The purpose of the Junior League is to foster interest among its members in the social, economic, educational, cultural and civic conditions of the community, and to make efficient their volunteer service.

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HISTORY OF THE ASSOCIATION OF JUNIOR LEAGUES OF AMERICA

The Junior League represents a serious endeavor on the part of young women to become active and constructive factors in the communities in which they live, to be intelligent citizens, and to assist in promoting human welfare. In addition to providing the member with channels of work and training for volunteer service, the Junior League helps her to realize two vital concepts: (1) that she is not an onlooker, but is herself a part of the community; (2) that the community, in turn, is not an isolated unit but part of the nation and of the world.

It was in 1901, at the beginning of a new era for American women, that the first Junior League was organized in New York. At that time Mary Harriman (Mrs. Charles Carey Rumsey) and Nathalie Henderson (Mrs. Joseph Swan) realized what might be achieved if a group of young women were encouraged to take a more active part in some form of active service to their own neighborhoods through the settlement houses and other organizations in existence at the time.

Soon similar organizations to that in New York were formed in various other of the large cities—Boston; Brooklyn; Portland, Ore.; Baltimore; Philadelphia, and Chicago. In the spring of 1912 six of the seven Leagues then in existence held their first national conference in New York City. In 1921 the Association of the Junior Leagues of America, Inc., was founded by the thirty Leagues then in existence. Mrs. Willard Straight (Mrs. Leonard K. Elmhirst) was elected president and a Board of Directors was appointed and instructed to draw up a constitution.

After 1921 the Association grew rapidly until, in 1923, there were sixty-three Leagues. In order to establish a closer contact between the Leagues and the Association, the country was divided into six territories and in each a League member was appointed regional director to act as liaison officer between the Leagues of the region and the Association and to serve on the latter's Board of Directors. Now there are twelve regions, in each of which the Leagues elect every second year a member to serve as their regional director.

At the time the Association was first formed most League activity was in the realm of social work but the Board of Directors, realizing the opportunities which would eventually offer themselves to Junior Leagues, set down in the constitution the social, economic, educational, cultural and civic fields as those in which Junior Leagues should interest their members.

Gradually the Leagues realized that a benevolent "doing for others" was not enough, that they must form a partnership with professional community workers to effect the improvement of conditions. To do this required knowledge. As evidence of this the first course for provisional members was established in 1921 and such a course, which includes an examination of the various forces at work in the community, has been a prerequisite for active membership since 1927. Originally League projects were

large enterprises—convalescent homes, day nurseries, curative workshops and the like. It was discovered, however, that to support these undertakings a disproportionate amount of time and energy often was going into money-raising to the exclusion of the educational process of volunteer service. Today where Leagues have projects the recommended type is one in which the demonstration element is present, the choice being based on the needs of the individual community in the light of the interest and money-raising capabilities of the League.

The League's realization of the need for expert guidance in their welfare activities soon led to the establishment of a trained social work staff at the Association's offices. Members of this staff were available for visits to Leagues to study the local situation and give advice. Similar service was then made available for Children's Theatre, Arts, Ways and Means, and Publicity. The Association also publishes the *Junior League Magazine*, issued monthly to each Junior League member.

HISTORY OF WINSTON-SALEM JUNIOR LEAGUE

The local League was organized in 1923 and was the 46th League to be admitted to the Association and was the first in North Carolina.

During the first five years the League was active in many projects such as opening a gift shop, sponsoring a pre-natal clinic, opening a Hospital for Incurables, operating a Beauty Parlor and forming a Children's Play Committee.

The next ten years shows that the League was continually expanding into new fields. The Newssheet was begun and a placement system was put into effect. The League also continued operation of the Hospital for Incurables, opened a Rag Market (later the Thrift Shop) and helped organize the Civic Music Association. After the Hospital for Incurables was closed on June 1, 1957, the League assisted in the organization of the Mental Hygiene Society of Winston-Salem. The League also financed a Child Guidance Clinic which opened on November 1, 1937.

The next several years the League continued to sponsor and finance the Child Guidance Clinic. New projects included the Hall of History, presentation by the Junior Programs, Inc., and the bringing to town of four New York Dramas of the Contemporary Theatre Series. The League also joined with other interested community groups in forming the Children's Theatre Board.

In 1941 the League's program of planned expenditure of surplus was begun with \$3,000 donated to the Red Cross War Fund, \$1,000 given to the Library Fund of the Winston-Salem Teachers College, \$5,000 given to the Family Service Agency for the establishment of a Child Placing Agency and \$4,500 to the Community Council for the development of the Radio Plan.

In 1942 the Child Guidance Clinic was closed and in 1943 the gift shop was sold.

During the war years the League members devoted the major part of their volunteer service to war-related activities. Support of the Radio Council continued as well as a donation of \$1,000 to the Wachovia Historical Society. A survey by Miss Virginia Lee Comer, AJLA Arts Consultant, showed a need for development and expression of the creative arts in our community. In 1945 the beauty parlor was sold. In 1945 the major portion of the League's surplus was donated to the community. The 400 shares of Reynolds B stock was divided as follows: 50 shares to the City-County Hospital, 50 shares to the War Memorial Building Fund, 120 shares to the Mental Hygiene Society and 180 shares to the City Library. The Junior League Hospital Building was deeded to the Winston-Salem Foundation.

The League entered the Cultural field during these years by opening an Arts and Crafts workshop with Mrs. Chester Marsh as director. The League continued its financial support of the Radio Council and put aside \$7,200 for the employment of a Community Arts Coordinator when the Arts Council proved its readiness to handle the money. The League also contributed \$500 to the Piedmont Festival and sponsored a concert of the newly formed Winston-Salem Civic Orchestra.

In 1947 the city withdrew their support of the Arts and Crafts program and the League assumed the responsibility for the administration, financing and promotion of the workshop.

Support continued to the Symphony and the Piedmont Festival and in 1950 the League released the gift of \$7,000 which it had held in trust for the Arts Council. In March of 1952, \$3,000 was granted to the workshop and in 1951, the Arts Council established an Arts center and moved in a building owned by the Winston-Salem Foundation. In March the League's financial contribution to the Arts Center was completed through coordination of fund raising for the Arts groups under the Arts Council.

In 1952 the League had as its project the Children's Activities Program at the new City-County Library. The League voted the Library \$1,500 for the first year and limited the League's sponsorship to three years. The League also continued support of the Arts Council with a donation of \$5,000.

Two art exhibits were sponsored by the League in 1953 and recreational therapy was done in the Children's Wing of the Baptist Hospital. The next year showed the closing of the Thrift Shop and the beginning of our annual Rummage Sale.

In 1955 our three-year activity program for children was completed at the Public Library. The Recreational Therapy program at the Baptist Hospital was enlarged and the League continued to bring outstanding art exhibits to the Library. A new project was begun—providing the salary for a primary education teacher for the handicapped at the Children's Center.

During the next year the League strengthened existing projects and added to those services. A program for handicapped adults was begun and the therapy program at the Hospital enlarged.

The Handicapped Adult Program grew rapidly and the Hospital Therapy program was continued. The Cultural Arts Committee arranged a bus trip to Raleigh to tour the State Art Museum and \$150 was offered as a purchase prize to the Gallery of Fine Arts in the name of the Junior League. A successful Rummage Sale was held as well as 5 marvelous productions of the play *Sleeping Beauty*.

