

Introduction

MY PERSPECTIVE OF BROUGHTON

The Class of 1959 was blessed to be perfectly sited in the golden year of the Eisenhower years. The Eisenhower years were characterize by peace, stability, growth and modest prosperity. These idyllic years were sandwiched between the great Depression, World War II, the angst of Vietnam and the civil rights unrest of the 1960s. This brief and unique era was during our own formative years and may not be repeated. It is my belief it was a special and wonderful time to grown up.

Despite the tranquil years of the 1950's, we were also in the midst of a 45-year Cold War, complete with atomic bomb fears, seven foot Russians and Vietnam - which would claim our Dudley Dalhouse and Gordon Chadwick (Class of 1958), and earn Buddy Crumpler a Purple Heart. All three were neighbors around Anderson Drive.

During our era, we avoided or just missed integration, drugs, alcohol, big wealth, the Pill (not that it was needed), bullies (think Jeter Lewis), war immigration, class warfare and assassinations.

We were innocent and unaware of our segregation and the looming clash of civil rights which followed. Multiculturalism was not a goal; it was not yet invented.

We dodged the Depression and World War II and, thankfully, missed being Baby Boomers, yet we carry these DNA's. We are something in-between, perhaps a bridge generation yet to be studied.

It was a simpler time and lacking in the luxuries that we now witness. The prime worries were related to the basic needs of living, with few excesses. My memory is that everyone was middle class. Neither did I observe extreme poverty or wealth.

The early 1950's prior to high school were somewhat simple in that we:

only had one car in a family
walked to school
played in the woods and creeks
listened to radio, as RV emerged
played neighborhood sports
teachers and parents ruled and were respected
did not wear jeans to school
feared polio
grew up slowly
being good and well-mannered was important.

We morphed from grade school to 8th grade at Broughton to junior high and back to Broughton. Any confusion can be expected.

Watson Holyfield and Joe Holliday were effective as good cop-bad cop team -- a management technique I later witnessed many times.

School traditions were prevalent and respected. It provided a sense of place. Teachers and parents forced on us the seriousness of life, although we did not always take heed. We were well-prepared in our academics. Years later I determined that our teachers were conscientious and superior to others - despite their quirkiness and rigidity. Our numerous attempts at rebellion were marginal and more experimental than a serious rage. I remember Billy Lynn's iconic Crosley left outside the auditorium entrance. Deep down our favorite two cops thought it was humorous - but never admitted it.

Any cliques we had were based on friendships and were not malevolent.

Boredom was a factor. A common complaint for us was, "There's nothing to do in Raleigh." Raleigh was a docile sleepy town soon to be discovered by the Research Triangle and blossom into an envied growth machine which struggles with its success. Our Smedes York successfully served as Mayor for four years.

I first thought our class was well above average with prettier girls, skillful athletes, high intellects and wholesome qualities. After several decades of comparison, I saw we were more average on the first three items, but the special wholesome qualities remained.

Our idyllic years may not have fully prepared us for the gritty toughness, mean spirits and grim reality of life. Yes, we had more personal growth and challenges ahead of us.

Nevertheless, I believe our Broughton years were more prefect than imperfect. It is possible we had better experiences in high school than our children with their limitless privileges and opportunities. I am grateful to have been part of Broughton and our special class.

Reading the personal profiles featured later in this memory book will reveal the identify of the author of this composition.





Throughout the 1950s, Reynolds Coliseum rocked with the biggest holiday basketball tournament in the country -- the Dixie Classic. The three-day event in late December was even more popular than the postseason ACC Tournament. But it was canceled in 1961 because of a national point-shaving scandal that included players from N.C. State University and UNC-Chapel Hill.

The field in the Dixie Classic consisted of the Big Four schools -- N.C. State, Duke, UNC and Wake Forest -- and four teams from different sections of the country. Four N.C. State players -- Don Gallagher, Stan Niewierowski, Anton Muehlbauer and Terry Litchfield -- and UNC's Lou Brown were among players across the country who were charged with fixing college games in that era. Top administrators at UNC and N.C. State disbanded the Classic and de-emphasized basketball by cutting their regular-season schedules. UNC played only 17 games in the 1961-62 season, Dean Smith's first as head coach.

A Little Story of How "Bugg" " got his name ...

