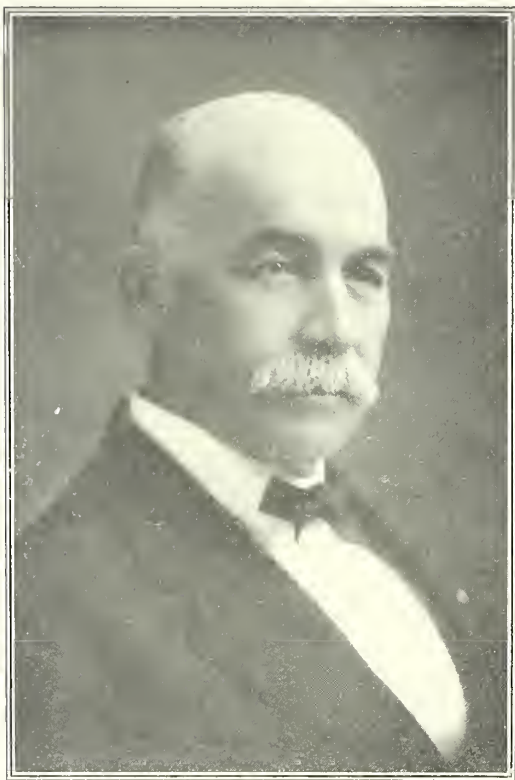

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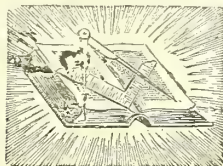

Grand Master's Address

The Grand Master delivered his address, which on motion was referred to a special committee, which the Deputy Grand Master announced as follows: Past Grand Master, John W. Cotten, Past Grand Master, B. S. Royster, Past Grand Master, W. B. McKoy.

Once more we have come to "meet and greet each other." Another milestone has been passed; and for the one-hundredth and twenty-seventh time the Grand Lodge of North Carolina has assembled amid the blessings of peace, health and plenty.

With bowed heads and thankful hearts we have rendered our obeisance to the Supreme Ruler of Heaven and Earth and given expression to our gratitude that we are again permitted to gather here and engage in the important duties that have been entrusted to our care, and to pledge ourselves anew to the loving services of our brethren to the purpose of our Institution—So my brethren I give you greeting.

One year ago you elected me your Grand Master. Your confidence in me was an inspiration to me to attempt to perform the duties of the office in a creditable manner. Whether or not I have succeeded you are to be judges. For what measure of success has crowned my efforts I am thankful and for my failures I bespeak the "broad mantle of your charity." I have striven to do my duty and have no excuse to offer.

We should always pause, before entering into the consideration of the present duties, to recall with tender memory, our Fraternal dead. True we mourn not as those who have no hope, for as Masons, we are taught that the life which now is, is to be followed by a future life—that the separation by death is but a "temporary separation." Yet it were well to pause for a moment and pay a small tribute to our departed brethren, even though the separation is but temporary.

It is with heart-felt gratitude that I bring you a message that not one of our official list, or of our Past Grand Masters have been called "up yonder," but behold what havoc, the scythe of time has wrought in the ranks of Sister Grand Jurisdictions. I have received notice of the following named distinguished brethren of other Grand Jurisdictions:

On September 1, 1913, Grand Master Frances Devereux Clarke, of the Grand Lodge of Michigan was called to the Grand Lodge above. The sudden call of Grand Master Clarke is recorded with profound grief, especially by this Grand Lodge. As he was a native of North Carolina and one of whom our State may well be proud, very probably a number of the brethren present knew him in his early life. He was born at Raleigh, N. C., on January 31, 1849, educated at the "Old Academy in Raleigh," then at Davidson College, and afterwards at Columbia College in New York. He received the degree of L.L.D., in 1901. He served in the Confederate Army, rising to the rank of lieutenant, went to New York in 1868, was employed in the New York Institution for the deaf, thence to Arkansas in 1895 and in 1892 was elected superintendent of Michigan School for deaf, which position he held at the time of his death. He was married in 1873 to Miss Laura Ransom, who survives him. He was initiated, passed, and raised in 1901, hence must have been an active, ardent, student of our Art to have attained the exalted position he did in the short space of twelve years. It was said of him that he was "well equipped for life, and equally equipped for death." "He left no duty unperformed."

He spent September 6, his last day on earth attending to his official correspondence, and left not a single letter unanswered. His labors ended, may he rest in peace!

On December 9, 1912, John B. Huffy, Past Grand Master of Colorado, was called to his final rest. "For him has bloomed a spring whose flowers perennial, deck a holier sod."

On December 22, 1912, Brother George W. Monroe, Past Grand Master Masons of Montana, a brother who "worthily wore the purple of our Fraternity," passed to that country "from whose bourne no traveller ere returns."

On January 1, 1913, Brother Leander Burdick, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Ohio was called up Higher. In both business matters and Masonic duties, he was conspicuous for "assiduity and success." "He is sadly missed."

On January 25, 1913, Joseph Hall, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of West Virginia, "laid aside the working tools" and was called to his reward after long services full of years. "He was respected by all."

On January 27, 1913, Brother Harry Bailey, Past Grand Master of Kentucky was "was cruelly assassinated" while in the "midst of life's duties and usefulness." His death was untimely and his brethren mourn.

On January 14, 1913, Brother J. W. Sorrels, Past Grand

Master of Arkansas "passed over the river." At all times faithful and devoted to the interests of Masonry, he held a foremost place in the affection of his brethren.

On February 21, 1913, Brother R. M. Lusk, Past Grand Master of Texas "went up higher." It was during his term as Grand Master that the great storm of Galveston and vicinity occurred and the judicious manner in which he directed the disbursement of the thousands of dollars contributed by Masons, generally for the relief of their distressed brethren of Texas, endeared him not only to the Masons of the coast but to all Masons everywhere. "His life was devoted to good deeds."

On March 3, 1913, Brother L. Branch Valliant, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Missouri answered the summons of the "Grim Reaper." In addition to his Masonic work, he was Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. "His life was an inspiration to his brethren." "An exemplary citizen, a brave soldier, a righteous judge and a Free Mason in the true meaning of the word."

On April 17, 1913, Brother Benjamin F. Turner, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Connecticut, "responded to the final summons," quiet, conscientious, efficient, "a wise and prudent adviser," were his chief characteristics. His loss is most grievously felt.

On May 12, 1913, Herbert Brown, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Arizona was called to his reward. He was active not only in Masonry but in all the duties of citizenship, the recipient of many honors. "He is mourned by a host of friends."

On June 2, 1913, Styles L. Rowe, Past Grand Master of Arkansas "went to rest." "Full of zeal and devotion to Masonry, active in all his duties, his wise council and valuable advice will be missed by his brethren."

On June 12, 1913, James A. Dunlap, Past Grand Master and Past Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Alberta was "removed from earth and transplanted to the Grand Lodge above." A warm friend and a wise counselor."

On July 11, 1913, Brother Charles Elliott Sweet, Past Grand Master of Michigan "passed to his reward." "A brilliant Mason and a learned lawyer." He was blessed with a host of warm friends who mourn his loss."

On August 26, 1913, Brother E. E. Allen, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Missouri was suddenly called to his reward. "A Mason since early manhood, his zeal and enthusiasm won for him honors and positions as well as hosts of friends."

On August 4, 1913, Walter McConner, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Mississippi was removed from among his

brethren and taken to his home above. "He performed nobly every duty that true Masonry devolved on him."

On October 27, 1913 Frank W. Havens, Past Grand Master and Past Grand Secretary of Connecticut was called home. "In every Masonic capacity he was a faithful and efficient worker."

On November 18, 1913 Nathaniel Mayers, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska entered into rest. Especially interested in the Masonic Home he was nevertheless faithful and zealous in the discharge of every duty entrusted to him."

On November 15, 1913, Brother Samuel Warren Hayes, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska was called from "his labors on earth to everlasting refreshment in the Paradise of God. He was the oldest Master Mason in the State, being 94 years of age, faithful in all his great duties to God, his country, and to himself." He has surely gone to receive the reward prepared for the righteous."

The following other Grand officers of Sister Grand Jurisdictions have also passed on to their reward.

On February 25, 1913, George William Carrington, Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Virginia.

On February 25, 1913, S. L. Carter, Past Deputy Grand Master of Florida.

On February 27, 1913, William Allen Cleland, Grand Treasurer of the Grand Lodge of Oregon.

On April 9, 1913, George W. Deits, Junior Grand Warden of the York Grand Lodge of Mexico.

On June 17, 1913, William Pettigrew Benedict, Senior Grand Warden of the Grand Lodge of Colorado.

On June 30, 1913, John M. Oathunt, Senior Grand Deacon of the Grand Lodge of Arkansas.

On March 11, 1913, Edward T. Schultz, Past Grand Warden, Grand Historian and Correspondent of the Grand Lodge of Maryland.

Joseph A. McKee, Senior Grand Warden of the Grand Lodge of Tennessee, "He discharged every duty conscientiously, was zealous in his devotion to Masonry, was of most genial and pleasing address, a gentleman in every sense of the word and a true and faithful Mason.

This I think closes the unusually lengthy list of the "departed ones" of our Sister Grand Jurisdictions. When we see how busy the "Grim Reaper" has been elsewhere it should I think inspire our hearts with deepest gratitude to our Heavenly Father for his particular care of our own Grand Jurisdiction. Not a single death in our official family or among our Past Grand Officers."

This I think is remarkable.

The only loss that has been officially reported is that of one whose face and form is sadly missed by us today. That of Captain W. H. McLaurin, of Laurinburg, whose death occurred after a somewhat lingering illness, on August 23, 1913 at his home in Laurinburg.

"Captain Billy," as he was affectionately called by his neighbors and friends, was one of "Nature's nobleman." None knew him but to love him, none touched him but that was elevated and strengthened by it, and to his intimate friends he was a constant inspiration to "nobler thoughts and better living." Modest and retiring in disposition, yet he was a man of strong convictions and when occasion required was ever ready to do valiant battle for that which he believed to be just and right. Devoid of personal ambition he never sought or held an office in the Grand Lodge, yet he was always an earnest, active and effective worker in the ranks. He was possessed of a strong individuality and yet of a pleasing presence, his honest opinions were expressed in vigorous language, but in the manner void of offense. A devoted friend, a zealous Mason, a good man. His life was full of honor and his death is mourned by all.

I think he has missed only two meetings of this Grand Lodge for more than 40 years. To many of the older ones of us, he will be most sadly missed, when the committee on propositions and grievances is announced. Who will take his place? His work on earth is over. In the Grand Lodge above we trust he is enrolled a member, and is fraternizing with those he loved so well and whose "seats were vacant before his own light was extinguished." The committee on Necrology will pay proper tribute to his memory as well as to that of the dead of our own and sister Jurisdictions.

To our own subordinate lodges, some of whose members have "like autumn leaves fallen to enrich Mother Earth," we extend our heart felt sympathy and a "Masons Prayer" for the bereaved homes, asking the "Father of the Fatherless" to shelter them under his protecting wings.

It is fitting that I should here chronicle the death of two other prominent North Carolina Masons, who while never members of this Grand Body; were nevertheless "true and loyal Blue Masons," who had won such distinction in some of the higher bodies of Masonry as to merit a place among our "distinguished dead."

One of these the Right Eminent, Carle Augustus Wood-

ruff; Past Grand Commander of Knights Templar of North Carolina; who entered the United States Army in 1861 as a second Lieutenant, was honored with a Congressional Medal of honor; and who steadily rising in his chosen profession of a soldier attained the rank of Brigadier General before his retirement in 1903 after 42 years of continuous service.

He was the recipient of many honors both in York and Scottish Rite Masonry, not only in this, but in other states, and was called to everlasting refreshment from his home in Raleigh on June 20, 1913.

The other was my good friend and Brother C. H. Wilmoth, of Charlotte, a man of so modest and retiring a disposition that his sterling worth and unswerving fidelity to all his trusts were known to few outside his immediate circle of friends, and his brethren in the local Masonic Bodies. He was loved by all who knew him and his record both as a citizen and a Mason attest the value of his life to the world at large.

"Whisper his name; but let him sleep in the shade
Where by the hands of his brethren his ashes were laid,
Silent and sad are the tears that we shed,
Like the night dew that falls on the stone overhead,
But the night dew that falls, though in silence it sweeps
Shall brighten with verdure the spot where he sleeps
And the tear that we shed; though in secret it rolls
Shall long keep his memory green in our souls,"

FOREIGN RELATIONS

The most cordial and friendly relations have been maintained throughout the year with all duly constituted Grand Lodges of Ancient Craft Masonry throughout the world. Many courtesies have been extended us by other Grand Lodges and when opportunity offered we have tried to be equally courteous.

Aside from communications with Grand Officers of Sister Jurisdictions upon subject matters of Masonic membership and conferring of degrees, the official correspondence of this Grand Lodge with other Grand Jurisdictions has been quite limited.

STATE OF THE CRAFT

I think I make no mistake when I say that Masonry in North Carolina was never so prosperous as it has been this year. Peace and harmony have prevailed in every section. It is true that a few little differences have sprung up between

lodges and between individuals; but they have been of such minor character and so easily adjusted that they merit no mention here.

The Grand Lecturer and his assistants have earnestly endeavored to spread the authorized work, yet there are many lodges who honestly think their work is up-to-date; but who nevertheless, would be very greatly benefitted by a visit from one of the Grand Lecturers.

The Grand Secretary's report will show the net increase in number of lodges in the active membership during the year. His earnest efforts and that of his efficient assistant is responsible for the most of this steady healthful growth.

CHARTERS

Three new lodges were chartered at our last Annual Communication, viz. Minneapolis No. 601, at Minneapolis, N. C., Queen City No. 602, at Rocky Mount, N. C. and Laurel Branch, No. 603, at Laurel Branch, N. C.

The Grand Secretary's report last year showed 408 active subordinate lodges. Three new lodges chartered this year and nine under dispensation seems a very satisfactory increase. Last year we had 22,214 affiliated Masons in the State. This year we have——.

I learned through the Grand Secretary's office that a pernicious custom prevails in some of our subordinate lodges, viz.: of only paying dues to the Grand Lodge on such members as are prompt in paying their dues to the subordinate lodge; reporting the tardy ones as suspended, then soon after settlement with the Grand Secretary going after these tardy ones, collecting their dues and restoring them to full fellowship, without action on the part of the lodge; thus

taking advantage of a technicality and depriving the Grand Lodge of a considerable sum each year which is justly due her. Brothren this is a pernicious custom and should not be tolerated. I most sincerely hope that the "New Code" will provide means by which this evil may be corrected. I learn that it prevails to some extent in several other Grand Jurisdiction.

DECISIONS.

As usual scores of questions have been asked as to Masonic Law and Custom by Masters and members of subordinate lodges during the past year, nearly all of them, however, could readily be answered by reference to the Code and to Andrew's Digest, to which reference has been made and page and number given wherever possible.

Would like just here to reiterate and emphasize the necessity of a closer study of the Code by the officers of Lodges; as has been so often urged by every predecessor.

I think I have only one case to report for which I did not have distinct ruling or precedent.

Mr. A. B. Living at W— many years ago, applied to the Lodge at W— and was rejected. Later later he moved to L— becoming a prominent citizen, active in church and state, the president of the local bank etc. Still anxious to become a Mason he applied to the Lodge at L— several times, but having been rejected at the Lodge at W— they still claimed Jurisdiction. Being asked to "waive Jurisdiction" they invariably declined, never more than one or two black balls appearing.

QUERY? Is a unanimous ballot required under such circumstances for waiver of jurisdiction? My ruling was that it was not. The code states that where two or more lodges are in the *same town*, having concurrent jurisdiction, that a unanimous ballot is required, then, per contra, where they are separate towns only a majority vote should be required.

Am I correct?

DISPENSATIONS

Numerous Dispensations for various purposes have been asked for during the year. In all cases, where the circumstances have seemed to justify, they have been granted. In a few cases, where the reasons for asking for them seemed trivial or illegal they have been refused.

I have in every instance striven to follow precedent

and the Ancient Landmarks and I think I have violated none.

Time does not suffice for me to go into details; but my records and correspondence are at your disposal.

SPECIAL COMMUNICATIONS

This does not include of course the regular meeting on St. John's Day at Oxford which was a most delightful occasion. One of the largest gatherings, I am informed that has ever assembled there. It would be well if a Committee from each Lodge in the State could visit the Orphanage at some time during the year.

MASONIC TEMPLE

I have nothing of special interest to report as to this "Home of the Grand Lodge." Its affairs have been managed judiciously and diligently. \$11,500.00 of its indebtedness has been paid off during the year. At this rate, it is hoped that the entire debt will be wiped out in six years more.

Its debt is only bearing four and one half percent interest. Great business sagacity, sound judgment and splendid management have been the chief characteristics of our Temple Committee. They are to be most highly commended. See their report for details.

THE OXFORD ORPHAN ASYLUM

The Oxford Orphanage will bring you a good report this year. Its financial affairs are in a very satisfactory shape. From every department, reports are most encouraging; showing a healthy growth and improvement.

A newly established department of domestic science and plain cooking supplies a deficiency which has hitherto existed in the general scheme of Orphanage work. It promises to be of great value, not only to the Institution itself but

in giving an opportunity for every one of our girls to be taught this useful art before leaving us.

The department of telegraphy is also doing most excellent work, in fact every department I think deserves "special mention" but I must refer you to the report of the Superintendent for details.

I must not leave this subject without mentioning the health record of the Institution which to my mind is simply wonderful. Only one case of pneumonia during the year, not a single case of typhoid in the past three years. Dysentery and diarrhoeal diseases; almost epidemic in the immediate locality, and yet not a single case of either in the Institution. Only two deaths in six years and one of those a boy who was *far gone* when he came to us. Brethren when we consider that these little ones more than 389 in number are not "selected cases," but are gathered from all classes of the "needy ones" throughout the State and that many of them must be subjects to inherent weakness, transmitted from parents who died young. I repeat it is simply wonderful.

These conditions as our superintendent truly says have "not come to us by chance" but are due, under the Divine Providence to the constant, faithful, intelligent and watchful care of our noble superintendent of health, Dr. T. L. Booth, ably seconded by the faithful co-operation of the whole corps of earnest workers to whom the welfare of these "innocent ones" has been intrusted. They have well earned our heartiest commendation. May God's blessings ever attend them.

The Board of Directors is seriously considering the admission of younger children. At present none is admitted under six years of age. If this age limit be reduced to three years, it would very greatly enlarge the scope of our present usefulness and save many young lives that must otherwise be lost.

The plans for this season seem to be eminently practical and when the time comes for its consideration I hope this Grand Lodge will look upon it favorably.

VISITATIONS

I have visited as many lodges as I possibly could. I am sorry not to have been able to accept all invitations; but under existing circumstances it was not possible. Where I have visited the courtesies have been so uniformly and graciously bestowed that it would seem ungrateful not to mention them: yet to do so in full would consume too much time and space,

sufficient to say that the memory of each visit will be cherished, not only on account of the hospitality and entertainment but on account of the actual knowledge and inspiration gained.

DISTRICT DEPUTIES

Some changes have been made during the year in the District Deputies on account of illness, resignation and similar causes. In most cases they have proven themselves active earnest and efficient workers. They have responded to every appeal and request with a willingness that was refreshing. I have not hesitated to call on them for the performance of such duties as I thought came within their province. There seems to be some confusion as to whom they should make their report. Only two reports have come to my hand to date, but these were, indeed gratifying. At our last communication the Grand Secretary was instructed to prepare and furnish them blanks on which to make report of their visitations and inspections. This he promptly did; but only two reports so far have reached me. Possibly, owing to the misunderstanding as to whom these reports should be made, others are in the hands of the Grand Secretary. I think this should be definitely decided and that these reports should invariably be made, either to the Grand Secretary or Grand Master.

CUSTODIANS AND LECTURERS

I have no formal report from this body for the year, but I know from observation that it has been a busy year for them. The work is being taught successfully and the lodges throughout the State are seeking instruction at their hands. I note that wherever one has been employed, enthusiasm has been rekindled and interest intensified. The subordinate lodges should be encouraged to avail themselves of the service of these teachers as often as possible.

GEORGE WASHINGTON MEMORIAL ASSOCIATION

It was my very great pleasure to exercise my prerogative and attend the third annual communication of the George Washington Memorial Association, at Alexandria, Va., on February 22, 1913. It was a most delightful occasion.

The objects and aims of this Association have already been brought to your notice several times. It is worthy of your interest and support. I presume Brother Cotten and Brother McKoy as your duly accredited representatives will

make a formal report, but there is one suggestion I will mention for your consideration.

President Shyrock suggested the appointment by each Grand Jurisdiction of one permanent representative for not less than three years, who in connection with the sitting Grand Master should represent that jurisdiction in the Association. This was with the view of having a part of the Association each year familiar with its work and actions and thus having practically a permanent working body. The suggestion was commended, but no formal action was taken, it being a matter which each Grand Jurisdiction should settle for itself.

MASONIC AND EASTERN STAR HOME

The crowning and tangible glory of North Carolina is the Masonic and Eastern Star Home. We were the pioneers in Orphanage work and we are proud of our achievements. Our Orphanage is the glory of Masonry and justly so.

If we take the bereaved and neglected orphan from the gutter and by our art and teaching transform him into a useful citizen it is a *good investment*. The State is greatly profited and Masonry banks in reflected glory. Like "bread cast upon waters," it returns to us "multiplied many times." If we bestow favors upon those who can and will reward us it is merely a *matter of business*, but if a sacrifice be made to assist those who are unable to help themselves, much less to help us in return, then and then only are we acting the part of the "Good Samaritan."

Each recurring annual communication of this Grand Lodge has been the occasion of renewed effort to provide this Home whereby we could make the declining years of our aged and dependent brethren, their wives and widows brighter and happier. Too much cannot be said of this great Institution, one of the most beautiful features of which is that those who enjoy its privileges are not "inmates" of a merely charitable institution, but are members of a home, guests of the Masons of North Carolina.

It therefore affords me peculiar pleasure to report that the home has at last been opened for the reception of guests and that in every way it is apparently in a flourishing condition. Under the efficient management of the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors composed of Brother C. M. Vanstory, Brother John J. Phoenix and Sister Gertie Woodbury, marvelous progress has been made during the past year and the Home has been transformed from a fond

hope" to a "beautiful and practical reality." Among so many active and efficient workers it would seem almost invidious to make any distinction, yet I cannot refrain from saying, and I believe that all agree with me, that the year's success largely due to the earnest work and constant effort of our "big-hearted" Brother John J. Phoenix, of Greensboro, God bless him.

Our faithful superintendent, Brother M. W. White of Mooresville,, has also proven a treasure, working with patience in "season and out of season." He has earned the gratitude not only of the Directors of the Home but of the entire fraternity. He and his good wife in the most kind and considerate manner are doing everything for the comfort of our guests possible.

For details of the work, and our financial condition, I must refer you to the report of the Board of Directors. Our home is completed and furnished. We have erected a complete water and sewerage system, electric light and power plant and opened the home for the reception of guests, but in order to do this we have assumed some obligations which must be met, hence I hope we will be treated liberally when we ask for an appropriation.

We have at present five guests happier and more content than they have ever hoped to be this side of the grave, and nine other applications under consideration. All of whom will probably be admitted at an early day.

The death of Brother W. H. McLaurin has left a vacancy on our Board of Directors; a noble man and a devoted Mason. His wise counsel will be sadly missed.

ORDER OF THE EASTERN STAR.

This Order, composed of the mothers, wives, sisters and daughters, grows in importance and practical usefulness year by year. It has been my good fortune to meet quiet a number of members of the Chapter of this Order during the year, and I am pleased to bear testimony to the sunshine and cheer they bring to us in our moments of relaxation as well as to their helpfulness in our labors.

They bring into closer touch the Masons wherever a Chapter Order of the Eastern Star exists. They have assumed the burden of two-fifths of the building maintenance of the home for the aged and infirm and right nobly have they fulfilled their obligations. Having contributed during the year more than \$1000.00 in cash besides having furnish-

ed quite a number of rooms and hundreds of minor necessities, such as linen, bed clothing etc.

Brethren I command this order to you. It has wrought "worthily and well" and should receive recognition and encouragement at our hands.

THE TOMB OF MONTFORD.

Among other visitations special mention should be made of my, "Pilgrimage to the Tomb of Joseph Montford at Halifax."

There can be little doubt but that this illustrious brother was the first and only Colonial Grand Master of America. The researches of Brother Harry T. Gowen, to my mind have very clearly demonstrated this fact; therefore all loyal Masons of North Carolina should revere his memory.

The precedent set by my predecessor Past Grand Master McCoy of an "Annual Pilgrimage" to his tomb by the Grand Master is to my mind a fitting and delicate tribute to the memory of this statesman, soldier and Mason.

I would like just here to give a sketch of this tomb and Lodge room and many interesting relics, so valuable on account of their antiquity; but space forbids and I refrain.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

I believe I have only one suggestion to make to this Grand Body and that is in the interest of my successors.

Section 4 of article one of the By-laws of the Grand Lodge reads:

"The Grand Master may appoint a private secretary and fix his compensation, provided it shall not exceed one hundred dollars per annum.

So far as I can ascertain this is the only provision made anywhere in the code for the expense account of the office of the Grand Master.

This state of affairs has existed far at least twenty years and in all probability twice that long.

Now my brethren, while, at the time this was incorporated in your By-laws; when there were less than one-fourth the number of Lodges and actively affiliated Masons in your state, this might have been entirely adequate, I submit that now, when your Grand Master is at the head of nearly five hundred subordinate lodges and nearly twenty-five thousand Masons the very flower of the citizenship of North Carolina, it is absolutely and wholly inadequate, either to provide

for the comfort or to support the dignity of the office he holds.

The records of your Grand Secretary and Treasurer will show that the expense account of the office for the past ten or twelve years has ranged from about three hundred and twenty-five dollars up to more than five hundred and I am sure that most, if not all of my predecessors have been compelled to supplement this expense account from their private purses.

My brethren this is not as it should be. The Grand Lodge of North Carolina is amply able to pay the expense of all its officers. Your Grand Master must sacrifice his business, his time and his comfort to visit subordinate lodges and exchange courtesies with sister Grand Jurisdictions. Besides the necessity for a stenographer or secretary, stationery, stamps, etc., there are numerous small expenses of which it is absolutely impossible to keep track and for which provision should be made by the Grand Lodge.

For these reasons I suggest that this Grand Lodge set aside the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600.00) annually, to be paid in installments of (\$50.00) dollars monthly, as an expense account for the office of Grand Master and that in addition thereto be allowed his actual travelling expense when on visitations; except on such occasions as where the bodies visited may justly and reasonably be expected to pay the same.

CONCLUSION

My brethren, the year's work is now almost completed, the designs are all on the trestle-board ready for your approval or disapproval.

In assuming the duties of this exalted office one year the consciousness of my unworthiness and inability would have been overwhelmed and disconcerting had it not been for the immediate and strengthening assurance of Past Grand Master, of their support, counsel and assistance.

My most sincere gratitude is due these distinguished brethren upon whose fund of information and experience drafts have frequently been made.

The constant help and assistance of our efficient Grand Secretary has been indispensable and to him and the entire official family I am under lasting obligations for their uniform courtesies, help and encouragement.

Mistakes and errors have been made, for which no man is free from errors. For those I again bespeak the broad mantle

of your charity. If anything commendable or praiseworthy be found, the credit is due to the inspiration afforded by your confidence in me as manifested by your signally honoring me; and to my constant and earnest desire not to be found entirely unworthy. Brethren I again repeat I have striven to do my duty and have no excuse to offer. The year is behind us, the future with all its possibilities lies before us. What are we going to do? May I suggest the consideration of the sentiment contained in the following lines with which I close.

“There are loyal hearts and spirits brave,
And souls that are pure and true,
Then give to the world the best you have
And the best will come back to you.

Give love and love to your life will flow
A strength in your utmost need,
Give faith and a score of hearts will show
Their faith in your word and deed.

Give truth and gift will be paid in kind
And honor with honor will meet,
And a smile that is sweet will surely find
A smile that is kind and sweet.

Give pity and sorrow to those who mourn
And flowers you will gather again,
The scattered seed from your thought outborne
When you thought the sowing in vain.

This life is the mirror of king and slave
And just what we are and do,
Then give to the world the best you have
And the best will come back to you.

Grand Secretary's Report

The Grand Secretary presented the following report which was read and referred to the Auditing Committee.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of North Carolina:

It gives me pleasure to lay before you my nineteenth annual report as Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of North Carolina.

I am glad to say that there has been some improvement in the promptness and accuracy of the Secretaries of the subordinate lodges in making their reports for the past Masonic Year, however, still further improvement is needed, and I hope these reports will be made with a greater degree of efficiency in the coming year.

NEW LODGES

New lodges have been established under the dispensation of the Grand Master as follows:

February 5, 1913, Riverside Lodge, at Catawba, in Catawba County.

March 3, 1913, Zebulon Lodge, at Zebulon, in Wake County.

March 3, 1913, Chadbourn Lodge, at Chadbourn, in Columbus County.

March 17, 1913, Dothan Lodge, at Dothan, in Columbus County.

April 21, 1913, Vaughan Lodge, at Vaughan, in Warren County.

June 2, 1913, Skyuka Lodge, at Tryon, in Polk County.

September 4, 1913, Glendon Lodge, at Glendon, in Moore County.

December 1, 1913, Grand View Lodge, at Grand View, in Cherokee County.

January 5, 1914, South River Lodge, at Autryville, in Sampson County.

The following lodges were continued under dispensation at the last session of the Grand Lodge:

You will see from the statement above that 1095 Master Masons were excluded and withdrawn during the past Masonic Year. As stated in my last report, there is no doubt but that a large majority of these brethren were good men and should have been retained as members of our Order, but

for the loose provision of our law on the subject of excluding members for non-payment of dues, and but for the neglect of some one in calling this matter to their attention, would have remained members of our Order, and would have made good Masons under other conditions.

In accordance with my usual custom, I bring forward the receipts and membership of this year and compare them with the receipts and membership of nineteen years ago, which will show the growth of Masonry in this State during that time.

In the year 1895 the receipts from all sources of the Grand Lodge were \$4,779.50. The total receipts for this year, as shown above, are \$20,248.50, which is an increase in receipts of over 400 per cent.

In the year 1895 the number of Masons in the State in good standing was 9,842. We now have a membership of 22,879, which shows that we have considerably more than doubled our membership. These statements show splendid growth both in receipts and membership, and should be exceedingly gratifying to every Member of our Order in the State.

CARD SYSTEM

In my last report last year, I stated that it had been my purpose for some time to prepare a complete card system, which would give the Masonic record and standing of every Mason in the State. I recommended that the Grand Lodge make an appropriation of \$600 for clerical help, to aid in the preparation of this work. Immediately after the session of the Grand Lodge last year I employed a young lady to assist me in this work. I prepared a Card on which we placed the name of the member of the lodge, and the name and number

of the lodge to which each member belonged. We took the the returns that had been sent in from all the subordinate lodges in the State and filled out a card for each member given in the returns. We then sent these cards, together with a number of blank cards, to the secretary of each of the subordinate lodges in the State, and requested them to complete the cards as far as possible and return them to us.

On these cards is to be given the date of initiation, passing, and raising of each brother; date of his affiliation, reinstatement, etc. We also asked for the date of the death, if deceased, of each brother in the State, and also for information concerning any brother in the State, also for suspended, or expelled. We also asked for the date of birth, and any other information that would be of benefit to the Craft.

We have gone to considerable trouble and expense in the preparation of these cards, and in sending them out to the secretaries throughout the State. Up to the present time only 122 lodges have filled out the cards and returned them to us. This you will see leaves 290 lodges that have failed to fill out these cards and return them.

As soon as the cards are returned from the secretaries of the subordinate lodges they are checked back through all the old files, and we add all the information that we can gather concerning each individual brother.

As fast as the membership cards of the several lodges are completed the cards are thrown into a general index alphabetically arranged. As soon as we get all of these cards back and get them completed we should have a full and complete Masonic record of every Mason that was ever connected with the Grand Lodge of North Carolina. We can then refer to this record at any time, and almost in a moment's time we will be able to give the Masonic record and standing of every Mason that ever lived in this State. This is a very important work, and will be very valuable to the Grand Lodge as the years roll on, and it is earnestly hoped that the secretaries of the subordinate lodges that have not yet filled out the cards sent them and returned them, will do so as promptly as possible, so that during the coming year this card system can be completed.

I recommend that the same appropriation be made for this purpose during the coming year, so that this card system can be completed, and the files put in proper shape.

Grand Orator's Address

The Grand Orator, Brother W. B. Love, was then introduced by the Grand Master, and delivered the Annual Address, which on motion was ordered printed in the Proceedings, and a vote of thanks was unanimously extended to the Grand Orator, Brother W. B. Love.

Most Excellent Grand Master and Brethren:

I appreciate fully the honor which our Grand Master has conferred upon me in asking me to speak to you this evening. The field, however, is so great that one becomes lost in its greatness when once he begins really and truly to study the great institution which we represent. I have selected, however, as my subject "The Badge of a Mason." I have selected this subject because the badge is the gift from the Fraternity, and the only material thing by which the non-masonic world can distinguish us. I have no eulogy for you this evening because you are Masons, because the real Mason needs none; I have no defense to make for Masonry because it needs no defense at the hands of any man. It has stood the test of ages and the world now concedes its purpose. It is true, that it is not the only institution of its kind, but it is the only one at whose door you must knock as an individual and uninvited before you can enter.

The history of the past, my brethren, is to a large extent the history of our institutions social, political and religious. Their teachings and the lives of the men who compose them mean the rise or fall of our commonwealth. Be their ideals pure and ennobling, it flourishes and is great, be they base and unholy, it decays and dies. It is impossible for these institutions to reach a golden mean and rest, for the mind of man is so constituted that it knows no resting place. It ever seeks its giver and the great or its seducer and the base. Mankind recognizing this has organized our social institutions to guard the life of the individual.

I grant you that the great personages of the world stand out as individuals but I declare unto you that that for which they stand is to a marked degree the fruits of their association with their fellow-men. The great histories of the past have been written by the historian as he sat alone in his study;

the great philosophies have been given expression to by the philosopher as he sat in some secluded spot; the great poems have been penned by the poet as he sat, perhaps, on the mountain side listening to the call of nature, or as he watched the hand of God as it played upon the waves; but when once the great history has been written, the great philosophy expressed, or the great poem penned, the author sits exhausted and alone. Take him then from his fellow man and he dies, but place him again where he can regain that vital life which comes from association only, and renewed energy springs up he goes forth to greater achievements, to nobler deeds. Mankind recognizing this has organized our social institutions, and among them none is more timely than Masonry. Founded upon that universal principle of brotherly love and recognizing the common worth of man, it has gone forth on its mission of help, not to Masons alone, but to the world at large. Having selected as its badge the lambskin, it has said to the outside world that its mission is pure, its purpose godly. And what it has said to the outside world it has said with a secret, but greater, meaning to its members as they knelt from time to time at its sacred altars. Its badge can never be misunderstood, its purpose never mistaken. It is the first gift to the Entered Apprentice, and if worn throughout an honorable life, 'tis placed by brotherly hands upon the coffin which contains his earthly remains. He then who enlists under such a banner goes forth to battle thrice armed because his cause is just.

Masonry is no longer operative but speculative, it deals no longer with stone, but its mission is to influence the lives and hearts of men. There is no possible construction you can place upon its obligations which justifies a man in living a life other than one of helpfulness and for the betterment of the human race. Nor is its field of action confined to the lives of those who possess its secrets, but its domain is the world. Its strong sympathetic arm reaches out to every man who lives under its influence, to the widows and orphans of every land. It is not a mere passive organization for the amusement of a band of men, but it is a real life-giving institution which undertakes and does things—not for self but for God and humanity. Like all great movements, it demands action, strong manly action; it demands men who can stand “four-square to all the winds that blow,” who can meet and mingle with men of action and give and get that which is best.

But in its real sense, Masonry helps most who help

themselves. It refuses to give returns to the Mason until something has been given; it is very emphatic in its demands for a strong sympathetic service, and to the man who puts most into it, to that man it gives most in return. It thrusts itself upon no man, and every man who is bound by its obligations is thus bound of his own free will and accord, but when once bound, manhood and common honesty demands that he live up to his teachings and that he put something into it.

Masonry knows no man for worldly wealth or honor; it recognizes the great truth that an honest man is the noblest work of God, and appreciates the spark of divine in every man. It places manhood upon a common plane, and all who would seek its secrets must travel the same road, meet the same opposition, and be raised by the same strong hand. And to my mind there is no grander, nobler sight than to see him to whom the great Master of the Universe has given much, take by the hand the fellow to whom less has been given, and by giving, lift him to a higher and a better life. 'Tis but emblematic of the lonely Gallilean as he leaves the throne of God to elevate the human race.

Masonry has no place for the little, selfish side of man, its secrets are dead to him who looks at life in that way. It looks for the man with a bigger soul, with a more universal spirit. It stops and stays with him only who sees in the betterment of the human race man's mission; who sees in the helpless widows and orphans at his door an opportunity to exemplify its teachings, who can take by the hand the fellow who is down and out, and put him on his feet, and send him on his way a better man. In fact, its teachings are wonderfully practical and God-like when once we recognize them. It gives to the individual a higher conception and a more definite mission.

But while this is the spirit of Masonry too few of us realize it; for no man can understand and appreciate it until he has pondered long and faithfully upon its teachings. Many a man has taken the obligations from the Entered Apprentice to the Master Mason and failed absolutely to understand or get that broader vision which they are intended to give. To that man Masonry is a failure. He fails not only to understand, but it is impossible for him to practice and appreciate its teachings. He is neither an active nor practical Mason, but a mere hanger-on. Such is not the fault of Masonry, but it is due to the fact that the Mason fails to mix thought and action.

If then we have sought admission into an organization

whose badge is an emblem of innocence and which exists not for selfish reasons, but for the betterment of humanity, it behoves us to understand its teachings; and when they are once understood, somewhere, in some way, and at some good time, the widow, the orphan, or the aged and infirm, will realize that life's pilgrimage has been made easier thereby, and the teachings of Masonry will have been exemplified.



