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HISTORY OF THE ASSOCIATION OF JUNIOR LEAGUES OF AMERICA

The Junior League represents a serious endeavor on the part of young women to become active and constructive factors in the communities in which they live, to be intelligent citizens, and to assist in promoting human welfare. In addition to providing the member with channels of work and training for volunteer service, the Junior League helps her to realize two vital concepts: (1) that she is not an onlooker, but is herself a part of the community; (2) that the community, in turn, is not an isolated unit but part of the nation and of the world.

It was in 1901, at the beginning of a new era for American women, that the first Junior League was organized in New York. At that time Mary Harriman (Mrs. Chas. Carey Rumsey) and Nathalie Henderson (Mrs. Joseph Swan) realized what might be achieved if a group of young women were encouraged to take a more active part in some form of active service to their own neighborhoods through the settlement houses and other organizations in existence at the time.

Soon similar organizations to that in New York were formed in various other of the large cities—Boston, Brooklyn, Portland, Ore., Baltimore, Philadelphia and Chicago. In the spring of 1912 six of the seven Leagues then in existence held their first national conference in New York City. In 1921 the Association of the Junior Leagues of America, Inc., was founded by the thirty Leagues then in existence. Mrs. Willard Straight (Mrs. Leonard K. Elmhirst) was elected president and a Board of Directors was appointed and instructed to draw up a constitution.

After 1921 the Association grew rapidly until, in 1923, there were sixty-three Leagues. In order to establish a closer contact between the Leagues and the Association, the country was divided into six territories and in each a League member was appointed regional director to act as liaison officer between the Leagues of the region and the Association and to serve on the latter's Board of Directors. Now there are twelve regions, in each of which the Leagues elect every second year a member to serve as their regional director.

At the time the Association was first formed most League activity was in the realm of social work but the Board of Directors, realizing the opportunities which would eventually offer themselves to Junior Leagues, set down in the constitution the social, economic, educational, cultural and civic fields as those in which Junior Leagues should interest their members.

Gradually the Leagues realized that a benevolent "doing for others" was not enough, that they must form a partnership with professional community workers to effect the improvement of conditions. To do this required knowledge. As evidence of this the first course for provisional members was established in 1921 and such a course, which includes an examination of the various forces at work in the community, has been a prerequisite for

active membership since 1927. Originally League projects were large enterprises—convalescent homes, day nurseries, curative workshops and the like. It was discovered, however, that to support these undertakings a disproportionate amount of time and energy often was going into money-raising to the exclusion of the educational process of volunteer service. Today where Leagues have projects the recommended type is one in which the demonstration element is present, the choice being based on the needs of the individual community in the light of the interest and money-raising capabilities of the League.

The League's realization of the need for expert guidance in their welfare activities soon led to the establishment of a trained social work staff at the Association's offices. Members of this staff were available for visits to Leagues to study the local situation and give advice. Similar service was then made available for Children's Theatre, Arts, Ways and Means, and Publicity. The Association also publishes the *Junior League Magazine*, issued monthly to each Junior League member. At the present time the Association has 177 member Leagues, 169 in the United States proper, one in Honolulu, one in Mexico City, and six in Canada, comprising a total of some 57,761 members.

HISTORY OF THE WINSTON-SALEM JUNIOR LEAGUE

The local League was organized in 1923 by about forty of the girls and young women of Winston-Salem with Mrs. Thurmond Chatham as president. We were the 46th League to be admitted to the Association, and the first in North Carolina.

During the second year, under the presidency of Mrs. Paul Montague, our League adopted the point system, and sponsored a pre-natal clinic, which, at the time, was the only one of its kind in North Carolina.

In 1925, with Mrs. Kenneth Mountcastle as president, we brought Will Rogers and the de Reschke quartet to town, opened a gift shop, and began a training course for Provisional members.

During Mrs. Fay Huntley Spencer's (now Mrs. Edwards) administration we undertook the financing of our Hospital for Incurables.

In March, 1928, Mrs. Charles Long became president and on the fifteenth of that month we opened a Beauty Parlor. On May fifteenth we had Paper Day. In this same year the Arts and Interests and Children's Play Committee was formed.

In 1929 Mrs. Ralph Hanes was elected president and was instrumental in starting our monthly Newsheet with Miss Dell Norfleet as its first editor.

In 1930-31, under Mrs. Elsie Hines Norfleet's (now Mrs. Charles Siewers) leadership, we became more nationally minded with respect to the Junior Leagues of America, and began to take a more active part in community affairs as well. We helped to organize the Civic Music Association, began our yearly assistance to the Community Chest Drive, opened a Rag Market (later the Thrift Shop), and initiated Occupational Therapy classes in our hospital.

With Mrs. James Hanes as president in 1932, work began on a placement system, and under Mrs. Linville Martin in 1933, we put the system into effect.

From 1934 to '35, with Mrs. James Hanes serving her second term as president, the League's most important work was the continued operation of the Hospital for Incurables.

In 1935, under Mrs. W. H. Sprunt's presidency, the Winston-Salem Play Group was chosen to represent the medium-sized Leagues at the Children's Theatre Conference in Baltimore.

In March, 1936, Mrs. W. K. Hoyt was elected president. During her term of office we employed a Professional Placement Secretary, and the League as a whole became more familiar with the needs of the community. On June 1, 1937, after the opening of the Forsyth County Hospital and the satisfactory placing of all our patients, the Hospital for Incurables was closed.

In the spring of 1937, we assisted in the organization of the Mental Hygiene Society of Winston-Salem. This society asked the League to finance a Child Guidance Clinic for a demonstration period, and on November 1, the Clinic was opened in the League's Hospital Building. Through professional Placement secretaries we were able to give specialized training to our volunteers.

In 1938, Miss Aurelia Plumly (now Mrs. Ralph Spaugh) was elected president. The League at a cost of \$1,200 per year, continued to sponsor and finance the Child Guidance Clinic, which was under the supervision of the Mental Hygiene Society. Our projects included assistance at the Christmas Exchange, the new Hall of History, and the presentation by Jr. Programs, Inc., which we brought to town. The chief undertaking, however, was the bringing to the community of four New York Dramas of the Contemporary Theatre Series, from which a profit of \$5,000 was made.

With Mrs. A. S. Johnson as president in 1940, the Child Guidance Clinic was moved to new quarters, reorganized, and became affiliated, through its director, with the Bowman Gray School of Medicine in this city. The play group was most active and received national acclaim for its excellent work. Acting on advice from Mrs. Dingman, Secretary of Ways and Means of AJLA, our system of budgeting was revised and a plan for maintaining separate accounts for Administrative and Community Program funds was put into effect. A plan was worked out for conservative spending of the surplus over and above a contingency fund.

In March, 1941, Mrs. Linville Martin was elected to serve as Director of this Region for a two-year term.

The League joined with other interested community groups in forming the Children's Theatre Board, whose purpose is to provide a year-round program of entertainment for the city school children. The League is represented on this Board by the Children's Theatre Committee chairman and two other members of the committee. The Board is responsible for the promotion, financing, and transportation of the children to the entertainments it sponsors. The League's major production became a part of the Board's yearly series, and the League ceased the annual troup ing of a smaller play to the city schools.

During the presidency of Mrs. Thomas Rice, from 1941-43, many changes took place. The program of planned expenditure of surplus, advised by the AJLA Staff, was begun: \$3,000 was donated to the Red Cross War Fund, \$1,000 was given to the Library Fund of the Winston-Salem Teachers College, and \$5,000 was given to the Family Service Agency for the establishment of a Child Placing Agency.

A Radio Institute, conducted by Miss Gloria Chandler, AJLA Consultant, began our entrance into the cultural field, and the League allocated \$4,500 to the Community Council for the development of the Radio Plan.

In 1942 the Director of the Child Guidance Clinic resigned, and no replacement was available. The Clinic was evaluated by a

special committee which recommended that it be closed.

Mrs. Helen Lipscomb, of the Staff, conducted a Board members' institute.

The League was very proud to have one of its members, Mrs. Linville Martin, elected President of the Association of Junior Leagues of America.

In 1943 the Beauty Parlor was sold because the League deemed it unwise to operate a shop in competition with local business, and its community service program was amply protected by a contingency fund.

During the term of Mrs. Irving Carlyle, 1943-44, the League began to feel the full impact of World War II. Many of the younger members were away with their husbands, who were in service, while those at home devoted the major part of their volunteer service to war-related activities, such as Red Cross, Bond Sales, Rationing Board, and USO.

A Cultural survey of the community was made by Miss Virginia Lee Cromer, AJLA Arts Consultant, which revealed a need for the development and expression of the creative arts.

From 1944 to 1945 Mrs. George Walker served as president. The League voted to support the Radio Council for a three-year period, allocating \$2,500 per year. A donation of \$1,000 was made to the Wachovia Historical Society to provide a part-time Director for its Museum. The League gave \$600 to the Piedmont Festival and assisted in the sale of tickets to its performances.

In a Staff visit for the Arts program, Miss Cromer advised: "Conditions in Winston-Salem indicate that the League would be wise to strengthen already established agencies; i.e., museum, library, recreation department, public schools . . . "

In 1945-46, upon the return of many members who had been away during the war, the League expanded its program under the leadership of Mrs. Thomas Moore, and, on the advice of AJLA, donated the major part of its surplus to the community. Three Staff visits, two in connection with League finances, and one for the Arts program, helped to get the plans underway.