Few of my friends have any idea. To burst a myth, Walt Disney did not name me for Bugs Bunny. But you'd be surprised how many people think so! To this day, lots of people still pluralize my nickname. I'm only one Bugg (that's a gracious plenty)-not two bugs! Actually, my late parents--bless their hearts--are to blame for hanging this moniker on a poor, defenseless, little child. Sometimes I wonder if I'll ever be able to forgive them. You'll never imagine how much kidding and woe this nickname "Bugg" has caused me over the years--especially when I was growing up as a child and starting school. Here's the real story about how this nickname came to be. Actually, it's guite bizarre. If you happen to be a Raleigh native in your 60's or older, you will no doubt remember the legendary Dr. Charles Bugg. For many years, Dr. Bugg was Raleigh's sole pediatrician. Later, he partnered with Dr. Sanders to form Sanders and Bugg, MD's. If you were of that time and place, your Momma either took you to see Dr. Bugg or Dr. Sanders. In the beginning, it was most likely Dr. Bugg. Like most small children, I was scared SHITLESS of him! Charles Bugg was a very kindly and gentle man--wonderful with children--but I associated him with "needles" and "shots" and that sort of thing. One day when I was about two years old, I as misbehaving at home in front of my mother and father by whining, crying and pouting like children that age are prone to do. My mother said, "If you don't stop that whining, we're going to take you to see Dr. Bugg." Instantaneously, I froze in mortal fear and went almost catatonic. The misbehavior stopped on a dime. My Mom and Dad thought it was funny as hell! So, they started using the threat as a discipline device. Friends of my parents would come over for a visit. I might be crawling around on the floor perfectly happy. Mom and Dad would say to their company, "Hey, watch this. They they would say the word, "Bugg." I would freeze in abject terror while the adults yucked it up. Well, like most nicknames do, it caught on. Mom called me "Bugg" and Dad called me "Bugg-Boy." Then all of their friends and my little playmates picked it up. The rest is history. I became "Bugg" to Raleigh. Only one problem. My contemporaries had no knowledge of the true origin of my name. But they did know about Bugs Bunny. So, in the iuvenile world. I became "bugs." I HATED IT! Meantime, until the day he died, Dr. Charles Bugg thought my parents had named me after him. I suffered all the way through kindergarten, elementary and high school with the name "Bugs" or "Bugg" Berryhill. Finally when I headed for UNC in l959, I said, "Enough is enough. I'm not going to have classmates calling me 'Bugs' at Carolina." So, since my given name was William Irwin (hell, Irwin was almost as bad as "Bugs"), I opted to introduce myself to all my new college friends as Bill. As a result I have two distinct and separate groups of friends. Old friends (ante 1959) call me "Bugs" or "Bugg." Newer friends (post 1959) call me Bill. I will readily answer to both. Whenever someone calls me "Bugg," I know immediately that it's an old friend--and old friends are truly the best. But then there is the story of my last name "Berryhill" ... we'll save that for another time.







Burlington couldn't catch up with fleet halfback Johnny Wardlaw often enough Friday night at Devereux Meadow and as a result took a 26-6 beating from Raleigh's Caps.

Wardlaw, 145-pound tcam cap-tain, showed his heels to the Bulldogs three times in the first half as Raleigh grabbed a 20-0 lead. For the game he gained 194 yards in 14 carries, most of them sweeps around left end.






Raleigh came back later in the period on an 18-yard run by quarterback Max Boxley for the final touchdown.


Edgerton contributed 10 points, hitting five field goals. Scott Bowers had nine points and Forney Holler and Bobby Soden hit for six each.


GO CAPS!



Martin, one of the finest track men Raleigh has had in some time, made another clean sweep by winning both the high and low hurdles.


Both Bowers and Martin will be among the favorites in their respective events at the state meet next Friday.







Remember that caps and gowns are coremonial attire and are to be worn accordingly. The only occasions for wearing them are: (1) Senior picture (2) Baccalaureate Sermon (3) Class day and night program (4) Senior assembly (5) Graduation (6) Church Programs

At all other times they should be carried in a box provided for that purpose including coming to and returning home from school. Remember it takes only one person to cause a negative impression. Remember you are responsible for yourself and your class. Please take care of the box also as the gowns have to be returned in these boxes.

Girls do not remove caps at any time during the baccalaureate or graduation exercises. All boys remove caps simultaneously whenever a prayer is being offered. The cap should be removed with the left hand. Boys remove their caps when receiving their diploma: the diploma is received with the right hand. After receiving diploma, do not replace cap until seated.

The tassel is worn over the right eye; pin it in place. The point of the cap crown is worn to the rear. The cap at all times should be worn parallel to the ground. It is suggested that the girls wear dark shoes and very light-weight clothing. Boys should wear white shirts and dark ties. No coats should be worn due to the heat. Dark shoes and trousers should be worn if possible.





Theme:

Our high school knowledge is a picture -- a painting whose richness, realism, and meaning are revealed to us more fully as years pass and our perspective grows.

Symbolism: The narrator, his inner voice, and the background painting of Broughton form the major features of the production. The narrator and his inner thoughts (represented by the Voice) portray the class of '59, today; tomorrow -- the future. The painting is symbolic of the true importance of Broughton Now it is blurred and obscured. Only faintly is any part of the picture discernible. Yet, as time passes, the painting -- Broughton's true significance -- becomes clearer, more meaningful.