In 1957 the League again contributed \$5,000 to the Children's Center providing the school with a Kindergarten teacher. An art exhibit drew 3,700 people and the Rummage Sale was a great success. Night meetings were begun for professional members and those unable to attend the morning meeting. Two brochures were printed—one dealing with Admissions policies and the other describing the community activities of the Winston-Salem Junior League.

The League continued to strengthen existing projects in 1958 by donating \$2,000 a year for the next two years to provide an aide at the Children's Center, by buying a metal awning for the Pediatric Ward at the Baptist Hospital and by giving \$1,155 to the Arts Council.

In 1959-60 the League accepted a new project by voting to pledge \$26,000 over a three-year period for the restoration of the Timothy Vogler Home in Old Salem. A vote to establish head-

quarters in the restored house and a vote for a substantial dues and initiation fee raise were important outgrowths of the visit of Mrs. Robert Dingman, Financial Consultant of A.J.L.A. The League participated in the celebration of Winston-Salem, the All America City, by sponsoring an essay contest in the city schools.

In 1960-1961 Regional Meeting was held in Winston-Salem for the first time. Delegates and observers from the twelve Leagues in Region XIII attended. The restoration of the Timothy Vogler House was completed, and \$15,000 was paid on the \$26,000 pledge to Old Salem. A new Admissions system was put into effect through extensive By-Laws changes.

ANNUAL REPORTS OF BOARD, 1960 - 1961

WINSTON-SALEM JUNIOR LEAGUE

The realization that this is the 38th anniversary of the Winston-Salem Junior League must fill some of you tonight with nostalgia, many of you with satisfaction, and still others, with anticipation; but I know that all of you share, with me, a tremendous feeling of pride in this organization.

During these thirty-eight years the League has contributed so very much to the life of this community. Tonight we are going to talk about what YOU — Board and membership — have accomplished during "That Wonderful Year — 1960."

This was the year of short skirts, "Jackie" hair-dos, and Regional Meeting. Although this was the first time a meeting of Region XIII had ever been held here, it proved to be the best held anywhere. Bob Ed Hanes and her committee got rave notices; and, in turn, praised the wonderful co-operation of our membership.

This was the year of pointed-toe shoes, astronauts, and "Timothy." The restoration of the Timothy Vogler House was not only begun, it was completed — thanks to Bunjy Valk and her committee. The aims of our project have been fulfilled in the addition to the outside restoration of Old Salem, the endowment of this house through rent, and a much needed, unique, and attractive headquarters.

The unprecedented success of the Rummage Sale has made it possible for us to pay \$15,000 toward the \$26,000 pledge to Old Salem. We have two more years in which to pay the remaining \$11,000. Every member who worked with Betsy Sawyer and her committee should feel very proud.

This was the year of the "New Frontier" and our new Provisionals and new Actives. An exceptionally capable and conscientious Admissions Committee, with DeWitt Cordell as chairman, has given us an excellent list of thirteen prospective candidates. Emmy Lou Parrish and her committee revamped the Provisional Course and have successfully trained and graduated sixteen new actives.

A completely new Admissions system was put into effect, after a thorough study by Aurelia Eller and the By-Laws Committee. They also made possible four other much needed changes.

The new officers and the delegates to both conferences came to us through the courtesy of Lucy Wilson and the Nominating Committee. They, of course, deserve a huge bouquet for the excellent choices they made.

This was the year of polka dot bikinis, Caroline, and other children. We produced many of our own and gave much pleasure to those of others. The Children's Theatre's beautiful production of "Pinocchio" played to 2,460 children. Sarah Ann Sugg, as chairman, had the help of 100 active members.

The Hospital Therapy program was revitalized through the efforts of an inspired Carrie Davis and her committee. Twenty-four trained volunteers gave many happy hours to the hospitalized children.

This was the year of Harvard, eggheads, and culture. "We have culture, too," quotes Nancy Elberson. Through her Cultural Arts Committee, we had an exhibit of antique African sculpture, gave \$150 as a purchase prize to the Winston-Salem Gallery of Fine Arts, and will have a trip this month to the State Art Museum in Raleigh.

We got culture, education, and entertainment through the excellent programs at our nine membership meetings. The high attendance at these meetings is proof of the grand job done by E. Sue Shore and the Education Committee.

This was the year of metrecal, Pierre Salinger, and Eleanor Vance. Our newspaper, television, and radio coverage was exceptional, thanks to Eleanor and the Public Relations Committee. They were also responsible for the delightful luncheon given as a "thank-you" to those in the community who had helped us during the year. We had a full page article, pictures, and Tidings in the Magazine, thanks to Betsy Miller and her committee.

We were not only publicized, but we published. The News-sheet, with editor Jane Waugh in charge, proved outstanding in our Region. The excellent lay-outs, large number of pictures, and new features made the nine issues wonderful reading.

Our publishing didn't stop here. Ruth Pepper's Adult Handicapped Committee designed an attractive and much needed brochure entitled "Open Doors To Fun." They also planned a unique program every month for the Poke Easy Club.

This was the year of dogs in space, Dag Hammarsjold, and our own watchdogs — Greta Gray and Pat Vaughn. Greta and her Hospitality Committee "watched over" our social life and entertained us royally at two luncheons and a dinner dance. They also looked after our transfers during the year.

Pat and her Placement interviewers "watched over" our volunteer life. The importance of this committee can be realized in the thought that the true success of a League can be measured by the growth of the individual member in her volunteer work. And work you did! Placement has recorded 1031 volunteer jobs held by our members in 1960-61.

This was the year for Hollywood celebrities in Washington and AJLA celebrities in Winston-Salem. Mrs. C. Dickinson Barton, Association Secretary, paid us a director's visit in December. This was one of the most important events of the year, because, with her invaluable help, we were able to evaluate our League and its program. After her inspection visit Mrs. Barton said, "I was tremendously impressed with the scope of your activities, the many contributions you are making to your community and particularly with the excellent way you are training your members to know how to assume the responsibilities of citizenship and why it is important that they do this. I have visited few Leagues who have as well balanced a program or as excellent a grasp of Junior League philosophy."

An extra-added attraction was the appearance of Mrs. H.

Edmund Lunken, Association President, who was our special guest at Regional Meeting. Of course our "star" was Mrs. Agnew Bahnson, Jr., Director of Region XIII. Our delegates "caught her act" at annual conference at Lake Placid and here in Winston-Salem. She was superb!

We had other hometown celebrities — the Executive Committee. Dot Morehead has been invaluable as Vice President. She has conducted eight night meetings for the Professionals — and has stood by my shaky elbow. Marty Hancock has taken minutes at all membership, board, and executive committee meetings and is now compiling the handbook with the help of Pauline Robinson, who has handled all membership changes as Corresponding Secretary. Our Treasurer, Vaughn Owen, has paid our bills and guarded our finances. Joy Bennett, as Assistant Treasurer and Ways and Means chairman, has investigated and presented and investigated again to see us to a happy conclusion.

One of the biggest boosts to the entire year has been the great amount of interest shown by the Sustaining members. Without their help, neither Regional Meeting, nor the Rummage Sale, nor Mrs. Barton's visit, nor the Timothy Vogler Restoration could have been so successful. Our special thanks to Virginia Pleasants, sustaining representative to the Board.

I cannot conclude this report without expressing my deepest appreciation to all of you who have made this year so enjoyable for me. Your understanding, conviction, determination, and sense of responsibility were not surprising to find, but oh so inspiring. It has been an honor to serve as president of this League — in which I so deeply believe.

Now — as That Wonderful Year—1960 comes to an end — it is my privilege to turn this gavel over to your new president, E. Sue Shore.