A portion of the invested surplus, consisting of four hundred shares of Reynolds B stock, was turned over to the community: fifty shares to the City-County Hospital; fifty shares to the War Memorial Building Fund; one hundred twenty shares to the Mental Hygiene Society; one hundred eighty shares to the City Library.

The Junior League Hospital Building was deeded to the Winston-Salem Foundation.

The League brought Mrs. Chester Marsh to the community for a three-year demonstration as Arts and Crafts Director for the City Recreation Department, which made space available for a Workshop to carry on the activities.

From 1946-47, Mrs. Bowman Gray served as president. During the summer a story-telling program was conducted at the Wachovia Museum. In January a Staff visit for reorganization of the Thrift Shop resulted in improved management of this project, and we were advised to appoint a project-finding committee.

The League continued its financial support of the Radio Council and the Arts and Crafts program. A survey of fifty-six groups in the community revealed interest in the establishment of an Arts Council, and \$7,200 was put aside from surplus for the employment of a Community Arts Coordinator when the Council proved its readiness to handle the money. The remainder of the invested surplus was donated as follows: \$1,800 to the City Library; \$950 to the Radio Council.

The League contributed \$500 to the Piedmont Festival and sponsored a concert of the newly-formed Winston-Salem Civic Orchestra (now the Winston-Salem Symphony) by selling tickets and handling newspaper and radio publicity. \$750 was given the Leisure Time Division of the Community Council for a coordinator of youth activities at the Fairview Playground, which is in an area not served by any other organization.

During the two-year term of Mrs. Robert Lawson, from 1947-49, a change in the Arts and Crafts Program took place. Half-way through the three-year demonstration, the City Recreation Department withdrew its support when the building which housed the Department was sold. The advice of AJLA was sought, and a visit from the AJLA Arts Consultant, Miss Virginia Lee Cromer, helped to clarify the situation. In the letter of recommendation following her visit, Miss Cromer advised that a strong Board with committee structure be formed for the Workshop. An Interim Committee, composed of League members and others interested, was formed for the Workshop. This committee organized the Arts and Crafts Association, which assumed responsibility for the administration, financing, and promotion of the Workshop. The League agreed to pay the salary of the Director for a three-year period ending October, 1950, and pledged its support to see the program stabilized in the community.

Further advice in Miss Cromer's letter of recommendation was that: a Board Members' Institute be held; we considered ways of lightening the president's job in order that she might be able to serve for two years; our League should adjust its thinking concerning projects, and should know the workings of any agency with which we have a project in the future.

The League voted to contribute \$500 per year for a two-year period toward the support of the Children's Programming Committee of the Radio Council, and also loaned \$1,200 to this committee for the transcription of a radio series, "Storytime."

Mrs. Albert Butler, Jr., was president during the year 1949-1950, when our financial commitments to the Radio Council and to the Arts and Crafts came to an end. The League voted to continue its yearly appropriations of \$3,000 to the Arts and

Crafts Association through March 1951, \$250 to the Piedmont Festival, and \$250 to the Winston-Salem Symphony.

Working with the Piedmont Festival and the Chamber of Commerce, the League helped to organize the Arts Council.

A Project-Finding Committee was appointed.

During the term of Mrs. Clifton Pleasants, 1950-51, the League voted to release the gift of \$7,000 which it had held in trust for the Arts Council, and in August 1950, Miss Gertrude Elliot was employed by the Council as Coordinator.

The request of the Arts and Crafts Association for further support of the Workshop in the amount of \$3,000 was granted through March 1952. \$250 was given to the Winston-Salem Symphony Association. The Junior League play, "Indian Captive," was presented to the county school children at the Mineral Springs Auditorium.

From 1951-52 Mrs. John Whitaker served as President. The Arts Council established an Art Center by moving its member groups, including the Workshop, into a building owned by the Winston-Salem Foundation.

The Project-Finding Committee received a letter from the Arts and Crafts Association, requesting that "... the Junior League consider association with the Arts and Crafts on a permanent basis." The Board turned down this request for permanent support and recommended to the League that it ask the Association to make a specific request.

The League was advised by AJLA to evaluate, to continue Project-Finding, and to have a League Administration Institute. A comprehensive evaluation of the League's administration and program was made. Mrs. Emma Buettner, General Program Consultant from AJLA, conducted the League Administration Institute, and upon her advice a Manual of Procedure was compiled for the use of Board members.

The county school children were brought to Reynolds Auditorium to see the Junior League play, "Tom Sawyer."

After careful consideration, the Board voted to release the Children's Programming Committee from its obligation to return to the League the \$1,200 loaned it for the purpose of transcribing "Storytime."

On March 31, the League's financial contribution to the Arts field was completed through coordination of fund raising for the Arts groups under the Arts Council.

ANNUAL REPORTS OF BOARD OF WINSTON-SALEM JUNIOR LEAGUE

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

A detailed account of the year's work is contained in the following reports of the officers and committee chairmen, therefore the report of the President cites major problems and developments in the League as a whole.

The first duty of the Board, upon assuming office in April, was to follow through on the reports of the Project-Finding Committee. Since the membership had indicated that the majority was interested in a request from the Arts and Crafts Association, a careful study was made of the request. After consultation with our Regional Director, the Board turned down the request that: "...the League consider association with Arts and Crafts on a permanent basis", either by guaranteeing that present standards be maintained, or by extending the services of the Workshop. Upon the recommendation of the Board, the League, at its June meeting, voted to ask the Association for a specific request. In November a reply was received, stating that no request would be made until the results of the Arts Council's drive for funds were known.

The major undertaking of the year was the evaluation of the League, which was necessitated by: first, the rapid growth in membership during the past six years—a fifty per cent increase in the number of Active members has taken place since 1946; second, loss of continuity due to constant turnover in Administration—for the past two years only one Board member has served a second term in the same job; and third, the completion of our planned expenditure of surplus in the Community Program Fund.

The plan followed by the Board in setting up the Evaluation Committee was one suggested by the Association Board and Staff in February 1951, when a letter was sent to all the Leagues calling their attention to the necessity for keeping abreast of changing times in a changing world.

During a visit to New York last June, I took the opportunity to go to Association Headquarters for a consultation with the general program consultant, Mrs. Emma Buettner. After studying our League's Yearbook, Budget, reports of our last Staff visit in 1947 and Regional Director's visit in 1950, and a file on our Arts program, Mrs. Buettner recommended that we have a League Administration Institute, that we evaluate, and that we continue project finding.

In addition to the above advice, among other suggestions were: that we establish a contingency fund in the Community Program account; that the League lawyer be consulted on the tax problems of the Thrift Shop, and that its books be audited.

In discussing our community program, Mrs. Buettner advised that the League clarify its relationship to the Arts and Crafts Association, pointing out that although the League should not undertake permanent support of the Workshop, it can continue

on a year-to-year basis as a member. She also made suggestions for building further community support for the Workshop. These were discussed with the Junior League members of the Workshop Survey Committee, with the Director, and with three members of the Advisory Committee for the Workshop, and were given to the President of the Arts and Crafts Association.

The League Administration Institute was conducted by Mrs. Buettner in November and was attended by thirty-five persons. Duties of officers and committees were discussed, and needs of our League were pointed out. The following suggestions were made: (1) that a Manual of Administrative Procedures be prepared for the use of the Board; (2) that the meaning of the League to its members be re-emphasized; (3) that a feeling of togetherness be encouraged; (4) that we interpret to the community that the League is no longer wealthy; (5) that we use the AJLA Staff for advice; (6) that we have a full League understanding and agreement on the Legislative problem.

During her visit, Mrs. Buettner met with the Evaluation and Project Finding committees, visited the Art Center, and conferred with the leaders of our Arts program.

Following the Staff visit, a letter of recommendation was sent to the League which contained further advice: (1) that continuity in Administration be promoted through more Board members serving second terms in their jobs; (2) that the Board have a clear understanding of its duties as the planning and policy-making body of the League; (3) that files and notebooks be maintained and used by all Board members; (4) that the purpose of the Arts Committee be defined in real specifics; (5) that the Project Finding Committee study the AJLA Handbook and Project Manual and in presenting proposed projects to the League, give facts concerning the exact amount of money involved in initiating and demonstrating the project, and the amount of womanpower involved in carrying it out; and (6) that the League follow up the recommendations of the Evaluation Committee.

The report of the Evaluation Committee is published elsewhere in this Yearbook. We are deeply indebted to Mrs. Bailey Liipfert and the members of her committee for their painstaking, comprehensive study of the League. To carry out their recommendations, the Board has been reorganized; new Standing Rules have been adopted; the By-Laws have been brought up-to-date; and permanent notebooks have been set up for each Board member. These contain a Manual of Procedure setting forth their duties, and a section for the use of each Board member showing how she goes about her particular job. However, the real success of the Evaluation depends upon the full cooperation of every League member as the Board goes about the job of following-up the conclusions and recommendations of the committee.

