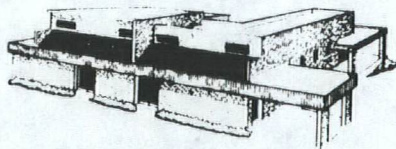

Obituary

On August 13, 2004, William Russell McNair, Sr. departed this life to go and be with the Lord. William was a sweet, and loving man, he had many friends that were near and dear to his heart. William loved to talk about his family and friends to other people very often. William also spoke highly of Fayetteville State University, he loved that school. William will be missed by all who knew and loved him.

William attended Rocky Mount Public Schools (diploma); he received a B. S. degree from Fayetteville State University, and an M.A. degree in Education Administration and Supervision from Teachers College Columbia University. He served in the US Armed Forces during WWII. He received several citations, awards and was honorably discharged in March 1946.

William was a teacher and principal from 1950-1970 in the Edgecombe, Halifax and Nash County School Systems as well as Wilson Elementary School in Washington, DC.

At age 13, William R. McNair accepted Jesus Christ as his Lord and Savior. As an active member at St. James Baptist Church, he sang in the choir, taught Sunday School classes, served as Assistant Church Treasurer and a member of the Board of Deacons, which he was officially ordained as a Deacon in 1963. Upon graduation from Fayetteville State University in 1950, he joined the Rocky Mount Chapter of Fayetteville State University. William McNair served on the Executive Board of the National Alumni Association, as he served three terms as Treasurer. He later returned to Fayetteville State University where he served as Academic Counselor, Senior Advisor and Director of Alumni Affairs 1970-1971. His distinguished awards and citations included Waymon W. Williams Membership Award, Chancellor's Certificate of Merit (1998) and a Replica of the Liberty Bell in lieu of key to the City of Philadelphia in observance of its 300th birthday.

William was the son of the late Johnnie R. McNair and Alice T. Alston and the stepson of Robert Alston. He was preceded in death by his son, William R. McNair, Jr., daughter, LaVerne M. Sinclair, and son, Robert L. McNair.

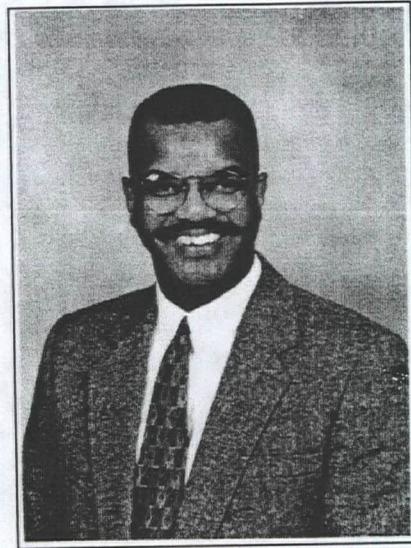

Ex-police chief McNeil dies at 55

Durham native remembered as positive role model

When Jackie W. McNeil was sworn in as Durham's police chief in January 1993, he said improving race relations in the department and community would be one of his biggest challenges.

On Saturday, Chief McNeil, 55, died following more than 25 years of law enforcement service to the Bull City.

"I've always been very impressed with him," Durham police Chief Steve Chalmers said. "He really was a positive role model for our younger officers coming into public safety at that time. As he moved through the ranks, he became a source of support as well as encouragement, especially for the African American officers."

"He was a man of great faith, I know that," former Durham police Lt. Col. Kent Fletcher said. "He did a lot of praying and he carried his Bible with him every day to work. I was really sad to hear he died."

Although Chief McNeil took an early retirement in July 1997 after the department was rocked by allegations of reverse racism, sexism and police brutality — charges that spawned a host of lawsuits against Chief McNeil and the city — Lt. Col. Fletcher said many of the problems Chief McNeil faced were inherited.

Chief McNeil was born in Durham and grew up on Juniper

reet in the Albright community and in McDougald Terrace. He joined the Durham Police Department on June 14, 1971, when it was still a public safety agency.

Lt. Col. Fletcher, who said he and Chief McNeil began working in uniform patrol around the same time, said Chief McNeil's ties to the community were evident throughout his career.

"He knew everybody," Fletcher said. "He liked to be out in the community, and he could barely take it more than 10 steps before someone stopped him."

Chief McNeil also was active as an ordained deacon at Greater Paul Baptist Church. He drove a school bus for Neal Middle School following his retirement.

Police Maj. Charles Tiffin said he was saddened by Chief McNeil's death.

He was definitely into community-oriented policing," Tiffin said. "He had a lot of ideas that were really helpful and learned a lot from him."

My best wishes go to his family and it's a loss to the community," he added.

Chief Chalmers said he and Chief McNeil started the community-oriented Partners Against

"Jackie was always very committed to his profession and committed to the community. I think he did an excellent job as chief of police," Chief Chalmers said.

During his tenure, Chief McNeil, in an effort to deal with limited resources and to balance his community-oriented police style, also changed the officers' working schedule to a 12-hour shift with seven consecutive days off each month.

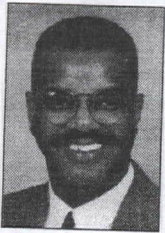
The switch proved unpopular with rank-and-file officers, who protested and even filed a lawsuit, which later was dropped. Chief McNeil leaves behind a wife, a son and a daughter, Col. Fletcher said. Funeral arrangements are pending at Holloway Funeral Home.

"He had a big heart. He was a very compassionate person," Col. Fletcher said. "He had a love for his community, and he did the best he could."

THE REVEREND LOTTIE HILL McNEILL, the daughter of the late Reverend and Mrs. Simon P. Hill of Brunswick County, died September 26, 1983 at Duke Hospital. She was born October 9, 1906 into a family of ministers and educators that served the Eastern area of North Carolina.