Report of *The* Board of Directors of *The* Oxford Orphan Asylum

Brother G. Rosenthal, one of the Directors of the Oxford Orphan Asylum, submitted their report, which was read and referred to the Committee on Orphan Asylum.

To the Grand Lodge of North Carolina:

BRETHREN:—We herewith submit our annual report on the Oxford Orphan Asylum for the fiscal year ending October 31st last, and are gratified to inform you that the Institution has been blessed with another year of health and prosperity. There has been no epidemic of any kind and only one death, the second in six years, from an operation for an abscess on the lungs. This boy, Sam Davis, aged about 7 years had just recovered from an attack of typhoid fever when he was received. In June he contracted tubercular-pleuritis and after suffering for nearly three months was sent to Dr. McGuire, in Richmond who performed the operation without making any charge for this as well as several for appendicitis. Our thanks are due to him for his kindness and generosity.

In addition to these the late Dr. John R. Moss of Henderson, who left an estate estimated by Bro. A. J. Harris at \$25,000.00, provided in his will that his widow should receive the income during her life, at her death it is to go to his son-in-law, Mr. Arthur Vivian, and at the death of this

person the Oxford Orphan Asylum should become the residuary legatee.

Acting upon our recommendation made to your body a year ago, that a bill be introduced into the General Assembly increasing the State's appropriation from \$10,000 to \$20,000, such a bill was introduced and passed and we receive now the latter amount.

We have abolished the age limit in order to admit younger children, but to do this an additional building, especially adapted, will be required, also attendants and furniture. We hope to provide a part of the necessary funds from the earnings of the several departments and appeal to you for an increased appropriation to enable us to accomplish this most important work.

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The expenses of the Institution are constantly increasing, partly on account of the greater cost of provisions and material for clothing and to a very large extent on account of higher salaries and wages we are compelled to pay. Good teachers are in demand and receive compensation double the amount paid a few years ago. The tours of the Singing Glass have been very satisfactory and exceed our most sanguine expectations.

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In this connection we desire to gratefully acknowledge

the services of Miss Maxwell and Mr. Alderman, teacher and manager respectively of the class. We regret to have lost the services of the former.

A most valuable addition to the machinery of the Printing Office has been made by the purchase of a Linotype machine, costing \$2,800.00. This gives us a first class Printing Department.

The total expenditures for the year are \$45,492.07 of which the several departments and the farm have earned \$27,061.55 equal to 59½ per cent. We consider this a most excellent showing reflecting credit on the management. The Farm, Printing Office, Woodworking and Shoe Shop show handsome margins of profit as you will learn from the report of the Treasurer to which, and that of the Superintendent, we refer you for particulars.

The Executive Committee acted on 113 applications for admission of which 75 were approved, 19 disapproved and 19 referred to us. There are 322 children under our care, the per capita cost being \$94.01.

Our thanks are due and tendered to Superintendent Brown, Treasurer Bland, Miss Bemis, the teachers and all other employees for the efficient work they have rendered and the cordial co-operation they have given to the plans of the Board.

Report of Superintendent of Oxford Orphan Asylum

Brother R. L. Brown, Superintendent of the Oxford Orphan Asylum, submitted the following reports of the Superintendent and Treasurer of the Asylum, which were also referred to the Committee on Orphan Asylum.

To the Board of Directors of the Oxford Orphan Asylum:

GENTLEMEN :

The close of the forty-first year in the history of this Institution brings us many evidences of God's goodness and His guiding hand in its affairs. So often during the few years of my connection with this Institution, and especially during the past year, has there been so evidently the protecting hand of God's providence in the life of this Orphan Home, that it seems impossible to mistake the evidence of it. In grateful acknowledgement of His goodness, I wish thus publicly to acknowledge Him as the source of our help.

We have had a very good year. The financial interests of the Institution are in a satisfactory shape. From every department the reports are most encouraging, showing a healthy growth and improvement. I beg to refer you to the Treasurer's report for detailed information in regard to the financial condition of each department. In regard to the School and Cottage work, you will find information in Miss Bemis' report. Dr. T. L. Booth's report tells of health conditions. Dr. L. V. Henderson's report gives information in regard to dental work done for the children.

There have been a few changes in the heads of departments during the year. Mr. D. S. Kennedy, who was editor of the Orphans' Friend, resigned his position in September and Mr. F. M. Pinnix was engaged to take his place. Mr. Kennedy had made a most excellent editor and his services were highly appreciated, but he wished to get a course in

journalism, so left to enter Columbia University. Mr. Pinnix comes to us well fitted to perform the duties of his office. I wish to commend his services since he has been in charge, as betokening a useful career as editor of the Orphans' Friend.

Mr. J. G. Pendergraph, resigned January first to take a position in the western part of the State, and Mr. R. A. Rowe was elected to fill his place. Mr. Rowe has had considerable experience in his business and his work with us this year has been very satisfactory.

Dr. C. D. H. Fort resigned as Dentist in March and Dr. L. V. Henderson was elected to take his place. Dr. Henderson is well equipped for this position and his work has been well done.

We have with us the following new teachers, Misses Florence E. Mitchell, Annie Stanbury, Rosa Hamilton, and Mary Venable, all of whom are valuable additions to our faculty.

Mr. E. D. Fowler served us to the end of our fiscal year, but resigned to take a position with the Christian Sun Publishing Company of Elon College, N. C. To fill this position Mr. E. G. Hulse was employed to take charge of the Printing Office November first. Mr. Hulse comes highly recommended, and we believe is well equipped to look after the business entrusted to his care. His services thus far have impressed us with his ability and energy in the discharge of his duties.

It is gratifying to be able to report the very agreeable and pleasant relations which exist among the workers in all the departments. I would like to mention and commend each one by name, but this report would be too long if I should do so. They all have my most sincere thanks and commendation for the fidelity, courtesy and consecrated energy, which have characterized this year's work. This Institution was never blessed with a better or more competent corps of workers.

According to your instructions, at the June meeting, there has been established a department of Domestic Science

or Plain Cooking. This department is in charge of Miss Mary Venable, a graduate of Salem College. It is the plan to have this department supply a deficiency, which has hitherto existed in our work. Heretofore we have been able to teach only a small number of girls how to cook, but from now on each girl will be taught this useful art before leaving us. We expect this department not to do simply theoretical cooking, but to put into practice the knowledge of this art, eliminating any approach to fancy dishes. It has already proven a great help and will be a greater help as the children get more experience.

The play ground, which you authorized to be established, has been laid out. A baseball ground has been established, and some outdoor Gymnasium apparatus built. Not as much has been done along that line as is needed, but a very good beginning has been made. The boys have enjoyed it very much, and we hope you will sanction the erection also of some apparatus suitable for the girls to exercise on.

Since taking charge of this work, it has been our policy to try and improve the conditions of the various departments, paying special attention to that department most in need of it. As I have said in a former report the farm has demanded and received considerable attention during the past two or three years. This year's report will speak as to what has been accomplished. If the same policies are adhered to in the future, this Institution will have a great asset in its farm. The lands have been greatly enriched, and at the same time have produced paying crops. They are just now getting to the place where they can be made to show to some advantage the work which has been expended upon them.

The Printing Office is another department that has needed and received considerable attention. In the past eighteen months nearly six thousand dollars worth of machinery and fixtures have been added to this department entirely out of the profits of the department. We owe

about \$1,300 on the new linotype machine added in September. The old equipment was out of date, and in order to teach our boys the printer's art, so they can command good positions, when they leave us, we have thought it wise to equip our Printing Office with the most improved machinery. It is very gratifying to say that my efforts along these lines have met with hearty support from you and the Executive Committee. I gratefully acknowledge the liberal support you have always accorded me. We now have a printing office as well equipped as any office of its size need be, to do first-class job work. It would not be amiss however to suggest that some means be adopted for calling attention of the various Lodges of the State to our ability to furnish them their stationery and other printers supplies. While our business with the Lodges has increased we still receive orders from a comparatively small number of Lodges. We are now in position to furnish all Lodge stationery having recently made arrangements with one of the largest supply houses in this country to furnish us books and articles we do not print ourselves.

The Orphans' Friend had at the time of my last report 9,500 subscribers. I am proud to report that our list has now reached 11,500, and is still growing. There is decidedly more interest in our paper, and there is no reason why the subscription list should not grow to 15,000 before very long. This is our aim.

Our Wood Shop has done one of the best year's work in its history. The plan agreed upon to enlarge it, will be put into execution when the busy season is over. We hope to be able to make this even a greater means of assistance in supporting this Institution in the future than it has been in the past.

The profits of the Printing Office and Wood Shop have not been used in maintaining the children and have not been taken into account in making up the per capita cost. These funds amounting to \$6,646.37 have been used in the purchase of new machinery, stock, etc., in order to improve the effi-

ciency of these departments, and in affording them the necessary capital with which to do business. These departments are required to use their own funds to run their business on and these funds are kept in separate bank accounts from those of the general institutional work.

Electric motors have been installed on the sewing machines in our Sewing Rooms, which we believe have proven a great help to these departments. The electric dough mixer purchased for our Bake Room is also a great improvement over our former method of hand work. It is no small matter to work a barrel and a third of flour a day by hand, as we have been compelled to do in the Bakery heretofore.

The health of the children generally has been all that we could expect. There was one case which saddened the year's work. A little boy Sam Davis came to us in June. He was not strong when he reached here, having recently had a spell of sickness. It was not long after reaching here that he was taken with Pneumonia. He was sick for some time with this and when he got up it left him with pus on the lung. In order to relieve him, he was sent to St. Luke's Hospital, Richmond, Va. on September 26th, to be operated upon by Dr. Stewart McGuire. The poor little fellow never survived the operation. The doctor stated that he would not have lived long had the operation not been attempted. We have the satisfaction of knowing that we did all we could for Sam, and spared no expense to help him. He is better off. Dear little fellow!

There are many other matters which might with propriety be touched upon in this report, but I must refrain. Before closing, however, allow me to say the time has now come in the life of our work when I feel we should take an advanced step.

We have during these years been trying to improve and perfect our plant and organization, and can justly look with pride upon the success which our efforts have met with. But there is now work, I believe our Institution should undertake, which it is not doing. At present we only admit children as

young as six (6) years. I would respectfully recommend that the age be reduced to three (3) years and that arrangement be made to take care of a larger number of children, with special view to the admission and care of children from three to six years. This will necessitate additional room, especially adapted to the care of younger children than we now care for, and will also necessitate some plan to raise money to carry this into effect. We can take care of some additional children with our present income, if our Singing Class and other departments continue successful, but I do not think we should be expected to build additional houses out of our maintenance funds.

Report of Lady Supervisor

Mr. R. L. Brown, Superintendent:

DEAR SIR:—The past year shows several changes in the faculty, yet we are confident that the school has gained much in strength and efficiency. Recognizing the home and the school to be the important factors in education, we have faithful teachers mindful of the responsibility, who are giving their time and energies to the careful training of the children.

Our school aims to give to homeless children the best possible educational advantages. All who will avail themselves of the opportunities given may obtain a good education, and may extend their school course upon leaving the institution. Seven who left during the year are pursuing their studies in other schools of the State.

There are now twenty pupils in our eighth and ninth grades, and fifty-four in the seventh grade. These classes are much larger than in previous years. At the beginning of the school year in September, we added a half day to the afternoon sessions giving the fifth and seventh grades five

afternoons a week instead of four as had been the rule. This is a much needed change.

The importance of training in cottage life cannot be overestimated. Opportunities for consecrated work are increasing and it becomes more and more evident each year that the growth of the child in the development of stability and strength of character depends largely upon the loving spirit and consecrated efforts of the instructor.

The work in Manual Arts is increasing and there is an added interest in the subject that is most gratifying.

Exhibits of school work were held in December and June which proved very interesting and instructive.

With the funds collected from the sale of articles in this department, the school has purchased an academic lantern and a hundred slides for use in the grade rooms. This lantern is considered invaluable for school work.

The department of Telegraphy has thirty-nine students under instruction. One boy who will take a position in January is spending twenty hours a week in class room and office work. Students in the advanced class are giving eleven and a half hours per week. Other classes spend from two to four hours in practice.

Miss King, who succeeded Miss Hoffman last March as instructor, is doing excellent work.

The Department of Domestic Science is a new and very important branch of our school. As with the telegraphy classes, care has been exercised to have the hours for this work interfere as little as possible with other departments. Sixty eight girls are taking the course, receiving one lesson a week. Only five are needed for cooking at the kitchen, therefore very few of the girls have had the actual experience of learning to cook. With the introduction of classes in Domestic Science it is expected that all will in time receive instruction in this very important and useful branch of home life.

Report of Physician

Mr. R. L. Brown, Superintendent, Oxford Orphan Asylum:

DEAR SIR:—It is with a feeling of profound gratitude to the Father of the fatherless that I review the work of another year among those who He has placed under our care.

The same conditions of healthfulness which, under the guidance of Providence, we have learned to expect have continued through another year.

There has been one death since my last report. Sam Davis, aged about 7 years came to us in the early summer just up from an attack of typhoid fever.

Late in June he developed what proved to be tubercular pleuritis and after an illness of about three months we sent him to one of the most careful and skillful surgeons in the country for an operation which offered the only hope of his relief. He died the 26th of September. This is the second death among us in more than six years.

We had but one case of Pneumonia during the year—less than in any year since I have known the institution. There has not been a case of Typhoid fever since my last report—making more than three years since the last case in the Institution.

There have been no epidemic diseases among us during the year. From January 15th to April 13th it became necessary to isolate as far as possible the Institution from the town on account of an epidemic of measles existing in Oxford during that period, and, though some of the employees of the Institution who lived in the town, including the farmer, contracted the disease, we were successful in keeping it from among the children. Children from localities where measles existed were not admitted during that period.

Though dysentery and other diarrhoeal diseases were almost epidemic in this locality in the late spring and early summer there has not been a case of either in the Institution.

We have had one little girl to break her arm, and one boy to fracture his leg. One boy was severely injured by a

fall from the second story window of one of the cottages. There was one case—a boy—of septic poison from an infected wound of the foot. All these recovered without permanent disability or deformity.

In addition to these there have been about the usual number of minor accidents, cuts, bruises, etc.— which are not worth of specific mention.

We have had three cases of appendicitis requiring operation—two girls and one boy. For the care of these (without charge for his services) I desire to express my thanks to Dr. Stuart McGuire of Richmond, Va. They are all well now.

During the spring and summer we had Dr. J. W. McPherson treat 25 cases of throat and nose troubles, and Dr. B. K. Hays quite a number of eyes.

A few cases of hookworm have been treated since my last report. These are all among those recently admitted to the Institution. I do not believe the disease is ever contracted here. I desire to call special attention to the very low death rate in the Institution. The occurrence of two deaths in a period of six years, with an average during that period of 325 children is equivalent to two deaths in 1950 in one year, or to one death in each 975 per year.

Even if we do not consider the fact that these are orphans, many of whom must be the subjects of inherent weaknesses transmitted to them by parents who have died comparatively young, this would be a remarkable record.

Scarcely less worthy of mention is the phenomenal absence of epidemic, or the diseases known as preventable, such as diarrhoeal diseases, typhoid fever, measles, scarlet fever, diphtheria, etc.

These conditions have not come to us by chance, but rather because of the constant, intelligent and faithful co-operation of your whole corps of workers in the effort to reach and maintain the highest standard in everything pertaining to the welfare of these children, the most important of which are spiritual, mental and physical health.

We are not the fortunate wards of any special Provi-

dence in any other sense than that "God helps him who helps himself."

Nor are we the possessors of any special knowledge or unusual skill in these matters. What has been accomplished in this Institution can be accomplished in any community, or I might say every community in North Carolina by the expenditure of far less energy on the part of each individual member of such community than there is of individual effort in this Institution.

There is but one sanitary improvement which I desire to recommend in this report and I feel that I need only direct your attention to this, so patent is its need.

The use of the common drinking cup which may be, and frequently is, the medium through which so many undesirable things are communicated, should be prohibited in the Institution and sanitary drinking fountains installed.

Report of Treasurer

To the Board of Directors, Oxford Orphan Asylum:

GENTLEMEN:—I take pleasure in presenting herewith financial report for the fiscal year ending October 31, 1913.

As explained in last report, the funds are kept under two heads. "General" and "Special." The General Fund includes all moneys received and disbursed for the support and instruction of the children, also the expenditures for repairs and minor improvements. The Special Fund embraces all cash received and disbursed by the Woodworking Shop, Printing Office and Investment and Legacy accounts.

The average number of children, as the year before, was about three hundred and nineteen.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE

Brother Francis D. Winston, from the Special Committee to memorialize the Legislature and ask for an increase in the State's appropriation to the Oxford Orphan Asylum submitted the following report which was read and adopted, and a vote of thanks was extended to the Committee and the members of the General Assembly of North Carolina.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of North Carolina:

Your Committee appointed at the communication of the Grand Lodge, in January, 1913, in accordance with a recommendation contained in the report of the Committee of the body on the Oxford Orphan Asylum, charged with the duty of memorializing the General Assembly to increase the State's appropriation to that noble charity to the amount of \$20,000 annually, beg to submit their report:

The matter was most carefully considered, and presented to the General Assembly by Masons and others of our citizenship, who know the estimable work of our great institution at Oxford. The General Assembly with one voice raised the appropriation to the amount asked for.

The Committee wishes to acknowledge its obligation for the hearty co-operation and generous support of many Masters and Secretaries of lodges about the State, as well as to our brethren who were members of both branches of the General Assembly. They made our work a pleasure, and took from it the disagreeable feature of lobbying. This worthy proposition carried itself. A short historical reference to the efforts to unite the State with our institution in the support of this great work will be of interest.

In the year 1877 an appropriation was asked of the State. There was no organization and no special effort to accomplish this result. In 1879 the Grand Lodge for the first time seriously considered the subject, and decided that the appropriation should be made. When we name the Committee appointed by the Grand Lodge to memorialize the General Assembly in 1879, we are not surprised, and you will not be surprised, at the appropriation of \$3,000 that was made. The Committee was composed of brethren Zebulon B. Vance, then Governor of the State; J. M. Worth, then State Treasurer; Thomas S. Kenan, then Attorney General; Edwin G. Reade, then Past Grand Master and Supreme Court Judge; Eugene Grissom, Past Grand Master and Superintendent State Insane Asylum, at Raleigh. In

1881, the State's appropriation was raised to \$5,000 annually. In 1885, it was raised to the sum of \$10,000, and in 1913, to the sum of \$20,000. This generosity on the part of the State will in no way lessen our obligation to extend our equipment, and greatly enlarge our capacity for the great work we are doing at Oxford. We have but to do our duty as North Carolinians and as Masons, and the State of North Carolina will, when needed, double and quadruple the present splendid appropriation.

In making this report we wish to say to you and to the Brethren what we said to the members of the General Assembly when we asked for this increase, and that is that it was demanded and justified by the increased cost of living and proper maintenance of those under our care, as well as the widening opportunity for the Oxford Orphan Asylum to do a much greater work in making men and women of the fatherless and homeless boys and girls of our good old State.

REPORT OF GRAND HISTORIAN

Brother Marshall DeLancey Haywood, Grand Historian, presented the following poem as his report.

In lieu of a report the Grand Historian filed a copy of a historical ballad, contributed by him to the Orphans' Friend, of March 14, 1913, as follows:

THE MASONS OF '76

A tale of the Grand Lodge of America, at Halifax, North Carolina, which ceased work during the War of the Revolution in consequence of the facts that Provincial Grand Master, Joseph Montfort expired at the beginning of hostilities, Deputy Provincial Grand Master, Cornelius Harnett died in a British prison at Wilmington, and Provincial Grand Secretary, William Brimage was exiled for Toryism by the Americans.

Written by Marshall DeLancey Haywood, Grand Historian of the Masonic Grand Lodge of North Carolina.

In Halifax, renowned of old,
I've heard a stirring legend told,
How Masons of an ancient day
Were ruled by Montfort's gentle sway.

Their working-tools they wielded long,
Then closed the lodge with happy song;
Or 'round the table formed a ring
And drained the cups "to Craft and King."

Yet once when Montfort took his place,
A troubled look was on his face,
While Harnett, in his apron white,
Sat silent at the Master's right.

The visiting brethren, one and all,
Were welcomed to the spacious hall,
And Brimage made a record fair
Of all the Craftsmen gathered there.

"My brothers," said the Master old,
"Sad tidings for the Craft I hold;
The King, whom we have honored long,
Now seeks to do our country wrong.

"His forces march and take the field
To conquer all who will not yield;
His free-born subjects he defies,
And all their chartered rights denies.

"If for the King we take our stand,
We prove untrue to this fair land;
If to the land such help we bring,
We fight the armies of our king.

"I've told you this unwelcome news,
And listen now to hear your views;
In this, our sad perplexing plight,
Wise counsels yet may guide us right."

Then up rose Brimage in his place,
To Montfort bowed with courtly grace,
And to the Lodge, assembled there,
Hastened his homage to declare.

"Most Worshipful," he slowly said,
"In England I was born and bred,
And to this far-off western land
I journeyed at my King's command.

"Sworn to maintain his righteous laws,
If war must come, I'll back his cause;
Take heed, lest treason on you bring
The vengeance of our country's King.

"Forever honored be his name,
And may we all uphold his fame!
Call me a Tory if you will—
To King George I'm loyal still."

Then Harnett rose, with heart of fire,
By long oppressions aroused to ire,
And curses loud he showered down,
On all adherents of the Crown.

In scornful tones rang out his cry:
"Let cowards yield who fear to die!
But rest assured, my brothers all,
With freedom's friends I'll stand or fall.

"Our fathers, reared on English soil,
Were long inured to blood and toil;
They swept the Spaniards from the sea,
And formed here a country free.

"Shall we, the sons of such a race,
Our sacred heritage disgrace?
Better the goblet and the grave
Than creep on earth, a cringing slave!

Grand Master Warren gave his life
At Bunker Hill, in deadly strife;
And Masons here, in brave array,
Have fought where Caswell led the way."

Beneath the lodge's windows then
There moved a line of mounted men,
While countless bugles, ringing clear,
Awoke the echoes far and near.

A banner strange these horsemen bore
Which none had ever seen before;
Fair were its white and crimson bars
And azure field bedecked with stars.

Three gallant soldiers, Craftsmen all,
Now sought the old Masonic Hall;
And by their grips and tokens true
Soon passed the portals safely through.

Patten and Lamb, and Murfree too,
In uniforms of buff and blue,
With sabres dangling at their side,
All entered with a hasty stride.

"Short time for greetings have we here!"
Bold Patten cried, in accents clear,
"With our brave men we're riding post
To Washington's beleaguered host.

"From this old State, so dear to all,
Southward we heard our country's call;
And bloody fields the tale can tell
We tried to do our duty well.

"Our troops are camped within your town,
But, ere another sun goes down,
We'll strike our tents and northward go
To seek again the hated foe.

MASONIC TEMPLE

Brother A. B. Andrews, Jr., from the Masonic Temple Committee submitted the following report, which was read and adopted:

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of North Carolina:

Your Temple Committee is pleased to report another year of satisfactory progress.

As we stated in our last report, the Temple affairs have assumed a regular routine, and we feel more than ever that this Grand Lodge and the Temple Committee are both to be congratulated on the wise and prudent management that has attended every step connected with the management of this noble trust.

We are forced once more to call attention to the fact that some of those who signed pledge cards and agreed to make donations to the Temple have totally failed to comply with their pledges, and others have only paid in part. If we could collect the entire amount due on these pledges it would assist us very materially in soon paying off our entire indebtedness.

In 1910 the Grand Lodge appropriated \$7,500.00 per annum for ten years to the Temple Fund, or until the debt on the Temple should be paid off. In accordance with this action of the Grand Lodge, notes were duly executed for the above named amounts, and deposited with the Bank holding our obligation, in order to strengthen our credit. Four of these notes for \$7,500.00 each have been paid. This leaves six notes for similar amounts still outstanding, and the prompt payment of these notes when due will enable us to pay off the entire debt of the Temple.

During the year we had the books and accounts of the Secretary and Treasurer of the Masonic Temple Construction Company audited by an expert accountant, in accordance with our usual custom, and they were found correct and accurate.

You will notice this year another slight increase in rent receipts from the Temple. We believe, however, that another year will show decrease, because during the year two large office buildings have been erected in Raleigh, and about three

hundred new offices have been put on the market. Several of our best tenants have gone to these new buildings, and we have a number of vacant offices at the present time; therefore, we are fearful at this time that our net income from rents next year will necessarily show a decrease.

When we made our Annual Report last year the total indebtedness against the Temple was as follows:

During the year 1913 we have been able to pay off \$10,000.00 on our first-mortgage bond indebtedness, and \$1,500.00 on notes due in various banks. We have increased our second-mortgage bond indebtedness \$100.00, as two lodges that subscribed for second-mortgage bonds paid up the balance due by them during the year, and bonds were issued to them. The total indebtedness on the Temple at the present time is as follows:

It will be seen from the above statement that while our second mortgage bond indebtedness increased \$100.00, we reduced our first-mortgage bond indebtedness \$10,000.00 and reduced the amount due to the banks in the sum of \$1,500.00. This reduction in our indebtedness will enable us to save in interest alone \$600.00 during the coming year.

It will be seen from the above statement that this is the best and most satisfactory showing that your Committee has ever been able to make in any one year. The net results during the past year have been exceedingly gratifying, because it will be seen that we paid off during the year almost as much as in the preceding year, although we received a very small amount in donations and subscriptions.

We also give herewith a statement of our receipts and disbursements during the year. We had on hand when we made our report last year:

It will be seen from the above statement that while our rents increased during the year, we were compelled to pay out more than usual in repairing the building. This was

due to the fact that a number of our tenants moved out and have taken space in the new office buildings recently erected in this City. It, therefore, became necessary in getting new tenants in the building, and some of our old tenants desiring to move into other parts of the Temple made it necessary for us to make additional changes. This accounts largely for the item of \$932.33 charged to real estate account.

It will also be seen that we reduced our interest account during the year from \$4,099.80 to \$3,529.00, which is a saving in this item of over \$500.00.

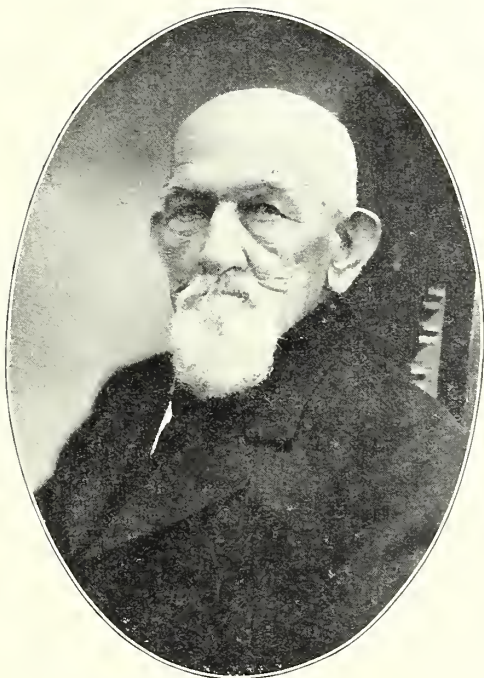
The gavel was duly accepted in appropriate terms by the Grand Master.

Second Day--Morning Session

Wednesday, January 14, 1914.

The Grand Lodge was called from refreshment to labor at 9:30 o'clock, a. m., Most Worshipful Grand Master, F. M. Winchester, presiding.

The Proceedings of the last evening's session were read and approved.

Brother John A. Collins, Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence, submitted his Annual Report, which on motion was received and ordered printed as an appendix to the Proceedings of the Grand Lodge.

Brother B. S. Royster, from the Special Committee on the Grand Master's address, presented the following report which was read and adopted:

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of North Carolina:

Your Committee to examine and classify the address of the Grand Master begs to report:

We are gratified to note that peace, harmony and prosperity exist in this Grand Jurisdiction, and we congratulate our Grand Master upon the splendid accomplishments of the past year. He has led with courage and wisdom; and the Craft has followed with loyalty and devotion.

The cry of the orphan has been heard and our chief pride, Oxford Orphan Asylum, is moving gloriously forward. With caring for and training indigent orphan boys and girls to take first place in the civic and religious life of the State, we have not forgotten those whose days of activity are over. The Masonic and Eastern Star Home at Greensboro is now ready to welcome and care for those of our ranks whose forms are bended under the weight of years. What a glorious companion for our Orphanage!

So much of the address as relates to Fraternal Dead, we recommend it to be referred to the Committee on Necrology; and so much as relates to Foreign Relations, Charters and Dispensations, Decisions, Oxford Orphanage, and Masonic and Eastern Star Home, we recommend to be referred to the several committees dealing with these subjects.

The recommendation as to fund for expense account of the Grand Master should be considered by the Committee on Finance or Accounts and Claims.

The hour for the special order having arrived, viz: the consideration of the adoption of the New Code, this matter was laid before the Grand Lodge.

The Committee on Code Revision submitted its report as follows which was read and on motion of Brother John J. Phoenix was adopted:

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of North Carolina:

Your Committee on Code Revision submits the following report:

At our last Annual Communication the following Resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED: That the Grand Secretary be directed to have 1,500 copies of the new revised edition of the proposed Code printed, and that three copies be sent to each subordinate lodge in the State, and that said lodges be directed to consider same as soon as possible, section by section, and report their action thereon on or before the first day of August, 1913, to the Chairman of the Committee, John C. Drewry, at Raleigh, N. C., and that the Committee tabulate the entire returns from the subordinate lodges and have same ready to submit as the action of said subordinate lodges at the next Annual Session of the Grand Lodge, with their report on the Code.

RESOLVED further: That all such sections that shall receive the necessary two-thirds majority of those voting shall be declared adopted, and only such sections as fail to receive the necessary two-thirds majority of those voting shall be considered at the next meeting of the Grand Lodge.

In compliance with the terms of this resolution, 1,500 copies of the Revised Code, as provided by your Committee, were printed, and three copies were sent to each subordinate lodge in the State.

We have repeatedly written the lodges and urged upon every lodge in the State to take definite action in regard to

this Code. Several lodges have written stating that it was impossible to get a meeting, and some have made the statement that they didn't know enough about Masonic Jurisprudence to take any action in regard to the Code, but that they were willing to leave the matter entirely to the judgment of the Code Committee. We have invariably written back urging the lodges to take final and definite action either one way or the other in regard to the adoption of the new Code.

Regardless of the fact that we have repeatedly written the lodges, yet at the present time there are 89 lodges that have made no report whatsoever concerning this important matter submitted to them by this Grand Lodge.

We are pleased to report that 323 lodges have reported, and out of this number 240 lodges have voted to approve the Code as a whole, as submitted by the Code Committee.

Immediately after the Code was sent out a letter was also issued by a committee appointed by the three Masonic lodges at Wilmington, setting forth the views of that committee. This committee and the lodges at Wilmington approved the Code almost entirely, except that part of it permitting an installed officer to resign.

There were thirty-three (33) lodges in the State that took the same view in regard to this matter, and adopted the Code in accordance with what we have been pleased to designate as the Wilmington Plan.

There were forty-two (42) lodges that adopted the Code as submitted, but with few minor changes, making certain slight amendments here and there, some of them only being clerical corrections.

Eight (8) lodges in the State disapproved of the new Code entirely, and desired to retain the old Code.

All of the correspondence in regard to the Code is now on file in the office of the Grand Secretary, and can be inspected and consulted if found necessary to do so.

It would appear from the above figures that a two-thirds majority of the lodges voting in accordance with the resolution adopted at the last session of this Grand Lodge, have approved of the Code as a whole as submitted by the Committee.

It will also be seen from these figures, we believe, that a two-thirds majority of all the lodges in the State have approved of every section of the Code, because the thirty-three (33) lodges that adopted the Code in accordance with the Wilmington Plan approved of every other section in the

Code and the forty-two (42) lodges that approved of the Code with minor changes adopted it with the Wilmington amendments added, and only eliminated some of the sections which were approved by the lodges acting upon the Wilmington Plan.

It will also be seen from this report that out of the four hundred and twelve (412) lodges in the State, 323 lodges have voted. This leaves 89 lodges that have not voted. We believe that it would be natural to suppose that had these lodges seen fit to vote a large majority of them would have voted to approve the Code, and we believe it would be reasonable and fair to assume that had all of these lodges voted the ratio of those approving the new Code would have been equally as great as it has been with those that have voted upon this measure, and assuming that proportion it will be seen that a very large majority of the lodges in the State approve of the new Code as submitted by your Committee.

I assumed the duties of secretary and treasurer of the Masonic and Eastern Star Home, on March 15, 1913, with full realization of the fact that I was undertaking something I had reason to believe was beyond my ability. I realized my weakness and was loath to accept such a responsible position. But having faith in my brethren throughout the State of North Carolina and appreciating the great honor that was offered me, I looked to the future with confidence and hoped for the best. I have given you the best that was in me, feeble though that may be, and now according to the custom, present to this honorable body my first annual report of my stewardship.

OUR HOME

I found on first investigation that we were in possession of a plant located near the City of Greensboro, N. C., on a tract of 25 acres, that represented an investment of over \$25,000.00. This Home had been built through the donations received from the Masonic and Eastern Star Bodies of North Carolina. Of the amount mentioned, the sum of \$10,000.00 was still unpaid, and is still represented by a first mortgage held by the Masonic Life Insurance Association, of Washington, D. C. The balance of the investment was raised through the able efforts of our Most Worshipful Grand Master, to whom every Mason in North Carolina should give the credit for bringing this Institution to a successful completion. To Doctor Winchester, the noblest Roman of them all, Masonry in North Carolina is indebted for a Charity that will live and be useful, long after all of us are "Buried beneath the silent clods of the Valley."

The building was completed, but without furnishings of any kind, and my first efforts were directed toward equipment. We also required a water system and sewage system. And I have devoted my first year to the task of installing these necessary units. The results are as follows:

FURNITURE AND FIXTURES

I issued an appeal to the Masonic and Eastern Star Bodies of the State, calling for donations for the purpose of furnishing the rooms. The response was far beyond my fondest expectations. The demand for the privilege of furnishing the rooms became so great that I fear some of our friends will have to wait until we add more rooms before we can assign them the privilege so eagerly sought. Every room has been provided for and this account shows a surplus.

These funds will be kept separate and at some future time, when the Home is added to, this fund will be drawn upon. The complete list attached will show the different bodies to whom rooms have been assigned. Upon each of these rooms will be found a silver plate appropriately inscribed. This will be a perpetual memorial to the fraternal spirit that prevails in the respective bodies.

THE WATER AND SEWAGE SYSTEMS

I attended the meeting of the Grand Commandery Knight Templars, held at Wilmington, in June, and presented to that body a prospectus of our Home, and informed the Templars of some of our needs. I was assisted in this effort by Sir Knight Vanstory of Greensboro and Sir Knight Woodbury, of Asheville and many others. The result of this appeal was the magnificent donation of \$500.00 cash to be applied on the water system and septic tank. The following week Brother Vanstory and myself attended the meeting of the Grand Chapter Order Eastern Star, held at Greensboro and with the able assistance of Brother Woodbury, his wife, and other members of the Eastern Star, we lay our wants before this body and were rewarded by a donation of \$1,000.00 to be used in connection with the Grand Commandery donation, in building a complete system of water works and sewage. These plants have been completed and experts have informed us that we have the most sanitary septic tank in Guilford County and our water pressure is equal to that of Greensboro. The superintendent of health of Guilford County, Dr. Jones, has given us a certificate that our sewage system fully complies with the law, and has taken our plans as models for others to erect similar plants.

THE GENERAL FUND

Our appeals for money for the General Fund have met with satisfactory response and I refer you to the itemized list for complete data on this subject. I cannot say too much in praise of the loyal support that has been received from the A. F. & A. M. lodges throughout the State. Of the 408 lodges 117 have made a donation of some money during the year and those that have not I am sure will do so just as soon as their circumstances will permit.

DEATH OF MEMBER OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Death Angel invaded our official family and claimed that splendid Masonic character, that noble Confederate

Veteran, Brother W. H. McLaurin. Brother McLaurin has been a member of the board for many years and his wisdom has contributed largely to the success of our Home. He was called to his reward, and in his passing Masonry has lost one of her most priceless jewels. It may be truthfully said of this good man: "He lived to bless mankind."

THE OPENING

Our Home was formerly and officially opened for the reception of guests, Monday, January 12, 1914. Any Masonic or Eastern Star Body in the State of North Carolina, may petition the Institution for a prospective guest. The Masonic Bodies of the State are respectfully invited to write for blanks at any time. We cannot negotiate direct with the individual, as the Home belongs to the Masonic and Eastern Star Bodies of the State, and they alone should have control of the privilege of admission.

It will be a pleasure for me to impart information to any representative at this meeting.

THE FUTURE AND RECOMMENDATIONS

We have an Institution we should be proud of—and an Institution I am confident the future has great use for. Throughout the United States, state after state is erecting these homes. I am gratified that North Carolina has taken her place as a practical exponent of this duty to our dependent ones.

Our Home is just in its infancy. There is a great deal of work to do before the Home will be fully complete, and to carry out the necessary work will require large amounts of money during the next few years.

I have carefully prepared a budget of our prospective wants for 1914, and respectfully appeal to my brethren for the funds necessary to carry on our work. Our first effort should be to liquidate the \$10,000.00 bonded debt. The interest charge of \$500.00 each year is a great burden.

HOSPITAL

I recommend that this Grand Body appoint a committee of three to investigate the advisability of building a Hospital building and operate the same in connection with our Home. We find that old people are constantly in need of both medical and surgical treatment, and in addition I recommend that this Hospital be considered on the basis of accepting

as patients any member of the Craft throughout the State, the services to be free of cost to all Masons and Eastern Stars. I believe many lives would be saved among our membership if a hospital was available without cost. The usual fees at hospitals are so great that many of the brethren suffer and die for the want of professional treatment.