BY-LAWS COMMITTEE

The Committee worked closely with the chairman of the Nominating Committee, the chairman of the Provisional Committee, the Corresponding Secretary, the Recording Secretary, the Chairman and members of the Admissions Committee, and the Regional Director.

Suggestions for changing the By-Laws came from the above-mentioned group, and the committee recommended such changes as they deemed advisable.

The proposed By-Law changes were presented to the Board on January 31, and were approved. They were then presented to the membership at the February 7 meeting and, after discussion, were tabled for a month. Two weeks prior to the March 7 meeting, the proposed changes were mailed to the membership (voting). The Admissions Committee wrote a letter of explanation concerning the proposed By-Law changes regarding admissions, and this letter was included in our mailing.

At the March 7 meeting, the proposed By-Law changes were accepted unanimously.

The changes are as follows:

Article VI — Committees

D. Nominating Committee

which read:

... The Nominating Committee shall be composed of five members; one, the chairman, to be appointed by the Executive Committee; one elected by the Board; and three elected by the League, one who has been active from one to four years inclusive, one active from five to nine years inclusive, and one who has been active over nine years.

now reads:

... and three elected by the League, one who has been active from one *through four years*, one active from five *through nine years*, and one who has been active over nine years.

which read:

... Two weeks prior to the February meeting a roster of League members eligible to serve on the Nominating Committee shall be mailed by the current Nominating Committee to all active members. At the February meeting each member may nominate from this list one person in each age group. The three candidates receiving the highest number of votes in each age group will appear on the final ballot and will be voted at the March meeting. . . .

now reads:

... At the February meeting each member may nominate from this list one person in *each group*. The three candidates receiving the highest number of votes in *each group* will appear on the final ballot. *One candidate from each group will be elected at the March meeting.* . . .

Article IV — Officers

Section 2. Nomination

which read:

... The Nominating Committee shall present a slate of one candidate for each office to be filled. The slate shall be sent by the Recording Secretary to each voting member of the League at least two weeks before the election meeting.

now reads:

... The slate *shall be sent to* each voting member of the League at least two weeks before the election meeting.

Section 4. Duties

C. Recording Secretary.

which read:

... The Recording Secretary shall keep minutes of the meetings of the League, the Board of Directors, and the Executive Committee. She shall keep a correct, classified list of the names and addresses of all members, and shall maintain a file of essential records which shall be transferred to her successor at the close of her term of office ...

D. Corresponding Secretary.

... The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the general correspondence of the League. She shall assist the Recording Secretary in compiling the annual reports and editing the yearbook. She shall handle all correspondence in regard to changes in membership.

C. Recording Secretary.

... The Recording Secretary shall keep minutes of the meetings of the League, the Board of Directors, and the Executive Committee. She shall maintain a file of essential records which shall be transferred to her successor at the close of her term of office ...

D. Corresponding Secretary.

... The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the general correspondence of the League. She shall assist the Recording Secretary in compiling the annual reports and editing the yearbook. *She shall keep a correct, classified list of the names and addresses of all members* and shall handle all correspondence in regard to changes in membership.

Section 2. Admission to Membership

A. Eligibility.

which read:

. . . A proposed member shall be from 19 through 32 years of age on or before June 1. She shall have completed her schooling and shall have been a resident of Winston-Salem or its vicinity for at least one year at the time of her proposal on June first. If a proposed member moves out of the city before the invitation is issued, she may still be invited.

now reads:

. . . A proposed member shall be from 19 through 32 years of age on or before her proposal on October 1. She shall have completed her schooling or be in her last year of school. She shall have been a resident of Winston-Salem or its vicinity for at least two years immediately prior to the time of her proposal. In the case of a proposed member who has lived in Winston-Salem or its vicinity at least ten years and has returned after residing elsewhere, the two-year residency requirement prior to proposal shall not apply. At the time of invitation in April, a proposed member must be residing in Winston-Salem or its vicinity, except in the case of a proposed member whose home is in Winston-Salem or its vicinity but who is away completing her last year of school.

B. Proposal of Members.

. . . The deadline for applications for those members to be taken in the following April shall be June 1 . . .

now reads:

. . . The deadline for applications for those members to be taken in the following April shall be *October 1* . . .

which read:

. . . No member of the League shall contact any member of the Admissions Committee in behalf of a candidate except at the open meetings held for this purpose.

. . . No member of the League shall contact any member of the Admissions Committee in behalf of a candidate.

CHILDREN'S THEATRE

The Children's Theatre Committee began preparation in June, when we had our first meeting. Procedure Manuals were distributed to sub-committee chairmen and the budget was discussed.

The play "Pinocchio" was chosen and mimeographed during the summer. Also, scenery sets and costume designs were planned in detail and made available for the Director's approval.

Fall brought on more activity as the Committee met to discuss plans for our provisional workshop which was held September 20th. All committee members participated in this venture. Try-outs were held for League members September 13th. It was decided children were needed also and try-outs were held on September 22nd and 23rd. Thirty-four children offered their talents, and unfortunately only six could be chosen for leading roles. However, thirteen children participated in each performance. Rehearsals began in late September. After many weeks of practice, technical rehearsal was held November 12th. Two dress rehearsals, November 13th and 14th, were held in order that both

casts of children would have an opportunity to perform. Performances were held November 15th through 18th — one performance each of the first two days and two performances each of the last two days — totaling six performances. Two-thousand four-hundred and sixty children attended our performances and a hundred active members participated in preparing production.

Representing the Junior League on the Children's Theatre Board were: Mrs. Edgar Roberts, Mrs. William McCall, and the Chairman.

The sub-committee chairmen were enthusiastic and capable, as was my associate chairman, Della Roberts. It was a privilege to work with this group.

CULTURAL ARTS

In September the League sponsored an exhibition of antique African sculptures from The Segy Gallery of New York. These sculptures were shown at The Gallery of the City-County Library September 18 through October 8. Through the courtesy of Mr. Gordon Hanes, Mr. Ladislas Segy came to Winston-Salem and lectured on "African Sculpture and Modern Art." Mr. Segy is the owner of The Segy Gallery and the foremost authority in America on African sculpture. This lecture was presented at the Community Center Theatre of the Arts Center on September 23 at 8:15 p.m.

There were no paid attendants during this show but it was staffed by 53 League volunteers plus additional volunteers available for school tours. Approximately 1,150 attended and this included at least 12 school groups. Although financed entirely by League funds the Winston-Salem Gallery of Fine Arts, Associated Artists and Arts Council all cooperated to make this exhibit a success. The Arts Council printed a special folder announcing both the show and lecture and this was mailed to their 1200 mailing list. Mr. Robert Hanes, Director of Secondary Education for the City Schools, sent detailed information to all principals, art teachers and Jr. High Common Learnings Teachers telling of this exhibit and the Library's schedule for the remainder of the year.

We feel this show was not only unique in subject but certainly timely as proved by the great interest from the schools.

For the third year the League gave \$150 to the Winston-Salem Gallery of Fine Arts to be used as a purchase prize for presentation to a local school. Claude Howell was the recipient for his oil, "Net Menders." This painting was presented to Paisley Jr. High. It is hoped that these paintings will eventually be used as a traveling exhibit in the city schools.

Included in correspondence for this committee have been four requests for information on the organization of the Winston-Salem Arts Council. These requests were received from the Junior Leagues of Augusta, Ga., Wilmington, N. C., Fort Worth, Texas and Charleston, S. C.

The chairman has represented the League at the monthly Board meetings of the Arts Council.

