

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

"Well done, good and faithful servant! You have been faithful with a few things; I will put you in charge of many things. Come and share your master's happiness."

Surrounded by his loving family, the Reverend Doctor Benjamin Alexander Mack, age 83, died peacefully at his home in Durham, N.C. on Sunday, July 10, 2005 and won the victory of Resurrection.

The Reverend Mack, the son of the late Eddie Dale and Lula Petree Mack, was born in Winston-Salem, N.C. on January 6, 1922.

He received his calling from God at an early age and preached his first sermon at Saint Home United Methodist Church on Mother's Day, May 12, 1935 at the age of 13. He was known and respected for many years as the energetic boy preacher with a large faithful following, which included his family. Later, with his devoted wife Ollie by his side, they carried the Word and music out into churches across North Carolina, the United States, Canada and the Caribbean Islands.

After graduating from Atkins High School, he attended Winston-Salem State Teacher's College, now Winston-Salem State University, while living and working as a butler in the home of John C. Whitaker, President and CEO of R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Company. He completed further study at Piedmont Bible College and the Seminary of Johnson C. Smith University in Charlotte, N.C., where he obtained a Bachelors Degree in Theology. In 1973, Reverend Mack was conferred a Doctor of Divinity Degree by Miller University School of Religion in Plainfield, N.J. He also received Certificates in Pastoral Counseling in 1950 from Bowman Gray School of Medicine and Baptist Hospital in Winston-Salem, and Certification in Hebrew History from Johnson C. Smith University. He continued his theological studies at Shaw University, Livingston College and received personal mentorship under the late Dr. Miles Mark Fisher of White Rock Baptist Church and the late Bishop Ruben L. Speaks of the A.M.E. Zion Central North Carolina Conference.

Reverend Mack's ministry spanned over seventy years. His ministry inspired his younger brother, the late Reverend Doctor Sir Walter Mack, Sr., to become a renowned minister in Winston-Salem, NC, where he served as Pastor at Emmanuel Baptist Church for thirty-two years. Reverend B.A. Mack devoted his life through pastoring, mentoring and unselfish kindness. Early in his ministry, he was recognized by the A.M.E. Zion Conference as a spiritual innovator and motivator. He was the founder of New Hope Baptist Church in Winston-Salem, and erected four new churches during the course of his ministry. Pastor Mack was one of the original founders and served as a Trustee for Camp Dorothy Walls in Black Mountain, N.C., one of the first camps for African American children that is owned and operated by the A.M.E. Zion Church.

During his ministry, he served as the Pastor of many churches: Saint Holmes United Methodist Church and New Hope Baptist Church, in Winston-Salem, N.C.; Emmanuel A.M.E. Zion, Thomasville, N.C.; Ervin Avenue A.M.E. Zion, Newton, N.C.; Bethlehem A.M.E. Zion,

Stonesville, N.C.; Hood Memorial A.M.E. Zion Church, Belmont, N.C.; Saint James A.M.E. Zion, Troutman, N.C.; and Kessler Temple A.M.E. Zion Church, Henderson, N.C. One of his most challenging ministries was serving as a circuit minister for St. Paul, Macedonia, Union Grove, and Mount Herman, in the Sanford and Pittsboro, N.C. District of the A.M.E. Zion Central Conference. In 1967, Reverend Mack was called to the ministry of Morehead Avenue Baptist Church in Durham, North Carolina, following the demise of the Reverend Doctor C.E. McLester. Following an inspiring twenty-eight year tenure, he retired in April, 1995. However, the Lord was not finished with him yet. His tenacious spirit and desire to continue to serve the Lord moved him to accept the pastorate of Mount Sinai A.M.E. Zion Church in Advance, N.C. He retired after four faithful years. During his declining years, he returned to the A.M.E. Zion Church and joined St. Mark A.M.E. Zion Church under the former pastorate of Dr. Avery C. Brown in Durham, N.C.

From 1970 to 1975, Reverend Mack served as historian for the Durham Ministerial Alliance. He served as a Trustee of the Union Christian Bible Institute. He was proxy representative on the Board of the Minister's Life Insurance Company of Minnesota. Pastor Mack was also a member of Doric Lodge #28, affiliated with the North Carolina Baptist State Convention, the Lott Carey Foreign Missionary Convention, the Progressive National Convention, and the New Hope Association.

He was elected "Minister of the Year in 1982" by supporters of Edgemont Community Center and Durham residents. The award included a trip to the Holy Land, which he declined. He requested that the money be used to purchase shoes for the children of the community. This act was indicative of his legacy of giving to the disadvantaged. He lived a life of service to those in need. Reverend Mack was best known as "The Preacher Who Cares."

Reverend Mack was preceded in death by his son Jerry Nivens Mack; one grandson, Derrick Fox; one granddaughter, Tenecha Diane Martin; five brothers; Eddie Dale Mack, Jr., Louis Mack, Reverend Sir Walter Mack, Sr., Clifton Mack and George Melton Mack, Sr.; three sisters; Flavella Mack, Lillian Mack Hopkins, and Mary Mack Napper; two brothers-in-law; Reverend Warren Napper and Mr. Al Fuller.



OBITUARY C. C. "BUDDY" MALONE, JR.

Clarence Calvin "Buddy" Malone, Jr., the second child of Clarence C. Malone and Willie Hendricks Malone was born on October 25, 1928. His parents moved to Durham in early 1927, where he attended the public schools of the City of Durham from the first through the eighth grades. Upon entering high school, "Buddy" studied for one year at Voorhees Normal and Industrial School in Denmark, South Carolina, before transferring to Palmer Memorial Institute in Sedalia, North Carolina, from which he graduated in 1947. He then matriculated at what was then known as North Carolina College at Durham, from which he was awarded the Bachelor of Arts degree in History and Political Science.