RECENT DONATIONS

We have been fortunate during the past month in being remembered by the higher bodies of Masonry throughout North Carolina. Oasis Temple Mystie Shrine of North Carolina has made a donation of \$500.00. The Scottish Rite bodies of North Carolina have also remembered the Home during the year, \$300 being donated in the spring and \$600 during the past month, by Casolin Consistory, No. 1, of Charlotte. And the donations received from the Royal Arch Chapters, the Knight Templars, the Council Royal and Select Masters, the Anointed High Priests, and the Eastern Star bodies, have been gratifying. I cannot refrain from making special reference to the great interest taken in our Home by the Masons of Charlotte, Raleigh, Winston, Asheville, and other large cities of North Carolina. The Fraternity in these enterprising and progressive cities have demonstrated to the Craft that they are interested in our Home. Every Masonic body in the City of Charlotte has made a donation; from the A. F. & A. M. lodges, the Royal Arch Chapter, the Commandery Knight Templars, the Scottish Rite bodies, and the Eastern Stars. This interest is ample evidence that the labors of our esteemed Grand Master has met with favor within his own circle of Masonic and Eastern Star Friends, and I assure the Masons of Charlotte that the Craft throughout the State have repeatedly mentioned the fact that Masonry in the Queen City was practical, liberal, and believed in helping the unfortunate members of our Fraternity.

CONCLUSION

In conclusion I desire to express before this distinguished body of representative Masons, my sincere thanks for the generous support that has been given me by so many Masonic and Eastern Star bodies in our State. To those who have not helped this Home I extend a cordial invitation to visit and inspect what has been provided for our unfortunate brethren, and I am sure our Home will have your moral and financial support in the future. The large personal donation made by brother W. H. Woodbury and wife of Asheville of \$500, is worthy of special mention. Mr. Ceasar Cone, of

Greensboro, has also made a donation. The support of such influential people is a great inspiration and I predict greater results from wealthy members in the future than have as yet been recorded.

The superintendent of our Home, Brother M. W. White, and his wife have instructed me to extend an invitation to all Masons and Eastern Stars to visit the Home at any time. I hope every lodge in the State will appoint a Home Committee of one, to whom the secretary of the Home may carry on correspondence relative to the Institution. I also request this Grand Body to include our Institution in your organization.

To the members of the Board of Directors elected by this Body I desire to express my thanks for the able manner in which they have discharged their duties. They have at all times been willing and ready to contribute their valuable time and good counsel.

And to our Most Worshipful Grand Master, I can scarcely find words to express myself. To him more than to any one man is the honor due. Never faltering in his efforts, he has pressed onward in his efforts to give Masonry this Home for her worthy unfortunate brethren. At a sacrifice of his personal affairs he has given over ten years of his life to our Institution. You have honored him with the highest gift within your power and he has justly earned this honor. And I wish to thank Brother Clymer and the Masons of my home city, who have ever been ready to render assistance. To Brother Clymer great credit is due for the many details of building and this Grand Lodge should recognize this good brother for his zeal and fidelity to the Home. Brother Vonnestory, the Chairman of our Executive Committee, has also given me great assistance during my term of service and I feel under many obligations to him. Also Brother White our superintendent and his faithful wife. Both have contributed to the success of our Home.

My brethren, we are one and all engaged in a noble work and time alone can and will crown our efforts with laurel leaves of victory. We are contributing to a work that will make our noble order a shining light in the world's future progress. Our duty is plain. Modern life is so fast and furious, the extending of brotherly love must be delegated to our fraternal organizations. Masonry, ever practical, and ever abreast with the times, is measuring up to the occasion. May she continue to do so! Our greatest monu-

ments before men are: The Oxford Orphanage and the Masonic and Eastern Star Home.

With one hand we grasp the fatherless children and with the other we now grasp the hand of our worthy, though unfortunate, brothers and sisters and hold both up before our admiring world, as living and concrete examples of our practical conception of Friendship, Charity, Benevolence, and Love.

RESOLVED 2.: That the Grand Master appoint a committee of five to take charge of this movement, consider and devise the best methods of raising this fund and report at the next Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge; meanwhile, said committee be authorized to raise funds for treatment of those indigent Masons who need it.

RESOLVED 3.: That the Grand Lodge appropriate five hundred dollars to be used for treatment of indigent, tubercular Masons during the present year, in so far as may be deemed necessary by a committee composed of the Grand Master, Grand Secretary, and Dr. W. S. Rankin.

We, your Committee No. 2, on Charters and Dispensations, beg to report further that Tally Ho Lodge, No. 393, at Stem, in Granville County, prays the Grand Lodge to allow them to change their name from Tally Ho to Stem. We recommend that this change be allowed, they retaining the number 393 and purchasing a new seal.

Also that Charters be granted to Chadbourn Lodge, at Chadbourn, in Columbus County, and Vaughan Lodge, at Vaughan, in Warren County.

We also recommend that Dothan Lodge, at Dothan, in Columbus County, be continued under dispensation.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of North Carolina:

Your Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence to whom was referred the decisions of the Grand Master, referred to us his address, beg to report:

Article 10, Section XIII, of the Code, fully sustains the ruling of the Grand Master, and your Committee, therefore feels constrained to approve the ruling, though it feels that the law is unfair.

Your Committee is glad to know that Regulation 173, page 110, of the new Code eliminates the doctrines of perpetual jurisdiction, ours a rejected *profine*, and brings the law in harmony with the principles of justice.

RESOLUTION OF BROTHER A. S. HOLDEN

Upon the resolution of Brother Holden, your Committee recommends the following as a substitute for the same.

Strike out Section 89 of the new Code and substitute the following:

“An installed officer may, with the consent of his lodge, and the approval of the Grand Master, resign his office in the lodge.”

The adoption of this substitute will simply have the office of re-enacting Section 14 Article XVI of the old Code, which we think should be the law.

It is sad to reflect and difficult to appreciate that after passing safely through the dangers incident to childhood and youth, having arrived at man's estate in full possession of health and vigor, with intellect enriched with knowledge and wisdom, well equipped to give others the benefit of their learning and richly stored minds, without a moment's warning, they are gathered to the land of their fathers, and all their rare attainments of mind, achieved by years of study and experience, are lost to the world, and there is left only the example of their noble lives as an incentive for the living to emulate.

The lives of those brethren who have given up life's struggle and laid down to pleasant dreams, who were endowed with divinely given powers, and ennobled manhood, at once so strong and worthy of grateful imitation, should prove a helpful study, and exert an uplifting influence upon the present and coming generations. Thus would we perpetuate the memory of those faithful and talented brethren, who, having devoted many years of their useful and busy lives towards the upbuilding of symbolic Masonry, have passed out from this life into the great beyond, leaving their good deeds to shine as beacons to light the pathway of those who are left behind and those who shall come afterward.

The orphans' friend

April 12, 1913, by the death of Brother Schäum, the most useful member of Winston Lodge, No. 167, was called from labor to refreshment, one whose purity of life and rectitude of conduct was a never-ending argument for nobler

deeds, higher thoughts and greater achievements. He was a noble Craftsman, the loss of whose society and companionship came to each of his brethren as a personal bereavement, and is a sufficient reason for attempting to pay the tribute which affection demands and which we can only hope to inadequately express.

For almost a generation he was Chairman of the Oxford Orphan Asylum Committee for Winston Lodge, and perhaps no other Mason in the State had, through his own personal efforts, collected so large contributions for the maintenance of the institution whose interests were always on his mind and heart. It was his daily joy to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, and provide for helpless orphans. Nature seemed to have left him childless in order that he might be a foster-father to the many hundred boys and girls who, during the last quarter of a century, have gone in and out from the institution he loved so well. As a memorial, the annual Thanksgiving and Christmas offering collected from the Masons and friends of Winston-Salem will hereafter be called "The Fred G. Schaum Fund."

We recall with pleasure his fidelity to the principles of the Order, and we trust that those who survive may take up and carry forward to a larger fruition the important work to which he gave so much valuable time and earnest thought, and that the remembrance of his commendable example may awake in their hearts something of the tender compassion shown by him to those in need and distress. We shall long remember his stern integrity of character, and the earnestness and zeal he displayed in promoting the noble ends for which Masonry exists.

For long years he was our familiar associate, one upon whom we could lean for counsel, who breathed words of encouragement into our ears, and stimulated our ambition to strive to show who could best work and best agree in advancing the work which God has given Masonry to do.

We pause in our labors to pay tribute to his worth as a man and as a Mason, to recall his faithful work and dwell upon his virtues.

A. HAYWOOD MERRITT

A. Haywood Merritt was born in Chatham County, near Chapel Hill, North Carolina, on July 18, 1832; died in Mt. Airy, North Carolina, November 14, 1913. Twenty-seven years of his life were spent in the town of Pittsboro, he being the editor of the county paper, and principal of the Pittsboro schools. In the year 1900 he moved to Mt. Airy, which place he made his home until his death.

For many years Brother Merritt was a Trustee of the University of North Carolina, his Alma Mater. For twenty-seven years he was superintendent of the Methodist Sunday School at Pittsboro. For one or two terms he represented his County as State Senator. For nearly sixty years he was a faithful and enthusiastic member of the Masonic Fraternity. In the passing of our distinguished brother, the State at large loses one of her prominent citizens—a champion of righteousness and temperance, an educator, and a scholar of distinction. The Grand Lodge of North Carolina loses a member whose knowledge of, and zeal for, the principles and traditions of Freemasonry have meant much in the perpetuation of its life and interest in its growth. The church has lost a valuable and faithful member. Brother Merritt was above all a christian gentleman. His life and his deeds are a priceless heritage.

REV. JOHN A. GILMER

Rev. John A. Gilmer, of Mount Airy, North Carolina, died October 20, 1913, at the age of 56. He was born in Guilford County, the son of Joseph and Nancy Gilmer. When a young man, he was graduated from Davidson College and entered at once upon the profession of teaching. He taught at Morganton and Henderson and made a splendid reputation as an educator. After taking a theological course, he entered the Presbyterian ministry in 1900. His first pastorate was in Rowan County, where he did a successful work. Following that, he was pastor of the Presbyterian Church in Mount Airy for six years. There also his work was eminently successful.

Brother Gilmer was a member of Granite Lodge, No. 322, of which he was Chaplain at the time of his death. He was a useful and upright citizen, a loyal Mason and a faithful and learned minister of the Gospel. His death was a distinct loss to his section of the State. His knowledge of Masonry, his zeal for the Order and a life in every way con

sistent with its noble principles won for him a high degree of popularity and influence in his lodge and among Masons wherever he was known.

The value of a life like that of John A. Gilmer can never be estimated. Masonry shares with his State and his church in the benefits of his life. He added dignity and honor to every institution to which he belonged. After serving well with the Craft below, he has gone to that celestial Lodge above, where the great Architect of the Universe presides.

WILLIAM H. McLAURIN

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of North Carolina:

The last matter of business which this Grand Lodge transacts before it closes in ample form at each January communication is the announcement of the standing Committees for the ensuing Masonic year. For a quarter of a century—since 1889—we have always heard Brother William H. McLaurin named as a member of Committee No. 1, on Propositions and Grievances. This name we shall hear no more except in memory.

Friday, August 22, 1913, this faithful and beloved brother was called from earthly darkness to light eternal, and it becomes a duty we owe to ourselves as well as to his memory to place upon our records a tribute, however inadequate, to his Masonic virtues and personal worth.

“Captain Billie” as Brother McLaurin was affectionately called by his friends and neighbors, had passed the fateful three score years and ten of scripture, but we all remember him as erect, strong, vigorous and active. He was a brave and gallant officer in the Confederate army, and on many occasions so distinguished himself that he received the highest praise from his official superiors for valuable and meritorious service. It is said of him that he was so fond of fighting that he was never so happy as when in the heat and crash of battle.

Since those memorable days he has worn the worthy garlands of a modest, patriotic and unselfish private citizen, though always a soldier in spirit, willing and eager to battle for the right. Kindly of heart, a warm friend and congenial neighbor, he lived a correct and consistent Christian life, loved and respected by all who knew him.

As Masons we honor his memory for his unswerving attachment to the principles of our ancient and honorable Order, and we earnestly commend the uprightness, integrity and piety which characterized his long and useful life, and

the ardor, zeal and faithfulness with which he invariably discharged every duty imposed upon him by this Grand Lodge. His was long a familiar figure in our councils. Honest, frank, always ready, we shall miss him greatly and deeply mourn the loss the fraternity has sustained.

He was a sturdy and fearless Confederate and Masonic veteran, stern in his advocacy of the right, yet when occasion demanded, as kindly considerate and tenderly affectionate as a woman. Living, he enjoyed the happy reflections consequent on a well-spent life, and passed peacefully away in the firm hope of a glorious immortality.

We know his light is not extinguished, but trimmed and brightly burning, has merely been removed from these dim outer courts into that sanctuary to shine eternally, and where the ever-dwelling Shekinah sheds a blessed radiance before which the mists of error, the gloom of ignorance, and the darkness of prejudice have forever flown away.

CARLE AUGUSTUS WOODRUFF

32 Degree Mason

Carle Augustus Woodruff, 32 degree honorary, Brigadier-General in the United State Army, and one of the best known Masons in the United States, died at his home in Raleigh, North Carolina, on Sunday, July 20, 1913. He was a native of the State of New York, born in the city of Buffalo on the 8th of August, 1841. He came of a family famous in both civil and military life. His father, Brevet Brigadier-General Israel Carle Woodruff, was an officer of distinction in the regular army. Among his more remote ancestors were Hon. Aaron Dickinson Woodruff, for forty years Attorney-General of New Jersey; and such Revolutionary patriots as Commander Elias Woodruff, Lieutenant-Colonel Thomas Lowrey, and Captain Israel Carle, of the same State. He was also lineally descended from Thomas Mayhew, Governor of the Colony of Martha's Vineyard in 1671.

A good deal of the early life of Carle A. Woodruff was

spent at army posts where his father was stationed, and his own name was borne on the register of the army as an officer for more than half a century—forty-two years of active service, and ten years on the retired list. On October 19, 1875, General (then Brevet Lieutenant-Colonel) Woodruff was united in marriage with Miss Effie Hicks Haywood, a daughter of the late Dr. Richard B. Haywood, of Raleigh, and claimed North Carolina as his legal residence from that time until his death. During periodical visits to Raleigh, while actively serving in the army, he made countless friends, and took up his permanent abode in that city after his retirement in 1903. Among his friends none were more cherished than the Confederate veterans against whom he had contended on the field of battle during the War between the States. On more than one occasion he was an honored guest at meetings of the local Camp of Confederate Veterans in Raleigh. He was a member of the Loyal Legion, the Sons of the Revolution, and other patriotic orders.

General Woodruff was a man of stainless character in all relations, and a devoted Christian. He was a communicant of Christ Church, in the city of Raleigh, and served that parish as a vestryman until failing health necessitated his resignation. He was much interested in the Layman's Missionary Movement, and presided over one of the sessions of that body which assembled in the Church of the Good Shepherd in Raleigh.

General Woodruff was known as the Father of Scottish Rite Masonry in the Army, and his Masonic services in North Carolina were long and varied. Both his military and Masonic records are so highly distinguished that we beg leave to subjoin them hereto under separate heads; and request leave to print.

The hour for the special order having arrived, viz., the consideration of the Report of the Masonic and Eastern Star Home, this report was laid before the Grand Lodge. Brother M. C. S. Noble was recognized and addressed the Grand Lodge in strong and earnest terms concerning the Home. Brothers W. C. Lyon, R. N. Hackett, J. J. Phoenix, and F. M. Winchester, also spoke feelingly in behalf of the Home. A roll call of the lodges was then made, and a goodly sum was pledged for the support of the Home.

Brother R. N. Hackett then called up his resolution calling for an appropriation by the Grand Lodge of \$500.00 for the care and treatment of indigent Masons afflicted with tuberculosis at the Montrose Sanitarium. He made an earnest

appeal to the Grand Lodge for this appropriation, and was ably supported by Brother W. S. Rankin, Secretary of the State Board of Health. After the discussion a vote was taken on the resolution, and it was unanimously adopted.

Brother Geo. S. Norfleet, Chairman of the Committee on Orphan Asylum, presented the following report, which was read and adopted:

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of North Carolina:

Your Committee on the Orphan Asylum, submits the following report:

1st. That the appropriation of \$5,000.00 be continued for the year 1914.

2nd. Our thanks are tendered to the Committee who secured the increased State's appropriation.

3rd. The Board of Directors having abolished the minimum age limit, it becomes necessary to erect a new building to care for at least 30 young children, and we recommend an appropriation of \$4,000.00, payable \$2,000.00 in 1914, and \$2,000.00 in 1915 to supplement the amount the Asylum can furnish for that purpose.

4th. We commend the establishment of a Domestic Science Department in which 68 girls are taught at present the art of preparing plain food.

5th. The setting aside of a play-ground and the erection of apparatus on same is bound to be conducive to the health of the pupils and is heartily approved by your committee.

6th. We are gratified to note the large increase in the circulation of the Orphans' Friend which has been almost doubled within the last two years, which increase is largely due to the efforts of Mrs. E. B. Farmer, the representative of the paper and we suggest that the Committees on the Oxford Orphan Asylum of the lodges give her their hearty support when she visits their towns for the purpose of soliciting subscribers.

7th. The Singing Class has been eminently successful in its tours during the year and we return our thanks to its members, Miss Maxwell, the teacher, and Mr. Alderman, the manager to whose combined efforts this success is due.

8th. We cannot too highly commend the Board of Directors for the election of Brother R. L. Brown, as Superintendent, whose success in the management of the Institution has worked wonders in every department and the thanks of the Grand Lodge are due to him, the officers and employees

for the earnest and undivided attention they have given to the important work entrusted to them.

Your Committee on Propositions and Grievances No. 2, respectfully report as follows:

1st. Pleasant Mount Lodge, No. 441, tried and expelled Brother J. I. Handy, a dimitted Mason. In the opinion of the Committee after earefully considering all evidence, and the record in the case, the evidence fails to sustain the charge and the verdict of the lodge should be set aside leaving Brother Handy entitled to the privileges of a non-affiliated Mason.

The District Deputy Grand Masters made reports as follows:

MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR:—I am enclosing herewith reports of inspection made by me of the various lodges of this District which I have visited during the year. It has been my privilege and pleasure to visit the lodges covered by the reports, and of the condition of those which I have not been able to visit in person, have kept myself informed.

Masonry in the District has enjoyed a steady and consistent numerical growth.

Roanoke Lodge, No. 203, Weldon, N. C., has taken on new life, and with the impetus given it by the lectures of Brother J. W. Rowell this lodge is doing good work.

Widow's Son Lodge, No. 519, Roanoke Rapids, has added to its membership during the year a large number of the best men in that community, all of whom have pledged themselves to work for the good of the Craft. In fact practically all of the lodges of the District have added substantially to their membership, and the personnel of such new membership is far above the average, indicating that the brethren have at last realized that the ballot box is not merely a means of election but for protection as well.

I would that I could report that harmony prevails throughout the District but candor compels me to admit that this is not true. Among some of the brethren there are dissensions and misunderstandings, personal in themselves yet of sufficient importance to disturb the peace and harmony of the lodge and detract from its strength and support. In each instance that has been brought to my attention I have advised such action as I thought best in the premises, and I believe that if the Masters of the respective lodges will handle these situations in a firm yet diplomatic manner that peace, friendship, and brotherly love, which has always characterized the fraternity of this District, will be restored. It is well worthy of mention that, in a large majority of instances in which misunderstandings have occurred between the brethren, it has been between those who are not regular in their lodge attendances, and consequently those whose interest in Masonry has become dormant. A brother, fresh from the lodge room where he has witnessed the beautiful ceremony of opening and closing, where he has paid heed to the candidate solemnly making his vows, where he has heard the charge admonishing him to walk uprightly in his

several stations before God and Man, such a brother is not so prone either to forget or to violate those obligations he has so voluntarily assumed.

Yet I would not have you to believe that Masonry in this District is on the wane. The splendid personnel of the new membership as well as the glorious activities of the older members of the Craft throughout the District and brotherly love and charity in relief and in truth refute such a statement.

We have had the pleasure during the year of having with us in the District the present Grand Master, whose visit to us, though he came for the purpose of conferring the higher degrees of the Scottish Rite, was an inspiration to the prominent Masons from the Eastern section of our State, who gathered for the purpose of paying their respects to their distinguished Grand Master. Again later in the year, we heard, with equal pleasure, Past Grand Master Winston as he delivered a stirring speech on Masonry to the Knights of St. Aldemar Commandery, No. 12.

On account of severe and protracted illness in my family during July, August, September and a part of October, we were not able to have the District meeting as I had planned. We hope to have this meeting during the early Spring.

None of us do what we could do or what we should do for the good of the Craft and I least of all. Yet I love Masonry, its symbols, its ceremonies, its teachings and its aims. I realize that there are those who practice its teachings and live up to its principles as best they can and be consistently human. And, on the other hand, I realize that there are those of us who observe our obligations more in the breaking than in the keeping. In these respects the brethren of my District are not different from those of any other District in this Grand Jurisdiction.

I regret exceedingly that my reports from the lodges of the fifth Masonic District have in some way gotten lost in the mail and I submit this general report instead:

The lodges in the fifth District have been in good shape during the year, and have made substantial gains. There

has been unusual peace and harmony prevailing and a few questions for rulings have come up.

I discovered that Temperance Lodge had never been constituted and the brethren are anxious for this to be done. At their request I suggest that the Grand Master designate Brother Richard Williams, of Greenville, to perform this ceremony.

Lenoir Lodge of LeGrange, N. C. was burned this year. They have not paid their dues and three attempts to meet with them proved a failure as they could not raise a quorum. I have some hopes that they will yet come around after recovering from a terrible fire and a bank failure.

Ayden Lodge is doing splendid work and have recently fitted themselves in a handsome way in a brick building due east and west with library and reception rooms. Five years ago this lodge was practically dormant.

St. John's No. 4 and Pleasant Hill Lodges are in a flourishing condition and there are not better lodges in the State.

Rountree is a safe and sure lodge presided over by the Chairman of the Board of Custodians.

Snow Hill lodge has its monthly barbecues and is live and hustling and fixed in good quarters.

The two Greenville lodges are in splendid shape. The baby lodge at Greenville has a fine personnel and is growing lustily.

I think every lodge in the district sent representatives to the Grand Lodge though the brother from Lenoir lodge had to return home as the lodge had not paid its dues.

In addition to visits in the District I have visited a number of lodges from the seashore to the mountains. In all of them I was heartily welcomed. In most of them I conferred degrees and made a plea for the Home at Greensboro and the Asylum at Oxford. These talks did good as I witnessed, in some instances before I left the place contributions being made at once.

As my time is demanded out of this District largely just now, I wish to recommend that some other brother be appointed as District Deputy Grand Master who can give the work the great amount of time and thought it requires. I would also recommend that the lodges be notified by the Grand Secretary that they are expected to pay the District Deputies' expenses when on this official visit, as the total expense is a much larger sum than one would imagine and the

loss of time in visiting fifteen or twenty lodges, many not on a railroad, is considerable.

Brother John W. Cotten presented the following communication, which was read and referred to the Committee on Finance:

Mr. John W. Cotten, City:

DEAR COLONEL:—I want to write you my ideas and wishes in regard to the Masonic Temple matter. I wish you would bring the same before the Temple Committee next Tuesday and get them to act upon it. Impress upon them the fact that this lodge, without any help, has built a \$25,000.00 Temple; that all the stock is owned by its own members and that this amount of money in a building in a town this size will not pay the interest on its bonds and leave enough to create any sinking fund. This lodge paid to the Temple Construction Co., according to letter received from John C. Drewry, \$502. Brother Lam Lawrence says he paid \$10.00, which would bring the amount up to \$512.00. Of this amount \$350.00 is in bonds and the balance owned by the members of our lodge who were under the impression at the time payment was made, that they would receive for same certificate of indebtedness bearing 4 per cent. With these facts, we want the Temple Committee to accept from this lodge this \$512.00 and give us credit on account of dues to the Grand Lodge—this amount to bear 4 per cent. interest until used up in payment of dues. I would like to state that all of the contributions will be given to the Lodge and also that this request is made at this time to permit the lodge to make preparation to retire \$5,000.00 of its indebtedness and put the lodge on a sound basis. We want this matter urged if it is necessary before the Temple Committee. If I can be of any service to you I will go to Raleigh next Wednesday.

Brother L. A. Bickel was then recognized and made an earnest and eloquent talk concerning the sessions of this Grand Lodge as they were held thirty odd years ago.

Brother A. B. Andrews, Jr., Chairman of the Committee on Finance presented the report of that Committee, which was read and adopted:

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of North Carolina:

Your Committee on Finance beg to report that they have examined the reports of the Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary which had been previously audited by the Auditor and find the following:

The Grand Treasurer's reports show the receipt of the above together with \$60.00 annual interest received from the Masonic Temple Construction Company for the loan of the \$1,000.00 of the B. F. Moore fund, which is held in trust by the Grand Lodge, and also the receipt of the \$25.00 donation returned from the Grand Lodge of Illinois.

MASONIC TEMPLE

We congratulate the Grand Lodge upon the continued good management of this building, as shown in the report of the Masonic Temple Committee.

From that report we find that the Grand Lodge has to date invested \$59,000.00 in an enterprise which cost \$173,467.56 which is now yielding nearly 5 per cent. upon the total cost of investment. We note with pleasure that the debt was reduced from \$80,850.00 down to \$69,450.00, a reduction of \$11,400.00. We further congratulate the Grand Lodge upon the fact that the interest on the bonded debt has had such a low rate.

OXFORD ORPHAN ASYLUM

We congratulate the Grand Lodge upon the successful

operation and management of this Institution, which is so successfully caring for 322 children at a per capita cost of \$94.01. This is a record which we believe no other institution can equal, much less excel. The Grand Lodge is to be congratulated upon the successful memorializing of the Legislature of North Carolina to increase their appropriation from \$10,000.00 to \$20,000.00, which aid was generously granted as ninety per cent. of the orphans cared for are not Masonic orphans.

In accordance with their request for \$4,000.00 special appropriation, payable \$2,000.00 in 1914 and \$2,000.00 in 1915, which is desired to be used in erecting a new building in order to accomodate 30 other children, we recommend that the same be granted.

The usual \$5,000.00 appropriation for maintenance is also asked, which we recommend be granted.

MASONIC AND EASTERN STAR HOME

We congratulate the brethren who have so earnestly been working on this undertaking, in that their hopes are now realized and the Home is opened and now has five guests.

The report of the Secretary and Treasurer shows in summarized form the balance sheet of the institution, and also a statement of what they wish to do during the present year. The cost of operating the institution is not shown, as we think should be, the Grand Lodge having, under its agreement with the Eastern Star, assumed three-fifths of its maintenance and construction, while that order agrees to contribute two-fifths. Of course, the institution just having been opened, and the small number of guests, the cost per capita of its operation cannot be figured with any fairness to anyone concerned. However, we hope that the continued growth of the institution will enable it to aid a much larger number, many times the number now cared for.

We have not been asked for any specific appropriation by this institution, although their budget of \$8,000.00 contemplated for additions to the property is set out in their report, yet as the Grand Lodge is obligated for three-fifths of its maintenance (the other two-fifths coming as above stated). We recommend the continuance of the \$2,000.00 appropriation, the same as last year, which we wish the Grand Lodge were able to make larger.

ESTIMATED REVENUE FOR 1914

For 1913 your Committee estimated the receipts from

dues at \$20,830.00, while actually the receipts were \$900.00 less. Estimating on 22,500 Masons at present and allowing for 5 per cent. increase, we estimate the number of affiliated Masons for 1914 at \$23,600.00, which should make the receipts from per capita tax \$21,240.00.

CARD INDEX

We recommend that the Grand Secretary be allowed \$600.00, the same as last year, having additional clerk hire to agree on the card index and records, as authorized in 1913.

EXCESS OF EXPENDITURES

It is apparent to all that the present expenditures now authorized will exceed the income by nearly \$5,000.00, and it is now up to this Grand Lodge to decline these appropriations, or else to provide the money to meet the same as they fall due. To meet this excess the income of the Grand Lodge must be raised which can be done either by increasing the per capita tax or by levying a tax upon each initiate or raising. We believe both will be necessary for the Grand Lodge to do. We therefore recommend that the resolution of Brother A. S. Holden to put a tax of \$1.00 upon each initiate be adopted. This will add \$1,500.00 additional to the Grand Lodge revenue. Also we recommend that the resolution of Brother George L. Peterson increasing the per capita tax from 90 cents to \$1.00 be adopted. This will add approximately \$2,250.00 to the revenue.

We recommend that all appropriations herein authorized be payable during the month of December 1914, as no Grand Lodge revenues will come in until after the first day of November. However, we recommend that the specific appropriation to any institution or fund may be anticipated by the Grand Master and Grand Secretary being authorized to execute the note of the Grand Lodge, without interest for that amount falling due on or before January first next. This will enable the institutions to raise the amount of their appropriation where they are obliged to have them before the Grand Lodge can make payment.

Two meetings of the Board of Custodians and Grand Lecturers have been held during the year, one at Greensboro, June 12 and 13, and the other at Raleigh for two days immediately preceding this Grand Lodge session.

At the Greensboro meeting only one Custodian was able to be present and part of the lecturers were compelled to divide their time lecturing our sessions, and those of the Grand Chapter of the Eastern Star. For this reason, the results obtained were not satisfactory.

At the January meeting there was a full attendance and we were gratified and encouraged because of the presence and counsel of the Most Worshipful Grand Master and the Right Worshipful Grand Secretary.

From the reports filed by the lecturers we learn that more lodges were lectured during the year than ever before and the lecturers spent more time in the field than in former years, their services being in constant demand, and at times they were unable to answer all the calls made upon their time.

We believe the uniform work is rapidly growing more popular and that the time is not far distant when all the

lodges of this Grand Jurisdiction will be practising and using the uniform work.

We commend the thoroughness of the work done by Joppa Lodge, No. 530 in exemplifying the work of the second degree on an active candidate and respectfully recommend that provision be made for a continuance of this work by other subordinate lodges at future communications.

We desire to return our sincere thanks for the many courtesies extended to us as a board in the discharge of our duties, and to assure the numerous brethren to whom we are under obligations that we fully appreciate their timely aid and assistance.

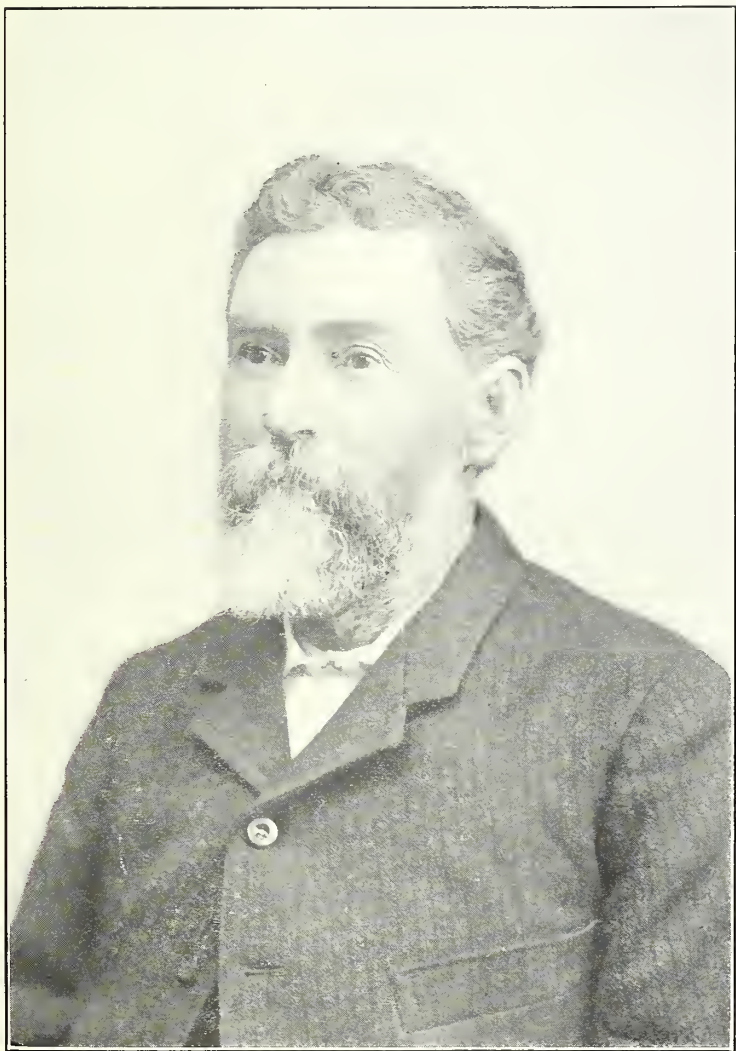

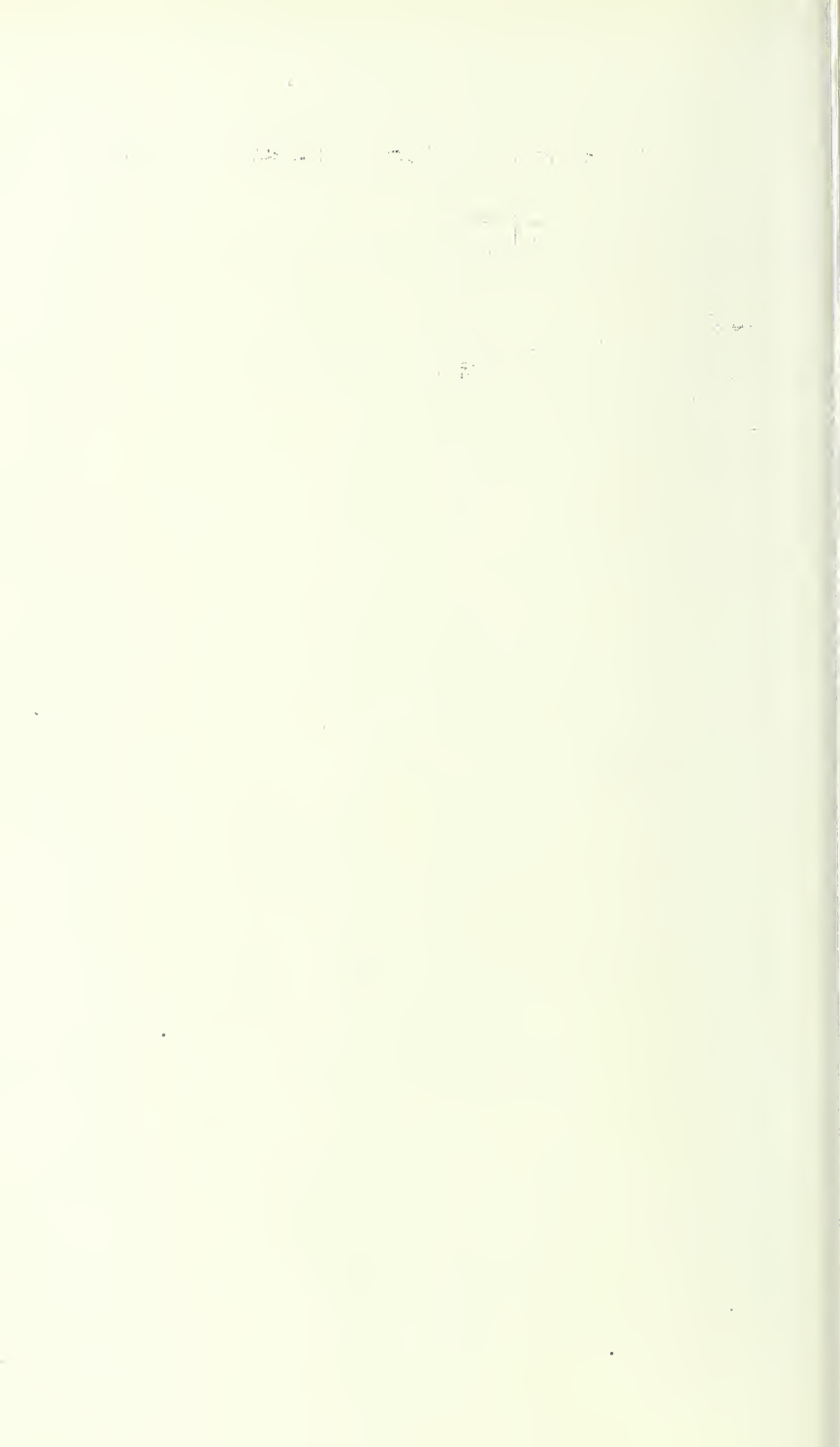

Report on Foreign Correspondence

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Masons of North Carolina:

After a pleasant excursion through the domains of nearly all of the English speaking Grand Lodges, your Committee on Correspondence is gratified to be able to say that peace and prosperity are apparent to the most superficial observer. Numerical growth and financial strength prevail everywhere.

In many jurisdictions costly homes for widows and orphans and indigent Masons are maintained at a very high per capita cost.

Very many other jurisdictions are accumulating endowment funds for the erection and maintenance of such homes in the future.

There are, however, in the United States, and notably in the British Colonial Grand Lodges, many of them which are averse to the erection of homes and pursue the well-tried plan of building benevolent funds, the income of which is ample to provide for every worthy case of need. The machinery for the management and distribution of the income of benevolent funds is simpler and cheaper than that of the institutional plan, and has the supreme advantage of keeping the beneficiaries in touch with the general craft. Those Grand Lodges, who practice this plan, are so well pleased with it that they do not contemplate making a change, and it seems from the records that economy and efficiency are subserved.

Owing to the satisfactory results accruing from the conferences of the Grand Lodge officers, the sentiment is very extensive if not almost universal that these meetings should be encouraged and continued if there were no other result than that of bringing the fraternity of all jurisdictions in closer and more harmonious touch with each other. When

they begin to know each other. When they begin to know each other better they begin to love each other better.

The growth in numbers is phenomenal, notwithstanding that the requirements for admission to the craft are higher and more exacting than they ever have been. The applicant who is not under the tongue of good report rarely passes within the portals of the lodge.

These impressions have been made upon your committee by a careful examination of the proceedings of the following Grand Lodges, and it requires no spirit of optimism to perceive the beneficial effects following in the steps of the Masonic fraternity.

Special Report

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Masons of North Carolina:

Somewhat more than a year ago the Grand Lodge of the Philippine Islands was regularly organized by three lodges chartered by the Grand Lodge of California and received the sympathy and approval of the mother Grand Lodge in this enterprise. Your Committee therefore recommends that the Grand Lodge of the Philippine Islands be duly recognized as a regular and independent Grand Lodge, and that exchange of representatives be made.

We also recommend that the Grand Lodge of Porto Rico be recognized as a regular, independent and sovereign Grand Lodge.