The League was represented at three conferences held by the Association during the year. The President and the Placement Chairman, Mrs. Sam Orr, Jr., attended the Houston Conference. At this time a change in Association policy was brought

to the Leagues' attention: we were advised that the Staff will no longer supervise the Leagues, but will serve them in an advisory capacity only. In September, I attended the Presidents' Council, which the Association is sponsoring as a two-year demonstration to the Leagues. The Presidents of Region V met with our Director, Mrs. Moragne Whitney, in Savannah, Georgia. Our delegates to the Regional meeting, Mrs. Flake Steele, Jr., and Mrs. Walter Crump, brought back many helpful suggestions from the conference held in Charleston, S. C.

Contacts with other Leagues in the Association have consisted mainly of sharing our experience—more than thirty Leagues have requested copies of our Admissions' yardstick; and our Conference exhibit elicited sixteen requests for copies of the Report on Evaluation and the Manual of Procedure.

Following Mrs. Buettner's suggestion, the tax status of the Thrift Shop has been clarified by the League's lawyer, who secured a ruling from the Bureau of Internal Revenue declaring our Shop exempt from the payment of income taxes. We are able to qualify for this exemption upon the basis that ninety per cent of the operation is carried by volunteers. This was one reason for increasing the budget requirement of the Shop to \$5,000 for the next fiscal year, as our Thrift Shop Committee estimates that we can handle a larger volume of rummage without any increase in operating expense.

One of our problems this year was the postponement of the play, due to the closing of the schools during the flu epidemic. The League is grateful to all the members who gave so unselfishly of their time in the extra effort which was required in order that the production, "Tom Sawyer," might go on. The County school children were brought to Reynolds Auditorium for two performances of the play.

In February, a business meeting, followed by a Coffee, was held for the Sustaining members in order to keep them in touch with various phases of the League. At this time a report of the Evaluation, given by two members of that committee, was received with great interest. At the suggestion of the Finance Committee, a motion that Sustaining members pay the same dues as Active members was passed. Also, recognition was made of the contribution of Mrs. Chester Marsh to the development of Community Arts, and she was presented a rug for her new home as a mark of the League's appreciation of her services.

In March, the Board considered the League's loan to the Children's Programming Committee of the Radio Council. Several years ago we advanced this committee \$1,200 for the purpose of transcribing a radio series of in-school broadcasts, called "Storytime," the money to be repaid, in three years, from proceeds derived from the sale of the recordings. To date, approximately \$800 has been made and was put aside for payment to the League. After careful consideration, the Board voted to release the Children's Programming Committee from its obligation to the League. Reasons for the decision are: (1) the Committee has only a small income from the Parent-Teacher

Association upon which to operate; (2) although it is no longer a project of the League, many of our members continue to give volunteer service in the field of radio; and (3) it is the advice of the AJLA Staff that the Leagues leave volunteers and money, if needed, in projects which they turn over to the community.

The League is beginning to see the results of its pioneering in the cultural field. The Arts Council moved its member groups, including the Arts and Crafts Workshop, into a building owned by the Winston-Salem Foundation, and established an Art Center. This move, together with the retirement of Mrs. Marsh as Director of the Workshop, necessitated a change in the organizational plans, and a realignment and expansion of personnel connected with operation of the Center.

At the end of the fiscal year our financial commitment to our present community program was completed, and the League joined other groups to enlist community support of the Arts field.

The coordination of effort in promoting cultural activities points up the need to make new plans for the League's community service program. For seven years we have operated on a long-range plan, made possible through expert Staff advice and through expenditures from surplus.

In planning for the expansion of our League program, it is necessary that we give serious consideration to the number of available volunteers, and the changes which have taken place in the community.

Careful study of ways in which to make more effective use of the League's womanpower is of great importance, for only through giving our members real responsibility can we carry out the League's purpose of producing mature, responsible citizens.

The President, in making her Annual Report, has the responsibility of evaluating the League in the community. As I have gone about my duties this year, I have been struck by the real respect in which our League is held. This respect has been won both through group achievement, and through the volunteer service of our members as individuals. It is the duty of every one of us to uphold our traditions and to add to the accomplishments of those who have gone before us. We cannot afford to rest on the laurels which others have won.

I wish to thank the Board members for the support, encouragement, and cooperation which they have given me. If we made progress this year, it is only because of their helpfulness and the faithfulness with which they have carried out their duties.

To each of you, my deep appreciation for the privilege of serving as your President. It has been a worthwhile experience, which I shall always treasure.

VICE-PRESIDENT

October—The regular League meeting was held at night in the new Arts Center. Mrs. Marsh and Miss Elliot addressed the group briefly outlining the activities of the Arts Council and Arts and Crafts Workshop.

December—Most of the employed members attended the dance.

February—A member of the Nominating Committee presented the slate of officers which was voted upon and accepted. The new Provisional members were announced. Members of the Evaluation Committee gave the report of this Committee, and the Conclusions and Recommendations were discussed and adopted.

Three of these meetings were held in the home of the Vice-President. Attendance was checked and reported. The feeling of some of our employed members was one of unawareness and lack of unity in the total League program. I feel that some of this is unavoidable, due to the time element, but hope that in the future progress will be made to rectify it. My association with these fine members has been most stimulating and pleasant for me.

EVALUATION COMMITTEE

This special committee was created by the Board, with its purpose being to make an intensive factual study of past and present League Administration and Program, and from that study to draw conclusions and to make recommendations which would point to future planning.

The period to be considered was determined by the Board, with Staff advice, to be from 1940 through 1951.

The members of the committee were chosen to represent a cross section of the League membership, and consisted of a provisional, a past-president, a Board member, an active member, and a sustaining member, with a chairman.

The general procedure followed by the committee in carrying on its work was: Permanent records from our files, AJLA Handbooks and Manuals, Yearbooks, Staff reports, and other pertinent materials were assembled; each committee member was given a folder containing her specific assignment, general information concerning the duties of the committee, and the materials with which to carry out her phase of the study; each member brought to the committee reports of her findings and after thorough discussion, conclusions were drawn and recommendations were made.

The Suggested Evaluation Guide sent us by AJLA was followed by the committee in carrying on its work. This Guide was made up into two sections, the first part being on League Administration, and the second being on League Program.

A comparison of past and present League Administration was made by the committee, and the following summary of the findings, with the conclusions and recommendations, was given to the Board:

ADMINISTRATION

1. Continuity of officers and committee chairmen

Our officers and standing committee chairmen should serve on a rotating basis for two-year terms. This would enable them to learn their jobs, plan their work, and follow through to carry out these plans.

A file, a calendar, and a notebook should be compiled and maintained by each Board member and committee chairman. Such records would give a clearer understanding of what each job involves and how to go about fulfilling the responsibilities. It would follow that a new Board could more easily plan the total League program if each member had the benefit of a detailed record to follow from preceding years. The AJLA Handbook recommends this strongly.

The Board at its present size is top-heavy and unwieldy. It should be set up so that: the officers and standing committee chairmen form the voting administrative body; the special committee chairmen attend the Board meetings only when their particular activity is functioning. At no time do special committee chairmen vote.

A Board Manual of Procedure should be required by our Standing Rules, and should include both Board procedure and individual committee and office procedure.

2. Budgeting procedures

The treasurer should always be elected for a two-year term.

The Finance Committee should be set up in accordance with the AJLA Handbook, page 87, and should make up the budget for presentation at the April meeting. This would enable the incoming Board to build the budget around the program, rather than have the program built around the budget.

We should have definite policies on requests for financial donations in order to protect ourselves from the standpoint of Public Relations.

3. Use of committees

Duties of committees are defined in the Handbook; procedure of committees is worked out locally. The compiled detail of how a committee carries out its duties is known as its "calendar."

The purpose of the League is to train its members to serve as volunteer leaders in the community, and the basic step for beginning this training is serving on League committees. Each committee should be small enough for the chairman to delegate the work of the committee to its members, and the chairman would serve as the liaison between the committee and the Board. The chairman would therefore not be overburdened with detail and would be able to interpret the work of the committee as a whole. The committee member would have the advantage of actual committee participation under the guidance of the chairman. In this manner, we feel, the committees could work more

efficiently, the members would have more responsibility, and the training would be more effective in developing understanding and leadership.

4. Coordination of committee activities

Several League committees (such as Provisional, Placement, Admissions) have a file and manual and seem to be functioning well. There should be an overlapping of all committees working together toward the total League program. The Board acts as the coordinator of activities, with the chairman and officers forming this "pool of thought," and with the Board responsible for the work of all committees being coordinated. A yearly calendar of all activities would help to establish a balance.

5. Admissions procedures

This committee has a file, records and policies which have been kept up over a period of years, which enable the committee members and chairman to understand their purpose and responsibilities—it is functioning well. In comparing our committee procedure with the AJLA Handbook suggestions, we find that our Admissions Procedure is as near perfect as possible.

6. Plans for training and continued education of membership

Our provisional member gets good training, but when she becomes active, the "let-up" in training produces "let-down" in performance.

The continued education of our active members should be the goal of our education committee.

The education committee should consult with placement to find the interests and needs of the members, and plan the year's program around these interests. (Small interest groups could be formed, such as scribblers, public speaking, etc. This type of education would be helpful to various phases of League Program.)

The education committee should present the year's program to the League for its approval at the beginning of the working year.

