




- **Dr. James Axtell,** Kenan Professor of Humanities, College of William and Mary; noted scholar and author on the subject of American Indians.
- John Brooke-Little, Norroy and Ulster King of Arms at the College of Arms in London; Research Consultant for the recent Elizabethan Research Program; scholarly article on the successful armorial identification of Roanoke's Governor John White is in progress.
- Dr. E. Gus Cothran, Director, Equine Blood Typing Research Laboratory, Department of Veterinary Science, University of Kentucky; principal investigator on several U.S. Department of Interior projects involving study and management of feral horse populations; author of numerous papers on mammalian genetics and evolution.
- Carl Curnutte, Costume Director for *The Lost Colony*, former interpreter at Elizabeth II State Historic Site.
- **Dr. Thomas Davidson**, Curator and Research Director of the Jamestown Settlement Museum; director of the recent research program centered on the identification of the Jamestown colonists and their systems of supply.
- **Dr. Louis De Vorsey**, Professor Emeritus of Geography at the University of Georgia; co-editor of a work in progress centered on a study of maps of the American Southeast during the pre-colonial and colonial periods.
- Dr. Fred Fausz, Dean of Pierre Laclede Honors College and Associate Professor of History, University of Missouri-St. Louis; THE much-published authority on the subject of the Powhatan Empire; assistant editor of *The Complete Works of Captain John Smith*.

- John Gillikin, National Park Service ranger, student and *aficionado* of Thomas Harriot.
- Gary Grassl, author; former staff member of the Wall Street Journal, the U.S. Department of the Interior, Bureau of Mines, and later a staff member at the U.S. Office of Education; the only modern scholar to have conducted and published research data relative to 1585–1586 colonist and metallurgist Joachim Gans.
- Charles Hassell, Ph.D. candidate and classroom history teacher in Tidewater Virginia.
- Barbara Hird, Queen Elizabeth in *The Lost Colony* for seven seasons; veteran of many productions on stage, screen, and television.
- Dr. Paul Hoffman, Professor of History at Louisiana State University; author of the most recent scholarly articles on Spain and the Roanoke voyages based on new research.
- Lebame Houston, Director of the Elizabethan Research Program for the Eastern National Park and Monument Association and the College of Arms; scholarly articles on the successful identification of the 1589 relief investors of the Roanoke colony, and on the career and cousinage of Roanoke's Governor John White are in progress.
- Olivia Isil, Research Associate of the Elizabethan Research Program for the Eastern National Park and Monument Association and the College of Arms; former lead interpreter at Elizabeth II State Historic Site; Ranger at Fort Raleigh National Historic Site

- **Francis Jennings**, Director Emeritus, Newberry Library Center for the History of the American Indian; author of *The Invasion of America*, *The Founders of America*, and numerous papers on American, especially American Indian, history and culture.
- Dr. H.G. Jones, Curator of the North Carolina Collection and Adjunct Professor of History at the University of North Carolina; author of *North Carolina Illustrated*, 1524–1984 and numerous other publications dealing with North Carolina history; recipient of the Award of Distinction of the American Association for State and Local History; current research is focused on the Arctic voyages of Gilbert and Frobisher.
- Dr. Karen Kupperman, Professor of History at the University of Connecticut at Storrs; Chair of the Board of Editors for both the William and Mary Quarterly and the Virginia Magazine of History and Biography; one of the leading authorities on the culture conflicts of the pre-colonial period, and an eminent historian of the Roanoke and Jamestown settlements.
- William Ivey Long, III, Professor of Design, New York University; winner of Tony, Drama Desk, OUter Critics' Circle, and Maharam awards for costume design; associated with *The Lost Colony* in one capacity or another for twenty-three seasons.

- Ivor Noël-Hume, Project Director, Fort Raleigh NHS Archaeological Project, Virginia Company Foundation; author of *Martin's Hundred* and numerous other archaeological works; consulting archaeologist for the Martin's Hundred museum; former archaeologist for the Corporation of London; former senior archaeologist for the Colonial Williamsburg Foundation.
- David Phelps, Professor of Anthropology, East Carolina University; director of the Institute for Historical and Cultural Research; archaeologist; leading author and authority on the archaeology of eastern North Carolina.
- William Powell, Professor Emeritus of History, University of North Carolina; former curator of the North Carolina Collection at the University of North Carolina; author of North Carolina through 400 Years and numerous other works on North Carolina history; editor of the North Carolina Gazetteer and the Dictionary of North Carolina Biography.