This Grand Lodge was formed by lodges chartered by the Grand Lodge of Cuba, which traces its origin to the Grand Lodge of South Carolina.

We have received from the Grand Lodge of Egypt a request for recognition and we recommend that consideration of this question be deferred pending the receipt of further information as to legitimacy, independence and sovereignty.

The likeness of the Grand Master, Daniel A. Greene, forms the frontispiece. His address is a comprehensive and detailed accounting of his official acts during the year.

His exordium is a very beautiful presentation of some of the ideals of Masonry.

Quite a number of the lodges—eighteen—were chartered, and dispensations issued for seven others.

Special dispensation for various purposes were granted.

This address is remarkable in that it reports no official visits, no banquets, no speechmaking. He reported twelve decisions, which met the cordial approval of the Committee on Jurisprudence. He reported having issued two dispensations for the formation of new lodges, which he knew at the time was not in accordance with the law of Alabama as to the establishment of new lodges. In reporting this exercise of authority the Grand Master claimed that he had the right to do anything for the good of the Craft unless it was in violation of the law or disregard of the landmarks. The Committee on Jurisprudence expressed positive disapproval of this act simply because it was a violation of Article I. Section 7 of the constitution. The report of the committee was adopted.

The most notable event of this communication of Grand Lodge was the dedication of the Masonic Home, which was impressive and was marked with the sense of rejoicing, thanksgiving, and praise.

Under the jurisdiction of Alabama there are 543 lodges having a present membership of 25,471, covering 239 pages of the volume, is contributed by the able and veteran reviewer William Y. Titcomb. Bro. Titcomb makes some excuses for his report on account of bad health, but we have seen no reason for his excuses. North Carolina for 1912 receives very full and kindly review and the space of four pages, for which we express our appreciation.

His annual address is a model in brevity. We take these extracts as evidence of progress made in every line of masonic endeavor. What he says is alike a compliment to himself and to the fraternity generally. He says:

DECISIONS AND DISCIPLINE

I have pleasure in stating that I have not been called upon to decide any important point of Masonic Law during my term of office. The absence of such requests indicates that the brethren are making themselves more conversant with the provisions of the Constitution and are settling the points for themselves instead of submitting them to the Grand Master.

Brethren, to conclude, in taking a survey of the Jurisdiction and looking back over the past year, I think there is a great cause for thankfulness. We are still progressing and when we compare the present year with those that have flown, we cannot fail to realize the great advance that masonry has made in the Province of Alberta, and the many moral benefits it confers upon its members.

Although only in its eighth year the Grand Lodge of Alberta has taken on rapid and solid growth. The chartered lodges have increased from 65 to 74, and the membership has grown to 5,166, showing a gain of 688.

Upon the recommendation of the Committee on Correspondence the Grand Lodge of Costa Rica and the Philippine Islands were duly recognized.

The Committee on Grievance and Appeal reports that it has had nothing to do, and the Committee on Benevolence said that it had but one application for charity during the year. These reports, and such as these, go far to show that peace and prosperity are active entities.

The report on Correspondence is, for the second time, contributed by Bro. S. Y. Taylor, who need make no apology for the character of his work. The report is a very good one.

The transactions of North Carolina for 1912 received the kindly consideration of Bro. Taylor, and we are glad that he finds nothing to criticise.

The address of the Grand Master, Harry Arizona Drachman, whose likeness forms the frontispiece, is a readable and full statement of his administration. He gives this very satisfactory account of the condition of the craft:

STATE OF THE ORDER

It is with a sense of pride that we see our ranks increasing and that we are becoming strong and powerful. Our Treasury shows a large increase and our influence for good is expanding in the fraternal world. We are receiving into the Order in this State many men who stand high in their respective communities, and with prosperity before us we should see our membership increase by leaps and bounds and prove a power for good in all that appertains to Masonry.

We agree with the Grand Master as to the value of official visits, and believe, as he does, that they are followed by benefit to the general membership. He says in part:

OFFICIAL VISITATIONS.

When I was inducted into the office of Grand Master I determined to visit every Lodge in the Jurisdiction. This I accomplished, with but one exception. That exception was Verde Lodge No. 14 at Jerome, Arizona, which could not secure the Lodge for the evening that I was there.

I consider the visitation one of the most important duties of the Grand Master. I believe these visits have been of much good to the Order. I do not care to impose on your valuable time by giving in detail the visit to each Lodge. Many of the Lodges ex-

emplified the work of the Master's Degree and one Lodge, that of the Fellowcraft Degree. Every Lodge served a banquet after the completion of the work and meeting and I shall ever have a pleasant memory of these visits. Most of the visits were made during the summer months, which in Arizona are always hot, yet this did not keep the brethren away. Wherever I have gone I have been treated in the most generous and cordial way, and I herewith wish to extend my thanks for the many favors shown me by brother Masons of Arizona.

The Grand Master reported nine decisions, two of which were disapproved by the Committee on Jurisprudence. The Committee however, approved No. 1, which we think is in direct conflict with the almost universal sentiment and usage of the fraternity. We do not recall having seen permission for a Masonic hall to be converted into a dance hall or a meeting place for card parties. This is what the Grand Master says:

1. Q. Could the Masonic Hall be used for a dance and card party, and could the Lodge hold a bazaar and raffle?

A. There is nothing to prohibit the holding of a dance, card party, or bazaar, but do not deem it prudent to hold a raffle or any game of chance.

In the Jurisdiction of Arizona there are 20 subordinate lodges, having a total membership of 2,118, a net gain of 105. The reading of figures is not very inspiring, but in this case seeing that the subordinate lodges had rejected 54 applicants for the privilege of Masonry is very strong evidence that the moral health of subordinate lodges is excellent.

An interesting appendix to the proceedings is the transactions of the Past Grand Masters' Association, from which the president Martin W. Kales, was absent. He gives this explanation of his inability to be present and preside:

To the Past Grand Masters' Association of Arizona:

Very Dear Brothers: After having been honored by the Grand Lodge to the highest degree, and finally being elected to the Presidency of the Past Grand Masters' Masonic Association of Arizona, I feel that it is not exactly proper that I should send you an apology, instead of being present at your Annual Meeting.

Twenty-five years ago, it was a pleasant outing to travel to Tombstone, by stage and rail, on a two-days' trip, or by team to Prescott, on a three-days' journey. But now with modern railroad facilities for travel and with best appointments for comfort. I find that the journey to the Grand Lodge of Arizona from Oakland, California, is becoming a task to me. I am warned that my boat is nearing the shore. It may be that I shall not again visit with you. Though, if spared, I shall try to be present at your meeting a year hence.

The portrait gallery contains the likenesses of the incoming Grand Master, William T. Hammock, and of two deceased prominent members of the fraternity, George A. Donnelly and Sam H. Davidson. These brethren had worked faithfully in the quarries, and received from the Grand Lodge the tribute due their services and virtues.

At this communication of the Grand Lodge, there were present a round dozen of Past Grand Masters.

The annual address of the retiring Grand Master, Mark P. Olney, is a full statement of his official doings and the conditions of the fraternity in Arkansas.

The Grand Master and the Craft generally is deeply concerned in the effort of Hot Springs Lodge, No. 62 to erect a handsome and spacious sanitarium on a part of the government reservation, for the care of Masons everywhere who sought the health giving properties of the waters of Hot Springs. If the enterprise should meet with success, there can be little doubt of the service which it will render. But it is equally certain that the necessity for enlargement will follow very speedily.

We note that the Grand Lodge, of San Salvador, was recognized as a regular and sovereign Grand Lodge.

The number of Lodges in the roll, is 554, having a membership of nearly 19,000.

We have marked several items for comment, which we must forego, in order to make room for this poem and the explanation of the author:

This volume is adorned with the likenesses of the retiring Grand Master, Jno. M. Rudd, and of the two Past Grand Masters, E. D. McLarin, 1897, and Alexander Charleson, 1896.

Seven emergent communications for the constitution of lodges and one for the dedication of a Masonic Hall are reported.

The annual address of Grand Master Rudd is a plain business presentation of his official doings during the year.

He was kept busy from July 2, 1912, until June 13, 1913, in paying official visits to the lodges.

He reports foreign relations as being of the most harmonious character.

He reported his rulings which seem to us to be elementary and should not have come to the Grand Master.

Discipline was imposed upon the Secretary of one of the lodges, as the most culpable party concerned for affiliating with a clandestinely made Mason.

The Grand Master publishes, from Vancouver Masonic Board of Relief, a letter showing how a peddler of Masonic degrees came to grief, was fined \$200 and deported by the British Columbia officials into the United States, of which he was a resident. The active agent in the perpetration of this fraud was one Joseph Mendell, who was said to be a member in good standing in a Masonic Lodge in Ohio. In his conclusion the Grand Master says in part:

The good fortune has been mine to visit 61 out of the 63

Warranted Lodges in the Jurisdiction. I found Freemasonry prospering, and advancing. Our membership is increasing, the Lodges are in good financial standing, and most important of all, care is used in choice of material. A high standard has been set, and they are trying to live up to it.

In the Grand Jurisdiction of British Columbia there are 69 lodges, having a membership of 6,344, showing the handsome increase of 484.

The sum of \$5,488.72 was expended for the relief of members, widows and orphans and transients.

The report on Correspondence, covering profitably 122 pages is contributed by V. W. Brother W. A. DeWolf Smith and is forceful independent and occasionally pungent. Our brother calls us to task for "endorsing" Mississippi in its severance of fraternal relations with New Jersey. He is mistaken, for we have frequently endorsed and commended the dignified attitude of New Jersey in the controversy.

The transactions of North Carolina for 1912 received the kindly consideration of Brother DeWolf Smith.

The likeness of the Grand Master, William David McPherson, forms the frontispiece, and we can offer no better wish for the new executive than that his record of service will equal that of his immediate predecessor, Brother Aubrey White.

The address of the retiring Grand Master gives a full account of the faithful performance of his duty to the Craft of Canada during the year, and in saying this we are

sustained by the report of every committee having to do with the work of the Grand Master.

To the Masonic dead the Grand Master pays this handsome and appreciative tribute :

Last year I took occasion to record our sorrow and regret at the loss of life incident to the wreck of the "Titanic," which gave pause to the world. Again I am called upon to express our regret at the occurrence of a tragedy which, though it did not entail so great a loss of life, has yet called forth equally wide-spread sympathy. Need I say that I refer to the tragedy of the Antarctic seas, in which Captain Scott and his four companions met their death. The sorrow of those left behind will be somewhat alleviated by loving sympathy, wide as the Empire, and their future comfort will no doubt be generously provided for. While we mourn and sympathize with those afflicted our hearts throb with pride in our race whose sons can face death with fortitude when or wherever it comes, whether in the excitement and rush of battle or on the lonely ice floe in far Antarctic seas. Captain Scott was a Free and Accepted Mason, and he well exemplified the teaching of the sublime degree when he laid down his life and did not for one second betray the trust reposed in him. Of Captain Oates, who calmly walked out to his death that he might increase, in some slight degree, the chances of safety for his comrades, I am unable to put into words the emotion his action calls forth. Let us rise in respect to his memory.

The Semi-Centennial Benevolent Fund has passed the mark of \$100,000 which was set for it, and is now nearly \$102,000, the interest of which will contribute \$5,000 to active charity. This method of meeting the needs of the destitute members of the Craft, commends itself to us as being the most Masonic and practical way of dispensing relief.

After reporting the constitution of four lodges and the formation of eleven lodges under dispensation, the Grand Master expresses the view that the erection of small lodges in remote sections should not be discouraged.

He reports the dedication of ten lodge halls and the laying of four corner-stones.

He issued 204 special dispensations and expresses delight at the valuable work done at the lodges of instruction

The finances of the Grand Lodge are in such fine condition

as to enlarge the practice of benevolence, of which the Grand Master says:

BENEVOLENCE

You will see by a perusal of the Grand Treasurer's and Grand Secretary's reports that the total expenditure for benevolence up to the end of the year was \$33,835, or about \$1,000 in excess of last year. This expenditure is the largest ever made by this Grand Lodge for benevolent purposes. Of this \$29,108 came from Grand Lodge funds proper, and \$4,727, from the Semi-Centennial Fund. Great care is taken to ascertain that the recipients of our benevolence are all worthy, and from the report of the Inspector who looks after such matters I am glad to inform you that he finds them all deserving cases and no attempts made to impose upon our charity. Our expenditure this year for benevolence has been, as I have already stated \$1,000 more than last year, and it will continue to grow. We have made a great step forward by accumulating a special fund of \$100,000, but if this does not suffice to meet our responsibility the resources of Masonic benevolence are not exhausted, and we can once more appeal to the Craft to give us sufficient money to perform our bounden duty. It should also be borne in mind that the private lodges have granted about \$18,000 per annum for benevolent purposes, so that the full measure of our benevolence during the year will be nearly \$5,000. The Chairman of Benevolence is a generous, large-hearted man and no worthy applicant is denied assistance.

He reports 21 rulings, all of which seem to be sensible and in accord with Masonic law.

Brother White made as many official visits as he could and the effects have, in all cases, proved to be satisfactory. At the close he says:

Had it been possible for one of my nationality to be killed by excessive kindness, I fear I should not be with you to-day.

My brethren, let me remind you that we belong to a great jurisdiction in this young and prosperous country. Of the 90,000 Masons in the Dominion of Canada about 54,000 are of our jurisdiction and obedience, and in addition we have given of the best of our sons to build up the Craft in the great provinces of the west. We have done great work in benevolence, and we shall yet do more wonderful things if we are true to our convictions.

Near the close of this communication a resolution was adopted to appropriate \$500 for the purchase of a testimonial to the retiring Grand Master and it is a proper and graceful acknowledgement of his faithful service.

In a special report of the Committee on Correspondence, which was adopted, M. W. Brother A. T. Freed, recommended that the consideration of the request of the York Grand Lodge of Mexico be deferred.

In another special report of the same Committee the acceptance of the Oregon proposition looking to the formation of a Supreme Grand Lodge is modestly declined :

That the Grand Lodge of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons of Canada in the Province of Ontario is a sovereign and independent Masonic body; that it cannot become a member of a central representative Masonic body without surrendering some portion of its independence; that, in the opinion of the Committee it is not necessary, wise nor expedient that such independence should be impaired to any extent; and the Committee recommends that this Grand Lodge do not participate in the proposed Convention at San Francisco, nor take part in any movement for the formation of a central representative Masonic body.

There are 432 lodges, having a total membership of 53,699.

The report on Correspondence, covering 138 pages of the volume is presented by Past Grand Master A. T. Freed, and is a comprehensive and satisfactory review of the English speaking Masonic World. Although North Carolina for 1912 is listed as one of the Grand Lodges whose proceedings are reviewed, we fail to find any note of the Old North State in the body of the report. We concur entirely with Brother Freed in these extracts taken from his conclusion :

The steady, regular growth of the order in numbers is really remarkable. There is not a Grand Lodge in the World which does not report an increase of strength. At the same time there is evidence on every hand of greater carefulness in the selection of material. The standard of membership rises year by year.

Masonic benevolence is more carefully watched than formerly. While the amounts given to the needy steadily increase in volume, greater care is exercised in systematizing the charities and cutting off impostors. It is not possible wholly to prevent fraud, but system and co-operation do much toward that end.

The likeness of the Grand Master elect, William S. Pickerill, occupies the fly leaf of the volume, and photographs of two deceased Grand Masters are found farther on in the Volume—John B. Happy, and William Pettigrew Benedict.

The retiring Grand Master George E. Simonton opens with this paragraph, showing the contrast between fifty-three years ago and now:

Brethren:—Fifty-three years ago, the representatives of three Lodges, with a total membership of sixty-two Master Masons, met and organized this Grand Lodge. Today we meet as the representatives of one hundred and twenty-six active, chartered Lodges, having a total membership of sixteen thousand, one hundred and thirty-nine, and as I look into your faces, I feel no grander body of men can be gathered together within the borders of our State. The tree of Masonry was planted in good soil by those early pioneers, its growth has been vigorous and healthful, and its branches now spread over every section of the Commonwealth.

He puts the satisfactory state of the Craft in these two sentences:

MEMBERSHIP

Our growth during the past year has been gratifying, our present membership being sixteen thousand, one hundred and thirty-nine; a gain of six hundred and seven.

FINANCIAL

The Grand Treasurer's report will show that our finances are in excellent condition, the amount now on hand being \$47,564.13; a gain of \$5,134.44 for the year.

To the distinguished dead of his own jurisdiction Brother Simonton has offered affectionate and eloquent tribute.

We are delighted to see the incorporation of the Colorado Masons Benevolent Fund Association, and feel sure that they will find in the future that this is the best, the most satisfactory, and the cheapest way of caring for the needy. The fund has grown to nearly, \$40,000, and will keep on growing until its earnings will be sufficient to meet all cases of distress.

Three lodges were constituted.

We notice that the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania asked to be excused from conferring the Master Masons degree on a fellowcraft from Colorado, simply because it was against the law of Pennsylvania.

Many special dispensations were granted, and one dispensation for the formation of a new lodge was refused because the location seemed to be unpromising.

The Grand Master reports that he had made fifty-one official visits.

After several years' effort the Grand Lodge of Colorado has been recognized by each of the eight German Grand Lodges.

Bearing on the subject of visitations the Grand Master tells how a Colorado Mason was denied admission to a lodge in Sweden:

In December, 1912, I received a letter from W. Bro. Herrick McLeod, retiring Worshipful Master of Goldfield Lodge, No. 108, Goldfield, Colorado, enclosing a letter from Bro. Charles N. Peterson, a member of Goldfield Lodge, No. 108, the last named letter having been written at Holmstad, Sweden. Brother Peterson stated that he had been denied the privilege of visiting a Masonic Lodge in Sweden for the reason that fraternal relations had never been established between the Grand Lodge of Sweden and the Grand Lodge of Colorado. I turned the correspondence over to M. W. Bro. Lawrence N. Greenleaf, Chairman of the Committee on Correspondence, since which time I have not been further advised.

On notification of the distress caused by the floods in Ohio, the Grand Master ordered the Grand Secretary to forward a check for \$500 to the Masonic Relief Committee of Ohio.

Although the Jurisprudence Committee referred this matter to the Board of Custodians, the Grand Master is right in quoting from Mackey as follows:

"The box is placed on the altar, and the ballot is deposited with the solemnity of a Masonic salutation, that the voters may be duly impressed with the sacred and responsible nature of the duty they are called on to discharge."

Time was, and not so very long ago as we recall it, when Henry M. Teller's name was almost synonymous with that of Colorado, and the sphere of his activities in Masonic affairs was more extensive than that of the State. His sun is gradually sinking to the western horizon and the night is not far off. The action of the Grand Lodge in sending a deputation bearing flowers to this retired Masonic worker was peculiarly graceful and appropriate.

Upon recommendation of the Committee on Correspondence the Grand Lodge of the Philippine Islands was duly recognized.

In Colorado there are 136 lodges, with a total membership of 16,830, showing a net gain of 607.

The Report on Correspondence is a review of the proceedings of sixty-two Grand Lodges, and is the skilled work of Brother Lawrence N. Greenleaf. It is the twenty-ninth contribution of this kind. To say that the report is written by Brother Greenleaf is a guarantee that it is of the finest quality. We regret that the proceedings of North Carolina failed to reach him. He closes his report with a poem entitled "Head, Hand and Heart," which is too long to quote entire, and its mutilation would be a crime. We quote instead what we have been trying to accomplish for years:

In view of the large accession of members to which we have so frequently called attention in these reports, a most hopeful sign is the enforced idleness of Committees on Appeals and Grievances in some of the larger Jurisdictions, by reason of there being no work laid out. It is truly a remarkable showing when twenty thousand or more Brethren dwell together in such peace and unity that there is not a case of appeal or grievance to be brought before the Grand Lodge. It shows that the portals of the Lodges in such Jurisdictions are closely guarded.

As a shading to the picture we have in some Grand Lodge Proceedings transcripts of disgusting cases, which should have briefest reference. It indicates the admission of defective material which should have no place in the Masonic structure.

We think such Grand Lodges greatly err by defacing their printed records with details of such offences. We are pleased to note that but few Grand Lodges continue the practice.

Nine special communications were held for the purpose of dedicating Masonic Temples or laying corner-stones.

The annual address of Brother Holden is a plain, unpretentious business paper which gives a full account of all matters transpiring during the year which affects the interest of the Grand Lodge. Brief reference is made to the Masonic dead.

His official visits were not as numerous as he desired but such as he made were pleasant to the Grand Master and he hopes profitable to the lodges visited.

He reported thirty eight special dispensations and four decisions, all of which were approved by the Grand Lodge.

The excellent condition of the Grand Lodge, numerically and financially, is due largely to the influence, good judgment, and integrity of the men who directed its affairs during the long period of its existence. It is not, therefore, surprising to speak in this triumphant way of the condition of the Masonic Home and its management:

On Saturday, September 21, 1912, occurred the annual event, known as Grand Master's Day. The numbers present were somewhat less than on some other occasions of like nature, owing to the very threatening weather, and also to unusual attraction in a nearby city. The efficient Superintendent of the Home, Past Grand Master John O. Rowland, and the Grand Secretary, Past Grand Master Frank W. Havens, had entire charge in perfecting arrangements for the day's program. Despite the obstacles above mentioned, the attendance was good and the excellent program, which had been so carefully arranged was carried out in a most complete and pleasing manner. The Home was duly inspected by those in attendance and many expressions of surprise and pleasure were heard on every hand at the extent and quality of the good work being done by the "Masonic Charity Foundation of Connecticut." Right here permit me to say that during the year the subject of Masonic Homes in other Grand Jurisdictions has been brought to my notice in a number of instances, and I have discovered that Connecticut has

been a leader in the good work; that our home and its management have been subject to inquiry by those instituting or contemplating a home for their homeless brethren and sisters. I could say much in praise of ours; could tell of the peculiar fitness of the Superintendent, of the efficiency of the Board of Managers, to whom you have entrusted the conduct of its business; of the thoroughness and integrity with which every detail is executed, but I must forbear. If you have never visited our Home, I earnestly recommend that you do so.

The Grand Master reports the celebration of the one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of two of the lodges, and heartily commends this practice wherever a lodge reaches that age.

An examination of the Grand Secretary's recapitulation will go far to show the causes of the prosperity and usefulness of the Grand Lodge. It has one hundred and ten subordinate lodges, every one of which made returns, paid dues, and was represented in the Grand Lodge. The membership is 24,281, and the increase for the year has been 547.

The report on Correspondence, condensed to the limit of fifty-two pages, is contributed by Past Grand Master Frank W. Havens, and shows in every Grand Lodge review a comprehensive summary of the proceedings. The proceedings of North Carolina did not appear in the report, for the reason, we suppose, that they had not come to his hands.

His annual address is a comparatively brief paper, in which the usual subjects are discussed. He reports having visited every lodge in the jurisdiction except one, and that failure was owing to sickness.

He reports having forwarded \$150 to aid in the relief of the flood sufferers of Ohio, and this action was endorsed by the Grand Lodge.

The Masonic Home of Delaware is practically completed and gives shelter to eight inmates, and there is room for seven more. The funds for the maintenance of the Home are growing rapidly; it is hoped that in a few years, it will be ample for the purpose.

The Grand Jurisdiction of Delaware has 22 lodges with a total membership of 3,358. It is noted that the lodge membership varies from 24 to 388 having a healthy average of nearly 150.

The report on Correspondence 99 pages is contributed by Brother Harry J. Guthrie, and is an interesting summary of the transactions of the Grand Lodge's review.

From his conclusion we quote :

Only those who have been engaged in the work can realize the tremendous amount of time involved in perusing the many thousands of pages of the several printed preceedings and the culling out of the transactions which will be of interest to Brethren who desire to be informed of the constructive accomplishments of the Masonic Craft. In some instances we have used scissors and the paste, but only where the language used was superior to our ability to reproduce the thought. Where comment has been indulged in we sincerely trust the thought expressed will be accepted by the beloved brethren of the Round table, as made by one who has the highest interest of the Craft at heart; who would not offend; who does not have a desire to talk for talk's

sake; who does not think he knows it all, and while entertaining an opinion does not deny the privilege to his Brethren.

The retiring Grand Master, Ben W. Murch, whose likeness forms the frontispiece, delivered a comprehensive address, in which his official doings are fully stated. These reports were made at the 3rd communication and at the annual.

The first communication, which we think eminently practical and useful, is devoted to the thorough exemplification of the work in the three degrees, and is bound to lead to practical uniformity.

A special communication was held on the 10th of April, 1912, for the purpose of having the corner-stone of the University Club building at which the Grand Master made an address and was followed by President Taft, an enthusiastic member and the first president of the Club.

At the 3rd communication the Grand Master made a strong and stirring appeal to the fraternity of the District to raise funds for the completion of the Masonic and Eastern Star Home, and said in part:

You know the history of our Home. It covers scarce a dozen years. In that time much has been done. The record is one of which we may well be proud. I say "we" advisedly, for although the greater part of that which has been accomplished has been due to the unselfish efforts of our sisters of the Eastern Star, yet they are our wives, our mothers and our sisters, and we have a right to be proud of our own and of the good our own accomplish.

We have now ten acres of ground, a building that accommodates about eighteen guests, with necessary outbuildings, and \$13,000 cash in the building fund, all free from debt. The demand for accommodation is greater than can now be met. Our indigent brothers are asking relief. What answer shall we give? What

must we give if we would not have our ritual as sounding brass and tinkling cymbal?

Past Grand Master, William G. Henderson, Chairman of the Special Committee, offered the following resolution, which after warm discussion was adopted :

Resolved, That no constituent Lodge of this Grand Lodge shall hold its communications in any building or premises where a public bar is maintained for the sale or dispensing of intoxicating liquors or beverages, or derive profit by lease or rental from, or own, any such building or premises; provided that a Lodge shall be exempt from the provisions of this resolution during the present term of an existing lease or rental of a building or premises owned by it and so used, but not after the expiration of such lease or term of rental.

At the Annual Communication, December 18th, the Grand Master reported that he had made the prescribed official visits besides others, and that all of them were pleasant and profitable.

He reported that 18 of the 29 lodges had expressed their willingness to be assessed for the completion of the Home building.

The condition of the Craft is thus summarized :

Our net increase in membership from October 1, 1911, to September 30, 1912, was 206. The fact that 88 in that time failed to pass the ballot test shows that while we welcome to our Order good men and true, we at the same time keep careful watch and ward at our entrance gate. There has been, during the year, a substantial increase in the cash balances and net assets of the Lodges. As an Order we have made material and Masonic progress. Our today is better than yesterday, and our earnest prayers and well founded hopes are that our tomorrow shall be better than today. Our prayers will avail, our hopes end in fruition, if we live up to the vows we have taken, remain true to the faith that is in us.

The report on Correspondence, 147 pages, is contributed by Past Grand Master George W. Baird and that announce-

ment is a guarantee that the report is up to the standard. We regret that of the 72 volumes which come to his hands that the transactions of North Carolina was not included.

Reviewing the address of the Grand Master of Nevada, he makes this reference to the matter of whisky sellers:

He takes a fall out of the whisky-seller, whom he regards as a "leech and a vampire," but is a little way out when he says, "All Masons recognize the whisky-seller as a leech and a vampire," as quite a number of Masons are still engaged in selling whisky in small and large quantities, and still a goodly number of Masons patronize the sellers and drink at the bar.

In his conclusion, Brother Baird refers to the liquor question again and we concur:

The subject of prohibition seems still to be agitating several Masonic jurisdictions, and has, we fear, already been carried too far. There is apt to be a reflex action which may be equally intemperate in the other direction. We complain, very properly, when strikers use force to prevent other men from working for wages which they, the strikers, have decided insufficient, but it is just as inconsistent to prohibit all men from providing the least amount of stimulant because some particular intemperate men have abused the privilege. There is law in every State to punish drunkenness; there is also law to punish the vendor for selling stimulants to an intoxicated individual.

The cravings of nature are stronger than any other impulses. When such men are deprived of one stimulant they naturally seek a substitute. The sale of opium, cocaine, hashheesh, absinthe, etc., has invariably increased in localities where the sale of alcoholic stimulants is prevented. Simultaneously the "speakeasies" come into existence.

The liquor question would never come into Masonry if intemperate men were kept out of it.

ENGLAND, 1913

We have before us only the record of the Quarterly Communication, held at Freemason's Hall, London, June 4th.

The most interesting part of these transactions relates to the visit of a deputation of prominent members of the Grand Lodge to the German Grand Lodge in Berlin. A full account of the splendid hospitality and cordial friendship with which they were greeted was reported to the Grand Lodge and elicited this commentary from the Pro Grand Master, Lord Ampthill:

My report is necessarily a bare record of facts which, for your convenience, I have made as brief as possible, but facts speak for themselves to those who are able to appreciate them, as I cannot doubt that this Assembly is able to do, and I do not think that any eloquence could add to the impression which the facts of this memorable exchange of visits have made upon the minds of those who take a thoughtful view of the present day tendencies and future prospects of Freemasonry.

Brethren, it is no more possible for us to maintain an attitude of "splendid isolation" in Freemasonry than it was possible for us to do so as a Nation rather less than a generation ago. All the tendencies of the age are against it, and unless we move with the times we shall as surely perish, as do all institutions which fail to conform to changing circumstances and new requirements.

In Freemasonry, as in national life, we must enter into closer relations with the rest of the world; we must seek to share the advantages of experience in other lands and of co-operation with those who may, in some respects, have developed better than we have ourselves.

That, in a few words, is the true inwardness of this attempt, so auspiciously begun, to promote closer relations with our Brethren in Germany.

We have much to learn about them, and much to learn from them, and they feel the same about us.

Now, the better we get to know one another, the better we shall get to like one another. That is a truism on which I need surely not expatiate, and I leave it to you to imagine for yourselves what far-reaching advantages might well result from mutual liking, confidence and understanding between a great organized body of Germans and a great organized body of Englishmen. Those advantages would extend far outside the sphere of Freemasonry, even though our relations with our German Brethren were conducted solely on Masonic lines, as indeed they must be, in accordance with the fundamental principles which are common to us both.

The things which impressed us most in Germany, apart from the wonderful cordiality and generosity with which we were received, were the intense earnestness of our German Brethren, the high and pure ideals of Freemasonry which they keep before them, and the efficiency which they owe to a wonderful spirit of discipline in the Craft. We were also greatly impressed by the spacious splendor of the Masonic Halls of the three Grand Lodges in which we were entertained, and the fact that in Germany most Private Lodges have their own dignified and appropriate habitations.

We have all returned inspired with new zeal for Freemasonry, and with a strong sense of duty to make our experiences known to the widest possible circle of our Brethren, in order that all English Freemasons may be influenced by those feelings of friendship, admiration and gratitude which we ourselves shall always preserve.

The address of the retiring Grand Master, Albert W. Gilchrist is a painstaking account of his official doings for the year.

The condition of the fraternity, is reported to be entirely satisfactory. Ten lodges have been constituted, and dispensations have been granted for the formation of eleven new lodges.

The Grand Master reports 35 decisions, and these have been approved by the Jurisprudence Committee, with only some modifications of three of them.

We extract from the close of his address, these paragraphs having reference to his Masonic ambition and his Masonic service.

M. W. Brother Angus Patterson was then Grand Master. He appointed me Grand Pursuivant. I wish to state that this was one of the highest offices I ever held. It seemed to me bigger than

that of the position of the Grand Master itself. I have been signally honored in being the only man in the history of the State who at the same time held two of the highest offices that could be held in this State—Governor of the State for four years, and Grand Master of Masons for two years. Although I was anxious to be elected Junior Grand Warden, that being the stepping stone eventually to the high office of Grand Master, yet Masonic offices are the only ones for which I never electioneered.

As a Mason, I have been largely instrumental in securing the foundation for a future Masonic Home and Orphanage. The last proceedings of the M. W. Grand Lodge shows to have been collected and now on hand for the Masonic Home and Orphanage \$19,563.06. Sooner or later, we will have collected funds sufficient with which to establish and operate this Home and Orphanage.

As Governor of the State, I recommended to the Legislature the passage of an act providing for the establishment of a hospital for the indigent crippled children of the State. Such an act was passed. To be instrumental in the establishment of two such institutions is well worth living for.

In order to accentuate the value and necessity of the schools of instruction, a resolution was adopted as follows:

Resolved, That Past Grand Master Silas B. Wright be requested to make an address to this Grand Lodge to urge upon all the representatives of the particular Lodges now present, the great importance of this work, and that they should present this matter to their respective lodges so that these "Schools of Instruction" may be more largely attended during the current year, and that all of the Lodges may be inspired and enlightened by the splendid work being done by the Grand Lodge Committee on Work.

In every Grand Lodge there is to be found a number of capable men, who are ambitious to reach the Grand East by the shortest way. To aid this group in the plan for rapid transit the following resolution was introduced, and unceremoniously squelched by the Jurisprudence Committee.

Resolved, That the terms of office of the M. W. Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Senior Grand Warden and Grand Junior Warden shall be only one year and that they shall not be elected as their own successors in office.

This committee are of the opinion that it is the right and privi-

lege of the Grand Lodge to choose its Grand Master and Wardens each year. This right cannot be taken away by a resolution adopted in a previous year. Sec. 3 of Article II. reads that the Grand Master is always in nomination for re-election and the Grand Lodge may re-elect him if a majority of the brethren voting cast their votes in his favor. This is an inalienable right of which this Grand Lodge cannot be deprived, and it is recommended that the proposed resolution be not adopted.

The adoption of this resolution is evidence of the great service which the retiring Grand Master has rendered to the fraternity:

Resolved, That the thanks of the Grand Lodge be extended to our retiring Grand Master, Brother A. W. Gilchrist, for the able and industrious manner in which he has administered the affairs of the Grand Lodge during the past two years and for the fair, impartial and business-like manner in which he has presided over our deliberations during his term of office, and, as he lays down the responsibilities of his high office and returns to the rank we assure him that he carries with him the esteem, regard and confidence of the Masons of Florida.

In Florida there are 219 active lodges on the roll, having a total membership of 10,794, a net gain of 663.

The report on Correspondence, 208 pages, is contributed by Past Grand Master, Silas B. Wright, and is of the high character which has marked his previous reports. Brother Wright is always thoughtful, judicial and fraternal in his conclusions. To the North Carolina transactions of 1912 he has given kindly consideration and the generous space of more than four pages of general commendation. We feel that we can not use our space to better purpose than to reproduce his introduction:

In presenting our report we feel that we should explain that we think it our duty to present Masonic information of interest to the Craft, but more particularly to the Brethren of Florida.

These reports seem to have been designed as a kind of post graduate course in the world of Masonry with the members of the round table as the faculty.

We have tried to present accurate information as to the accomplishments of the Craft in the other states and to show what the Masonic institution stands for in the world at large.

Our fraternity forms a chain which encircles the globe, embracing an army of over two million members. Men of education and above the average citizen in their several communities. Thinking of this we are amazed at the potentiality of our fraternity and the power for the good of mankind. Each and every member of this vast number stands pledged to work for the benefit of each and all.

The question of "recognition" is ever coming up and refusal frequently brings reprisal in the way of establishing clandestine Lodges.

Invasion of jurisdiction by Lodges occasionally crops out and sometimes Grand Jurisdictions are at outs as was the case with Michigan and Canada a year or so since, and is now the case between Mississippi and New Jersey.

We think that many times these petty differences would have passed unnoticed if there had been personal acquaintance and an application of the golden rule.

If I knew you and you knew me,
'Tis seldom we would disagree;
But, never having yet clasped hands,
Both often fail to understand
That each intends to do what's right,
And treat each other "honor bright."
How little to complain there'd be
If I knew you and you knew me.

A photograph of the incoming Grand Master, Robert L. Colding, adorns the volume.

At the close of his second term of faithful and valuable service to the Craft the retiring Grand Master George M. Napier, tells in clear, forcible diction what he has been doing for the Craft during the year.

He reports eight decisions, which seem to us to be in accord with Masonic law and good sense. In discussing his

last decision that the use of sectarian songs and prayers in a Masonic service should be avoided; he says:

And in a Masonic Lodge, no word or reference in song, or prayer, or speech, should ever be made about religion or worship, that might wound the feelings of even the most sensitive Brother. In their churches every religion and every creed can employ the songs and prayers deemed most acceptable. But in a Masonic Lodge, the language used in our worship should be such that every Mason present—be he Mohammedan, Buddhist, Shintoist, Zoroastrain, Scythian, Greek, Jew or Christian, can join with equal devotion and freedom in worship to the Great Architect of the Universe. One of the landmarks of its long history, one of the potent factors in the influence of Masonry, is Tolerance. We must not undertake to foist our individual predilections in religious matters upon Brethren, of whatever faith or order. Let our Lodges avoid the least appearance of sectarianism. Ours is a Brotherhood, and we "should eat no meat if it cause our Brother to offend." There are beautiful prayers and uplifting hymns in which all nations and all creeds and all tongues may unite in common worship. Let these our tongues employ while on the checkered floor of a Masonic Lodge.

In the more than ten pages devoted to descriptions of his official visitations, Brother Napier shows that he had an enjoyable time, and that his personal presence had a salutary influence on the fraternity at large. More than fifty of these visits were made in all sections of the State.

Thirteen Lodges were constituted and dispensations were issued for the formation of three others.

We quote his tribute to the late Brother A. W. Moody, who rendered distinguished service as chairman of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence:

Brother Moody died at his home in Boston, Georgia, on April 7th, 1912. He was a man fertile in resource and possessed of a cultured intellect and consecrated heart. As a minister of the Gospel, scholar, citizen, and Mason, Brother Moody was a man of the highest type. He was conservative in action and devoted to the best interests of his home and country. He died ripe in years and crowned with honors, and has gone to his just reward.

Oh friend of mine, I grieve to lose
The grasp of loving hands;

How much we need each other here
Each fully understands.

But if our pathways meet no more
In meadow land or heather,
Believe that when the night is come
We'll all be at home together.

In considering the finances of the Grand Lodge, Brother Napier argues forcibly that there should be strict economy in expenditures, and says on this subject:

It is evident that the Grand Lodge is in a better financial condition than it has been in more than a quarter of a century.

Heretofore, we have been counting our treasury as full at the time we have received the Grand Lodge dues, and other revenues, but we have not deducted the enormous expenditure to be made immediately after each Grand Lodge Communication.

