



REVEREND ALEXANDER DUMAS MOSELEY departed this life at Durham County General Hospital on Wednesday evening, April 9, 1986. He was born in Bertie County, North Carolina, son of the late Samuel and Bernettie Wiggins Moseley Williams. He spent his formative years in North Carolina, where he graduated from high school in Winton, North Carolina and Elizabeth State Teachers' College. He received his A.B. Degree in Theology from Shaw University in 1948; M.A. Degree from the University of Denver in 1953; D.D. Honorary Degree from Kittrell College 1960; D.D. Honorary Degree from the Union Christian Bible Institute 1970.

Upon graduation, his professional career began as a public school teacher and as a principal in Gates County, North Carolina. In 1944, he delivered his trial sermon at the Spring Hill Baptist Church in Lewiston, N.C. His pastorates included New Sawyer Creek Baptist Church in Bell Cross, Union Baptist Church in Tarboro, St. John Baptist Church in New Bern and the First Baptist Church of Weldon. From August, 1961 to December, 1981, he served as Pastor of Mount Gilead Baptist Church of Durham and upon his retirement, he was honored for his meritorious record in the ministry by being named Pastor Emeritus.

His life-long dedication in the ministry was visible on several levels: American Baptist Convention, Former Vice President and active member of the General Baptist State Convention, Moderator of the New Hope Association, Co-Founder, Dean and Instructor of the Union Christian Bible Institute, one of the organizers of the United Campus Christian Ministry of North Carolina Central University, member of the Durham Ministerial Alliance, the first Black elected President of the Durham Ministers Association and Vice President of Durham Congregations In-Action.

Through his pastoral leadership, Mount Gilead was blessed with the calling to the ministry five of its members: Rev. C.R. Stone, Ledge Rock Baptist Church, Durham, N.C.; Rev. Glenn M. Pettiford, First Baptist Church, Lexington, N.C.; Rev. A. Bernard Morrison, Shiloh Baptist Church, Kittrell, N.C.; Rev. Earlie E. Thorpe, Assistant Pastor, Ledge Rock Baptist Church, Durham, N.C.; Rev. Wadell Tapp, Assistant Pastor, Mount Gilead Baptist Church.

He distinguished himself in his service to his nation, state and the local community of Durham through leadership, membership and affiliation: Army-Airforce, 1942, The Veterans Training Program, the Elks, Civil Liberties, John Avery Boys' Club, NAACP, CORE, Democratic Party Precinct Chair-Fuller School, Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, The Durham Committee on the Affairs of Black People, Co-Founder of the Durham Chapter of The Southern Christian Leadership Conference and affiliated with all Senior Citizens organizations.

He married Mrs. Earle Cleaves Moseley and they became the proud parents of one daughter, Alexis Moseley Daniel, who resides in Urbana, Illinois.

He is survived by his wife of 40 plus years, Earle Cleaves Moseley; one daughter, Alexis Moseley Daniel; one sister, Mrs. Clara Jones of New York; one granddaughter, Ayesha Earle Randolph; a host of other relatives and friends.

Muslims Leader 77

Muhammad Dies

CHICAGO (AP) — Elijah Muhammad, leader of the Black Muslims religious sect which advocated racial supremacy

and isolation for blacks, died today at 77, a spokesman at Mercy Hospital said.

Muhammad's influence was extensive. Membership rolls are secret, but estimates of his followers range to around two million. The most well known is Muhammad Ali, born Cassius Clay who grew up to be boxing's heavyweight champion of the world.

Muhammad's business empire had assets estimated at \$60 million. Properties include thousands of acres of farmland and herds of cattle in Michigan, Georgia and Alabama.

In his last years, Muhammad often was ill and never available to the news media. He would leave Chicago's wintry weather for a house he owned in Arizona. He suffered from respiratory ailments.

Muhammad, the leader of the Black Muslim movement for more than 40 years, often was a study in paradox.

Tiny and light-skinned, Muhammad didn't look like the See ELLIJAH, Page 2-A.

Messenger of Allah he proclaimed himself or the architect of a supremacist group which accomplished what all of the angry young rhetoric and militancy of the 1960s didn't: economic independence for the U.S. black man.

His followers are called Black Muslims, his group the Nation of Islam. The creed is not that founded by Mohammed but many of the religious disciplines are similarly strict: members are supposed to attend three meetings a week, recite prayers five times daily; eat only one meal a day and abstain from drugs, alcohol, to-bacco, gambling, illicit sexual relations and soul food.

Although he preached racial supremacy, he prayed to a man who identified himself as white. He extolled austerity but lived in a 19-room mansion in a fine area called Hyde Park.

He denounced whites as devils, drunkards and as rattle-snakes, "made to hate and kill off the black;" yet, he got along well with them, employing many within his economic enterprises.

In 1974, Chicago Mayor Richard J. Daley, one of the nation's most powerful political leaders, proclaimed a special day for him.

Muhammad was born in Georgia as Elijah Poole in 1897. His family moved to Detroit in the early 1930s and there Poole met W. D. Fard, founder of the Temple of Islam whose members were called Muslims and whom Poole ultimately came to call God.

Fard was once convicted on charges of violating narcotics and bootlegging laws and regularly identified himself as white.

Fard disappeared in 1933 and Poole became Elijah Muhammad, "The Messenger of Allah."