7. Plans for keeping the membership aware of League focus, program, and activities.

There is a real need for our members to be kept aware of League focus, program, and activities. This planning would come under the responsibility of the education committee (refer to No. 6)—the education program should be related to our interests, activities and training—keeping in mind that total League program means all of the activities of the League, and not just being responsible for the program at League meetings.

8. The meaning of the League to the member

Our regional director pointed out in her report following her last visit, "I sensed a real need for more emphasis on the understanding, by each member, of the purpose of the Junior League and her responsibility to the whole." In addition to this suggestion by our regional director, the coffee reports of 1949 and 1951 show that the members need a clarification of the purpose of the League and how this purpose is carried out.

Recommended Board Set-Up

"The Board of Directors consists of officers of the League and the chairmen of activities involving year-round administrative or program responsibilities." AJLA Handbook, page 74.

"The committees necessary to a League program depend, of course, on what that program includes and how much organization work is necessary for each activity . . . Nominating, Admissions, Placement, Education, Finance, Public Relations, and Magazine committees are essential to every League, no matter what its program, and are required under Policy A Binding on Leagues. These committees are generally considered standing committees whose chairmen should sit on the Board with a vote." AJLA Handbook, pages 75 and 76.

"Special committees are those not necessitated by the League's permanent program but by a particular circumstance . . . While special committees are functioning their chairmen should be present (without vote) at meetings of the Board of Directors." AJLA Handbook, page 76.

This plan of administration was followed by our League until 1944. Somehow, during the confusion of the war years, chairmen of special committees acquired equal voting power with those of the standing committees, but this is not recommended procedure.

The above summary was given to the membership in the December issue of the Newssheet.

The study on League Program was accomplished by making an analysis of our program of activities, by studying our woman-power and how it is being used, and by finding out what the League means to its members and to the community. A report was given to the membership at its February meeting, and the following conclusions and recommendations were presented:

PROGRAM

1. Scope of League Program in the community

Conclusion: The present League Program is not broad enough in scope and does not offer variety to stimulate and foster the

interest of its membership.

Recommendation: That the League expand its program, according to the interests of its members.

2. Fields covered by League Program

Conclusion: The cultural field only is covered by League Program.

Recommendation: That the program be expanded to cover the fields of interests as expressed by the members.

3. Relationship with agencies with which League works

4. Relationship with other organizations and groups in the community

Conclusion: In the past, when undertaking a new project, the League has not always formulated a long-range plan of support

Recommendation: 1. The League should determine to what extent in time and money it feels morally obligated to support projects it sets under way, but which have been taken over by the community and still need strengthening.

2. That our relationship with other organizations and groups in the community be strengthened.

5. Size of League in relation to size of community and needs of community

Conclusion: Our membership is lacking in the age group from 20 through 27 years.

Recommendation: That the Admissions Committee study the age groups in the League in order to build towards a proper age balance in the League.

6. Money-raising: Is the profit consistent with the amount of money, time and effort expended?

b. How interpreted to the community?

Conclusion: Our money-raising activities in the past have been mostly confined to the operation of shops. The amount of net profit justified the continued operation of these shops. The Thrift Shop was found to be the easiest source of revenue and the least competitive.

Recommendation: 1. That the Community Program Contingency Fund be built up through the net proceeds from the Thrift Shop.

2. That the League consider increasing the Thrift Shop quota to speed the building up of this fund.

7. Money-spending: a. Was there sound planning?

b. Was it a good investment?

Conclusion: Our financial contributions in the community have shown sound planning. Donations in the Health, Welfare, and Recreational fields have provided badly needed extension of service to already existing agencies. Donations in the Cultural field have made possible the widespread interest in the Art Center and the erection of the new Library. It is to the League's interest that every member support the Arts Council's effort to meet its own budget. The League should continue to make its

members aware of the volunteer needs of the Art Center.

Recommendation: That each League member give her whole-hearted physical and moral support to the Art Council's Follies.

At the conclusion of the presentation, a motion was passed to adopt the report of the committee.

In order that our active members could express their interests in League Program, a ballot was taken. The results of this "Interest Ballot," as printed in the Newsheet, were:

KEY TO FUTURE PLANNING

League Program is the responsibility League members accept as a group. We have League Program because it is the means of fulfillment of League purpose—to train our members to be efficient community leaders.

What this program shall consist of is determined by the membership according to: 1. Our interests; 2. The number of volunteers available; and, 3. The community's needs.

The purpose of the "Interest Ballot" is to be a help to the incoming Board in planning for the coming years.

There were 116 ballots from the active membership of 146. The bollots show 116 first choice votes and 109 second choice votes, or a total of 224 votes:

Thus we see that 56 of our members are primarily interested in the Cultural field while 60 of our members are primarily interested in other fields. If we total the first and second choice votes in each field, this difference in interests is accentuated. This will reveal that there were 79 total votes in the Cultural field and there were 145 votes in other fields. This is significant because the Cultural field is clearly first choice. Taking the four fields altogether, it is equally as clear that there is a tremendous interest in other fields for our expanded program.

This ballot will be of great value to the ones responsible for planning our Program for the future, for it points the way to their study and presentation to the membership of a broad enough program to stimulate and sustain the interests of our present active membership.

However, it should be kept in mind that no expansion can occur which does not take into full account the number of available volunteers and the amount of money involved. With the present state of our finances, it seems that "future" means next year or the year following.

A complete file of Evaluation, including full reports and research done, is with our Permanent Records.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Finance Committee met periodically during the year to supervise and study the financing of the League's administrative and community programs. Recommendations were made to the Board in this regard.

During the year \$3,000 was paid to the Arts and Crafts Association—thus completing the League's financial obligation to that organization. A farewell gift amounting to \$144.00 was approved by the Board for Mrs. Chester Marsh in appreciation of her contributions to the workshop and community.

A maintenance fee of \$10.00 per month is being paid to the Arts Council through their fiscal year ending June 1st. Since no request was made for next year, this fee will be discontinued.

The League's pledge of \$250.00 to the Winston-Salem Symphony Association was paid and no additional pledge made.

As a result of the evaluation study, the Board approved the printing of a manual to be used as permanent material by each Board member. The approximate cost of this was \$235.00. The amount came from the current administrative surplus.

All dues were collected except in one case. This case was excused by the Board.

The Junior League Thrift Shop paid to the League its budgeted amount of \$2,500.00 plus additional profits of \$142.10.

The Finance Committee recommended that the League back the Thrift Shop with increased efforts so as to raise its profits to \$5,000.00 for next year. The main purpose being to establish a contingency fund to protect our future community program for two years.

The 1952-1953 budget was drawn up and submitted to the Board and to the League. It was approved and accepted.

PLACEMENT

The Placement Committee made two vital changes this year. Two interviewers assisted the Placement Chairman, and Placement charts were sent to each League member.

The interviewers accompanied the Placement Chairman on her tour of the community agencies, interviewed 50 League girls apiece, and were responsible for those 50 girls throughout the year.

A chart was made of the jobs, with hours and training required, the agencies wanted filled by League volunteers. This chart was mailed to each League member prior to her interview in September. It was felt that the charts were satisfactory in that they educated the members to the tremendous number of jobs available to volunteers in the community; and the charts gave the volunteers an opportunity to study the jobs open be-

fore interviewing time, thus making for a more intelligent selection of jobs, and shortening the time spent on each interview. However, three-fourths of the members already had their time filled when they came to Placement interviews.

League members have done the following jobs in the community during the year:

- 62—Church work (Sunday School teachers, circle leaders, etc.)
- 53—Fund raising campaigns (symphony, library, YWCA, etc.)
- 52—Children's Theatre (production of "Tom Sawyer")
- 39—Red Cross (Nurses Aides, Bloodmobile, Motor Corps, Grey Ladies, OB Clinic, etc.)
- 32—Sat on Boards, with several girls on 4 or 5 Boards
- 30—Arts Council (Task Force to raise money, Dance Forum, helping on the Fashion Show, interviewing for Arts Survey, Decorating at the Arts Council building, and advisory positions on the Board.)
- 26—Scouting (Cub leaders, Brownies or Girl Scouts, or sit on advisory Boards.)
- 25—Run the Thrift Shop
- 21—Arts and Crafts (instructors or sit on the Board)
- 18—PTA executive work
- 15—YWCA (Y-Teen advisors or sit on Board)
- 14—Christmas Cheer
- 13—Community Council Divisions (Leisure Time, Family and Child, Health, and Negro as League representatives)
- 11—Bowman Gray Auxiliary (running the Bookmobile)
- 10—College Alumna work
 - 5—Sold poppies
 - 5—Little Theatre, acting or on costumes)
 - 5—Big jobs on Candle Tea
 - 4—Old Salem, Inc.
 - 3—Travelers' Aid Board
 - 2—Social Service Exchange

This makes a grand total of 487 jobs filled in the community by Junior League volunteers, or an average of over three jobs a girl.

In addition, every active and provisional member has served five hours at the Thrift Shop.

It is with great humility that I thank not only every member of my committee, but every member of the Junior League for the untold number of volunteer hours that they have given so cheerfully and capably.

PROJECT FINDING

The 1950-1951 Project-Finding Committee functioned through June in order to finish their presentation of proposed projects to the League for their rejection or approval. At the May meeting the League voted to table all requests except that in the Arts and Crafts field. In June the League voted to turn down a request for permanent support of the Arts and Crafts

Workshop, but indicated its willingness to consider other requests from the Arts and Crafts Association.