The saving in per diem this year by completing our Session in two days will amount to \$5,000.00. Brother R. H. Carpenter, the chairman of the Mileage Committee, has furnished me with an estimate of a saving of \$4,950.60, on the mileage for one representative from each of the six hundred and eighteen lodges, and an estimated saving of \$569.92 on the mileage of the Grand Lodge officers and Committees, making a total amount of saving by the reduction of mileage, \$5,520.53.

Thus it will be seen that the amount of total saving by the reduction of mileage and by completing our Session in two days, will be about \$10,520.53.

In the Masonic Home of Georgia the inmates consist of 2 men, 11 women and 34 children, a total population of 47. As to the prosperity and desirability of caring for aged men and women at their homes we share the views of the Grand Master who says:

I am constrained to repeat the recommendation which I made to the Grand Lodge at its last Communication, to the effect that it would be the part of wisdom for us to contribute to the maintenance of aged, indigent Masons, their wives, and widows, in the locality where they have friends, and acquaintances, where they have lived for many years, rather than maintain them in the Home. The per capita expense of maintenance in the Home is about \$190.00 per year and even one-half of this sum, with an equal contribution from the local Lodge to the beneficiary, would as a rule, make the aged recip-

ients of our bounty better off in the home of some relative or friend than in the Masonic Home.

The Grand Master received the hearty commendation of the entire membership of the Grand Lodge and of the whole fraternity of the State. The Committee on the Grand Master's address closes its report with words of generous praise :

For most men it is reserved that results of their labors shall be only fully known in the long years to come—yet for Most Worshipful Grand Master Napier, Brotherly Love now holds out its hands, and gives him its reward of appreciation, full measure, running over.

Here, upon this occasion of his farewell address as Grand Master, the Committee desires to express in behalf of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge, the never-ending appreciation of the influence of his address, for the unchanging benefits of his principles, for the great and glorious faithfulness of the work.

And we hold out our hands to him, asking that as he goes along life's way, that God and love shall be dear to him, that time shall be tender, and that the jewels of God's reward for him, shall be more glorious than the gems that bedeck the diadems of eastern potentates.

From the report of the Special Committee to which was referred the matter of lodges in Scotland making Jack Johnson, the negro pugilist a Mason, it seems that there was violent protest against this procedure by members of the lodge, who at once reported the matter to the Grand Secretary, and by him was referred to the Grand Committee, which suspended the master and four past masters, and arrested the charter of the lodge until January 1, 1914. Mr. "Johnsing" was initiated and will probably never be advanced beyond that in a symbolic lodge.

An amendment to the code was adopted which permitted the Grand Lodge to hold its annual communication at other cities, and not invariably at Macon as in the past.

The report of the Committee on Appeals and Grievances, shows that about one hundred members were expelled, for non-payment of dues, and that they were classified with those expelled for gross unmasonic conduct. It seems to us that the Subordinate Lodges could manage the matter of

non-payment of dues without having to refer the matter to the Grand Lodge. We think that Georgia is the only Grand Lodge which expels a brother on account of his poverty.

There are 618 lodges, having a total membership of 36,806, a net gain of 1,483.

The successor to Brother A. Q. Moody at the round table is Brother Charles L. Bass, who in his initial contribution gives evidence of possessing the qualifications which will make his reports of value to the Georgia Craft. The proceedings of North Carolina for 1912 are fraternally considered by Brother Bass, and more than four pages assigned to the transactions of the Old North State. Brother Bass has overcome the difficulties which at first seemed insurmountable and in a short time we feel sure, they will have disappeared. We clip this from his introduction:

I entered upon the work embarrassed by inexperience, handicapped by limitations of time; but confronted by the greater difficulty of the high standard set by Brother Moody with his rich scholarship, high ability and ripe experience.

I have finished the task and submit to my Brethren, trusting that the great Masonic virtue—Charity—will enable them to overlook its shortcomings and our cardinal tenet, Benevolence, prompt them to generously accept it.

The likeness of the incoming Grand Master, Ezra A. Burrell, forms the frontispiece.

The address of the retiring Grand Master, Frank C. Bowman, is a plain, business story, without frills or adornments, of an honest and successful administration.

Appropriate reference is made to the fraternal dead.

Dispensation was granted for the formation of a new lodge and refused for another.

The greater part of the Grand Master's address is given over to answering questions, and some of these answers, mostly interpretations of local law, failed to win the approval of the Jurisprudence Committee.

Permission was granted Hot Springs Lodge, No. 62 of Arkansas, to solicit aid for a Masonic sanatorium for the use of all Masons.

The Grand Master regretted that sickness in his family prevented him from making many official visits.

Altho' we think that the Idaho method of caring for the indigent Mason and his family is, by far, the best and thus far has proved satisfactory, still it is apparent, that some of the brethren want a Masonic Home as the more ostentatious method of showing their love for the needy and helpless. To the end of securing a home, an amendment to the By-Laws was offered with the view of entering at once upon the enterprise. After its first reading, the proposed amendment was withdrawn, but is coming up next year, because the "progressives" will not be denied.

The fraternity of Idaho is evidently held in esteem by the ladies of the Eastern Star, and is attested by this extract:

Brother Arch Cunningham, on behalf of Boise Lodge, No. 2 and the ladies of the Adah Chapter, No. 8, Order of the Eastern Star, invited the Grand Lodge and visiting brethren, their wives and daughters and families, and the members of Oriental Lodge, No. 60, with their wives and daughters to a reception and banquet this evening at 8:00 o'clock.

On recommendation of the Committee on Correspondence, the Grand Lodge of Porto Rico was recognized as a regular, independent and sovereign body in its territory.

It was finally decided that the city of Boise should be the home of the Grand Lodge, and that its archives and library should be kept there.

There are 59 lodges in the jurisdiction of Idaho, and a membership of 3,844, making a net gain of 276.

The report on Correspondence, covering 115 pages, is as

usual, contributed by Brother George E. Krupper and is of the excellent quality of the work he presents for inspection. North Carolina proceedings for 1912 receive the kindly consideration of Brother Krupper. We regret that the Idaho proceedings of 1911 got lost in the shuffle and was not dealt into us.

This bulky volume, containing about six hundred pages, should be of the utmost interest to the Craft of Illinois, in as much as it gives full information as to the affairs of the Grand Lodge in every one of its departments.

The address of the Grand Master, Delmar D. Darrah, is an illuminating and dignified statement of his official acts during an eminently successful administration.

Under the heading, State of the Fraternity, the Grand Master recites tersely but fully the progress made in the last ten years:

It is with satisfaction and pride that I report to you the flattering condition of the Craft in Illinois. While we have instituted but eight new lodges during the year this comparatively small number is due to the fact that no dispensations were granted except where it was clearly shown that the best interests of the fraternity demanded a lodge.

Our growth in the last ten years has been almost phenomenal. In 1902, the Grand Lodge of Illinois comprised 724 chartered lodges with a total membership of 63,034. The net gain for that year was 3,367; the report which the Grand Secretary will make to you this year shows that we have 807 lodges, with a membership in round numbers of 115,000, a gain for the year of approximately 7,000. From this it will be seen that at the present rate of increase it will be but a few years until the Grand Lodge of Illinois will number 150,000 good and true men, the flower of Illinois manhood. Who can estimate the power for good of this

great body of men standing shoulder to shoulder in a righteous cause? Does anyone dare say that the lodges in Illinois may not become a moral force from which may radiate great influences for good in every community?

Ten years ago we had no organized charities; today we can refer to two splendid institutions, proving conclusively that the much boasted doctrine of brotherhood has found permanent expression among the Masons of this great state. As evidence of our material prosperity, I call your attention to the fact that all over the state splendid buildings are being erected in which to enshrine the principles of Freemasonry. During the year structures have been consecrated to masonic uses which have cost in the aggregate, over one-half million dollars, a fact which testifies to the permanence of our fraternity.

Appropriate reference is made to the loss of active and zealous brethren, who have crossed over the river and entered into rest.

He reports having reorganized the district deputies with the result that their labor is in every way satisfactory and deserving the commendation of the Grand Lodge.

Twenty-two lodges were constituted and dispensations issued for the formation of eight others.

The functions of dedications and of laying cornerstones are noted by the Grand Master.

Many special dispensations have been granted and many have been refused.

The Grand Master is strongly in favor of encouraging and increasing the number of schools of instruction, and expressed the belief that the upbuilding of the fraternity of Illinois is largely dependent upon these schools.

Touching the questions of physical qualifications, these two questions were submitted, and the answer of the Grand Master was sustained by the Committee on Jurisprudence:

1. Does the necessity of wearing a truss, which it would be dangerous to remove, even temporarily, disqualify a man from receiving the degrees in Masonry?

2. If so, when, where, by whom and in what way should this information be obtained?

The brother who submitted these questions was frank enough to say that he did not want any stock reply behind which Grand

Masters had been hiding when they did not have the nerve to decide, or were ashamed to say, "I don't know," to-wit: "The Master of each lodge must decide the question of physical qualifications, at his peril, as each case presents itself," and suggested that that answer had "driven more Masters to drink, profanity, and eternal damnation than all their other troubles." Being heartily in sympathy with the views of the brother, I answered this question by saying that the wearing of a truss which it is dangerous to remove even temporarily does not disqualify a man from receiving the degrees in Masonry. This same question came up at our schools of instruction, and when I answered as above, several strict ritualists took exception. I have had no occasion to change the opinion ventured and hold that if the wearing of the truss debars a man from receiving the degrees, then modern dentistry has placed a similar handicap upon many good men in the way of artificial teeth and gold crowns. In order that the question may be definitely settled and that brethren may have something tangible to guide them, I ask that the matter be referred to the Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence.

On the subject of "Discipline," the Grand Master reports this unique case:

But few infractions of law requiring disciplinary proceedings have come to my notice. One case, however, I desire to report. Early in the spring my attention was called to the fact that three members of a lodge in southern Illinois had participated in the Masonic burial of a negro. An investigation was instituted, and it was found that a Past Master, a Past Senior Warden and a member of the lodge had assisted in the funeral ceremonies of a negro Mason in the capacity of pall bearers, and had worn the regalia of the clandestine organization. They justified their conduct upon the ground that the negroes being short of help had importuned them. I ordered the lodge to prefer charges against the three offenders, which was done, with the result that the Past Master was expelled and his two companions were sentenced to definite suspension for one year.

At the expense of a large demand on our space we reproduce what the Grand Master says of cypher rituals and other irregularities, which he is trying to correct. He says:

I have found to my surprise that hundreds of cypher rituals are not only in daily use in Illinois among lodge officers, but it is even charged that some grand lecturers have learned their work from this spurious source. The traffic in these books is conducted

openly. Each year the state is flooded with circulars by an outside book concern calling attention to these aids to learning the work and inviting brethren to act as their agents, and it cannot be doubted but that they derive an immense business as the result of their efforts. During the year many of these books have been taken up by the District Deputies and sent me to be destroyed. Within three weeks following the constitution of a lodge which received its charter at last Grand Lodge, I sent one of my officers to take up three cipher rituals which were in active use. In a central Illinois lodge it was found that a local druggist and a member of the lodge was openly selling these unlawful books over his counter. I ordered charges preferred against him with the result that the lodge gave him a reprimand, not wishing to expel him, for fear, perhaps, their source of supply might be disturbed. This case I have appealed to the Grand Lodge and it is now before the Committee on Appeals for review. A brother disciplined for officiating as pall bearer at a negro masonic funeral disclosed the fact that in his lodge there were seven cipher rituals in active use, and that the members were in the habit of exchanging rituals with a negro lodge of Masons. This case is now under investigation. Last fall I instructed all District Deputies to commence a vigorous crusade against the cipher ritual with the result that some progress has been made.

The Grand Master reports writing as many as forty or fifty letters a day in answering inquiries, that were deemed entirely unnecessary.

He states that he rendered no decisions. We have seen some of the travesties to which the Grand Master refers, and we are in thorough accord with the opinion of the Grand Master, the first that we have seen from any Grand East on this subject:

Somewhere, some time, a silly ass trying to be funny at the expense of the traveling salesman wrote a travesty on our Entered Apprentice catechism. It gained quite a ready circulation among a class of Masons because it was the kind of literature with which they were best acquainted, and like the balance of their Masonry, could be easily carried in the pocket. Every little while some lodge member who wants to be cute and who lacks the legitimate means of attracting attention to himself, either by a knowledge of the ritual or the practice of the moral and social virtues, will reprint this detestable travesty, and appending his advertising card, give the whole ready circulation. During the year one brother Mason who possessed some inventive genius, and who

had a pique at the mayor of his town, prepared a travesty on the second degree catechism and had it printed in the local paper. I believe that the time has come when all good Masons should join in an active crusade against the circulation of masonic 'travesties of any kind whatever, and that charges should be preferred against any brother who gives countenance in any way to the dissemination of this senseless jargon. I anticipate that a little discipline along this line will soon stop their circulation and have a wholesome effect.

The report on Correspondence covering 225 pages of this volume is contributed by Past Grand Master, Owen Scott, among the ablest of Masonic scholars in Illinois if not in the United States, since the passing of the illustrious Masonic scholar, Joseph Robbins, of precious memory.

The proceedings of North Carolina for 1912 receive his fraternal consideration without adverse criticism. The absence of a review of Illinois for 1911 is owing to the fact that we failed to receive the volume.

We concur, cordially, in the last paragraph from Brother Scotts "poem" touching the pleasures and labors of a member of the guild in preparing the reports:

The work of reviewing the world's doings in masonry for the third time has been a most pleasant one, although the labor has been considerable. Considering the mission of service to humanity, coming in contact with the work of the vast army enrolled under the fraternal banner, there could be nothing but benefit and blessing to the reviewer. It is sincerely hoped the brethren of Illinois may be made better by the labor done.

The volume is adorned with the likeness of the handsome incoming Grand Master, John W. Hanan.

At the annual informal assemblage before the meeting of

the Grand Lodge, the Grand Master, Brother Elmer F. Gay, was made the recipient of a loving cup, thus inscribed:

At the conclusion of the preliminary to the opening of the Grand Lodge, Past Grand Master Calvin W. Prather, on behalf of the Grand Masters of other Jurisdictions who had attended the Conference of Grand Masters on March 17 and 18 in the City of Indianapolis, presented to M. W. Elmer F. Gay a loving cup of most beautiful design, engraved with the signatures of those present at the conference. The surprise to Brother Gay was so complete that for once in his life he was nearly carried off his balance, but he rallied, and in pleasing words accepted the kindly remembrance with expressions of love and affection for those who had so sweetly remembered him.

Brother Gay's annual address is a fine paper, creditable to himself and his Grand Lodge. This is the flattering condition of the Craft as he reports it:

We now number sixty-three thousand and thirty-five Master Masons in this Grand Jurisdiction, a gain of two thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven over 1912, the largest gain that we have ever made. One of the best features of this splendid increase is the fact that it has been general throughout the entire State, and I am assured that the high standard which Masonry demands has been maintained in all cases.

The usual routine of the Grand Master's office is observed in the report, including constitution of lodges, dispensations for lodges, laying of cornerstones, and dedication of halls.

Some complaints were received by the Grand Master, most of which he happily composed, but he had occasion sometimes to impose discipline.

Our prediction last year that Indiana would soon have a Masonic Home has been verified, and the Grand Master and his associates are enthusiastic in their efforts to establish a handsome institution. This practically has been done. The money is in hand and a very desirable and beautiful site has been secured at Jeffersonville. In fact, all the preliminaries for commencing work have been methodically arranged.

The decisions of the Grand Master were concurred in by the Grand Lodge.

Brother Gay is a strong advocate of continuing the conference of the Grand Masters, as thereby he believes that only good can accrue to the Craft.

Speaking of the disastrous floods in Indiana, he refers to the numerous tenders of financial aid from the Grand Lodges and individual Masons, and says it was to him a practical demonstration of that fraternal love and friendship which should, and does, exist between Masons wherever dispersed. He says in part:

We returned all donations, thanking the senders and informing them that we expect to be able to render all assistance needed without calling for outside aid, but should it be necessary we would so inform them. I trust that this Grand Lodge will officially extend its thanks for the many offers of assistance which have been received.

Under the jurisdiction of Indiana there are 553 subordinate lodges, having a total membership of 63,035, a net gain of 2,867.

Past Grand Master Charles N. Mikels received permission of the Grand Lodge to have printed in the proceedings a very strong argument for the continuance, regularly, of the conferences of Grand Masters.

The report on Correspondence, which is known in Indiana as the "Indiana Annual Masonic Review" (which we accept as a very appropriate designation of the work) is presented by Past Grand Master Daniel McDonald, who on account of feeble health incident to the weight of eighty winters was not able to be present at this communication or that of last year. Our brother apologises for the character of the work, but to us it is as strong and attractive as it has been in the past. The one hundred and forty-two pages of the report are all of value. The proceedings of the Grand Lodge of North Carolina for 1912 receive the kindly consideration of Brother McDonald, who sees much to commend and little to criticize in the Tar Heel transactions.

In its execution and arrangement, this large and handsome volume of proceedings, gives evidence of the prosperity of the Grand Lodge and attests the skill and artistic taste of its Grand Secretary, Brother Newton R. Parvin.

A handsome engraved portrait of the Grand Master, Judge William Hutchinson forms the frontispiece of the volume. His annual address is a fine paper and gives a comprehensive review of the condition of the fraternity after a very successful administration. We think it a pity that so able and well equipped an executive could not be held for another year, at least.

The fine results of one year's occupancy of the Grand East gives an earnest of the possibilities of good for a second term. We quote this paragraph from his exordium as showing his conception of Masonry:

To the student's mind Masonry presents a varied field of instructive lessons. It matters little whether it is called a religion or not. It is enough to say that it brings vividly before us the great truths and teachings of the Holy Bible. All our holy precepts and symbols are taken from the Bible, which is the foundation of all Masonry. By it we are taught obedience to the moral law, which means more than the observance of technical rules. It means that Masonry must distinguish between good and evil and right and wrong in all our dealings with all mankind. It means we must walk uprightly and act justly.

Appropriate and extended reference to the Masonic dead adds very much to the interest of this paper. We reproduce his beautiful quotation at the close of his remarks under the head of Necrology:

"Why be afraid of death, as though your life were breath?
Death but anoints your eyes with clay.
O, glad surprise!

"Why should we be forlorn? Death only husks the corn.
Why should we fear to meet the thrasher of the wheat?

'Is sleep a thing to dread? Yet sleeping you are dead
'Till you awake and rise, here or beyond the skies.

"Why should it be a wrench to leave your wooden bench?
Why not with happy shout run home when school is out?

"The dear ones left behind? Oh, foolish one and blind.
A day—and you will meet—a night— and you will greet.

"This is the death of death, to breathe away a breath
And know the end of strife, and it is the deathless life.

"And joy without a fear, and smile without a tear,
And work, nor care to rest, and find the last the best."

He reports the Iowa Craft to be prosperous, at peace with each other and with all the world.

His decisions were approved as in accordance with Masonic law.

He denounced vigorously the travesties upon the catechism of the different degrees and suggested that severe discipline should be imposed on any Mason who "composes, prints, circulates or merely speaks these Masonic travesties."

He calls attention to the acting of clandestine Masonry in the Jurisdiction and warns the Craft against these frauds.

He pays this compliment to past Grand Master, Charles E. Clark, the Committee on Correspondence, but unfortunately not even this high tribute to his ability and fitness will keep Brother Clark at the round table beyond this year. He says:

The report on Fraternal Correspondence requires peculiar skill and particular fitness to properly prepare and present. I feel that I was justified in appointing Past Grand Master Charles C. Clark to present this most important report. No report made to our Grand Lodge is heard with more interest, and none is of more importance to lovers of good Masonic literature. The report prepared by Past Grand Master Clark bears evidence of much thought and research, contains useful information, and is clothed in appropriate and beautiful language. It contains so much of interest to the Craft generally of the work being done in other jurisdictions that I commend it to you for your careful study.

His judicial duties prevented him from making many

official visits, but those which he made were thoroughly enjoyed.

He adverts to the Charity Fund of the Grand Lodge and in this connection we wish to say, as we have done on former occasions, that the Iowa manner of dispensing charity is the true Masonic way, and is followed by the most satisfactory results.

Grand Master Hutchinson is not a stickler for the physically perfection fad and suggests that the law in this topic be made elastic. He closes his discussion of this matter in these eloquent words:

I have always been thankful that I am possessed with two good legs and two strong hands and arms. My heart has always gone out in sympathy for my less fortunate brother-men, and if the teachings of the great truths of speculative Freemasonry are good for me they ought not to be denied to those who are less fortunate. When the grave is opened and we come forth the deformities of an earthly body will have disappeared. I believe this doctrine, my brethren, or I would not preach it, and I would not be true to my God now if I did not teach it.

We would be glad to quote more fully from this admirable address, but our limited space forbids the indulgence.

There are in the Jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Iowa 525 lodges having a total membership of 47,585, showing a net increase for the year, of 1,588. This is a fine exhibit of the year's work.

The report on Correspondence is contributed by Past Grand Master, Charles C. Clark whose labors at the round table have marked him as one of the foremost writers in this department of Masonic literature. We feel sincere sorrow at his determination to lay down his pen and direct his talents to secular affairs.

The proceedings of the Grand Lodge of North Carolina for 1912 receive the fraternal consideration of Brother Clark.

From his epilogue we quote this hopeful view of the progress and influence of Freemasonry:

In the main, however, the progress of Masonry has been safe, sane, substantial, and impressive. Perhaps there are not so many of the so-called distinguished men joining, but the real

yeomanry of the world, the solid substantial, moral, and upright men of every community are proud to enlist under its banners. Its influence is on the side of civic righteousness and its mighty power is back of every onward and upward movement.

The likeness of the retiring Grand Master, Judge William Easton Hutchinson, forms the frontispiece of this handsome volume, and further on in the book are to be found photographs of his nine associate officers.

To the Kansas Mason, who desires to be equipped for any service which the Grand Lodge or the subordinate Lodge may impose upon him, this volume will give the needed information, not alone as to the 57 years of its useful life but will give also the constitution and By-laws and edicts of its Grand Masters. Besides it gives valuable information as to the antiquity, the land marks and the regulations of the ancient Craft. It is a volume of value to any Mason, but especially to a member of the Kansas fraternity, and is deserving of close study.

In his fine address, Grand Master Hutchinson gives a very attractive story of the year's work. It is written in clear, forcible style. We extract this from his exordium:

The net gain in the membership within this jurisdiction during the year 1912 is 1,572, which is not as great by more than two hundred as that of each of the two last preceeding years. No attempt will be made to account for this slight decline, nor does it call for any explanation other than the suggestion that, in the ordinary course of events, gains and losses come with no steady or regular cadences. In some of the lodges the increase has been unprecedented, and so great as to call for an inquiry as to the scrutiny with which petitions are received and accepted; but in all such cases is is very evident that the Mason of today

is more careful about preserving the high character, honor and stability of the lodge than was the Mason of yesterday.

The success and attainment of the lodges are not wholly measured by its numerical increase. The older elements which show growth and development must be taken into consideration at the same time in making the inventory. The value of each note and bond in the bank has more to do in the computation of the total assets of the institution than the number of the notes and bonds.

His tribute to the Masonic dead of his own Jurisdiction is affectionate and earnest.

Under the head of Foreign Relations, he states that the York Grand Lodge of Mexico, with which Kansas holds fraternal relations, made inquiry as to the prosperity of the York Grand Lodge extending recognition to another Grand Lodge in the Mexican Republic, (presumably under the jurisdiction of a Supreme Council,) and this inquiry was referred to the Chairman of the Committee on Correspondence, M. W. Brother Matthew M. Miller, who promptly advised against any such procedure.

Seven lodges were constituted and dispensations issued for the formation of two others.

He reports the issue of 82 special dispensations, all of which were approved.

His kindness of heart, good sense and diplomacy combined to save him from the unpleasant duty of imposing discipline on several of the lodges for their persistency in the use of forbidden rituals.

He reports official visits to 36 lodges and their utility is so apparent that he is very much in favor of holding district conventions; so that it will be very much more convenient for his successors to meet the fraternity generally than in the present way of visiting individual lodges.

He gives high praise to the fidelity, intelligence and zeal of the district deputies who have visited every lodge in the State within the year.

The Grand Master reported only three decisions, one of which states that when the investigating committee reports that the petition does not possess the requisite qualifications,

mental or physical it is not necessary to spread the ballot. In North Carolina the rule is that the ballot must be spread in any event. With the acceptance of this decision the report of the investigating committee seems to be sufficient to determine the fate of the candidate, and, therefore would seem to indicate that the ballot was superfluous.

The Grand Master is a firm friend of the Masonic Home as will be seen from this extract:

Each recurring Annual Communication has been the occasion of our renewed satisfaction and pleasure in being able in this way to make the declining years of our dependent brothers and their wives and widows brighter and happier, and to afford a temporary home for masonic orphans, where the great principles of brotherly love, relief and truth are inculcated, while they are acquiring, like other more fortunate children, the knowledge usually received in the public schools which they are privileged regularly to attend. Too much cannot be said of the great feature that is being done in that institution, and the greatest feature of it all is, that those who enjoy its privileges are not inmates of a purely charitable institution, but are members of a home.

The Home is still under the efficient management of our most capable superintendent, Brother James Snedden, and his estimable wife. The number of members has increased this year from eighty-seven to ninety-five; thus the number now consists of nineteen women, twenty-five men, twenty-seven girls and twenty-four boys. Death claimed nine of our family this year, all of mature and well-ripened age except one, Raymond Guest, age fifteen, who died December 26th, and rejoiced in the fact that he lived past Christmas Day so as not to mar the happiness of the other children in the Home on that festive occasion. Aside from the deaths, nothing unusual has occurred at the Home this year.

There are 402 lodges under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Kansas, having a total membership of 38,877, a net gain of 1,572 within the year.

In a special report of the Committee on Correspondence, presented by Brother Matthew M. Miller, the Swiss Grand Lodge, Alpina is shown to be entirely unworthy of recognition as a Masonic body.

The report on Correspondence, covering a review of 66 Grand Lodges, 8 of them for two years, is, as usual,

presented by Past Grand Master Matthew M. Miller, and covers 186 pages of the volume.

The proceedings of North Carolina for 1912 are fraternally reviewed by Brother Miller, who fortunately finds nothing to criticise, except that this scribe is disqualified to serve "as a judge in a beauty contest." We demur to this finding of our brother, and insist without any qualification whatever that we were entirely right in our estimate of the value of Brother Miller's labors. We could call up a host of witnesses to sustain us.

The likeness of the incoming Grand Master Joe H. Ewalt forms the frontispiece of the volume. Just preceding the roll of the Masonic dead of Kentucky is found the portrait of the Beloved Grand Secretary, H. B. Grant, who after a life well spent, has ceased from his labors.

The address of the retiring, Grand Master Dave Jackson, is an excellent presentation of his official doings during the year. Following his exordium is this tribute to the worth and zeal of the deceased Grand Secretary:

Capt. Henry Baninster Grant, Grand Secretary of this Grand Lodge (of whom you all know), is the one that God called from our official family. Unwelcome and uninvited the death angel crept into our midst and plucked from us one of the noblest characters, one of the brightest minds, and one of the truest Masons that, to my mind, Freemasonry has ever been blessed with. Capt. Grant was a Masonic code within himself, loved by all who knew him, a friend to the poor, a help to the helpless, and a comfort to those who knew him best. He was a Mason in deed and in truth. He put into practice each day the great teachings of Masonry—Charity. That Charity which suffereth long and is

kind, which vaunteth not itself, doth not behave itself unseemly, is not puffed up. His life has been a great sermon within itself. We mourn the loss of Capt. Grant, and extend to his beloved family our heartfelt sympathy and love in this sad experience which they have been called upon to endure.

The decisions of the Grand Master were not numerous, and met the approval of the Jurisprudence Committee and of the Grand Lodge.

Many special dispensations were granted and an unusual number of official visits were made by the Grand Master, for which he received the hearty commendation of the Grand Lodge.

He refers to the two great charities, the widows and orphans' home, and the old Masons' home and states that they are both in excellent condition. This extract indicates his view on the question of perpetual jurisdiction.

The sovereignty of this Grand Lodge touching all Masonic matters within but not outside its territorial boundary, is full and complete; and any of its subordinate lodges have the right to receive the petition of any profane or non-affiliate who is a resident of its respective jurisdiction and possesses the physical, mental, moral, and residential qualifications that may be required by the constitution and regulations of this Grand Lodge. This Grand Lodge concedes the same right and power to all other Grand Lodges.

At the risk of being charged with "padding" our pages we are bound to reproduce this rebuke:

Dear Sir and Brother:

I have your letter of the 16th, in which you say my circular letter urging subscription to the Home Journal was read to your lodge and my request for such subscription "was voted down by a large vote against it," I wish you to read this letter to the lodge and report to me that you have done so. The price of the subscription is 25 cents per copy per annum, which would cost your eighty-five members a total of \$21.25 a year towards fostering one of the greatest Masonic charities in the United States. It appears from the report of the Home, that your lodge has had nine beneficiaries accepted into the Masonic Widows and Orphans' Home, clothed, fed, instructed in one of the best schools in Kentucky and had the care of the most distinguished physicians, as well as kind and competent care of the officers at the Home.

These children were of the Clark, Hyden, Herd and Stuart families, and the aggregated time they remained at the Home was twenty-five years. It cost the Masons of Kentucky last year something more than \$139.00 to support each ward; and the average cost during the time these children remained at the Home, we will say \$120 a year for each one of them, which in the aggregate amounts to \$3,000 and more, actual cost, not taking into account many gifts they received, and the entertainments given them at the expense of the lodges in the city. Now, although your lodge received from the Home relief from the care and expense of supporting nine beneficiaries at a cost of over \$3,000.00, it now refuses to contribute to the welfare of the home the paltry sum of \$21.25 a year. Pardon me if I say I am amazed that any lodge in Kentucky would for an instant hesitate, and above all things refuse to contribute so small a sum to such a great charity—especially when it received from the charitable institution the equivalent of over \$3,000.00 in money toward supporting their destitute widows and orphans. I doubt whether, under the circumstances, it is not my duty to ask you to return your charter. I shall take this matter under careful consideration, for if we teach charity and practice it so little, I doubt if we are entitled to the name of Masonry. Besides all this, for the expenditure of the small subscription price, every Mason receives more than three or four times its value in Masonic information. I take it the brethren do not want “more light” in Masonry, and can see very little use in continuing the lodge.

In the jurisdiction of Kentucky there are 578 subordinate lodges having a present membership of 38,782, showing a net gain of 1,426.

The report on Correspondence, covering 120 pages, is presented by Past Grand Master, William W. Clarke and the highest praise that we can give it is to say that it is up to the standard of his former contributions.

Commenting, under Washington, on the subject of exclusion for non-payment of dues, Brother Clarke makes this strong answer, and we concur:

What Brother Tyler says is true. Strange as it may seem, in such matters, in many instances, Masonic lawmakers show more consideration for those under discipline for the infraction of Masonic law, sometimes in cases involving moral turpitude, than for a brother who has been suspended for failure to pay his lodge dues. The trouble is, that while, under present conditions, it

is at times necessary to suspend a brother for this reason, yet when he pays his dues, that fact should automatically reinstate him. Such was at one time the law in Kentucky, but a provision, similar to that of the Washington law, we presume, was finally inserted in the Constitution, and it required years of persistent effort to secure even a modification of its stringent provisions. The law now is that after two years the suspended brother, after paying the amount for which he was suspended, must petition for reinstatement, his petition must be referred to a Committee, and lie over one month, then, if three-fourths of the members present so vote, by secret ballot, he is reinstated. And all this for what? Because he failed to pay, possibly, one year's dues, was suspended therefor, and for two years so remained. Is money and the getting of money of such importance to Masonry?

The photograph of Grand Master elect, Emil Sundbury occupies the fly leaf of the volume. Look at the fine head and strong features of the new executive, we hazard the guess, that he will compare favorably with the best of his predecessors, and that the Craft of Louisiana will have reason to congratulate itself.

The address of the retiring Grand Master, E. H. Addington, is a straight forward and dignified report of his stewardship, and leaves nothing to be wished for in the recital of his official doings.

The Grand Master is in favor of permitting lodges to have public installations without the requirements of a dispensation from the Grand Master.

A member of one of the lodges having publicly renounced Masonry, the Grand Master reports his action in the matter.

I instructed that all the facts be brought forward at a regular meeting and duly entered in the minutes of the Lodge.

That having been done, that the Lodge adopt a statement and resolution that the fact of public renunciation severed the Brother's connection with the Lodge and with Masonry; that his name be stricken from the roll and the fact duly reported to the Grand Secretary. This I consider equivalent to an indefinite suspension, but as it varies slightly from the suspension by the Grand Master provided for in the Constitution, I ask your approval.

After approving the action of the Grand Master the Committee on Jurisprudence adds this comment:

This is a practical solution and seems a good one, but it leaves an unsatisfied suggestion that some more drastic means of condemnation should be found.

Why condemnation? The man came into the fraternity of his own free will and accord and had the right to withdraw whenever he chose to do so, without punishment or condemnation. He could have joined a church and could, at any time, withdraw without denunciation. Practically many Masons renounce Masonry every year and still their names are carried on the rolls.

The Grand Master expresses the view that visitation was a "fundamental right" possessed by every Master Mason but the Jurisprudence Committee, showed very clearly that it was a privilege to be enjoyed only under certain qualifications.

In charities dispensed by the fraternity of Louisiana to sick and distressed sojourning Masons, Louisiana Relief Lodge, No. 1, is a most active agent. In its report, we find this peculiar case:

The instance which we have called a special case came to our notice some four months ago. It was that of the daughter of a deceased Master Mason of the State of Texas, her husband—not a Mason—serving a sentence in the State Penitentiary, and she having four small children to support. When brought to us, it was an instance of utter destitution. For this we made a special appeal to the Lodges of the city and met with a ready response, and with what we also received from the Lodge of her father's connection, we fitted her up a little store which we think will keep them from want with very little attention on our part.

There are 210 lodges, having a total membership of 15,152.

The report on Correspondence, occupying only 62 pages of the volume, is the work of Brother Herman C. Duncan, and is able, instructive and thoroughly independent. North Carolina for 1912, receives the fraternal consideration of Brother Duncan.

Reviewing Mexico for 1912, he has this to say of the Grand Lodge Valle de Mexico and the new, York Grand Lodge, which claims to be the Supreme Masonic authority in the Federal district of Mexico:

The Grand Lodge Valle de Mexico as it existed before what Brother Young terms the separation was on the lines held by the Grand Lodge of Louisiana. We deeply regret that it did not continue to hold its strong position when certain lodges seceded from it. We sincerely hope that it will give up its sectarian name of York, and boldly proclaim itself as the sole Grand Lodge of Freemasons in the Federal District of Mexico, as we believe is its right. It would not thereby be precluded from warranting Lodges in any territory not occupied by a legitimate and authoritative Grand Lodge. Louisiana Grand Lodge has never claimed jurisdiction beyond the State of Louisiana, but that has not hindered her from warranting Lodges in unoccupied territory. She has in time past had her Lodge in Vera Cruz and Yucatan, but never claimed to be the sole Masonic authority in Mexico. She set no such evil example to those that should come after.

The Annual address of the Grand Master, Elmer P. Spofford, is a clear, well written report of his official doings during the year.

The Grand Master paid an affectionate tribute to the memory of Brother Warren Osgood Carnay, the beloved Grand Tyler who had given forty years of service to the Grand Lodge.

He expresses the view that the policy of purchasing life membership should not be adopted by the lodges, and where it now exists, he thinks the by-laws should be repealed.

He granted dispensations to a large number of brethren in Washington County to establish a lodge of instruction under such restrictions as would prevent the performance of any Masonic work.

On recommendation of the Committee on Correspondence the Grand Lodge of Porto Rico was recognized as a regular and sovereign Grand Lodge in its own territory.

The Grand Lodges of the Dominican Republic and of Costa Rica made applications for recognition, but the Committee asked for further time in which to make a formal report.

On information of the destruction caused by the floods in Ohio, Brother Spofford sent to the Grand Master of Ohio a check for \$500 to meet immediate demands for aid.

He made no decisions. He was requested by some of the brethren to permit them as Master Masons to appeal to the President of the United States to pardon a Mason who was serving sentence imposed upon him by naval authorities. He refused to approve and instead offered this stinging rebuke:

The petitioners should act in the character of citizens and ask for the pardon of the convict upon other grounds than that he is a Mason. Masons are lovers of law and order, good government and efficient administration of public affairs, and they adhere to the proposition that all men are alike and equal before the law. It is our privilege, as citizens, to petition the Government for the redress of wrongs and in the interest of justice, and it would be our duty so to petition for the commutation of sentence of one, especially a Mason, who had already suffered adequate punishment for his offence; but the petition for clemency should be based upon the ground of justice and not upon the fact that the prisoner is a Mason. It would be a perversion of Masonry to inject it into our courts or departments of government to prejudice or influence the due administration of law and justice.

In the Grand Jurisdiction of Maine there are 203 lodges, having a total membership of 29,872 and an average lodge

membership of one hundred and forty-seven and fifteen one-hundreths.

The report on Correspondence, 114 pages is contributed by Past Grand Master, Ambro E. Chase, and is a discriminating review of the proceedings which had come to hand. We regret that the North Carolina volume is among the number that is missing.

A very careful inspection of this small volume of proceeding shows throughout, that its officers and committees are faithful and zealous in the discharge of their duties, that the benevolent funds are accumulated and safe guarded with such care that there is no danger of an indigent brother or his dependents suffering from serious want. Brotherly love and peace prevail and this happy condition is confirmed by the report of the Committee on Grievances and Appeals, which says that it has had absolutely nothing to do.

The address of the Grand Master, Brother William Chambers is a very clear and unpretentious statement of his government of the Craft for the preceeding year, and he is justly entitled to all the commendation which the Grand Lodge has given him.

We quote from the exordium in part :

Freemasonry teaches the things that are noble and true. We are urged by its lessons in the most forcible manner to perform such duties and be guided by such principles as will make us good, true and better men in all relations of life.

The Masonic order seems so wonderful to me that I think the Most High must have inspired our founders to make it the unit of all creeds. The order is not meant to take the place of the

church or religion, but nevertheless it combines the different faiths in a unit, where no contention exists.