Shortly after receiving his college degree, "Buddy" enlisted in the United States Air Force serving his country during the height of the Korean conflict. He enlisted in September of 1951 in the Air Force. He was assigned to a course in statistical accounting in Denver, Colorado, which led upon completion to his first real assignment in Mobile, Alabama. The Air Force barriers to integration at that time led Mr. Malone through an unusual course from which he received a general discharge under honorable conditions in January, 1954.

Returning home he operated the family grocery store full-time while attending law school. This was one of the first Black owned supermarkets in Durham, where "Buddy" became renown as a butcher. He decided that eventually he would study law because he thought a legal education would help him enhance his family business enterprises which now included real estate, grocery operations, and a restaurant business. The developments in the United States pertaining to civil rights stimulated his interests, therefore, he got involved. The practice of criminal law attracted him and his instructors encouraged him to consider trial law as well because of his oratorical talent which was enhanced by his striking bass voice.

Upon completion of law school Malone again encountered segregation in his attempt to take the State Bar examination. After being allowed to take the exam, he passed it the first time and was notified of such in September of 1961. Having been admitted to the North Carolina State Bar, he opened his first law office at 336 Pettigrew Street in Durham on October 1, 1961.

At approximately the same time that Attorney Malone entered the practice of law, there was a significant increase in civil rights demonstrations across the nation. With the rise in sit-in demonstrations by young African-Americans throughout the state of North Carolina, thousands

of demonstrators were arrested and prosecuted. As a fledgling lawyer, Attorney Malone was retained by the NAACP Legal Defense Fund and the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE) to defend hundreds of demonstrators who had been arrested throughout the state of North Carolina. During this tumultuous period, Malone tried 500 to 600 cases involving Civil Rights issues which spanned the state, from Greensboro to Fayetteville to Elizabeth City. Along with others, Attorney Malone represented many of the demonstrators who participated in the "Greensboro Sit-Ins", including a young college student by the name of Jesse Jackson. While representing these civil rights protesters, Attorney Malone continued to hone his skills as a criminal trial litigator.

On February 1, 1968, Attorney Malone associated with three other prominent Durham attorneys to become one of the founding partners of the law firm of "Pearson, Malone, Johnson & Dejarmon", which became the first Black law firm organized in the state of North Carolina consisting of three or more attorneys. Subsequently, the Law Firm expanded to become "Pearson, Malone, Johnson, DeJarmon & Spaulding." At one time, the firm employed seven full-time attorneys as well as several legal secretaries and paralegals. In 1979, the Law Firm constructed and moved into a new law office building located at 705 Kent Street in Durham, where Attorney Malone continued to practice law until his retirement due to ill health in 1999.

The Law Firm developed a diverse and varied practice, however, it was as a criminal trial lawyer that Attorney Malone distinguished himself as an effective and dynamic legal advocate. Not only had he represented thousands of clients in virtually every county of North Carolina, but he had developed a reputation as a tough and skillful cross-examiner rendering legendary closing arguments which were both articulate and persuasive. His distinctive bass voice would reverberate throughout the courtroom as he implored the jury to find his client "not guilty". Most of the time, he was able to convince the jury to return a verdict in favor of his client.

Having become one of the leaders in the fight to end segregation in North Carolina during his illustrious career, Attorney Malone became known as "The Defender. He also served an important and unparalleled role in mentoring, nurturing and employing recent law school graduates, many of whom were unable to gain employment or experience through other law firms because of their race. After practicing under the tutelage and guidance of Attorney Malone, many of these young attorneys embarked upon distinguished careers in the legal profession. One of Attorney Malone's proteges is retired Judge Clifton Johnson, a former Associate Judge of the North Carolina Court of Appeals.

Nearly a dozen of Attorney Malone's former associates are now engaged in the practice of law throughout the state of North Carolina. All of them were positively influenced by Attorney Malone, who was always willing to share with other attorneys the wisdom and vast legal knowledge that he had acquired during his thirty-eight years in the legal profession.

In recognition of his role as a defender of the right, an advocate for the cause of justice and freedom, and champion of the people, the George H. White Bar Association held a testimonial dinner February 5, 2000, to recognize Clarence Calvin Malone, Jr. "upon whose shoulders they stand". This occasion was the genesis for a scholarship established in Malone's honor at the North Carolina Central University School of Law.

Mr. Malone joined his neighborhood church, St. Titus Episcopal Church, as a youth and remained a long-time parishioner. He has been active in numerous civic and professional organizations. He has been recognized and honored by the North Carolina Association of Black Lawyers as one of the "Pioneer Black Lawyers in North Carolina." Through his dedication, passion for justice and extraordinary advocacy skills, Attorney C. C. "Buddy" Malone has earned the respect and admiration of clients, associates, adversaries, judges and the public in general.

Mr. Malone married the former Margaret Odessa Hunter on January 7, 1957. This union remained until her death on March 10, 1999. He was also preceded in death by his parents and a sister, Evelyn Malone Thorpe. He is survived by one brother, Harold Bruce Malone, sister-in-law, Patricia Damron Malone: niece, Miriam Yvonne Thorpe Rush, nephews, Joseph Harold Thorpe and Christopher Harold Malone, nephew-in-law, Gerald Edwin Rush: great nephews, Brandon Joseph Thorpe, Gerald Edwin Rush, II, and Pierre Alonzo Rush, as well as numerous other relatives.

He departed this life on the evening of February 10, 2001 at his home in Durham, North Carolina.