Future plans include a bus trip to the State Art Museum in Raleigh to view the new Kress Collection. The date for the trip is tentatively April 18.

Serving as Cultural Arts Chairman has been a real privilege and education for me. I wish to thank the committee members and volunteers who served this committee during the year.

PLACEMENT

Immediately following its formation in the spring the Placement Committee consisting of a chairman and seven interviewers began working on plans for the May interviews. The Committee accompanied by new actives, recent transfers, and a few members of other local women's clubs conducted a concentrated two-day agency tour at which time twenty agencies in the community were visited and their volunteer needs explored. Charts explain-

ing placement opportunities were then compiled and mailed to all active members two weeks prior to the interviews.

Placement interviews were conducted over a two-day period in the home of a League member in May. In October, again in January, and finally in March telephone calls were made to each member to determine how the League's obligations to the community were being carried out. Follow-up calls to most of the agencies further clarified the Placement situations.

The Junior League volunteer program presents a well-balanced picture with volunteer activities in the health, welfare, and cultural fields. Following is a summary of the volunteer services given by League members during the year:

Eighty-eight members assisted in the production of the Children's theatre play in some capacity. The Rummage Sale utilized the services of seventy League girls in addition to almost full participation of the membership during the sale. Forty-six girls were hostesses at the League Art Exhibit and four at the Gallery of Fine Arts. Fourteen members worked at the Arts Council, fifteen at the Craft House and fifteen at Old Salem.

The Associated Family and Child Service Agency used five League volunteers, the Children's Center five, the Child Guidance Clinic three, the Red Shield Girls' Club three and the Graylyn School for Exceptional Children three. Working regularly with the convalescing children at the Baptist Hospital were twenty-seven girls and with the Handicapped Adult group ten.

Thirty-three girls repaired toys at the Toy Shop and seven drove for the Golden Age Club. The Radio-TV Council used seventeen League volunteers in their program and the City-County Library used four League storytellers. Thirty-one girls worked with either Girl or Boy Scouts, thirteen in various capacities at the Red Cross, and eight at the YWCA.

Twenty-three members assisted with the Cancer, TB, and Heart programs and twelve with the Special Gifts Division of the United Fund Campaign. Forty-nine members participated fifty-eight times in various other community fund drives.

Forty-two League members insured the success of our first locally held Regional Conference and eight members staffed our newly opened League headquarters in March.

Fifty-three League members held eighty community board memberships. In addition to these specific volunteer jobs the membership continues to meet many other community needs through PTA work, church work, medical auxiliary jobs, and alumnae groups.

My expression of appreciation goes not only to the members of the Placement Committee but also to the entire Junior League membership for a successful and satisfying Placement year.

By-Laws of the Junior League of Winston-Salem

ARTICLE I—NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Junior League of Winston-Salem, Incorporated.

ARTICLE II—OBJECT AND POLICIES

Object: The object of this League shall be to foster interest among its members in the social, economic, educational, cultural and civic conditions of the community, and to make efficient their volunteer service.

Policies: The policies of the League shall be in harmony with the policies of the Association of Junior Leagues of America, Incorporated.

ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Classes of Membership

Only women under forty years of age who shall comply with the requirements of the Association shall be admitted to membership by the League. No member shall at any time be a member of more than one League. The classes of membership shall be as follows:

A. Provisional Membership

Provisional members are those who are engaged in complying with the requirements for admission to Active Membership and are not eligible to vote or hold office. Provisional members shall be required to complete a provisional member's course, which shall meet the standards set by the Association and a period of volunteer service satisfactory to the Placement Committee within twelve months after their election to provisional membership. An extension of time may be granted by the Board of Directors in the case of provisionals who for unavoidable reasons are unable to complete the course. Provisionals who have completed these requirements are admitted to active membership by a three-fourths vote of the Board of Directors. Those members failing to meet the provisional requirements shall be dropped from membership by a three-fourths vote of the Board of Directors and may not come up again for membership within two years.

B. Active Membership

Active members are those who have completed the requirements for provisional members and who, having been admitted to active membership, justify such membership through service to their communities. An active member shall enjoy all rights, privileges and obligations of membership until the end of the League Year (which need not be the League's fiscal year) in which she reaches her 40th birthday, provided, however, that any active member who holds a position as an officer or director of a League immediately prior to her 40th birthday, shall be considered an active member for all purposes until the completion of such term as officer or director. They shall perform voluntary service for a period and in a manner satisfactory to the Placement Committee.

C. Sustaining Membership

Sustaining members are those who have reached the age limit for active membership. They shall have all privileges of membership except that they may not hold office or vote.

D. Non-Resident Membership

Non-resident membership shall be open to active or sustaining members in good standing, living outside the County of Forsyth, North Carolina, nine months a year. They may not vote or hold office. Active members who become non-resident in a League town, may retain it for two years only, unless home League grants an extension.

Section 2. Admission to Membership

A. Eligibility

A proposed member shall be from 19 through 32 years of age on or before her proposal on October 1. She shall have completed her schooling or be in her last year of school. She shall have been a resident of Winston-Salem or its vicinity for at least two years immediately prior to the time of her proposal. In the case of a proposed member who has lived in Winston-Salem or its vicinity at least ten years and has returned after residing elsewhere, the two-year residency requirement prior to proposal shall not apply. At the time of invitation in April, a proposed member must be residing in Winston-Salem or its vicinity, except in the case of a proposed member whose home is in Winston-Salem or its vicinity but who is away completing her last year of school.

B. Proposal of Members

Each candidate shall be proposed by one member and seconded by two members on an application blank provided for the purpose. No candidate shall be proposed or seconded by a member of the Admissions Committee nor of the Executive Committee, nor by her relative (mother, mother-in-law, sister, sister-in-law, aunt, niece, or first cousin). No candidate shall be considered whose name has been proposed and voted on four times.

Application for membership shall be received by the Chairman of the Admissions Committee at any time during the year. The deadline for applications for those members to be taken in the following April shall be October 1. Only one blank for each candidate shall be accepted by the Admissions Committee.

Any eligible Active or Sustaining member may propose one candidate and second one candidate during a given year, but no member shall write to the committee in behalf of a candidate. No member of the League shall contact any member of the Admissions Committee in behalf of a candidate.

C. Election to Membership

The Chairman shall present the names of proposed candidates to the voting members of the Admissions Committee, and each shall vote by secret ballot. Eight affirmative votes of the Admissions Committee shall qualify a proposed candidate for membership. Invitations shall be mailed immediately to those elected. Before the candidate accepts the invitation, she shall agree to fulfill the duties and obligations of membership. The names of those who accept shall be announced at the April meeting.

If a candidate is unable to take the Basic Provisional Course or to transfer to another League, she must decline the invitation to membership. In this event, the invitation shall be re-issued a second time only upon the request of the candidate's sponsors to the Board of Directors. In the event that a candidate wishes to transfer to another League as a Provisional, she must have completed her basic indoctrination course.

Section 3. Changes in Membership

Applications for change to another class of membership shall be made in writing to the Corresponding Secretary and will be acted upon by the Board of Directors at any time during the year.