Under the head of Condition of the Craft, he states that the year has been prosperous in a commercial as well as in a Masonic way, and that there has been splendid growth in the various lodges. We subscribe, without reservation of any kind, to the following sensible remarks, which might be profitably digested by other Grand Jurisdictions.

The real seat of interest must always be in the subordinate lodge. The older members of the Grand Lodge, who have been coming here for many years, have a natural attachment for the Grand Lodge as such, but I believe it is true that no Mason will long keep a true and warm interest in Masonic matters if he neglects his Subordinate Lodge, attends none of its meetings, and gets out of touch with its membership.

Our Masonic obligations were taken at the altar of a subordinate lodge, and it is by gathering round that same altar that we are most likely to preserve its binding effect on mind and conscience. It was in a subordinate lodge that we first observed the chaste beauty of Masonic symbols, and there that we first heard the lofty principles of right living that Masonry inculcates.

It is by regular attendance at the subordinate lodge that the light by which Masons work and live may surely continue to shine and illumine our minds and make plain the path of duty. You have been instructed before from this Grand East concerning the evils of non-affiliation, but I would also call your attention to a sort of legalized non-affiliation.

It is the condition of the Mason who is a member in form but not in fact. His name remains on the list, but his person does not appear in the Lodge room. He pays his dues—Masonic dues ordinarily are not heavy to the average member—but he pays no attention to Masonic duty.

Every now and then he comes to the lodge on special occasions, and possibly wears a Masonic emblem in the hope that other brothers may note and thereby he may receive the benefit of Masonic friendship and confidence.

He is non-affiliated in everything except in name, and all the evils of non-affiliation surround Masonry such as his.

Membership and affiliation mean more than mere payment of dues, it means an interest in Masonry, and in brother Masons, and it demands attention to the affairs of the subordinate lodges.

In Manitoba there are 78 lodges, having a total membership of 6,455, showing a net increase of 488.

The Grand Lodge held two special communications, one for laying the cornerstone of the Polytechnic Institute, Baltimore, and the other for the dedication of the Masonic Temple, Cumberland, Maryland. The ceremonies on each occasion were elaborate and impressive.

We have read with a great deal of interest and pleasure, the transactions for the semi-annual communication, which was held at Easton, Maryland, May 14, 1912, for the purpose of "Commemorating the 125th, but in fact the 129th Anniversary of the formation of the Grand Lodge," and for honoring the memory of Dr. John Coats who organized the Grand Lodge of Maryland, and was its first Grand Master. After its arrival in Easton, the Grand Lodge proceeded to the cemetery, and Grand Master, Thomas J. Shryock placed a beautiful wreath of flowers on the grave; after which Past Grand Master, John M. Carter delivered an eloquent eulogy upon Brother Coats.

After opening the Grand Lodge the Grand Master introduced Brother Oswald Tilghman of Coats Lodge, No. 102, who delivered a brief but entertaining address on the services of Dr. Coats to Masonry and to the State.

Immediately following this address, Rev. Brother Henry Branch, D. D. Grand Chaplain, read a prayer, prepared by Brother Edward Schultz, the Grand Historian, entitled "Origin of Freemasonry."

This contribution of Brother Schultz covers 16 pages of the volume and is of so much interest that we have read

and re-read it carefully. Although we are not ready to accept the traditions offered by Brother Schultz, as constituting any part of Masonic history, still they are of great interest and indicate the trend of his mind in seeking the sources from which our present Craft may have sprung.

The Committee on Grievances reported that it had nothing to do in the last six months.

At the annual Communication, it is seen from the reports submitted by officers and committees, that the Craft of Maryland, is prosperous and zealous in the performance of its duties.

General Thomas J. Shryock was unanimously elected Grand Master for the 28th time. This continuous service of the Grand Master is a compliment from his brethren as to his pronounced fitness for the office, also a compliment to the good sense and patriotism of the rank and file of the fraternity.

Maryland has 114 subordinate lodges, having a total membership of 15,142, a net gain of 711.

The Report on Correspondence, 131 pages, is contributed by Brother Edward T. Schultz, who although in his 86th year does not exhibit any of the weakness generally supposed to follow with the years.

The proceedings of North Carolina, for 1912, received the fraternal consideration of Brother Schultz.

We quote the last paragraph of his conclusion:

And now in the eighty-sixth year of my natural life and fifty-ninth year as a member of our beloved fraternity, I think I may repeat the words I said last year "that after these many months of labor I find myself as fresh as when I commenced and I think that after a few days' rest I could be ready to commence the preparation of the next year's Reports." And I do not know how better to close these remarks than by also repeating the words I then used: "If this be my final conclusion, may it also be my benediction to my Brethren and Companions of the Corps, my good friends in and out of the Fraternity, and to all good Masons where-soever dispersed."

The photograph of the newly elected Grand Master, Francis Devereux Clarke, forms the frontispiece, and the following page is occupied by photographs of his associate Grand Officers. The Grand Master was born in Raleigh, N. C., and comes of the best blood of the Old North State. His father Col. William J. Clarke, was a soldier in the Mexican War and later took active part in the war between the states. After the establishment of Peace Col. Clarke obtained high judicial position in his State. His mother, Mrs. Mary Baird Clarke, was distinguished among the women of her time, and possessed the gift of poetry to a marked extent, and was prominent in the coterie of literary women. On his mother's side the Grand Master is a direct descendant of one of the early Colonial governors, Thomas Pollock. Brother Clarke is to be congratulated for having attained the highest gift held in the hands of an army of more than seventy-one thousand Masons, and the Michigan Craft for having found a man who by heredity and association can be nothing less than a gentleman.

The address of the retiring Grand Master, James H. Thompson, contains a very full statement of his official doings as well as of the state of the Craft during his administration.

The Grand Master reports the constitution of five lodges, the laying of cornerstones, and such functions as the dedication of temples.

Many special dispensations were granted.

The Grand Master was able to pay only a few official visits.

He reports the loss of "the goat":

You doubtless have noticed the unusually fine appearance of the Grand Lodge officers, which is made especially noticeable by the new official aprons and jewels, and thereby hangs a tale:

At the time of the dedication of the Masonic Hall of Harbor Springs, the official suit-case, technically known and designated as the Goat, was stolen while in the custody of the Grand Rapids and Indiana Railroad Company. The miscreant who purloined the same evidently thought he had secured a case of jewels, but on finding out to the contrary threw it into the Bay, retaining only the jewels, probably not then aware that they were made of cast iron. The aprons were ruined, but through the courtesy of the railroad company, by its personal representative Brother John H. P. Hughart, the jewels and aprons have been replaced with new ones and our official staff is properly adorned, and without expense to the Grand Lodge.

The imposition of discipline was the misfortune of one of the lodges, whose charter was arrested for gross misconduct.

Upon announcement of the Ohio floods and the distress following them, the Grand Master forwarded \$500 to Brother Bromwell, the Grand Secretary, together with \$120 from county lodges in Saginaw County.

The Masonic Home of Michigan is a nice place for anybody to visit and has the attractions of a real home, if the Grand Master is correct:

The Masonic Home at Alma is indeed a home to the happy and contented residents who through the vicissitudes of life find themselves in their declining years in need of its hospitality. It has more the appearance of a high grade hotel than that of an institution. The buildings have been put in excellent condition, the rooms are sweet and clean, the meals served are good enough for the most fastidious, and a restful, homelike atmosphere pervades the place.

At a reception given by the local Craft to Past Grand Master, William T. Mitchell, and Brother Calvin Thompson, father of Grand Master James H. Thompson, there were eloquent speeches and good fellowship in abundance. It was the ninety-sixth anniversary of Brother Mitchell's birth. On

this occasion Grand Master Thompson addressed the Grand Lodge and said:

The King can do no wrong, and likewise the Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Michigan is a law unto himself; and now that we have introduced one "young man" to this audience, I want to crave your forbearance and give myself the pleasure of introducing another "young man" who has been my friend for a great many years.

Brethren, I have the pleasure of introducing to you my father, who will soon celebrate his ninety-first birthday (great applause). It may be that other boys have had better fathers but it has never come to my knowledge. We have been pals since I could remember, and the days that have elapsed since my babyhood until now have been watched over by this kind old father, and the ambition for the boy is what has kept him here until this time. Several years ago, when I had just started in the Grand line, there came days when he was discouraged and his health was failing and he felt he would have to give up. But I told him if he would wait until I became Grand Master, he could do what he wanted to after that. So he has stayed and we hope we will keep him with us many years.

The Grand Lodge of Michigan has under its jurisdiction 424 subordinate lodges, having a total membership of 71,752 a net gain of 3,355. This is wonderful growth.

The report on Correspondence, quite half of the volume is contributed by Brother Lou B. Winsor, Past Grand Master, and Grand Secretary. In his introduction he explains that North Carolina is not in the list of the reviewed simply because he had not received the transactions. So we have no complaint:

I herewith submit my tenth annual report on correspondence which includes a review of sixty-six Grand Jurisdictions, being all with whom the Grand Lodge of Michigan is in fraternal relation, whose proceedings are printed in the English language, excepting those of Montana and North Carolina, their volume of proceedings not having reached us at the time this report goes to press, the reviews of the Grand Lodges of Mexico, Mississippi, Oklahoma, Philippine Islands, Tasmania, Quebec, Tennessee and Utah covering a period of two years.

The volume is adorned with pictures of the retiring Grand Master, Owen Morris and of a handsome loving cup, presented by his brethren of the Welsh persuasion, than whom there are no better Masons anywhere. There are also photographs of David W. Knowlton, Grand Treasurer, of John Fishel the Grand Secretary; and of two distinguished deceased brothers, Samuel Emery Adams, Grand Senior Warden 1859, and of Past Grand Master Henry Rogers Wells.

The address of Grand Master Morris is a thoroughly good report of his stewardship for the year and he sums up the results in this inspiring paragraph:

I feel that for a year I have been going in and out among the Craft, watching them doing work, square, true, and good. There has been no discord in any of the apartments of the Temple. Each workman attended to his own work and seemed to consider it a man's job. I have not heard a complaint. I have quite forgotten what a sour face looks like. The sound of a hammer at the building has not been heard. There are no knockers in all Jerusalem.

He made appropriate and brief reference to the Masonic dead of his own and other jurisdictions.

He reports one lodge constituted; two lodges consolidated; surrender of charter of one lodge, and dispensations issued for three others.

His eight decisions seem to us to be correct and they met with the approval of the Jurisprudence Committee.

The George Washington Memorial Association, he considers to be of great service now and of still more in the future.

He reports this modest request from three individuals, who, presumably must consider themselves of more than ordinary importance, either on account of the length of their purses or on account of official positions. This is his story:

I have had a direct request from one person, a direct request on behalf of another person, and an indirect request on behalf of a third to make them Masons at sight. These requests may have been due to my being so good-natured; but I refused the three applications, deeming that the circumstances in each case did not justify the exercise of that power. I feel that we should aim to treat all persons alike in so far as that can be done. We should meet upon the level. The candidate needs the impressions of the ceremonies and the instructions of the degrees. Lack of time was the reason given in each of these cases. Unless a person has, on the outside of the lodge, learned to allot the twenty-four hours given him each day by his Creator and Sustainer, to such an extent as to enable him to comply with the very reasonable requirements of the fraternity, there is very little hope that after his admission, he will ever be able to even approximate the division of time emblematically taught in connection with the twenty-four-inch gauge.

Wouldn't it have been better if the Grand Master had told these complacent gentlemen that Masonry requires every candidate for its privileges to submit to the scrutiny of the ballot and that the Grand Master held no prerogative to dispense such favors.

Under the head of visitations, he reports having attended the reception of the Welsh Masons of Minnesota and having been made the recipient of the loving cup figured in the volume. His official visits were pleasant and profitable on account of the good fellowship which was invariably present.

The Grand Lodge of Minnesota has 253 lodges on the roll, and all have made returns. The membership is 27,447, showing a net gain of 911.

The report on Correspondence, compressed within the limits of 80 pages is a skilful, condensation of the proceedings of 64 Grand Lodges. It requires experience and discrimination to enable Brother Todd to present to his brethren of Minnesota this *multum in parvo* of Masonic conditions amongst English speaking people.

The likeness of the Grand Master elect, Alfred H. Bays, occupies the fly leaf.

The address of the retiring Grand Master, J. Rice Williams gives a very full account of his official doings during the year.

He reports the arrest of the charters of three lodges, one because it was on its death bed, another because *the officers had some of their body friends present at the opening of a fellowcraft lodge*. The third case is thus referred to by the Grand Master:

In September I received a copy of summons served on Brother Frederic Gordon Speed as Grand Secretary in a certain case styled "Vicksburg Lodge, No. 26 vs. W. H. Stevens Lodge and the other Masonic Bodies of Vicksburg," asking the court to compel them to execute a quit claim deed to the Masonic building. I wrote the Master, Brother Biedenharn, that I was in receipt of information as to the suit, expressing my regret, and I suggested that Masons should be able to settle all matters of equity without recourse to the courts. I received no reply to this and asked the Law Committee to meet in Vicksburg and investigate the matter. Brother W. A. Roane being inaccessible, I substituted Brother George D. Riley. They repaired to Vicksburg accordingly, where after a thorough investigation, they made the following report:

More than forty pages of this volume is cumbered with the testimony, taken by a joint commission, appointed by the Grand Master to investigate and try to compose any differences when they were found to exist. The officers and controlling element in Vicksburg Lodge, No. 26 were found to be insubordinate and contumacious, and as a result, the charter was revoked. The Grand Lodge sustained this action of the Grand Master.

He reports many official visits, the laying of corner-stones and the formation of seven new lodges, and the constitution of nine chartered lodges.

He reports having granted no special dispensation not provided for by their laws.

His reference to the Masonic Home is in a spirit of high commendation for its officers and their satisfactory management. The institution contains 100 children and the need for enlargement is urgent. The conditions of the increase in the population will continue so that every few years it will be necessary to add new buildings. The cost of maintenance is comparatively low, about \$150 a year for each resident.

Mississippi has 358 lodges, with the present membership of 19,103, showing a net gain of 172.

The report on Correspondence, covering 82 pages of the volume, is contributed by Past Grand Master, Harry T. Howard, and consists of a brief review of the proceedings which had come to his hand. The North Carolina journal of transactions is reported with the list of the "missing."

The portrait of the retiring Grand Master Jacob Lambert forms the frontispiece. A biography of Brother Lambert, written by Past Grand Master Dorsey A. Jamison indicates very clearly that the retiring executive is worthy of all the good things that can be said of an affectionate and dutiful man and brother.

The annual address of Grand Master Lambert gives a full accounting of his stewardship of the affairs of the Craft for the past year. He gives this report of the condition of the Craft:

In so far as I have been able to ascertain in a somewhat extended and careful observation of the conditions existing throughout this Jurisdiction, we have much to encourage us. Increase of members, this is a record year, and in general prosperity it has

not been excelled. While a majority of the lodges have been conservative and careful nevertheless I fear that in some cases, especially in the larger cities, the spirit of rivalry has acted injuriously and that material has been introduced that cannot be converted into perfect Ashlars fitted for our Temple. Where such has been the case, not only must the lodges in question suffer, but the entire Fraternity must bear something of the odium which will inevitably follow. During the year 4,091 were raised.

Guard well the outer door.

He is very earnest in support of the Masonic Home, has visited it very frequently, and knows its exact condition. He pays this compliment to the women of the Eastern Star, who are enthusiastic in their labors for the Home :

During the year the ladies of the Eastern Star, and the members of the Christmas Committee representing the lodges of this District have arranged numerous entertainments at the Home. Moolah Temple Orchestra has at different times given concerts there, much to the enjoyment of the entire family.

We have sheltered and comforted many aged and helpless ones, and have cared for many orphans. The good work is magnifying every day. Let any doubter go to our Masonic Home and study its past and present, and he will doubt no more.

He reports 28 decisions, which were approved by the Jurisprudence Committee after some slight verbal changes.

The Grand Master reports having been obliged to impose discipline upon the Worshipful Master of one of the lodges.

We believe that it would be well for the fraternity if the Grand Lodge adopted every recommendation of the Grand Master.

During the year, seven dispensations were issued for the formation of new lodges and only four special dispensations were granted.

On receiving information of the destructive floods in Ohio, the Grand Master forwarded at once \$500 for immediate relief and issued a notice to the Craft of the distressing conditions, and contributions came in rapidly. He then sent \$1,000 with an offer of more, but the Grand Master of Ohio informed him that no further assistance would be necessary.

He reports several very pleasant official visits, which were profitable to the lodges which enjoyed his presence.

The number of lodges in the Grand Jurisdiction of Missouri is 624, and all made returns in time. The total membership is 58,237 a net gain for the year of 2,500.

Some of the American Grand Lodges seem to be of the opinion that the members of the royal family of England and some of the members of the higher nobility are made Masons at sight in the perfunctory manner which obtains in the American Grand Lodges who believe in this prerogative of the Grand Master. On this subject, we quote these letters from the Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of England:

M. W. Brother Robt. F. Stevenson, Representative of the United Grand Lodge of England, on request of that Grand Lodge, presented and read the following communication and facts from the Secretary of said Grand Lodge as to the report of its "making Masons at sight," which, on motion, was received and ordered printed in the proceedings:

London, England, 25th July, 1913.

Dear Sir and Brother:—I enclose a copy of a letter which I have addressed to the Grand Secretaries of the Grand Lodges of Maryland and Quebec, from which you will see that they have in some unaccountable manner been imposed upon and led to publish a statement which is as injurious as it is erroneous.

I am to request you to do everything in your power to remove the false impression which may have been created among the Brethren under the Grand Lodge to which you are accredited, and to do so in such a manner that nobody may be offended.

Copy of the letters addressed to the Grand Secretaries of the Grand Lodges of Maryland, U. S. A., and Quebec.

Freemason's Hall, Great Queen Street, London, W. C., 25th July 1913.

Dear Sir and R. W. Brother:—I am directed to address you on the subject of the statement of which I append a copy and which appeared in the Report on Correspondence of your Grand Lodge for 1912 and to inform you that it is entirely incorrect and without foundation.

The M. W. Pro Grand Master is unable to believe that any such information can have been furnished by M. W. Brother W. B.

Melish, to whom he is writing himself on the subject, for Brother Melish cannot possibly have carried away so false an impression of his conversation with H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught and Lord Amphill.

It will be sufficient to inform you of the actual facts, which can, of course be verified by reference to numerous records both public and Masonic.

They are as follows:

H. R. H. Prince Arthur of Connaught was initiated by the Pro of Wales Lodge on the 24th of March, 1874. Passed on the 23rd of June, 1874 and raised on the 27th of April, 1875. On each occasion the full ceremony was performed without the slightest abbreviation or variation from the established custom.

H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught was initiated by the Pro Grand Master (i. e., by Bro. Lord Amphill himself) in the Royal Alpha Lodge, on the 25th of May, 1911. Passed in the same Lodge by the W Master, R. W. Brother Lord Kensington, on the 2nd of July, 1911, and raised in the Household Brigade Lodge by the W. Master on the 29th of April, 1912. In each case the ceremony was exactly the same as for every other candidate for Freemasonry.

In view of what I have already written it is hardly necessary for me to add that the remarks attributed to His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught and to Brother Lord Amphill are purely imaginary.

I am to beg you to give the same amount of publicity to this correction as was given to your report, for I need hardly explain to you what serious mischief would be caused if the false statement which was unaccountably furnished to you should not receive the fullest correction.

It may be useful to you to know that the Constitutions of the Grand Lodge of England expressly provide in Rule 195 that "No Lodge shall confer more than one degree on any Brother on the same day, nor shall a higher degree be conferred on any Brother at a less interval than four weeks from his receiving a previous degree."

Except in the case of Lodges abroad the Grand Master has no power to grant a dispensation to permit degrees to be conferred at shorter intervals, and then only by substituting intervals of one week for four.

excellent presentation of the present condition and progress of the Grand Lodges whose proceedings he has reviewed. The transactions of North Carolina for 1913 are fully summarized and receive commendation of Brother Woods, without any adverse criticism.

The address of the Grand Master, James R. Cain, Jr. is an elaborate accounting of every important official act during his successful administration. It is written in easy attractive style, and merits all the commendation which it has received from the Grand Lodge. This is the inspiring statement of Brother Cain as to the condition of the fraternity:

I am convinced that our affairs were never in more satisfactory condition. We have ample funds for all legitimate demands, your interests are safeguarded in every possible manner, our lodges in the main are doing good work, and seem to have plenty to do. I fully realize that in Masonry numbers do not always possess an especial value, that it is quality that counts, instead of quantity, but you may be interested in knowing that our membership is now more than twenty thousand, that during the year just closing almost fourteen hundred brethren have, for the first time crossed the threshold of a Masonic lodge, and that the net gain is the largest in our history.

Relations with other Grand Jurisdictions are reported to be cordially fraternal.

The Grand Master gives approval to the plans of the George Washington Association, but the Grand Lodge declined to sanction membership in the association or to permit the president of the association to solicit membership in Nebraska.

The Nebraska Masonic Home received the unstinted praise of the Grand Master for its excellent management and the care devoted to its inmates. He states that the average population for a year has been about 42, and that the cost of maintenance has been approximately \$241.22 an increase of \$34.54 per capita per annum.

They have in prospect the purpose of establishing an orphans' home and it is a safe guess that the hopes of its advocates will soon be realized.

The Grand Master expresses the opinion that membership in the Masonic Relief Association of the United States and Canada has been a profitable enterprise in that it has protected the fraternity from Masonic tramps and impostors.

He reports having issued dispensations for the formation of two new lodges, and that other applications, for this purpose are in contemplation.

He reports pleasant official visitations, at home and abroad. Unfortunately he has to report irregularities and some times infractions of law, which required discipline and admonition.

His six decisions seem to us to be entirely correct and in accordance with Masonic law. He makes this report of a very unusual occurrence:

I am sure my brethren will pardon this digression. I was raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason within three months of attaining my majority. By courtesy of the Master of the lodge the degree was conferred by your brother, our Past Grand Master, my well beloved father, James R. Cain, Sr. For some time previous and continuously since that time we have been actively associated together in the management of the business that affords our livelihood. It was a unique situation, the second of record, so far as I have been able to ascertain, when at the last annual communication of our Grand Lodge, was witnessed a father installing his son into the high office of Grand Master.

He reports having attended a conference of Grand Masters and other Grand Officers at Indianapolis on the 17th and 18th of February, 1913, and expresses strong faith in the value of these meetings to the general Craft, to say nothing of the pleasure afforded to the participants.

In Nebraska there are 255 subordinate lodges, with a total membership of 20,144, showing a net increase of 875.

On recommendation of the Committee on Correspondence the Grand Lodge of the Philippine Islands was duly recognized.

The report on Correspondence, a comparatively brief one, is a judicious summary of the transactions which have come to his hands. The proceedings of the Grand Lodge of North Carolina were in the list of missing. Brother Charles J. Phelps is the reporter.

In his address the Grand Master, Henry W. Miles, whose portrait forms the frontispiece, has given the fraternity a full accounting of his official doings for the year.

He reports having received notable invitations to visit other Grand Jurisdictions, which on account of the press of business he was forced to decline.

He made many official visits to the subordinate lodges of his own Jurisdiction and thus states the impression made on him:

I wish that I could adequately describe the enthusiasm for our Order, devotion to its ideals, and faith in the ultimate triumph of its purposes that I found to be the rule in our lodges, with perhaps an occasional exception; these exceptions only illustrating the infirmities of poor humanity. The kindly hospitality everywhere extended to the Grand Master spoke eloquently of the appreciation by the Constituent Lodges of these annual visitations. I wish that it were possible to give you even a synopsis of the many instructive speeches made by the brethren on these occasions, but I cannot even attempt the task.

He reports nineteen decisions many of which were severely slashed by the Jurisprudence Committee.

In response to his request for the lodges to aid the flood sufferers of Ohio, the handsome sum of \$774 was promptly contributed.

We quote these two recommendations of the Grand Master:

1. That steps be taken looking to the establishment of a Masonic Home in this State. Twenty-nine of our sister grand jurisdictions have established, or are establishing, Masonic Homes. While this appears to be a large undertaking for as small a jurisdiction as ours, yet a beginning should be made some time.

7. That a regulation be framed allowing a Constituent Lodge in its discretion to bury a member suspended for non-payment of dues if there be no other Masonic offense established against him, but it shall not pay the expense of the burial.

The Finance Committee approved the first, and it is practically certain that in a year or two Nevada will have its Masonic Home.

As to the seventh, the Jurisprudence Committee reported adversely and we certainly agree with the Grand Master that the officers of subordinate lodges should have the discretion to do what they think is right in cases of this kind.

In the Grand Jurisdiction of Nevada there are 25 lodges, having a total membership of 1,886, showing a net gain of 40.

The report on Correspondence, profitably covers 160 pages of the volume, and is as usual contributed by Brother E. D. Vanderlieth, and is in the bright and attractive style which characterizes the reports of our Nevada brother.

Under British Columbia we find that he and Brother DeWolf Smith have a word or two as to the Nevada usage of letting dues accumulate against a brother during suspension. He says:

Brother DeWolf Smith does not like Nevada's practice of charging dues of N. P. D.'s during suspension, nor our justification thereof. In the words of our Brother, under Missouri, "Oh, la!"

He asks, "Has it ever occurred to our brother that the suspension may have been due to the fact that the suspended brother's funds were about gone?" No, for no self-respecting Lodge would suspend a brother in such a condition.

We think the Nevada usage is wrong in charging a suspended brother with his share of the expenses of the lodge into which at the time, he is not permitted to enter.

North Carolina for 1912 receives the fraternal consideration of Brother Vanderlieth, and fortunately for us, finds nothing to criticize.

The address of the retiring Grand Master, Henry S. Bridges, Ph. D., is a brief paper, but has a full statement of his official doings. He makes this statement as to the condition of the fraternity.

As a proof that greater interest is shown in our Order, I am able to report a substantial increase in our membership. In many of the subordinate lodges there has been unusual activity throughout the past year and the increase in our numbers has been considerable. But, my brothers, I feel it necessary to remind you again that it is the internal not the external qualifications that recommend a man to be made a Mason. Let the standard of character for admission into our beloved fraternity be raised as high as possible and the outer door be guarded with the utmost vigilance. Let every man know that, when he is once admitted, he must demean himself in such a way that no reproach can be brought upon the Craft through any action of his.

He made a good many official visits which gave him the opportunity of knowing that the lodges were in good condition, and the officers generally well equipped for the work.

There are 39 lodges having a total membership of 3,177 showing a net gain of 114 for the year.

A photograph of William Russell Burleigh, Grand Master 1886-1887, forms the frontispiece.

At the semi-annual communication of December 27, 1912, there were present representatives of seventy-five subordinate lodges to witness and participate in the exemplification of the three degrees. This custom impresses us as being of the utmost importance. An entire day is devoted to these exercises morning, afternoon, and night.

An interesting addition to the proceedings consists in reading the reports of the schools of instruction held in the different Masonic districts.

At the Annual Communication held at Manchester there were present all the Grand Officers and only representatives of fifty-three subordinate lodges, a circumstance which seems to imply that the Craft is more interested in degree work than in the proceedings of the Grand Lodge.

Under the head of Necrology the Grand Master, Charles H. Wiggin, paid tribute to a long list of distinguished crafts men in New Hampshire, who had ceased from their labors. Photographs of these useful brethren are found in the body of the volume.

The Grand Master reports no formal decisions, but gives a long list of special dispensations for various purposes.

An appeal to the Craft for the benefit of the Ohio flood sufferers received a generous response from most of the lodges in the jurisdiction, amounting to the sum of \$1,056.

The Washington Memorial Association is commended to the Craft of New Hampshire, and the Grand Master directed an appropriation of \$100 to aid in meeting the expenses of the association.

Numerous official visits were made with resulting pleasure to the Grand Master and profit to the Craft.

The Masonic Home of New Hampshire is figured in the proceedings, and it has the appearance of being a refined and comfortable home. There are thirteen inmates now cared for, and the Grand Master says there is room for three more, and he advertises for that number. Here is what he says in part of that institution:

Your attention is directed to the annual proceedings for full information in regard to expenses and other details, and it is hoped you will give them careful study and serious thought. On my several visits to the Home, I have been most favorably impressed with its location, surrounding conditions and management— all are of the best. Those who sojourn there as our guests (using the distinction given by another Grand Lodge under similar conditions) would seem to be in the full enjoyment of their declining years: conditions under one's own roof are scarcely any better, restraint beyond that which would be expected of a guest in your household or mine is rarely if ever, enforced. The Matron, Mrs. Burbeck, is a most estimable and painstaking woman, well fitted by interest tact and good judgment for the position, and is entitled to great credit for the good work she is doing. She is aided by a staff of capable and painstaking assistants, worthy also of favorable mention.

He is earnestly in favor of establishing a charity fund, so as to supplement what is done in the way of relief by the subordinate lodges. He says that some of the lodges are burdened beyond their ability for aid to the needy and the Grand Lodge Charity, if established, would give them relief. We fail to see any action by the Grand Lodge upon this recommendation.

Upon the recommendation of the Jurisprudence Committee it was decided to recognize the Grand Lodge of the Philippine Islands, England and Ireland.

In the jurisdiction of New Hampshire there are 79 lodges,

all of which made their returns on time. The membership is 10,620, showing a net increase of 140.

The report on Correspondence is contributed by Past Grand Master Henry M. Cheney. It is a review of sixty-two Grand Lodges, covering one hundred and seventy-six pages of the volume. This report is of the kind always furnished by Brother Cheney, and is bright and sparkling. Under Mississippi he reports this dispensation :

Dispensations for seven new lodges were issued.

One dispensation reported as having been issued rather puzzles us. It was issued to collect dues, as they were not collected at the regular meeting. Up here in New Hampshire there are 365 days in any given year when we can pay our dues. Any day, with good money, is perfectly satisfactory. So the procedure above noted strikes us as being odd.

The North Carolina volume failed to come to his hands.

As is the custom with this prosperous Grand Jurisdiction, the portrait of the retiring Grand Master, Richard C. Woodward, is executed in the highest style of the engraver's art.

The address of the Grand Master is a fine, dignified paper in which he reports his official doings and the general condition of the fraternity. He closes the exordium of his address with this high and wholesome aspiration :

Some day when our work has long been done there will be gathered those who shall look back over a century at the work we shall do to-day. May we so deliberate and decide that our acts shall stand the test of time. May we be so guided and governed that in future times men may say of our work that it was good.

He paid an affectionate tribute to the lovable characters

and unpretentious service of two deceased brothers, William D. Ruton, Deputy Grand Secretary, and Luther S. Skillman, the faithful Grand Tyler.

The Grand Master reports the constitution of one lodge and the setting to work of another under dispensation.

Five emergent communications were held for the purpose of laying cornerstones.

Somewhat more than two pages of this handsome volume are defaced with the report of the improper conduct of the worshipful Master and nearly all the members of one lodge, whose charter was, in consequence, arrested. What is the use of putting these unpleasant things in cold type when they could be stored away safely with the records of the Grand Secretary?

Foreign relations are reported to be cordial.

The Grand Master reports that he has been delightfully entertained at receptions, anniversaries, and banquets, on all of which occasions a spirit of genuine friendship was displayed.

The response of the fraternity to the cry of distress from Ohio and Indiana is thus reported by Bro. Woodward:

Whenever a call for aid has been received from a sister jurisdiction in time of calamity or distress, the Grand Lodge of New Jersey has ever stood ready to render any assistance in its power. When last month we were shocked to learn of the great loss of life and destruction of property caused by floods in Indiana and Ohio, we realized that the great needs of our brethren in the West gave us an opportunity to show in a concrete way the meaning of Fraternity. Offers of aid were at once telegraphed to the Grand Masters of Ohio and Indiana. A reply was first received from Ohio gratefully accepting our offer, and about one-half of the balance in the Special Benevolent Fund was immediately telegraphed to the Grand Lodge Board of Relief of that state. The reply from Indiana, received later, stated that no assistance was needed at that time. Upon the receipt of this information the remainder of the Fund was also forwarded to Ohio. Since this time, in answer to my appeal issued to the brethren of New Jersey, such prompt and generous response has been made that we have been able to substantially contribute to the relief of our afflicted brethren. I desire at this time to express to the brethren of New Jersey

my appreciation of the generous manner in which they have responded to this call for aid.

One hundred and seven cases of the maimed were lined up before the Grand Master and seventy of them were allowed to pass on. Twenty-nine cases were allowed to "stand aside", and eight cases are still marking time.

The Masonic Home of New Jersey is in splendid condition with an invested fund of nearly ninety-four thousand dollars for its maintenance and support. The population consists of 55 men, 17 women, 13 boys, and 11 girls, a total of 96. These dependents of the Grand Lodge are properly cared for and the children are attending the high school, graded school, and the district school, except one child, not of school age.

There are 192 lodges, with a total membership of 36,649, showing a net gain for the year of 1,794.

The report on Correspondence, covering 160 pages and reviewing the proceedings of 53 English-speaking Grand Lodges and 10 German Grand Lodges, is the work of Robert A. Shirrefs, and is interesting and instructive throughout. The proceedings of North Carolina for 1912 receive a brief summary of its proceedings.

The address of the Grand Master William B. Walton is a comparatively brief statement of his official doings during the year.

He reports this condition of the fraternity in New Mexico:

It gives me great pleasure to report to you that Masonry in this Grand Jurisdiction has made satisfactory progress during

the year; that peace and harmony prevail among our members; that there has been a substantial increase in membership, and that the finances of the Grand Lodge are in good condition. Surely, we have much for which to be thankful.

The Grand Master issued numerous special dispensations some of them for joint occupancy of halls and they were approved by the Grand Lodge, but he refused to give permission to confer degrees out of time.

His rulings were few, and they were all approved by the Committee on the Grand Master's Address.

One lodge was constituted, and dispensations granted for the formation of three others.

The Grand Master and the Grand Lodge also approved the effort being made by Arkansas Masons to establish a Masonic hospital at Hot Springs and permission was granted to solicit contributions from individual Masons in New Mexico.

The Grand Master expresses sympathy in the movement to erect a suitable memorial to George Washington, the Mason at Alexandria Virginia, but we fail to find any action in the matter by the Grand Lodge.

A very interesting and instructive report on the reasons which lead and have led to non-recognition by regular symbolic lodges of the Grand Orient of France and the Grand Lodge of France. This report is the fruit of the labors of the Committee on Correspondence, Past Grand Master James H. Wroth, and received the cordial thanks of the Grand Lodge. This report of Brother Wroth's is a condensation of the answers to these questions:

1st: Does your Grand Lodge grant fraternal recognition to the Grand Orient of France?

2nd: Upon what grounds is such action based?

3rd: Does your Grand Lodge grant fraternal recognition to the Grand Lodge of France?

4th: Upon what grounds is such action based?

5th: What are the requirements demanded by your Grand Lodge for recognition of other Grand Lodges?

6th: Is non-recognition in the absence of a decree of non-

intercourse, a bar to visitation by members of the unrecognized Grand Lodge?

From the close of this report we quote these paragraphs showing the attitude of the Grand Lodge of England in the matter of visitations:

The practical question comes, how to handle such cases of visitors who come from lodges which admit and hold recognition with these branches of our organization which do not believe in this specific regulation.

I feel that the regulation of the Grand Lodge of England, the Mother Grand Lodge of us all, issued in 1878 not only covers this ground, but, granted the legitimacy of any Grand Lodge, will solve the problem.

These resolutions come to me direct from Sir Edward Letenworth, Grand Secretary of the United Grand Lodge of England, and are as follows:

"That in view of the foregoing resolutions, the Worshipful Masters of all Lodges holding under the Grand Lodge of England be directed not to admit any foreign brother as a visitor unless

First, he is duly vouched for, or unless his certificate shows that he has been initiated according to the ancient rites and ceremonies in a lodge professing belief in T. G. A. O. T. U., and

Second, not unless he himself shall acknowledge that this belief is an essential landmark of the Order."

The Grand Lodge of New Mexico has under its Jurisdiction 43 subordinate lodges having a total membership of 2,948, a net gain of 149.

The report on Correspondence, covering 170 pages is contributed by Brother James H. Wroth, and is, as usual, independent and instructive. He gives the proceedings of North Carolina for 1912, fraternal consideration and some what over two pages of space. He pays this compliment to Grand Master, Richard N. Hackett:

I want to congratulate this Grand Master on emphasizing a point which many jurisdictions overlook and that is of making a member with a club, and the sooner that Lodges realize that they make Masons and not members, by the act of initiation and passing and raising, the better it will be for all hands concerned. Several times I have seen occasions arise where the newly raised Master Mason, for reasons personal to himself, desired to change

his Masonic residence, but refrained from so doing from a feeling that he would hurt somebody's feelings, and the foolish custom of compelling that Brother to sign the By-Laws, or forcing him into non-affiliation, is, to my mind, judging him without a chance to defend himself. I recall a recent incident in an eastern jurisdiction that required the signing of the By-Laws. By courtesy a Fellow Craft belonging to this Jurisdiction was raised in a western jurisdiction. The laws of the first required that he should sign the laws in person, and for a long time he remained, like Mahomet's coffin, midway between heaven and earth.

We are glad to be in accord with Brother Wroth in so many essentials.

Two fine engravings of John D. Willard, and of the Grand Master, Charles Smith, adorn the volume.

The address of the Grand Master is a paper of unusual excellence, and indicates that that official was not in the enjoyment of a sinecure.

As to the condition of the Craft in New York, he gives this brief and satisfactory account:

Prosperity has marked the progress of every lodge in this jurisdiction during the year now passed into history. We have been signally blessed by nearly the entire absence of fire and flood. The granaries of the husbandmen have been filled to overflowing; the merchants and the manufacturers have found ready markets for their wares; the mechanic, constant and remunerative employment, and yet in all our rejoicing there comes a minor chord of sadness. All whom it was our privilege to greet when last we met are not here to-day.

The Grand Master pays high tribute to the prominent members of the New York fraternity who have ceased from

their labors within the year, and a long list of distinguished brethren of other jurisdictions is reported.

The number of his special dispensations, considering the size of the jurisdiction, is a comparatively small one.

Dispensations were issued for the formation of six new lodges.