In September, a newly formed Project-Finding Committee met to formulate plans for the rest of the year. This Committee was composed of the Chairman and five other members: Mrs. Otto Liippfert, Mrs. Albert Butler, Mrs. Robert Lawson, Mrs. Alex Galloway, and Mrs. Irving Caryle. In view of the fact that the League had indicated its desire to remain in the cultural field, that there was a possibility of another request from the Arts and Crafts Association, and that the League's present financial commitment to the Association would not end until March, 1952; this new committee decided that its function for the year was as follows: to serve as receiving agent for any further requests from the community, and to keep in touch with all community developments and needs so as to be ready with up-to-date material on whatever project the League may want to consider in the future.

In November, the Committee cooperated with the Evaluation Committee by studying its history, duties, policies, etc. In this connection, it also surveyed and evaluated the needs in Forsyth County as brought out in a meeting on September 19, 1950 preparatory to the White House Conference on Children and Youth. This evaluation was made a part of the project-finding files.

In January, the committee met to consider and discuss recent developments in the Day Care Nursery situation in Winston-Salem. Additional information in this field was made a part of the committee files.

There were no specific or further requests made to the Committee by the community during this year. Plans for an Arts Council Follies to make money for the support of its member organizations are being made as our fiscal year draws to a close. Any future plans of the Project-Finding Committee more or less depend on the financial success of this project.

The present Project-Finding Committee would like to recommend strongly to next year's committee that it consider the present financial picture of the League and the availability of League volunteers already placed in existing agencies before investigating a large project which would involve a big outlay of money and a large number of League volunteers.

PROVISIONAL

Beginning April, 1951, we had twenty-three Provisionals on the membership list of the Winston-Salem Junior League. One of the group who had been granted an extension of time transferred to another League as a Provisional; two were granted a one year extension of time to complete their course and the remaining twenty were voted into active membership in February.

The Community Lecture Forum was held during April and May with Provisionals selecting the subject in which they were most interested in our Community life. Active members in the

League were called on to work with the Provisionals in securing material for their subjects and advising as to contents of paper. The lectures covering the following subjects were presented: History, Industry, Recreation, Cultural Development, Health, Education, Housing, Welfare, Government, and Future Planning. In addition to the lectures, eight field trips were planned in connection with the subjects discussed.

During June, July and August the Provisionals worked at the Thrift Shop marking and selling. A Radio Course was given in September; while the months of October and November were spent on introducing the girls to the Arts and Crafts Workshop. They were allowed to choose and make some article offered at the Workshop. The January Newsheet was put out by the Provisionals.

In February 1952, fifteen new Provisionals were invited to join the Winston-Salem Junior League. The committee planned in outline form the year's work which was explained to the Provisionals at an interview before they accepted their invitation. The Children's Theatre Unit and the discussion on History of the Winston-Salem Junior League and the Associations of Junior Leagues of America have been completed.

There are seventeen Provisionals on the membership list of the Winston-Salem Junior League at this time.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

The Public Relations Committee was composed of three active members, plus the chairman or a representative from the committees interested in newspaper publicity such as Thrift Shop and Children's Theatre Committees. The President or Vice-President was asked to attend meetings.

At the first meeting, it was decided that fresh emphasis should be put on maintaining good in-League relations, and that the membership be urged to explain and interpret the League program to the general public at every opportunity. The need for a policy of this type was felt to be especially important at the present time where the League's role in the Arts and Crafts Workshop and the Arts Council is not fully appreciated by the community.

The Winston-Salem Journal and the Twin City Sentinel were most cooperative, but the Committee was handicapped by not having one particular reporter to deal with. This was attributed to a shortage of personnel on both papers, and to changes on the staff of each. A planned story on the Thrift Shop never materialized due to the resignation of the reporter who was to write it. However, there was a good newspaper story following each League meeting and also before and/or after conferences. The committee was particularly appreciative of the fine articles printed in connection with the visit of Mrs. Emma Buettner. All press releases from AJLA were turned over to the Sentinel, as well as League stories of a social nature

such as the Christmas Dance. The Journal covered all meetings, and the Provisional-Sustaining coffee. Stories on the Children's Theatre production were given to both papers.

As in years past, a scrap book of newspaper stories was kept. Radio was not used during 1951-52.

THRIFT SHOP

The Thrift Shop Committee for the year 1951-1952 has followed very much the same operation of the shop as the past committee, with the exception of few minor changes. Prior to this year the manager of the shop has received no sick leave. It was felt that this was a handicap to her efficiency and consequently six days sick leave were granted, in addition to her paid vacation. Both Mrs. Brown, the manager, and Mrs. Jarvis who is employed on Saturdays, are now participating in Social Security. The auditor checked over the bookkeeping system and found it to be satisfactory and the books are being audited this year for the first time.

At the start of the League year the shop was thoroughly housecleaned and a few inexpensive improvements made, which helped the appearance of the shop a great deal.

Four times this year we have augmented the stock by purchasing second-hand clothing from a wholesaler in town. A total of \$227.00 was bought and a good profit realized. The shop also received extra stock at the June meeting when each member was requested to bring a summer hat.

The policy of paying the manager 3 per cent commission on the net profits of the shop has been continued, the commission being paid her in November and March.

The rotating system of volunteers has been adequate and every member has completed five hours work at the shop, but shifts were changed so that two volunteers would be at the shop during the lunch hour. It is felt by the committee that a slight increase in the volunteer hours would more adequately staff the shop at this particular time.

The total sales for this year are \$9,000.65, the operating expenses totaling \$5,867.17, showing a net profit of \$3,133.48. The \$2,500.00 quota was turned over to the League Treasurer, with an additional \$142.10 at the end of the year, making a total of \$2,642.10 given to the League.

I feel that the Thrift Shop has concluded another successful year and would like to take this opportunity to thank every member of the committee and all the League members for their hard work and cooperation, without which this project would not have been so successful.

By-Laws of the Junior League of Winston-Salem

ARTICLE I—NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Junior League of Winston-Salem, Incorporated.

ARTICLE II—OBJECT AND POLICIES

Object: The object of this League shall be to foster interest among its members in the social, economic, educational, cultural and civic conditions of the community and to make efficient their volunteer service.

Policies: The policies of the League shall be in harmony with the policies of the Association of Junior Leagues of America, Incorporated.

ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Classes of Membership.

The membership of this League shall consist of young women who shall comply with the requirements of the Association. The classes of membership shall be Provisional, Active, Sustaining, Non-Resident.

A. Provisional Membership

Provisional members are those who are engaged in complying with the requirements for admission to Active Membership and are not eligible to vote or hold office. Provisional members shall be required to complete a provisional member's course, which shall meet the standards set by the Association, and a period of volunteer service satisfactory to the Placement Committee within twelve months after their election to provisional membership. An extension of time may be granted by the Board of Directors in the case of provisionals who for unavoidable reasons are unable to complete the course. Provisionals who have completed these requirements are admitted to active membership by a three-fourths vote of the Board of Directors. Those members failing to meet the provisional requirements shall be dropped from membership by a three-fourths vote of the Board of Directors and may not come up again for membership within two years.

B. Active Membership

Active members are those who have completed the requirements for Provisional Members and have been admitted to Active membership. They may not be over forty years of age, with the exception of Board members completing their term of office. They may hold office and vote. They shall justify their membership through some form of community service satisfactory (in quality and amount) to the Placement Committee.

C. Sustaining Membership

Sustaining members are those who have reached the age limit for Active membership. They may not vote or hold office.

D. Non-Resident Membership

Active and Sustaining members in good standing are entitled to Non-Resident membership which is open to those living outside the county of Forsyth, North Carolina nine months a year. They may not vote or hold office.

Section 2. Admission to Membership

A. Eligibility

Proposed members shall be from nineteen through thirty-three years of age, shall have completed their schooling, and shall have been residents of Winston-Salem or its vicinity at least one year. Before accepting the invitation to membership, they shall agree to engage in community service in connection with the program of the League.

B. Proposal of Members

Each candidate shall be proposed by one member and seconded by two members on a form provided for the purpose. Active and Sustaining members may propose one candidate and second one candidate during a given year, but no member of the Admissions Committee nor of the Executive Committee may propose or second a candidate. No member may propose or second a relative. Application for membership shall be received by the chairman of the Admissions Committee at any time during the year. The deadline for applications for those members to be taken in the following February shall be June 1. No candidate will be considered whose name has been submitted more than four times, beginning with and including the year 1946.

C. Election to Membership

Each member of the Board of Directors shall vote by secret ballot on the list submitted by the Admissions Committee. A two-thirds vote for a name shall qualify a name for membership. The Board shall have at least two meetings to consider the proposed candidates for membership. Invitations shall be mailed immediately to those elected, and the names of those who accept shall be announced by the Admissions chairman at the February meeting.

Section 3. Changes in Membership

Applications for change to another class of membership shall be made in writing to the Corresponding Secretary and will be acted upon by the Board of Directors at any time during the year.

Inter-League Membership

A member of any League who is subject to frequent change in residence may have an Inter-League card issued to her by the League of which she is regularly a member, accrediting her temporarily to the League in the city where she is temporarily residing. An inter-League member shall continue to be listed as a member of and shall pay her regular dues to the League which issues the card; she shall also have all privileges of membership in the League to which she is temporarily accredited, except the right to vote or hold office; she shall comply with the requirements of such League.