Inter-League Membership

A member of any League who is subject to frequent change in residence may have an Inter-League card issued to the Secretary of the League in which she will be temporarily residing by the League of which she is a member (hereinafter called the home League). Such card shall accredit her temporarily to the League in city where she is then residing (hereinafter called the temporary League). She shall have all privileges of membership in the temporary League except the right to vote or to hold office; or to propose or second candidates for membership in the temporary League;

she shall comply with the requirements of and be subject to the rules of the temporary League. An Inter-League member shall continue to be listed as a member of, and shall pay her regular dues to the home League, and the home League shall have final responsibility for her in all matters. An Inter-League card is issued for one year unless extended by the League to which the card is issued. Any extension shall be limited to an additional year. A League to which a member is temporarily accredited may charge such member for special club privileges or for the actual cost of her membership.

Transfer of Members

Provisional, Active, Sustaining and Non-resident members in good standing shall have the right of transferring membership from one League to another except for the period subsequent to March 1 and prior to April 15, when there shall be a transfer moratorium. Members who are in a League special classification may not transfer in such special classification but may transfer only when in a classification recognized by the Association. The right of transfer granted in this section need not extend to a person who has been dropped or expelled from membership by the League to which transfer is desired. Provisional members shall take any additional training required by Leagues to which they transfer. A League may require all active members who are applying for transfer to take an orientation course before their transfers are accepted. A League shall not be required to accept Transfers which exceed twenty-five per cent of all admissions to membership in any one year. If it is necessary for transfers to be put on a waiting list, they shall be accepted in the order in which they apply.

Section 4. Resignations, Dropped Members, Re-instatements

A. Resignations

Any member of the League who is not in arrears in dues or in the performance of League duties may resign. Resignations shall be made in writing to the Corresponding Secretary of the League at least two weeks before dues become payable; otherwise, members shall be liable for dues for the coming year.

B. Dropped Members

Members may be dropped from the League for cause by a three-fourths vote of the Board of Directors.

C. Re-instatements

Members who have resigned while in good standing may be re-instated by a three-fourths vote of the Board of Directors, upon paying a sum determined by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS

Section 1. Personnel

The officers of this League shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, and Assistant Treasurer.

Section 2. Nomination

The Nominating Committee shall present a slate of one candidate for each office to be filled. The slate shall be sent to each voting member of the League at least two weeks before the election meeting.

Independent nominations may be made in writing by five active members of the League, provided the nominee has given her consent.

It shall be the duty of the Nominating Committee to insure continuity of administration by retaining one or more members of the Executive Committee for two terms.

Section 3. Elections

Officers shall be elected at the February meeting of the League for a term of one year with the exception of the Treasurer, who shall be elected for a term of two years. They shall assume their duties immediately after the April meeting.

Section 4. Duties

The powers and duties of the officers shall be as follows:

A. President

The President shall preside at meetings of the League, Board of Directors and Executive Committee; shall appoint the Admissions Chairman and personnel of Committees not otherwise provided for with the approval of the Executive Committee, and shall be a member ex-officio of all committees except the Nominating Committee and Admissions Committee. She shall, with the Treasurer, sign all contracts, and obligations authorized by the Board of Directors, and shall perform the duties pertaining to the office.

B. Vice-President

The Vice-President shall assist the President and perform the duties of the President in her absence.

C. Recording Secretary

The Recording Secretary shall keep minutes of the meetings of the League, the Board of Directors, and the Executive Committee. She shall maintain a file of essential records which shall be transferred to her successor at the close of her term of office. She shall, with the Corresponding Secretary, compile the annual reports and edit the year book, and she shall inform all independent nominees of their nominations.

D. Corresponding Secretary

The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the general correspondence of the League. She shall assist the Recording Secretary in compiling the annual reports and editing the year book. She shall keep a correct, classified list of the names and addresses of all members and shall handle all correspondence in regard to changes in membership.

E. Treasurer

The Treasurer shall be custodian of the funds of the League and shall receive all monies except for those activities which have their own treasurer or other person specifically appointed to handle finances. Such persons shall be under supervision of the Treasurer. She shall serve as Chairman of the Finance Committee. She shall make payments in accordance with the budget: expenses not provided for in the budget shall be incurred and paid only upon order of the Board of Directors. She shall keep full and accurate accounts and shall present financial statements at regular meetings of the League and Board; she shall turn over to her successor all books and financial records and shall take a listed receipt therefor.

F. Assistant Treasurer

The Assistant Treasurer shall collect all dues and assessments, check attendance records, and assist the Treasurer when necessary.

Section 5. Executive Committee

There shall be an Executive Committee, composed of the officers, which shall assist the President in making appointments. It shall have all the powers of the Board of Directors during the months in which there are no regularly scheduled Board meetings. The minutes of the meetings of the Executive Committee shall be submitted to the Board for ratification at its next meeting.

ARTICLE V—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. Personnel

The Board of Directors shall consist of the officers and the chairmen designated by the Executive Committee each year. Chairmen are appointed by the President with the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Term of Office

Officers are elected for a term of one year; chairmen appointed for a term of one year. No officer or chairman shall hold the same office for more than two terms in succession.

Section 3. Duties and Powers

The Board of Directors shall have general charge and control of the affairs, funds and property of the League. It shall be the final arbiter in matters of interpretation of these By-Laws. It shall present to the membership all proposed major program activities for ratification.

Section 4. Vacancies

Vacancies among the offices shall be filled by election by the Board of Directors. Vacancies among the chairmen shall be filled by the President with the approval of the Executive Committee until the expiration of the term of office.

Section 5. Meetings

The Board of Directors shall hold regular monthly meetings from September through June. Special meetings may be called by the President and must be called upon the written request of three members of the Board.

Section 6. Quorums

Eight members of the Board of Directors and three members of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum respectively.

ARTICLE VI—COMMITTEES

There shall be the following Committees who shall present plans for work to the Board of Directors. No work shall be undertaken without the Board's approval.

A. Admissions Committee

There shall be an Admissions Committee whose function shall be to pass upon all applications for membership to the League (or) to make recommendations to the Board with respect to applications for membership. The committee shall be elected at the time and in the manner herein provided, and shall serve for one year.

(a) Personnel of Committee

The committee shall be composed of eleven members: A Chairman, who shall be appointed by the Executive Committee, and shall not be entitled to vote; a Sustaining member who shall be elected by the League, and shall NOT be entitled to vote; and nine voting members, who shall be elected by the League as provided in this Article.

(b) Eligibility to Serve on Committee

To be eligible for election to the Admissions Committee, a member must have been active for at least one year, and a resident of Winston-Salem or its vicinity for at least five years. A voting member shall be eligible to serve for two consecutive years, and shall be ineligible to serve for the following year, except as chairman. The chairman may have been a voting member of the Admissions Committee for two consecutive years prior to her chairmanship but after her term as chairman shall be ineligible to serve for the following year. The Sustaining member shall have been sustaining no longer than ten years and shall have served on the Admissions Committee during her active membership. No one who has a sister, sister-in-law, daughter, daughter-in-law, niece, proposed for membership shall serve on this committee.

No mother and daughter nor two or more sisters shall serve on the same Admissions Committee. Neither the President nor the Vice-President shall be eligible to serve on this Committee.

(c) Election of Committee

Election of this committee shall be held at the March meeting.

Two weeks prior to the February meeting the Nominating Committee shall mail to all active members a list divided into three age groups of all active members

eligible for election and the names of those present members of the Admissions Committee who are eligible for re-election. These age groups shall be as follows: 21 to 29, 29 to 35, and 35 through 39. At the February meeting each active member present may nominate, by secret ballot, 4 members from her own age group, and 5 members from the present Admissions Committee.

Consent of a nominee shall be obtained by the Nominating Committee before her name is placed on the ballot. At the March meeting, the Nominating Committee shall present a list of the 4 nominees receiving the highest number of votes from each age group, the 5 nominees receiving the highest number of votes from the present Admissions Committee, and 3 nominees from the Sustaining members.