He issued a caution to the Craft in which he earnestly advised caution in taking in new members and a strict scrutiny of their characters and fitness. In this regard he says in part:

If we would perpetuate Freemasonry we must select only a high standard of man. It is unfortunate that the popularity of the Fraternity has caused those undesirable to seek admission and, as such admission is entirely within our power, should we not exert our very best efforts to ascertain the fitness of every man who seeks to become a member.

The publication of Masonic work in the press should be materially curtailed. It is, of course, impossible to prevent the publication of Lodge meetings, especially where these partake of unusual occurrences; but the Masonic reporter should confine himself exclusively to such things as may be written and without giving to the world every detail of our ceremonial proceedings.

* * * * *

In all candor should we not exercise a far greater caution in the admission of candidates and the publication of our Masonic work in the secular press?

The Grand Master found it necessary to administer discipline to the turbulent element of one of the lodges by the revocation of its charter. He thinks that the punishment had the desired effect.

He reported only two decisions.

One of the most useful organizations under the Grand Lodge is its employment bureau, whose business it is to secure suitable employment for those willing to work, and in this respect he says:

Let us be friends rather than almoners. How many of us have reason to remember that "a friend in need is a friend indeed"? The duties of brotherhood are not collective. They are

individual. We are obligated personally to relieve a Brother's distress, and to sympathize with his affliction. Distress too often means the want of a job. Better than temporary financial aid are friendship, encouragement, and assistance to obtain employment. For those who have passed the period of self-support, and are worthy, a Home has been provided. The able-bodied, who have yet something to give to the world and to mankind, although beset with misfortune, must be encouraged and an endeavor made to obtain a market for their honest industry.

The Grand Master says the annual income from the positions secured since the bureau has been in operation exceeds the sum of \$225,000.

He speaks earnestly of the Masonic Home at Utica and what it is accomplishing. The total population in the Home is 438, consisting of men, women and children, and the maintenance of these dependents requires an annual per capita outlay of \$225. The boys and girls who have left the Home have been placed in useful and profitable situations some of them earning as high as \$25 a week.

The Grand Lodge is in debt to the amount of about two and a half millions, but the Grand Master thinks with a membership of 180,000 it wouldn't require very long to pay off the debt, and he says of this in part:

A scheme of contributions from among 180,000 Masons, which will bear but lightly upon the lodges of which they are members, and which will, at the same time, result in the redemption by August, 1918, of the heavier half of our debt, will enable us to refund our first mortgage bonds, either through our own lodges, or by public subscription, at a less rate of interest than they now bear.

In any such plan lodges that have already paid toward the Sinking Fund proposition must be given due credit for their respective payments.

I strongly urge the Craft to give this entire matter their early and most careful attention, for it involves our honor and integrity and the future welfare of our Home in Utica and those who are sheltered there.

The Grand Secretary reports the number of lodges in the jurisdiction to be 820, every one of which has made returns and paid dues. The total membership is 179,927.

The report on Correspondence, covering the most extensive reviews of Masonic doings the world over and containing the most comprehensive tabular statements, is contributed by the members of the committee, Brothers William Sherer, Emil Frenkel, and Emanuel Loewenstein. It is invaluable on account of the varied information which it contains. The committee has been very kind to the proceedings of North Carolina for 1912, and fortunately, finds nothing to criticize. From the introduction of the committee we quote this as showing the scope of Masonry.

Again we come before you to submit our annual report, and again we are pleased to say that peace and harmony prevails throughout the Masonic World. Not a ripple appears on the smooth surface of this mirror of love and good will to all mankind, with a possible single exception.

It is indeed an inspiration to review the vast field of Masonry here and everywhere, and find its many blessings flowing from its source, from its teachings and its principles. It may be laid down as a sound maxim that every institution whose organic regulation promote friendly intercourse in social life and whose influence is on the side of morality, virtue and benevolence is a common blessing to mankind, and as men are mutually dependent on each other it will not be denied that the happiness of society is greatly increased by such acts of reciprocal kindness as are peculiar to true relationship of our common brotherhood.

Masonry has a fixed and settled home with us, it is deeply rooted in the flesh and bone of our people, is alive and flourishing among the best citizens in the community, and is one of the elements of power which holds together and strengthens the social fabric, it dispenses blessings, joy and sunshine to many in all the land.

The likeness of the retiring Grand Master, William E

Hoover, forms the frontispiece. His address is such a fine paper as we would naturally expect from a man of his high attainments as an educator. Everything of importance occurring during his administration has been reported to the Grand Lodge.

On notification of the disastrous floods in Ohio, he issued a circular letter to the lodges, and the response was prompt and generous, \$1,231.25 having been contributed.

Three lodges were constituted and dispensations issued for the formation of another.

The official visits were few.

Only one decision was reported and as that is not of the ordinary run we reproduce it, and think it eminently correct:

Question: May a Master of a Lodge excuse a brother from voting on the petition for the degrees of Masonry, or for membership in a Masonic Lodge?

Answer: It is my opinion that in voting upon the petition for the degrees of Masonry or membership in a Masonic Lodge, unanimity of choice is necessary. This function is the inherent privilege of the particular lodge. No member present may be excused from voting upon a petition for the degrees of Masonry or membership except upon the unanimous consent of the members of the Lodge present.

The Grand Master recommended the appointment of a Committee, which we judge will be a strong standing committee. He says:

Many requests come to the Grand officers of this Grand Jurisdiction asking for the recognition of Grand Lodges in various parts of the world. These requests are made matters of reference, and I am led to believe that with the limited time for intelligent investigation and with inadequate sources of information available at the time, committees to whom such matters are referred are unable on account of these limitations to report recommendations in these respects that are satisfactory to themselves or the Grand Lodge. I therefore recommend that the Grand Lodge provide for a committee whose duty it shall be to recommend a standard by which all Grand Lodge recognition shall be measured, and to whom shall be referred, from time to time, all applications for such recognition for careful investigation and recommendation to the Grand Lodge.

On his recommendation, the Grand Lodge authorized the purchase of a life membership in the George Washington Memorial Association, at the cost of \$100; but stipulated it should involve no future financial obligations.

There are 103 subordinate lodges in the jurisdiction of North Dakota, having a total membership of 8,666, showing a gain not quite so large as that of last year, but quite substantial.

The committee on fraternal relations recommended the recognition of the Grand Lodge of the Philippine Islands and it was so ordered by the Grand Lodge.

There is evidently much enthusiasm among influential members of the Grand Lodge for the establishment, equipment and maintenance of a cottage, to be known as the Masonic Cottage for the treatment of tuberculosis, at Dunseith. The Grand Lodge contributed \$6,500 for this purpose.

Immediately following the record of the transactions of the Grand Lodge, we find pictures of handsome Grand Masters and handsome Masonic temples.

The report on Correspondence, a comparatively brief one, is contributed by the poet laureate of North Dakota, Past Grand Master James W. Foley and the only objection to it is that it is too brief. North Carolina proceedings, we are sorry to say, failed to reach Brother Foley.

This volume is adorned with the portraits of the retiring Grand Master Augustus John Wolff and of Hon. William Ross, Past Grand Master, and of John Winburn Laurie, Past Grand Master, deceased. Brothers Ross and Laurie were distinguished and useful Masons and admirable citizens.

The annual address of Grand Master Wolff is a comprehensive report of his official acts. 'Tis complete in every detail, and indicates that with him the year was a busy one.

The condition of the fraternity, he reports to be satisfactory:

It affords me pleasure to be able to report that the past year has been one of commendable activity along the lines of Masonic work, and that our Lodges are in a flourishing condition, both numerically and financially. There have been added to our rolls during the year, from all sources, 520 members, and the losses have aggregated 288, leaving a net gain of 232, bringing the total number of Master Masons on the register of the Grand Lodge, on 31st of March, to 6,455; the additions were made up as follows: Raised, 431; reinstated, 20, and affiliated, 69.

There are 71 chartered lodges in this jurisdiction, with a total membership of 6,456, showing a net gain of 253.

The report on Correspondence covering 179 pages of the volume is presented as usual by R. W. Brother Thomas Mowbray; and is an excellent and fraternal review of 60 volumes of Grand Lodge transactions. He has given fraternal consideration to the proceedings of the Grand Lodge of North Carolina and he has made the "Tar Heel" membership his debtor for the unusual space.

Quoting what we said of negro Masonry, Brother Mowbray has a "hankering opinion" that we have not much love for the colored population especially if they happen to be Masons. Therein our good brother is totally mistaken. We have a very kindly feeling for the colored population, and will always have it, but we have no knowledge of negro Masons and shall not seek any. Our good brother intimates broadly that in this matter we are a "little narrow." It may be so, and we do not begrudge our brother the right to that opinion.

Brother Mowbray brings us up short for expressing the view that the Grand Master of Ohio had a right to make President Taft a Mason at sight, while denying that the exercise of that right was a landmark, and Brother Mowbray inquires: "if not, with all due respect, we ask where does prerogative come

from to make Masons at sight?" Bless you, dear brother, there is no such landmark, but the Grand Master of Ohio acted under the authority of the constitution of that Grand Lodge.

There are other things we would like to discuss with Brother Mowbray, but limited space forbids that pleasure.

The likeness of the Grand Master elect, Dr. Charles L. Reeder, adorns the volume and precedes a short biography which shows the brother to be an active agent in promoting everything that will contribute to the public good. His home is in Tulsa, which in its improvements gives evidence of his active personal influence.

The address of the retiring Grand Master, Alfred C. Gray, is a painstaking and itemized account of the manner in which he conducted the affairs of the Grand Lodge.

Thirteen of the lodges were chartered and dispensations issued for the formation of nine others, which gives evidence of unusual activity.

The Grand Master reported thirty-one decisions, which passed the scrutiny of the Jurisprudence Committee with only slight amendment or elaboration.

Naturally in so large a jurisdiction there will arise cases calling for discipline, either of individuals or lodges. The Grand Master had to impose discipline in four cases. It is well enough, and his duty, to report these cases to the Grand Lodge, but to our mind it is a waste of space to reproduce them in the printed proceedings.

He reports having visited nineteen lodges, and in each

case he was greeted with a hearty welcome and hospitable treatment.

Brother Gray made some recommendations which did not meet the approval of the Committee on Law and Usage.

He is an enthusiastic friend of the Masonic Home and urges the immediate erection of a fire-proof dormitory for the boys at the Home. The fraternity at large has not been prompt to meet the requirements of the case, but the Grand Lodge generously appropriated \$10,000 to expedite this movement.

We are glad to note that there is a sentiment among the fraternity to make amends for its haste of a few years ago in severing fraternal relations with the Grand Lodge of New Jersey. A resolution was introduced to resume fraternal relations with the Grand Lodge of New Jersey, but no action was taken, and consideration was deferred to the next annual communication.

The following resolution in honor of the oldest and most useful Mason in the Jurisdiction was adopted by a rising vote:

The committee appointed to prepare the resolutions to be presented on parchment to Father Murrow submitted the following report:

WHEREAS, God in His infinite goodness and mercy has for many years given to our dear Brother, Joseph Samuel Murrow, the Father of Masonry in Oklahoma, the wisdom, the energy, and the love to guide the Great Brotherhood, through the years of its infancy, to its present development.

THEREFORE, We proudly embrace this opportunity to express our sincere appreciation to him, engrossed upon this enduring parchment, for the heroic labor of love he performed that we, his brethren, might thereby be benefitted. May the Great God of the Universe have him in His holy keeping.

The report on Correspondence painfully compressed, was presented by Past Grand Master, Thomas C. Humphrey. The proceedings of 38 Grand Lodges receive fraternal review, in which North Carolina for 1912 finds a place.

The likeness of the retiring Grand Master, Thomas B. Guitteau, occupies the fly leaf of the volume, and the smiling face of his successor, Edwin S. Griffiths, is farther on in the volume. The likeness of the Grand Secretary, Brother Jacob H. Bromwell, who has been at the Grand Secretary's desk for twenty-five years, also appears in association with the picture of a handsome desk and chair presented to him by his brethren of the Grand Lodge in token of their love for the man and their appreciation of his services.

A careful inspection of the volume gives ample confirmation to the accuracy of this statement of the Grand Master:

I am pleased to inform you that during the past year the Craft has enjoyed great prosperity, that there has been marked increase in membership, that no serious difference or misunderstandings have occurred, and that peace and harmony prevail. Great physical improvements have taken place, new temples and halls have been erected and fitted up in almost every section of this Grand Jurisdiction, and much pride has been manifested in the furnishings of the same. With very few exceptions our Lodges are in a most flourishing condition, and the ritualistic work is rendered with an enthusiasm and care that can but ultimately attain perfection.

Brother Guitteau paid appropriate tribute to the distinguished dead of his and other jurisdictions.

He reports having visited the Masonic Home and urged upon the brethren to visit this splendid institution and thereby discover that this useful charity may be maintained at such a trifling cost to the individual Mason.

He granted six dispensations for the purpose of forming new lodges, and ninety special dispensations for various purposes. Four lodges were constituted.

He reports numerous pleasant official visits.

The request for recognition by the Grand Lodge of Porto Rico was referred to the Committee on Foreign Correspondence, which asked for further time in which to report.

For florid and opulent coloring we commend to those of artistic temperament this paragraph from the report of the Committee on Necrology:

In this magnificent autumn time the leaves are gently falling to the ground in a splendor of coloring seen at no other time of the year. Radiant crimson, royal purple, rich red, golden yellow, and all the intermediate interwoven shades are covering this brown earth of ours with a mantle of the skies. For nowhere else save at sunset, in the sun-illuminated and radiated clouds, can such colors be seen. Then the monarch of the day, after riding in triumph around the earth, has gathered here the red of the flamingo, there the crimson of the humming-bird, yonder the blue of the violet; here the blush of the apple, there the ripened glory of the harvest; here the yellow of the orange, there the fire of carbuncles; here the opalescent hue of the dewdrop, there the amethystine sparkle of the wave; and combining this refulgent carnage of color with the joyful smile of the babe and the soul piercing glance of the maiden's eyes, has cast this indescribably beautiful mass of splendor on the banked clouds, as he sinks from sight beyond the horizon, that every human eye might behold the transcendent beauty of this good old world of ours.

The membership of the fraternity reaches the big figures of 86,493 showing a net gain within the year of 3,660.

The report on Correspondence, a review of 72 volumes of proceedings, is the second effort of this kind of labor by Past Grand Master Nelson Williams and gives evidence of his ability and fitness. The proceedings of North Carolina for 1912 received the fraternal consideration of Brother Williams.

graph of a deceased brother, William Allan Cleland, the late Grand Treasurer, to whose memory the Grand Master offered an affectionate tribute. There is also a photograph of a very handsome Masonic Temple at the city of Corvallis.

The address of the Grand Master gives a succinct account of his official doings for the year. He reports the constitution of six chartered lodges, and of having issued dispensations for the formation of three others.

His official visits were not numerous, but like all the other Grand Masters, he enjoyed them.

His special dispensations for various purposes were numerous and met the approval of the Grand Lodge.

He reported twenty-five decisions, which seem to us to be correct, and they met the unqualified approval of the Jurisprudence Committee.

Adverting to the matter of the Washington Masonic Memorial the Grand Master is enthusiastic in favor of the project and thinks it should have the approval of every loyal Mason in the United States. However, the special committee to which the matter was referred does not favor the enterprise as will be seen by this extract from its report:

The true Masons do not need the assistance of any visible Temple to enshrine their love and veneration of George Washington. His memory is safely cherished in the hearts of every true Mason, as well as every true patriot who claims the protection of the Stars and Stripes. Two years ago this Grand Lodge appropriated \$100.00 toward this enterprise, without committing the future action of the Lodge to further contributions.

There are many calls at home for all the moneys this Grand Lodge has, and your committee recommends that no further appropriations be made toward this object.

The peddlars of clandestine Masonic degrees seem to have been active in the cities of Oregon and some of the victims have appealed to the courts for the restoration of their money. In this litigation the Grand Master asserts himself as being entirely indifferent and as having very little or no sympathy with those who have suffered in the purse.

Grand Master Burnett is certainly a bold man to advocate

the erection of a general Grand Lodge after the declaration of the most distinguished Masons in the country at two Masonic conferences at which the idea of erecting a general Grand Lodge was unequivocally repudiated. He presented this resolution and it was adopted:

Be it resolved by the Grand Lodge of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Oregon, in its sixty-third annual communication assembled, That some central representative Masonic Body should be formed, to be composed of three delegates from each of at least a majority of all the Masonic Grand Lodges in the United States and British North America, with authority to enact laws and take measures binding upon the various Grand Jurisdictions participating, and not inconsistent with the Ancient charges and Landmarks of Freemasonry, for the purpose of promoting friendship, morality, and brotherly love, together with uniformity of laws and ritualistic work among English-speaking Masons on this continent.

And be it further resolved, That the first Monday in September, A. D. 1915, A. L. 5915, at the city of San Francisco, in the State of California, be and is hereby suggested as the time and place of meeting of such delegates to consider and act upon the subject matter of these resolutions, and that the Grand Lodge of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons of California be and is hereby specially requested to provide a place of meeting for such assembly and to give its adherence to the general purpose hereinbefore expressed.

And be it further resolved, That the Grand Master be and he is hereby requested to use all honorable means at his command to effect such an organization, and to that end he and the Grand Secretary be and they are hereby instructed to forward a copy of these resolutions to every Grand Lodge within the scope of the proposal herein expressed, with the invitation of this Grand Lodge to participate in the contemplated work and to send delegates for that purpose to the appointed meeting.

The report of the special committee on this subject was non-committal and without recommendation.

In the Grand Jurisdiction of Oregon there are at present 135 lodges, showing a total membership of 12,315, a gain of 905.

The report on Correspondence is presented by Past Grand Master David P. Mason, and is in every way creditable

to Brother Mason and his Grand Lodge. The proceedings of North Carolina for 1912 are made the recipient of very generous treatment and the allotment of four pages of his space. It is a very full summary of the North Carolina transactions. We quote his reference to the passing of three distinguished and useful members of the Craft: Dr. Thomas M. Matthews, Sr., of Texas, Christopher Diel, of Utah, and Henry B. Grant of Kentucky:

We deeply regret that in the preparation of this report we shall miss the presence of some of those whose writings were indeed an inspiration to the neophyte in Masonic literature, notably, we mention our brethren of the Guild of Utah, Kentucky, and Texas.

These men wrought faithfully and well and they have been called to the honors and awards that await the faithful Craftsman.

The volume is adorned with two handsome engraved portraits, one of William L. Gorgas, the Grand Master, the other of John A. Perry, the Grand Secretary.

A special communication was held on the 23rd of May, for the purpose of making Mr. Marlin Edgar Olmsted a Mason at sight. The Grand Master of Masons in Pennsylvania possess the prerogative and can exercise it at will, but the record does not recite the merits of Mr. Olmsted, but it pleased the Grand Master and may be pleasing to the gentleman on whom this honor was conferred.

President Taft was present and it was hoped that the Duke of Connaught, the Grand Master of Masons in England,

and the Governor-general of Canada would grace the occasion, but his official duties in Canada forbade the pleasure. Of this ceremonial the Grand Master says in part :

The Right Worshipful Grand Master stated that he had called this Communication, as provided in Article XII, Section 5, of the Ahiman Rezon, to instruct the Craft: the Masters and Wardens of the Lodges in the County of Philadelphia principally, being notified to be present thereat. He intended by so doing, to exercise his prerogative and make (by virtue of his presence), a Mason at sight and he was sure that the work in the three degrees had never been done in the presence of any of the presidents of the United States.

When it was known three months ago that the Grand Lodge would be honored by a visitation of the President of the United States, we tried to have with us at this time, the Grand Master of Masons in England, who is the Governor-general of the Dominion of Canada. The correspondence relative to this will now be read by the Right Worshipful Grand Secretary.

We note that at the quarterly communication of December 4, 1912, Brother A. B. Andrews, Jr., was a visitor. Brother Andrews is one of the younger, more industrious and more intelligent of the Grand Officers of the Grand Lodge of North Carolina. We regret that his visits could not have been so timed as to permit him to witness the manner in which the Grand Master of Pennsylvania makes "a Mason at sight." The Grand Lodge of North Carolina does not recognize this prerogative. This is the record :

Brother A. B. Andrews, Jr., Senior Deacon of the Grand Lodge of North Carolina, was admitted as a visitor.

The Grand Master's address discusses the usual topics of these papers.

We received a copy of the beautiful Memorial volume of which the Grand Master says:

The committee having charge of the celebration of the One Hundred and Twenty-fifth Anniversary of our Independence as a Sovereign Grand Lodge, which was so successfully conducted in September of last year under the direction of my predecessor, R. W. Brother George W. Guthrie, have issued a Memorial Volume, which is a worthy record of a most interesting event. A copy has been sent to each Lodge.

In the report of his few rulings we are glad to quote this proper reversal of Grand Master Guthrie in 1911:

Second. Physical disqualification arising after initiation of a Brother will not prevent his advancement, provided he is mentally and morally qualified.

He reports many enjoyable official visits and the issuance of comparatively few special dispensations.

Six gentlemen, whose applications had been rejected in Pennsylvania lodges, being blind to the consequences, sought and received Masonic degrees in other jurisdictions and were surprised to find that on their return to Pennsylvania that they were not received with open arms, but on the contrary they found the doors shut in their faces, and the sentence of outlawry pronounced upon them by the edict of the Grand Master:

Now, therefore, I, William L. Gorgas, Grand Master of Masons in Pennsylvania, by virtue of the powers and authorities in me vested and for the reasons herein set forth, do hereby prohibit your Lodge from admitting said Thomas J. Pearce, George W. Phillips, Elmer E. Davis, Frank or Francis Joseph Croyle, Thomas H. Williams, and Harry Richardson as visitors to your Lodge, and do also prohibit the members of your Lodge from extending to said persons any Masonic recognition whatever.

This Edict must be read in open Lodge at its next stated meeting and written in full in its minutes.

In Pennsylvania there are 486 lodges, having a total membership of 105,242, a net gain of 4,516.

The report on Correspondence limited by the force of circumstances is confined to the review of seven Grand Jurisdictions, and is contributed by Brother James M. Lamberton. We miss the illuminating and dignified comment found in the more extensive labors of this well-equipped brother. We sincerely hope that the personal disability which helped to curtail his work will soon disappear and that he will return to the round table with renewed vigor.

On account of the illness of the Grand Master, H. Eugene Stafford, who came to the United States for treatment, the Grand Lodge was opened by the deputy Grand Master, George H. Harvey, whose address we quote :

It is my unpleasant duty to inform the Grand Lodge that our Most Worshipful Grand Master, immediately after his installation, was compelled to retire to his home on account of illness, and his physical condition was such that it was deemed necessary for him to go to the United States for surgical and medical treatment. He left Manila on December 28, 1912, and it was his expectation that he would be away about three months. The Deputy Grand Master received a letter from him at Nagasaki, Japan, in which he expressed his sincere appreciation of the action of the members of the Grand Lodge in seeing him aboard ship the day of his departure for the United States.

The formation of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of the Philippine Islands should be a matter of sincere congratulation on the part of every Mason in these Islands. The purpose of its formation is to promote and maintain harmony and unity in our Masonic relations, and to increase the usefulness of our fraternity in the Orient. No contention should exist either among Masons or Lodges, except a noble contention or emulation in promoting the happiness of our fellow man, and the true interest, dignity, and welfare of our ancient and honorable Order.

Fortunately for the well-being of the Lodges under the jurisdiction of this Grand Lodge, they received their original dispensations and charters from the Grand Lodge of the State of California, and therefore a uniform and very satisfactory system of work will characterize the proceedings of the Lodges within this jurisdiction.

The Grand Lodge having been so recently established, the Deputy Grand Master has little to report in the way of official action. It having been brought to the attention of the Deputy Grand Master, after the departure of the Most Worshipful Grand Master for the United States, that the Grand Lodge at its first communication made no provision for the numeration of the existing Lodges in this jurisdiction, the Deputy Grand Master, under date of December 30, 1912, ordered that the Lodges now under the

jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of the Philippine Islands shall be numbered on its register as follows:

Manila Lodge, No. 1,
Cavite Lodge, No. 2,
Corregidor Lodge, No. 3,

pending the necessary action by the Grand Lodge at its present annual communication, and all transactions of said Lodges from December 19, 1912, to said date of December 30, 1912, wherein they might have made use of said numeration in connection with their names, were approved.

The Deputy Grand Master is in receipt of a cablegram from our Most Worshipful Grand Master dated San Francisco, February 1, 1913, as follows:

“Harvey,
Manila.

Grand Master approves.

Stafford.”

This message is interpreted to mean that our beloved Grand Master has conferred with the Grand Master of California and that the latter approves the action of the Lodges in the Philippine Islands formerly under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of California in forming the Grand Lodge of the Philippine Islands.

There are three lodges, having a total membership of 454, and yet these brethren formed a board of relief for the purpose of assisting visiting and sojourning Masons, their widows and orphans.

The address of the retiring Grand Master, John T. Profit, gives an itemized statement of his official accounts during the year and the condition of the Craft is thus tersely stated:

Extraordinary development of industries peculiar to our own

land have attracted almost world-wide attention. In Masonic circles, however, no special excitement has disturbed us. A slow and steady growth continues.

Increase in numbers without unity is not success. Financial growth without harmony is not prosperity; yet with our slight increase, we can report that unity and harmony, which means success and prosperity.

The Grand Master makes appropriate reference to the Masonic dead of his own and other jurisdictions. He reports four special dispensations, which seem to be proper and necessary. He thus refers to his official visits and their satisfactory results:

Following the example set during the past few years, that the Grand Master shall visit all the lodges in the Jurisdiction during his term of office, I have succeeded in getting all around.

The broad general impression from the several visitations was that the work was moving along, but perhaps rather slowly, but I am happy to be able to say that the aggregate progress this year surpasses that of any year for some time past.

In this small jurisdiction much attention is given to the benevolent fund, which keeps growing steadily and now amounts to \$3,719.98. This is evidence, if any were needed, that these brethren are imbued with the genuine spirit of Freemasonry.

The York Grand lodge of Mexico and the Grand Lodge of the Philippine Islands were duly recognized and an exchange of representatives authorized.

The Grand Secretary, who is also the chairman of the Committee on Correspondence, acknowledges the receipt of the proceedings of English speaking Grand Lodges and expresses his views on the right of visitation, documentary evidence, and other matters of general interest.

There are fifteen lodges having a total membership of 769, showing a net increase of 28.

The likeness of the incoming Grand Master, John E. Wright, occupies the fly leaf of the volume.

The address of the Grand Master, Rev. Frank Charters, D. C. L., is an excellent presentation of the management of Grand Lodge affairs during his administration. He made affectionate reference to the death of a prominent member of the fraternity, Grand Senior Deacon, Dr. James Chalmers Cameron, who without warning was called to final rest.

The Grand Master's showing of the condition of the Craft is very satisfactory:

The Craft has made steady progress during the past year. 341 of a net increase has been added to the membership and over \$9,000.00 have been received for dues, fees and the Permanent Benevolent Fund, a result which I feel sure will encourage us to even greater efforts in the future.

He granted several dispensations, but declined to permit candidates to receive the degrees within the time limit.

One lodge was chartered, and a dispensation issued for the formation of another.

He reports a good many official visits, and all were pleasant for the Grand Master and invariably closed with a sumptuous banquet.

He is strongly in favor of documentary evidence as will be seen by a perusal of this extract:

I am convinced that we have reached a time when some kind of definite action should be taken by this Grand Lodge upon the question of "Proof of Standing" of the Masons in this Province. This matter was before the Grand Lodge some few years ago, but so far no definite action has been taken. The Masons who, from time to time visit other parts of this country, or the United States, are placed in a position of discomfort and disadvantage, owing to the fact that we have no authorized form of the proof of their Masonic standing. Not only is this so, but there appears to be a real need of such proof within the limits of our own Province. The presence of such a large number of dimitted Masons, especially in this city, and the apparent failure to distinguish between them

and the Mason of the regular standing, works a real injustice upon the men who are bearing the burdens and doing the work. Dimitted Masons must be made to feel that their position in the Craft is at best very indefinite, and that apart from one visit permitted them from courtesy, rather than by right, they have no Masonic rights, until such time as they again enter the ranks of the workers. If proper and definite proof of standing can be authorized, and then demanded by the various Lodges, what I feel to be a defect in our system may be avoided in the future, and proper justice given to the worthy and active workers.

The report of the Grand Secretary is in confirmation of the Grand Master's statements that peace, harmony, and prosperity prevail.

There are 64 lodges, having a total membership of 7,362, showing a net gain of 341.

The funds of the Grand Lodge are ample for their several purposes and are safely invested.

The Grand Chaplain, Rev. William Henderson, delivered a very interesting address on early Masonry, and of his observations while spending some time in Jerusalem.

The report on Correspondence, one hundred and twenty-eight pages, is contributed by Past Grand Master, E. T. D. Chambers, who has the gifts and the experience to make his reviews of permanent value. In his introduction he makes some observations in which we are in full agreement, and we select this evidence of his judgment as to the things most needed in the lodges:

Our lodges need, in some instances, to be reminded that the conferring of degrees is not by any means all there is of Masonic work. Too often we fear it is only too true that lodges "have no work on" when there are no degrees to be conferred. Yet this should not be. The first and chief duty of a Master is not to confer degrees, but to instruct the brethren or to cause the same to be done by a fit and proper person in his absence. Even when there is degree work to be done, it should not usurp the entire time of the lodge. No wonder is it that so many lodge members tire of attending meetings at which nothing but degree work is done. It would often be far better for the Master to introduce attractive lectures or papers by well-skilled brothers in the lodge on regular meeting nights, and, if necessary, to postpone a part or the whole of the degree work to an emergent meeting.

Lodges are mainly for the instruction, the improvement, and the mutual benefit, of their members, and not recruiting grounds for the Craft. And Masonry is a beautiful system of morality, and not an organization whose chief aim is its own aggrandisement.

We regret that the transactions of the Grand Lodge of North Carolina failed to reach him.

The Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge was opened by the Deputy Grand Master, Brother Wendell Richmond Davis, who later on was elected Grand Master.

At the semi-annual communication, owing to the severe illness of Grand Master James Bacon Gray, (whose likeness occupies the fly leaf). Brother Davis presided and the Grand Lodge directed that a bouquet of flowers be sent to the sick Grand Master. Eight days later, however, the Grand Lodge was convened to pay its last tribute to this brother who had passed within the veil.

In his announcement to the Craft of Brother Gray's death, the Grand Master paid this handsome tribute to the worth of the dead Grand Master:

His death follows closely upon that of his predecessor and again are we plunged into deep mourning. His genial nature, generous disposition and bright sparkling wit endeared him to all, attracting and binding closely to him the large number of friends which surrounded him. He was modest and unassuming, but was endowed with a good understanding of business affairs, which, united with his never varying promptness and diligence and his strict integrity, made him in all things thoroughly dependable, and won for him the admiration and respect of his associates.

The annual address of Grand Master Davis contains an

account of every important transaction occurring during his administration.

The marked prosperity of this numerically small Grand Lodge may be ascribed to the fidelity and zeal of its officers, to the strength of its individual lodges and, perhaps, especially to the high quality of its membership. The report of the Commissioners of Trials attests the accuracy of this opinion when they say :

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Rhode Island:

The Commissioners of Trials beg leave to report that no matters have been referred to them for consideration, which come within their jurisdiction, since their last report. They now have no matters pending before them.

The diminishing number of cases which they have had to consider during the past few years, when compared with the years preceding, has shown a commendable decrease, and one which speaks well for the members of the order and the welfare of the fraternity.

The mayor of the city extended a cordial welcome to the Grand Lodge, to which suitable replies were made by the Grand Master and others.

The address of the Grand Master, A. S. Gorrell, is a full accounting of his management of the Craft for a year, and a thoughtful presentation of the dangers to the Craft, by reason of sudden and large influx of alien peoples, attracted to the possibility of acquiring freedom and fortune in their new home. He says in this regard :

The immense immigration into this Province may bring men of all nationalities and creeds to the doors of our lodges and upon us will rest the duty of so molding the opinions of these

possible applicants that they will redound to the credit of our Grand Lodge and to the benefit of the country as a whole.

It has been the boast of this Ancient Craft that it takes rough material from whatever part it may come and by the exercise of its art turns it into the finished product. So must we so far as in us lies, endeavor to make use of the large immigration of a foreign population into our country and so shape their destinies that they may become useful and intelligent citizens and cornerstones upon which may be erected a superstructure, perfect in its parts and honorable to the builders. By instilling into the minds of these applicants the true spirit of Masonry and by pointing out to them their duties as citizens we are rendering a service to our country and to the Craft. Many of these people have come from countries where civil and religious liberty are unknown and are so accustomed to being ordered and guided that they cannot realize that it is their privilege to think and act for themselves. To us belongs the duty of spreading the light of Masonry among these, our fellow citizens of alien birth, and to show them by example and precept that freedom is the right of every man in this country and the search of Truth his to pursue for himself.

In reply to a communication from one of the lodges asking if there was any objection to the formation of chapters of the Eastern Star, the Grand Master said:

"Your letter to the Grand Secretary has been handed to me and I beg to say in the kindest manner possible, and without adverse criticism, that the matter mentioned therein should never have been the subject of a debate in your lodge. The Order of the Eastern Star is not Masonic, nor in any way founded upon Ancient Craft Masonry, therefore, the Grand Lodge of Saskatchewan has no more to say about it than it would have of any other Society not Masonic. This Order cannot under any circumstances be recognized by the Grand Lodge of Saskatchewan, nor can any special information from the lodge books or rulings be furnished to any member of any Society not founded on Ancient Craft Masonry."

The order of the Eastern Star, of course, is not Masonic, but the membership is composed of the wives and daughters, mothers and sisters, of Master Masons and is doing a noble work for humanity wherever it is established; and generally it has the encouragement and sympathy of the Craft.

From the report of the committee on condition of Masonry we make this quotation as showing the fidelity and courage of the committee:

It has been the practice of this committee in the past, when criticizing matters which came before it, to express such criticism in general terms, trusting that those to whom it might apply would recognize the application and act accordingly. On this occasion your committee proposes to accept the unpleasant duty of definitely reporting to you their dissatisfaction with the work of the District Deputy Grand Master for Masonic Districts Nos. 8 and 11, and in doing so to emphasize the principle that when responsibilities are accepted by members of the Grand Lodge they are answerable for the proper discharge of the duties entailed by those responsibilities, and if they feel themselves disinclined to perform those duties, they should resign them and make way for men who will perform them.

The welfare of the Order depends entirely on the efficiency primarily of the officers elected to rule subordinate lodges, and then on the District Deputy Grand Masters, who should see that this state of efficiency is maintained.

The report on Correspondence, 165 pages, is contributed by Past Grand Master, A. S. Gorrell, and is an excellent review of the general condition of the Craft in English speaking countries. We regret that the proceedings of North Carolina failed to reach Brother Gorrell.

Portraits of Eustace Beardoe Grundy, K. C., Pro Grand Master, and Alfred M. Simpson, P. D. G. M., President of the Board of General Purposes, give added interest to the volume.

The prosperity of and usefulness of the Grand Lodge is indicated by this extract from the Grand Master's address:

During the past year also the beneficent functions of Freemasonry have been in operation, and I find that the sum of £838

was distributed in aid of aged and distressed Freemasons and their families. Those benefactions, however, do not represent nearly all that has been distributed; they refer only to the gifts from Grand Lodge funds. I know that in the case of one Lodge alone £100 was voted last year in aid of a brother, who for many years filled a high position in Freemasonry, and who occupies still a high place in the esteem and affection of the brethren. Unfortunately, though no fault of his own, he found himself in adverse circumstances, and was helped by his brethren in the manner I have indicated.

From the report of the Grand Inspector of Lodges we quote these two paragraphs as evidence of excellent sense on the part of this official:

In visiting these lodges, I have, wherever possible, carried out the idea suggested in my last report—that of meeting the Worshipful Master and his officers at an informal rehearsal. This to my mind, has proved of much greater benefit to the lodges than a formal visit on a regular evening, as more ample opportunity is afforded of correcting and explaining the work as it proceeds. Should any of the lodges care to make arrangements for such rehearsals the Deputy Inspector or I shall do what we can to fall in with them.

As our lodges increase in number and our roll of membership becomes longer, it behoves the Worshipful Master and Junior Wardens more and more to be certain that visiting brethren who are strangers to them are able to give convincing proofs of their right to enter before being admitted to our assemblies. At times there is a tendency to take too much for granted in this matter. This is especially so at installation meetings, when visiting brethren are admitted by lodges, and unattached brethren temporarily join the ranks of one or other of those lodges. That this is no idle fear is shown by the fact that a few months ago a visitor from one of the other States, about whom there are grave suspicions, gained an entrance into one of our lodges, and on the strength of that was admitted to several others.

The Jubilee Celebration of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the initiation of Grand Master Sir Samuel J. Way into the mysteries of Freemasonry was held in the Lodge of Harmony on the 8th of October, 1912, and a large number of the most prominent Masons in the jurisdiction attended for the purpose of doing honor to the Grand Master. After

the elaborate banquet there was enthusiasm, good fellowship, and oratory in abundance.

Just preceding "A History of Freemasonry in South Australia" is a picture representing the country near the site on which Adelaide was built seventy-six years ago.

We heartily commend the fraternity of South Australia in putting the history of the lodges in permanent form. This volume contains the second chapter of the history in the period between 1844 and 1854.

The report on Correspondence, 103 pages, is contributed by the members of the committee of fourteen. The work of each is excellent. The transactions of North Carolina for 1912 are well summarized by "W. H. S.," which we judge to stand for Brother W. H. Selway, who has been advanced to the important position of Junior Grand Warden. With an equal division of the volumes of proceedings among the fourteen members of the committee, the labor would fall lightly on each, and the sum total of the product, we feel sure, would be excellent.

The likeness of the retiring Grand Master, William J. McMakin, occupies the fly leaf, and a photograph of the Masonic Temple at Yankton precedes the record of the regular Annual Communication. The mayor of Yankton extended a cordial welcome to the Grand Lodge, to which a suitable response was made by Past Grand Master John A. Cleaver.