Transfer of Members

Only Provisional, Active, Sustaining and Non-Resident members in good standing shall have the right of transferring membership to another League. The right of transfer granted in this section need not extend to a person who has lived for some time in Winston-Salem without being a member of this League, a person who has been refused membership or who has been dropped or expelled from membership by this League. Transferred Provisional members shall take the additional training required by Leagues to which they transfer. The Board of Directors is not required to accept transfers which exceed twenty-five per cent of all admissions to membership in any one year. If it is necessary for transfers to be put on a waiting list they shall be accepted in the order in which they apply.

Section 4. Resignations, Dropped Members, Re-instatements

A. Resignations

Any member of the League who is not in arrears in dues or in the performance of League duties may resign. Resignations shall be made in writing to the Recording Secretary of the League at least two weeks before dues become payable; otherwise members shall be liable for dues for the coming year.

B. Dropped Members

Members may be dropped from the League for cause by a three-fourths vote of the Board of Directors.

C. Re-instatements

Members who have resigned while in good standing may be re-instated by a three-fourths vote of the Board of Directors, upon paying a sum determined by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS

Section 1. Personnel

The officers of this League shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, and Assistant Treasurer.

Section 2. Nomination

The Nominating Committee shall present a slate of one candidate for each office to be filled. The slate shall be sent by the Recording Secretary to each voting member of the League at least two weeks before the election meeting.

Independent nominations may be made in writing by five active members of the League, provided the nominee has given her consent.

It shall be the duty of the Nominating Committee to insure continuity of administration by retaining one or more members of the Executive Committee for two terms.

Section 3. Elections

Officers shall be elected at the February meeting of the League for a term of one year with the exception of the Treasurer, who shall be elected for a term of two years. They shall assume their duties immediately after the April meeting.

Section 4. Duties

The powers and duties of the officers shall be as follows:

A. President

The President shall preside at meetings of the League, Board of Directors and Executive Committee; shall appoint the Admissions Chairman and personnel of Committees, not otherwise provided for with the approval of the Executive Committee, and shall be a member ex-officio of all committees except the Nominating Committee. She shall, with the Treasurer, sign all contracts, and obligations authorized by the Board of Directors, and shall perform the duties pertaining to the office.

B. Vice-President

The Vice-President shall assist the President and perform the duties of the President in her absence.

C. Recording Secretary

The Recording Secretary shall keep minutes of the meetings of the League, the Board of Directors, and the Executive Committee. She shall keep a correct, classified list of the names and addresses of all members and shall maintain a file of essential records which shall be transferred to her successor at the close of her term of office. She shall, with the Corresponding Secretary, compile the annual reports and edit the year book, and she shall inform all independent nominees of their nominations.

D. Corresponding Secretary

The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the general correspondence of the League. She shall assist the Recording Secretary in compiling the annual reports and editing the year book.

E. Treasurer

The Treasurer shall be the custodian of the funds of the League and shall receive all monies except for those activities which have their own treasurer or other person specifically appointed to handle finances. Such persons shall be under supervision of the Treasurer. She shall serve as Chairman of the Finance Committee. She shall make payments in accordance with the budget on written authorization of the President: expenses not provided for in the budget shall be incurred and paid only upon order of the Board of Directors. She shall keep full and accurate accounts and shall present financial statements at regular meetings of the League and Board: she shall turn over to her successor all books and financial records and shall take a listed receipt therefor.

F. Assistant Treasurer

The Assistant Treasurer shall collect all dues and assessments, check attendance records, and assist the Treasurer when necessary.

ARTICLE V—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. Personnel

The Board of Directors shall consist of the officers and the chairmen designated by the Executive Committee each year, with the retiring President. Chairmen are appointed by the President with the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Term of Office

Officers are elected for a term of one year; chairmen appointed for a term of one year. No officer or chairman shall hold the same office for more than two terms in succession.

Section 3. Duties and Powers

The Board of Directors shall have general charge and control of the affairs, funds and property of the League. It shall be the final arbiter in matters of interpretation of these By-Laws. It shall present to the membership all proposed major program activities for ratification.

Section 4. Vacancies

Vacancies among the offices shall be filled by election by the Board of Directors. Vacancies among the chairmen shall be filled by the President with the approval of the Executive Committee until the expiration of the term of office.

Section 5. Meetings

The Board of Directors shall hold regular monthly meetings from October through June. Special meetings may be called by the President and must be called upon the written request of three members of the Board.

Section 6. Executive Committee

There shall be an Executive Committee, composed of the officers, and the retiring President, which shall have all the powers of the Board of Directors between meetings. The minutes of the meetings of the Executive Committee shall be submitted to the Board for Ratification at its next meeting.

Section 7. Quorums

Eight members of the Board of Directors and three members of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum respectively.

ARTICLE VI—COMMITTEES

There shall be the following Committees who shall present plans for work to the Board of Directors. No work shall be undertaken without the Board's approval.

A. Admissions Committee

The Admissions Committee shall make recommendations to the Board with respect to applications for membership.

Names of the Admissions Committee shall be announced by the President upon election. There shall be ten members and a chairman. A voting member shall be eligible to serve for two consecutive years and shall be ineligible to serve for the following three years. The chairman may have been a voting member of the Admissions Committee for two consecutive years prior to her chairmanship but after her term as chairman shall be ineligible to serve for the following three years. The chairman shall have no vote on candidates for Provisional membership either on the Admissions Committee or as a Board member.

At the regular April meeting, the Nominating Committee shall present a list of 22 names of members who have been

active for at least two years to the voting members. This list shall contain the names of five active members who have served on the Admissions Committee the year before, 3 of whom are to be elected, 6 active members over 28 years of age, 3 of whom are to be elected; 5 active members under 28 years of age, 2 of whom are to be elected; 3 active members who have been life-long residents of Winston-Salem, 1 of whom is to be elected; and three sustaining members, 1 of whom is to be elected.

In case of ties, the active members shall cast a second ballot.

The Admissions Committee shall acquaint themselves concerning the individual candidates and shall be responsible for finding out their qualifications. After thorough discussion a vote by secret ballot shall be taken. Seven affirmative votes of the Admissions Committee are necessary for election by this committee.

B. Placement Committee

The Placement Committee shall include the Placement Chairman, and a member from each committee using volunteers, these committees being designated by the Executive Committee each year. The function of the Placement Committee shall be to plan and supervise the volunteer service program of the League. It shall interview all active members at regular intervals and offer them a free choice of placement in the Community Service program conducted by the League.

C. Education Committee

The Education Committee shall include the Education Chairman, and a member of each committee responsible for any part of the Education program. These committees being designated by the Executive Committee each year. The duties of the Education Committee shall be to plan and supervise the educational program of the League.

D. Nominating Committee

The Nominating Committee shall be composed of five members; two elected by the Board, one a Board member, the other not a board member; and three elected by the League one who has been active from one to four years inclusive, one active from five to nine years inclusive, and one who has been active over nine years. These shall be nominated from the floor at the April meeting from a roster of eligible League members. The Committee shall elect its own chairman. The Placement Chairman shall serve ex-officio.

E. Public Relations Committee

The Public Relations Committee shall include the Public Relations Chairman, and a member of each committee responsible for each phase of the League program. The duties of the Public Relations Committee shall be to plan and supervise the publicity of the League. No member of the League shall give out to the press any news item or information concerning the League without the approval of the Public Relations Committee.

F. Newsheet Committee

The Newsheet Committee shall consist of the Newsheet Editor, as Chairman, and such assistants as she may require. The duties of the Newsheet Committee are to edit and publish the Newsheet.

G. Finance Committee

The Finance Committee shall include the Treasurer, as chairman, the Assistant Treasurer, the treasurer of any money-raising activity either permanent or temporary, and a past League Treasurer. The duties of this committee shall be to plan the financing of the total League program, compile the budget, study and oversee the League's funds and investments, and to present facts to the Board and to the League of the League's financial status in any discussion regarding financial expenditure.

H. Magazine Committee

The Magazine Committee shall consist of the Magazine Chairman and such assistants as she may require. The function of the Magazine Committee shall be to report to the Junior League Magazine any developments in the League program considered to be of publication interest and value, as well as to follow up suggestions and requests from the Junior League Magazine Editor for material. It shall also develop the use of the Magazine as a program aid in its own League.

I. Special Committees

Special Committees shall be appointed by the President with the approval of the Executive Committee which shall designate their powers and the term of the committee's appointment.

ARTICLE VII—MEETINGS OF THE LEAGUE

Section 1—Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the League shall be held in April for the purpose of receiving the annual reports and of installing officers for the ensuing year.

Section 2—Regular and Special Meetings

Regular meetings shall be held from October through June, the February meeting being designated for the election of officers. Other meetings shall be held at the discretion of the Board of Directors or upon written request of ten members of the League.

Section 3. Quorum

A quorum of the League shall consist of one-third of the voting members.

ARTICLE VIII—FINANCIAL ARRANGEMENTS

Section 1. Fiscal Year, Audit and Bonding

The fiscal year shall be from April 1 through March 31.