Each active member present shall vote for 2 nominees from each age group, for 3 nominees from the present Admissions Committee, and for 1 Sustaining member. In the event that close relatives are elected to this committee, it shall be the duty of the Nominating Committee to determine which of them shall serve.

In case of a tie vote, in either nomination or election of this committee, it shall be the duty of the Nominating Committee to determine which members shall serve.

The names of the Admissions Committee members shall be announced by the President.

(d) Vacancies on Committee

Vacancies on the Admissions Committee shall be filled by the Nominating Committee from among the nominees in the categories in which the vacancies occur. No sponsor of a candidate shall be eligible to fill a vacancy on this committee.

(e) Duties of Committee

It shall be the duty of the Admissions Committee to consider all proposed candidates by acquainting themselves concerning each individual's desirability and qualifications for membership in the League.

A secretary shall be elected by the Admissions Committee from among its members. She, with the Chairman, shall be responsible for keeping an accurate record of all names considered by the committee. These records shall be kept in a permanent file which shall be kept confidential and handed from chairman to chairman for reference by the Admissions Committee.

Members of the Admissions Committee shall take an oath of secrecy, as follows: "I swear that, to the best of my ability, nothing which is said in these Admissions Committee meetings shall be divulged by me, either by statement or implication. I swear that to the best of my ability, my vote will be cast considering the best interest of the Junior League, disregarding my personal feelings."

The Admissions Committee shall hold at least eight meetings during the year.

B. Placement Committee

There shall be a placement committee whose function shall be to interview all active members at regular intervals for the purpose of offering them a free choice of available placements in the community service program conducted by the League. The Placement Committee shall keep as nearly as possible uniform records concerning the activities of the members under its supervision. The Placement Committee shall include the Placement Chairman, and a vice-chairman, the Interviewer, and such other members as they shall designate.

C. Education Committee

There shall be an Education Committee whose function shall be the planning and supervision of the total education program of the League. The Education Committee shall include the Chairman and a member of each committee responsible for any part of the Education Program; these committees being designated by the Executive Committee each year.

D. Nominating Committee

There shall be a Nominating Committee whose function shall be to prepare slates of candidates for election to the various elective offices of the League. The Nominating Committee shall be composed of five members; one, the chairman, to be appointed by the Executive Committee; one elected by the Board; and three elected by the League, one who has been active from one through four years, one active from five through nine years, and one who has been active over nine years.

Two weeks prior to the February meeting a roster of League members eligible to serve on the Nominating Committee shall be mailed by the current Nominating Committee to all active members. At the February meeting each member may nominate from this list one person in each group. The three candidates receiving the highest number of votes in each group will appear on the final ballot. One candidate from each group will be elected at the March meeting. The Placement Chairman shall serve ex-officio.

E. Public Relations Committee

There shall be a public relations committee whose function shall be to arrange for all newspaper, radio and television publicity for the League. It shall attempt to build good public relations by interpreting all League activities to the public so that community understanding, interest and support will result. The Public Relations Committee shall include the Public Relations Chairman, and a member of each committee responsible for each phase of the League program. No member of the League shall give out to the press any news item or information concerning the League without the approval of the Public Relations Committee.

F. Newssheet Committee

The Newssheet Committee shall consist of the Newssheet Editor, as Chairman, and such assistants as she may require. The duties of the Newssheet Committee are to edit and publish the Newssheet.

G. Finance Committee

There shall be a Finance Committee which shall function as the financial fact-finding committee to advise the Board on all matters relating to the financing of the League's own administration and that of its community program. Among its duties shall be the preparation of the budget for presentation to the Board each year. The committee shall include the treasurer as chairman, the assistant treasurer, the treasurer of any money-raising activity, either permanent or temporary, and a past League Treasurer.

H. Magazine Committee

There shall be a Magazine Committee or chairman whose function shall be to discover and report all developments in League activities which might be good material for the Junior League Magazine as well as to follow up suggestions and requests from the Junior League Magazine as a program aid in its own League.

I. Provisional Committee

There shall be a Provisional Committee whose function shall be to plan and direct the education and training of

provisional members until such time as they are admitted to active membership.

J. Special Committees

Special Committees shall be appointed by the President with the approval of the Executive Committee which shall designate their powers and the term of the committee's appointment.

ARTICLE VII—MEETINGS OF THE LEAGUE

Section 1—Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the League shall be held in April for the purpose of receiving the annual reports and of installing officers for the ensuing year.

Section 2—Regular and Special Meetings

Regular meetings shall be held from September through June, the February meeting being designated for the election of officers. Other meetings shall be held at the discretion of the Board of Directors or upon written request of ten members of the League.

Section 3. Quorum

A quorum of the League shall consist of one-third of the voting members.

ARTICLE VIII—FINANCIAL ARRANGEMENTS

Section 1. Fiscal Year, Audit and Bonding

The fiscal year shall be from April 1 through March 31.

The books of account of this League shall be audited at least annually by a certified public accountant, and a copy of the complete audit shall be distributed to each member. Books shall be kept in accordance with sound accounting practices. The community funds and administrative funds shall be carried in separate accounts. All money in the community fund shall be distributed solely for the benefit of the community.

The Treasurer shall be bonded in the amount determined by the Board of Directors.

Section 2. Membership Dues and Fines

All classes of membership shall pay annual dues of not more than \$20.00, which shall include the Association dues of \$7.00, part of which covers the subscription to the Junior League Magazine. Provisional members shall pay an initiation fee of \$25.00.

There shall be a fine of one dollar to each active member and provisional member for non-attendance of regular meetings and special meetings, and a fine of two dollars for non-attendance of the Annual meeting. Sickness, absence from the city, or an unusual emergency shall be the only acceptable excuses for an absence. It shall be made in the form of a letter to the Assistant Treasurer, written the week of the meeting. Such fines shall be payable monthly. An additional 25-cent penalty for each month a fine is in arrears shall be added.

Any Junior League member, other than Non-Resident and Sustaining shall be required to pay annually on March 1st, in cash to the Junior League, any amount not otherwise contributed in rummage to complete her Rummage Sale quota.

A. Payment

Dues shall be payable on the first day of the fiscal year. The Assistant Treasurer shall send notices to each member on April 1. Members whose dues and fines are not paid by May 1 will be notified by card by the Assistant Treasurer. Members whose dues and fines are not paid by May 15 will be sent a certified letter. Members whose dues and fines are not paid by June 1 will be dropped by the Board of Directors. The only acceptable excuse for non-payment is financial disability, made in writing each year, and received by the Assistant Treasurer on or before June 1.

B. Refunds

Refunds of dues will not be made to members resigning during the fiscal year.
Refunds will not be made to Provisionals failing to meet the requirements.

C. A. J. L. A. Indebtedness

Members delinquent in paying this indebtedness to the Association shall be considered in arrears in their dues to this League.

Section 3. Association Dues

The Treasurer of the League shall pay yearly per capita dues for all classes of Membership to the Treasurer of the Association.

Section 4. Letters, Agreements and Contracts

Before any letter, agreement, or contract involving the expenditure of Junior League funds shall be signed and delivered, it shall be approved by the Board of Directors. If it involves more than \$500.00, it shall also be approved by the Junior League Attorney.

ARTICLE IX—DELEGATES TO ASSOCIATION CONFERENCES

Delegates to the Annual Meeting of the Association shall be Active members elected by the League.

