvania; James Franklin Kradel of Ogdensburg, New York and Richard Paul Kradel of Ft. Smith, Arkansas and son-in-law, John Williams Schaub of Chapel Hill. Surviving also are 19 grandchildren, including Martha Schaub Bordeaux, Josephine Schaub Hunt, David William Schaub and Rebecca Sue Schaub all of Chapel Hill area; and 28 great-grandchildren.

Final arrangements for her memorial service have not been made, but will be held at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Chapel Hill. She will be buried with her husband in Ligonier, Pennsylvania.