In his address Grand Master McMakin makes this reference as a principal reason for the meeting of the Grand Lodge in Yankton:

These brethren have good reason to feel proud of what their organization has accomplished in the past fifty years. In reading the history of the organization of the lodge and the permanent settlement of the Territory we find them to be almost cotemporaneous. St. John's has not only given many distinguished statesmen to our Commonwealth, but learned and skillful Craftsmen to this Grand Body, one of whom—M. W., Brother George H. Hand, having presided over its destinies for four consecutive years.

In his report of the Masonic dead he paid a very high tribute to the memory of Past Grand Master Oscar Sherman Gifford and closed with this quotation :

“His epitaph, a Mason true and good,
Sincere in friendship, ready in relief,
Discreet in trusts, faithful in brotherhood,
Tender in sympathy and kind in grief.
His toils are ended; we must labor on;
Our Master for a little longer calls
Our hands to duty at the rising sun,
Our hearts to rest when evening shadow falls.”

Seven lodges were constituted, and dispensations issued for the formation of six others. One application for dispensation he declined because of belief that the territory would not be sufficient to maintain a healthy lodge.

The Grand Master refers to physical qualifications and complains that in several instances subordinate lodges have been guilty of flagrant violation of the law. He refers to some irregularities in conducting communications of subordinate lodges, which in every instance is due to ignorance of the law.

The Grand Master reports that he made but very few official visits.

Grand Master McKin shows that he earnestly desires the increase of the Charity Fund as shown by this extract, and the sentiment of the Grand Lodge is with him in this laudable purpose. He says:

At the thirty-eighth Annual Communication, M. W. Brother Brockway in speaking of the Grand Charity Fund said, “I believe we are at a point where if the matter was properly worked out

and presented it would not be at all difficult to add to the fund each year a substantial sum by some sort of a per capita contribution from the membership throughout the State.

In this connection, I call your attention to the fact that the next year the oldest lodge in the State will celebrate the Fiftieth Anniversary of its constitution under Charter.

I commend to your consideration whether we might 'not with great propriety make that the occasion of the Golden Jubilee of organized Masonry in this Grand Jurisdiction, and bring our gifts to the altar by making a substantial increase in the Grand Charity Fund.

In response to this suggestion by the Grand Master the Committee on Jurisprudence to whom it had been referred recommended the appointment of a special committee of five with power to formulate a plan for raising additional moneys for the Grand Charity Fund by voluntary contributions from the members of the Craft throughout this jurisdiction, said committee to report at the next Annual Communication of this Grand Lodge.

In South Dakota there are 138 subordinate lodges, having a total membership of 10,221, a net gain in membership of 522.

The celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of St. John's Lodge, No. 1, was observed with music, eloquence, and feasting.

The appeal of Hot Springs Lodge, Arkansas, for permission to ask for aid in the building of a Masonic hospital at Hot Springs did not impress the South Dakota brethren as a matter of first importance, and the report of a special committee indicates that they believe in the motto that charity should commence at home, and they say in part:

As to the appeal from the Masons of Arkansas, for funds to erect a Masonic building at Hot Springs, and all similar appeals, your committee believes that the matter of organized Masonic Charities is something that requires careful and judicious thought of each jurisdiction, and, until we are in a position to take care of worthy, distressed Masons in our own jurisdiction in some sensible, reasonable and expeditious manner, your committee believes it is not the part of wisdom, justice or true charity to countenance by endorsement schemes of this character, which involve the possibility of soliciting funds from the Masons of lodges of the State to be invested outside of the State. In this your committee

casts no reflection upon the brethren, and expresses no opinion on the merits of the Arkansas appeal.

This is the cordial approval if the Committee of Jurisprudence upon the rulings of the Grand Master:

We approve all the dispensations granted, they being of a nature clearly within his power. But we more than approve his refusal to exercise his prerogative in applications to confer degrees out of time. It is extremely refreshing, in fact, a great source of satisfaction to your committee, to see in one of our successors so well developed vertebrae. This strong approval covers all other refusals reported by the M. W. Grand Master, and we heartily recommend the pursuance of this policy to his successors in office.

The three decisions reported are approved, being true interpretations of Masonic Law.

The report on Correspondence is, as heretofore, the excellent work of Past Grand Master S. A. Brown. The North Carolina volume failed to come to hand, and thus is lost the opportunity to hear the voice of a friend in behalf of the "Tar Heel" Craft. We quote Brother Brown's poetic eulogy to the memory of Thomas M. Matthews and Christopher Diehl:

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of South Dakota:

The Committee on Correspondence has lost two of its dearest friends:

Thomas M. Matthews, of Texas.

Christopher Diehl, of Utah.

When spirits from all spheres shall meet these high souls abroad in the vast expanse and companion them, they will teach each other that the earth is a splendid world.

"Proceedings of the Grand Lodge of Scotland from

February, 1913, to January 1914, with Grand Office Bearers, Provincial and District Grand Masters, Grand Stewards, Committees, Roll of Members, Provincies, Lodges, Financial Returns, etc."

The above is the table of contents of a volume of 190 pages.

"The list of Provincies with lodges therein," shows that Scotland has subordinate lodges in every part of the known world and they are to be found in the Republic of Panama, in the Fiji Islands, Egypt, Arabia, Japan, Hawaiian Islands, Philippine Islands and everywhere, with a complaisant indifference as to the existence of other Grand Lodges.

The Grand Lodge of Scotland has its fund of benevolence which it disburses judiciously to worthy needy Masons, and their dependents. It has also an annuity fund from which is regularly paid a fixed amount. In this report 252 annuitants received £2780, or nearly \$13,000. Besides this the individual lodges have their benevolent fund and dispense aid to worthy applicants.

On opening the volume the strong and thoughtful face of Sam P. Coehran, the Grand Master, greets us.

Brother Coehran's address is a well-written and dignified story of a successful administration, in which all matters of importance received his careful consideration. His tribute to the character and service of past Grand Master, Thomas M. Matthews, Sr., is beautiful in sentiment and bears the stamp of sincerity. He says in part:

The loyalty and devotion of Brother Matthews to our noble order is evidenced by his long and constant labor, continuing as the shadows lengthened, even to the very hour of his death. The institution he loved so well and served so faithfully was the

inspiration and joy of his feeble and broken life, and the privilege of being a worker in the ranks was, in his declining years, an unspeakable comfort. The brethren of Texas are proud of the career of this good man and Mason, and will ever hold in grateful remembrance his noble and distinguished service in behalf of Ancient Craft Masonry, cherishing a hope that the lofty sentiments, high ideals and Christian virtues seen in his life and labor will be a help and inspiration to men and Masons everywhere.

Like many other Grand Masters, he has been forced under the provisions of the law to impose discipline upon lodges and erring brethren. In so large a jurisdiction it is not surprising that punishment must be imposed.

Twenty-three lodges have been deemed worthy of receiving charters, and nine lodges have received dispensations to work.

He issued many proxies for laying cornerstones, and granted special dispensations for special purposes, and quite a large number were refused.

The decisions of the Grand Master, 26 in number, indicate that the Grand Master possessed the judicial temperament and the knowledge of the Masonic scholars, so much so, indeed, that the Jurisprudence Committee closes its report with these words of eulogy:

In conclusion, this committee desires to extend to our Grand Master the congratulations of this Grand Lodge on his brilliant administration of Masonic affairs in Texas during the past year, and to assure him of the appreciation, respect and affection of the great brotherhood throughout our imperial commonwealth.

Discussing the subject of physical disqualification he gives this stinging rebuke to the officers of the lodge for their carelessness in reference to this matter:

I am surprised to learn of the frequency with which lodges accept candidates who are subject to physical disqualifications, and actually confer a degree or degrees upon them before discovering this fact. The law of the Grand Lodge of Texas on the subject of physical qualification is clear and unquestionable, and the reports of Grand Masters for years and years past teem with decisions covering numerous varieties of cases passed intelligently upon most any kind of a case. Notwithstanding this, candidates who are clearly disqualified are accepted, and after

receiving the Entered Apprentice (and sometimes the Fellow Craft) degree, the fact of the maim, loss or injury is discovered, and then the candidate has to be stopped. This shows gross carelessness and lack of attention to duty on the part of the lodge officers, and it is unfair to a candidate to lead him to expect to receive the degree of Master Mason, and allow him to advance part of the way, only then to be informed that subsequent discoveries render it absolutely impossible for him to attain the realization of his hope. It is especially the duty of the Senior Deacon to fully satisfy himself that each candidate is in every respect thoroughly qualified before permitting him to enter the lodge room, and a careful observance of this duty on his part would save the lodges and officers from many embarrassing situations.

Under the head of "Clandestine Masonry" he reports having received a letter stating that 17 men who were members of a lodge chartered by King Solomon's Grand Lodge, having jurisdiction over negro Masons and having withdrawn from the negro lodge they asked to be affiliated and constituted as a lodge under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Texas. The Grand Master courteously answered that it was impossible to grant the request, so persistent were they that application was made to the Secretary of State for a charter to organize "a Grand Lodge of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry for the State of Texas and the Masonic jurisdiction of this Grand Lodge determined and agreed upon by the constitution and by-laws of this Grand Lodge." And they fell down again.

The Grand Master endorsed the work of the Masonic Relief Association and recommended that the Grand Lodge of Texas become a member.

In the jurisdiction of Texas there is a total number of 851 lodges with a membership of 56,071 showing an increase of 2,161 over last year.

The Grand Lodge of Texas has receded from its cast iron rule of physical perfection by the adoption of the following modification:

That an application for initiation must be sound and hale, without maim or defect in his body that may render him ineligible to be a Mason; that is, physical maims and defects should be

considered on the basis of his ability to receive, practice and impart freely and without artificial or other aid, all the rites and ceremonies of Ancient Craft Masonry, including Masonic work in the lodge room, and shall possess the mental and physical ability to earn his livelihood in his chosen occupation outside the lodge room.

The Grand Lodge has modified its law in perpetual jurisdiction to the five-year limit:

"Sec. 6. Each lodge has jurisdiction of all applications for Masonry residing nearest to it; and no lodge shall act on the application of a person residing nearer to another lodge, without the unanimous consent of such lodge, duly certified; nor confer a degree upon any person who has been rejected by another lodge without similar consent, if such lodge is working, unless five years have elapsed since the date of such rejection."

And now we sadly come to the report on Correspondence, the last written by our late distinguished brother, Dr. Thomas M. Matthews, Sr. Some of the work of this report was completed only a few hours before his death. In his Masonic labors, Brother Matthews was *primus inter pares*. Brother George W. Tyler, P. G. M., acting chairman has this foreword:

R. W. Brother Thomas M. Matthews, P. G. M., while serving his twenty-fifth term as Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence, departed this life on the 14th day of June, 1912. He fell in full possession of his faculties and in the active discharge of his duties with such diligence that his completed manuscript reviews of forty-four of the Grand Lodges lay on his table when he expired. These have been forwarded to the undersigned, whom the Grand Master was pleased to designate as acting Chairman for the unexpired term. A consensus of opinion was then had among the members of the Committee, and we decided unanimously to bring to you these reviews as the

LAST REPORT OF BROTHER MATTHEWS,

without any change, addition or diminution whatever, and the same are herewith presented accordingly.

We feel that in so doing we pay the highest honor within our power to Brother Matthews, and it is fitting that the result of his last labors should stand in our proceedings in consecutive order, and as a proper conclusion to the twenty-four reports that have hitherto come from his able pen—the whole rounding out and completing a splendid and enduring monument to his ability, learning and Masonic fidelity.

We reserve the privilege of submitting to the Grand Lodge in December a more extended tribute to the life and character of our distinguished brother.

The transactions of North Carolina for 1912 was one of the fortunate volumes to receive the touch of the hand now cold in death. We have never until now reproduced any compliments of our brothers at the round table, but we now depart from our custom and transcribe what he so kindly says of our work:

Our long-time friend and brother, both Masonically and professionally, Dr. John A. Collins, again, and for the sixteenth time furnished the report on Foreign Correspondence. That it is a good paper thorough and interesting, goes without the saying, for Brother Collins has the reputation, which by his long experience he has earned and well merits, of being a well-informed, broad-guaged, conservative, able and yet versatile writer. Like us he prefers and holds to the good old ways of the fathers in Masonry, and does not run after or approve of the new-fangled fads and fancies of the latter day would-be progressives. Clear-headed and plain-spoken, always he commends and sustains what he believes to be right, and fearlessly strikes at and condemns what he considers wrong. Believing that "error ceases to be dangerous when reason is left free to combat it," he hews to the line regardless as to where the chips may fall or whom they hit. It is, therefore, a pleasure to read what he writes. We regret that, as it seems, the Texas volume failed to reach him. Such we suppose was the case, as there is no notice of it in his report. We will hope, however that such will not be the case again soon.

The likeness of the Grand-Master-elect, Charles Comstock, forms the frontispiece.

The address of the retiring Grand Master, J. Lynn Bach-

man, is an unpretentious presentation of his administration of Grand Lodge affairs for the year.

His tribute to the Masonic dead is a fine recognition of the Masonic work which they accomplished.

The Grand Master reports many dispensations, and one dispensation for the formation of a new lodge. Reporting the effects of his visitations and what he had seen, he says:

The State is large, the lodges are many. My time was limited and duty prompted all my goings. The real needs of subordinate lodges are few, and many of them can be better met by arousing a spirit of progress among the brethren by having the Masters of these lodges do the work themselves, rather than ask the Grand Master to exemplify it for them. No Master is worthy to sit in the East if he cannot put on the entire work, without evasion, equivocation or mental hesitation, and no lodge should elect a brother to any station before he learns the work. In all my visitations, this was the worst enemy I found to real interest and progress. There is no real study to know how. The second section of the third degree is the most splendid tragedy in existence. The scene, the actors, the holy purpose involved, make it in dramatic effect more thrilling than Shakespeare's Hamlet. Why, then, a laugh; why the actor a buffoon? Why not vindicate the eternal truth that a man true to self and the interest committed cannot be false to any man? Life may come and life may go; my secret goes on forever.

He reports twenty official rulings which had reference only to the interpretation of local laws, but the committee on Jurisprudence failed to agree with him on three or four of these rulings.

In speaking of the Masonic Home and its needs, the Grand Master tells how his prayers and efforts were rewarded:

I am glad to report that the Home is in a prosperous condition. It is faithfully and efficiently managed. God in great mercy has kept His good hand over all the little ones, and all eyes have been kept from tears, and all feet from falling, and all souls from death.

I asked the brethren of the subordinate lodges to make a donation of twenty-five (25) cents per capita this year for the up-keep of the Home. My circular letter was sent to all the lodges and its contents known, and in response the Home has re-

ceived \$1,944.26, and for which goodly sum in the name of the Home I offer most appreciative thanks.

The Grand Master received some communications which failed to have the signatures of the writers, and of these cowardly missives, he says:

I have been much perplexed over the many anonymous letters received. I would suggest to all the brethren, that Masonry should ever live in the open and keep both hands above board.

The Committee on Ways and means in discussing the kind of practical education that the boys and girls need before leaving the Home, says very sensibly:

It is desired by the Board of Control at the earliest possible time to institute a department of domestic science, sewing and manual training.

The importance of this branch of training in the Home cannot be exaggerated. If it is possible, and it is believed to be, to equip the boys and girls who are entrusted to our care in such a manner that they may be prepared to earn a livelihood, it must be apparent we will be accomplishing results which could not otherwise be attained. This Committee believes we all feel the importance of preparing the children of the Home to fight the battle of life, and so to educate them, not only in reading and writing, but along physical lines, that they may be able to command employment when the time arrives that they must leave the Home.

Your Committee does not hesitate to express the opinion, that when young women are prepared to do capable work in domestic lines, their opportunities for happy and successful lives are infinitely greater than if they are put out into the world without resources, and without ability to earn a living. The same thing applies to young men, and we earnestly trust that the day is not far distant when the hope of the Board of Control with reference to providing for instruction in the departments of domestic science and manual training may be realized.

The likeness of the Grand-Master-elect, George H. Dern, forms the frontispiece, and precedes a brief biography, which shows this brother to have been an active factor in the Masonic and business life of the State.

The unavoidable absence of Grand Master S. H. Goodwin made it necessary that the annual address should be read by the new Grand Secretary, Brother C. B. Jack.

Brother Goodwin's address is a comparatively brief paper but omits nothing of importance in the management of the affairs of the Grand Lodge for the year just coming to a close. He paid this deserved tribute to the beloved Grand Secretary, Christopher Diehl whose name has become closely associated with that of the Grand Lodge of Utah:

I cannot, however, allow this occasion to pass without placing a wreath upon memory's altar for one who, for the first time in forty years, is absent from our annual gathering. Death selected a shining mark when he laid his hand upon the shoulder of Brother Christopher Diehl, and bade him follow into the mists, beyond which lie the sun-tipped mountains. Our venerated and beloved Grand Secretary, after a period of service in this Grand Body such as it is the privilege of few to give to any Grand Lodge, sleeps. All who knew him respected and esteemed him for his genuine worth, and many loved him; but only those who have been tuned to better things by the sweetness and simplicity of his life, and who were accustomed to draw upon his rich and varied experience and extensive accurate fund of Masonic knowledge, know how large a place he filled in our ranks, and how great is our loss. I take this opportunity to gratefully acknowledge my personal indebtedness to him for much that helped to make Masonic law and usage a guide to my feet, and the Masonic spirit an inspiration to my life.

The Grand Master reports having visited every lodge in the district at least once, and several of them oftener, and he reports that every one of these visits was marked by evidences of sincere good-fellowship.

He reports having constituted two lodges, which he felt assured would influence the moral conditions of the communities in which they were established.

Unlike some other Grand Masters, Brother Goodwin is a very earnest advocate of the Grand Representative system and addressed the officials in words of cordial welcome, and we quote from this address:

Be assured that Masonry in Utah, although numerically weak as compared with nearly all of the other states of the Union, is strong in spirit and is striving valiantly to propagate light, and to advance civilization and education in this commonwealth, which we believe has so great a future. Utah Masons, like all good loyal citizens of this young State, are filled with the conviction that here, in these mountains and valleys, will one day be builded a State that will be one of the fairest flower beds in the American garden. The boundless and diversified resources that nature has so generously provided for us, the soil, the minerals, the climate, and the natural scenery make our material progress certain. And as Freedom's home was ever in the mountains, we may rest assured that in good season the minds of our people will be freed from the shackles of superstition and error, the blessings of civil and religious liberty will be universally enjoyed among us, human knowledge will be advanced, and human happiness improved. We Masons of Utah feel that our greatest mission is to speed that happy day.

The Committee on Jurisprudence, to whom the matter was referred declined to recommend any action looking to the recognition of the York Grand Lodge of Mexico, owing to the unsettled condition of affairs in that country.

The Grand Lodge adopted a resolution appropriating \$500 for the purpose of a suitable tablet to be placed in the Masonic Temple, as a memorial to the memory of the late Grand Secretary, Christopher Diehl. This was a very proper recognition of the labor of the late Grand Secretary in behalf of Freemasonry in Utah.

After the installation of Grand Master Dern, the signet

ring was presented by the retiring Grand Master, and the ceremony elicited the usual display of eloquence and good-fellowship.

The successor to Christopher Diehl who has been called up higher, both at the Grand Secretary's and at the Round Table, is Brother Charles B. Jack whose report on Correspondence compressed in 79 pages, indicates very clearly that he wields a facile pen, and that he possesses such equipment as to fit him especially for the work.

Although the proceedings of North Carolina had failed to reach Brother Jack, we are none the less interested in his fine review. We are disposed to predict that the report on Correspondence for Utah will continue to be illuminating and instructive. We quote Brother Jack's introduction:

It is with reluctance that we attempt a review of the proceedings of the various jurisdictions. Our brother Diehl for thirty-six years performed this work in such a manner as to give distinction to the Proceedings of your Grand Lodge and merit the esteem of other reviewers.

Whether we could have done better with more time at our disposal we do not know; but lack of time will serve as an explanation for not including any of the Grand Lodges outside of the United States, and the proceedings from one or two states have not come into our hands.

We have been impressed by the uniform courtesy shown by the reviewers of other Grand Jurisdictions and by the many kind things said of us.

Utah has 17 subordinate lodges having a total membership of 2,081, showing a net gain of 102.

The address of the Grand Master, Eugene S. Weston, is

a comprehensive recital of his official acts during the year. After welcoming delegates and members of the Grand Lodge, the Grand Master made appropriate reference to the Masonic dead.

As to the condition of the Craft and some slight loss in the membership he makes this sensible statement:

The net gain in membership has been small, notwithstanding about the usual number have been raised, for the reason that many of the lodges have been weeding out those who would not do their share in paying for the benefits received. The report of the Grand Secretary will show a much larger number of suspensions for non-payment of dues. This is a wise course of action on the part of the lodges. It leaves them with a membership of workers, without the expense of supporting the drones.

He reports having sent \$100 to the Red Cross Society for the relief of Masons at Salonica, and they were ready—those Masons of Vermont—to contribute to the flood sufferers of Ohio and Indiana when needed.

The Grand Master reports an appeal for money by a lodge at Ponce, and disapproved of the plan.

As to the conference of Grand Masters, Brother Weston is disposed to believe that the importance of these meetings has been exaggerated and that at present attendance thereon would be an unnecessary expense.

Many special dispensations were granted and a few refused.

He reports several pleasant official visits which he greatly enjoyed.

Dual membership is not permitted in Vermont, though it is said to prevail in the neighboring jurisdiction of New Hampshire.

After discussing the subject of the George Washington Memorial Association, the Grand Master closes the matter with the words:

It is soon going to be considered the clearing-house for the Grand Lodges in settling matters of dispute.

As the meetings at Philadelphia and Baltimore were productive of much good, so will these gatherings each year be the means of bringing the Grand Jurisdictions into closer bonds.

This Grand Lodge by its subscription of \$100 became a member of the association, but is not bound to be any more expense than it chooses. Even if you are not represented you cannot be assessed any sum that is obligatory on you to meet. Everything must be voluntary.

Having thus explained the matter I leave it with you for such consideration as you may think best.

The dispensations and decisions of the Grand Master were generally approved, but the Jurisprudence Committee offered these criticisms, which we think are just:

An application for a dispensation is addressed to the discretion of the Grand Master, and unless the dispensation transgresses the organic law of Masonry, your Committee would not feel that it was necessary to revise the action of the Grand Master in either the granting or refusing to grant a dispensation. In the matter of dispensations submitted for our examination, we find only one, and this one was referred to by the Grand Master himself, as transgressing the law. This was the granting of a dispensation to receive and ballot upon a petition from an applicant who had not resided for the term of one year in this State.

In relation to the request for decision in the case of the the brother who borrowed the fifty dollars and has had charges preferred against him by the party that loaned the money, in our judgment this is not a matter for the Grand Lodge to consider, and is not one that ought to have been sent up to the Grand Master. This whole question is in the hands of the Master of the lodge, and when he makes his decision as to whether the charges are frivolous or ought to be investigated, and the lodge acts under the direction of the Master, if the parties to the proceedings are not satisfied with the result of the matter in the lodge, they have the right of appeal, but until the matter has been acted upon by the lodge, and comes to the Grand Lodge in the regular form, we do not think we have any call to pass upon this question.

In a report of the Committee on Charity it was strongly urged that a Charity Fund be formed and maintained of such a size as to be available in time of need. This gave rise to majority and minority reports, during the discussion of which it was disclosed that there had been a Charity Fund, which had never been used for years and years.

With 103 lodges the Grand Lodge of Vermont has a membership of nearly 14,000.

The report on Correspondence, 153 pages, is contributed by Past Grand Master O. Perkins, and is, as usual, of excellent character. We regret very much that the proceedings of North Carolina have failed to reach Brother Perkins.

The address of the Grand Master, William L. Andrews, is an attractively-written account of his administration. The practical wisdom in the following extract justifies its reproduction here:

If increase of numbers be a sign of prosperity, then have we reason to congratulate ourselves on a great year's work, for the lodges have been busy, purging of rosters, because of the increased capitation tax. Some lodges have made notable gains, and are really becoming "top heavy" with numbers.

It is my opinion that those lodges having a membership of less than a hundred do more for the cause of Masonry, and show more enthusiasm than when they number hundreds.

If you look over the list of lodges that have shown their "faith by works," you will find that when it comes to practical charity the smaller lodge exceeds, in percentage, its larger sister. I have been forcibly reminded of that fact in canvassing returns made to appeals sent out in behalf of our Home.

I know of one lodge whose membership runs to nearly half a thousand, sending but little over five cents per capita, when some of the smaller lodges send nearly one dollar per capita. In too many cases the small lodges furnish the money and the large one excuses.

Financially, all our lodges appear to be prospering, but many of them are commercializing themselves by trying to obtain expensive properties that yield large revenues, and, as a result, the lodge enters into voluntary servitude for years to come, paralyzes

its chance of usefulness, creates dissatisfaction among its members by necessarily increased dues to meet these obligations made in pursuit of wealth, and discourages men of moderate means from applying for the mysteries, because the amount to be paid in the future as dues, with a probable raise, is more than they feel they can spare for the cause.

He reports only four decisions, which were cordially approved by the Jurisprudence Committee.

Usually the statements of visitations make very dull reading, but if any one should pass over the fourteen pages of delightful travel, as told by Brother Andrews, his mind would be disabused of the fear that it would in any respect be tiresome. It is a delightful story of pleasant visits and sparkles with wit and humor. This is how he was equipped for his travels:

At the Grand Lodge some of the brethren, who thought my appearance might be improved by a silk hat, had provided that necessary nuisance, and, for fear I might lose it, the brethren of Nos. 63 and 190, on the occasion of my reception, presented me with a handsome hat-box, in which it has, ever since, proudly reposed, and, being mindful of Most Worshipful McChesney's offer of a quarter to a colored porter to lose his similar impedimenta, I have jealously kept watch over it, for fear the porter might not remember that it was Brother McChesney, and not I, who had made the offer.

That he is the warm active friend of the Masonic Home and the little ones sheltered there is shown by this extract:

I have made frequent trips there, unannounced; have been into the fields, the school-rooms, the building from basement to attic, and the outer buildings, to make personal inspection, and made personal examination of the food and clothing of the children, and I assure the brethren things "look good to me" out there; but, for fear I may be biased in the matter, each one should make an investigation for himself. But let me give you this warning, if you don't want to love those children, and be blessed by their love, don't go to the Masonic Home.

The Grand Master is earnestly in favor of equipping a Home for aged indigent Masons, and feels sure that this needed charity will soon be in operation.

Virginia has 234 lodges, having a total membership of 23,317, showing a gain of almost 700.

The report on Correspondence, 156 pages, is an interesting and instructive review of the transactions of 64 Grand Lodges, in which North Carolina, 1912, is included and is contributed by Past Grand Master Joseph William Eggleston, whose fitness for this kind of Masonic labor is universally recognized.

We find ourselves at wide disagreement with Brother Eggleston that the prerogative of making Masons at sight is a landmark of Masonry but we are in thorough accord with his opinion of the "International Bureau for Masonic Intercourse" as expressed under District of Columbia:

They have joined and are contributors to the International Bureau for Masonic Intercourse, at Neufchatel, Switzerland. Now we may be wrong, but it is our honest opinion that trouble will come of this movement, and our brethren will one day regret that they gave countenance to a movement designed ultimately to fuse all independent Grand Bodies into one international one, and make of Masonry a propaganda in religious politics. Masonry is not combative, has no wars to regret, and should pursue her calm beneficence untroubled by abuse from any source. Besides, these Continental bodies are Scottish Rite, governed by Supreme Councils, and their members cannot even grasp our American Masonic idea of the true mission of Masonry. It has, more than once, been wisely said that Latins cannot learn to understand Ancient York Masonry, much less practice it.

This volume is adorned with the likeness of Past Grand Master George W. Atkinson, who after an absence of six years in Washington City, has come back home; of Past Grand Secretary, Hiram R. Howard, who departed this life the 9th of May 1912, and was buried with full Masonic

honors, two days afterwards, and left to his brethren of West Virginia, the heritage of a useful and upright life; of Past Grand Master John M. Collins, a successor as Grand Secretary of the late Brother Howard; and of the incoming Grand Master, Charles W. Lynch.

The Grand Lodge of West Virginia has made a record for special Communications, 18 of which have been held during the year. Many of these specials were held for the purpose of dedicating temples, and three of these handsome edifices are figured in the volume.

The annual address of the retiring Grand Master, John M. McConihay is a comparatively brief paper but makes a full accounting of his official doings for the year. He thus reports the condition of the Craft:

It is with great satisfaction that I report the healthy condition of the Craft in West Virginia. During the year ending October 31, 1912, there has been a net gain of 881 in the membership of the subordinate lodges. Our Commonwealth has been blessed with prosperity in all branches of industry, great trains of cars on our railroads and huge barges on our river have borne the coal from our mountains and the products of our farms and factories to the busy marts of trade. The Author of all good and perfect gifts has sent rain in due season and the land has yielded her increase and the trees of the field have yielded her fruit. All the necessities of life have abounded among men throughout this jurisdiction.

Appropriate reference is made to the dead at home and abroad.

Two lodges were constituted, and dispensations issued for two others. The reported special dispensations which he found it necessary to refuse, one to open the lodge without the presence of the Master or Wardens; two to re-ballot, and one to attend a public rally and lecture on Masonic regalia.

The Grand Master reported decisions regarding the construction of local legislation. The Committee on Jurisprudence failed to entirely agree with the Grand Master.

West Virginia has 147 subordinate lodges with a membership of 15,768, showing a gain during the year of 878.

We welcome Brother George W. Atkinson to his old position of scribe at the round table. He seems from the following to think that in six years he has become "rusty" and says:

Owing to the death of our highly esteemed and much beloved Brother, Hiram R. Howard, Grand Secretary and Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Correspondence, our M. W. Grand Master, Brother John M. McConihay, very kindly designated me to prepare the report for the current year. Although I have had twenty years' experience in this sort of work, yet I have been out of the harness for six years, and as a consequence of this lengthy hiatus, I find myself quite rusty, and I shall necessarily fall far below the high standard set by Brother Howard during the six years of his occupancy of a chair at the Round Table as the able representative of this thrifty and aggressive Grand Lodge.

In the foregoing statements, Brother Atkinson does himself injustice for it is obvious that his right hand has not lost its cunning, and that his return to the guild will give a flavor of individuality to these reports, that it would be hard to duplicate.

The North Carolina transactions for 1912 received the kindly notice of Brother Atkinson and we are glad to find ourselves in accord with him in the matter of cipher rituals.

The likeness of the incoming Grand Master, Fred C. Barnett, occupies the fly leaf of the volume.

The address of the retiring Grand Master, William Pugh, gives a full account of his stewardship and it received the commendation of the Grand Lodge.

He reports seven decisions all of which were approved by the Grand Lodge. The last of these is unusual and indi-

icates the wisdom and practical good sense of the Grand Master. It arose out of a controversy between two contiguous lodges, as to jurisdiction over material. Gillette lodge in ignorance as to its territorial boundaries, initiated a candidate under the jurisdiction of Sundance Lodge and conferred the Fellow Craft degree upon the same candidate without having received official notice of waiver from Gillette Lodge. The Grand Master decided that each lodge should pay to the Grand Secretaries the fee which it received from the candidate, the whole amount to be transferred to the Masonic Home Fund. This action of the Grand Master was approved by the Grand Lodge.

The Grand Master reports a very good time spent in making official visits, and devotes nine pages to the story of his outings. At the close of his report he says:

Masonry is growing and prospering in Wyoming, the number of the lodges as well as the membership thereof continues to increase; naturally this increases the labor and responsibility of the Grand Master, and the past year has been one of great activity for me nevertheless. The opportunity for extending my knowledge of the State and the many delightful people that I have met, have fully compensated for the labor and time expended, and I shall always look back on this year as a pleasant spot in my life, only regretting my inability to do more and better service for our noble Order. The experience of the past year has resulted in greater knowledge and more appreciation of Masonry, and I shall step out of office into the ranks ready to help carry forward the good work that Masonry is endeavoring to accomplish.

A resolution was adopted which forbids the use of Masonic halls for any amusement except for Masons and their families.

On recommendation of the Committee on Correspondence, the Grand Lodge of the Philippine Islands was recognized as a sovereign, legitimate, and regular Masonic Body.

Not the least interesting and hopeful record is that of the Committee on Appeals and Grievances, which reported that it had absolutely nothing to do.

In Wyoming there are 34 subordinate lodges, with a membership of 3,036, showing a net gain of 191.

The report on Correspondence is furnished by Brother W. L. Kuykendall, and is like his preceeding reports, a paper of great value. There is hardly a page of this report that has not something of importance to symbolic Masonry. Replying to Brother James M. Wroth, of New Mexico, in the recognition of the Grand Orient of France, Brother Kuykendall says and we concur in his views:

We have never believed in even attempting to recognize any Grand Lodge until it had asked for recognition. We are well satisfied from the record that the Grand Lodge of England is absolutely unsafe as a guide on the question of recognition, as we believe its action in that direction is too often warped by commercial considerations, and this applies as well to a few of the Grand Lodges of this country. We greatly regret to see the Grand Lodge of New Mexico commit itself to Brother Wroth's proposition that "I feel that a Grand Lodge may not be recognized and yet be regular, and that to inflict upon its members a purely legal proposition is not just and fair." In the name of reason, shall an individual Mason or a lodge determine whether or not a Grand Lodge is regular to which heresy it seems New Mexico is now committed or should the Grand Lodge first determine the question of regularity? If lodges and Masons are to determine such regularity and we are to return to the go-as-you-please style in vogue in operative Masonry before Grand Lodges existed, it seems Grand Lodges should cease considering the question of recognition and, like England and New Mexico, let us all adopt the new fangled Uptonian doctrine on that question. We do not believe our brother considered what would be the effect of failure by a Grand Lodge "to inflict upon its members a purely legal proposition." Certainly nothing less than chaos and anarchy would speedily ensue if a Grand Lodge failed to enforce any legal mandate or proposition. His report as a whole on the status of said Grand Orient and Grand Lodge of France with very few other exceptions outside of above meets with our hearty approbation.

The proceedings of North Carolina for 1913 received the fraternal consideration of Brother Kuykendall.

The address of the Grand Master, David B. Greene, is an excellent presentation of his year's work compressed into less than twenty pages of the volume. In his exordium he presents very forcibly the ideals and purposes of Masonry and sums up the matter with this pertinent statement:

Masonry depends for its influence among men, for its prestige in the world, for its very life, upon the power that lives and manifests itself in the example of its votaries.

Under the head of Necrology, we quote what he says in reference to a future life:

We are perhaps too much disturbed about the exact conditions of life. It is very likely that we are putting too much emphasis on the technical details of attaining to it. The whole of our experiences thus far, and the whole argument of our brethren who have lived out their lives before us, to teach us that our concern should be, and that our duty is, to our fellows here and now, and that he is best prepared to live this life, in its full and complete sense, is best prepared to continue it under such conditions as the future shall impose.

Special dispensations to the number of 65 were granted, but in no case unless there were good and sufficient reasons for doing so.

These extracts from the decisions of the Grand Master, seem to indicate that the Wisconsin brethren are advancing to the goal of physical perfection:

Question—Is a candidate with a part of the little finger of the left hand gone, eligible to the degrees?

Answer—No.

Question—Has our lodge jurisdiction in the case of one who wears a glass eye that would hardly be noticed?

Answer—No.

It is difficult for us to see that these blemishes should prevent a man from being a useful Mason and complying with all the requirements of the ritual.

Four dispensations for the formation of new lodges were granted.

The frequency with which cremation is adopted for the final disposal of the dead has impressed the brethren with the belief that there should be an appropriate service for such occasions and the Grand Lodge has accordingly appointed a committee to present, at the next meeting of the Grand Lodge, a cremation ceremonial.

The Grand Lodge of Wisconsin has no Masonic Home, and we think it is wise in this respect, but the Grand Master says that no claim for relief has come to his hands which has not been promptly met whether the claimant was a Mason or not. In confirmation of the Grand Master's statement, is his reports of the promptness with which the fraternity responded to the cry of the suffering in the flooded districts in Ohio and Indiana.

Grand Master Greene proved to be such an efficient executive that the brethren put him in a new line of work, as Grand Treasurer, following the death of Brother Thomas Jefferson Pereles, the former custodian of the Grand Lodge funds.

That the Grand Lodge is prosperous is shown in the increase in its lodges and membership. There are 269 lodges, having a total membership of 28,082, showing a net gain in membership of 849.

The retiring Grand Master was complimented by the adoption of a resolution, which instructed the Grand Secretary to procure, at the expense of the Grand Lodge, a suitable Past Grand Master jewel for presentation to him.

A similar resolution was adopted authorizing the Grand Secretary in the future to procure a similar jewel for each retiring Grand Master.

The report on Correspondence is, as usual, presented by Past Grand Master Alder Jenks, who in 141 pages has given a delightful review of the proceedings which have come to his hands. We regret that the North Carolina transactions were not received. Brother Jenks' tribute to

his associates of the round table who are not, is so fine that we quote it entire without apology:

Many of those we have become accustomed to commune with through their writings have dropped out of the ranks of the living and we miss them from the Round Table. They have gone to grace a larger and brighter circle, gathered around the Great White Throne. As we sit at our desk we hastily recall those who have been co-workers with us in this field only a short time ago and whose names were synonyms for Masonic lore in their respective Grand Jurisdictions and throughout the world.

We recall the names of Brothers Drummond, of Maine, Cunningham, of Ohio, Robbins, of Illinois, Speed, of Mississippi, Vincil, of Missouri, Parvin, of Iowa, Matthews, of Texas, Hedges, of Montana, Diehl, of Utah, and many others whose writings have served to keep the Masonic Institution from drifting from its ancient traditional moorings. It is a great privilege to be allowed to sit at the feet of such Masons and drink in the words of wisdom that fell from their ready pens. As we look around the circle, gathered about the Round Table, we miss them from their accustomed places, and a feeling of sadness comes over us. We do not frequently indulge in poetical quotations, but nothing seems to express our thoughts and emotions at the present time so well as the lines written by Brother Albert Pike, as follows:

“To the past go more dead faces,
Every year;
As the loved leave vacant places,
Every year;
Everywhere the sad eyes meet us,
In the evening’s dusk they greet us,
And to come to them entreat us,
Every year;

But the truer life draws nigher,
Every year;
And its Morning Star climbs higher,
Every year;
Earth’s hold on us grows slighter,
And the heavy burden lighter
And the Dawn Immortal brighter,
Every year;