All League books shall be audited at least annually by a certified public accountant and a copy of the complete audit shall be distributed to each member. Books shall be kept in accordance with sound accounting practices, and the community funds and administrative funds shall be carried in separate banking accounts.

The Treasurer shall be bonded in the amount determined by the Board of Directors.

Section 2. Membership Dues and Fines

All classes of membership shall pay annual dues of not more than \$12.00, which shall include the Association dues of \$5.00, part of which covers the subscription to the Junior League Magazine. Provisional members shall pay an initiation fee of \$10.00.

There shall be a fine of one dollar to each active member for non-attendance of regular meetings, and a fine of two dollars for non-attendance of the Annual meeting. Sickness, absence from the city, or an unusual emergency shall be the only acceptable excuses for an absence. It shall be made in the form of a letter to the Assistant Treasurer, written the week of the meeting. Such fines shall be payable monthly.

Any Junior League member, other than Non-Resident and Sustaining, shall be required to pay annually on March 1st, in cash, to the Thrift Shop, any amount not otherwise contributed in rummage to complete her Thrift Shop quota.

A. Payment

Dues shall be payable on the first day of the fiscal year. The Treasurer shall send notices to each member on April 1. Members whose dues and fines are not paid by May 1 will be notified by card by the Treasurer. Members whose dues and fines are not paid by May 15 will be sent a registered

letter. Members whose dues and fines are not paid by June 1 will be dropped. The only acceptable excuse for non-payment is financial disability, made in writing each year, and received by the Treasurer on or before June 1.

B. Refunds

Refunds of dues will not be made to members resigning during the fiscal year.

Refunds will not be made to Provisionals failing to meet the requirements.

C. A. J. L. A. Indebtedness

Members delinquent in paying this indebtedness to the A. J. L. A. shall be considered in arrears in their dues to this League.

Section 3. Association Dues

The Treasurer of the League shall pay yearly per capita dues for all classes of Membership to the Treasurer of the Association.

Section 4. Letters, Agreements and Contracts

Before any letter, agreement, or contract involving the expenditure of Junior League funds shall be signed and delivered, it shall be approved by the Board of Directors. If it involves more than \$500.00, it shall also be approved by the Junior League Attorney.

ARTICLE IX—DELEGATES TO ASSOCIATION CONFERENCES

Delegates to the Annual Meeting of the Association shall be Active members elected by the League.

Delegates to special meetings or conferences shall be Active members appointed by the Board of Directors.

The full expenses of delegates to conferences and the Annual Meeting of the Association shall be paid by the League.

ARTICLE X—AMENDMENTS AND RULES OF ORDER

The By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting at any meeting of the League, provided the proposed amendment has been mailed to each voting member at least two weeks prior to the date of the meeting; or provided the proposed amendment shall have been presented over the signature of five Active members at least one meeting prior to that at which action is taken, and due notice of such meeting or action is given the membership.

Roberts Rules of Order shall be the parliamentary authority for all matters of procedure not specifically covered by the By-Laws or by special rules of procedure adopted by the League.

STANDING RULES

1. It shall be the duty of the Board to enforce the By-Laws of the League and the Association Policies binding on all Leagues.

2. It shall be the duty of the Board to create, maintain, evaluate, and revise, the Manual of Procedure by which it carries out the duties and powers delegated to it in the By-Laws.

3. It shall be the duty of the Board (before the beginning of the working year) to present to the League a suggested program for ratification.

4. It shall be the duty of the Board, in drawing up the program, to give serious consideration to the interests and capacities of the members, and the number who can take an active part.

5. It shall be the duty of the Board to see that a contingency reserve be maintained in the community fund.

ASSOCIATION POLICIES BINDING ON ALL LEAGUES

AS REVISED APRIL, 1952

POLICY I

- A. The Association shall act in an advisory capacity to the Leagues except as otherwise stated in the By-Laws or in the policies and standing rules adopted pursuant thereto.
- B. The Association shall have the right to protect the Leagues from action by one League which may adversely affect the program, standing or fund-raising of other Leagues.
- C. The Junior League shall encourage their members to accept the responsibilities of good citizenship and to educate themselves in all legislative, political and governmental movements which affect the life of their communities, their countries and the world, and shall endeavor to stimulate their members to exercise their respective citizenships intelligently.

POLICY II

- A. The Association may participate in, cooperate with or sponsor any organization, movement or program, which in the judgment of the Board of Directors, as represented by a three-quarters affirmative vote of the members of the Board, will further the purpose of the Association. The Board will inform any such organization that active participation by the individual Leagues is optional. The association shall not engage in legislative action.
- B. A Junior League may participate in, cooperate with or sponsor conferences or institutes of other national or international organizations, provided approval has first been obtained from the Association office.
- C. A Junior League may hold or sponsor a group meeting of League members in connection with conferences and institutes of other national or international organizations, provided approval has first been obtained from the Association office.

POLICY III

- A. A Junior League may take action on a national, international, state or local public question, provided that a study of the specific problems and the legislative or administrative measures involved has been made, and that the action taken by that League is compatible with the stated purpose of the Association and its member Leagues; does not adversely affect any other League; is not contrary to the policies of the Association; and is subject to the following:
 1. Action may be taken on a national or international public question provided the League has first obtained approval from the Board of Directors of the Association, as represented by a three-quarters affirmative vote of the Board of Directors.
 2. Action may be taken on a state public question provided the League consults its Regional Director and follows Association legislative procedures.
 3. Action may be taken on a local public question at the discretion of the League.

POLICY IV

- A. The Association shall not act for others as a fund-raising agent.
- B. The Association shall not make financial contributions to individuals, other organizations or agencies. Financial support may be rendered for direct services.

POLICY V

- A. The Association shall endeavor to protect the name "Junior League" from misuse, and shall take all action

- which may be advisable to that end.
- B. All references to the Association should be based on accurate facts from current material made available from the Association. This material can be secured from the Regional Directors or the Association office.
 - C. Any use of the Junior League name in connection with publicity shall identify the League or Leagues involved.
 - D. Any publicity of a Junior League designed to extend beyond its community area must be approved by the Association office.
 - E. A Junior League member may publicly identify herself as such only when such identification is in connection with an affiliation or activity compatible with the stated purpose of the Association and its member Leagues and the policies of the Association.

POLICY VI

- A. The Association shall not recommend the exclusive use of a specific commercial product for the services of a specific commercial concern.
- B. A Junior League membership list shall not be made available for commercial purposes or for purposes of solicitation.
- C. A Junior League may cooperate with commercial concerns, provided the attachment is consistent with the standards of quality and dignity expressed by the Junior Leagues and the Association, and does not recommend exclusive use of a specific product or concern.
 - 1. Sponsorship of a Junior League activity by reputable firms is permitted for local broadcast, telecast or other media of communication.
 - 2. Sponsorship of a Junior League activity by reputable firms on a regional, national or international basis is permitted provided such sponsorship has been approved by the Association office.
 - 3. Direct selling in a commercial portion of a radio or television program, or in other media of communication, is permitted so long as it is in keeping with the quality of the presentation itself, feature articles in good taste, and does not recommend the exclusive use of a product by the Association, any member League, League member, or person representing the Junior League. Samples of the commercial copy must be submitted for approval by the sponsoring League to the Association office.
- D. A Junior League member may be identified as such in commercial endorsements, only in League publications and/or in connection with League money-raising projects. No Junior League member may be identified as such for personal gain.

Policies VII and VIII embody the "Minimum Standards" which all Leagues require of themselves and each other. Their observance and enforcement are the responsibility of each individual League and its officers. Visiting Board and Staff members are obligated to point out apparent deviations from these standards, but the responsibility for constant self-evaluation rests with the League, not with the Association. These policies should be printed with each League's By-Laws. These are policies as revised April 1952.

POLICY VII

Each member League shall incorporate in its charter, constitution, or By-Laws, the following material:

- A. A statement of its name, which shall be limited to the words "Junior League of (name of city, town or community in which located)."
- B. A statement of its purposes, which shall include the statement of individual purposes stated in Article I, Section 1 of the By-Laws of the Association.
- C. A statement that its policies shall be in harmony with the Policies of the Association.
- D. Provisions complying with the requirements of Article II of the By-Laws of the Association. (No other classes of membership shall be permitted; provided, however, that

- (a) individual Leagues may have a limited number of honorary members, and (b) Leagues which now have other classes, including life members, may continue such classes for their present membership, but shall not admit any additional members thereto.)
- E. A requirement that all provisional members shall complete a course which shall meet the standards set by the Association, and shall perform voluntary service for a period and in a manner satisfactory to the Placement Committee.
 - F. A requirement that all active members shall justify their membership through some form of community service satisfactory, in quality and extensiveness, to the Placement Committee (the term community service being defined as including volunteer work for, and service on Boards and Committees of, any philanthropic or humanitarian community organization of high standing in the educational, civic, cultural or social welfare fields.
 - G. A requirement for the following committees:
 - 1. An Admissions Committee whose functions shall be to pass on applications for membership in the League or to make recommendations to the Board with respect thereto.
 - 2. An Education Committee, whose function it shall be to plan and supervise the educational program of each League.
 - 3. A Finance Committee, among whose duties shall be the initial preparation of the annual budget of each League.
 - 4. Magazine Committee (or Chairman)
 - 5. A Nominating Committee whose function it shall be to prepare slates of candidates for election to the various elective offices of the League.
 - 6. A Placement Committee, the function of which shall include the interviewing of all active members at regular intervals and the offering to them of a free choice of placements as provided in F above.
 - 7. A Public Relations Committee (or Chairman).
 - H. The books and accounts of each League shall be kept in accordance with sound accounting practices; each League shall maintain a community fund separate and distinct from its administrative fund; all money in the community fund shall be distributed solely for the benefit of the community. Annually a copy of the audited balance sheet (statement of Assets and Liabilities) and profit and loss statement (statement of income and expense) shall be distributed to each member of the League.
 - I. A requirement that the Board of each League shall present to the membership all proposed major program activities for ratification.