Delegates to special meetings or conferences shall be Active members appointed by the Board of Directors.

The full expenses of delegates to conferences and the Annual Meeting of the Association shall be paid by the League.

ARTICLE X—AMENDMENTS AND RULES OF ORDER

The By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting at any meeting of the League, provided the proposed amendment has been mailed to each voting member at least two weeks prior to the date of the meeting; or provided the proposed amendment shall have been presented over the signature of five Active members at least one meeting prior to that at which action is taken, and due notice of such meeting or action is given the membership.

Roberts Rules of Order (Revised) shall be the parliamentary authority for all matters of procedure not specifically covered by the By-Laws or by specific rules of procedure adopted by the League.

STANDING RULES

1. It shall be the duty of the Board to enforce the By-Laws of the League and the Association Policies binding on all Leagues.

2. It shall be the duty of the Board to create, maintain, evaluate, and revise, the Manual of Procedure by which it carries out the duties and powers delegated to it in the By-Laws.

3. It shall be the duty of the Board (before the beginning of the working year) to present to the League a suggested program for ratification.

4. It shall be the duty of the Board, in drawing up the program, to give serious consideration to the interests and capacities of the members, and the number who can take an active part.

5. It shall be the duty of the Board to see that a contingency reserve be maintained in the community fund.

ASSOCIATION POLICIES BINDING ON ALL LEAGUES

AS REVISED APRIL, 1952

POLICY I — GENERAL

- A. The Association shall act in an advisory capacity to the Leagues except as otherwise stated in the By-Laws or in the policies and standing rules adopted pursuant thereto.
- B. The Association shall have the right to protect the Leagues from action by one League which may adversely affect the program, standing or fund-raising of other Leagues.
- C. The Junior League shall encourage their members to accept the responsibilities of good citizenship and to educate themselves in all legislative, political and governmental movements which affect the life of their communities, their countries and the world, and shall endeavor to stimulate their members to exercise their respective citizenships intelligently.

POLICY II — COOPERATION AND SPONSORSHIP

- A. The Association may participate in, cooperate with or sponsor any organization, movement or program, which in the judgment of the Board of Directors, as represented by a three-quarters affirmative vote of the members of the Board, will further the purpose of the Association. The Board will inform any such organization that active participation by the individual Leagues is optional. The association shall not engage in legislative action.
- B. A Junior League may participate in, cooperate with or sponsor conferences or institutes of other national or international organizations, provided approval has first been obtained from the Association office.
- C. A Junior League may hold or sponsor a group meeting of League members in connection with conferences and institutes of other national or international organizations, provided approval has first been obtained from the Association office.

POLICY III — ACTION

- A. Junior League may take action on a national, international, state or local public question, provided that a study of the specific problems and the legislative or administrative measures involved has been made, and that the action taken by that League is compatible with the stated purpose of the Association and its member Leagues; does not adversely affect any other League; is not contrary to the policies of the Association; and is subject to the following:
 1. Action may be taken on a national or international public question provided the League has first obtained approval from the Board of Directors of the Association, as represented by a three-quarters affirmative vote of the Board of Directors.
 2. Action may be taken on a state public question provided the League consults its Regional Director and follows Association legislative procedures.
 3. Action may be taken on a local public question at the discretion of the League.

POLICY IV — FINANCIAL

- A. The Association shall not act for others as a fund-raising agent.
- B. The Association shall not make financial contributions to individuals, other organizations or agencies. Financial support may be rendered for direct services.

POLICY V — PUBLIC RELATIONS AND PUBLICITY

- A. The Association shall endeavor to protect the name "Junior League" from misuse, and shall take all action which may be advisable to that end.
- B. All references to the Association should be based on accurate facts from current material made available from the Association. This material can be secured from the Regional Directors or the Association office.
- C. Any use of the Junior League name in connection with publicity shall identify the League or Leagues involved.
- D. Any publicity of a Junior League designed to extend beyond its community area must be approved by the Association office.
- E. A Junior League member may publicly identify herself as such only when such identification is in connection with an affiliation or activity compatible with the stated purpose of the Association and its member Leagues and the policies of the Association.

POLICY VI

COMMERCIAL ATTACHMENTS AND MONEY-RAISING

- A. The Association shall not recommend the exclusive use of a specific commercial product for the services of a specific commercial concern.
- B. A Junior League membership list shall not be made available for commercial purposes or for purposes of solicitation.
- C. A Junior League may cooperate with commercial concerns, provided the attachment is consistent with the standards of quality and dignity expressed by the Junior Leagues and the Association, and does not recommend exclusive use of a specific product or concern.
 - 1. Sponsorship of a Junior League activity by reputable firms is permitted for local broadcast, telecast or other media of communication.
 - 2. Sponsorship of a Junior League activity by reputable firms on a regional, national or international basis is permitted provided such sponsorship has been approved by the Association office.
 - 3. Direct selling in a commercial portion of a radio or television program, or in other media of communication, is permitted so long as it is in keeping with the quality of the presentation itself, feature articles in good taste, and does not recommend the exclusive use of a product by the Association, any member League, League member, or person representing the Junior League. Samples of the commercial copy must be submitted for approval by the sponsoring League to the Association office.
- D. A Junior League member may be identified as such in commercial endorsements, only in League publications and/or in connection with League money-raising projects. No Junior League member may be identified as such for personal gain.

Policies VII and VIII embody the "Minimum Standards" which all Leagues require of themselves and each other. Their observance and enforcement are the responsibility of each individual League and its officers. Visiting Board and Staff members are obligated to point out apparent deviations from these standards, but the responsibility for constant self-evaluation rests with the League, not with the Association. These policies should be printed with each League's By-Laws. These are policies as revised April 1952.

POLICY VII — MINIMUM STANDARDS

Each member League shall incorporate in its charter, constitution, or By-Laws, the following material:

- A. A statement of its name, which shall be limited to the words "Junior League of (name of city, town or community in which located)."

- B. A statement of its purposes, which shall include the statement of individual purposes stated in Article I, Section 1 of the By-Laws of the Association.
- C. A statement that its policies shall be in harmony with the Policies of the Association.
- D. Provisions complying with the requirements of Article II of the By-Laws of the Association. (No other classes of membership shall be permitted; provided, however, that (a) individual Leagues may have a limited number of honorary members, and (b) Leagues which as of April, 1947 had classes, including life members, may continue such classes for their present membership, but shall not admit any additional members thereto).
- E. A requirement that all provisional members shall complete a course which shall meet the standards set by the Association, and shall perform voluntary service for a period and in a manner satisfactory to the Placement Committee.
- F. A requirement that all active members shall justify their membership through some form of community service satisfactory, in quality and extensiveness, to the Placement Committee (the term community service being defined as including volunteer work for, and service on Boards and Committees of any philanthropic or humanitarian community organization of high standing in the educational, civic, cultural or social welfare fields).
- G. A requirement for the following committees:
 - 1. An Admissions Committee whose functions shall be to pass on applications for membership in the League or to make recommendations to the Board with respect thereto.
 - 2. An Education Committee, whose function it shall be to plan and supervise the educational program of each League.
 - 3. A Finance Committee, among whose duties shall be the initial preparation of the annual budget of each League.
 - 4. Magazine Committee (or Chairman).
 - 5. A Nominating Committee whose function it shall be to prepare slates of candidates for election to the various elective offices of the League.
 - 6. A Placement Committee whose function shall be to plan and supervise the League's volunteer service so that the capacities and capabilities of the members of the League may be utilized in ways most valuable to the community.
 - 7. A Public Relations Committee (or chairman).
 - 8. A Provisional Committee whose function shall be to plan and direct the education and training of Provisional Members until such time as they are admitted to Active Membership.
- H. The books and accounts of each League shall be kept in accordance with sound accounting practices; each League shall maintain a community fund separate and distinct from its administrative fund; all money in the community fund shall be distributed solely for the benefit of the community. Annually a copy of the audited balance sheet (statement of Assets and Liabilities) and profit and loss statement (statement of income and expense) shall be distributed to each member of the League.
- I. A requirement that the Board of each League shall present to the membership all proposed major program activities for ratification.