Act I

The time is now. Graduating tomorrow, our narrator struggles with himself (the Voice) about what high school has really meant to him. He recalls the events of his high school years that at present mean the most to him. Prominent in his thoughts are the fun and hard work of his three years here. The real significance of Broughton -- symbolized by the painting -- is dark, unclear to the graduate.

Act I

A few years have passed now, and our narrator is in college. He still questions himself on the importance of Broughton. Yet, in his questioning he is beginning to see more than the good times of high school. He is beginning to recognize the true educational value of his school years. Now the Broughton picture is beginning to take shape, to become clear to him.

Act II

High school, college, business -- our narrator is ten years older. Self-confident, mature, he no longer questions Broughton's importance; dances and homework are no longer so salient in his memories. In these later years the '59 graduate realizes and appreciates his high school training. The years have lighted for him the whole picture of Broughton.




School officials surprised by spirited opposition to parking plan

RALEIGH - Broughton High :hool's front lawn is more than st green grass to alumni. It's 'sacred expanse" and an "icon" juivalent to the Mona Lisa. Those were some of the emoonal phrases invoked by the hool's influential alumni on uesday as they persuaded the leigh Planning Commission reject a plan to turn the tiered wn into a parking lot. They at down arguments from hool officials and parents who id the additional parking is eded to give students and traf-: some relief.

"Protect the integrity of this ilding," said Harold Tharrington, an alumis and retired founding partner of the law m of Tharrington Smith. "It's worth it. It's e right thing to do.'

William Berryhill Jr., another alumnus d retired U.S. marshal for the Eastern strict of North Carolina, said paving over

the front lawn would be like spray painting graffiti on the Mona Lisa.

"It's unthinkable to pave over the front lawn for a parking lot," Berryhill said.

In the aftermath of the planning com-

mission's 6-3 vote rejecting the parking plan, Wake County school officials said they

haven't decided whether they appeal to the Raleigh City Cou cil, which would have final sa

The fierce opposition to the plan surprised school official who had expected easy approv and additional parking ready t October.

Opened in 1929, Broughton the oldest high school i Raleigh. It has been designate a historic landmark by the cit and features a distinct archite tural look, similar to a castle that's at odds with the box school designs of today.

Located on St. Mary's Streenear Cameron Village Broughton, like many older hig schools, has less parking tha

newer campuses. While the standard fc new Wake high schools is 797 spaces for str dents, staff and visitors, Broughton has 27 spaces; the plan to pave over the lawn woul add 126, camouflaged by streetscaping.

The lack of on-campus parking for Broughton's 2,200 students means many students pay up to \$400 a year to use off-campus parking lots. The school district charges \$170 a year for parking.

School officials say they are trying to replace parking spaces that have been lost on campus and surrounding streets.

"We really need to have more parking on campus," said Maggie Turner, 16, a junior, who pays \$300 a year to use an off-campus lot across from Broughton.


Other students get to school very early in the morning to find street parking or a spot in a free, first-come, first-so ve gravel lot behind the school.

The Planning Commission delayed taking action last month, asking the school district to consider other options.

School officials said Tuesday that alternatives such as using nearby Fletcher Park wouldn't provide enough spaces. They also said they were worried about the safety hazards of creating additional parking that would require students to cross the street.

Two dozen Broughton alumni, showed up at Tuesday's hearing to oppose the project. They recognized the need for more space, but favored building a parking deck over paving the lawn.

Tharrington, one of the leaders of the alumni opposition, said some areas aren't meant to have cars. For instance, he said, you



wouldn't pave over the Bell Tower at N.C. State University to get more parking.


"This building is an icon," he said. "There aren't many icons ir Raleigh."

A few parents also attended the hearing to voice support for the parking lot.

The fact that it's a school, un fortunately, takes a little bit o precedence over historic preser vation," said Susan Leonard whose daughter is a senior at Broughton.

Bart White, an alumnus and parent of a Broughton student said the school will be weakened without adequate parking. "The strength of Broughton is not the beauty of the school," White said "The strength of Broughton is the students of the school.'

Raleigh recaptures its low-rise past


Hundreds of feet below the surging shimmer of Raleigh's new RBC office tower, a humbler but equally dynamic transformation is taking shape.

Down along the broad new sidewalks of Raleigh's reborn Fayetteville Street, entrepreneurs and preservationists are restoring century-old store-fronts in vibrant colors, decorative facades and historic textures.


Like others scattered throughout downtown, the reincarnated cast-offs, standing as thick as seven abreast along Fayetteville Street's 200 block, are helping to revive the city's forlorn heart—one costly, painstaking renovation at a time.

"When you looked at this block 10 years go, it was primarily vacant, and half the block had false facades," said Myrick Howard, president of Preservation North Carolina, whose headquarters is in the 1874 Briggs Building, which anchors the stretch. "It has turned into a very cool block. It will wind up in a lot of brochures about Raleigh, because it has a very interesting, late 19th-century/early

20th-century streetscape."