POLICY VIII

- A. The course for provisional members of all Leagues shall include all topics covered in the Association's basic provisional course outline. Each League shall send to the Association annually, for evaluation and criticism, an outline of its provisional course as soon as reasonably possible after the completion thereof.
- B. The Placement Committee of each League shall keep as nearly as possible uniform records concerning the activities of the members under its supervision.
- C. No individual League shall associate itself with nor endorse any welfare or other similar project, program or activity which does not meet accepted standards in its field, or show evidence of working toward such standards.
- D. All money-raising, on the part of individual Leagues, shall be consistent with standards of dignity and good taste and in keeping with the laws and customs of the community.
- E. Each League shall send to the Association annually a copy of its audited annual statement.
- F. Each League shall maintain the same standards as required of applying groups under Article II-A, Section 2 of the Association By-Laws.

Association Procedures Applying To All Leagues

INTER-LEAGUE MEMBERSHIP PROCEDURE

A member of any League who is subject to frequent change in residence may have an inter-League card issued to her by the League of which she is a member, accrediting her temporarily to the League in the city where she is then residing. An Inter-League member shall continue to be listed as a member of and shall pay her regular dues to the League which issues the card; she shall also have all privileges of membership in the League to which she is temporarily accredited, except the right to vote or to hold office; she shall comply with the requirements of such League.

Transfer of Members:

Provisional, active, sustaining and non-resident members in good standing shall have the right of transferring membership from one League to another. The right of transfer granted in this section need not extend to a person who has been dropped or expelled from membership by the League to which transfer is desired. Provisional members shall take any additional training required by Leagues to which they transfer. A League may require all active members who are applying for transfer to take an orientation course before their transfers are accepted. A League shall not be required to accept transfers which exceed twenty-five per cent of all admissions to membership in any one year. If it is necessary for transfers to be put on a waiting list, they shall be accepted in the order in which they apply.

Fiscal Matters:

The books of account of each League shall be audited annually by a certified public accountant. Members of individual Leagues who are delinquent in paying any indebtedness to the Association shall be considered in arrears in their dues to their own League.

Arranging Inter-League Memberships:

Section 1

Inter-League cards issued pursuant to Article II-B, Section 2, of the By-Laws, shall be for a term of one year, unless extended by the League to which the card is issued. Any extension shall be limited to an additional year.

Section 2.

The League to which a member is temporarily accredited may charge such member for special club privileges or for the actual cost of her membership.

Section 3.

(a) A member desiring an Inter-League card shall notify the secretary of the League to which she belongs.

(b) The secretary, or other authorized League official, and the treasurer of the League in consultation with the Placement Chairman shall be empowered to determine whether said member is in good standing.

(c) To a member in good standing the League secretary, or other authorized League official, shall issue an Inter-League card; notifying the Association headquarters that such card has been issued; and furnishing to the member the name and address of the secretary of the League to which the member may apply for temporary affiliation, and notifying that secretary about the member.

(d) Inter-League membership shall become effective immediately upon presentation of the Inter-League card to the secretary, or other authorized League officials, of the League with which the member wishes to be temporarily affiliated. This League shall notify the home League within fifteen days of the date the Inter-League card is received.

(e) When the period of Inter-League membership expires, the inter-League card shall be returned to its owner.

(f) Upon return to her home League, an Inter-League member shall return her Inter-League card for cancellation to the secretary, or other authorized League official, who shall notify Association headquarters of the cancellation of the card.

Transfer of Members:

Section 1.

The corresponding secretary and the treasurer of the League from which a transfer is made shall be responsible for filling in the information regarding the member's record called for by the transfer card supplied by the Association. They shall also certify that the transferring member is in good standing and shall then forward the transfer card to the secretary of the League to which the transfer is made.

Section 2.

Transfers shall be accepted by the Board of Directors or the Executive Committee of any League unless the member has no right to transfer under the provisions of Article II-B, Section 3 of the By-Laws. Transfers shall be accepted in order of application, except that applications of members under 40 may be given precedence over those of sustaining members. Transfers shall become effective upon acceptance. Within 15 days thereafter the secretary of the League to which the transfer has been made shall notify on transfer cards supplied by the Association, the member involved, the treasurer's office at Association headquarters, and the member's former League.

Section 3.

A member transferring from one League to another shall become subject to the jurisdiction of the League to which she transfers on the date on which such transfer is accepted.

A.J.L.A. GUEST ROOM INFORMATION

Junior League Section

The Junior League Guest Room Section of The Waldorf-Astoria which is located on the 19th and 20th floors, West (Park Avenue) side, consists of 32 rooms. When these rooms are taken we have an option on rooms in the hotel at their minimum rate.

For the convenience of our members a lounge is maintained on the 20th floor. A maid is in attendance from noon until 7:30 P.M., to serve tea and beverages.

Cots and cribs may be put into guests' rooms upon request. A cot is \$3.00 per night, but there is no charge for a crib.

In all cases, a 5% municipal hotel tax is added to the price of rooms.

Nurses, etc., for children may be secured through the hotel. The usual charge is \$1.00 an hour until midnight, \$1.25 per hour after. Guests are requested to state the time they would like the nurse to arrive and about how long she will be required.

Cars may be stored at a nearby garage for \$3.00 per night, including pick-up and delivery.

Accommodations

20th Floor—17 rooms; each with private bath, consisting of: 16 rooms—double occupancy. Double \$9 daily. 1 room—single occupancy only. Special rate of \$5.00 daily due to less desirable location.

19th Floor—15 single rooms—14 rooms—7 at \$3.50 daily, 2 at \$4.00 daily and 5 at \$5.00 daily. Suites of two rooms, sharing a bath. Prices differ according to size and location of rooms. 1 room—\$5.00 daily. Has a private bath.

Additional Rooms in Hotel—Double or single occupancy. Double \$11.00 daily—Single \$8.00 daily.

Reservations

In writing for information or to make a reservation, always address Guest Room Hostess, Association of the Junior Leagues of America, Inc., The Waldorf-Astoria, New York 22, N. Y.

It is advisable to write for reservations as far in advance as plans will permit. In case of cancellation an immediate wire is requested. This not only protects the Association against loss, but prevents turning away other members who could be accommodated in your place.

Reservations received by wire are answered by Western Union collect. Please indicate the name of your League when making reservations.

Since there are so few rooms in the Junior League section, it is possible to assign the best accommodations only if we know in advance the exact date of arrival and the maximum length of your stay. It is often impossible to retain rooms longer than the time specified in the reservation, due to the fact they are reserved for the very date they are to be vacated.

Registration

8 A.M. to 10 P.M.—Upon arrival, please take the West elevators and go directly to the guest room desk in the A.J.L.A. office on the 19th floor to register.

10 P.M. to 8 A.M.—Upon arrival, kindly register at the front desk of the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel.

Length of Stay

Because of the great demand for accommodations, it has been found necessary to limit the length of stay to one month for members and two weeks for guests who are put up by members.

A.J.L.A. Departure Time: 12 Noon

Those retaining their rooms after departure hour will be charged for another day. Due to heavy bookings, we are unable to promise that accommodations always will be assigned immediately upon arrival.

Hotel Departure Time: 3 P.M.

Eligible Guests

Relatives of members may be put up for a period not exceeding two weeks, and may stay for a month if accompanied by members.

Written authorization from a League member is REQUIRED for putting up guests.

MEMBERS SHALL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR ANY UNPAID INDEBTEDNESS INCURRED BY GUESTS INTRODUCED BY THEM.

The AJLA Board adopted new arrangements on rooms in the Waldorf-Astoria through room facilities. Such rooms will be available for use of Junior League members and their immediate families only.

Members are requested to write headquarters for the necessary form to be filled out for non-members, who cannot be accepted until this form is received (No form is necessary for members or non-members who accompany members.)

When bringing guests, it is well to send their names in advance. This insures holding of messages and communications received at the hotel previous to arrival.

Telephone Connection.

The most direct way for your friends to reach you is by calling the Waldorf-Astoria, Eldorado 5-3000, and asking for you by name. If you are out, messages may be left with the Waldorf operator and will be typewritten and sent to your room. The Junior League may be reached through the Waldorf number, or direct at Eldorado 5-4380. We will be glad to give information and render any assistance possible to your friends in reaching you.

Bills

Bills are mailed to guests after their departure unless they prefer to pay before leaving. Only United States Currency, checks on United States Banks or checks on Canadian Banks payable in American funds can be accepted. **CHECKS WILL NOT BE CASHED FOR MEMBERS UNLESS THEY ARE STAYING IN THE HOTEL AS JUNIOR LEAGUE GUESTS.**