She attended secondary school at Redstone Academy in Lumberton, N.C. She was a graduate of Fayetteville State Normal College, Fayetteville, N.C., attended Shaw University Divinity School, Raleigh, N.C., and was a graduate of United Christian College in Goldsboro, N.C.

During her sixty years in Durham she worked for the American Tobacco Company, Duke Hospital, and the Medical Arts Complex.

Mr. McNeill was a long-time community activist. He began his career as a teacher in secondary education and later served as the Executive Director of Operation Breakthrough for nearly 21 years. He served in the U.S. Medical Army Corps, member and former Basileus, Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, NCCU Alumnus substitute teacher with Durham Public Schools, Officiator Association, St. Mark Church Trustee Board and president of the Lay Council. He was a 1949 graduate of Hillside, 1951 graduate of NCCU and received his M.S. from NCCU in 1958.

Survivors are his wife, Myrtle Jones McNeill; two daughters Rev. Sheila McNeill-Lee of Washington, D.C., and Veta McNeill-Best of Durham; two sons-in-law, Jerome Lee of Washington and Moses Best of Durham; a granddaughter, Janice Best of Durham; and other relatives and friends.

Lifelong educator dies in traffic accident on I-85

Fred Douglas McNeill Jr., a lifelong educator and the first black to serve on the Durham County Board of Education, died in a traffic accident Friday.

The accident that killed Mr. McNeill, 70, was precipitated by Friday's heavy rainstorm. Driving on Interstate 85 north of Durham, he veered off the highway and his car struck another car beside it.

Mr. McNeill was elected to the county school board in 1968, but he was best known for his leadership of Operation Breakthrough, a Durham non-profit organization that operates Head Start preschool classes and other community assistance programs.

"He really liked to invest in people, which is a good way to describe him," said his daughter, Sheila McNeill-Lee. Mr. McNeill's family remembers him as an energetic man with strong opinions and a passion for education and social issues.

"He loved community service," said another daughter, Veta McNeill-Best, 42. "He was somebody that loved people and loved life. He was somebody that really enjoyed helping others."

Mr. McNeill began his career as a high school biology teacher and football coach. He was a member of the N.C. Board of Educators and refereed for the Durham County Department of Parks and Recreation. "He was very energetic," Ms. McNeill-Best said. "When he was refereeing, he could call two or three games per day, when most people could only call one. That's just the kind of person he was. He loved children and he loved people and he loved sports."

Ms. McNeill-Lee said that her father renewed his passion for teaching in the later part of his life and returned to teaching biology as an adjunct professor at N.C. Central University in the fall. Mr. McNeill served for 28 years as executive director of Operation Breakthrough. please see **MCNEILL** | C5

"Everybody's been saying to us that he had such a big heart for giving," Ms. McNeill-Lee said. "Most people remember his passion for social justice."

Besides helping others, Mr. McNeill was dedicated to his two alma maters: N.C. Central University, class of 1953, and Hillside High School, class of 1949.

"He loved coordinating his high school reunions," Ms. McNeill-Best said.

While at college, Mr. McNeill played halfback for the football team. He remained a team booster and was inducted into the NCCU Sports Hall of Fame in 1989.

"He was at all their games," Ms. McNeill-Lee said. "He had season passes."

Mr. McNeill was also a lifetime member of the NCCU Alumni Association and Omega Psi Phi, a public service fraternity.

As a family man, Mr. McNeill was described by his daughters as giving and patient.

"I think we were really blessed to have two wonderful parents, and most people don't have that," Ms. McNeill-Lee said.

Mr. McNeill was married for 46 years to another educator, Myrtle McNeill, who was the first black administrator at the Durham County Public Library system. They also shared the same birthday with each other and with Martin Luther King Jr., Jan. 15.

"He was one who lived life to the fullest," Ms. McNeill-Lee said. "He had his opinion on things, but he respected your opinion also."

Funeral arrangements were still being made late Saturday through Scarborough Funeral Home. A service will be held at St. Mark's AME Zion Church.

Besides his wife and two daughters, Mr. McNeill is survived by a granddaughter.

He was born January 15, 1932 in Durham, a son of Fred Douglas McNeill, Sr. and Mrs. Lottie Hill McNeill. He attended Durham public schools and was a 1949 graduate of Hillside High School. He was a 1953 graduate of North Carolina Central University and earned as Master of Science degree in 1958. He also studied at Tufts University, Cambridge Mass., Wisconsin University at Madison. He held several professional education positions. Uppermost among them was 20 years as executive director of Operation Breakthrough.

McNeill began his teaching career at Mary Potter High School in Oxford. There he taught biology and coached high school football. He had served as director of LINCS, the Learning Institute of North Carolina and later as the director of the N.C. Teachers Credit Union of Raleigh. He became the first African American elected to the Durham County Board of Education in 1969.

He was a member of Saint Mark AME Zion Church and had served in numerous capacities: Board of Trustees, Board of Stewards, Budget Committee, Personnel Committee, president of the District Lay Council of the AME Zion Church. He was a member and former basileus of Beta Phi Chapter of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity. He held memberships in the NAACP, NEA, ATA, AARP, The Therapeutic Club, the American Bridge Association; Guys and Dolls Family Club, and Meals on Wheels.

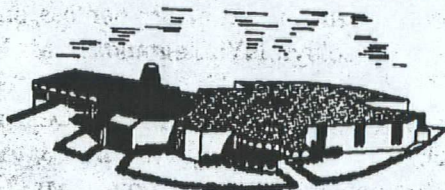