POLICY VIII — MINIMUM STANDARDS

- A. The course for provisional members of all Leagues shall include all topics covered in the Association's basic provisional course outline. Each League shall send to the Association annually, for evaluation and criticism, an outline of its provisional course as soon as reasonably possible after the completion thereof.

- B. The Placement Committee of each League shall interview all active members at regular intervals in order to plan and supervise their free choice of community service as defined in Policy VII, F, and shall keep as nearly as possible uniform records concerning their activities.
- C. No individual League shall associate itself with nor endorse any welfare or other similar project, program or activity which does not meet accepted standards in its field, or show evidence of working toward such standards.
- D. All money-raising, on the part of individual Leagues, shall be consistent with standards of dignity and good taste and in keeping with the laws and customs of the community.
- E. Each League shall send to the Association annually a copy of its audited annual statement.
- F. Each League shall maintain the same standards as required of applying groups under Article 11-A, Section 2 of the Association By-Laws.

Association Procedures Applying To All Leagues

INTER-LEAGUE MEMBERSHIP PROCEDURE

Arranging Inter-League Memberships:

Section 1

Inter-League cards issued pursuant to Article 11-B, Section 2, of the By-Laws, shall be for a term of one year, unless extended by the League to which the card is issued. Any extension shall be limited to an additional year.

Section 2.

The League to which a member is temporarily accredited may charge such member for special club privileges or for the actual cost of her membership.

Section 3.

(a) A member desiring an Inter-League card shall notify the secretary of the League to which she belongs.

(b) The secretary, or other authorized League official, and the treasurer of the League in consultation with the Placement Chairman shall be empowered to determine whether said member is in good standing.

(c) To a member in good standing the League secretary, or other authorized League official, shall issue an Inter-League card; notifying the Association headquarters that such card has been issued; and furnishing to the member the name and address of the secretary of the League to which the member may apply for temporary affiliation, and notifying that secretary about the member.

(d) Inter-League membership shall become effective immediately upon presentation of the Inter-League card to the secretary, or other authorized League officials, of the League with which the member wishes to be temporarily affiliated. This League shall notify the home League within fifteen days of the date the Inter-League card is received.

(e) When the period of Inter-League membership expires, the inter-League card shall be returned to its owner.

(f) Upon return to her home League, an Inter-League member shall return her Inter-League card for cancellation to the secretary, or other authorized League official, who shall notify Association headquarters of the cancellation of the card.

Arranging Transfer of Members:

Section 1.

The corresponding secretary and the treasurer of the League from which a transfer is made shall be responsible for filling in the information regarding the member's record called for by the transfer card supplied by the Association. They shall also certify that the transferring member is in good standing and shall then forward the transfer card to the secretary of the League to which the transfer is made.

Section 2.

Transfers shall be accepted by the Board of Directors or the Executive Committee of any League unless the member has no right to transfer under the provisions of Article 11-B, Section 3 of the By-Laws. Transfers shall be accepted in order of application, except that applications of members under 40 may be given precedence over those of sustaining members. Transfers shall become effective upon acceptance. Within 15 days thereafter the secretary of the League to which the transfer has been made shall notify on transfer cards supplied by the Association, the member involved, the treasurer's office at Association headquarters, and the member's former League.

Section 3

A member transferring from one League to another shall become subject to the jurisdiction of the League to which she transfers on the date on which such transfer is accepted.

A League receiving a transferring member may charge such transferring member the actual administrative costs incurred by such League in connection with her transfer.

A.J.L.A. GUEST ROOM INFORMATION

Junior League Section

The Junior League Guest Room Section of The Waldorf-Astoria is located on the 19th and 20th floors of the hotel's West (Park Avenue) side, and consists of 32 rooms.

For the convenience of our members, a lounge is maintained on the 20th floor. A waitress is in attendance from 2:00 until 9:00 P.M., to serve tea and beverages.

Cots and cribs may be put into guests' rooms upon request. A cot is \$5.00 plus 5 per cent city tax per night, but there is no charge for a crib.

Sitters for children may be secured through the hotel. The usual charge is \$1.00 an hour until midnight, \$1.25 an hour after. Guests are requested to state the time they would like the sitter to arrive and about how long she will be required.

Cars may be stored at a nearby garage for \$3.25 per night, including pick-up and delivery.

Accommodations

16 rooms—double occupancy—twin beds and private bath. Rates \$16.50 and \$18.50 daily plus 5% city tax.

6 rooms—single occupancy—2 with private baths. Rates \$7.00, \$9.00 and \$10.00 daily plus 5% city tax.

Reservations

In writing for information or to make a reservation, always address Guest Room Hostess, Association of the Junior Leagues of America, Inc., The Waldorf-Astoria, New York 22, New York.

Reservations cannot be accepted more than three months in advance. **In case of cancellation, an immediate wire is requested.** Cancellations made less than 24 hours in advance will be billed at full rate. This not only protects the Association against loss, but prevents the turning away of members who otherwise could be accommodated.

Reservations received by wire are answered by Western Union collect. Please indicate the name of your League when making reservations.

Since there are so few rooms in the Junior League section, it is only possible to assign the best accommodations when the exact dates of arrival and departure are known in advance. It is often impossible to retain rooms longer than the time specified in the reservation, due to the fact that they are reserved for the very date they are to be vacated.

Registration

8:00 A.M. to 9:00 P.M. — Upon arrival, please take the West elevators and go directly to the guest room desk in the AJLA office on the 19th floor to register.

9:00 P.M. to 8:00 A.M. — Upon arrival, kindly register at the front desk of the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel.

Length of Stay

Because of the great demand for accommodations, it has been found necessary to limit the length of stay to one month each six months.

A.J.L.A. Departure Time 12 noon.

Those retaining their rooms after departure hour will be charged for another day. Due to heavy bookings, we are unable to promise that accommodations always will be assigned immediately upon arrival.

Eligible Guests (other than League members)

Members of immediate families (husbands, children, parents, brothers and sisters) may be accommodated for a period not exceeding two weeks when the League rooms are not otherwise occupied. If accompanied by a League member the period is extended to one month.

Written authorization from a League member is **REQUIRED** for reservations of members of her family. Members are requested to write AJLA for the necessary form to be filled out in advance of making family reservations. No form is necessary, however, if the member accompanies her family.

Guests other than League members (or their immediate families) may be accommodated **only** when accompanied by a League member. League members need not request a form in advance when accompanying non-members.

When bringing guests, it is well to send their names in advance. This insures holding of messages and communications received at the hotel previous to arrival.

Bills

Bills are mailed to guests after their departure unless they prefer to pay before leaving. Only United States Currency, checks on United States Banks or Checks on Canadian Banks payable in American funds can be accepted. **CHECKS WILL NOT BE CASHED FOR MEMBERS UNLESS THEY ARE STAYING IN THE HOTEL AS JUNIOR LEAGUE GUESTS.**
